During the Spring Term the Guidance Department held a Career Day. Successful professionals — bankers, doctors, and lawyers in the area came in and talked to interested students about their occupations.

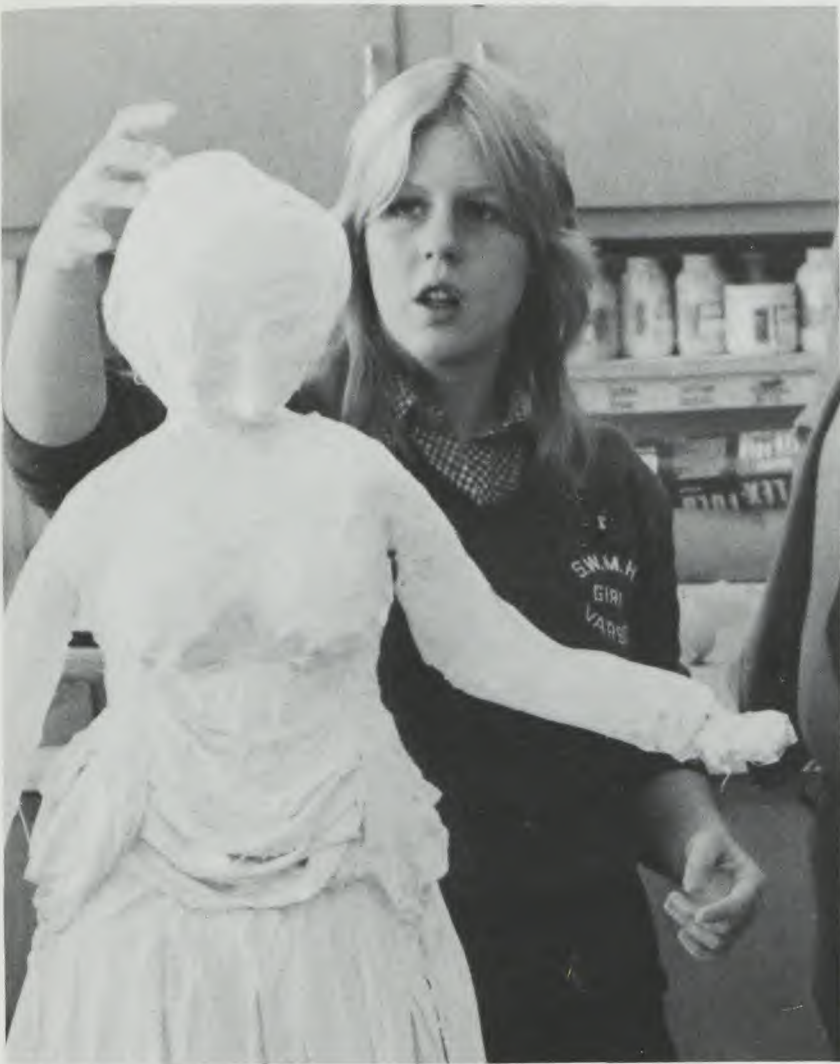

Mr. Todd, the advisor feels that being a Mathelete provides a forum for students interested in Math problems to meet and discuss the solutions.

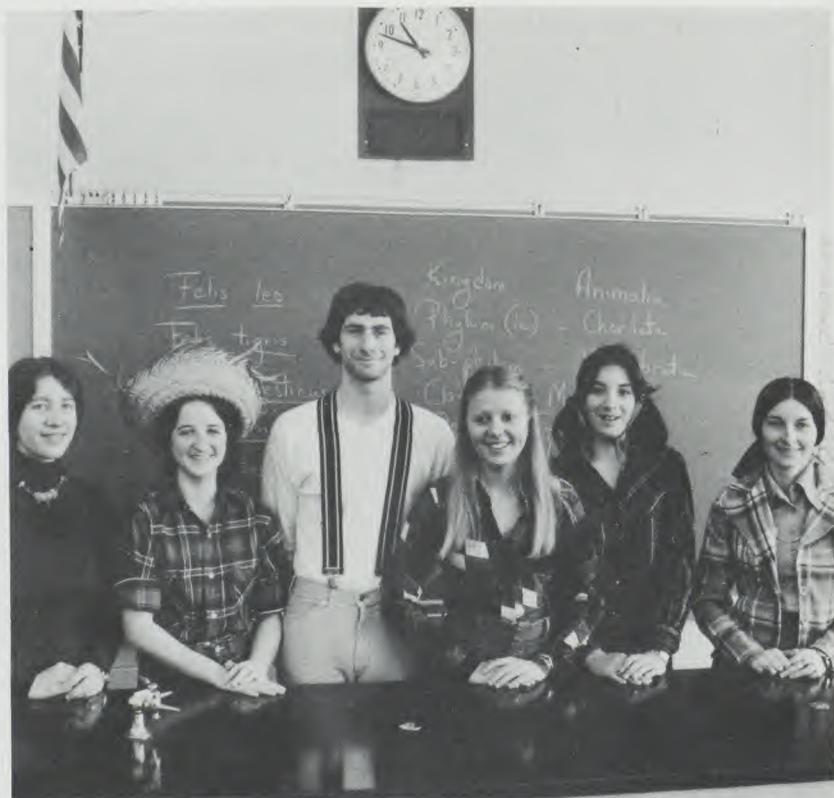

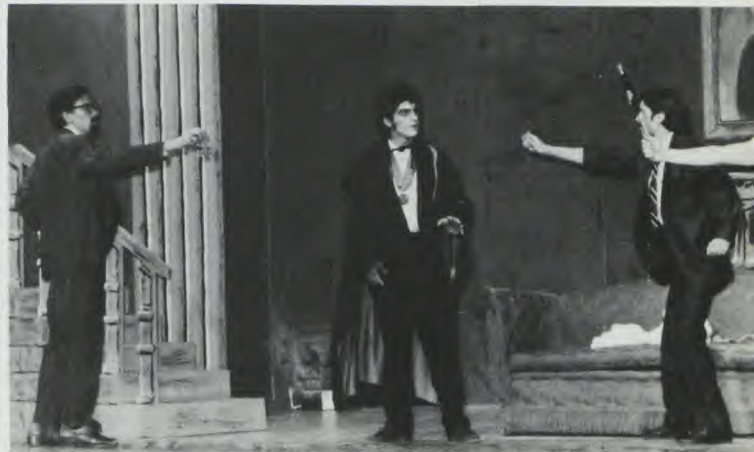

A program designed to help crew members acquire and improve their skills is held each spring.



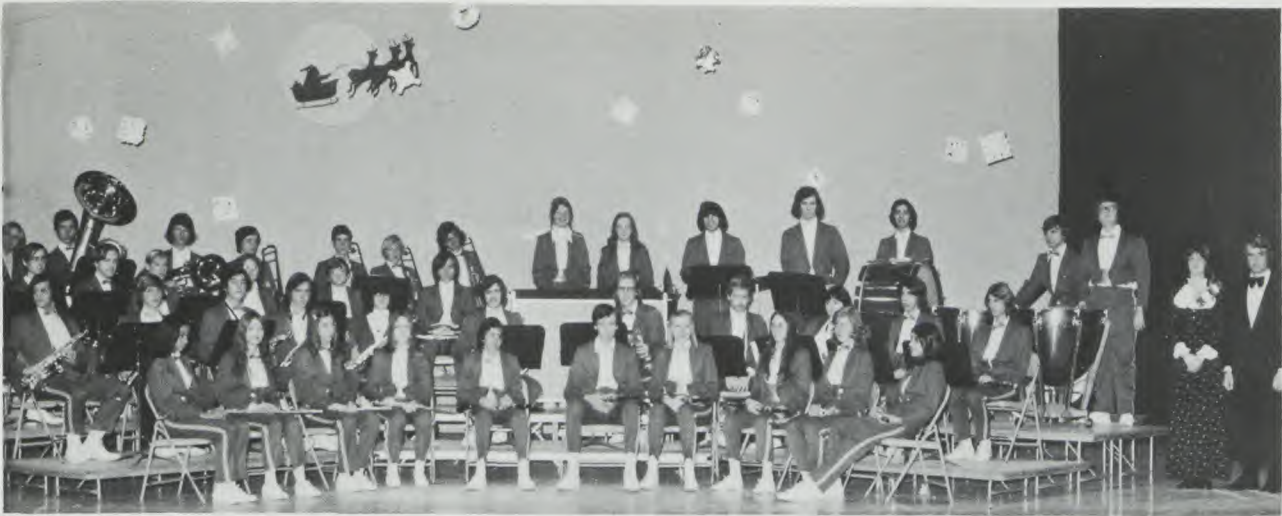

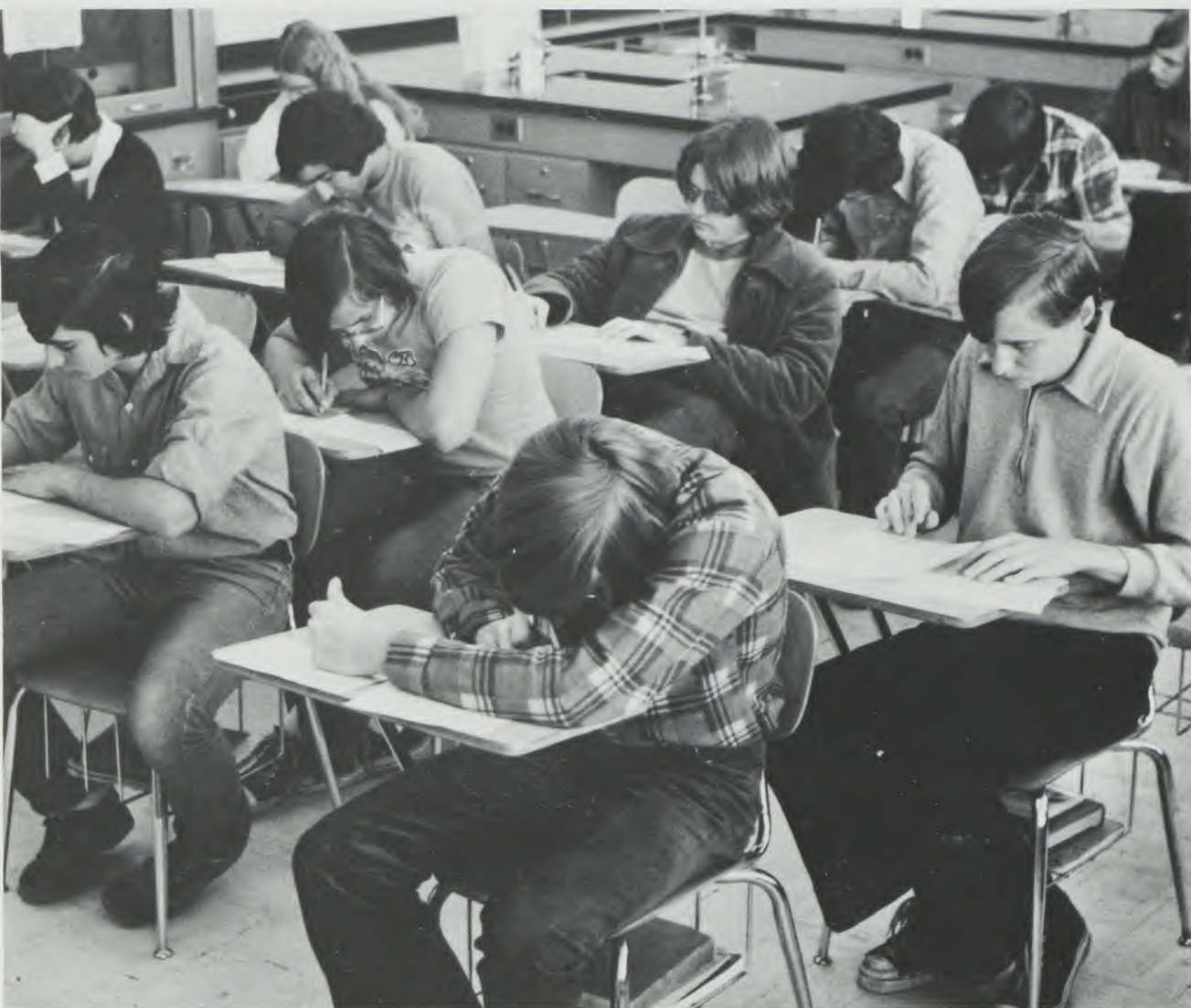

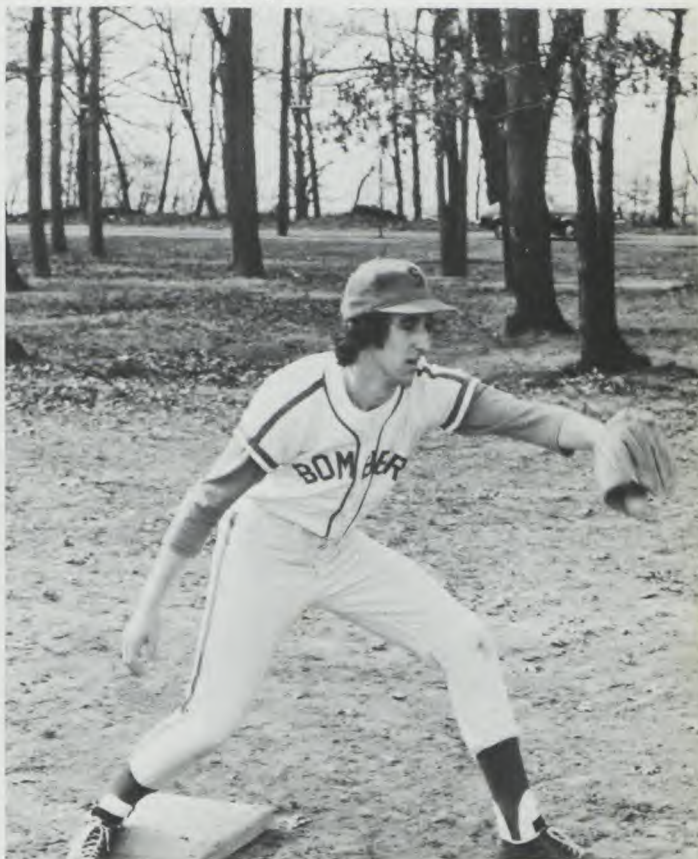

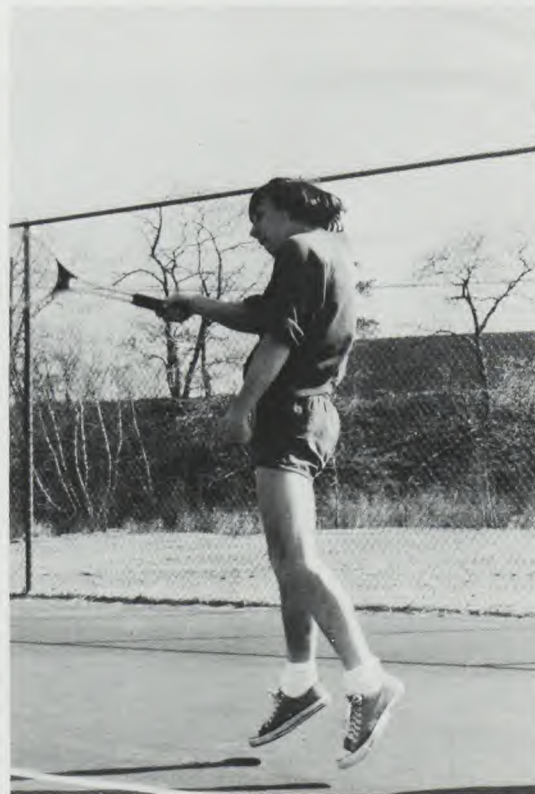
