





For this winter, the stockpiles include 27,000 tons of rock salt; 48,000 cubic yards of abrasives including sand, cinders, stone grits, and crushed slag; and 6,000 tons of calcium chloride.

The rock salt will be spread to not the ice and snow, the abrasives will provide traction, and the calcium chloride will keep the stockpiles from freezing solid.

This year the Department pur chased 25 heavy-duty snow plows, 25 tailgate spreaders, and 10 spreader bodies, bringing the total to nearly 1,200 pieces of

otal to nearly 1,200 pi of snow-removal equipment ready to roll and keep the 6,160 line miles of highway system clear this winter.

In addition, snow crews have erected more than 256 miles of

snow fence at strategic loca-tions to prevent or minimize

drifting.

Until the season closes, the Department's landscape section continues to plant shrubbery as living snow fence.

According to the spokesman, even with all this, the snow crews' big problem is not snow and ice, but the unthinking driver who is unprepared for snow ver who is unprepared for snow storms and uniformed about

storms and uniformed about proper driving techniques.

He identified this type of driver as the one who runs out of gas during a snow storm, skids or stalls on highways and ramps, or drives in the wrong direction in a selfish attempt to avoid his own delay.

Every motorist can help re-

Every motorist can help re-duce driving hazards at this time of year, the spokesman noted, by driving with extra caution and courtesy, and by having his vehicle functioning properly and equipped for en

properly and equipped for emergencies.

The Department has distributed more than 200,000 copies of "Year 'Round Driving Hints," a pamphilet which explains many safety precautions to be observed for safe operation of a motor vehicle, and what equipment should be kept in the vehicle for emergency use. This folder is available free by writing the State Highway Department in Trenton.

In general, the department advises motorists always to give snow plows and other snow-removal equipment the right of way; put chains, snow tires, or stud tires (authorized for use on highways from November 1

on highways from November 1 to April 15), on rear wheels to avoid getting stuck in snow; take curves and corners with caution; maintain a safe, even speed, avoid accelerating or braking rapidly, and eliminate "tailgating" by driving well be-hind vehicles ahead.

Emergency equipment should include tire chains, sand, a shovel, and flares kept in the car trunk; non-perishable food and a flashlight in the glove compartment or console; and a blanket for warmth when in a traffic tie-up, instead of keeping the motor and heater running.

a. is convicted of operating a vehicle at a speed of 60 miles an hour or greater upon any street or highway on which the speed is 50 miles an hour or less: or

an hour or greater upon any turnpike project operated by the New Jersey. Turnpike Aùthority or upon any other limited - access bighway on

limited - access highway on which the speed limit is 60 miles an hour or less.
