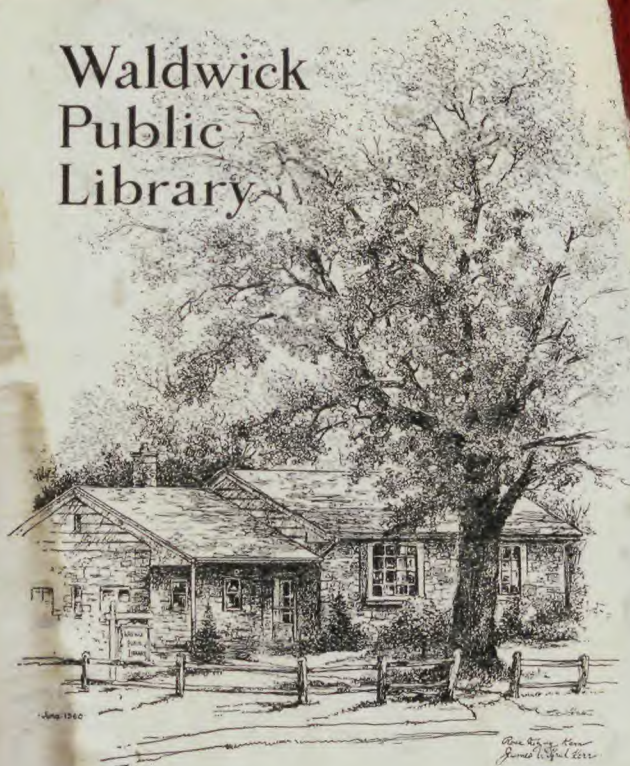

# Libraries moan over funds cut

**NORTHWEST BERGEN** — Public libraries face the dilemma of 27 percent cuts in state funding, which has left board trustees and library directors juggling costs for services and programs with the never-ending inflation of books and operating expenses.

The libraries were advised in October they would receive only 73.2 percent of state funding budgeted for 1975. So most of the lost funds will be cut out of their 1976 budgets.

Added to hikes in maintaining the buildings,

libraries face increases in book, record, tape and equipment costs. The fact that no one knows whether more cuts will be made in 1976 state aid is causing additional concern.

Robert Ross, library director for Ridgewood, reported Friday that in 1975 the institution received \$25,206 in state aid, a figure far

below 1974's \$34,434.

"It's tough medicine for us to take, especially during times of high inflation,"

Ross said. "The library is going to do its best not to curtail services to our residents. Of course we're still working on the budget, so we don't know exactly where the cuts will be made."

Glen Rock received approximately \$16,000 in state funding in 1974. This year the

library received only \$11,906, a 27 percent reduction from last year's figure.

Glen Rock's public library isn't really in trouble yet, according to Asst. Director Jeanne Bloom, who claims that there are really no expensive programs offered by the institution.

The library here doesn't spend a lot of money for expensive programs, so we really have nothing to cut back on," Mrs. Bloom said.

"Although it hasn't affected our programs yet, no one knows what cuts will be made next year. Of course we're all hoping that the funding is brought back to the 100 percent mark again. It may go up or may fall below the present 73.2 percent."

"We anticipated 100 percent in state aid when the 1975 budget was approved, and we depended on that money," Jones said. "We worked for a long time to come to 100 percent funding, which we finally received last year. Now we're going back down again."

Miss Lorraine Sano, director of the Upper Saddle River public library, said that in 1974 the institution

received approximately \$8000 in state aid, in 1975 the figure dropped to the \$6000 mark.

We're just going to spend \$2000 less in books," Miss Sano said. "The cost of books is astonishing. Over the last year the average hard cover book has gone from \$12 to \$15. Even little picture books for children, which last year cost \$3.95, now cost between \$4 and \$5. We've struggled here for years to establish a library, and it's the growing libraries like ours that are suffering the most from cuts in state aid. We're just not able to do all we'd like to."

Ramsey Public Library director Leona Schauble said in 1974 full state aid for Ramsey was \$15,714 while in 1975 the library received only \$9,203.

"We're trying to hold our own by raising fines for overdue books and reserve fees for books," Miss Schau-

ble said. "The last thing we'll do is cut back on our services."

Henry Thomas, director of the Fair Lawn Public Library for 20 years, reported that in 1974 the library received \$47,469 and in 1975 suffered a loss of approximately \$13,000 in state aid, bringing the figure to \$34,748.

According to Thomas the budget "hasn't even been discussed yet," and Fair Lawn is "still in salary negotiations."

By law state funding checks must be issued to libraries by November of the year they cover, which means most library trustees will face the problem of cutting money from their 1976 budgets.

All directors interviewed seemed optimistic, however, that the state funding will be brought back to its full 100 percent by next year's check issuing time.

## New Library policy

**BERGEN COUNTY** - Since library materials should be available for everyone's use, the Library Board has approved an overdue policy which consists of five cents a day fine for overdue adult books and magazines, two cents a day for overdue children's books, ten cents a day for overdue audio visual materials and one dollar a day for overdue cassette players. The fines will never exceed the cost of the materials.

When library materials are damaged or lost, the policy is to have the borrower pay for the damage. To replace a lost

article the borrower will pay the list price.

After proper notification, if the fine amounts to more than one dollar, there can be no more materials charged out on the patron's card. When the fine falls below one dollar the card can be used again.

In the event a fine is not paid within six months, the patron will be notified by letter that his borrowing privileges will be revoked until the fine is paid. This revocation will be effective in all Federation member libraries, until the fine is paid and the materials are returned.

It is what goes on three times a day every Wednesday in six-week sessions in a program that registers 15-25 three to five-year-olds for storytelling sessions conducted by Janice Strader, Children's Librarian.

Mrs. Strader, who has been with the library since March, conducts the entertaining sessions at 10:15 a.m., 11:15 a.m. and 1:15 p.m. telling stories, starting games and leading songs.

"A library is where children start to get their education. There is a lot for them to do here; it is a good experience for them," says Mrs. Strader, who helps the children choose among story books on the shelves after the session.

While the children enjoy tales and join in singing, their mothers are gathered in groups of two, or more, conversing over coffee in other sections of the library.

"Besides their children being entertained, the women themselves get into good discussions," Mrs. Strader says.

The present session will be over in two weeks, and another will begin in January. Interested mothers with preschoolers can register at the library.

Mrs. Strader says some of the children reregister for another session but that she also sees many new faces each time.

The Waldwick Public Library is part of the 14-member North Bergen County Federation of Public Libraries which issues a monthly calendar of events.

This month, Waldwick has possession of the federation's audio-visual system of a television and cassette player. Along with the equipment, the library has six 25-minute long educational programs.

Among those programs are "What Happened to the Colorado," and "The Art of Meditation."

Other educational material for children includes the Grollier Pre-Reading Enrichment Program, a 26-booklet set which gives non-reading youngsters a foundation in shapes, letters and colors.

Mrs. Strader says parents work with their own children with these booklets. They can use them at their own pace for a half hour at a time.

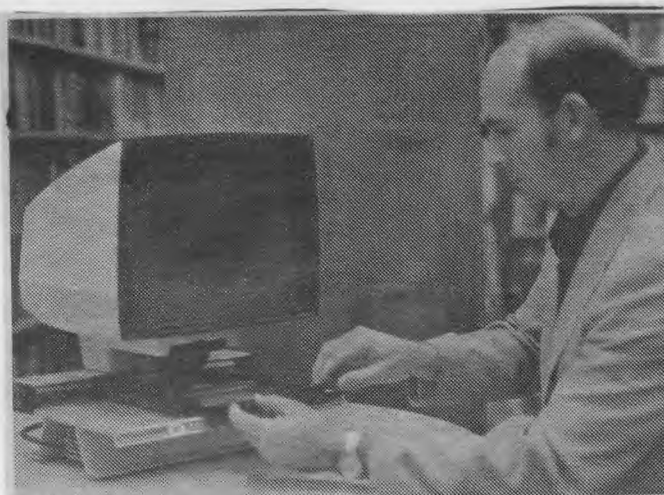

It was stipulated the contract with Boswell would be voided if the grants are not approved and that the engineering fees would come out of the grants if approved.

All dogs brought to the clinic must be on a leash, and accompanied by an adult.

Cats can also be immunized. Any cat owner wishing to have their pet immunized may bring their cat to the clinic no earlier than 7:30 p.m.

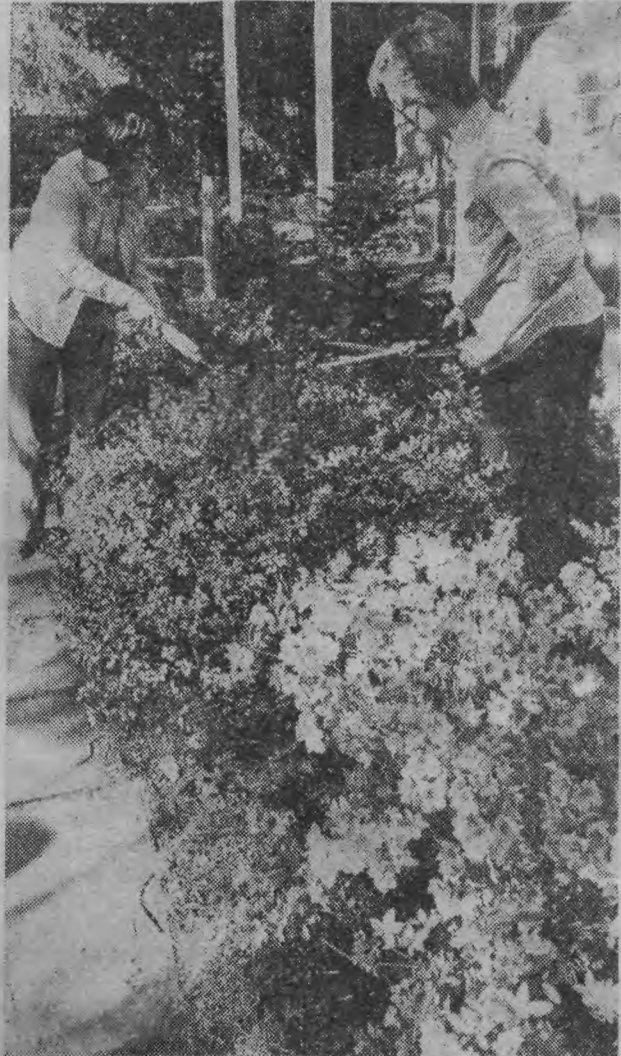

## Waldwick library to unveil coins

WALDWICK — When J. David Kamykoski, director of the public library, traveled to different countries, he often found himself left with a surplus of foreign coins.

Rather than exchange them for American currency, he kept them and now has a sizable coin collection, part of which he will display this month at the library.

"It's not really a hobby," he explained. "When you have extra currency, the banks will exchange the paper money for United States bills, but not the coins."

Thus Kamykoski decided to keep the coins he had collected from Latin America, Central America and Europe in the last seven years.

Because of the weight of coins being shipped back and forth to countries, banks do not want to be bothered with coin exchange, he said.

Sometimes, the library director said, he had thrown one of his coins into a toll collector box, not realizing his error until it was not

accepted. There is a Dutch coin he said, that greatly resembles an American dime.

Many of the Mexican coins have pictures of presidents and their national bird on them. A picture of the Queen graces most coins from England, he said.

Kamykoski brings back clay figures and incense burners from South America and said, "I am also very interested in the history of the Aztec and Maya Indians."

This is the first time he has displayed his coins. He expects to show about 40 foreign kinds.

# Library addition gets planned cement walls

WALDWICK — Cement-block walls for the public library's 1,456-square-foot addition have sprung up during the past couple of weeks, but just a month ago, trustees were not sure the long-planned project would get off the ground.

The low bid submitted in April by Bruce Adamski and Son was \$61,177, more than the library's available funds. But by lopping off a number of alternate items, the price was reduced to \$56,557.

This amount was just met by adding to the bank account interest anticipated by the library in August and state aid due in November.

As library board Secretary George Fredericks expressed it, "Members did some deep soul-searching in an effort to prevent the project from going under, but all were of the opinion that if the addition was not started, there was no possibility of it being consummated in the

foreseeable future."

Director J. David Kamykoski said last night that the present building is crowded, there is practically no storage space, space for personnel is inadequate, and there is a shortage of proper shelving for books and other library material.

NORTHWEST BERGEN — Area municipal library directors are predicting reductions in staff, operating hours and book purchases if a proposed 32 percent budget cut in state aid by Gov. Brendan Byrne is approved.

The governor is proposing to reduce aid from \$8.8 million to \$6 million for the state's 325 county and municipal libraries.

Directors of the Fair Lawn, Waldwick, Ridgewood and Allendale public libraries have commented on the affects of the proposed 32 percent reduction in state aid.

Robert D. Ross, director of the Ridgewood Library said, "Ridgewood was one of the 40 libraries that was surveyed by the state Dept. of Education. We estimate the budget

reduction could result in the layoffs of two full-time employees, reduction of book purchases and reduction of operating hours at the main building and at the Pease Memorial Branch Library."

Grace Husselman, director of the Allendale Public Library, said the budget cut would mean fewer books for the library. "We'd be losing about \$1600 in state aid. Last year we received \$5217," she said.

David Kamykoski, director of the Waldwick Public Library, said plans for cuts were still not definite, but there would probably be a "drastic" reduction in the book budget and related research materials. "We can't save on utility bills, but we can cut the hours the library is open."

Kamykoski said the reduction in hours may include Saturdays. "Every penny counts. Last year we received \$10,294 from the state which is not as much as some libraries in the area, which are much larger," he said.

Henry Thomas, director of the Fair Lawn Library, said there will be no financial problem this year, but the library will feel

the effects of the cut in 1982, in the area of staff. "We don't use state funding for books, that's part of the operating budget, but we use it toward salaries," he said.

Thomas said if the cut is based on 1970 census figures, the library will have a \$13,000 loss in state funds. If based on the 1980 census figures, the loss would amount to \$17,000. "The local taxpayers will probably be asked to make up the difference," he said.



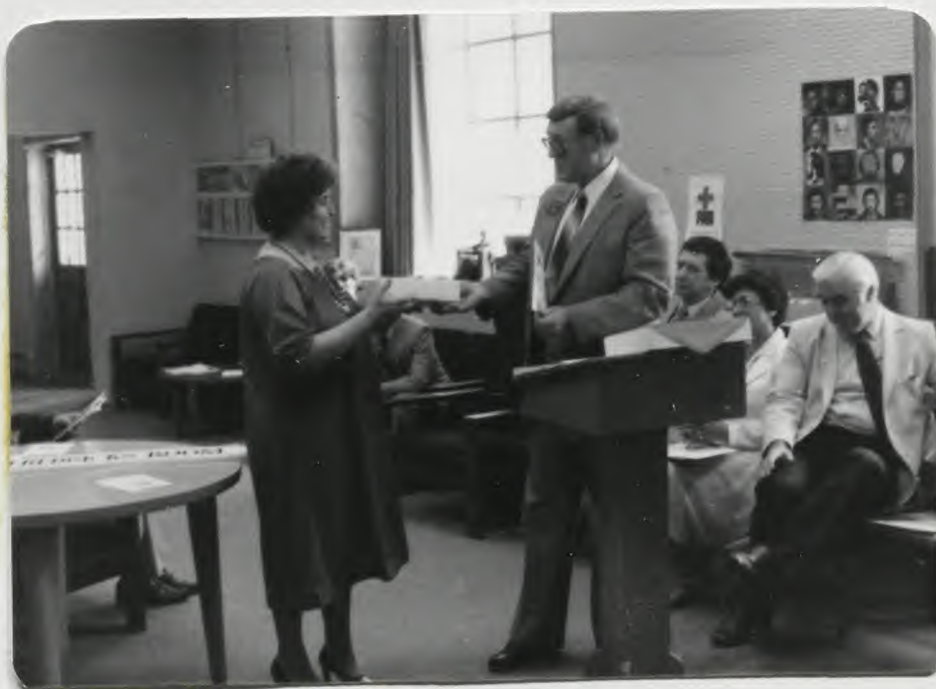

# Library marks 25th anniversary

**WALDWICK** - The Waldwick Public Library is celebrating its 25th Anniversary, and the Friends of the Waldwick Library have prepared a month-long celebration to mark the event.

Three displays will be featured throughout the month. There will be a display of the ten best logos made by the 7th graders from the Middle School, under the direction of art teacher, Nancy Michelson. One of these will be chosen to represent the Friends of the Waldwick Library. The winner will receive a certificate of achievement.

The second display will be a picture of a Waldwick scene painted by Agnes Costanza, a prominent painter from Waldwick. It was framed by Rolf Helmlich, owner of Custom Gallery and Framing, 31 Franklin Turnpike, Waldwick. The picture will be given to someone who is a Friend and/or who makes a donation to the library. The program, which will begin at 2 p.m. in the library, will consist of four parts: lecture and exhibit, audience participation, appraisal hour, and browsing period. On June 28th, the final day of celebration, visitors will be treated to a model train display by John Huska of Waldwick. The display features trains that belonged to his father and grandfather.

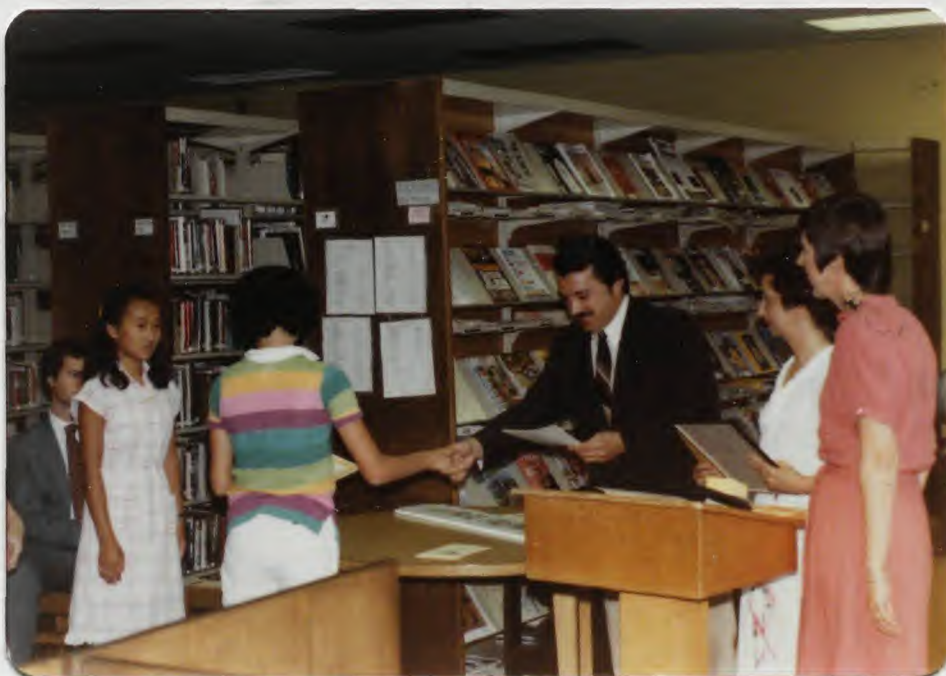
Granddad's trains are 1929 American Flyers. Among them is the "President's Special," the top of the line and probably the largest American Flyer, ever built. Dad's trains are early post-war models - Lionel 027 and American Flyer "s" gauge.

Many special cars and operative accessories will be featured, such as the milk can car unloader, semaphore Sam, submarine car and the Helicopter car. The engines smoke and chug-chug realistically. The trains will wind through and around a plasticville village with inhabitants. The display will run from 12 noon to 5 p.m. Admission is free.
