#### Art Center's Application To Be Heard

A special exception application to allow construction of a new Art Center building at 68 Elm street will be considered by the Board of Adjustment at its meeting September 8.

The property is located in the R-6 single family residence zone. The center also is seeking a variance to permit construction and use of private parking spaces within the required minimum side yards.

In June members of the Art Center voted to proceed with plans for a new building. The Elm street property is adjacent to the First Aid Squad building and opposite the Junior High School.

If the application is approved by the Adjustment Board, a house on the plot would be demolished. The 180 by 280-foot tract is large enough to permit off-street parking for normal class requirements. Its proximity to the Elm street municipal parking lot would provide additional spaces for evening activities.

The center is now housed in a structure on Cedar street across from the Public Library. The membership feels that expansion is needed to meet the needs of the geographic area served by the center. Currently, membership stands at more

In other business scheduled for the zoners' September session, a variance request will be presented to permit construction of a 36-unit tower apartment at 777 and 773 Springfield avenue.

The lots, in the multi-family district are zoned for a tower apartment with sufficient area for 32 units.

#### New Report Lists 3,468 Qualified, But Unregistered, Voters In Summit

There are 3,468 Summit residents eligible to vote who are unregistered, according to new estimates released this week by the Eagleton Institute of Politics at Rutgers University.

The report covers every community in the state.

This city, with a 1968 population estimate of 25,100, has 13,023 registered voters.

In New Providence there are 1,116 unregistered and 6,943 registered. Population of the borough is listed at 13,800. Berkeley Heights, with a 12,490 population, has a voter registration of 6,190

compared with 1,791 not registered.

Those Summit citizens qualified to vote in the November General Election and who are not registered may register or transfer with City Clerk Harry Kates at his office daily from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., except Saturdays and Sundays, on the evenings of August 28, September 4, 11, 18, 19, 22, 23, 24 and 25 from 4:40 to 9 p.m.

The new report, written by Dr. John C. Blydenburgh of the Eagleton staff, is designed to be helpful to both partisan and currently engaged in campaigns to increase voter participation in New Jersey.

According to Dr. Blydenburgh, there are currently more than a million and a quarter unregistered voters in New Jersey, and the state has an "appallingly low rate of voter participation."

The Eagleton report, one of a series of monographs prepared in the university's Institute of Politics on the subject of voting registration, is the first state-wide report on the numbers of unregistered voters in every municipality.

The new library learning center and multi-purpose ground floor room still must undergo some last minute touches but are expected to be ready shortly. With the addition

completed, overcrowding in the elementary schools has been eliminated for this year. During the summer, the

school system's own crew proceeded with general repairs and painting to buildings and all was finished

Alphabet for kindergarteners and first graders at Jefferson will be introduced and new social studies material will be utilized in kindergarten and first and second grades in all the elementary schools.

Also in all kindergartens through sixth grades new mathematics books and materials, published by the Singer Co., will be used.

For non-college bound students at the high school, an electronics course will be offered for the first time. A complete unit, "The Negro in American History," will now be incorporated at both high schools in American history courses.

As to the introduction of the controversial family living course (sex education), there will be no action taken on it - at least for the present.

A directive from State **Education Commissioner Carl** Marburger was received by local school authorities on July 29 requesting that systems not having sex education programs postpone decisions until hearings by a Legislative committee have been concluded.

Sex education hearings were started this summer by the Legislature and will be continued this fall. When they are finished, school officials and the Board of Education here will study the conclusions and recommendations before they consider further such a program for Summit.

Although some overcrowding will continue and the junior and senior high schools facilities at the remaining buildings are adequate. "We're in excellent shape

in the elementary schools now that the rooms at Lincoln School are ready for occupancy," noted Dr. Salisbury.

#### Summer is Over

The warm weather is still with us but there is a livelier feeling in the air. The tempo quickens and it is noticeable along Springfield avenue. Labor Day is just around the corner and then the schools reopen.

Schools mean a great deal to Summit and always have. Our educational systems, public and private, are a source of local pride. The fall resumption of school activities is an annual event that heralds the end of summer. School opening also is the return of life to the community.

Reopening of school brings plenty of action during the waning days of August. Children are temporarily removed from playgrounds and beaches so that mother can get the school wardrobe ready. There is a wistfulness in the air as well as a bustle. The summer is short. The school year stretches into the future for ever and ever.

A familiar sight right now is the small child being pulled through the downtown streets on his way to be fitted for new shoes and the kind of clothing discarded last June as vacation days began.

The young who go unwillingly back to school does so with more show than cause. He is inwardly glad of the forthcoming new experiences of new classes, new teachers, in some cases a new building. Summer is good, but like so many things it palls after a while. So although there is bound to be protests about school, about new shoes, about new clothes, it really isn't sincere.

For all purposes, summer is over but when the colleges reopen, then we know that it is really over.

#### The Need to Know

There was little surprise element in the announcement by a study group of the Food and Drug Administration which stated that the agency is not equipped to protect the American consumer from bad food, bad cosmetics, bad drugs, household products and other items that can kill or maim.

But if the Food and Drug Administration can't, then who can? We have had suspicions about the labeling on products. Try to read the labels. It takes a graduate chemist to understand the names of ingredients of various drugs, garden sprays and some foods. How much is in the giant size and what, if any, is the saving over the economy size? Try to find out what is in a prescription or what will happen to the person who combines a couple of recommended remedies. Just what happens if a weed killer is inhaled or gets into the eyes? We are cautioned about such things but usually in terms far beyond the scope of the average

The report says the FDA lacks manpower, money and legal authority. The FDA also has no

manpower to help police the Fair Packaging and Label Law which goes into effect September 10. The FDA has inadequate control over imported drugs. In short, the FDA is woefully lacking.

The government should be advised that American housewives are apporaching a state of seething rebellion. The frugal housewife always did want to get full value for her housekeeping allowance. With the prices sky high, the need to know what you are buying becomes even more important.

The housewife wants to know what is in a product, if it can have any bad effects, if it is dangerous to have around children, if the food on the grocery shelves is tainted from long storage. She also wants to know if she should stock up on giant-sized packages or whether there is no saving in buying such packages.

She wants honesty in packaging and labeling because she is now paying top prices for everything she buys. She has expected the Food and Drug Administration to work for her and help solve her problems. That makes the news from the study group hard to take.

#### **Current Comment**

(Taxpayers Are Aware . Woodbury Daily Times)

The New Jersey Taxpayers Association, in its latest breakdown of what it costs taxpayers for the operation of the various segments of our government, reports what most taxpayers are already aware - the tax levy has increased.

Local property tax levies this year have risen 10 per cent - for a total in excess of \$1.7 billion. And, of that total, nearly \$1 billion represents school costs - which rose 14 per cent, which the Association said is the largest one-year increase in the history of the state.


The tax figures, as broken down by the Association, are alarming if it can be anticipated that further increases are ahead of us.

During the past decade local tax levies have risen \$937 million; with taxes for school purposes up by than a half-billion dollars. Based on the breakdown reported by the Taxpayers Association - and we have never found them incorrect the schools account for 56 per cent of the total levy; municipalities about 22 per cent; counties, 20 per cent and deductions for veterans and senior citizen exemptions, two per

The question that must necessarily arise in the mind of the taxpayers is where will it stop? Homeowners, in a great many areas of the state, would appear to be paying just about the limit - if we can believe the statements we hear from many sources. Certainly, it is evident that there must eventually be a new - or broader - method of meeting the increasing cost, without sacrificing, for instance, the educational requirements of our young people.

We cannot help but feel that New Jersey should look to the federal government for a far greater return from the tax dollars collected from the residents of this state. As it is now, the federal government collects several hundred millions of ollars in excess of the funds that are returned to this state. Surely, under today's conditions, New Jersey could not be criticized for seeking a more equitable distribution of these funds.

A quarter of a million dollars devoted perhaps to educational need, or assistance to municipalities could make the tax picture more

It's Your Town

Its staff consists of a full-time health officer, a physician, appointed by the board, and a part-time doctor in charge of clinics. Other full-time employees are a sanitary and plumbing inspector, a public health nurse, a secretary-registrat and a clerk-deputy. There is also a rabies control warden who acts as agent for the board.

Clinics are held at the

board's office at 71 Summit Ave., Monday through Friday at 9 a.m. with a physician and public health nurse in attendance. There is also a baby-keep-well clinic on Mondays at 1 p.m. Through these dinics the Board of Health furnishes the public with vaccinations and innoculations against smallpox, diptheria and typhoid, instruction in infant care and hygiene tuberculosis patch tests, Wasserman tests, and, in the case of venereal infection, tests and treatment. Food handlers are examined at the clinics and health cards issued without charge.

Every year the Board of Health offers free anti-rabies innoculations for Summit

The public health nurse assists at the clinics, keeps records and sends monthly reports to the State Department of Health. She makes visits to the homes of pre-school children, mothers-to-be, communicable disease patients, boarding-homes for children, schools and the Child Care Center.

Inspections

The sanitary and plumbing inspector supervises the issuing of plumbing licenses assisted by a board of three plumbers. He carries out inspection of the plumbing and sanitary conditions of retail food stores and restaurants, school cafeterias cold storage lockers, laundries and laundromats, tenements and apartment houses, barber shops, beauty parlors, public buildings, hotels, theaters, schools, the railway station, rooming houses, swimming pools and back yards. He is

also responsible for 'the control of ragweed, poison ivy, flies, mosquitoes, rodents, other vermin and air pollution.

The registrar and the clerk record births, marriages and deaths. A copy is kept for local records and the original sent to the State Department of Health. They issue birth certificates, marriage licenses and permits for burial, transit and disinterment.

The budget of the Board of Health is prepared by the board and financed by an appropriation from the Councit: Money received from fines, licenses and permits is returned to the city treasurer.

The water supplied to Summit by the Commonwealth Water Company comes from state approved watersheds, reservoirs and artesian wells. The Summit Board of Health periodically sends water samples to the State Department of Health for examination.

#### Overlook Hospital

Overlock Hospital, a) voluntary, non-profit community hospital, is located in Summit off Morris Avenue. It has a bed capacity! of 438, plus 46 bassinets. It serves over 17,000 in-patients and 17,000 out-patients annually from Summit and surrounding towns.

Overlook is accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals, the American Hospital Association, American Association of Blood Banks, and the New Jersey Hospital Association.

A new, seven-story wing finished in 1967, has provided many medical advances and raised the hospital to the level of a comprehensive community health center. New services include a short-term psychiatric unit, monitored coronary care unit, cardio-pulmonary laboratory, an intensive care unit, a cystoscopy section and an

isolation unit. The Radiology Department provides supervoltage radiation therapy, a complete radioisotope department remote control fluoroscopy and an array of highly specialized equipment for diagnostic purposes.

The Emergency Department has four experienced doctors who rotate duty to give qualified medical coverage 24 hours a day. The hospital provides 13 clinics: Obstetrical, Gynecological, General Practice, Medical, Surgical, Hypertension, Genitourinary, Orthopedic, Pediatric, Dental, Nutrition, Diabetic,

Birds

By Farris S. Swackhamer Last month we began a birding trip down the Garden State Parkway. We started from the headquarters of the New Jersey Audubon Society and made a stop at Eagle Rock Reservation to watch the hawks.

If you leave the Parkway

at Exit 140 and go west on Morris avenue, you'll come to Chatham Township where the Great Swamp is located. This 3,750-acre tract within 30 miles of Times Square is now a Federally-protected wilderness area. Land developers had long had their eves on it. An even greater threat was that of the Port of New York Authority, which put the Great Swamp at top of the list of possible sites for a new jetport. With the action of Congress, however, this island of solitude will be there for many generations of birders. Twice a year it is a resting place for waterfowl as they pause on their journey to and from their breeding grounds.

center on the edge of the swamp and from there a trail leads over a boardwalk and along one of the wooded high spots in the swamp. Programs are held there for school children. The swamp is a vast outdoor laboratory for Union College, and several other colleges in the immediate vicinity. In addition to the 170-odd varieties of birds that live in or visit the Great Swamp, the visitor can see beeches that were saplings when Columbus made his historic voyage. White tailed deer, raccoons and red foxes will often watch you from the safety of the forest.

plain of the southern portion of the state. East of Exit 125 on the Parkway lies the shore of Raritan Bay and the park on Sandy Hook. The bay shore is a particularly rewarding spot in winter. Park in the lot by the yacht club and walk east along the beach. Often you'll be rewarded by the sight of a European gull that has somehow lost his way. Many of these birds breed in the Arctic and when it comes time to journey south, mistake the shore of the New World for that of the Old. You can frequently pick them up in your binoculars

from the water's edge. The Hook is home to wide variety of shorebirds and long-legged waders. Tide pools on the inland side of the spit make excellent birding areas any time of the year.
