

## Don G. Mitchell To School Board; Other Changes

Don G. Mitchell of Oak Ridge avenue, president of the United Campaign Fund in Summit, a member of the Board of Directors and of the Executive Committee of the American Management Association, and vice-president in charge of sales of Sylvania Products Inc. of New York, has been appointed a member of the Board of Education to succeed Raymond A. Husing of the same street, resigned.

Mr. Mitchell met with the Board of Education Tuesday night at its December meeting.

Mayor G. Harry Cullis, who made the appointment, also an-

nounced the resignation of Mr. Mitchell from the Planning Board. To succeed Mr. Mitchell on that board, Mayor Cullis has appointed Herbert G. Kenagy of Manor Hill road, superintendent of agencies of the Mutual Benefit Life Insurance Co., to the office.

The resignation of Romeo T. Betts from the Planning Board was also announced by Mayor Cullis. Mr. Betts has been chairman of this board. Francis A. Keane of Oak Knoll road has been named to succeed Mr. Betts.

## Need to Maintain Central Agency In Community Life

The consensus of opinion at the quarterly meeting of the Council of Social Agencies, held Thursday evening, December 6, at the YMCA, was that there is a definite need to maintain a co-ordinating organization in Summit, with more power to act than the Council now has, and probably with a different name which would define its program more completely.

Ms. Percy E. Farnum, the new president, presented the three new services offered the community by the Council: a booklet listing information about the member groups; a community calendar to be maintained at the office of The Sumner Herald; and a file at the

public library. After a brief resumé of the past activities of the Council, she asked Fred L. Palmer to act as moderator of a forum discussion of the need for and functions of the Council in the future life of Summit. Mrs. Far-num reminded the group that the Council is the only medium at

present through which the 75 member agencies can co-ordinate their activities and findings.

David K. Barnwell, the first speaker, suggested that the three natural divisions into which the activity of the city falls, church, school, and purely social work, offer an efficient set-up which now

function in their own fields, with the need for an over-all body such as the Council limited to possibly one yearly or specially called meeting, and under a new name as "Community Council." The name, properly belongs to a much narrower field, now represented in

Lawrence J. MacGregor said that the great American custom of appointing committees often ends in no action being taken. He believes the need is for an action group which will do something about controversial issues in the

The suggestions made at this meeting will be used as a basis of study by the executive committee before the next meeting, in February, which was voted to take the

The White Elephant auction held for the benefit of the "Save the Children Federation," by the Service Chapter of Calvary Episcopal Church at its regular meeting last Friday, December 7, surpassed expectations both in variety of articles donated and in amount of proceeds realized, according to the committee in charge. Each member of the group brought in what she considered to be a "white elephant" in her home. "From the lively bidding for the many articles, what is a white elephant to one seems to be indispensable to another woman," added one of the committee.

All items were on display for a preliminary view before the bidding began, when Mrs. Henry Runyon, as auctioneer, aided by her co-chairman, Mrs. Gustav Fischer, took charge, and knocked down each object to the highest bidder. There were no "boosters" planted in the audience, the committee assured The Summit Herald.

An antique rocker, was a real bargain at \$9. Although the purchaser said she had no apparent use for it, she hinted that it would make a fine wedding present. A sterling silver syrup pitcher went for \$6.50; articles of clothing were sold for from 50 cents to \$2.50. Although Mrs. Runyon pointed out flaws and worn spots, still the women bid, and everything was sold—trays, skates,

linens, glasses, boots,—except a "rowing machine." It is being held for a possible bidder from a reader of the Herald.

The total proceeds, \$85, will be sent to the "Save the Children Federation." Previous to the sale, Mrs. James Garry collected ten large cartons of used clothing from her friends and members of the Service Chapter. These boxes were delivered to the Federation workrooms in New York City, by the Summit Express Co., which carted them without charge. The clothing will be sorted and shipped to the children in the devastated areas of Europe.

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**Food at Lyons Good, Plentiful, Old Guard Hears**

Introduced by Dr. E. L. Elarp, Miss Florence O'Brien, chief dietitian of the Veterans' Hospital, told the Old Guard last Tuesday the story of her work among the mentally ill. Specially trained at the Stout Institute in Wisconsin, she has, since 1925, given nearly her whole time to this kind of service.

At the Lyons hospital, the patients (ranging from 18 to 88 years old), have needed more proteins and more food generally than most adults. They are active and restless and many of them work on the farm or play out of doors. Violent patients wear wristlets, use only spoons at their meals and are limited to the taking of the food to their own mouths, but they eat in the dining room and they are not confined in cages. All the able bodied are hearty eaters and there is practically no waste. The elderly and the sick have their food specially selected and mashed or out as needed; but, generally, the patients are helped to lead normal lives as far as possible. So they are given Christmas and other parties, in which they often take part, and picnic suppers, with steaks grilled out of doors in warm weather. For all this the patients

Last year's returns for the same period for Union County were larger than they are at the present time. Money from the return of seals means the continuation of the tuberculosis health program. During the past year, he added, 158 clinics were held in the county. Weekly clinics were held at the Muhlenberg Hospital in Plainfield, at St. Elizabeth Hospital in Elizabeth, and at the Bonnie Burn Sanatorium. A total of 1,544 patients were examined and 148 new cases of tuberculosis were found.

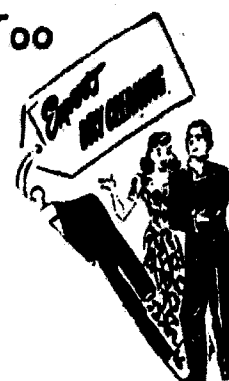

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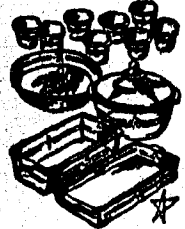

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## Cardboard Milk Containers Sold By the Billion

One billion, six hundred million cardboard milk containers were sold last year. Don G. Mitchell of Oak Ridge avenue, now a member of the Summit Board of Education and vice-president in charge of sales for Sylvania Products, Inc., of New York, told Rotarians Monday at their stated luncheon.

Mr. Mitchell's topic was "How Marketing Successes Are Made." He pointed out that regardless of what business a person may be in, whether it be manufacturing, retailing, wholesaling or a profession such as doctor, lawyer or dentist, selling is vital to the success.

He stated that although selling had tended to fade into the background during the war period when most of us had only one customer, Uncle Sam, it was now about to become more important than ever in maintaining the high standard of living we have all become used to in America.

Delving into his own experience in the field of selling and advertising, Mr. Mitchell told the club members the story of the inception and introduction of the paper container for milk, which had reached the total sales above stated. He said the first model was made and put together in his own home; that it was difficult to get it manufactured because container makers were used to the round tin can which kept "rolling along" the production line in endless procession and manufacturers didn't see how the rate of speed could be kept up with the square container. Even after quantity production was possible it was necessary to evolve a method of sterilizing and sealing that would meet health requirements.

Mr. Mitchell also told the story of the phenomenal use of the soft drink Pepsi-Cola from a relatively unheard-of product in 1936 to a position of national reputation five years later. The difficulties surmounted in getting this product on the market were almost unbelievable from procuring the necessary containers to placing it on the market, which carries a story

of its own.

"Fundamental principles of successful selling are the same in any business," Mr. Mitchell said, and mentioned the following as being of particular importance:

1. Think in terms of your customer's business rather than your own.
2. Capitalize what seems at first to be a sales handicap.
3. Test your product in advance.

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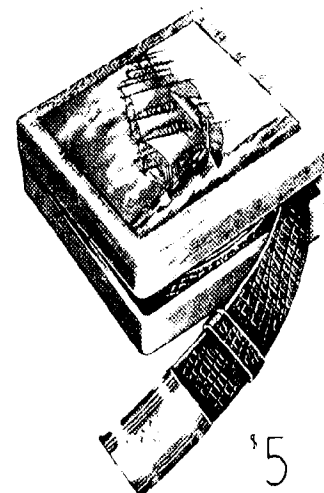

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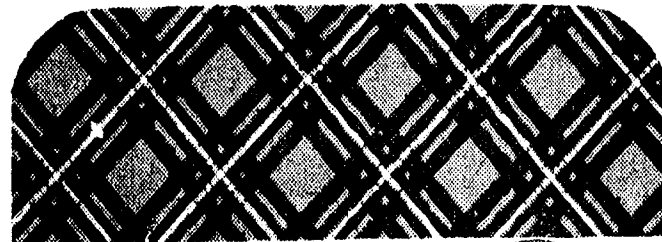

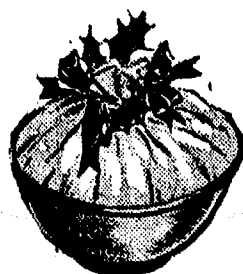

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## Relief Cases And Costs Show Slight Increases

There was an increase of 149 in the number of cases granted public assistance in October, making a total of 4,791 cases cared for during the month, according to figures just released by Charles R. Erdman, Jr., Commissioner of the State Department of Economic Development. These cases were composed of 8,241 individuals, which means that one person out of approximately every 510 residents of New Jersey was a recipient of public aid in October, or about two-tenths of one per cent of the population. Costs increased over September by about \$15,800 to a total of approximately \$172,000. The cost of caring for individual cases averaged \$35.53, an all time record high.

Commissioner Erdman believes that these relatively small increases can be ascribed to seasonal rather than economic conditions, since the ending of summer employment always makes it necessary for certain part time workers to look to the welfare offices for help. He also points out that in spite of wholesale layoffs by

industry, only 44 relief cases were opened in October because of unemployment, while 97 cases were closed because of gain of employment. Increased food prices accounted for part of the rise in the average case cost, but demands for winter fuel were a more potent factor in the over all cost increase, Erdman states.

During the first fifteen days of the month of November, Commissioner Erdman reports that figures received from seventeen large New Jersey municipalities reveal that 100 more cases were opened than were terminated; this figure projected for the State as a whole would indicate that the assistance rolls might show an increase of about 200 cases for the full month. "Of course," Mr. Erdman warns, "we must remember that 497,222 unemployment compensation payments totaling over \$10,207,000 were made during October, and unless these people find work before their payments and many of them may be obliged to apply for relief. The fact that to date the public assistance rolls have really been unaffected by unemployment does not mean that we think this happy state of affairs will continue indefinitely."

Costs for relief for the first ten months of 1945 were \$1,636,713, about \$220,000 less than for the corresponding period of 1944.

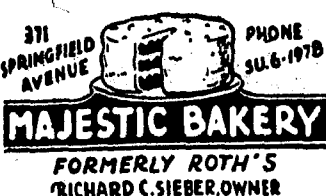

## Washington School Art Exhibit Shows Christmas Spirit

An art program connected with the celebration of Christmas, which reveals the talent and artistic ability of children is on display at the Washington school. Here is individual work of pupils who collectively have produced the sort of work from which artists might well draw inspiration in their attempt to create truly primitive painting. The paintings are expressions of minds free from pre-conceived notions, so there is present a freshness and spontaneity often found lacking in more sophisticated work.

The subject matter is very simple, and in the case of the wall painting, represents the conventional Nativity Group and the three wise men. The composition was planned and executed by the pupils, uninfluenced by outside suggestions. There is more than incidental affinity with the work of the Italian Primitive painters, not only in the bold outline of figures, but in the pure strong colors employed. The paintings are not loaded with details of distract from the emotion which is fully conveyed. The angels, of reduced size, are highly effective and expertly drawn, and the wise men advanced in solemn procession, followed by some very realistic sheep. In front of the manger, the cattle stand motionless in a position revealing an unconscious knowledge of the principles of foreshortening.

The students are apparently very are conscious, and the class rooms are full of their individual endeavors, making possible a study of the development of ability as the children grow older and become more aware and observing of the world about them. In the kindergarten class the minds of the very young are impressed most by the Christmas tree, which is the favorite subject of composition for that age. From then on the subject matter expands to include Santa Claus, houses and others of an advanced nature, until a point is reached where one student created a fine landscape of a small house set at the base of rolling hills, which rise in the background in a series of interesting diagonals, with straight trees cleverly introduced to hold the composition together.

A most delightful work is a group of figures, cut out to represent St. Francis feeding the birds and animals. The Saint is clothed in somber garb, and the animals gathered about include a reindeer, sporting a triple set of antlers which spring from the top of its head. Upon entering the scene he is at first aware of two large wall drawings done in multi-colored crayons. On the right, the wise men, richly clothed in oriental dress and mounted on camels, watch a glorious star rise in the east from which emanates a radiance which floods the entire scene. On the left, the wall is covered by a large drawing, representing the Manger scene of which the execution is of equal excellence.

The exhibit will continue through Christmas, and is under the direction of Miss Berry, art instructor of the High School and Washington School.

## Perfect Pop Corn May Be Matter Of Water Content

Holiday entertaining is sure to include corn popping in many homes. And there are tricks to achieving snowy white, fluffy popcorn, just as in preparing any culinary treat. Following correct

procedure prevents waste of corn which frequently refuses to pop even after repeated attempts and much waiting; advises Mary W. Armstrong, country home agent.

So treat your guests to successful corn popping parties carried on with assurance and finesse, and producing distinctly edible results. Popcorn pops by steam power, and poppers get the best results, say corn specialists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Research Administration, when the kernels contain between 14 and 15% moisture.

Good results in popping corn depend on the way the corn is kept just as much as on its conditions when bought. Much of the popcorn now sold at retail in small quantities is hermetically sealed in cans at the proper moisture content for best popping. When one of these cans is opened, the corn not to be used at once can be kept at the right moisture content by sealing in a glass fruit jar, using a rubber ring.

Most householders have no quick and easy way to find the moisture content of loose popcorn, but popping a sample will give some indication. If the corn pops well, leaving few grains unpopped, the rest of the batch may be kept in this condition indefinitely by closing tight in rubber-sealed jars.

If the corn does not pop well and seems too dry, it may be improved by sealing in a fruit jar with a few drops of water added.

follow a rule of thumb method that seems to work well in moderately humid climates. They keep the shelled corn hanging in a cloth bag on a ceiling hook on the porch in fall, winter and spring and near the floor of the basement in summer.

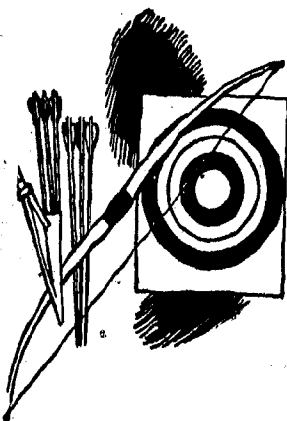

## State Highway System Lags

TRENTON—The need for additional parkways and public recreational facilities in New Jersey is indicated by the fact that the Garden State ranks second in America in the number of cars per square mile. Dr. Charles R. Erdman, Jr., commissioner of the New Jersey Department of Economic Development declared today in announcing the completion of a survey of automobile registrations in the 48 states made by the division of planning and engineering in the same department.

The analysis was carried out under the supervision of William T. Vanderlipp, director of the division of planning and engineering and showed that New Jersey has more automobile transportation available to its citizens than any similar highly developed state in the Union. It stands second only to Rhode Island in the number of cars per square mile of state area. New Jersey having 126.2 as against 157.6 in the latter state. Massachusetts is third with 100.6 cars per square mile, and Connecticut ranks fourth with 85.3 cars per square mile.

Of the highly developed states of the Union, where there is an average of over 200 persons per square mile, New Jersey has a car for every 4.4 persons. This places New Jersey ahead of Pennsylvania and New York which have a car for every 5.3 and 5.6 persons, respectively.

According to Dr. Erdman, these figures show clearly that parkways or parkway treatment of major highways as a service to the general public is even more necessary for New Jersey than for its neighboring states. The survey also indicates that the citizens of New Jersey need public recreational facilities because of the high concentrations of population in this State and that if these facilities are provided in places accessible to adequate highways, citizens of the State have the transportation with which to patronize them. The studies demonstrate the need for a greatly expanded highway and parkway program, and are also being used to estimate potential private airplane ownership in the state.

## Price Control A Factor

Four years after Pearl Harbor day, it was pointed out by District OPA Director Richard J. Tarrant, most rationing controls in this country have been dropped.

"Today, most rationing controls are gone," Tarrant said, "but what many people do not realize is that the fight against scarcity is not over. Many do not realize that price control has become the principal factor assuring the fair distribution of scarce food and goods."

"The fair distribution of scarce food, housing, automobiles, clothes, washing machines, electric irons, radios, vacuum cleaners depends entirely on price ceilings which keep their cost within reach of all of us. Those of us with \$50 or \$75 a week income have an equal opportunity with the wealthy to buy what we need."

## Save Used Clothing

NEW YORK—Former President Herbert Hoover declares that "there are certainly one hundred and fifty million people in Europe alone who are dreadfully under-clothed as a result of the war." He asks the American people to start putting aside now all the serviceable used clothing they can spare for donation to the Victory Clothing Collection for overseas relief, January 7-31.

Mr. Hoover was administrator of American relief activities during World War I.

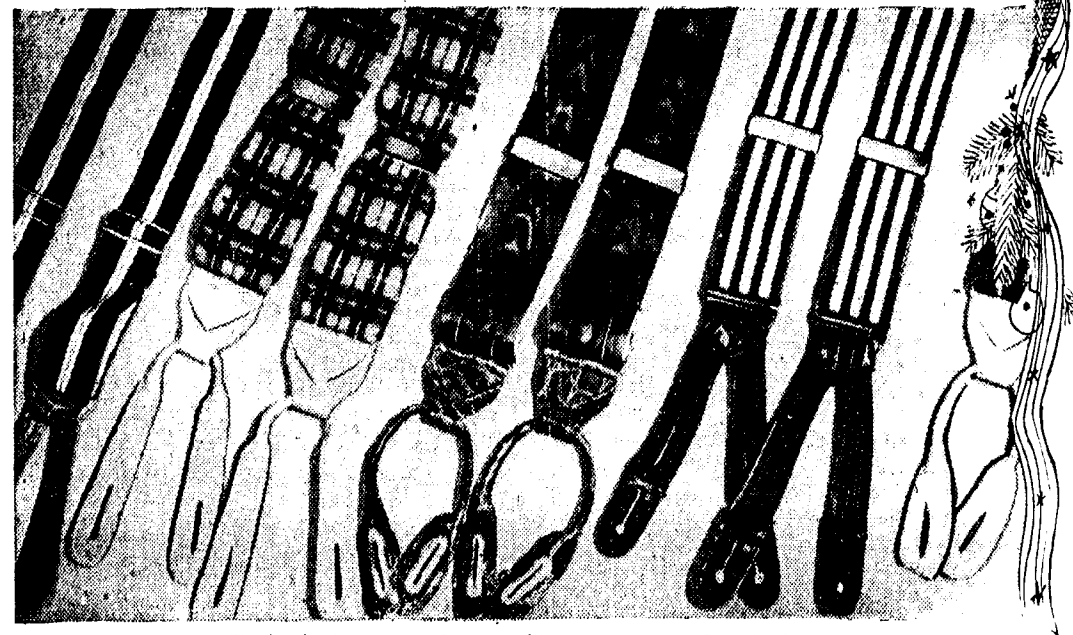

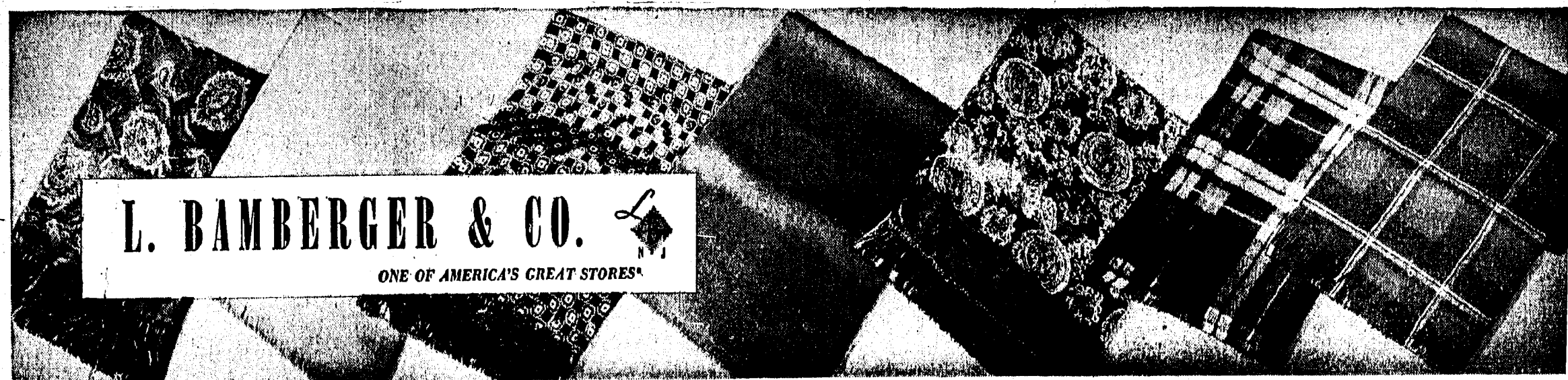

Heed to the warning may save a home and a life.

During the past week all our stores have taken on the Christmas look, presenting the holiday spirit to the passersby with their suitable gifts for all ages. Springfield avenue, Maple street, Beechwood road, and the windows in other streets draw the attention of the shopper. The writer, on a tour to purchase an article of apparel, found stores well-filled with customers. Stocks are short in many lines—some things one can't get—and one has to hunt for what one wants. Saturday marks the 154th anniversary of the ratification of the Bill of Rights, the first ten amendments to the Constitution of our country. Our state was the first to ratify, which occurred on November 20, 1789; Virginia was the last or eleventh to ratify which made the Bill of Rights law. The Bill of Rights is important to all of us. Thinking that all of us should be interested in it, particularly at this time, the end of the greatest war in history, fought to save us from despotic domination, Passaic Valley Chapter, sons of the American Revolution, has loaned our Public Library a replica of the original copy. H. Donald Holmes, chairman of the Summit Christmas Seal sale, asks that if you have not made your return for the stamps sent you that such return be made as soon as possible. The dollar or more you spend for the stamps to attach to Christmas mail will go a long way toward eradicating tuberculosis. This disease does not now head the list of the causes of death but still too many die unnecessarily from it. A dollar invested in seals is money well spent.

## League of Women Voters Public Opinion Poll

SUMMIT SAYS

Do you think that every able-bodied young man should be required to take military training for one year?

Yes—74% No—16% Undecided—10%

These are two results of the recent poll conducted in Summit by the League of Women Voters in which this question was asked. According to Mrs. H. H. Sprout, State Chairman of Government and Foreign Policy, "these answers tally fairly closely with the results of a nation-wide survey conducted about the same time by the Gallup Poll on the same question. The Gallup Poll figures were 75% 'yes'; 21% 'no' and 4% 'no answer'."

It is interesting to note that there were no wide differences in the replies of men and women questioned in the Summit poll. Practically identical percentages of men and women said "yes" to the question. A higher percentage of women were undecided. Interviewers reported that the majority of those interviewed answered this question promptly and decisively, whether they said "yes" or "no." This would seem to indicate that people have given thought to this important postwar problem.

The question of peace-time military training is not on the program of action for the League of Women Voters and no hostile stand has been taken for or against it as yet.

## Our Neighbors

**MONTCLAIR**—This town sees public opinion as a factor in the housing shortage which, it is thought, will have a bearing on whether there shall be relaxation in the building regulations. So far nothing definite has been decided, there being the cost factor in building, how to convert, what will happen when the stringency is over and several other matters to consider before definite action is taken. Meanwhile the "Montclair Times" has conducted a survey of its own on building sites and has found that the town owns under tax liens various scattered properties on which 150 homes could be built. The Times states officials are trying to sell the properties, not only to relieve shortages, but to get it back into the revenue column. Assessed value reaches the quarter-million mark.

**SPRINGFIELD**—A new business factory will soon be within the bounds of this township if the action of the Board of Adjustment is accepted by the prospective builder and concurred in by the Township Committee. The Board voted an exception to the zoning ordinance for the erection of a building by the Pyro Plastics Company of Westfield. The factory will be located on Route 29. The company at present employs 50 operatives which it is expected will be double when located here. The building will be of glass brick.

**MAPLEWOOD**—The battle of the apartments is over here. Township Committee on December 4 decided to grant application for an apartment at Elmwood and Boyden avenues. An amendment to the zoning ordinance to allow "Garden Apartments" and to create a definite zone for such will be passed if and when all specifications have been met. The apartment question has been one of the most discussed local issues in Maplewood in the last decade. It has been before the citizenry for the past year. In commenting editorially on the subject the "Maplewood News" says the issue was decided "on the basis of the municipality's best interest, rather than political expediency."

**CHATHAM**—In order to foster store decorations the Chamber of Commerce will offer prizes for the best-decorated window in the borough. The Chamber says this is the first peacetime Christmas in four years and Chatham stores should be cheery places for Santa's wares. The Chatham Women's Club has heretofore conducted such a contest but has consented to relinquish the project in favor of the Chamber and will confine its selection for prizes to homes, interiors and exteriors. Anthony Coppola is chairman for the Chamber and Mrs. Harvey V. Delapena for the Women's Club.

**SOUTH ORANGE**—Century Lodge No. 100, F. and A. M., is observing its 75th anniversary which includes a dinner for Edward Gascoyne, one of the lodge's oldest members and for 45 years its treasurer. Mr. Gascoyne has belonged to the lodge 57 years. The dinner will be on December 15, in Masonic Temple, Irvington and Prospect streets, served by Miss Chapin, Order of the Eastern Star. The lodge will set aside one night each month as anniversary night, with special programs for members and their families and friends.

**MILLBURN**—The report of tax collections for the first 11 months of the year presented to the Township Committee at its last meeting show that 95 1/2 per cent of the tax money is already in. In commenting, Committeeman Junge said that last year 94 1/2 per cent was collected for the full twelve months. Only \$50,000 still remains to be collected to make it 100 per cent for the year.

**WESTFIELD**—Several ages of man have passed. The atomic age has arrived, according to Louis F. Voigt, a chemical metallurgical engineer of this town who spoke to members of the Old Guard at their last meeting. He said, "the beginning of the atomic age was really July 16 down in New Mexico, when the first atomic bomb was fired. The speaker further said: 'We are going somewhere scientifically at a tremendous speed. There is something urging us on and there must be something behind it. We might be working toward the solution of life; we might be working towards the knowledge of God; something we do not know much about. It might be very logical to work toward these things scientifically. Maybe that is what God intends.'"

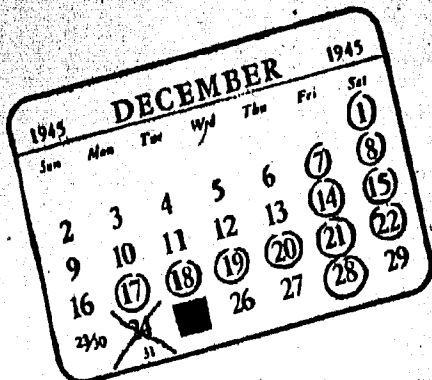

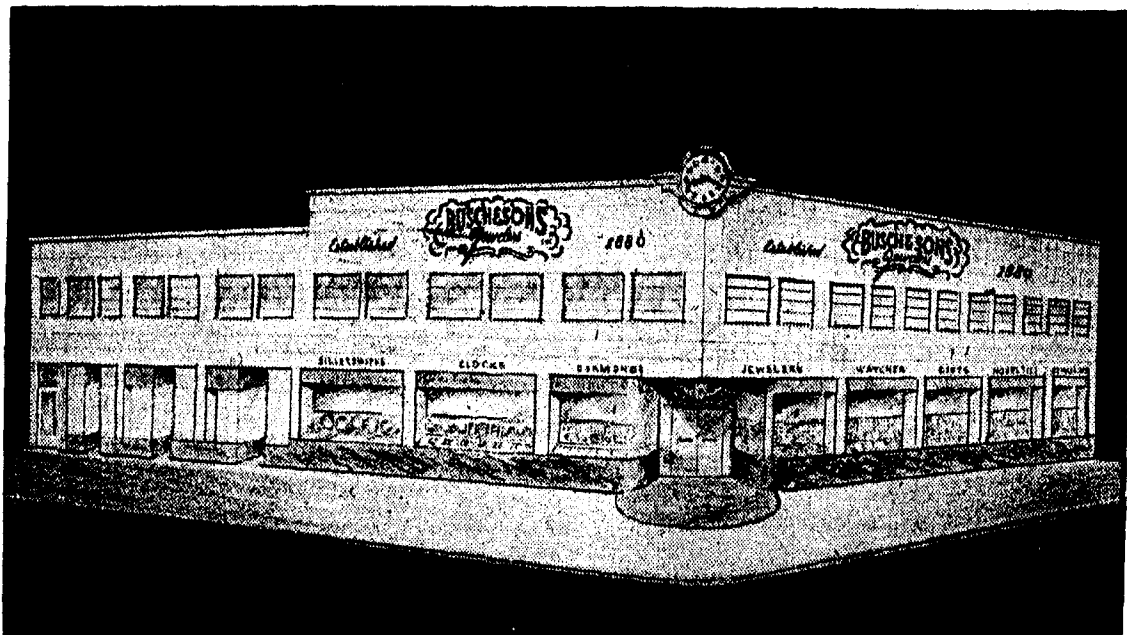

## Judge Hetfield Urges Institution For Sex Offenders

Judge Walter L. Hetfield, III, in addressing the Grand Jury, recommended the establishment of a State institution for sex offenders and commitment powers for courts. He said this is the only way this situation can be remedied.

Advances in psychiatry, the court said, have shown that punishment alone is not the means, but may be an aggravating influence.

"There are some cases where we suspect that the defendant is afflicted with some mental quirk," the judge said, "and we order a psychiatric examination of the defendant."

"Now, of course, a psychiatrist looks at a case purely from the viewpoint of the individual's welfare, whereas the court must look at it primarily from the standpoint of what is best for society. Often times the court cannot follow the recommendation of the psychiatrist. If it is feasible, we do, and we take it all into consideration in imposing sentence."

"We find ourselves in a very perplexing dilemma because, under our present system, we must necessarily choose between two undesirable alternatives."

"We can place the defendant on probation and order him to submit to psychiatric examination and treatment, or we can sentence him to the state's prison or reformatory for a specified term. Now, if we do place the offender on probation, of course, he is at large and is free to commit his perverted acts if he fails to respond to the psychiatric treatment that he has taken. The court, in many cases, does not want to be responsible for a man repeating his act if he is allowed at large, as has happened."

"That is where we clash with the psychiatrist, because the psychiatrist recommends in his treatment of the individual that he must be allowed to live a normal life. He is probably right, too, that if we sentence a man to state's prison, the abnormal life which he leads will aggravate his perverted tendencies, and when he is released, he comes out a greater menace to society than when he went in."

"That is the dilemma that the court faces in cases of that type because our first duty is to protect society. That is our primary obligation. Secondly, if we can rehabilitate or help and assist the individual offender, we do that also, but it is a secondary consideration."

"So I believe that the only way this situation can be remedied is to have our legislature provide an institution and give the courts the power to commit a man with this illness, which the psychiatrists call and illness, for an indefinite term and segregate him in a proper institution where he will receive treatment until he is completely recovered and rehabilitated. If he does not respond to such treatment and he still has these perverted tendencies, he should be segregated for the rest of his life, because he is a menace and a grave danger to society to have him loose. That is what happens now."

"I understand that you have also taken this matter under consideration and I say that the whole thing lies with our legislature to provide the courts with the power and an institution to which to commit psychopathic cases."

## Framed Replica Of Bill of Rights In Public Library

December 15 marks the 154 anniversary of the ratification of the Bill of Rights, being the first ten amendments to the Constitution. A framed replica of this document, the property of Passaic Valley Chapter, S.A.R., has recently been placed in the Summit Public Library. New Jersey was the first state to ratify on November 20, 1789. Virginia ratified the proposals on December 15, 1791, being the eleventh, and last, state vote necessary for it to become the law of the land.

In a paper prepared by Gardner Osborn, chairman, Bill of Rights Commemorative Committee, Sons of the American Revolution, the statement is made: "The Constitution of the United States, as originally drafted in 1787, did not guarantee the people any inherent rights of freedom. For that reason many states had been slow in ratifying it. The Constitution had merely set up a form of government and, had not the framers of it promised to add amendments in the form of 'rights,' it is doubtful if the Constitution would ever have been ratified by the requisite number of States. James Madison, at the Constitutional Convention, had promised that he would use his utmost efforts to place into the Constitution amendments guaranteeing the citizens' rights. How well he kept his word."

A welfare section is to be established in the Migrant Labor Division, Department of Labor, with Mrs. Maude H. Fuller, Princeton, former director of the Child Care Unit, New Jersey Office of Civilian Defense, as supervisor of case work. Commissioner of Labor Harry C. Harper, has announced.

At a special meeting of the Union County Chapter, National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, tentative plans were approved for the establishment by one of the local hospitals of a special ward to care for acute cases of infantile paralysis. It is expected that in the near future these plans will become sufficiently definite for public announcement. This has long been the goal of Union County Chapter which will give this movement substantial support.

Payments for hospitalization, medical care and after treatment

for victims of the disease amounting to \$1,082.46 were voted. This together with \$1,577.72 voted at the regular November meeting totaled \$2,660.18 expended during the month. This does not include an additional subsidy voted the Children's Country Home for each Union County patient for convalescent care because of additional cost in applying modern treatment, the bill for which will be presented later. These payments are from funds provided by the public in the "March of Dimes" campaign held during January of each year.

Edward L. Whelan, chairman, reported that plans were being made for the drive next January and that the names of the municipal chairmen would be announced shortly and a meeting called early in December.

## Maj. Garland Defines Educational Aims At Carteret Dinner

WEST ORANGE—In his initial appearance as Headmaster of Carteret School, Major Philip L. Garland, speaking before an audience of three hundred at the annual Father and Son Dinner held December 6 outlined his ideas concerning the goals of a successful preparatory school.

Major Garland stated that any preparatory school worthy the name will provide its students with a mastery of the fundamental tool subjects. Citing recent conclusions in the Nuremberg trials of German war criminals, the speaker pointed out that evidence of a high IQ is no guarantee of social and moral intelligence and that to read rapidly and understandingly, write clearly and effectively, and com-

pute accurately are not enough. The real test of mastery of these skills, he asserted, is the ability of the individual to apply them in ways which will promote his true success and happiness and the betterment of society as a whole.

The new Headmaster also emphasized the importance of a program of health and athletics for all students, personal growth through the promotion of hobbies, leadership qualities developed through a program of social activities, and cultural training through appreciation of values in nature, music, art and the field of human relationships.

The new Headmaster is expected to assume his duties at Carteret shortly after his release from the Army the first of the year.

## Unpreparedness

To The Summit Herald:  
Not everyone in Summit reads the New York Herald Tribune, therefore I should like to quote from Major George Fielding Elliot's editorial "Unpreparedness in 1941 is Laid to People's Dislike For Facts" in the December 10, 1945 issue.

But the time has come when facts must be faced. They must be faced from now on. There can be no more illusions. Illusions in the atomic era are the immediate handmaidens of destruction.

The illusion of defense must go. The illusion that "we must not become involved in the eternal troubles of the old world" must go. The illusion that distance and ocean barriers give us safety must go.

The reality of our position and our power must be reinforced by a realization that position and power will serve us only as long as we use them effectively.

Foundations of Security  
An active and vigorous foreign policy supported by a military policy of offensive readiness are the foundations of our security and the security of all our neighbors and associates in this troubled world.

Such policies can, however, have their own origins only in the hearts and minds of the American people. If we do not believe in them they will not exist.

Herein lies one of the strongest arguments for universal military training. I do not mean that such training will militarize our youth. I do not mean that it will give opportunity for filling their young minds with military propaganda. I do mean that it will, by its very nature, inform them of the facts of life in a world of air power and atomic power. I do mean that they cannot, in the course of their training, help absorbing the basic truth that defense is dead, that only offensive readiness can serve us as the basis of our future military policy.

Unless this fact becomes firmly lodged in the inner consciousness of all Americans we shall inevitably return to the halcyon world of our ancient illusions, and we shall require our political servants to live in that world with us. But neither we nor they will live there very long—or in any world at all.

I can think of no better way to dispel illusion and establish fact than to have a million young Americans taught every year, by practical illustration and illustrative practice, the realities upon which the security of their country must hereafter be founded.

There are facts in this article that show the prospective citizens of our country how to keep the peace.

## Author of Messiah Could Direct Many Composition Forms

When the choir of Central Presbyterian Church sings "The Messiah" at 4:30 and the Methodist choir sings it at 8 p. m., on December 16, they will be performing the work of a composer whose thunderous temper, open-handed generosity, and brilliant talent, made him a colorful figure in the British court two centuries ago.

George Frederick Handel, the composer, was a man of many musical accomplishments, being thoroughly at home with either organ or violin or any of several other instruments, as well as familiar with every form of musical composition, and capable as director of vocal or instrumental music. Only in the field of finance did his talent fall short; an opera company which he founded at one time met with complete and utter failure.

Born in Halle, Saxony, in 1685, Handel's early talent soon convinced his non-musical father that music was the proper profession for young George Frederick, and at the age of seven he began to study organ under the cathedral organist at Halle, Zachau. At the age of 11 he was sent to Berlin for further study, returning to Halle for a brief engagement as cathedral organist when only 17 years of age.

His passion for composing developed while Handel was playing second violin in an orchestra in Hamburg. In rapid succession he produced an oratorio and three operas. Visiting Italy in 1706, he came under the influence of the then-flourishing Italian opera.

Entering the service of the elector of Hanover, he became court musician, and when his employer was crowned king of England, Handel, visited England several times, settling there in 1710. By 1726 he had become a British subject, and lived under a pension from the queen, serving also for a time as head of the Royal Academy.

During this period most of his serious compositions appeared. His oratorios won wide acclaim, climaxing in "The Messiah," published in 1741.

Speaking with a heavy German accent, highly irascible and violent when irritated, and coarse in his manners, Handel nonetheless won a place in English hearts for his honor and integrity, his independence, simplicity and charitableness. In 1752 he was stricken with blindness. However, not even this affliction could keep him from the work he loved.

## Jewish Survey To Better Program Of Various Centers

How the National Jewish Welfare Board can strengthen the program of Jewish Community Center and more closely relate the work of the Veterans' Committee to that of the Center will be determined by an independent survey started recently under J.W.B. auspices, it was announced yesterday by Joseph Bidner, president of Jewish Community Center of Summit.

Jewish Community Center of Summit is one of 288 Jewish Community Centers in 225 cities that are affiliated with the National Jewish Welfare Board, which in addition to being a member agency of U.S.O., has conducted a full morale and religious program for the armed forces.

Requiring about a year for completion, the survey will be made under the direction of Dr. Oscar Janowsky, professor of history and international relations at C.C.N.Y. and author of "The Jews and Minority Rights." He will report to the J.W.B. Survey Commission, headed by Professor Salo Baron, of Columbia University, and consisting of 26 representative leaders in American Jewish life.

At a recent annual executive committee meeting, J.W.B. adopted a 1946 budget of \$1,375,195 which despite a cut of \$445,145 for the 1945 budget, provides for expanded services to veterans, Jewish Community Centers throughout the country and to hospitalized servicemen.

### Winter Feeding Of Bird Visitors Interesting Hobby

The central station of the winter bird feeding project of Summit, which is entering its second year, sends out, along with its monthly report, suggestive information about better care and more effective ways of attracting and feeding birds. One of the problems of winter care is that of providing water. It is reported that one manufacturer now sells an electric fountain that keeps the birds' water from freezing.

"Wild birds appeal strongly to the affections of mankind. In your winter care for the birds, you will be bringing close to your home, the many aspects of beauty, mystery and entertainment that can set agoing a refreshing and fascinating hobby — ornithology. John Burroughs warned, "Take the first step in ornithology, and you are tickled for the whole voyage. There is a fascination about it quite overpowering. It fits in so well with other things." Also care for birds is conservation. Every farmer or gardener knows the economic value of birds. Some authorities state that without the aid of birds successful agriculture would be impossible, that insect life would destroy all vegetation and that along with other animals, mankind would vanish from the earth." This was written by W. W. Wheately.

Thus, because of this pleasurable care and concern for the winter birds, the Nature Club hopes there might develop in this area a real and effective bird sanctuary of some significance.

Add a layer of the sausages (which have been partially cooked) and cover with rice. Pour milk over it all and dot with butter.

Cover and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for ½ hour, then uncover and bake ¼ hour longer.

#### Ham and Apple Pot

1 cup cooked ham, sliced thin

2 cups thin-sliced apples

1½ cups soft bread crumbs

1 cup water

1 cup dark corn syrup

1 tablespoon vinegar

2 teaspoons butter

Salt, pepper and mustard to taste

"My purpose in coming to you is simply to see if we can capture anew, for ourselves and these times, the tingling, throbbing vitality of this most living of all books."

From the early beginnings, there is one message: There is a God who cares. From Abraham and Sarah, to Jesus beside the sea of the Galilee, and Paul, writing letters from his Roman prison, all through its pages are men and women, poets, prophets, soldiers, saints and a supreme Savior, who tell us of a God who cares.

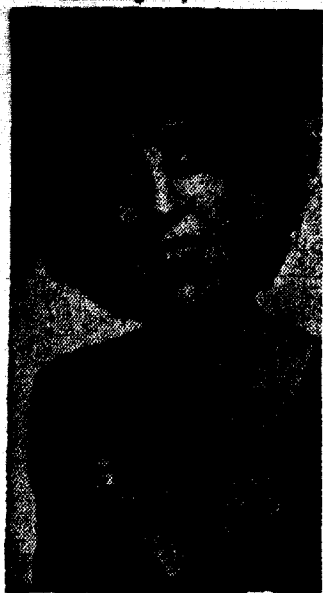
## Newark Museum Exhibition At Summit Gallery Closes Sunday, December 16

## Post-war Fashions Of Past 150 Years At Newark Museum

Opening on December 15 at the Newark Museum is an exhibition of Post-War Fashions over the past hundred and fifty years. Beginning with the Post-Revolutionary period, it will cover the periods following the War of 1812, the War with Mexico, the Civil War, the Franco-Prussian War, the Spanish-American War, and World Wars I and II.

Included will be many gowns once worn by New Yorkers and New Jerseyites, the earliest among them dated 1800.

Greater simplicity because of scarcity of materials and possibly the more active lives women were forced to live, characterized most of these post-war periods. The question now is what will World War II bring in its wake. Dresses borrowed from the leading shops of Newark and its suburbs indicating the latest style trends will be shown during the course of the exhibition.

From December 15 to December 23, a suit and evening dress lent by L. Bambarger and Company will be on view.

On Sunday afternoon, December 16, at 4:00 p. m., Helen Babbitt of the Museum staff will give a gallery talk on the exhibition.

### Manufacturers View Test Tube Fabrics In Fashions of Today

Fashions of today made from "fabrics of tomorrow"—test tube creations that will not be available to the public for some time—were presented to members of the National Association of Manufacturers recently in a show at the Waldorf-Astoria. The group is now holding its golden anniversary session. While no new fabric was introduced the garments were made of fabrics that have been put to wartime purposes until now.

Fortisan, a fabric by Celanese, which was used for parachutes during the war, made an appearance in a filmy at-home gown of chartreuse and rose. Koroseal, by the B. F. Goodrich Company, was shown in shiny, black raincoats for mother and daughter.

The Tennessee Eastman Corporation was responsible for a Tees and mohair combination that was used for tailored suits for a girl and her beau. Wools were treated with Resloom, a product of Monsanto Chemical, which prevents them from shrinking. Another raincoat duo in wine and grey were of a fabric by E. I. du Pont de Nemours nylon-coated with synthetic rubber.

For beach wear the fabric story continued with an abbreviated bathing suit of Lastex, a synthetic rubber that has returned from the wars and was offered by United States Rubber. The manikin accessorized her suit with a hat and bag of Lumite—a plastic by the Chicopee Manufacturing Corporation, and with a scarf of a cotton by the same company that is neither spun nor woven. The raw cotton is placed in a machine and emerges as cotton cloth with the aid of plastic binder. It has been named Masslin and has already been used for disposable diapers and towels.

A plastic fiber with a long war record is Velon, a Firestone Tire and Rubber Company product, which is now used in fabrics that can be cleaned with a whisk of a damp cloth. Soon this yarn will be available in sheer hosiery. Acetate Vinyon is a metalasse cloth by American Viscose which is guaranteed to keep its blistered surface. A photoluminescent fabric, Kodas satin, which lights in the dark, was credited to Toca. A gown of nylon with a lucite headress proved a top-toe fashion picture by chemists of du Pont.

½ cup honey  
½ cup chopped dates  
1 cup milk

Mix beaten eggs and milk. Make alternate layers of rice and dates in a baking dish. Pour a little honey over each layer. Repeat procedure until all rice and fruit is used. Pour beaten eggs and milk over this mixture. Bake in a moderate (350 F.) oven for 45 minutes.

# NEW PROVIDENCE Township

## Study Damage Claim of \$206 for Loss of Rabbits and Pheasants

TOWNSHIP—The Township Committee deferred action at its December 8 meeting on the claim of Clifford Gentile of Mountain avenue for damage totaling \$206 for the loss of 25 pedigreed rabbits in amount of \$185 and of seven tame pheasants in amount of \$21.

Such claims when approved are paid out of the dog Damage Account which Township Treasurer Fred C. Riceman reported has a balance of \$365.85 as of November 30. Chairman George W. Robbins, Jr., of the Township Committee declared it was fortunate for the township Mr. Gentile didn't lose 50 pedigreed rabbits or else he would have gotten the entire Dog Damage Account.

Committee member Anton C. Swenson stated there is a need for a yardstick to determine the method of paying such claims as are approved. He asked, "How are we paying, by the pound, or what?" At his insistence action was deferred on the claim until Township Attorney Judge John L. Hughes made a ruling in writing on the subject.

Treasurer Riceman reported bank and bond balances totaling \$157,747.94. Of this amount \$40,000 is invested in 2½ per cent Treasury Bonds and \$20,000 in Defense Bonds, Series G. Mrs. Olga Curtis, tax collector, reported November receipts of \$32,487.35.

Salvatore DelDuca, building inspector, reported permits issued through his office last month for construction work totaling \$2,650 and that fees received amounted to \$14. Permits were issued as follows: Julia Schweinfurth, Plainfield avenue, bath room \$300 and reconstruction of garage \$200; Berkeley Chemical Corp., Summit avenue, industrial building, \$2,000; Randal Boyle, Plainfield avenue, alteration, \$150. Certificates of occupancy were issued Ralph

DiNunzio for Springfield avenue premises and Berkeley Engineering & Mfg. Co. for Snyder avenue premises.

Matthew Formaro, captain of the Rescue Squad, reported one ambulance call last month, that 13 miles had been traveled with the ambulance and two men hours worked. Reporting for October and November, Dog Warden Carl Carpenter listed 26 calls received and attended to and eight dogs picked up.

Police Chief D. V. Russo's November report listed the following activities: arrests, one for speeding, three for careless driving, nine for malicious mischief and destroying personal property, two for being drunk and disorderly. He also reported 23 police calls attended to, five dog warden calls received and attended to, three young men reprimanded for hunting close to homes in Free Acres, three persons reported missing and three found, two accidents listed, one person injured, one fire call and one ambulance call received. The police car was used to patrol 1,740 miles.

Committee member Charles M. Monica commended Chief Russo for his work in apprehending the nine arrests for malicious mischief and destroying personal property. The conviction of these culprits was reported in last week's Herald.

Albert H. Bierman, associate of Judge John L. Hughes, township attorney, reported that the Dr. Henry P. Dengler of Summit of the Union County Mosquito Extermination Commission had inspected the situation at the corner of Hillside avenue and Debbie place where rain and surface water had been stopped by a resident from its regular course. The situation has been under study for several months by the committee. The report of Dr. Dengler is awaited before further action is taken.

## School Bond Bids Made Successfully By Newark Firms

TOWNSHIP—New Providence Township Board of Education Monday night sold to the joint account of J. S. Rippel & Co. and Coffin & Burr of Newark a school bond issue of \$210,000 par value. The issue was purchased for \$210,441.17 at an interest rate of 1.60 per cent with interest from December 1, the date of issue.

The low interest rate reflects the township's excellent financial condition, Benjamin J. Bateman, school auditor said. Six of the seven bidders were below 2 per cent interest.

The issue is to cover the cost of an addition to Columbia School to include eight class rooms, a manual training shop, domestic science room and a combination auditorium-gymnasium.

## Recreation Commission Creation Rejected, Premature on Fire Truck

TOWNSHIP—The Township Committee at its December 8 meeting rejected by a 4-1 vote the idea of changing over to a Recreation Committee now under the supervision of the Township Committee and creating instead a Recreation Commission which after its appointment would be autonomous as far as its authority was concerned.

The idea was brought up by Committee member Charles M. Monica, chairman of the Township Committee's recreation committee. He said the Township of New Providence Recreation Committee had requested him to bring the matter "before the Township Committee for decision tonight." Committee member Angelo M. DelDuca made a motion that the request be denied and Committee member Monica seconded it. In voting "no" Committee member Anton C. Swenson said, "I think it only courteous to hear what the gentlemen on the Recreation Committee have to say in the matter."

Committee member Monica asked the Township Committee to discuss the question of the Township's buying a new fire truck. He said, "I'm bringing it up though I am not chairman of the fire committee." Chairman Swenson of the fire committee said the

matter had been brought up for consideration because such action would be premature inasmuch as the 1946 budget hadn't been considered. The rest of the committee concurred with Chairman Swenson's viewpoint in the matter. However, the fire truck discussion brought out that consideration is being given to trading in the truck to which the Berkeley Heights Volunteer Fire Co. holds title.

In the items of routine business, checks were received as follows and ordered turned over to Township Treasurer Fred C. Riceman: \$135.85 subsidy from the State for the Police and Firemen's Pension Fund, \$25.41 from Michael DeCorso of New Providence Borough, and \$7.20 from the Strang Bus Co., the latter two checks being franchise receipts taxes for November.

A request from W. W. Drury of Countryside for a fire hydrant was referred to the water committee. A tax appeal from R. Chaplain from his \$4,000 assessment for a dwelling on Mountain avenue was ordered filed.

On motion of Committee member Swenson, chairman of the finance committee, the request of the custodian of school funds for \$3,809.82 was ordered paid.

Announcement was made that a Brownie Troop, organized several months ago, will begin operation after January 1. Girls between the ages of 7 and 9 years will be eligible for membership and meetings will be held one day a week in Columbia School.

Mrs. Herman Wilde reported proceeds of \$21.38 from a recent sale held at a meeting of the Columbia School Parent-Teacher Association. ## Ponder Mt. Avenue Cut-Off, Reject Chemical Firm, Skating Rink Ready

TOWNSHIP—The Township Committee at its December 8 meeting discussed a proposal for the construction of a new section of Mountain avenue running from the Bell Telephone Laboratories across to near the exit of the Murray Hill Golf Club. This stretch of highway would be known as the Mountain avenue cut-off.

By advice of the freeholders the township's application for \$50,000 for Glenside road has been withdrawn and in its place a request will be made for a State aid grant for the Mountain avenue cut-off, cost of which would be \$26,000 within the municipality. The township would bear 10 per cent cost of the proposed cut-off. Since Mountain avenue is a county road, supervision of the work would be in charge of the Board of Freeholders. Further action on the matter was deferred until more information is obtained especially in reference to right of way and the dedication of land for the 24-foot roadbed which is planned for the cut-off.

Permission to operate a plant for the manufacture of zinc sulphide was denied a Jersey City chemical company which was interested in acquiring property here. Chairman H. M. Kent of the building and grounds committee, who had been delegated to investigate the firm, reported on his consultation with three chemists that all chemical plants gave off some degree of odors. Decision to deny the Jersey City firm access to property was on motion of Committee member Angelo M. Del Duca and seconded by Committee member Monica. Chairman George W. Robbins, Jr.,

of the committee voted against the motion. Committee member Swenson expressed the opinion that the action was necessary in deference "to the many people who had built their homes here." He added that the action of the committee did not prejudice further consideration of the firm.

Committee member Monica as recreation chairman reported that by today the skating rink off the Municipal Building here would be ready for use depending upon the weather. He reported the area had been flooded and that benches and lighting equipment had been installed.

Committee member Kent was authorized to purchase smaller crushed stone for the parking lot adjoining the Municipal Building. He was also granted permission to sell a supply of coal purchased by the township to heat the Municipal Building prior to the reconversion to oil.

Chairman Robbins reported delivery hadn't been made yet on the new police car, the order for which was placed last month on authorization of the full committee.

Action on the purchase of an air horn signal to be installed in the cupola of the Municipal Building at a proposed cost of \$450 was deferred until experimentation with a slight alteration to the present setup is made.

Committee member Monica as chairman of the road committee reported work completed recently on a number of highways. Snow removal work this year in the township will be done by Vito La Sasso, who purchased Arthur Kuntz's snow-plows.

TOWNSHIP—According to plans made at the December 3 meeting of the Blue Mountain Farms Civic Association held at the home of I. C. Reese, everything is in readiness for Santa Claus' visit to the kiddies in this community on Christmas Day.

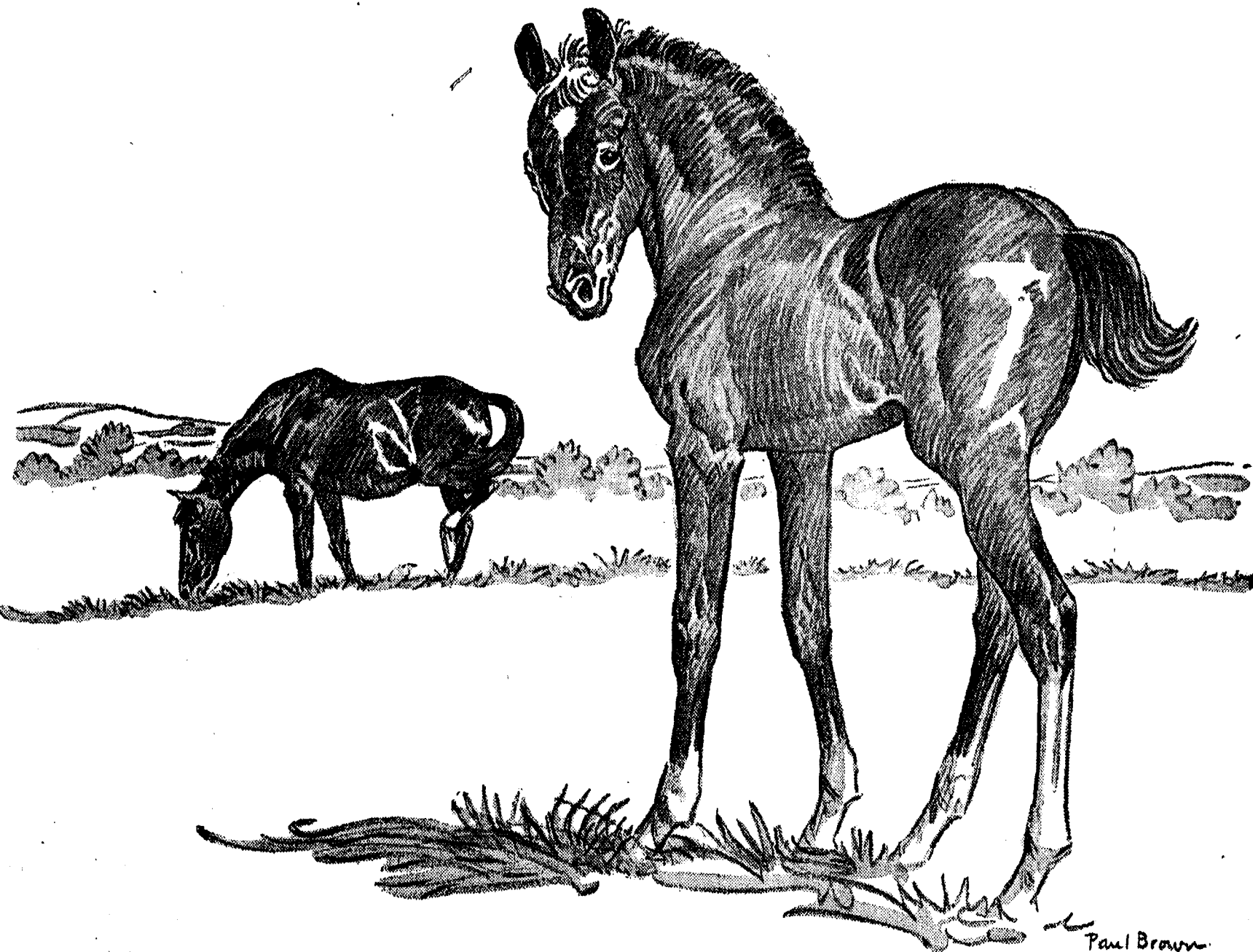

## Sports' Sidelights

### CHANGE OF SCENERY

Yes, a new basketball season has begun. Sort of sneaked up on us, didn't it? Only yesterday we were discussing tackles and touchdowns and now we are discussing on pivot plays and set shots. But that's the way the sports' picture has developed. You find one form of athletics intruding more on the other until they overlap completely. No longer is there a sharp break between football and basketball or, for that matter, between basketball and baseball. And before you know it, football's back in the center of the stage again. As one writer puts it, "Are we going too fast for you?"

### WHY NOT A BOOSTERS' CLUB

In recent weeks a number of sports' fans have asked, "Why not a Boosters' Club for Summit High School's athletic teams?" Frankly, we don't know the answer. A number of communities in this area have such clubs and the reports on their activities are quite favorable. Not only do these Booster Clubs honor the school's teams in various ways such as dinners and individual tokens, but they also function in a far more purposeful manner. Not only are they important factors in bringing about real support of the schools' athletic program, they also finance the most of injuries sustained by players in any scholastic contests.

Summit Kiwanis Club in a sense has been a Booster Club of Summit High School athletics in recent years. As an example, Kiwanis had this year's High School lettermen and their coaches as luncheon guests on Tuesday. As several of the lettermen said, "This sort of thing makes you feel there is a degree of appreciation or recognition for your efforts apart from the school itself." For the past two years Kiwanis clubs along the Lackawanna have sponsored a baseball league for High School boys and otherwise have taken a constructive interest in boys' work, not confining themselves merely to talking about youth welfare.

### SUMMIT ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION, INC.

The Summit Athletic Association, which was incorporated May 31, 1929, is laying carefully the groundwork to sponsor various activities in the athletic field beginning with the 1946 baseball season. Among the trustees at the time of incorporation was William I. McMane, director of the Union County Board of Freeholders. Mr. McMane has accepted election as an honorary member of the association which is continuing under the incorporation papers granted in 1929. Also accepting election to honorary membership is Mayor G. Harry Cullis. It is testimony to the soundness of the Summit A. A. Inc., as it is presently organized that these two men have accepted honorary membership because they are extremely careful with what organizations their names are associated.

Further evidence of the soundness with which the Summit A. A. is considered is attested to by the fact that Mayor-elect Maxwell Lester, Jr., has agreed to act on the Board of Managers as chairman of the finance committee and Ernest P. Patten, a local bank executive and president of the Board of Recreation, as chairman of the Management Committee.

In the meantime the Board of Recreation Commissioners has granted approval to the Summit A. A. Inc., for use of the baseball diamond on Saturday and Sunday afternoons at Memorial Field for the 1946 season. The Summit A. A. team will play its home games in the Union County Baseball League here on Sunday.

## "Jersey's Greatest Natural" Doesn't Materialize

Ill-directed or misplaced enthusiasm seemed to be the victor in the football game advertised in last week's Herald that was scheduled to take place Sunday afternoon on Memorial Field for the "North Jersey Championship" between the Plainfield Saracens, "undefeated Union County Champions" and the Summit Wildcats, "greatest semi-professional State team."

Director Harlan S. Kennedy of the Board of Recreation told the Herald the first that he or any member of the board knew of the proposed game was what they had read in the December 6 Herald. After reporting to the Board of Recreation the condition of Memorial Field, Director Kennedy was instructed to notify the Summit Sports Club, sponsors of the Wildcats, that the game could not be played. Lest a snow storm catch up with the Board of Recreation Commissioners, workers were instructed on Friday to take down the goal posts and remove the bleachers from Memorial Field. Consequently the game could not have been played anyway even though a party interested in the Sports' Club, and who doesn't want his name used, told the Herald a certified check for \$100 had been sent the Saracens as well as 300 tickets which had been sold. Coach Arthur G. Harms of the Wildcats has asked the Herald to point out that he is not the president of the Summit Sports Club as was indicated in the advertisement appearing in last week's Herald. He also indicated his displeasure at the haphazard manner in which Sunday's advertised affair was directed. Coach Harms said neither he nor any of the players had any responsibility in the botched up affair. He offers his sincere regrets and apologies to the hundreds of fans who had anticipated seeing the game.

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### Nurses Return From Army Duty

Fifty-two nurses left Summit for service with the Army and Navy when our country was at war. Six have now been discharged.

Lt. Frances B. Backer wears seven battle stars and one Arrowhead on her ETO ribbon. She was with an evacuation hospital for two and a half years overseas. Landing in Africa, her group of nurses made the longest convey by truck (at that time) than any other group had done before. The Tunisian campaign was the first initiation she had to battle casualties, sounds of gunfire and Jerry planes overhead. Landing in Sicily from an L. C. I. two days after D day and living in pup tents for several days until her unit caught up. Lieutenant Backer was in Italy for the Cassino campaign and on the Anzio beachhead for several months before the drive to Rome.

She landed in Southern France four days after D day. Her hospital unit was the first to cross the Rhine River in the Seventh Army sector and on V-E day her unit was set up near the Blue Danube in Southern Germany. She spent three more months taking care of service troops and troops waiting to come home and sailed from Marseilles on September 8, 1945, landing in Norfolk, Va., 10 days later. Lieutenant Backer is spending her terminal leave with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Backer of 32 Tulip street.

Lt. Nina Mahoney, a graduate of Overlook Hospital, entered the service in December, 1943. Upon completion of basic training in Greensboro, N. C., in January, 1944, she was assigned to the Regional Hospital at Greensboro. She served there 22 months, spending most of this time in the Orthopedic Department. Lieutenant Mahoney received an honorable discharge October 3, 1945, and is now engaged in special duty nursing.

Miss Elizabeth Maluso of 5 South street, a graduate of Overlook Hospital, entered the service in 1942. Nursed in the 18th General Hospital in England for one year. 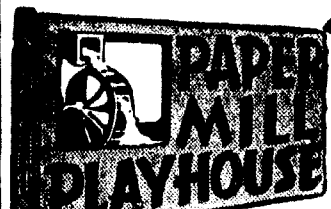

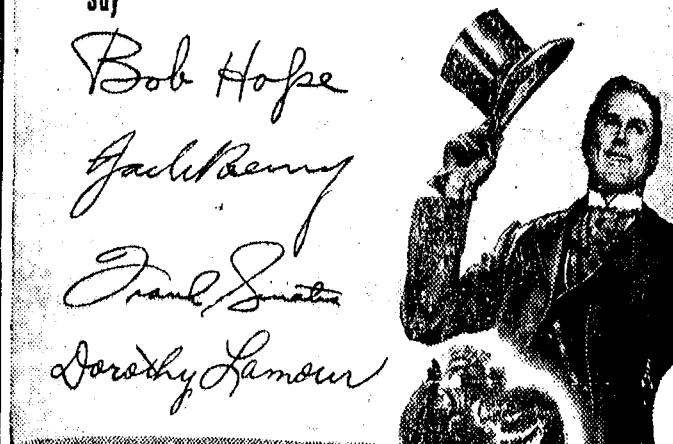

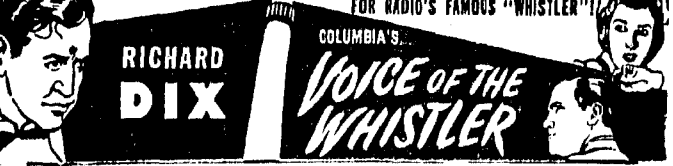

## Carrots— From Soup To Dessert Pie

Do you make the most of carrots? Nowadays, these once-unpopular vegetables are fashionably streamlined, attractive in color, and praised by nutritionists.

Better methods of distribution have done much to improve carrots. Under refrigeration, fresh carrots with good color are shipped from producing areas to many parts of the country the year round.

In recent years, too, plant scientists have improved the carrot a great deal. They are trying to get carrots with long, tapering roots, free from hard and woody cores. They are working for more tender carrots—for smoother carrots that can be scraped more easily. And they are breeding for carrots of a deeper orange color throughout.

In general, the deeper the color of the carrot—the better a source of vitamin A it is. Besides the vitamin A they supply, carrots are also a good source of calcium and a good source of riboflavin. It is not surprising, therefore, that the chemical name carotene stems di-

rectly from the word carrot. Because vitamin A is such an important item in a good diet and because both yellow and green leafy vegetables are good sources of carotene—nutritionists recommend at least one serving a day of these vegetables. They include carrots, as they do other green and yellow-colored vegetables, in their lists of "protective" foods.

But more of the carrot goodness can be conserved until it is eaten by proper storage. Refrigeration prevents wilting and consequent loss of vitamins. Cutting off the tops before storing keeps more food value and moisture in the roots where it belongs.

Carrots are an important addition to many main dishes in almost every home, but they are equally appreciated by those who know and use the recipes in dessert dishes also. Carrot custard and carrot chiffon pie are two good ones, and carrot soup with toasted croutons is also a favorite where it has been introduced.

### Carrot Chiffon Pie

- 1 T. gelatin
- ¼ c. cold water
- 1½ c. cooked carrots
- ¼ c. sugar
- ¼ c. milk
- ½ t. salt
- ½ t. ginger
- ½ t. nutmeg
- ½ t. cinnamon

- 2 eggs, separated
- 2 T. sugar

Soften gelatin in cold water. Sieve carrots and add them, with the ¼ c. sugar, milk, salt and spices, to slightly beaten egg yolks. Cook in double boiler until thick. Add gelatin to hot mixture and stir until dissolved. When mixture begins to thicken, fold in stiffly beaten egg whites to which 2 T. of sugar have been added. Pour into baked pie shell. Chill. Filling for 9-inch pie.

### Carrot Soup

- 1 large onion

- 4 T. butter or margarine
- 1 T. enriched all-purpose flour
- 4 beef bouillon cubes
- 4 c. hot water
- 4 c. sliced carrots
- 1 c. celery
- 2 t. salt
- ½ t. pepper
- Toasted croutons
- Brown onion in butter. Add flour. Add bouillon cubes and hot water. Cook until cubes are dissolved, stirring constantly. Add carrots, celery, salt, pepper. Simmer 2½ hours. Rub through a

## Celanese Buys Belvidere Plant; 800 Acres of Land

NEW YORK—Acquisition of a new plant at Belvidere, for the production of chemicals, plastics and related products was announced Monday by Celanese Corporation of America. Present plans call for an ultimate expenditure of more than \$10,000,000 and an employment of about 750 persons in the first phases of the operation.

Among the products it is planned to produce at Belvidere is the new Celanese plastic "Forticel" which was announced by Celanese Corporation on October 17 last. Celanese Plastics Corporation, wholly-owned subsidiary of Celanese Corporation of America, will sell the products.

Situated on the Delaware River, the plant was operated during the war by The New Jersey Powder Company for the manufacture of smokeless powder. Its area comprises 800 acres and among the buildings on the land are a main building of 100,000 square feet in which are located a completely equipped administration section and cafeteria; a power plant with a capacity of 300,000 lbs. of steam an hour; a complete sewage disposal plant; and railroad sidings.

All these latter Celanese Corporation will keep intact and improve where necessary.

One of the main reasons for the selection of the Belvidere site by Celanese is the easy accessibility to water from the Delaware River, large quantities of which are needed in the manufacturing processes used. It was stated by the company that operations at its plastics plant at Newark, will continue and that an expansion of facilities amounting to 25 per cent over the next two years is in progress.

1. New cars will be financed for the public when purchased on 12 months' terms at 5 per cent discount of the unpaid balance, a sweeping cut over pre-war financing rates.

## Potted Lamb Hocks Make Novel Dish

One of the most common complaints of the woman with a husband for whom to cook—but nobody else in the family—is this: "It's so hard to cook for only two of us. I hate to throw good food away, but I just can't manage many a nice dish when it has to be made up in such a small amount."

And there is so much truth in this complaint that it was with a lot of interest that I heard of a grand dish which can be made for two or three people as readily as for a large number. The little family dish let me drop in to see it in the making, and so I'd like to take you through the process step by step, as it is very interesting, though really simple.

Incidentally, it can be done in the tiniest of kitchenettes, if necessary, and a couple of gas plates is enough. In this case, it was done over a single gas plate and one electric plate. So far as I know, the dish has no fancy name, so we must call it just what it is, namely—

### Potted Lamb Hocks

The first move is to wheedle out of your butcher one, two or more front shoulder lamb hocks—the part of the front leg from the knee down. This isn't really much larger than a good sized turkey leg, while, actually, when properly prepared, it is even more tender and tasty. Incidentally, it is a very economical cut.

Let me warn you, though, that this isn't one of those "mille minute" dishes, so plan on having two enjoyable hours in its preparation. If you plan on dinner at, say 7:30, then along about 5:30 have your casserole hot. (In this case, one of those Italian earthenware pans with a long, hollow handle was used.) I suppose a foreign chef would tell you that into that is not necessary. Three tablespoons of a good oil went into the dish and when the onion was good and brown, the lamb hocks, freshly wiped with a damp cloth, and with a good pinch of salt rubbed in, went into the hot fat and were fried a good, rich brown. This done, the gas was turned lower, to maintain a simmering heat. And into the dish there followed three small carrots, cut up, two tomatoes and a half a lemon, half a dozen pepper corns, a tablespoon of Worcestershire sauce and a couple of nibbings of garlic. With the cover over the dish, the simmering continued with a frequent basting. In about half an hour, it was time to add a cup of boiling water and also to turn the meat over. At the end of an hour and a half, or along about 7 o'clock, it developed that the meat was tender enough to fall from the bones, or, as they say, to melt in your mouth.

So now came the next interesting step. The meat was now placed on a platter and the gravy strained to remove any stray scraps of lemon rind, pepper corns, and so on. What remained was a rich, dark-brown juicy gravy. Now into a little bowl went two tablespoons of flour and a half a cup of ordinary red wine (Zinfandel), and the flour and wine being rubbed into a thin paste, this was stirred into the gravy, all brought to a boil—a little tasting done to make sure nothing was lacking the meat replaced in the dish—and the grandest meat dish in the world was ready to serve.

With the meat dish, beer seems to come without calling. And just in passing, let me say, that meat dishes of this type really call for good, mellow beer. And incidentally, if a little dinner of this kind, which sort of keeps the group at home, is going to lead to a little bridge, then better have some extra bottles of beer on ice, because food of this kind has a way of making one thirsty later on in the evening.

In making gravy from meat, use the water in which vegetables have been cooked. This gives the gravy a better flavor.

Wins Citation

Word has been received that on December 2, S/Sgt. William R. Humphrey of Greenfield avenue, was decorated with the Silver Star by Major General H. W. Blakeley, Commanding Officer of the Famous Fourth Infantry Division, of which S/Sgt. Humphrey is a member. The citation was accompanied by the following quotation: "For gallantry in action near Hermspand, Germany, March 1, 1945. S/Sgt. Humphrey saw one of his comrades seriously wounded. During an attack he crawled forward under intense close range enemy fire and administered first aid. While dressing the wound he was attacked by four enemy soldiers. He engaged them in hand-to-hand combat and so quickly mastered the situation that he killed two with his bayonet and took the others prisoners. He then carried his comrade to a position where he could be reached by litter bearers." S/Sgt. Humphrey, who is now at Camp Butler, N. C., has received the following additional awards: the Presidential Unit Citation, the Purple Heart, Good Conduct Medal, the Combat Infantry Badge, and three campaign stars.

## Holder of D.S.C. Will Make Home In Summit Soon

Pfc. Edward C. Burnshaw, at present a patient at the Woodrow Wilson Hospital, Staunton, Va., who was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, Nation's second highest award, for his gallant conduct last February 19 in Germany, when for thirteen hours he lay wounded in the mud and rain, operating his "walkie-talkie" and reporting the activities of the enemy to his commanding officer in the rear, expects to move to Summit upon his discharge from the Army, where he will join his sister, Mrs. Edward F. Hoey of 10 Brook Court.

Pfc. Burnshaw fractured both legs and his right arm, and suffered multiple shrapnel wounds, when he stepped on a land mine while serving as a forward observer for his cannon company of the 94th Division during the heavy action that followed Von Rundstedt's breakthrough. Realizing the gravity of the situation that confronted our troops at that time, he endured intense suffering during which time he continued to operate his "walkie-talkie" until he was finally rescued by medical corpsmen under cover of darkness. Within 17 days of the time he was wounded, he was returned to the United States by ambulance plane, and has been hospitalized since March 13.

In addition to the Silver Star, Pfc. Burnshaw also was awarded the Bronze Star and his unit was recommended for the Presidential Citation.

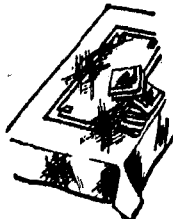
## Salvation Army Has Set Up Kettles In Suburban Towns

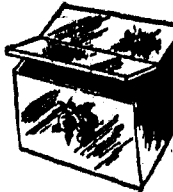

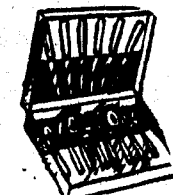

## Greens Are Scarce; Suggestions Made For Growing Them

According to current reports, holly, mistletoe, and other traditional Christmas greens will be scarce this year, reports Fred D. Osman, Union County agricultural agent.

Although careless harvesting is reducing the supply of laurel in eastern woodland areas, there is still plenty to be had for the gathering if the necessary labor were available. Harvesting of holly in the wild is prohibited by law in New Jersey, and ruthless cutting has made holly increasingly scarce. In addition to these limitations, spring frosts killed the blossoms of holly in many localities within the northern part of the plant's range and there are relatively few berries on holly plants in New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland and Virginia.

But it is not impossible to remedy this situation, and one practical solution to the problem might lie in growing Christmas decorative material as a commercial project on waste land. Almost every town and village in the state has some land that is not being put to use and that could be improved profitably if it were planted to American holly, winterberry or deciduous holly, hollyhocks, and other material suitable for selling at the holiday season.

Doubtless many local boys and girls would be interested in gathering and marketing the crop at the holidays. It could be taken care of easily at odd moments in their spare time. Material for planting is readily available.

Oregon has developed a large industry in the growing of English holly for Christmas use, and the crop is shipped all over the country. The American holly raised here in New Jersey is just as decorative as the English types, however, and it blends well with hollyhocks and winterberry.
