GL students take top honors in science contest

BERKELEY HEIGHTS — For the fourth year in a row, Governor Livingston's Project Home-Page Team, an extracurricular science team, has taken top honors in the nationwide Internet-based science fair called TechXplore.

Each fall, the Project Home-Page team at Governor Livingston assembles to brainstorm a new way in which technology can be used to make the world a little bit better.

They conduct Internet searches throughout the school year to see if their ideas could work and prepare a series of web pages that explain their proposal to the judges. Their past projects have tackled the problems of transporting nuclear waste safely; safeguarding rescue workers with a suit of environmental sensors; and most notably, protecting citizens in public buildings against bio-terrorists.

For this work, they have appeared on NBC News Channel 4; met with the head of Homeland Security, Tom Ridge; presented their work at the National Press Club, and been recognized at the Electronic Industries Alliance annual convention in Washington, D.C., the organization that sponsors TechXplore.

This year, the students' project, "Faraday's Dream," grapples with the challenge of finding an alternate, clean, renewable energy source — specifically by generating electricity in space using the Earth's magnetic field.

The "Faraday's Dream" proposal, which can be viewed at the Berkeley Heights Public Schools website (www.bhs.k12.nj.us), has earned the team its fourth year of top honors and a trip to Washington D.C. to receive the TechXplore award, on Tuesday, May 25.

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Schering-Plough makes Summit the company's major research site

AREA — The Schering-Plough Corporation last Wednesday, May 26, announced plans to develop its 88-acre Summit campus into a major research and development site that will become the company's second largest facility in New Jersey.

The global health care company plans to move 450 employees into the Summit facility before the end of 2004, with staffing to increase to approximately 1,700 by the end of 2005 as the company invests an estimated \$20 million over the two-year period into the maintenance of the infrastructure on the Summit campus.

The announcement ends an anxious year of uncertainty during which the campus, formerly owned by the Novartis Pharmaceuticals Corporation, has stood vacant while an embattled Schering-Plough decided the future course of its company, including the possible sale of the Summit site.

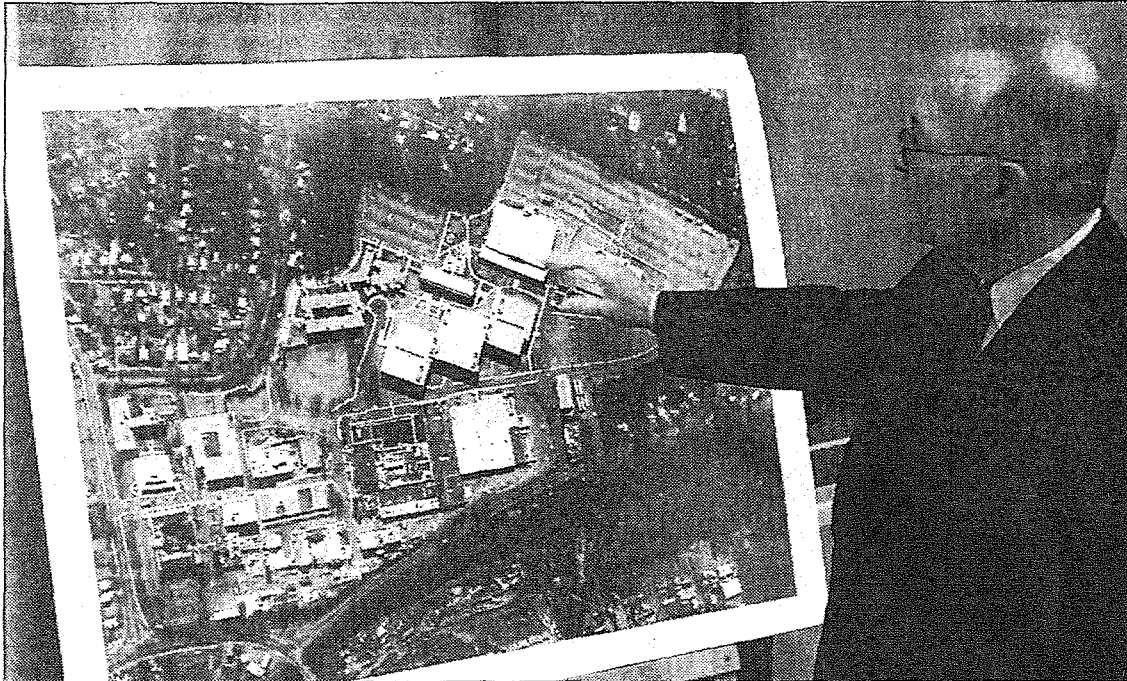
"We're thrilled," said Summit Mayor Jordan Glatt after hearing the announcement. "This is great for Summit. They have been an unbelievable corporate neighbor even before they fully occupied the site."

Winners and losers

While the decision is good for Summit, it may have a negative impact elsewhere.

The statement released by Schering-Plough last Wednesday said the company intends to vacate office space it leases at 3 Connell Drive in Berkeley Heights and will look into the eventual sale of the building it owns at the Giralda Farms Corporate Center in Madison as it moves to consolidate several of its New Jersey facilities.

Company officials emphasized that relocation of employees from satellite locations is expected to occur in phases, that details and specific timetables are still to be determined, and that not all employees affected would necessarily be moving to Summit.

Madison Mayor Woody Kerkleslager said a spokesperson for Schering-Plough recently confirmed that there would be some movement of employees at the Giralda Farms location, but that the building would not be vacated. Mayor Kerkleslager said he expected "Madison Schering-Plough will be occupied and used for the indefinite future."

In its statement last Wednesday, the company noted that plans for the facilities that would be vacated are still being determined, and that no layoffs are expected to occur as a result of this project.

"We plan to develop Summit into Schering-Plough's second-largest campus in New Jersey," second only to the company's headquarters location in Kenilworth, said Fred Hassan, chairman and chief executive officer.

The reorganization is intended to bring together core teams and operations into the same locations, Mr.

Hassan explained. He said, "Wherever possible, we intend to build contiguous work spaces so that our teams can work closely together. This creates important synergies and efficiencies, and reflects the new culture and global operations of the company we are building."

Mr. Hassan noted that the decision to develop the Summit site came as part of his 360-degree review of Schering-Plough that he undertook after joining the company just over a year ago. Recognizing challenges facing the company, he said several options for the site were considered, including its possible sale.

The decision to proceed with development, he said, was made after determining that doing so would achieve several objectives. It would: —Address current and future office space and R&D needs.

Consolidate functions that routinely interact at a single location.

Be the most cost-effective, by capitalizing on the assets of an existing site and cutting costs by reducing the number of Schering-Plough satellite locations in New Jersey.

"Developing the Summit site and bringing more of our people together will be integral to our plans for building the New Schering-Plough," said Mr. Hassan.

Preliminary plans call for Consumer Health Care employees in Berkeley Heights and Animal Health employees in the Union building to move to new offices in Summit. This move, involving approximately 350 employees, would unite the two primary businesses in the company's Global Specialty Operations unit and is targeted for completion by year-end 2004.

In addition, approximately 100 employees involved in auditing functions now working in three locations are expected to move to Summit by late summer.

When further actions currently planned are completed, the Summit site is expected to have approximately 1,700 Schering-Plough employees by year-end 2005.

Summit is planned to become a major R&D site for Schering-Plough, though initial occupancy is expected to be by business and administrative functions.

Since purchasing the Summit site, Schering-Plough has constructed a new \$70 million drug safety evaluation facility there. The new 145,000-square-foot building remains unoccupied as its new laboratories undergo a validation process which is expected to continue through 2006.

Formerly Novartis

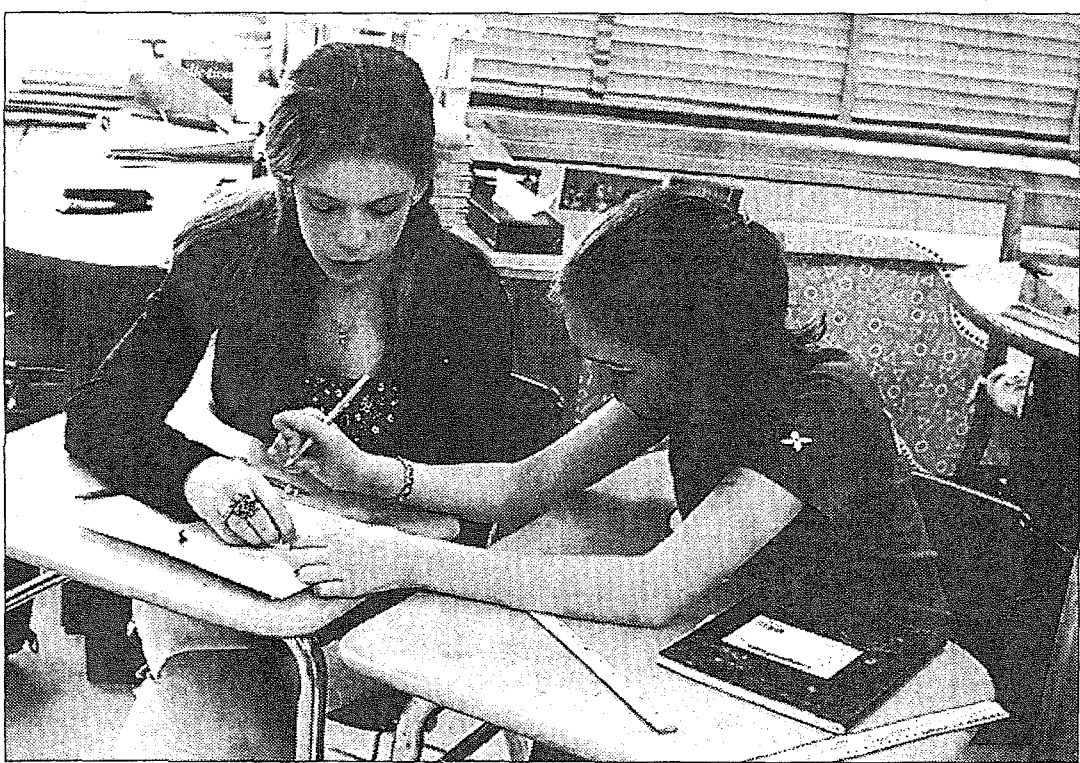
Schering-Plough purchased the Summit site from Novartis in November 2000, with Novartis vacating the site in April 2003. At its peak, approximately 2,500 people were employed by Ciba-Geigy (which merged with Sandoz to become Novartis) at the Summit site.

The research and development, laboratory and office complex totals approximately 1.7 million square feet in some 13 buildings, located at the intersection of Morris Avenue and River Road. The site has been occupied for R&D, laboratory, administrative offices and pharmaceutical manufacturing uses since 1937.

Schering-Plough is a global science-based health care company with leading prescription, consumer and animal health products. Through internal research and collaborations with partners, Schering-Plough discovers, develops, manufactures and markets advanced drug therapies to meet important medical needs.

However, the company has no plans for any manufacturing at the Summit site.

Schering-Plough employs more than 30,000 people around the world, with approximately 7,000 employees in New Jersey.

Memorial Day commemoration set for Monday

NEW PROVIDENCE — American Legion Post 433 and the New Providence Recreation Commission have planned events for this year's Memorial Day Parade, scheduled for 10 a.m. on Monday, May 31, on Springfield Avenue stepping off from Central Avenue.

This year marks the 50th time that Post 433 and the Recreation Commission have co-sponsored the town's Memorial Day Parade.

The parade, as always, is in memory of those who have served their country in the armed forces.

In addition to American Legion Post 433, the Beacon Hill Post 190 Veterans of Foreign Wars; New Providence High School Marching Band; New Providence Borough officials; New Providence Fire Department, and other local civic organizations will march the mile-long route ending at the Veterans' Memorial Library. The parade will pause for memorial services at the Methodist and Presbyterian churches on Springfield Avenue. Immediately following the parade, the public may view the Legion's Military Memorabilia Display at its Post home, next to the library. Residents are also invited to the Senior Citizens' Center on Fourth Street for refreshments after the parade.

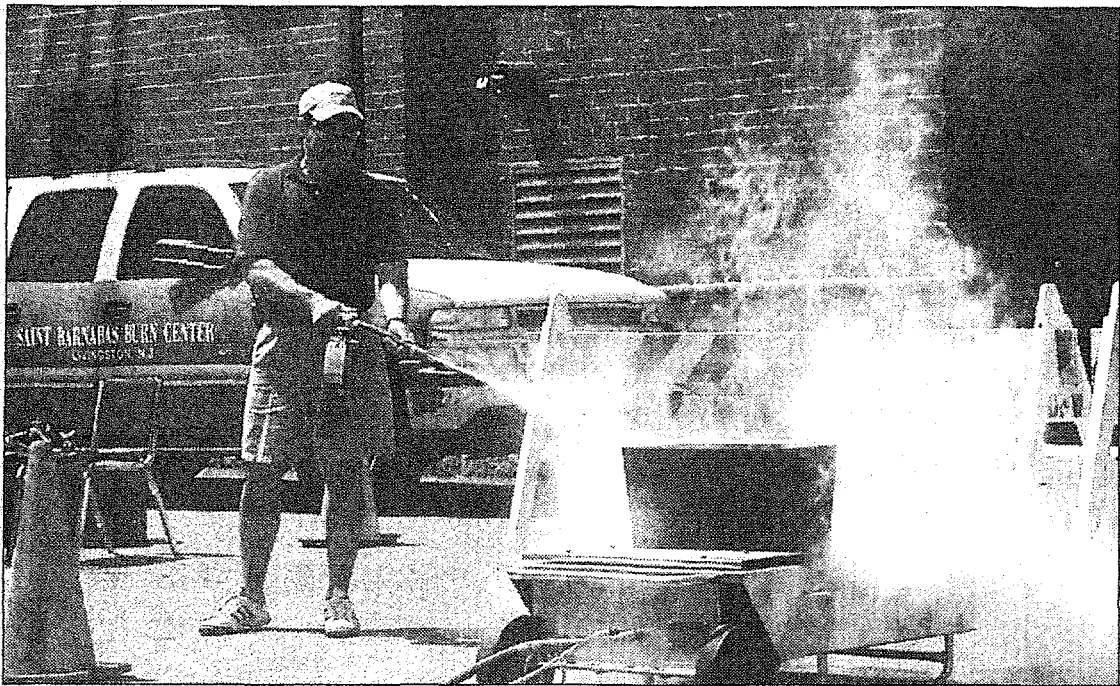
Borough seeks volunteers for committees

NEW PROVIDENCE — The borough is seeking volunteers to serve on two new committees of vital concern to the community — open space and cable TV.

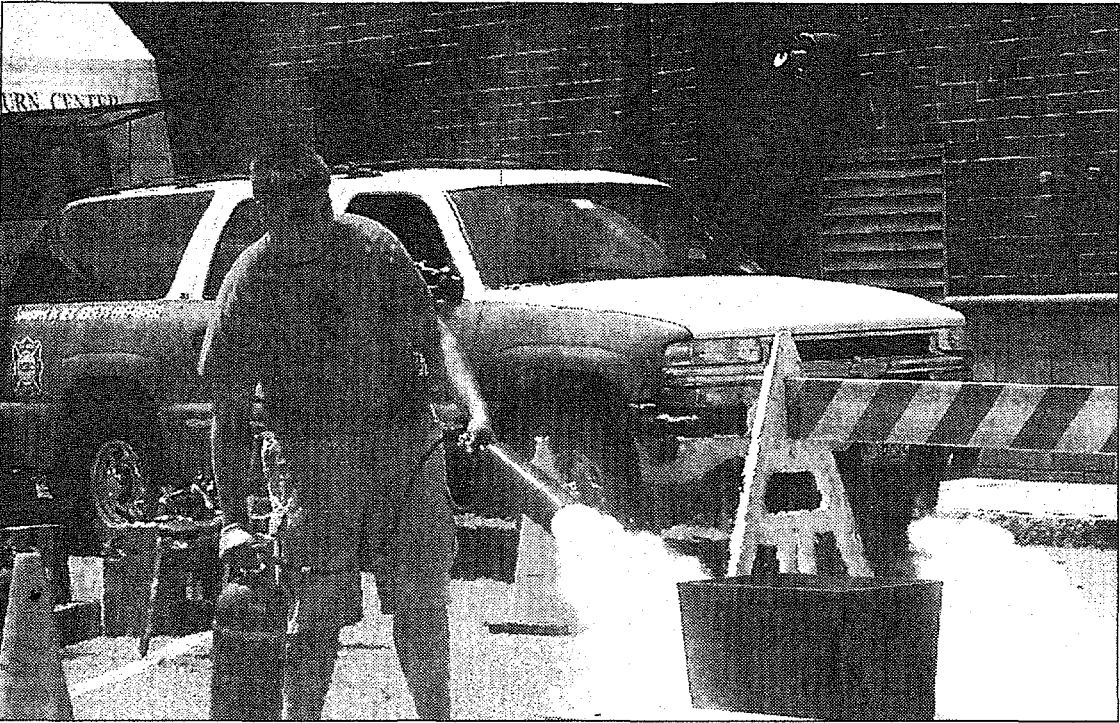
The Open Space Committee is charged with the preservation of open space and the management of

Firefighters share their skills

NEW PROVIDENCE — Scores of borough residents ranging in age from toddler to senior were given a rare opportunity to don fire gear — including a souvenir fire hat — spray hoses and ring bells during Firefighters' Day on Saturday, May

Residents arrived at the Floral Avenue firehouse with eyes wide open in anticipation of a fun-filled day. They weren't disappointed.

They departed with increased knowledge of fire safety and prevention, and a deep appreciation of the professionalism and bravery of the borough's all-volunteer fire squad. Participants raved about the op-

portunity to gain firsthand experience by putting out a live fire with an extinguisher.

After receiving instruction on the correct use of an extinguisher from firefighters Pete Popescu and Roger Demareski, a controlled fire was set ablaze using propane gas.

High school students Michael Kolanko, Bill Toft and Katie Damis demonstrated their newly-acquired skills by quickly extinguishing the fire.

Mr. Demareski offered some valuable tips, including, "If you have a fire at home, the first thing you should do is call 9-1-1, then use your fire extinguisher." He added that there are four steps to the use of an extinguisher that can be remembered through the mnemonic "PASS" — pull the pin, aim, squeeze and sweep (back and forth).

Not to be overlooked and certainly a hit with youngsters was the obstacle course, consisting of a 100-foot fire hose angled through various obstacles including chairs, tables and bottomless garbage cans.

"We're really fortunate to have the support of this town," said Fire Chief Ralph Parlapiano.

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Nelson Tree Service, Lewis Tree Service and Asplundh Tree Company have been contracted by Jersey Central Power and Light Company (JCP&L) to conduct scheduled vegetative maintenance (manual and/or mechanized, backpack foliar or stump spraying, as necessary) on 30 transmission line rights-of-way that cross multiple municipalities in nine counties. A water-soluble herbicide "Accord" will be applied to brush and tall growing vegetation to reduce/eliminate outages caused by vegetation contact with electrical wires. Application/maintenance is scheduled to begin during June 2004. Additionally, JCP&L proposes to conduct emergency vegetative maintenance in order to restore power to transmission and distribution systems in the event of storm damage that may occur throughout the Company's service territory. Tree trimming along distribution lines (primarily along public roads) will also be conducted as part of an integrated program to reduce power outages due to storm events. Some of the above activities may occur within regulated wetlands/transition areas. A copy of the complete Statewide General Permit application package can be viewed at either the municipal clerk's office or by appointment at the NJDEP's Land Use Regulation Program office at the address listed during normal business hours. The NJDEP welcomes comments that you may have concerning the applications. If you wish to comment on the application, comments should be submitted to the NJDEP in writing within 15 days of receiving this letter. However, written comments will be accepted until the Department makes a decision on the application. Comments cannot be accepted by telephone. County Clerk extends office hours for absentee voters

AREA — Union County Clerk Joanne Rajoppi will open her office on Saturday, June 5 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. for voters seeking last-minute absentee ballots.

The office will be open as a public service for voters seeking absentee ballot applications due to an inability to vote at the polls for the Primary Election on June 8.

"Voters should have every opportunity to cast their ballots," Ms. Rajoppi said. "We want to ensure that even those who have a last-minute change of plans can have a chance to vote."

Mail-in applications legally cannot be accepted if they are postmarked after June 1. Walk-in applications are accepted up to 3 p.m. on June 7, the day before Election Day.

"By opening the office on the Saturday before the election, as we have done for the past seven years, we hope to assist those citizens whose working hours or other commitments keep them from applying during the work week," said the County Clerk.

Voters will also be able to drop off completed absentee ballots at the County Clerk's Office.

This option, initiated in 2002, allows voters to pick up their ballots, fill out their votes in privacy and drop them in a secure, locked box all at the same office, through 3 p.m. on June 8. Completed ballots will be kept in a secure lockbox under the control of the Union County Board of Elections, which will pick them up for counting.

"This option makes voting more accessible and convenient for our residents, particularly for our senior citizens," says Ms. Rajoppi.

Countywide, polls are open from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. on June 8. The Clerk's office has processed more than 1,000 absentee ballot

applications to date.

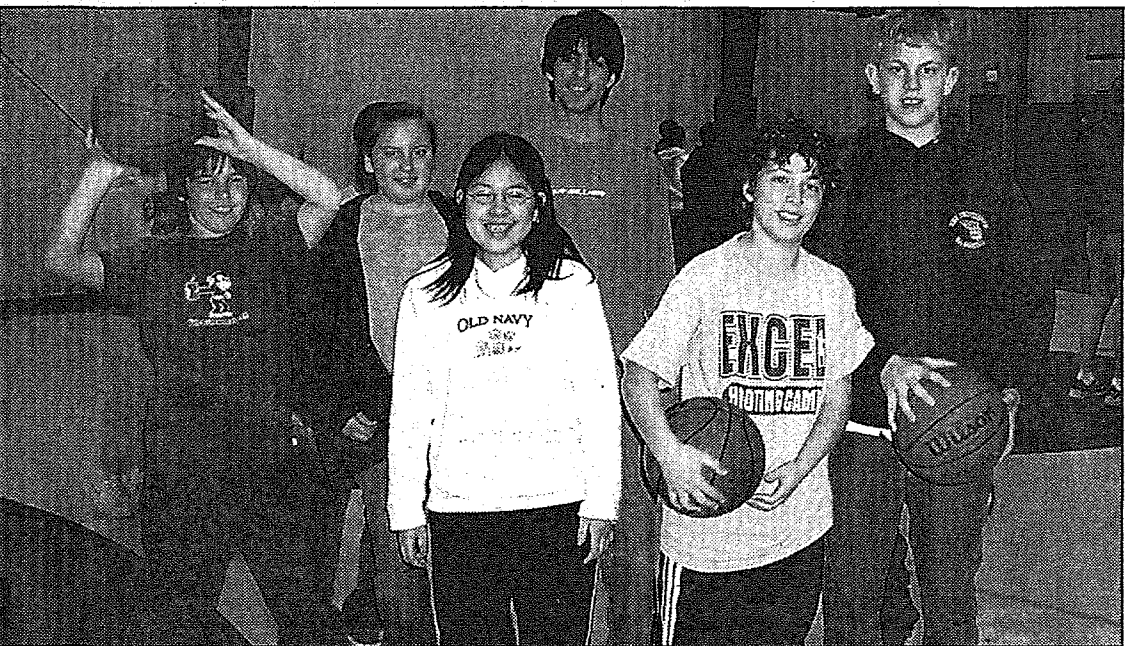

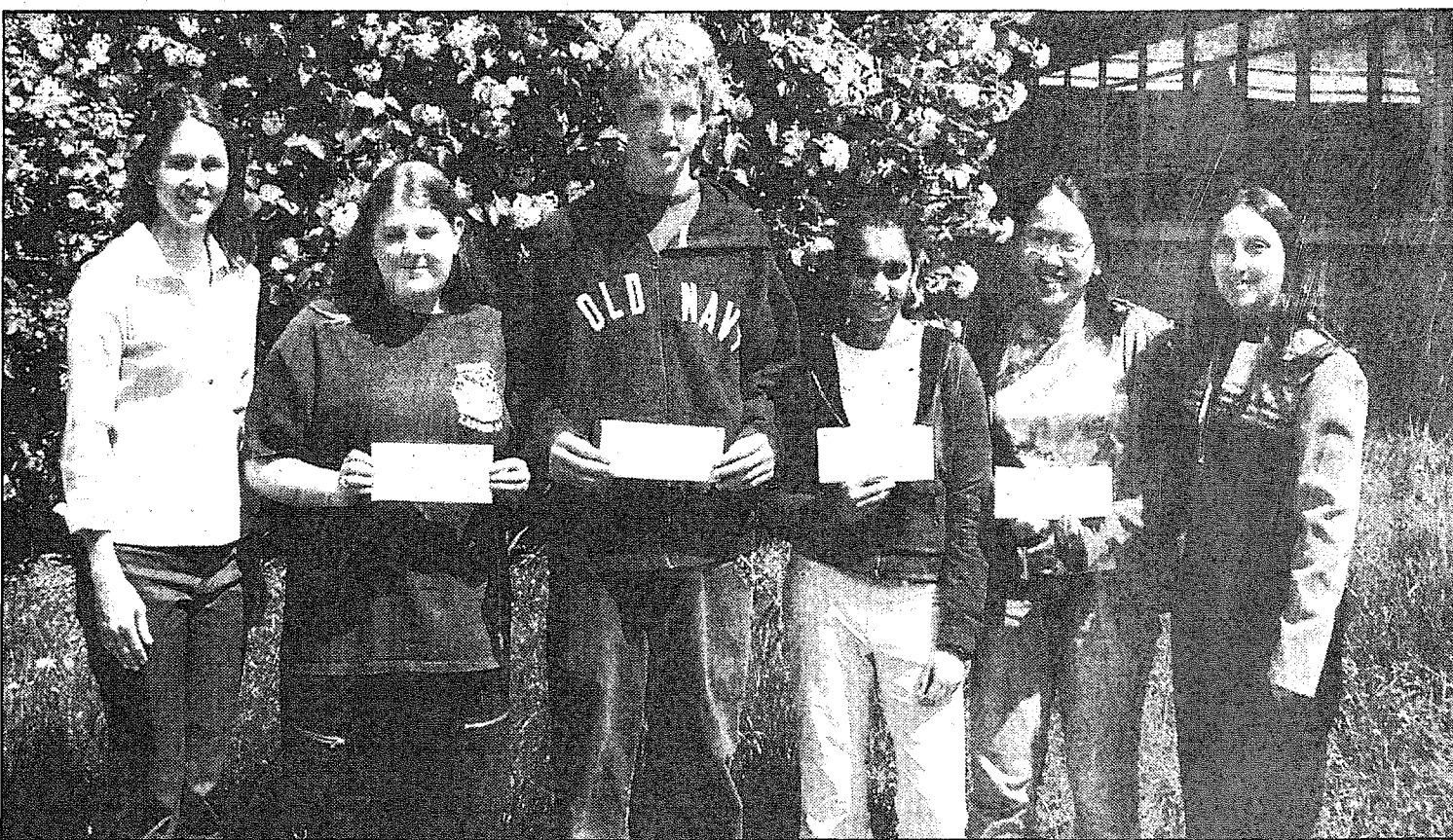

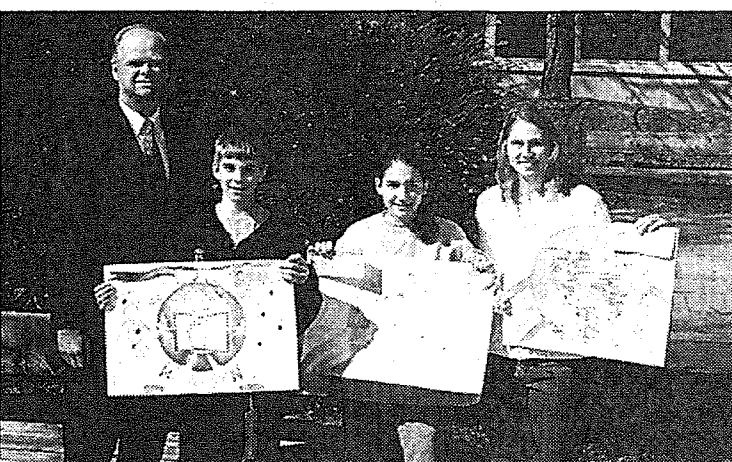

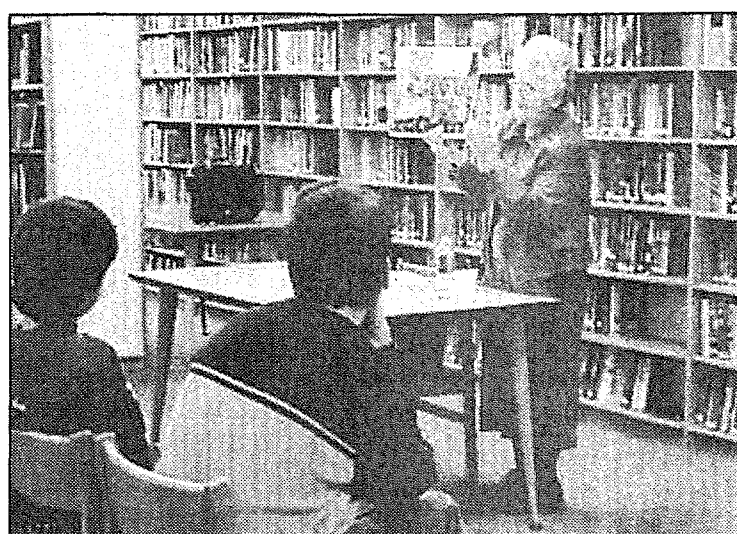

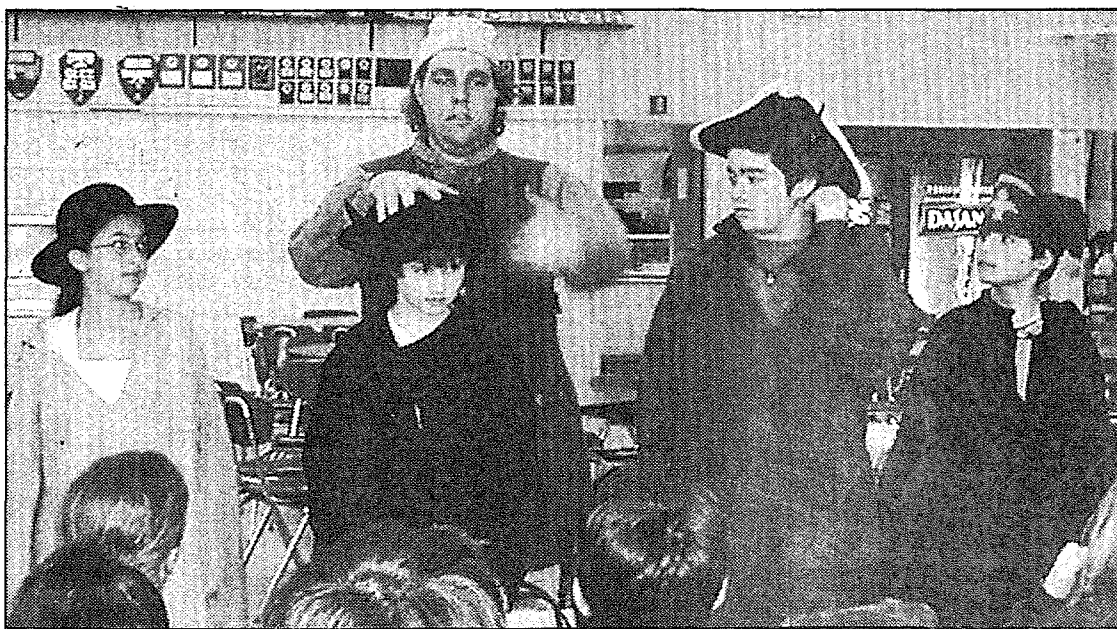

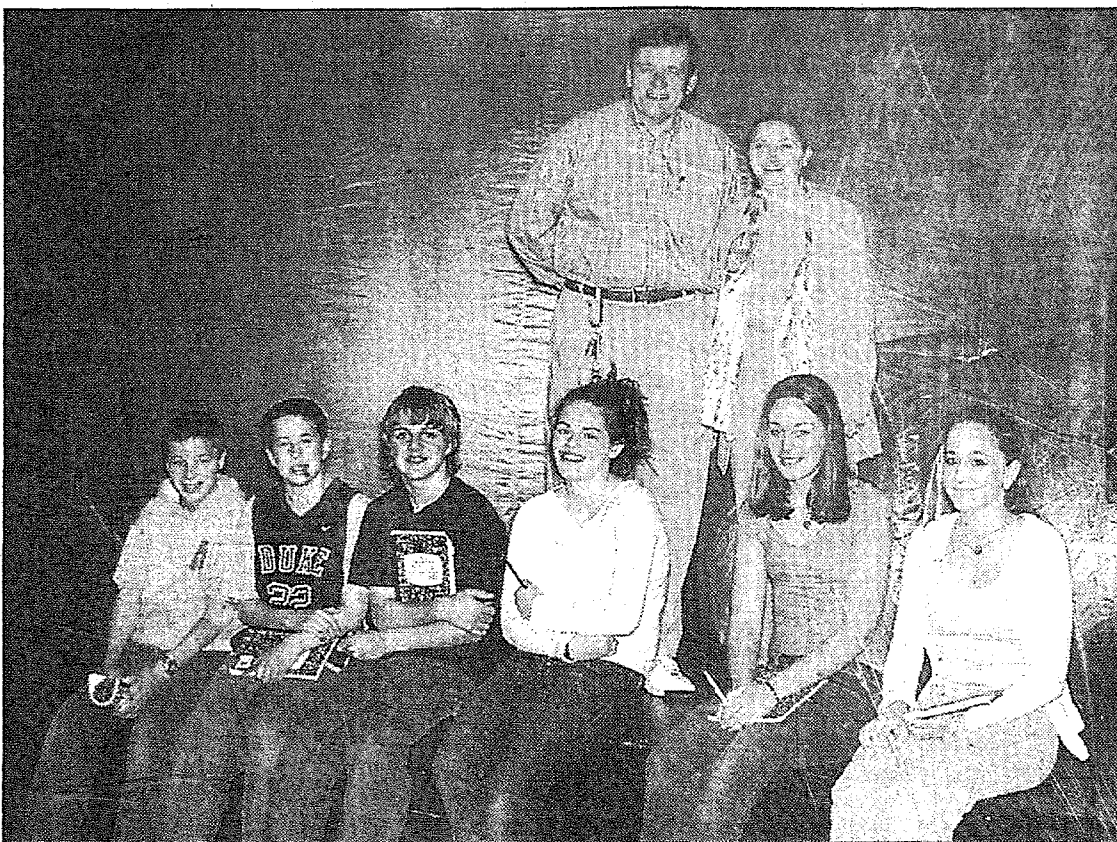

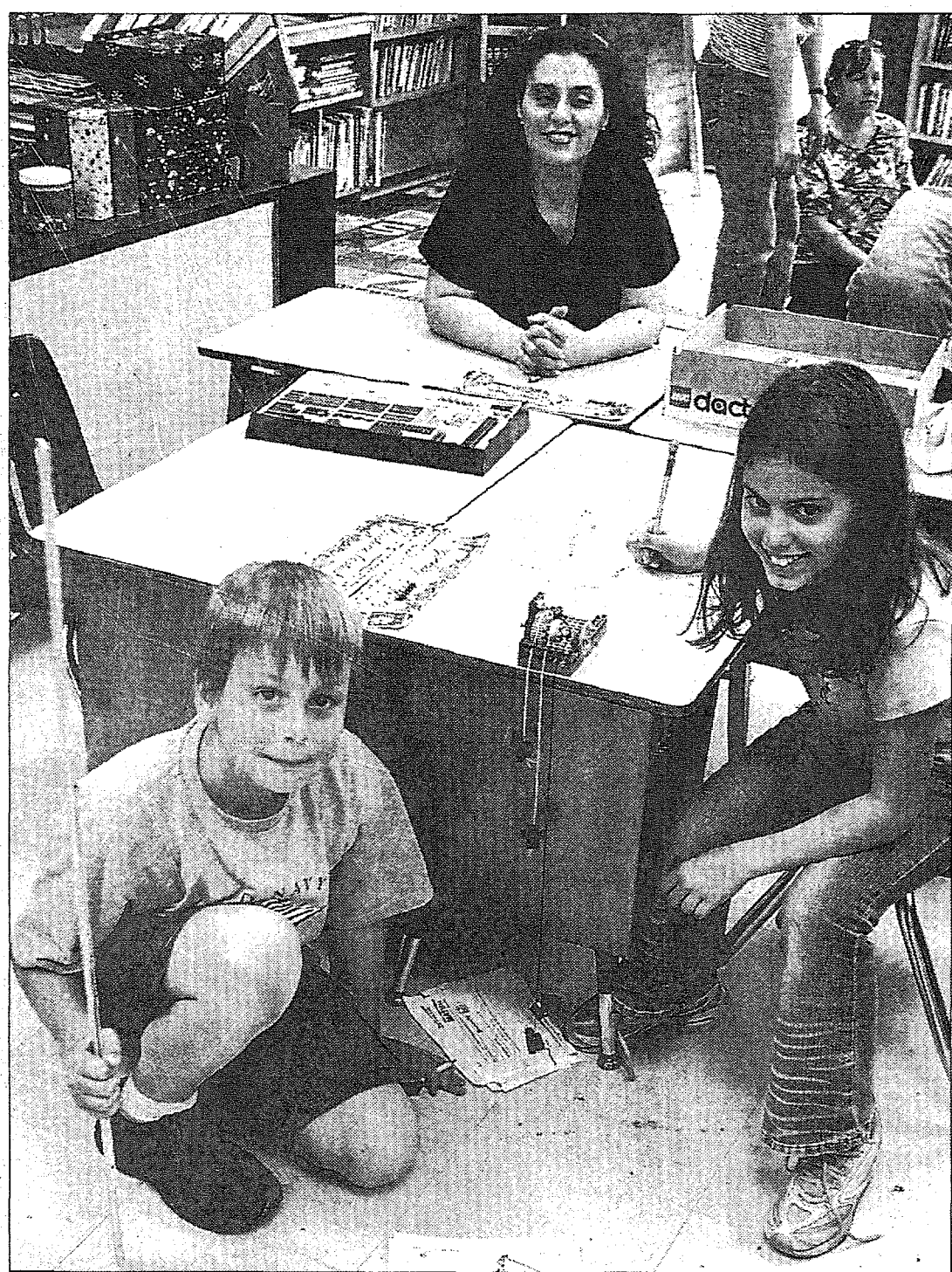

Public can view the finalists' designs for bus shelters

SUMMIT — Throughout the streetscape project in the city's downtown, which included planting new trees, widening sidewalks and installing vintage-look lighting, a topic that often came up at meetings was that of art in public places.

As a result of these discussions, the city established the Mayor's Partnership for Summit Arts Committee this year to look at public art opportunities in the newly-revitalized downtown and, over time, in the city at-large.

One of the first steps for the committee has involved the three municipal bus shelters that line Broad Street opposite the NJ Transit train station, between Summit Avenue

Artists were invited to submit designs, with the winning ideas turned into four-by-four-foot panels placed into each wall of the three shelters.

"When light enters faceted glass art pieces, essentially rough-edged slab glass set in resin or concrete," said arts committee member Vivian Furman, "it showers its environment with a cascade of colors."

Sixteen submissions from artists were reviewed by the selection committee, and were then narrowed to six semi-finalists. On Wednesday,

June 2, at 2 p.m. in the Community Room at City Hall, three finalists' designs will be selected. Residents are welcome to attend the meeting.

The faceted glass panel designs for the three shelters will remain on

display at City Hall from June 2 through June 14. On June 15, the Summit Arts Committee members will present the three finalists' designs to the Common Council for final review and approval.

The State We're In

There are many reasons to buy and eat locally

There are tons of reasons to "eat locally." It's fresher, it's tastier and it supports the local economy. But here's one you may not have thought of.

The Harvard University School of Public Health sponsored a conference on bio-terrorism last February. Several participants expressed concern that America's agriculture was most vulnerable to biological attack.

Since the Sept. 11 terrorist attack, we are all acutely aware of security. Airport checkpoints, "dirty" bombs, protection of nuclear power plants...and on and on.

We don't worry much about our food, though.

That's right, food. The vegetables, meat and milk and all the thousands of agricultural products that

make up our daily diet. As it turns out, this may be one of our most insecure areas.

After all, in pursuit of inexpensive food, we have developed a highly industrialized form of agricultural production, food processing and distribution. As a result, a bio-terrorism attack against one region or one processing or distribution center could impact millions of people.

Fortunately, a solution to this food safety concern is just a stone's throw from home. In fact, it's probably less than an hour away.

You'll have the benefits of locally-grown products, as well as peace of mind in knowing that you're eating foods grown with the healthiest, most natural methods possible. And this season's farm produce is just becoming available!

Our sense of security is often threatened by the evening news, lately dominated by war, homeland security and international law enforcement. But by supporting local farms and farmers, you can help improve your sense of security, and be a bit safer and healthier at the same time.

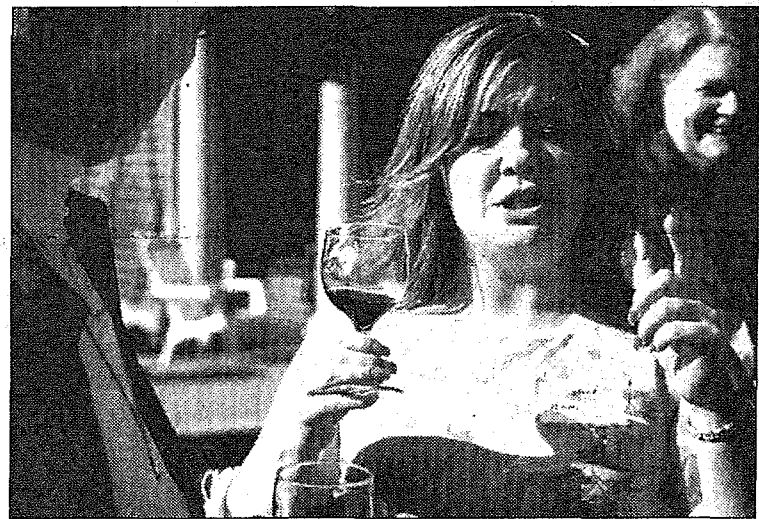

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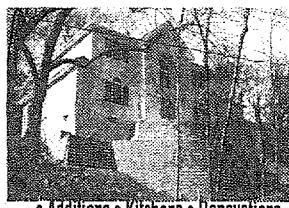

Highlanders capture their first-ever state track crown

WHIPPANY — Mike Carmody won three of his four races, while finishing second in the other, to lead the Berkeley Heights track team to the program's first-ever NJSIAA championship in the State Section Track Meet last weekend at Whippany Park High School.

Paced by Carmody's 38-point performance, Governor Livingston tallied 89 points to claim the Group II Section crown. Cranford was second with 65½ points, Hanover Park finished third, while Summit placed fourth.

Dwayne Reid accounted for 38 of Summit's 44 points, joining Carmody as the only individuals to earn three gold medals.

A senior fashioning the finest - by far - season of any tracklete in Berkeley Heights history, Carmody captured the 400, 800, and 1600-meter races. In running the 800 in a meet-record 1:51.3, Mike not only established a new personal-best for his premier event, but he also clocked three seconds faster than Greg Gomez's best machine-timed performance this spring, although Gomez has logged a 1:52 and change via stopwatch time.

Gomez, of Franklin Township High School, is the only guy to defeat Carmody in an 800-meter race this school year, nipping Mike at the indoor 'Meet of Champions' this winter.

Last Saturday in the Group III Meet on the same Whippany Park

track, Gomez only checked in with a 1:56.1 performance in what was a close finish. Carmody, on the other hand, was clearly running for a top-shelf time, as he won his 800 race by more than six seconds.

Even better, the previous record of 1:55.9 had been set in 1986. Thus Carmody blew away an 18-year standard by nearly five seconds! You suspect Mike is properly peaking for the climax of his scholastic career.

Carmody's performance in the 800 was so remarkable that the fact he set a school (but not a meet) record in the 400-meter event goes down as just another footnote to his effort last weekend. Mike won that race with a 48.03 clocking.

His 4:23 effort in the 1600 also registered a personal-best for Carmody for the metric mile. Mike ran the 200-meter dash in 22.72 seconds in finishing second to Summit's Reid.

Yet as extraordinary a season as Carmody has enjoyed, you must also credit GL's supporting cast for the Highlanders' emergence this spring. Consider that even without the 38 points Mike notched, GL would have still finished second in the State Section, behind the Cranford but one point ahead of Hanover Park.

Joe Murphy and Anthony Abitante were the other Highlander stars last weekend. A junior hurdler/sprinter, Murphy won the 400-meter intermediate hurdles event and finished second in the 110-highs. Joe also handled a leg on

the Highlanders' 4 X 400-meter relay which finished second even without Carmody, who was mixed with four individual events.

Murphy clocked a 58.47 to win his 400-meter hurdles race. His time in the 110-highs was an even 16 seconds.

Abitante, likewise a junior, registered an expected victory in the pole-vault, clearing 14 feet. One of the New Jersey's premier vaulters this spring, Abitante has gone over the bar at 14-6. Anthony also finished fourth in the 110-meter hurdles race with a 17:04 clocking.

Travis Deleon, Dan Felezzola, Tim Ringwood, and Sean Carmody were GL's other individual point-scorers.

Seniors Deleon and Felezzola placed in the triple jump and shotput, respectively. Deleon reached a 40-6 distance in the triple to finish fourth. Felezzola's 42-2 shotput wound up sixth.

A junior who has a 21 foot, 5-inch longjump to his credit this season, Ringwood came up a foot short (20-5) of that length, but it was good enough for fourth-place points last weekend. Also a junior, Sean Carmody ran a 52.62 to finish fifth in the 400 race his brother won.

Headed for the University of Buffalo on a Division I football scholarship, Reid does track as a third sport after football and basketball, where he established a new Summit single-season scoring record during the 2003/04 winter. Admittedly not always the most serious of trackletes, Dwayne certainly seems to be culminating his senior spring on a high note. Reid won the 100 and 200-meter dashes, along with the triple jump, at the State Section Championships.

His 11.07 time in the 100 would probably get him to the 'Meet of Champions' if Reid can match that performance at the State Finals this weekend. Which would also be the case if he can turn another 22.39 clocking in the 200. And Dwayne's 42-foot, 8-inch distance in the triple jump puts him among New Jersey's best guys in that event.

From a story-line standpoint, however, nothing else Reid has accomplished in track is as amazing as his emergence as a javelin thrower. A 'beginner' in what's conventionally regarded as a technique event, Dwayne threw 174 feet last weekend to finish second in the Section.

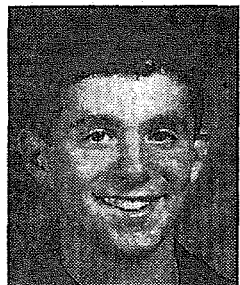

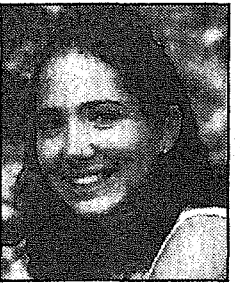
