Getting to know her students and their families has been a top priority for Susan Hase, Crescent's new principal, who started the year by instituting a celebration at the end of each month for children with birthdays that month.

Waldwick Seniors Named Garden State Scholars

Because of their superior academic achievement, twelve members of the Waldwick High School Class of 1993 have been selected either as Edward J. Bloustein Distinguished Scholars or as Garden State Scholars for the 1993-94 academic year.

Only 5.5% of the expected New Jersey graduating class of 1993 were designated Edward J. Bloustein Distinguished Scholars. They will receive a \$1,000 annual scholarship from the state for up to four years of undergraduate study if they attend a New Jersey

college or university. The Garden State Scholars program provides a \$500 annual scholarship for up to four years of undergraduate study at a New Jersey college or university.

District Reports Outstanding Test Results

Waldwick SAT and CAT Scores Above State and National Averages

California Achievement Tests

Waldwick children consistently score high on standardized achievement tests. On the California Achievement Tests administered last spring, students in the lower grades, on average, scored above grade level and sixth graders scored significantly higher than their grade equivalent. Students in grades eight through eleven, on average, scored at the highest possible grade level equivalent (12.9) on all sections of the test. Our seventh graders also achieved this distinction in four of the six tested areas. These results are evidence that the district's instructional programs are of high quality and that our students are mastering the basic skills.

Building Projects Completed

A number of much-needed facility maintenance and repair projects were completed during the last few months. Several of these projects had been deferred because of budget constraints.

- Walkway covers at Traphagen School were painted, their roofs replaced, and gutters installed.
- All Traphagen classrooms were painted at no cost to the district. A grant from the Bergen County Private Industry Council paid for the paint and for the labor by a professional painter, ten special education students in a work-study program, and one supervising teacher.
- The exterior of the high school was painted as were some of the school's classrooms.
- Roofs over the Crescent School library and all-purpose room were replaced.

Waldwick Hosts Model Congress

Eva Papoutsakis and Kimberly Kehrberger were the Waldwick High School delegates to Congresswoman Marge Roukema's annual Model Congress. Held at Waldwick High School, the event included some eighty participants representing forty area high schools.

The Model Congress is a simulation game designed to encourage students

to think about the way federal policy is made. In the role of members of Congress, they study and debate two actual Congressional bills before voting on them at the end of the day.

This year students considered the Family and Medical Leave Act and the Freedom Support Act to provide financial assistance to the Commonwealth of Independent States.

Following the votes Congresswoman Roukema gave the keynote address and presented certificates to the student legislators.

"Though neither of the bills were passed, each delegate learned a great deal about how Congress works and about its power and protocol," said student Eva Papoutsakis. Her colleague, Kim Kehrberger, added, "This experience helped me understand the problems that arise when a group of people with varying viewpoints attempt to pass legislation."

Long-term plan

Dear editor,

As concerned residents, we must demand that Waldwick's mayor and Republican-controlled council proactively establish and initiate a comprehensive long-term waste management plan, instead of addressing these issues on a reactive piecemeal basis.

Either Waldwick chooses to actively pursue the recycling of junk mail, magazines, non-food plastics, metal hangers, motor oil, car batteries and corrugated medium (boxes); or we will surely guarantee ourselves fines for non-compliance with Bergen County regulations and increased taxes, related to disposal costs, into the 21st century. These collection and recycling initiatives should be joint ventures with other Bergen County municipalities that are facing these same issues.

Waldwick's carting contract is up for negotiation on March 31, 1993. Our recycling collection contract is up in March of 1994. Waldwick has lost its leaf compost permit (for the volume we bring into our site). The Bergen County Utilities Authority has established new guidelines for determining our recycling requirements. The Boy Scouts (who collect our newspapers for recycling) have increased their pickup fees. Individually each of these issues is problematic. Collectively they pose a financial burden on Waldwick's budget.

In 1988 Waldwick's recycling program was established to reduce our solid waste disposal costs. In 1989 our cost saving was over \$94,000. In 1991 our

cost saving was only about \$57,000. If this trend is allowed to continue, Waldwick's Recycling Program will not longer be cost efficient by the end of the 1990's. It should also be noted that in 1993 Waldwick will incur a non-budgeted expense of approximately \$50,000 for leaf disposal and an additional loss of \$47,000 revenue from the compost of Ho-Ho-Kus' leaaves.

Now is the time to develop, implement and monitor a comprehensive waste management and recycling system for Waldwick. As concerned neighbors, we must actively participate in Waldwick's new recycling effort. We must support this new effort to control our escalating tax burden, and to ensure the quality of life we desire for ourselves, our children and our grandchildren.

Parents challenge Waldwick board on overcrowding

Anger at school budget hearing

WALDWICK — Leslie Halloran says her two children constantly come home from school with complaints — not about the school lunch or a tough teacher, but about overcrowded classes.

"They are learning absolutely nothing," Halloran said. "The kids come home and say the teachers have no time for them. I'm thoroughly disgusted."

Halloran was one of several parents at a Board of Education public forum Monday night who passionately appealed to the board to replenish the school district's dwindling staff.

While the number of students in the district has slightly increased, the schools have lost five full-time and four part-time teachers in the last two years, resulting in unprecedented crowding.

"This town has hit rock bottom," said Halloran, who has lived in Waldwick for 17 years. "We've got to go forward and not backward."

Parents like Halloran say the borough once boasted a top school system, hailed for its wide curriculum in math, science, and foreign languages. But three consecutive budget defeats, coupled with a tightening state cap on the budget, have forced school officials to cut back on teachers and other staff members. The result: Six classes at the high school have more than 30 students, and numerous classes at the two elementary schools have more than 25.

"In Bergen County, to have classes with more than 30 is not common," said Schools Superintendent Patrick Piegari. "We're competing with some of the best schools in the country. I feel the [large classes] are very undesirable."

Most of the teachers who were laid off were at the high school, where Piegari said it is easier to reduce staff. While the crowding at

the high school is mainly caused by the loss of teachers, Piegari said the large classes in the elementary schools are due to an influx of young children.

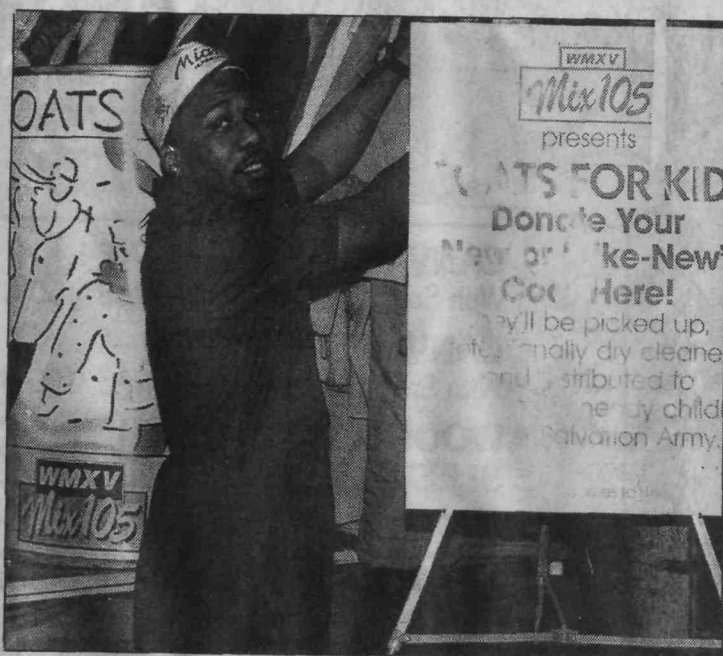
The school board may pay for a demographics study to determine whether the number of young students will continue to grow, while the Citizens Advisory Council, a group of parents and school trustees, is looking at ways to alleviate the crowding.

Piegari said the trend of increasing numbers of students in the primary grades is also evident in Mahwah and Wyckoff, which may expand its middle school to accommodate sixth-graders.

As school officials develop the 1993-1994 budget with the hope of hiring at least a couple of new faculty members, the board will be negotiating a new contract with the teachers. The previous three-year contract gave teachers an 8.5 percent salary increase each year.

Resident Don Cannon warned the board to push for minimal raises so that it could afford to hire more teachers and staff, whose salaries account for 75 percent of the budget.

Monday's forum, which was attended by about 25 people, was the first of several board meetings addressing the 1993-1994 budget. The board will hold work sessions on the budget that are open to the public on Jan. 11, Feb. 8, and March 8, and there will be a public hearing on March 29.

Russ Litchult bids farewell

His 21 years make him longest-serving councilman in Waldwick's history

WALDWICK — Waldwick Borough Councilman Russell Litchult, in an emotional speech at his last council meeting on Dec. 21, thanked the people of Waldwick for their support saying, "I was a councilman because I chose to do something for more than just myself."

He added, "Let me say simply — thank you, God bless you and

God bless Waldwick."

His farewell marked the end of 21 years of service on the Waldwick Borough Council.

Litchult who ran as a Democrat this year with Kenneth Gardner was defeated in the November election by Arthur Barthold and Edwin Sherman. From 1971 to 1989 he was a member of the Republican Party.

Several Waldwick residents voiced their appreciation of Litchult and his service to the

community. Frank McKenna said, "I don't think you can really grasp what 21 years of service means. If all of you (present council members) added the time you have spent on council and doubled it, it would not equal Litchult's."

Litchult, who is the longest serving councilman in Waldwick's history, was instrumental in several changes in Waldwick. In 1974 he led the council's efforts to purchase woodlands around the Saddle River Brook. He secured a grant from the state on the grounds the property be kept in its natural state.

Upgrading the police force was also a serious concern for Litchult. A former Waldwick policeman, he understood the importance of up-to-date technology in fighting crime. But, when he first took office in 1971, patrolmen were armed with revolvers that dated back to the 1920's. Litchult saw to it that they had state-of-the-art revolvers in 1974 and by 1987 they were using automatic pistols.

Fighting drugs was a top issue with Litchult. To help Waldwick remain a drug free

community he got K-9 drug-sniffing dogs for the police in 1990. He is proud of the fact that all these improvements in the police force were done without the benefit of state funds.

Most recently Litchult was involved in the renovation of wells 2,3 and 7. Harmful organic bacteria had been detected in these wells. Litchult led the way in having new air strippers put in the wells to prevent contamination, insuring clean water for Waldwick.

Litchult was born in a house on the Franklin Turnpike in Waldwick in 1932. He received his early education at St. Luke's Grammar School and High

School in Waldwick.

He served in the U.S. Marines during the Korean War from 1951 to 1954. After his discharge he joined the Waldwick Police Department and worked there until 1970 attaining the rank of detective lieutenant.

While he worked on the police force he attended the FBI National Academy and the Federal Bureau of Narcotics Training School, Washington D.C.

Litchult claimed he stayed in Waldwick politics because he loved Waldwick. He had been asked several times to run for larger offices, but always refused. "I got involved in politics because I wanted to do something for my neighbors," he said. "My heart was always in Waldwick."

Guns aren't the only ways to kill

Editor, The Record:

Regarding the two letters on Dec. 18 praising the British way to reduce murder, my relatives visited Great Britain and Ireland in September 1992. On Sept. 11 and 12, London newspapers reported on 17 murders. One was a shooting victim and the remainder were stabbed or bludgeoned. The weapons of choice are knives and clubs.

On Sept. 14, London headlines re-

ported a gun fight between bobbies (unarmed police?) and an armed gang. The bobbies confiscated 40 handguns.

On Sept. 20, there was a championship soccer match between the cities of Dublin and Donnegal. In honor of the win, a young man was killed in front of the hotel my relatives were staying in by a flying karate kick to his head.

Every day, the newspapers reported on at least four murders. That's an aver-

age 1,500 per year.

In this connection, there were more than 24,000 murders in the U.S. last year. Subtracting the 10,567 killed by guns leaves more than 13,000 murdered by other means. How do we control this?

Geese face lean times in Waldwick

If you feed them, they will come. And stay.

That's the thinking behind a proposed ordinance in Waldwick that would ban residents from feeding Canada geese and other migratory water fowl on public property.

If the Borough Council approves the ban, Waldwick would join Ho-Ho-Kus, Montvale, Hillsdale, Park Ridge, Clifton, and other North Jersey towns that are desperately trying to get rid of the pesky fowl that leave their droppings in parks and ponds.

In Waldwick, geese leave their signature at Whites Pond, the municipal pool, and the baseball fields at Waldwick Park, as well as around Waldwick High School.

"It's gotten to the point where it's pretty disgusting," said Mayor Rick Vander Wende. "We're probably one of the few towns in Bergen County that has not done something about it yet."

In addition to the aesthetic reasons for wanting to push the geese out of town,

there are health concerns. Robert Simonoff, president of the Waldwick Board of Health, which suggested the new ordinance, said food that people use to feed water fowl may attract raccoons and other animals that could spread rabies. He said there have been three confirmed cases of rabid animals in the borough since 1989.

"If we can prevent one case of rabies, we're going to do our utmost to do it with this ordinance," Simonoff said.

Ho-Ho-Kus, Montvale, Park Ridge, and Hillsdale have passed ordinances prohibiting residents from feeding water fowl, said Simonoff and Eric Preiss, health of-

ficer at the Northwest Bergen Regional Health Commission.

Clifton police used large firecrackers and shotguns loaded with blanks to scare geese away from Main Memorial Park in September.

Suburban areas, with their parks and ponds and an absence of hunters, provide an ideal habitat for Canada geese, state health officials say. Janet Sillings, state director of the Animal Damage Control Program of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, said 20 percent of the 300 complaints about Canada geese that she received from state residents between October 1991 and September 1992 were from Bergen County.

The population of Canada geese

in New Jersey, which Sillings estimated at 40,000, has increased exponentially in the last couple of decades as the fowl have shunned colder climates in favor of the state's relatively mild winters. She said the geese would be better off grazing in rural areas instead of eating bread and popcorn from animal-loving suburbanites.

"Not feeding them probably helps them in the long run," she said.

The state Bureau of Wildlife Management is drafting a plan that could be used by municipalities deluged by geese, said David Burke, a supervising biologist at the bureau. Banning residents from feeding the animals and erecting fences around ponds are among the recommended preventive measures, he said. One South Jersey town even placed an inflatable alligator in a pond to scare away the geese.

A candidate should be given 48 hours after the election to remove this unsightly advertising. After that, the candidate will pay

a fine to the municipality where the infraction occurred. The municipality would then take the responsibility of cleaning the affected signs, poles, guardrails etc.

The signs become illegible, it costs money to replace them, and quite clearly, offers a candidate unfair exposure at the expense of the taxpaying

public. In addition, the littering of toll booths has also grown totally out of control and in some cases, has affected the operation of the toll taking machines.

If the public really cares about its environment and how its tax dollars are being spent, look at the costs of cleaning up this yearly mess in every town throughout the state. Those towns with major thoroughfares running through them have become public billboards. This problem will not go away until there is enforcement of existing laws or ordinances regarding signs.

Time for comprehensive recycling program

As concerned residents, we must demand that Waldwick's Mayor and Republican-controlled council pro-actively establish and initiate a comprehensive long-term waste management plan, instead of addressing these issues on a reactive piecemeal basis.

Either Waldwick chooses to actively pursue the recycling of

junk mail, magazines, non-food plastics, metal hangers, motor oil, car batteries and corrugated medium (boxes); or we will surely guarantee ourselves fines for non-compliance with Bergen County regulations and increased taxes, related to disposal costs, into the 21st century. These collection and recycling initiatives should be joint ventures with other Bergen County municipalities that are facing these same issues.

Waldwick's carting contract is up for renegotiation on March 31, 1993. Our recycling collection contract is up in March of

1994. Waldwick has lost its leaf compost permit (for the volume we bring into our site). The Bergen County Utilities

Authority has established new guidelines for determining our recycling requirements. The Boy Scouts (who collect our newspapers for recycling) have increased their pickup fees. In-

dividually each of these issues are problematic. Collectively they pose a financial burden on Waldwick's budget.

In 1988 Waldwick's recycling program was established to reduce our solid waste disposal costs. In 1989 our cost saving was over \$94,000. In 1991 our cost saving was only about \$57,000. If this trend is allowed to continue, Waldwick's Recycling Program will no longer be cost efficient by the end of the 1990's. It should also be noted that in 1993 Waldwick will incur a non-budgeted expense of approximately \$50,000 for leaf disposal and an additional loss of \$47,000 revenue from the compost of Ho-Ho-Kus' leaves.

Now is the time to develop, implement and monitor a comprehensive waste management and recycling system for Waldwick. As concerned neighbors, we must actively participate in Waldwick's new recycling effort. We must support this new effort to control our escalating tax burden, and to ensure the quality of life we desire for ourselves, our children and our grandchildren.

CBC meetings shouldn't be cloaked in secrecy

To the editor:

In response to a school budget defeat in 1984, the Waldwick Board of Education created the Citizens Budget Committee (CBC). Since then, it has functioned largely as a public relations tool for the superintendent. Although charged to assist in developing the school budget and to consider "expenditure levels, tax rates and availability of surplus funds," the committee's real function is to dutifully rubber-stamp the proposed budget and issue a yearly pre-election flyer that endorses the budget, warns against the dangers of rejecting it, and vituperatively attacks anyone deemed to be critical of the board or the budget — an activity that the board is forbidden by law to engage in. I was a charter member of the CBC in 1984, but resigned when I discovered that the committee was formed, not for public input, but to serve as a propaganda tool.

Despite the fact that it pretends to deal with tax rates and expenditure levels, Superintendent Piegari has begun every organizational meeting by suggesting that the meetings be closed to the public whose taxes are affected. Past committees have not allowed this. At CBC meetings, the super-

intendent has shown his contempt for the public by stonewalling access to the public documents presented for discussion. At one point, he demanded \$26 for a copy of the detailed school budget provided to the CBC members.

At the December CBC organizational meeting the superintendent finally got his way. Spearheaded by the efforts of co-chairman Ken Gardner, the CBC members voted to bar the public from attending and observing their meetings. Mr. Gardner expressed his fear of public scrutiny. The Citizens' Budget Committee has become the Secret Budget Approval Society. It is ironic that co-chairman Gardner, who asked the citizens of Waldwick to come out last November and express their confidence in his council candidacy, now has so little confidence in his fellow townspeople that he will not allow them to watch his committee function — this in spite of the fact that a non-resident member of the teaching staff is a voting member of the committee. It appears that defeated council candidate Gardner has been afflicted with "election rejection syndrome." The condition is not life-threatening and the involuntary convulsive movements usually subside.

The people who pay taxes to support the school system have the right to attend these budget meetings, hear the discussions, examine the figures, see which of the nine board selected members actually attend the meetings, and judge whether the committee's budget endorsement is warranted by the facts.

The board has a responsibility to override the decision of Mr. Gardner's committee and direct that the public be allowed to attend committee meetings. The board policy set up to oversee the Citizens' Advisory Council directs that they "allow public access to all their meetings." The CBC is no less important. It should be made to function under the light of public scrutiny. The voters have rejected the last three school budgets because they lacked confidence in the superintendent, the board and its pronouncements. Throwing a cloak of secrecy over the budget deliberations will not restore that confidence.

Question schools' quality

Parents claim curriculum cuts, larger class sizes contribute to decline

WALDWICK—Several parents complained about the quality of the schools at the last Waldwick Board of Education meeting. The parents felt that education is in decline in Waldwick due to cuts in the curriculum and larger class sizes.

Pat Kehrberger, Waldwick resident, complained that the larger class sizes and the cuts in

the curriculum were hurting her children's education. "My oldest (child) graduated in 1990 and it's sad to say, but I don't think my other children are getting the same education. We have got to draw the line. There can be no more staff cuts."

Leslie Halloran, Waldwick resident, said, "We are very upset about class sizes. We have got to get back to education. This town is at rock bottom."

The board blames these problems on budget defeats over the last three years. After the trio of budget defeats, the Waldwick Borough Council reduced the board's budget by a total of \$547,940.

This has forced the board to cut teachers and the number of course offerings. Carole Ann Geronimo, board member, said, "There is a climate out there, and I hope it's not still out there, of reducing costs at all costs. The largest part of our budget is in teacher's salaries and textbooks. We have cut too many teachers."

Patrick Piegari, Waldwick schools superintendent, agreed on the importance of smaller class sizes. He explained that the courses are more complex than they were in the past. "To get the level of education we have had you need the smaller classes. Kids are exposed to different pressures than when I was teaching in the 1960's."

Three years ago, classes at the Jr./Sr. High School held between 20 and 25 students and no class held over 30. At present, classes hold 25 to 32 students, with 7 holding over 30

Students learn to read and to like it

WALDWICK — "In a word, it has been 'wonderful,'" said teacher Linda Vroegindewey on Crescent School's new literature-based reading program.

Crescent School in Waldwick is piloting a reading program in the second grades. "More and more students are going to the library for additional books by the authors they are reading in class," she added.

"The children understand their reading more because we are spending more time talking about the books," noted her colleague, John Murgia.

Teacher Marian Brovero, who is also thrilled with the program, explained that the students are learning the same second grade skills they always did, but they are learning them in a different way.

This literature-based reading program uses well-written, enjoyable books by popular authors as the basis for instruction in all language skills, including reading, vocabulary, spelling and writing. The basal reader is now used as a reference book and students do not have as many worksheets to complete.

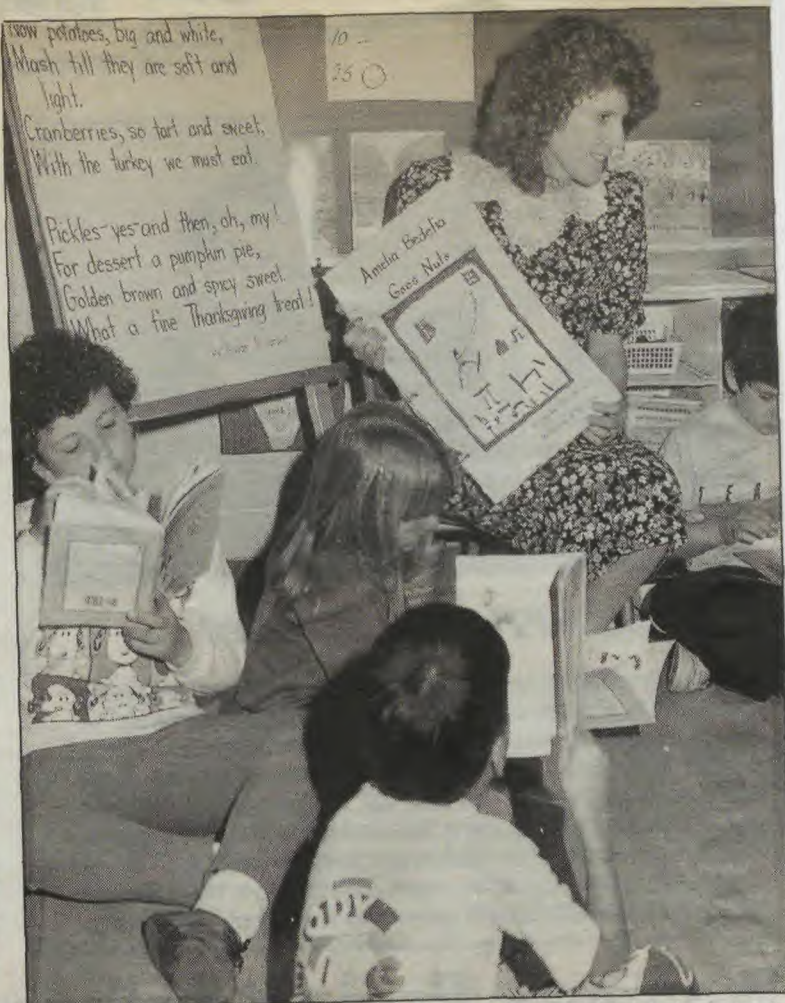
Instead, they spend more time reading together, alone,

with a friend, and at home with their parents. Spelling words are all taken from their reading and from common mistakes in their daily journals.

A variety of follow-up activities are based on their reading. For example, Murgia's class recently wrote letters to one of the characters in Judy Blume's book, "The Pain and the Great One." Vroegindewey's students rewrote Judith Viorst's "Alexander and the Terrible, Horrible, No Good, Very Bad Day" using positive instead of negative words.

After reading "Henry and Mudge," Brovero's class sang songs, listened to poetry about friendship, and developed a word hunt with their spelling words. Students may draw characters from a book or write new adventures for such personalities as Amelia Bedelia.

They learn vocabulary, discuss characters and plot, and complete a writing assignment based on each book. Reading skills such as making predictions, comparing and contrasting, and adding suffixes to base words are all learned through literature.

Waldwick senior rediscovers her touch

WALDWICK — Waldwick's Kim Kehrberger has been in a shooting slump recently, but you'd never know it based on the first five minutes of her performance Thursday against Midland Park.

The senior forward scored her team's first nine points in staking the Warriors to a 9-1 advantage. Waldwick went on to defeat the Panthers, 50-35, in a battle of Bergen-Passaic Scholastic League Carpenter Division leaders.

"Before the last few games I was thinking too much about having to score," said Kehrberger, who finished with a game-high 14 points. "Before tonight's game, I tried to put it out of my mind and just go out and have fun. It also helped a lot to have that first shot fall."

"Shooting is such a mind game," said Waldwick coach Bob Klie, whose team was 20-for-46 from the floor and 12-of-21 from the line in improving to 7-1. "It's amazing when the shots start to fall how quickly they become such better shooters."

Two of Kehrberger's first four baskets were assisted by freshman Erin Harvell, who had a field goal of her own in helping the Warriors to a 14-5 first-quarter advantage.

"Erin was a real catalyst tonight, especially early on," Klie said of the 5-foot-7 guard. "She is probably the most talented player I've ever coached at this stage of her career."

That's high praise considering that in 13 years, Klie has had some outstanding talent, including Patti Blackman, whose jersey is retired and hanging in the gym

after she finished with 1,587 career points.

"People in town are already making a lot of comparisons between Erin and Patti and they even kind of look alike," said Klie.

Harvell finished with eight points and Jeanne Kehrberger chipped in nine as the Warriors had seven different players score.

"If you take the entire 32 minutes as a whole, this might very well be the best game we've had this season," said Klie.

A balanced offense and aggressive man-to-man defense allowed Waldwick to maintain its early lead as Midland Park could come no closer than nine in the second and third quarters.

The Panthers, who hurt themselves with 19 turnovers, were led by a 13-point effort from Tracy Smith. Midland Park,

which started the season at 5-0, has dropped two straight. The schedule doesn't get any easier for the Panthers, whose next five games are against Eastern Christian, Glen Rock, Hawthorne, Mahwah, and Lodi.

Waldwick, which has only lost to East-

ern Christian this season, will be tested against Pompton Lakes and Lodi next week.

Board adopts new VAMA guidelines

WALDWICK — The Northwest Bergen Board of Realtors recently renewed its commitment to fair housing by adopting the newly-revised Voluntary Affirmative Marketing Agreement (VAMA).

VAMA provides guidelines on marketing, advertising, training and education of Realtors and the public to ensure fair housing practices in the real estate industry. The original agreement was established in 1975 among the National Association of Realtors (NAR) and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The changes in VAMA include: requiring participating state and local Realtor associations to assess their fair-hous-

ing efforts; giving HUD the the authority to check the efforts of VAMA participants; and requiring Realtor associations to cooperate with community-based fair housing and civil rights groups to remove community barriers to equal housing opportunity.

During a recent New Jersey Association of Realtors program, "Understanding the New VAMA," Howard Lukert, executive director, Northwest Bergen Board, said, "VAMA supports NAR's Code of Ethics by requiring Realtors to commit to equal housing. The latest version of VAMA includes revisions that provide simple guidelines that make it easier for Realtors to adhere to fair housing principles in their day-to-day business."

Lesson learned at Temple Israel shelter

We ate. We joked. We had some serious conversation. With one or two, I felt like a friend. But I knew the next morning, Christmas morning, I could go home.

When I volunteered to remain overnight at the Temple Israel shelter, I was unprepared for the mix of emotions I felt, from the stories I heard and the people I met. And because it was Christmas Eve, I couldn't help reflect on how different the holidays were for my family and friends.

I arrived at the temple at 7 p.m., just as the van which had delivered our guests was pulling out. The social hall, where just four days earlier my children had eaten latkes and spun dreidels, was now transformed into a makeshift dormitory. Cots lined the walls, still decorated for Hanukkah.

I watched the 11 men and three women arrange their bedding, and then I quickly retreated to the kitchen, reluctant to approach these strangers.

Temple Israel of Ridgewood is one of a growing number of churches and synagogues in Bergen County participating in the overflow shelter program run by the Interreligious Fellowship for the Homeless. Every night, those who can't be accommodated in the Fellowship's main facility in Hackensack are bused out and returned in the morning. Each congregation signs up to take the homeless once a week for a three month period. Volunteers cook and serve dinner, stay overnight and provide breakfast and bag lunches the next day.

This night, a crew of seven was busy in the kitchen. Within minutes, a sumptuous turkey dinner with all the trimmings was ready. Festive table cloths and candles had been set out.

I was moved not only by the abundance of the food and the attempt to create a holiday atmosphere, but also by the volunteers' obvious need to serve. While we may be unable to alter conditions, we can at least offer a hot meal.

We were called to the table and I joined Willie, Eugene, Rob and Loretta for dinner.

I quickly realized I had no reason to feel uneasy. These four were relaxed with one another and started joking with me as soon as they were told I

was writing a newspaper story.

"Don't you put me in no newspaper," Rob, 39, a former marine and Vietnam veteran, said in mock threatening tones. "Don't you dare try to take my picture."

But Willie, an outgoing, friendly man of 30, wanted to be sure I would make him look all right. Quick to inform me that he had attended the Culinary Arts School in Manhattan, he asked, "Aren't you going to write that you met this terrific, handsome guy?" I could see Willie and I would get along.

Eugene, 28, brought his book to the table for company — an Isaac Asimov sci-fi novel. "I've been working my way through all his stuff," he reported.

Loretta wasn't feeling well, and Rob was clearly concerned about her. She said they were a couple and hoped to marry in the spring. It struck me that even under the worst circumstances, love can flourish and that perhaps being with someone made their ordeal a little easier. "At least you have each other," I remarked and she agreed.

Conversation soon turned to their situation. There was a depressing sameness to their stories: lost jobs, frustrating job searches, lost contact with family.

Yet, neither he nor the others were objects of pity. Their vibrance and youth defied the stereotypical image of the homeless and gave me hope that these people, at least, had a chance to beat the odds.

"You lose a job, you lose everything," said Willie. He had just landed a job at McDonald's and hoped to be back on his feet in a month or so.

Ryan, 20, was having a harder time. "Any jobs at your newspaper?" he wanted to know the minute we shook hands. He's been in the shelter system for about six months and out of touch with his parents for three years.

Even those who were working faced an uphill battle to save enough to afford a place to live. "I have two jobs — as a nurses'

posite of last year," he said. "Last year, I had a decent job. I was surrounded by friends and family and had a big stack of presents."

He pulled out his wallet and showed off the pictures of his seven children, some of whom are now in college. "My son and daughter are coming to see me tomorrow," he said.

The children are beautiful and, as I complimented their photos, I couldn't help wondering where they would visit him and how he could bear having them see him in this condition.

Yet, neither he nor the others were objects of pity. Their vibrance and youth defied the stereotypical image of the homeless and gave me hope that these people, at least, had a chance to beat the odds.

A lively card game and a Tom Cruise-Nicole Kidman video kept many of the visitors going well past 11 p.m., when my fellow overnight volunteer announced lights out. This was later than usual; it was a holiday and things didn't entirely quiet down until about midnight.

I stayed up awhile with Willie and Ryan, who wanted to know

about my family. I showed them pictures and felt as if we got to know each other a bit.

At 1:30 a.m., I awakened my partner so I could take my turn sleeping. I brought my pillow and sleeping bag, which, like the other people, I laid out neatly on my cot. The only other belongings I had with me — shoes, jacket, purse and camera — were stowed close to me. I thought how strange it would be if I really owned nothing else but this.

I awakened at 7, when my partner turned on the lights and said, "Good morning, everyone." It was a quiet night.

Within 40 minutes, the van driver arrived. With surprising swiftness they were packed and ready to leave. As they filed out, they thanked us and we wished them Merry Christmas and, above all, good luck.

I was overcome with emotion, again reflecting on my own good fortune, knowing that very soon I would be back in my home with my husband and children. I hope that things turn around soon for this small group. I was touched by them and knew as I said goodbye that I would not forget them.

Anyone in general good health, age 17 through 75, and weighing at least 110 pounds can usually donate blood. Donors are requested to eat a moderate meal prior to giving and bring identification showing address and signature with them to the donor site.

The Bergen Community Regional Blood Center is a non-profit community-based organization. The center supplies 12 hospitals and over one million residents in Bergen, Passaic, Morris and Hudson counties. Citizens committee?

Dear Editor:

In response to a school budget defeat in 1984, the Waldwick Board of Education created the Citizens Budget Committee (CBC). Since then, it has functioned largely as a public relations tool for the superintendent.

Although charged to assist in developing the school budget and to consider "expenditure levels, tax rates and availability of surplus funds," the committee's real function is to dutifully rubberstamp the proposed budget and issue a yearly pre-election flyer that endorses the budget, warns against the dangers of rejecting it and vituperatively attacks anyone deemed to be critical of the board or the budget — an activity the board is forbidden by law to engage in.

I was a charter member of the CBC in 1984, but resigned when I discovered that the committee was formed not for public input but to serve as a propaganda tool.

Despite the fact that it pretends to deal with tax rates and expenditure levels, Superintendent Piegari has begun every organizational meeting by suggesting that the meetings be closed to the public whose taxes are affected. Past commit-

tees have not allowed this. At CBC meetings the superintendent has shown his contempt for the public by stonewalling access to public documents presented for discussion. At one point, he demanded \$26 for a copy of the detailed school budget provided to the CBC members.

At the December CBC organizational meeting the superintendent finally got his way. Spearheaded by the efforts of Co-Chairman Ken Gardner, the CBC members voted to bar the public from attending and observing their meetings. Gardner expressed his fear of public scrutiny. The Citizens' Budget Committee has become the Secret Budget Approval Society.

It is ironic that Co-Chairman Gardner, who asked the citizens of Waldwick to come out last November and express their confidence in his council candidacy, now has so little confidence in his townspeople that he will not allow them to watch his committee function --

this in spite of the fact that a nonresident member of the teaching staff is a voting member of the committee.

It appears that defeated council candidate Gardner has been afflicted with "election-rejection syndrome." The condition is not life threatening and the involuntary convulsive movements usually subside.

The people who pay taxes to support the school system have the right to attend these budget meetings, hear the discussions, examine the figures, see which of the nine board selected members actually attend the meetings, and judge whether the committee's budget endorsement is warranted by the facts.

The CBC's first clandestine meeting takes place on Jan. 6 in the Board Conference Room. The Board has a responsibility to override the decision of Gardner's committee and direct that the public be allowed to attend. The board policy set up to oversee the Citizens' Advisory Council directs that they "allow public access to all their

meetings." The CBC is no less important. It should be made to function under the light of public scrutiny. The voters have rejected the last three school budgets because they lacked confidence in the superintendent, the board and its pronouncements. Throwing a cloak of secrecy over the budget deliberations will not restore that confidence.

WILL PROHIBIT THE FEEDING OF MIGRATORY WATER FOWL OR CREATING A CONGESTION OF SAID WATER FOWL WHICH RESULTS IN A THREAT OR NUISANCE TO THE PUBLIC HEALTH, SAFETY OR WELFARE.

Section 61B-1. Definitions. MIGRATORY WATER FOWL - Shall include those species of birds commonly known as swans, geese, and ducks, and any other water fowl falling under the jurisdiction of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

Section 61B-2. Feeding or Causing a Congestion of Water Fowl.

It shall be unlawful for any person to:

(A) Feed any migratory water fowl on public property in the Borough of Waldwick.

(B) Create any condition which results in a congregation of migratory water fowl on public property which:

Results in an accumulation of water fowl feces or droppings, or

2. Results in damage to flora, fauna, or public property, or safety or welfare, or

3. Results in a threat or nuisance to the public health, safety or welfare, or

4. Results in a threat to the health, safety or welfare of said migratory water fowl.

Section 61B-3. Enforcement

(A) This ordinance shall be enforced by the Health Officer and the Police Department of the Borough of Waldwick.

(B) Whenever the Health Officer or the Police become aware that migratory water fowl are being fed in violation of this Ordinance they may issue a summons which shall be answerable before the Municipal Magistrate.

(C) Whenever the Health Officer becomes aware that a congregation or congestion of migratory water fowl exists on public property, he may disperse or remove them by any lawful means. However, before such dispersal or removal takes place, the Health Officer shall meet and confer with the Board of Health and with their advice and consent determine the appropriate method and considering first the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Waldwick; and second, the health, safety and welfare of the migratory water fowl.

(D) Whenever the Health Officer, in his sound discretion, determines that water fowl shall be dispersed by scare tactics, or noise tactics, he may request assistance for the implementation of the plan from the Police Department and/or Public Works Department, or from any responsible citizen or citizens. This paragraph shall not be construed to authorize any private citizen to discharge any firearm or to use any device which launches a projectile of any type.

(E) The Health Officer shall apply for and secure all permits necessary by law before dispersing or removing the migratory water fowl.

Section 61B-4. Penalties. Any person who is guilty of feeding migratory water fowl on public property, in the Borough of Waldwick shall be punished by a fine of \$10.00 and two hours of community service for the first offense and \$25.00 and five hours of community service for the second and subsequent offenses.

Section 61B-5. Repealer.

All other ordinances of the Borough of Waldwick which are in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

Section 61B-6. Severability

Waldwick girls own 9-2 mark but are seeking consistency

After going to the sectional final in Group 1 last year against Hawthorne, the Waldwick girls basketball team found itself a disappointed loser yet determined to atone for the loss this season.

After a 55-17 thrashing of Manchester on Tuesday, the Warriors are off to a 9-2 start and looking forward to the opening of the Bergen County tournament this weekend.

"I would put us somewhere around the ninth to 13th seed, which means we will probably be playing this weekend," head coach Bob Klie said. "The loss to Lodi probably cost us a bye in the preliminary round."

That setback last Friday was a bit of a microcosm of what has plagued Waldwick despite its lofty record. The Warriors shot a dismal 4 of 32 from the field in the second half of that game, which they lost by only three points.

"We are shooting around 41 percent on the season," Klie noted, "and the outside shots are not going in consistently. When we get the transition shots and the layups off turnovers, we are okay. But we

have not been able to rely on our perimeter game to win."

Another factor has been the lack of depth for the team, an area further weakened when two players left the team after the seventh game.

"We can go seven deep, but when we get to the eighth player, we are either way ahead or without a chance of catching up," Klie noted.

It also hasn't helped that senior Kim Kehrberger, the team's leading scorer with a 13.7 average, is still not fully recovered from reconstructive knee surgery last spring. She missed the spring, summer and fall seasons, and only received clearance to play three days before the first practice.

"You can see when she is in traffic that she is a half-step slow, and her timing is just not there. It is a shame, too, because she is a workaholic on the court and it is affecting her more mentally. She is about 95 percent back physically, but maybe 65 percent mentally."

The supporting cast is an experienced group, with all of the other starters having been

in the lineup last year. Senior Megan Schultz had a season-high 14 points against Manchester and will be counted on to carry a heavier load as the season progresses.

Chris Shenkberger, a junior, led Waldwick with 10 rebounds against the Falcons, and Chris D'Annibale, a senior, also will need to work the boards and shoot the outside shot. Sophomore Jeanne Kehrberger rounds out the starting five, and she had 10 points against Manchester.

Freshman Erin Harvell, who some are comparing to Waldwick's all-time career scorer Patti Blackman, is a solid sixth player off the bench, and sophomores Lisa Porfido and Kerri Fusco are picking up valuable minutes in reserve roles.

"Our success is dependent on playing good defense, limiting our turnovers while capitalizing on the opponents giveaways, and picking up our outside shooting game," Klie said. "We don't have the inside size to take advantage of teams, so we have to work hard for everything we get."

Arpine Terlemezian, 92; acclaimed Waldwick artist

Arpine Terlemezian, a native Armenian and late-blooming artist who painted memories of her homeland from her daughter's living room in Waldwick, died Thursday. She was 92.

Mrs. Terlemezian, who lived the last 50 years of her life in Waldwick, started painting when she was 60 years old. Her works hang in the John F. Kennedy Memorial Library in Boston, the Capitol Gallery in Washington, and the Peoples Art Museum in Armenia.

"One night I couldn't sleep," she told an interviewer in 1969. "I began to reminisce about an orphanage I worked at. I thought of the mountaintops and trees and rivers nearby. I took a canvas and painted what I saw."

A local artist praised that first work, "Memories of Armenia," Mrs. Terlemezian recalled. "That gave me the courage to keep on painting."

Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis chose a later painting of hers, "The Eternal Flame," for the Kennedy Library.

Mrs. Terlemezian, who came to the United States in 1921 to escape the Turkish and Russian invasion of her country, settled first in Massachusetts and later in New Hampshire. She and her husband, Dajad, who had fought the Turks as a teenage revolutionary in Armenia, moved to Waldwick in 1940. Dajad Terlemezian died in 1982.

Mrs. Terlemezian deferred her artistic aspirations while raising five children. "But she always had the love in her soul," said her

daughter Anahid Jafargian. "Once the kids had grown, she said, 'Now I have to get started.'"

Perhaps the highlight of Mrs. Terlemezian's career came in 1970 when she returned to Armenia to show her work. She appeared on television there and in a film that was shown in the Soviet Union.

In addition to her daughter Anahid, she is survived by three sons, Vanik, Dodge, and Aram, and another daughter, Alice Pizappi, all of Waldwick; 10 grandchildren, and 10 great-grandchildren.

Waldwick may host area dispatch

WALDWICK — The Waldwick police station has tentatively been selected to serve as a regional emergency dispatch center for Waldwick, Allendale, Saddle River and Ho-Ho-Kus.

A study commissioned by the four boroughs has determined that Waldwick's radio equipment emits the strongest signal, thus reducing the need to install repeaters, according to Waldwick Administrator Gary Kratz.

The four borough councils are now expected to authorize a second study to assess the staffing and technical requirements for basing the center in Waldwick. The councils would still need to formally approve the proposal later this year.

Under the plan, Waldwick would dispatch police, fire, ambulance and public works services for all four boroughs, possibly starting in January, 1994. The move is designed to save money by eliminating personnel and closing the three non-host police stations during off hours. Each borough now dispatches its own emergency services.

Municipal officials have said they are not concerned about the partial closings since emergency phones at those stations will enable a caller to summon a police officer within minutes.

School boards target 'plum'

Treasurer job called a waste

When the North Bergen Board of Education needed a treasurer of school moneys two years ago, it turned to Leo Gattoni — a former mayor, current municipal commissioner, and father of the schools superintendent.

It has worked out well for the 79-year-old Gattoni, who does little more than check the district's bank records each month and rubber stamp his signatures on paychecks to earn his \$15,000 annual pay. But such arrangements would become a thing of the past if New Jersey school officials had their way.

Calling the job a costly and unnecessary "patronage plum," representatives of the state's school boards and school business officials are pushing hard to eliminate the legal requirement that all districts hire a school treasurer. But they are facing stiff resistance from municipal governments and the city workers who usually hold those part-time jobs.

The New Jersey School Boards Association, which is leading the fight to get rid of the position, says it costs districts statewide at least \$3 million in salaries and even more in extra pension and health benefits. The group says that money would be better spent on children's education.

"It's a totally unnecessary position," said Connie MacKenzie, a member of the Leonia Board of Education and Bergen County's representative to the school boards group.

Representatives of the state's municipal governments and finance officers disagree. They object to the school boards' contention that the post is a patronage job and argue that school treasurers provide needed accountability.

"The only insight the municipality has into the school board finances is that position," said Joseph Regatts, an Ocean County municipal and school treasurer who is legislative chairman of the Tax Collectors and Treasurers Association of New Jersey.

Under a law dating back a century, each public school district is required to hire someone who does not work for the district or sit on the local school board to supervise the district's financial transactions. Salaries for the part-time job range from less than \$2,000 to more than \$17,000.

Districts are required to offer the post first to their municipal treasurer or tax collector, and such officials hold most of the jobs. If those officials decline the job, however, districts can offer the job

to any "suitable person," a term that it is not defined in the law. Elected officials, other districts' school business officials, and independent accountants are among those who hold the position.

School boards and school business officials repeatedly have sought the law's repeal over the years. Last fall it looked as if they finally would prevail, when the state Senate overwhelmingly passed a bill sponsored by Sen. Joseph M. Kyrillos Jr., R-Monmouth, to do away with the position statewide. But in December, the bill ran into trouble in the Assembly after the New Jersey League of Municipalities and the tax collectors association unleashed a vigorous lobbying campaign against it.

Under pressure, lawmakers amended the bill to leave it up to local districts whether to retain the treasurer post.

If boards decide to eliminate the job, the school board secretary would assume the duties. In most cases, school business administrators also hold the title of board secretary.

The amended bill is awaiting action by the full Assembly. School board representatives,

joined by the New Jersey Association of School Business Officials, say that municipal officials' opposition is motivated by personal financial interest. The extra money those officials make as school treasurer adds to their pensions and, in some cases, qualifies them for lifetime health benefits.

School officials also argue that many school treasurers do not fulfill the basic job duties, such as handling all school district bank deposits and signing all their checks. And school officials say that if the treasurers do try to meet those responsibilities, they may cause delays and inconvenience because of their part-time status.

Moreover, school officials say, school business administrators are

qualified to oversee district finances themselves. The annual audit that school districts are required to undergo, combined with a new state regulation requiring districts to adopt double-entry bookkeeping practices, provide ample accountability, they say.

"The irony here is that school districts' budgets are three times the size of the municipal budget in almost every case," said John Henderson, an official with the school boards association.

But not all school officials agree that the position has outlived its usefulness. Thomas Burgin, for example, school business administrator in Ridgewood, said the district pays the village treasurer \$3,500 to serve as school treasurer and that he performs such valuable services as balancing the district's books every month.

"It's a horrendous job," Burgin said. "Somebody is going to have that work if he doesn't do it."

State eases Mt. Laurel demands

Slow economy is cited as affordable-housing obligations are cut 42%

TRENTON — Citing New Jersey's slow-growing economy, which has depressed real estate prices throughout the state, a state agency is reducing the burden on cities and towns to provide special zoning for low- and moderate-income housing.

The Council on Affordable Housing released figures Wednesday estimating that the state needs 83,313 new units of affordable housing between now and 1999. That's down 42.3 percent from 1987, by which time the council had asked municipalities to make room for 145,707 affordable apartments and homes.

Statewide, the council said that about half of the drop in the housing requirement is due to compliance with its existing quotas. Much of the rest is due to reduced housing prices and slower growth.

"We were projecting a lot of growth for New Jersey — and a lot of it didn't happen," said Art Bernard, acting executive director of the council.

Many North Jersey municipalities will see significant drops in their affordable housing quotas, which the council revises every six years. Bergen County's requirement dropped by 68.5 percent, and Passaic County's requirement dropped by 53.6 percent.

Some cities and towns aren't being required to build any affordable housing between now and 1999.

In 1987, Paramus was given until this year to provide 1,160 units of affordable housing. For the next six years, its quota has been reduced to zero. The borough has met its obligations by asking mall developers to donate money and land for low-income housing in exchange for zoning approvals.

Other municipalities have had their obligations reduced, making their future compliance easier. Paterson's affordable housing requirement for the next six years was reduced by two-thirds, to 1,269 units.

That means the city's current five-year plan to upgrade deteriorating housing will go further toward meeting the council's requirements. Paterson will also be helped by a new law that says the council can't ask a municipality to build more than 1,000 units.

Many cities and towns have chosen to ignore the council's requirements, leaving themselves open to lawsuits by housing developers. A pair of state Supreme Court rulings in 1975 and 1983, known as Mount Laurel I and II, say that cities and towns have a constitutional obligation to zone some land for low- and moderate-income housing.

Under the Fair Housing Act, the council is charged with making sure that each New Jersey municipality zones for enough low- and moderate-income housing. Once the council approves a municipality's zoning ordinance, it cannot be sued under the Mount Laurel decisions.

"The towns that have not done anything are playing Russian roulette," said William G. Dressel Jr., assistant executive director of the New Jersey State League of Municipalities. "They're running at high risk for litigation."

Besides issuing new figures, the council also revised its rules defining affordable housing units. One change says affordable housing units have to be priced so families can purchase them with a 5 percent down payment; previously, a 10 percent down payment was required.

The council also ruled that cities and towns should provide more zoning for rental units.

Though housing prices have been depressed by the state's weak economy, council members said there's still a need to guard against exclusionary zoning. They expressed hope that their requirements will make housing more affordable to low- and moderate-income families.

"The rules we've adopted this time around make housing more affordable," said Nancy L. Randall, a council member.

Priorities

Dear editor,

At the Jan. 4 Waldwick board of education meeting, two parents complained about cuts in the curriculum and large class sizes. Citing the last three budget defeats as the cause of both the deteriorating educational quality and the fact that seven classes at the high school hold more than 30 students, the trustees blamed the voters for creating the problem. This is pure nonsense! The 1992-93 average cost per pupil is \$10,000 (higher for the 596 students at the high school in grades 7-12).

Over the past three years, the mayor and council made token budget reductions. As a matter

of fact, after the mayor and council reduced the defeated school budget for 1991-92 by \$276,925, the school board accrued a surplus of \$392,000 (June 30, 1992). The overcrowding in some classes is not caused by budget defeats but by the failure of the school board and the superintendent to prioritize the ample funds available to them. To get a sense of that failure, it is important to look at some of the board's priorities over the past few years:

- From 1988-1990 the board diverted \$300,000 from the current expense budget for capital expenditures related to the board office enlargement, restoration and beautification. There is no "overcrowding" of the eight people who work in this building.

- 1990-91 — Superintendent Piegari redlined the textbook account in order to create a new sports program.

- 1990-91 — The board awarded the teachers a three-year sweetheart contract granting a 25.5 percent increase. Half of the 112 teachers receive salaries between \$60,690 and \$68,700.

- 1990-91 — The Director of Special Services was awarded a \$12,000 (20 percent) increase. Her 1992-93 salary, benefits and perks total \$92,700.

- 1991-92 — The board reinstated a \$30,000 sports program after the budget was defeated by Waldwick's voters and reduced by the mayor and council.

- 1991-92 — \$50,000 more was spent than was budgeted for the administration account.

- 1991-92 — \$119,000 less was spent than was budgeted for the instruction account.

- 1992-93 — The board employs a teacher to coach students in various "contests" three days per week at a salary of \$43,030 and created the new (\$27,400) position of "Coordinator of Testing and Program Evaluation" two days per week — grand total, \$70,510.

- 1992-93 — The salary for the superintendent, including benefits and perks, reached \$117,000.

- 1992-93 — The business administrator's salary reached \$100,100 for base pay and benefits. His exact perks are still not available to the public.

The school board is currently negotiating the new teachers' contract and developing the 1993-94 budget. It must begin to prioritize its spending and act in the best interest of all of

Waldwick's citizens — children, parents, taxpayers — and to accept the responsibility for the consequences of its actions instead of blaming its failure on the voters.

Waldwick 'crisis'

The Jan. 6 Record article,

"Parents challenge Waldwick Board on over-crowding," claimed that the fact that six of the high school's many classes contained 30 students was a direct result of the defeat of the last three Waldwick school budgets. The anecdotal evidence of the supposed crisis was the complaint by a parent that her two children were "learning absolutely nothing," and that the "teachers have no time for them." However, her children's personal problems would more likely be affected by the curriculum and the teacher's competence than by the size of their class. The over-crowding in some classes is not caused by budget defeats, but by the failure of the school board and the superintendent to prioritize the funds available to them.

After the 1990-91 school budget of \$11,500,000 was defeated, the mayor and council reduced the total by \$174,895 in areas that did not have a negative impact on education. The school board subsequently awarded the teachers a 25.5 percent increase over the next three years and provided the director of special services a grandiose \$12,000 pay raise in 90-91 (20 percent increase). If the teachers and administrators had been held to an increase comparable to those being granted in private industry, funds would have been available to decrease class sizes.

After the 1991-92 school budget

reinstate a \$30,000 sports program that they had previously eliminated; to grant the building and clerical employees a generous 8.9 percent increase for each of the next two years, and to spend \$50,000 more than was budgeted for the administration account. They did some "belt-tightening," however. They spent \$119,478 less than was appropriated for the instruction account. (How's that for prioritizing?). Despite the \$276,925 reduction, the school board accrued a surplus of \$392,000 — \$121,500 of which was already spent as of December, 1992.

The parent who claimed that her children were "learning absolutely nothing" is misdirecting her anger. The budget defeats did not mandate enlarged class sizes, nor does a small class size guarantee results. Success depends upon a sound curriculum and a competent instructor. Half of the 112 teachers employed in the Waldwick school district receive

salaries between \$60,690 and \$68,700, exclusive of fully-paid health benefits. Parents have a right to hold teachers accountable. The board is currently negotiating the new teacher's contract and developing

the 1993-93 budget. They must begin to prioritize their spending and act in the interest of all Waldwick's citizens — children, parents, and taxpayers — by demanding fiscal integrity and academic accountability, and by accepting the responsibility for the consequences of their actions instead of blaming their failure on prior budget defeats.

me. Ironically, Ken Gardner's letter in the Jan. 27 issue provided an excellent jumping off point for my observation.

He asks that the Waldwick educational system maximize his children's ability, prepare them to compete for the college of their choice and cope with the technology and global economics of tomorrow's work world.

I'd like for him to add another expectation of the system — to help our children become well-rounded, open minded citizens of an America and world that looks and acts a lot different from what we experience every day in the largely homogenous environs of Bergen County. There's a really broad and rich cultural world out there, but little of it is invited into

Waldwick's schools, nor do the schools venture out, except to environments similar to their own.

When children are never really taught to admire and respect the contributions of people who look different from themselves, they go about their lives as if those people don't matter or even exist. The his-

tory, experiences and contributions of African-Americans, for example, are of little or no consequence to most of Waldwick's children. Our children have no appreciation of the massive influence Blacks have had on American culture over the past 400 years — or the catalytic role they've played in America's political and judicial history. Their history of America is a segregated history, in which the role nonwhites have played is seldom integrated into the big picture. Instead, this information often receives separate but unequal attention from our educators.

Perhaps out of a misguided effort to "protect" our children, there is only a token effort to bring the outside world into the Waldwick classroom. Many teachers approach Black history almost as optional information. They assign Black history lessons as extra credit projects. When a student's knowledge of Black history is tested, it's in the form of minor quizzes, barely graded. Lessons are taught almost apologetically. I recall the history teacher

who, while explaining his course to parents, hastily noted that the two chapters on Africa and South America would be gone over quickly. Why upset the parents, he seemed to be saying, by giving them the impression that too much precious class time would be spent on these remote and relatively insignificant subjects?

Such lackluster approaches signal to the student that non-European based history is nothing to be overly concerned about.

Well, we'll see how concerned everyone becomes 10 or 15 years from now, when these same "protected" children will have to report to African-American or Asian-American or Hispanic-American bosses someday, or work with nonwhite clients or constituents, or find themselves clumsily maneuvering in an environment in which their ig-

Children learn segregated history of our country

To the editor:

While the squabble among concerned taxpayers, parents and the Waldwick BOE is an interesting one to me, I wish to focus on another aspect of Waldwick (actually, Bergen County) education that bothers

Boro may lease grinder

Harrington Park expresses interest, co-owner Ho-Ho-Kus must approve

WALDWICK—Harrington Park is interested in Waldwick's tub grinder. Two weeks ago they contacted Waldwick officials and asked if they could rent the machine. The Waldwick Borough Council likes the idea and now it remains for Ho-Ho-Kus, half-owner of the tub grinder, to give its approval.

A tub grinder is a device that mulches leaves, small pieces of wood and grass clippings. Due to the high cost of the machine Waldwick and Ho-Ho-Kus decided to share ownership. A new tub grinder runs close to \$100,000.

Gary Kratz, borough administrator, has been speaking with Harrington Park about the rental. He said, "Whenever we supply the equipment, we also supply the operator. I would

recommend a cost of \$400 per day, plus the cost of the operator."

The initial \$400 would be split by Waldwick and Ho-Ho-Kus, while the operator costs would go to Waldwick.

The only major concern the council had was possible damage to the machine. They agreed not to hold Harrington Park liable for normal wear and tear. However, Harrington Park would have to reimburse Waldwick if damage resulted from the presence of foreign objects that might be in-

troduced into the machine.

Waldwick may also let other towns dump leaves at its compost site on Wyckoff Avenue. At present Allendale and Midland Park have contacted Waldwick about dumping.

Kratz sees this as a great way for Waldwick to make money. "You have a chance to make a profit down there," he said.

James Gibson, council member, is concerned about the volume of leaves coming into the site. "We don't want a lot of leaves coming in on Friday," he

A breakthrough for PCT football

Instead of playing some of the smaller schools in the Bergen-Passaic Scholastic League, the Passaic Tech football team will take on such big schools as Hoboken and Snyder in the fall. It's a dream come true for PCT coach John Iurato.

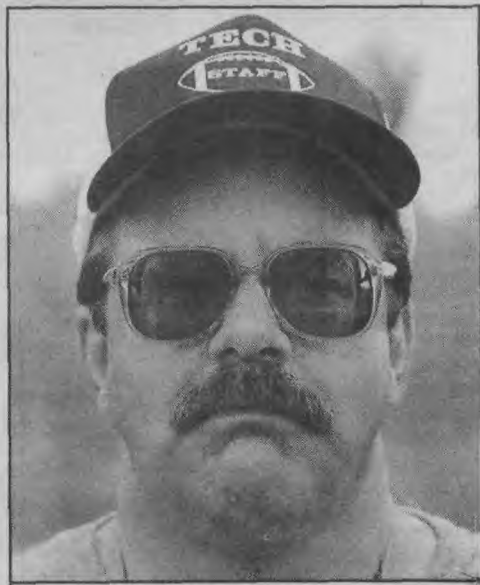
"Teams from the other division [Carpenter] told us, more or less, that they didn't want to play us," Iurato said after the executive committee of the B-PSL notified his school of the waiver. "We asked several years ago, and the league let us play one outside game. We played Jamesburg [Correctional], but first they were reclassified from Group 4 to Group 1 and then to Group 2. It was a mess."

Only games within the division count in the B-PSL standings, so the decision has no bearing on determining a champion in the King Division, in which PCT competes.

Over the years, Tech has virtually had to go unbeaten to qualify for the State playoffs due to the power-point system. A victory over a smaller school yields a minimum number of points.

"We get ripped in the paper for beating a [small] team by too many points," Iurato says. "But to this day, I don't think we tried to run it up against Garfield. It might be better for our kids to lose to competitive teams, and we might be able to qualify for the States if we play big schools."

Iurato wishes the decision had come earlier. "I would have liked to have had it last year [the fall of '92] with the type of team we had. We might have ended up in the State tournament even though we lost coming out of the box [opening day to Lodi]. We might have had 60-something points instead of 50 points. Union Hill just finished ahead of Passaic for the

fourth spot [in Group 4, Section 1] with 61 or 63 points."

Tech again opens with Lodi next season, followed by the Hoboken game. The Snyder game is in early November.

"We really don't get any respect, like Rodney Dangerfield," Iurato says. "When we were 1-8, 2-7, and 3-6, people said we stunk. Now when we're winning, we're too big."

Waldwick coach Terry Byrne favored the decision from two perspectives. "At least if they lose one game, they won't be disqualified like in other years," Byrne said of PCT. "We used to handle them, but since our numbers have dropped, it's been a mismatch physically. Tech could line up with some good Group 4 schools. If they can be occupied while we rebuild, it's all right by me."

Nicolas Palma, ^{2/14/93} pioneering physician

GLEN ROCK — Dr. Nicholas Palma, 90, formerly of Glen Rock, died Feb. 6 at Point Pleasant Hospital.

He had been a resident of Glen Rock for 21 years until he moved to Brick Township, and then Howell Township.

Dr. Palma was a member of the medical staff of Paterson General Hospital and president of the General Hospital Board before he retired in 1971 after 42 years of service to the hospital.

Born in Paterson, Dr. Palma graduated from the local high school in 1920. Following his pre-medical course at Bucknell University, he received his medical degree from Temple University Medical School in 1928.

He served his internship at Paterson General Hospital from 1928-1929, and was appointed to the department of anesthesia in 1936. In 1943, he was appointed director of the department.

Dr. Palma served as a commander in the Medical Corps, United States Naval Reserve, where he participated in the occupation of Guam, the invasion of Okinawa, and the occupation of China.

Upon his discharge, he was appointed attending anesthesiologist to the department of anesthesiology at Paterson General Hospital in 1947, and was elected president of the medical board of Paterson General Hospital in

1954.

At the hospital, he was instrumental in promoting inhalation therapy.

Dr. Palma was a founder and charter member of the New Jersey Society of Anesthesiologists in 1948.

In 1951, he became a delegate to the American Society of Anesthesiologists and served the ASA as director from 1959-1970.

He served on several national committees in his field, and in 1966, organized the Middle Atlantic States Caucus group as the NJ Component Society representative. He also edited the Society's newsletter.

He was a diplomate of the American Board of Anesthesiology and a fellow of the American College of Anesthesiology.

He was a member of the Ridgewood Country Club, Ivanhoe Lodge F & AM and The Salaam Temple.

He is survived by his daughter, Barbara Cox, Waldwick; three grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren. His wife, Violet Strouse Palma, died in 1981.

Services were held Feb. 10 at the Cedar Lawn Cemetery Chapel, Paterson.

Sewage treatment plant expansion nixed

Waldwick claims it may be unnecessary

WALDWICK — Arguing that a planned \$12.7 million expansion of a regional sewage treatment plant may be unnecessary and does not adequately address odor concerns, the borough is refusing to approve the project.

Since the plant is located in Waldwick, the state Department of Environmental Protection and Energy (DEPE) cannot OK the renovation, scheduled

for 1994, withough the council's endorsement. All other DEPE permits for the project have been approved.

"This project probably should not go through," Mayor Rick Vander Wende said at Tuesday's council meeting. "We certainly would not want the DEPE to approve further permits until our concerns are addressed."

The Wyckoff Avenue plant, which is operated by the North-

west Bergen County Utilities Authority, serves Waldwick, Allendale, Ho-Ho-Kus, Midland Park and Ramsey, as well as portions of Wyckoff, Mahwah, Upper Saddle River and Washington Township.

The 23-year-old facility is now operating at 88 percent of its average 9.5 million gallon per day capacity, exceeding the DEPE's 80 percent limit, said Emil Porfido, the authority's executive director. The expansion to a capacity of 11.5 million gallons per day is needed to meet DEPE regulations and to accommodate future growth, including the planned additions of Saddle River and Franklin Lakes to the sewerage system, Porfido said.

Studies show that the plant's high daily flow can be partly attributed to excessive amounts of ground water and rain water seeping into sewer pipes. Waldwick officials say action should be taken to reduce those intrusions before considering an expansion.

"Correcting inflow (rain water) and infiltration (ground water) problems could result in the same ends at a much lesser cost to all," Vander Wende said in a Feb. 10 letter to Matthew Farr, the DEPE's supervising environmental engineer.

Indeed, Farr said in a telephone interview that the DEPE plans to explore ways to reduce the inflow and infiltration as a possible alternative to expansion.

But Porfido contended that sealing pipes to keep out ground water "is very expensive" and doesn't work. "When you fix one crack in a pipe, you get another," he said.

"So that means you shouldn't fix the first crack?" responded Waldwick Administrator Gary Kratz.

Waldwick officials have a compelling reason to hold down the plant's costs. Based on its sewage flow, Waldwick funds 18 percent of the facility's capital and operating costs, the largest contribution among the communities in the system.

The odor problem is not persistent. Still, studies and area residents point to occasional offensive smells emanating from the sprawling plant, which also borders Ridgewood and Ho-Ho-Kus.

The authority has proposed installing a spray system to mitigate the odor, but the DEPE has said such a system is inadequate. The DEPE and Waldwick officials are instead recommending a scrubbing system that chemically treats the noxious smells.

But Porfido said that scrubbing materials can cost as much as \$500,000, compared to \$50,000 for spraying devices, and that they are not warranted since the odors are intermittent and not severe.

Yet the authority was recently fined \$4,000 by the DEPE for violating state air pollution standards resulting from investigations on Aug. 23 and Oct. 11. Porfido said the authority is appealing the fine.

'Waldwick' interpreted as 'The light in the forest'

Waldwick was chosen early in our country's history as a fine place to live. Easy access was the key to its growth. It was the Saddle River and the Ho-Ho-Kus Brook which provided both access to its fertile land and sustenance for the area's first recorded residents - the Lenni-Lanpe Indians. Much later it was the highway and railroad that spurred Waldwick's growth. Today, Waldwick is characterized as predominantly a single-family, commuting town.

The railroad has probably had the most important influence upon Waldwick's development. Some suggest that it was the early locomotive that gave birth to the name Waldwick, meaning "light in the forest." In the early 1900s,

Waldwick was a bustling freight yard. Most of its residents were employed by the Erie. Today it is the railroad that divides the borough almost equally in half and controls east-west access to the town's central business area.

The long and varied historical development of Waldwick is illustrated by many changes in the area near the intersection of Franklin Turnpike and Prospect Street. First, as the site of an Indian camp, the center of Waldwick was the hub of activity for members of the Lenni-Lenape Indian tribe. Next as part of New Barbados Township, which was formed in 1709, it was farmland for the Dutch and English farmers who first settled in his area. When

Gen. George Washington's troops passed through New Jersey during the Revolutionary War, it was part of Franklin Township (incorporated 1772) and provided a campground for his weary soldiers. Later it was the site of the first schoolhouse and now it is part of the central business district.

Numerous name changes for the area now known as the Borough of Waldwick resulted from the rapid growth of this area. It formerly was part of Ho-Ho-Kus Township, Orvil Township, and the Borough of Orvil. When the Erie Railroad established its depot and freight yards there, the Township Committee changed its name to the Borough of Waldwick.

Correct plant odors first

Officials want to rectify air quality problems before initiating Phase II sewer expansion plan

WALDWICK — Concerns over odor emanating from the sewage treatment plant on Wyckoff Avenue and the planned Phase II expansion of the plant have dominated Waldwick in the past few weeks. Waldwick Borough Council wants something done about the odor before the expansion begins.

Over the past several years, a number of residents from Waldwick, Ho-Ho-Kus and Ridgewood have complained about the odor. This ongoing problem, that dates back to the 1970's, has intensified in recent years. As the population has increased, a larger amount of sewage has been processed in the plant. And, as more houses were built near the plant, more residents have been affected by the odor.

The Northwest Bergen County Utilities Authority (NBCUA) have submitted permits to the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and Energy (NJDEPE) for anti-pollution devices designed to rectify the odor problem. To date these permit requests have been found unsatisfactory by the NJDEPE.

On Dec. 15, 1992, the NJDEPE found the NBCUA in violation of the Air Pollution

Control Act as a direct result of citizens complaints.

Ken Gardner, member of Waldwick Coalition For Clean Air, feels that the Phase II expansion should not commence until the present odor problem has been corrected. "As a minimum request Phase II should include state-of-the-art anti-pollution devices."

The council is also concerned that the inflow and infiltration of excess water into the plant has increased sewage treatment costs. Broken pipes and leaks in the system have allow-

ed inflow (rain water) and infiltration (ground water) to combine with the sewage. So residents end up paying in part for the treatment of ground and rain water.

Councilman James Gibson feels that the \$9 million budgeted for Phase II could be better spent reducing the excess water and controlling odor. "It doesn't take a rocket scientist to see that if you correct the 'I and I' (inflow and infiltration), you don't need to spend all that money." He said that \$4 million would probably solve the excess water problem.

The Mayor and Council are sending a letter to the NJDEPE to address these problems. They feel that the NBCUA is

attempting to push through Phase II expansion without any consideration for air quality or excess water.

Mayor Rick VanderWende has planned to meet with the mayors of Ho-Ho-Kus and Ridgewood to address Phase II and the odor problem. "The DEPE should not approve any further permits until such time as Waldwick is satisfied," he said.

If the NBCUA is still not willing to compromise with Waldwick, the council could refuse to sign the C-P-1 Permit authorizing Phase II expansion work. The council hopes an agreement can be reached with the authority. "You want people to work this through," Gibson said. Gibson indicated that a stalemate on this issue would not help anyone.

Train hits car in Waldwick; cop is injured

He parked too close to tracks

JERSEY CITY—A Waldwick resident and Jersey City police officer was injured Thursday morning when his car was struck by a commuter train on the Boonton line.

Edward Shinnick, 35, of Waldwick, was listed in stable condition at University Hospital.

New Jersey Transit spokeswoman Linda Maurice said Shinnick was stopped at the crossing but was parked too close to the tracks. "Transit police said the train struck his left front side," she said, adding Shinnick's car was spun around by the impact. Jersey City police said Shinnick was in his own car on the way to a pistol firing range.

Maurice also said Shinnick

suffered a broken elbow and developed a blood clot from the incident. She said there are no lights or gates at the crossing, but was not sure if there was a warning sign. It is a private grade crossing owned by the Public Service Electric and Gas Co., which has an electricity substation nearby. The utility would be responsible for erecting any warning devices at the crossing, she said. PSE&G could not be reached for comment.

The accident occurred at 7:43 a.m. in Jersey City and trains were delayed about 20 minutes. The train was on its way to Hoboken. No passengers were injured, Maurice said. They were bused to another train line.

No damage estimate was available for the train. Maurice said the engineer sounded his horn and applied the brakes but could not stop the train in time.

The Waldwick Board of Education has decided to reverse the ill-advised decision by the Citizen Budget Committee to close their meetings to the public. The taxpayers will now be allowed to witness the deliberations that had, for the first time in nine years, been cloaked in secrecy by the co-chairman (at the suggestion of

the school superintendent). The board's decision is to be commended.

Co-chairman Gardner's letter to this newspaper (Jan. 27) in defense of secret sessions was unconvincing. Waldwick's citizens have a right to observe

every aspect of the procedure that determines how 68 percent of their exorbitant property taxes will be spent. Even the committee's "non-binding" recommendations can end up increasing the tax burden. The

people who will pay the bill should not be excluded from the process.

Mr. Gardner's elitist contention that "if you are not part of the answer, you are part of the problem" is reflected in the ongoing attempt by the superintendent and the board to blame their problems on the taxpayers' rejection of the last three successive school budgets. The school board and its allied organizations are deceptively trying to create the impression that the token cuts

made by the mayor and council are responsible for seven increased class sizes and curtailed curriculum choice, diverting attention from the fact that the superintendent and the board have constantly mismanaged and mis-prioritized the multi-millions of dollars made available to them every year (\$14,000,000 in 1992-93 for 1,350 students). If \$10,000 per student is not enough, how much is? During the past three years the total

amount of the school budget was \$39,489,944; total reduction made by the mayor and council \$547,940.

Allowing the public to continue to observe the deliberations of the CBC is a good first step. Now let us hope that the board will continue to act in the public interest by providing the community with a budget that it can afford.

Mr. Smith alleges that from 1988-89, \$300,000 was diverted from the budget for the board office expansion. According to the New Jersey State Full Compliance Audit of 1992, page 9, "...the cost of the board office addition, including all audit adjustments totalled \$68,276.54." This document is available for public review.

Mr. Smith alleges in the 1991-92 school year \$119,000 less was spent than budgeted in the instructional account. According to our audit, the actual number was \$79,947. Expenses were less here because of a staff retirement and the replacement person who was hired at a lower salary. We also had a significant decrease in substitute salaries. These decreases in expenses did not diminish the quality of our educational programs.

Mr. Smith alleges \$70,510 was spent on a teacher who coaches students in "contests." FACT: A Gifted and Talented program is required by law in every New Jersey High School. Our teacher who is responsible

for our G&T/Enrichment programs which serves over 150 students in seven different programs and activities, also is the district-wide Coordinator of Testing and Program Evaluation. It is misleading to suggest that this individual who is a full-time employee with a very complex and demanding schedule, "...only coaches contests."

These are only some of Mr.

Smith's allegations of which all are either fiction or grossly inaccurate. What Mr. Smith does not report is the progress the current Waldwick Board of Education is making.

1992-93 contract settlements are between 3 and 4.9 percent, among the county's lowest. These are inclusive of all incremental cost. Our employees have negotiated in good faith.

Aggressive physical plant improvement at all school facilities, including reroofing, painting, lighting, and flooring.

Financial stability - the board has responsibility structured the role of reinvestment and necessary surplus to meet future or emergency needs.

I ask the citizens of Waldwick to come in and review my statements. I am outraged that Mr. Smith's group holds such contempt for the residents of Waldwick. Does this group believe that all are mindless? Their methods of polarization and division continue, but its acceptance must not.

Is statute in compliance?

Council to determine if grease interceptor ordinance is in violation of state code

WALDWICK — Does Waldwick's grease interceptor ordinance comply with New Jersey's Uniform Construction Code? Waldwick Borough Council mulls this question as it decides who will have to purchase the grease interceptors and when they must be installed.

To date, all food establish-

ments, laundries and dry-cleaners are required to have grease interceptors. This resolution was necessary because of a sewer blockage problem at a Franklin Turnpike shopping mall in late October.

This blockage was apparently caused by a build-up of grease in the sewer line. The council felt that this build-up was the result of several commercial establishments dumping their

sewage into one line. To remedy the problem, the council passed a resolution mandating grease interceptors which are designed to remove grease from sewer lines.

Since passage of the resolution several business owners have complained to the council about having to pay \$3,000 each to install interceptors. These proprietors claimed that their establishments were not the

cause of the back-up.

The Uniform Construction Code sets standards for construction in the state. Municipalities are not supposed to introduce ordinances that are more restrictive than this code. The council is concerned that their ordinance may be more restrictive.

Melanos Toskos, borough attorney, said that in some cases municipalities are enforcing more restrictive ordinances. He pointed to Cliffside Park, where the borough was able to enforce a zoning code that was more restrictive than the Uniform Construction Code.

Toskos said that it seems that Waldwick is in compliance with the code. But if it is not it shouldn't matter because the code is largely concerned with the construction of buildings. "We're not really adopting a building ordinance," he said.

Some businesses may not have to purchase the interceptors. Waldwick is probably going to let dry-cleaners off the hook because they use biodegradable soap. This soap does not contribute to grease build-up.

Businesses that prepare food for carry-out service only may not have to install the units. Gary Kratz, borough administrator said, "Originally we were going to require restaurants that prepared hot food (to install interceptors). To restrict it to just hot food is not in our best interests." He indicated that only food establishments that prepare food for on-site consumption should be required to install interceptors.

To manage these problems the council plans to amend the ordinance. Also, businesses will not have to comply with the ordinance until some time in March.

Mucho macho

Dear editor,

Outrage over Ramapo College's decision to drop its football program isn't surprising, given America's love affair with competitive (kick their butts!) sports.

Why pick on football? Ask your football player-son — or someone else's son — how many hours he spends on football. This premier macho sport is most costly (more than all other sports combined!), most dangerous, most gender-exclusive.

What about football scholarships? Spend football money on academic scholarships.

Doesn't football make money? Its costs can be hidden in other budget items; "cooked" books feed the egos of administrators, coaches and alumni lusting for football "power."

Isn't football's physical education important? Whole-body conditioning — not over-emphasis on specialized, exterior muscles and beef layered on adolescent frames — is important to everyone. Good-old "gym" doesn't teach whole-body conditioning any better than it did 50 years ago. Fortunately, there's a new breed of phys ed students coming out of college — practitioners of movement science — who understand exercise physiology.

What will ex-football players do with their spare time? Why not more (horrors!) homework; community service; academic

courses outside the school day (financed by football-freed money); sophisticated exercise equipment supervised by movement-science instructors paid the same way. With money saved overall.

Ramapo's move sends a message to our high schools, where boards of education and administrators sever teachers, drop courses, defer textbook buys and jam 30 plus students into classrooms rather than touch football, that most sacred bovine. These educators know that only the same half-dozen citizens will show up at meetings to note (wistfully) deprived academic programs. They also know that a hint of fewer freshman football games brings 50 angry parents to their gates. And so, with little fear, educators shortchange academic and roof repair.

Are these the priorities for a fiercely competitive global economy? No way! For educators, and other citizens, the choice is clear: smarter students or better football players. We can't have both. Ramapo College made the right choice.

Injury-ridden Waldwick still makes state tourney

They could easily be called the team that couldn't shoot straight, but it is much fairer to call the Waldwick High boys basketball team a group of overachievers who have made the most of what they have despite injuries and inexperience.

The Warriors are 8-10 heading into the final game of the regular season, but they will have at least a first-round game in the state tournament, having qualified with a 7-6 record before falling on hard times the past three weeks.

Head coach Paul Puglise says, "It is a testament to the desire and dedication of these boys that they are in the tournament, and that they also achieved a home game (against Secaucus on Monday).

"With only one player back with any varsity experience, we expected to have a rough go of it, but one of our goals was to make the states, and another to win 12 games."

The former was met, and the latter may have been a reasonable goal if injury had not swept away Ben Boufford and Kevin Neretich, a pair of seniors. A knee injury wiped

out the second half of Neretich's season, while Boufford never fully recovered from a broken hand sustained in football season and played only five early games.

"Ben was our starting point guard and our best shooter," Puglise explained, "and losing him was a tough blow. I feel for him, because he was the fourth brother to play for me and was the team captain, like all of his brothers before him. He even was willing to play with the injury to try to get us into the states. But the doctors thought better of the idea, and he is in a cast now."

His loss is only part of the shooting woes of the Warriors, who are making only 35 percent of their field goals and 58 percent of their free throws this year.

"It is really amazing that we have done as well as we have, considering the inability to score we have," Puglise said. "We average about 44 points a game, and in my 17 years I don't think I have had a team average less than 50 a game."

"I tell the team that it is very difficult to win games scoring 44 points a game, but we have been in a season-long shooting slump. The shots are

good shots, coming off of the offense as set up, but they just don't fall."

Waldwick has scored over 50 points only three times all year, and no one averages in double figures. Senior Doug Finale is closest at 9.2, while senior Danny White averages 7.7. Seniors Ike Odofile, Brian Bavaro, Michael Wynn and Brian Jackson also see a lot of action.

Junior Jason Bain, at 6-foot-4 the tallest player on the team, and sophomore Mike Branagh both average around seven points a game, and the two represent the top underclassmen on the squad.

The junior varsity and freshman programs are both over .500, and each went to the quarterfinals in their respective county tournaments, so there is a positive feeling for the future.

Sophs Rich Parks and Mike Fox are also getting varsity minutes that will come in handy down the road.

"We are looking to keep things positive at this time," Puglise said. "These seniors really worked hard and wanted to put together a winning season, but it wasn't there for them."

Significant Spending Cuts Again Impact Students

Once again the state-imposed spending cap and the \$96,000 budget reduction made by the borough Council after last year's third consecutive school budget defeat are affecting the educational programs in the district. The most severe consequences are being felt at the Junior/Senior School where the following staff positions and programs were cut or reduced for the 1992-93 school year.

STAFF CUTS

- The position of Director of Guidance was eliminated.
- Five teaching positions were eliminated, including a full time math teacher and part time foreign language, home economics, instrumental music, and art teachers.
- A full time custodian and a half-time secretary were eliminated.

PROGRAM CUTS

- Italian I was eliminated as the first step in a phase-out of the entire Italian language program.
- Half the courses in the Junior School Cycles Program were eliminated and the program was restructured to increase class sizes.
- There are now seven academic classes in the Junior/Senior School with 30 or more students.
- Certain advanced courses can now be offered only on alternate years.
- A total of \$10,000 for uniforms and supplies was reduced from extracurricular activity accounts.
- The Kids, Kids, Kids child development course, during which high school students organize activities for Waldwick preschool children, was cut back to eliminate participation by three-year olds.

1992-93 District Educational Objectives

Calculators are being used more often in grades 2-4 to fulfill the district's educational objective that seventy-five percent of the students in these grades improve their accuracy on calculators by 20%. checkers, and chess. Sports activities are supervised by high school gym teacher Marsha Blum who donates her time.

The impetus for this project came from Waldwick parent Margaret Lambrinides who was impressed with a similar program in Ramsey. In May 1991, she and Margaret McGuire, both of whom had sixth grade children about to enter the Junior School, organized the first Canteen for sixth, seventh, and eighth graders.

School administrators, especially Junior School principal John Surak, encouraged the women to continue the program during the 1991-92 school year when it was offered to all Junior School seventh and eighth graders. Gradually attendance increased, especially among eighth graders, with an average of 110 students at each Canteen in 1991-92 and 156 this year. For a change of pace, several Canteens have been held at Classic Athletic Club in Mahwah.

Support for the program comes from the sale of annual passes to the students as well as from grants from community groups, including the Waldwick Municipal Alliance, the Democratic Club of Waldwick, the Tamaron Association, the Waldwick Gun Club, the Waldwick Junior School PSO, the Waldwick High School Booster Club, and the Women's Club of Waldwick.

The Canteens are coordinated by a committee of five parents: Margaret Lambrinides, Patrick and Margaret McGuire, Jan Sanford, and Chris McGee.

"We attribute our success to the numerous parent volunteers and to the enthusiasm of the students," said Margaret McGuire, adding that there are currently 78 volunteers, 28 more than last year. Each Canteen requires 20 chaperones plus two parents in charge of refreshments.

It's not just the students who like the Canteens. Parents are also delighted with the program. "The Canteens give our children a safe, supervised place to socialize and give the many volunteers an opportunity to network," said Mrs. McGuire.

The board has suffered budget defeats the last three years that resulted in the Waldwick Borough Council reducing the school budget by a total of \$547,940.

The board has been forced to cut teachers and the number of course offerings. Classes that were offered every year are now offered every other year. The budget reductions have im-

pacted the number of times a course can be offered a day; classes that were offered three times a day are now offered only once. And German and Italian

students are being deprived. "As a policy matter, I would not like to see the course not given," she said.

John Carr, board member, is more optimistic about the budget passing this year. "Our initial approach to the budget was very conservative," he said. "That eliminates a lot of reducing."

The board will hold a public hearing on the budget on March 29. The public will vote on the budget on April 20.

NBCUA wants pilot test

Wants anti-pollution system demonstrated in effort to reduce odor at sewer plant

WALDWICK — Odors emanating from the sewer plant on Wyckoff Avenue continue to plague Waldwick and its neighboring communities. And tensions with the Northwest Bergen County Utilities Authority (NBCUA) have increased as Waldwick's most recent request to the Department of Environmental Protection

and Energy (DEPE) for anti-pollution devices was rejected on Feb. 8.

The NBCUA has now demanded that the DEPE either allow a pilot test of the anti-pollution spray system device or that they (DEPE) have an administrative hearing on the matter.

This odor problem, dating back to the 1970's, has intensified in recent years. As the population has increased, a

larger amount of sewage has been processed in the plant. And, as more houses were built near the plant, more residents have been affected by the odor.

Ken Gardner, a member of Waldwick Coalition For Clean Air, asked that the Waldwick Borough Council take an active role in the pilot test if it is approved by the DEPE. He requested that a "third party" engineering firm observe the testing procedures; that the

governments of Ho-Ho-Kus, Ridgewood and Waldwick participate in the selection process for the third party; and that the NBCUA hold a public meeting to explain the testing process and what the procedure will be if the test is a success or a failure. "Since we are directly affected we should be more involved," Gardner said. "What I would like to request to the council is that you either support all of these points or some of them," he noted.

The NBCUA wants the DEPE to approve the spray

system because it is less expensive and is easier to install than the scrubber system. The authority also claims that the scrubbers would be noisy and hard to maintain.

Gardner disagrees with the NBCUA. He feels that a scrubber system would control odor more effectively. But, if the authority goes with the spray system, he wants to make sure it will function effectively.

Shirley Feldman, a Concerned Taxpayers of Waldwick member, thinks it would be a good idea to have a council

member at the NBCUA's meetings. Mayor VanderWende admitted that no one from the council attended most of the meetings, but added, "We do follow the minutes. If it looks like something important like expansion, we do go."

The council still holds the position that the odor problem must be corrected before beginning the planned Phase II Expansion of the plant. On several occasions, Councilman James Gibson has questioned the expansion plan expenditures. He thinks that the money could be better spent correcting odor problems.

Free pre-school vision testing scheduled

WALDWICK — The Waldwick Board of Health is offering a free pre-school vision acuity screening for all Waldwick preschoolers, ages 3½ to five years old. The testing will be done at the Waldwick Health Center, 22 Whites Lane on Tuesday, May 18. Appointments should be made by calling the health department, 445-7217. Children will be scheduled from 9:30-11:30 a.m. and from 1-3 p.m.

The screening will detect many vision defects, including amblyopia which is commonly known as "lazy eye," and is one of the leading causes of partial blindness in children. If this condition is not discovered before the age of six, it may lead to a permanent weak eye.

This screening will be done in conjunction with the Child Health Program and will be conducted by Waldwick Public Health Nurse Carol Shepard,

R.N.C., assisted by volunteers. Necessary referrals will be made.

The board of health also offers free monthly physicals, re-

quired immunizations, TB testing, urinalysis, blood lead screening, hematocrit and hemoglobin, hearing and vision screenings, counseling and re-

ferred for pre-school well children. The aim of this program is to help families experiencing financial difficulty. Appointments are necessary. Call 445-7217.

Waldwick's calculated math program helps students learn

WALDWICK — As part of a new math program which focuses on problem-solving and hands-on activities, students in Waldwick Elementary schools are spending more time using calculators.

"Calculators, like computers, are tools to simplify work. The children still learn to do basic arithmetic, but they must also learn how calculators can help them solve more complex, multi-step problems," said Traphagen School Principal Peter Muir who chaired the faculty committee which recommended the district's new math curriculum.

This year Waldwick replaced its math textbooks with a new series emphasizing the latest standards established by the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics. The district also purchased 30 calculators for each grade level.

One of the district's 1992-93

educational objectives is to increase student use of calculators and to improve by 20 percent the accuracy of 75 percent of the students in grades two, three, and four.

At the beginning of this school year, students were tested on calculator use. They will be retested in May following a year of using the new program. Although calculators were used previously in math classes, there was no formal program to teach specific calculator skills to all students.

This new curriculum includes specific exercises for each grade level. For example, third graders may be asked to work in pairs to write addition problems using two and three digit numbers. One student would then estimate the sum mentally while the other uses the calculator to find the exact answer.

Waldwick comes up big with game on the line

PARAMUS — Waldwick's 1991-92 girls basketball season ended in the State playoffs on a couple of missed free throws. What a difference a year makes. Tuesday night the Warriors made 25 of 30 foul shots, including 13 of 16 in the fourth quarter to capture the Group 1 sectional crown with a 49-41 win over North Arlington.

"I think the biggest part of foul shooting is in your head," said Kim Kehrberger, Waldwick's senior forward, who was 8-for-8 from the line in the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association tournament game. "It all comes down to concentration, and tonight we had it because we wanted this game so badly."

The Warriors have owned Group 1, North 1 tournament play over the last decade, having won the title six of the last nine years. Waldwick had been to the final eight straight years before being eliminated a year ago by Hawthorne in the quarterfinals.

GROUP 1 GIRLS

"Tonight's game is the one we've been pointing to all year long," said Waldwick coach Bob Klie, who must now prepare for the State semifinals Thursday at Ridgewood against North Warren. "We may not have the big player, or a deep bench, but we have a lot of heart."

Waldwick lacks a player of any legitimate size, and it was 5-foot-8 junior Chris Sherkberger who had the unenviable task of guarding North Arlington's 6-foot center Nicole Campbell.

"I've been playing against the opposing team's tallest player all year long so I'm kind of used to it," said Sherkberger, who was effective in holding Campbell to 13 points. "I just tried to be as rough and tough as I could and deny her the ball whenever possible."

Sherkberger also contributed on the offensive end, tallying 10 points including 4-of-5 from the

foul line. The Warriors also got 10 points from Megan Schultz, who made eight of 11 free throws.

"We usually shoot about 65 percent from the line, and I'm a believer that you have to hit 70-75 percent against the better teams," said Klie. "In the games we lost this year, all three times we only shot about 30 percent from the foul line."

It was the foul shooting Tuesday that allowed Waldwick to score considerably over its 38-point average. The Warriors shot 12-of-29 from the field. North Arlington was 18-of-60 from the floor and 5-for-16 from the line in its first appearance in a sectional championship.

Despite the poor shooting, the Vikings stayed close for 2½ quarters before Waldwick ran off nine points to take its biggest lead, 36-26 at the end of three periods. North Arlington climbed back to within three, 42-39 with two minutes to play, but Waldwick nailed seven of nine foul shots down the stretch to seal the win.

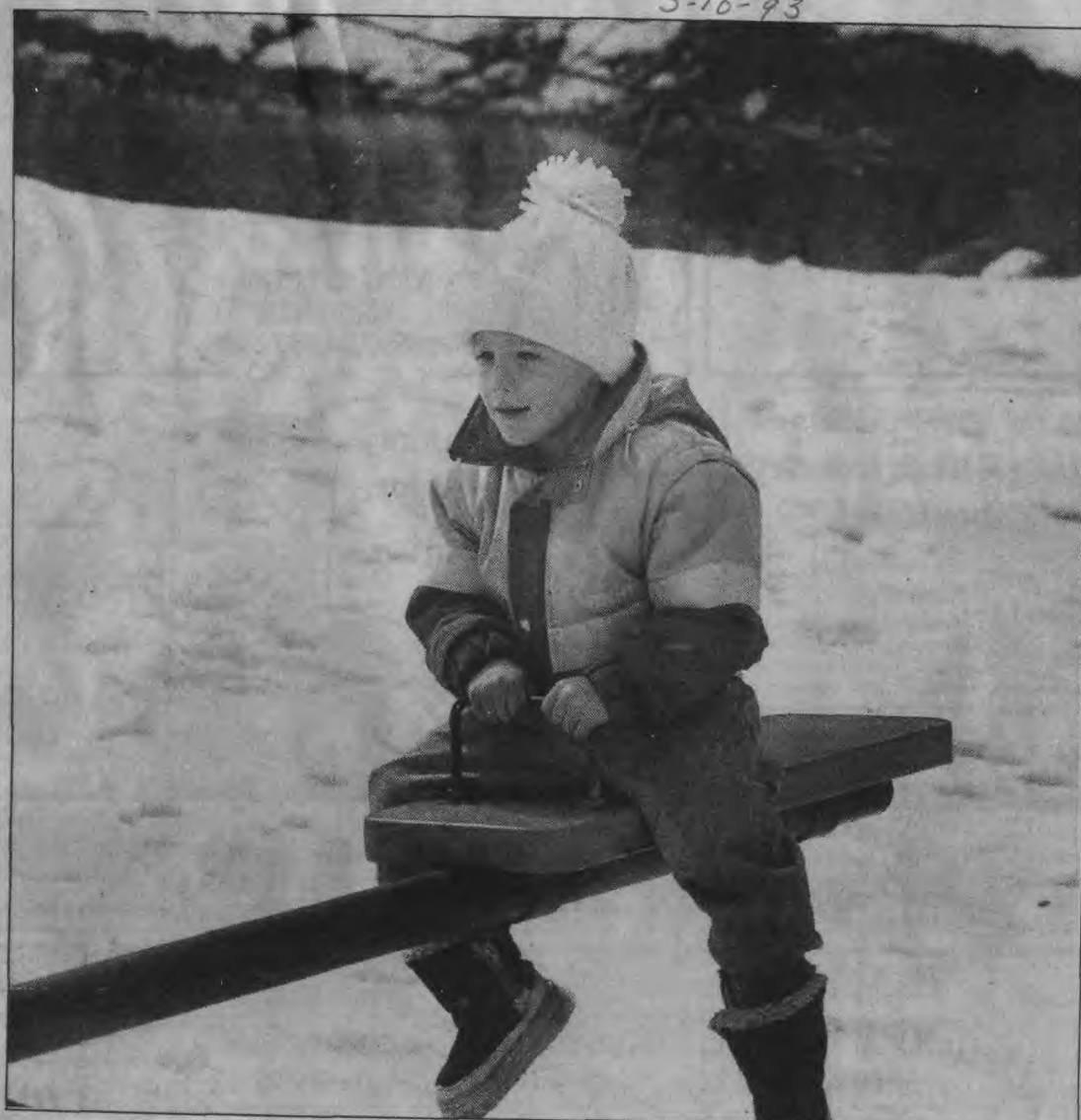

Waldwick, NBCUA confer

Boro, authority officials discuss spray vs. scrubber system to control plant odors

WALDWICK — Waldwick's problems with the Northwest Bergen County Utilities Authority (NBCUA) have not gone away. Odor emanating from the sewer plant on Wyckoff Avenue still plagues residents. But at least NBCUA and Waldwick are talking.

Recently Waldwick Borough Council sent Menelaos Toskos, borough attorney, and Gary Kratz, borough administrator, to meet with the NBCUA. They voiced their concerns about the odor problem and the planned Phase II expansion of the sewer plant.

The odor problem, that dates back the the 1970's, has in-

tensified in recent years. As the population has increased, a larger amount of sewage has been processed in the plant. And, as more houses were built near the plant, more residents have been affected by the odor.

The NBCUA asked if Waldwick would consider a new anti-pollution device. This device would spray an odor fight-

ing mist in the sewage tanks and would be helped by having a cover placed over the tanks. The cover is much like a swimming pool cover.

Waldwick is leaning towards a scrubber system, with a dome to cover the tanks. This system would cost \$500,000, as opposed to the \$150,000 misting/cover system.

Elaine Sinatra, council mem-

ber, is skeptical of the misting system. "Is it really a viable option?" she asked. "They have been so long trying to correct it (odor problem)."

Toskos and Kratz also discussed with the authority the inflow (rain water) and infiltration (ground water) in the sewage system. The council had been concerned that they were paying in part for the treatment of this excess water.

The NBCUA claimed that Waldwick's inflow and infiltration problem is not severe. The authority said that tracing this problem would not be cost effective.

Kratz and Toskos plan to meet with the Department of Environmental Protection and Energy (DEPE) and the NBCUA in Trenton, to discuss why they are not signing the C-P-1 Permit authorizing start-up of the Phase II expansion. The council maintains that until the odor problem is rectified they will not sign the permit.

Waldwick can't handle zone

RIDGEWOOD — The North Warren girls basketball team issues every opponent a test. The Patriots play a packed-in, 2-3 zone defense and challenge the opposition to beat them from the perimeter.

Waldwick couldn't meet the challenge Thursday in the New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association Group 1 State semifinals. The Warriors shot 10-for-53 from the field, including 0-for-14 in the third period in falling to North Warren, 43-26, at Ridge-wood High School.

"I can never remember being shut out for an entire quarter like that," said longtime Waldwick coach Bob Klie after his team was outscored in the third period, 13-0. "Offensively, there was just no flow, no rhythm, no chemistry."

GROUP 1 GIRLS

There were problems on the defensive end of the floor as well, as Waldwick gave up too many easy shots, especially to Jill Masker, North Warren's 5-foot junior point guard.

Masker buried her first of two three-pointers less than two minutes into the contest to give North Warren a 6-0 advantage and a lead it never relinquished. Masker hit her second trey to open the second half as the Patriots took their first double-digit lead, 25-14.

"I really love their little point guard," said Klie, referring to Masker. "She plays under control and sees the floor exceptionally well. But she's not their only fine player. They have two or three kids who can really light it up."

North Warren got 10 points from Jen Dorflinger, nine from the team's leading scorer, Jami Ochs, and six from reserve Mandy Bennett, who was a major force on the backboards as well.

"We just gave up too many easy baskets," said Liz Kehrberger, Waldwick's senior forward and team captain. "A lot of them were off of rebounds and that's not like us. We usually make the other

team work for them a lot more than we did tonight."

It was a night, for a change, where Waldwick matched up well with its opponent after facing taller opposition almost all season long.

"This was a team which on paper was well suited for us," said Klie, whose club finished at 21-4.

"But I thought we made too few passes, shot too soon, and just never forced North Warren to play that much defense."

Once Waldwick fell considerably behind, its focus turned almost exclusively to three pointers. All 12 of the Warriors' second-half points came on treys, the first by Jeanne Kehrberger to break an 11-

minute scoring drought.

NOTES — Waldwick had faced North Warren twice before in State semifinal play, winning in 1987 and losing in 1990 . . . North Warren lost to Haddonfield in its first ever State championship appearance in 1990 . . . The Group 1 State final is set for 1:30 p.m. Sunday at Monmouth College.

Gadflies Growing Older and Smarter

WHEN Gerard G. Boyle of Ridgewood gets up to speak at Council meetings, village officials shudder. A 76-year-old retired electrician, Mr. Boyle carries voluminous papers and a tape recorder, and he is not shy speaking out — at length — about everything from downtown parking problems to the salaries paid municipal officials.

Boyle is the community gadfly, a species in recent years has grown in number and influence.

Every community in the state has at least a few. Many are retired men and women, part of a growing army of older people who have the money, experience and talent to grapple with town issues. Often they graduate from being issue advocates to self-appointed community crusaders, organizing citizen groups that serve as permanent public watchdogs.

Gadflies have been helped by Sunshine Laws that have opened public records and one-time "open house sessions" of municipal agencies to public scrutiny. They have also been helped by the advent of computers and fax machines, which make it easier to get their messages out to



their supporters and to the local press.

"Gadflies are better armed now," said Dr. Michael Danielson, a professor of policy and public affairs at the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs at Princeton University. "When you combine the effect of the Sunshine Laws with the fact that we have more sophisticated citizens who have a lot of new technology to fall back on, community activists are bound to become stronger."

"Take the building of a road, for instance," Dr. Danielson said. "In the old days, engineers decided where they wanted it placed, and that's where it was built. Now, land-use laws have changed, and some residents are challenging the site and looking for different places to build it."

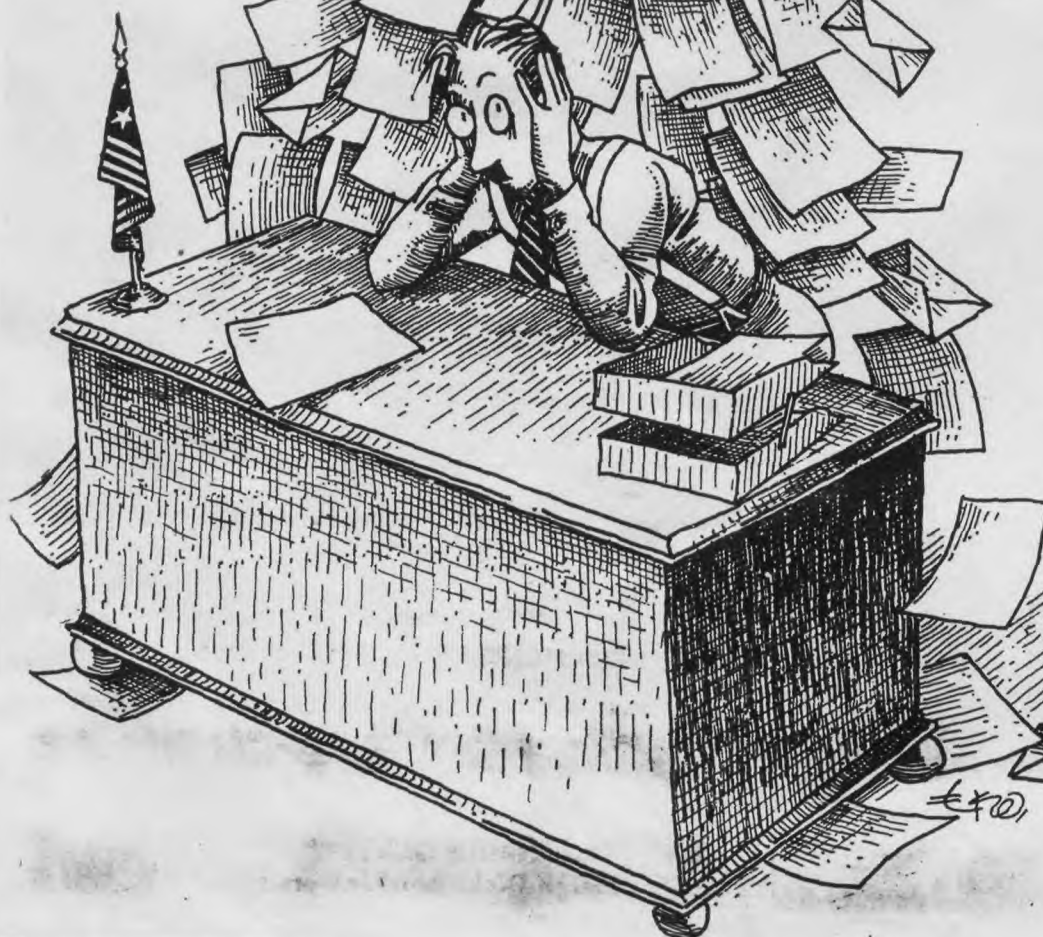
Among the weapons that gadflies are using more often at town meetings, he added, are tape recorders. "They really are a symbolic statement," he said. "They serve notice on their opponents that 'I'm here, I'm serious, I'm getting it all down, and I'm putting you on notice.'"

Mr. Boyle's home in Ridgewood is filled with computers, legal files and correspondence. He works several hours a day on a journal keeping a record of his work. He regularly keeps in touch with agencies like the State Department of Community Affairs and the Army Corps of Engineers to find out about codes and land use.

Over the last few years, Mr. Boyle has objected to all manner of municipal plans, including the relocation of the Ridgewood firehouse onto a flood plain, which occurred nonetheless. He has also objected to the salary received by the village attorney.

Mr. Boyle criticizes what he calls "stonewalling" attempts by the Council to keep its agenda hidden and its minutes unavailable to the public.

Roberta Svarre, a Republican Councilwoman and former Mayor, said the agenda for every Council meeting is posted in the clerk's office and minutes of the meetings are also available there. Some sessions, she said, are closed because of the discussion of legal matters or personnel decisions. She said the Council had been negligent in the past in releasing the minutes of a closed session, but that when Mr. Boyle or any other resident asks for a specific topic from the minutes, that por-

tion of the minutes is now being revealed.

Mr. Boyle is particularly irate over what he says is the Council's giving him just five minutes to present his side of the issues. "If another person got up, they'd give him 30 minutes," he said. "They just ignore what I'm saying anyway. I could call them a bunch of murderers and they'd say, 'Thank you, Mr. Boyle.'"

Mr. Boyle has made some enemies. "Anyone reading Mr. Boyle's letters to the editor can see that he's personally destructive," Ms. Svarre said. "Community activism is very important and we need watchdogs who will pick up honest mistakes, but people like Mr. Boyle, who oppose us at every issue, I think, are very suspect."

Speaking Up in Midland Park

Leonard Breen, a gadfly in Midland Park, has also come in for his share of criticism. Faith Walker, the borough's Mayor, says the 82-year-old retired engineer is vindictive.

"At one meeting," she said, "he got so nasty, attacking what he perceived as a conflict of interest between me and my son, who's a banker, the police chief had to come and tell him to sit down."

Mr. Breen offered this reply: "Mayor Walker just wants to be a dictator. She's got all her cronies placed strategically on committees. Once at a Council meeting they tried to limit the amount of time I spoke, but I just went right on speaking. They never tried that again."

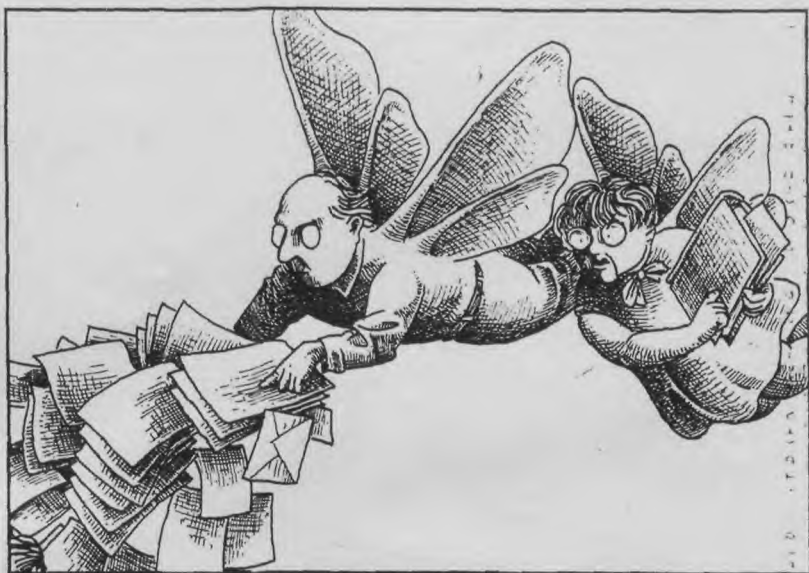
On that occasion, Mr. Breen said, he was objecting to "foolish spending" by Mrs. Walker's administration. One specific issue: plans for a new roof on Borough Hall.

"I told them it didn't have the right pitch on it," Mr. Breen said. He later climbed to the top of the roof and found two leaks, which, he said, proved his case.

"Then there was the sweeper," he continued. "It cost the town \$90,000 five years ago, and I didn't like the looks of it. I asked the Council if anyone had checked the company's quality control about it, but they ignored me. Sure enough, there were hydraulic leaks in the power line and a broken window before too long. Now they need another one."

When Midland Park issued zero-coupon bonds to pay for road repairs, Mr. Breen said, he objected because it was not proper to ask residents for money that the borough should have earmarked in its budget.

"That's ridiculous," Mrs. Walker said. "We invested the monies in zero-coupon bonds that have gone up a lot in value. By the way, Mr. Breen was one of our investors. He just doesn't want to move into the 21st century."



Government is under scrutiny.

One reason for the increase in gadflies, Dr. Danielson says, is the fact that public officials receive less deference than in years past — a Washington-level trend that has filtered down to the local level.

Raising Questions in Waldwick

The trend finds voice in the quarterly newsletter of the Concerned Taxpayers of Waldwick: "Step aside, Richard Nixon. James Mallen has developed stonewalling into a new art form." Shirley Feldman, the president of the group, was writing about the secretary of the Board of Education, complaining that he would not provide her with information on educational spending.

Mrs. Feldman describes herself as "just a little mom"; she and her husband, Robert, have two grown children. As she and her group questioned teacher pay increases, over-budgeted school expenses and a Board of Education president whose job as manager of a McDonald's hardly qualifies him, she said, to handle business decisions, she constantly infuriates board officials.

Last year, the Feldmans and other members of Concerned Taxpayers stood in front of a local supermarket and handed out newsletters replete with a laundry list of allegations against the board, including exorbitant teacher pay and padding of the school budget. The police showed up to disperse the group, but, Mrs. Feldman says, she insisted that she had a

constitutional right of free speech to be on the quasi-public property and the group was allowed to continue.

Last spring, a resident who had handed out literature in front of the supermarket in support of the board accused Mr. Feldman of pushing him and sued on assault charges. The case was eventually dismissed.

'Toes Kept to the Coals'

"I recognize that public servants should have their toes kept to the coals," said John Carr, a member of Waldwick's school board for 16 years and a high-school science teacher in Ridgewood, "but she's a psychological batterer of people and a master of half truths. I have nothing good to say about her."

Mr. Carr denied the charge that the school budget was padded. "We do put surplus aside in anticipation of expenditures," he said. "We'd be irresponsible not to."

He complains that Mrs. Feldman calls board vendors and pretends to be a member of the board in order to get privileged information, and that she has contacted State Department of Education auditors to report 12 charges of improprieties, most of which were later dismissed.

Mrs. Feldman denied that she had represented herself as a school board member and said that she had been personally threatened in letters though anonymously.

There is one point of agreement between Mr. Carr and Mrs. Feldman, however. Both of them say they love Waldwick.



Win section title

Waldwick school taxes up \$126 3/14/93

WALDWICK — Striving to relieve overcrowded classrooms without socking it to taxpayers, the board of education Monday approved a \$13.3 million proposed budget for 1993-94 that would raise taxes 4.3 percent.

The \$13,320,326 budget marks a 3.9 percent increase over this year's \$12.8 million spending plan, thus staying under the 5.6 percent state cap.

If the budget is approved by voters April 20, the property tax rate for school purposes would rise to \$1.68 per \$100 in assessed valuation from the current \$1.61. The owner of a \$180,000 home in Waldwick would pay an extra \$126 a year

in property taxes.

In an effort to ease classroom crowding, the budget calls for the addition of two full-time teachers and a part-time language instructor at Waldwick High School and one full-time teacher at Traphagen elementary school.

Those additions would bring all class sizes to under 30, said school superintendent Patrick Piegari. He said there are now six English and math classes with 30 or more students.

Three straight budget defeats by voters led to staff cutbacks that produced the crowded classrooms, drawing loud complaints from parents.

In an effort to address

parents' concerns while still crafting a frugal budget that can win voters' support, the school district plans to hold salaries for non-teaching personnel under 5 percent, reduce the number of employees eligible for health benefits and limit capital expenditures, Piegari said. The capital outlay is \$16,642 to replace a school bus.

"We cut even further than we had to, to get the support of taxpayers," Piegari said.

The budget also provides for \$1,471,436 in state aid.

A public hearing on the budget will be held Monday, March 29 at 8 p.m. in the high school cafeteria.

Pascack Valley, Waldwick girls quintets fall short

For the Waldwick and Pascack Valley girls basketball teams, these were the sounds of their seasons coming to an end on Thursday night at Ridge-wood High School.

Both teams spent frustrating state semifinal contests mired in abysmal shooting slumps, and the results were a pair of blowout victories for the opposition.

Even the patterns of both games were similar, as Waldwick went down by 43-26 to North Warren and Valley succumbed by a 47-20 score to Newark West Side.

Both teams were still in the game at halftime, only to see the second half go stone cold, as Waldwick went scoreless in the third quarter and PV was shut out in the fourth quarter of their games. Neither Warrior head coach Bob Klie nor Indian head coach Jeff Jasper could remember their teams being shut out in a quarter prior to Thursday.

The opener of the doubleheader saw Waldwick drop the rubber match of three state semifinal matchups to North Warren, after a 1987 win and a 1990 loss. Klie felt that "a couple of the girls came out a bit

nervous, and when we didn't get the shot to fall, we started to press a bit and then everything went south."

Kim Kehrberger and Erin Harvell combined for 10 second quarter points and had the Warriors within 18-14 late in the first half, but they missed their next 17 shots until 6:39 remained in the game and Jeanne Keherberger hit the first of her two three-point shots. In between, North Warren ran off 19 straight points to go up 37-14.

"There was no rhythm, no flow, no chemistry on the floor," Klie noted. "Before the game, I thought this was a team we matched up well with, but when you can't score, matchups mean little."

Waldwick (21-4) finished with a 10 for 54 shooting night, including 6 of 40 inside three-point range and 4 of 14 beyond. Klie said, "We haven't been a real good shooting team all year, but in most games we could find a way to win."

"Against a team like this, though, it wasn't going to happen. These girls went as far as they could go, and they still take home the sectional championship."

He also gave high marks to North Warren point guard Jill Masker, a 5-foot junior who had

14 points and controlled the floor well.

"She is a wonderful player, and she set the tempo of the game and held it all the way."

For Pascack Valley, the sub-story to their shooting woes goes something like what a difference a year makes. Last season, the Indians defeated West Side by a 47-40 score in a game that saw Lady Rider star Denise Anthony in foul trouble from the start and ineffective along with point guard Sabriya Mitchell, who also had foul troubles.

This time around, Anthony was trouble only for the Valley defense, scoring 33 points, including the 2,000th of her career. Mitchell had seven assists and controlled the game throughout, while Valley's Kim Beezer had an off-night, shooting poorly and scoring only 13 points.

"When your meal ticket doesn't have it, there isn't much you can do," Jasper noted. "They were stronger inside, and Anthony had a tremendous game."

West Side controlled the boards to the tune of a 54-19 rebounding edge, and Valley had only 8 of 44 shots go in in finishing the season at 24-5.

It was still a game at 23-16 at

"Except for the poor shooting, I thought we played a decent game," Jasper said. "That is the

way it goes sometimes, and you live with it. The worst part of this is that there is no more practice or gym time with this group."

"Winning and losing is not why I coach, it is the special relationships that are built, the comradery of the team. That is the saddest part about the last game, not the outcome. That all goes from the present to history."

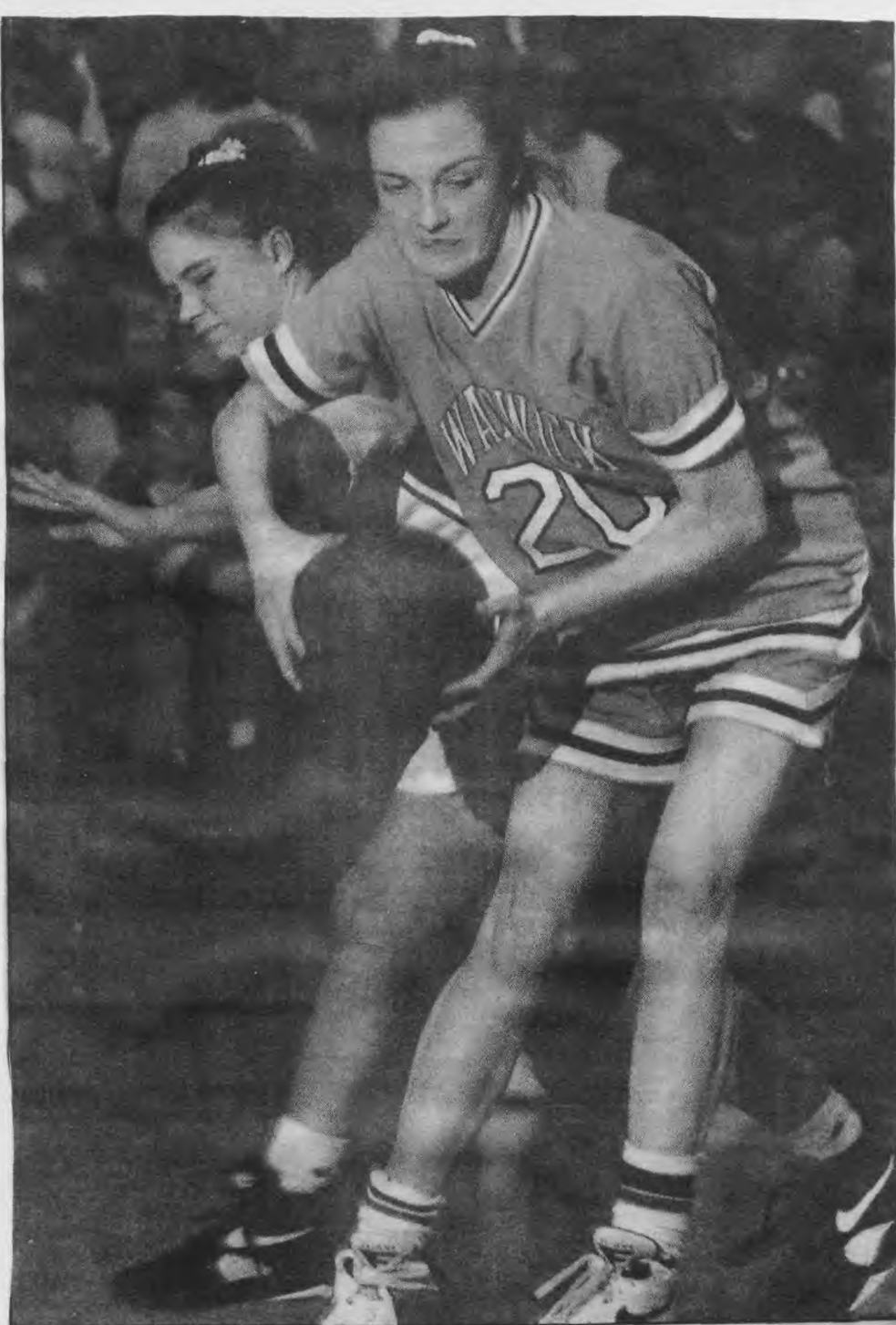
The Waldwick Board of Health hosted a retirement party for its town nurse recently at King's Ransom.

Waldwick taxpayers would see \$126 hike

WALDWICK — The Board of Education has introduced a \$13.3 million budget for 1993-94 that would add \$126 to the tax bill on the average home.

If approved by voters next month, the budget also would restore three full-time and one part-time teacher to the schools.

Waldwick voters have rejected proposed school budgets for the last three years — most recently by just 32 votes. As a result, the teaching staff has been cut by 10 while enrollment has remained steady. About six academic high school classes have more than 30 students.

"This budget allows us to hire two teachers on the high school level in math and English to help alleviate large class sizes," said Superintendent Patrick Piegari, adding that a third teacher would be hired on the elementary school level. "We are also proposing hiring a part-time language teacher so that students can complete their third year of a foreign language, which is required by some colleges."

The proposed budget calls for a spending increase of 3.85 percent, compared with last year's \$12,826,161 budget. That number does not include the amount the municipality paid for employee pensions, a responsibility that was assumed by the state this year.

The school tax rate would increase an estimated 7 cents per \$100 of assessed value, to \$1.68 from \$1.61, said Administrator James Mallen. That means the tax bill for the owner of a home assessed at \$180,000, the borough average, would go up to \$3,024 from \$2,898, not including municipal, county, and state taxes.

The board also introduced a capital budget of \$16,642 for a new school bus.

The current-expense budget also includes money for a distance-learning satellite for interactive learning. "This allows us to offer some classes for students through satellite," said board President Paul Cottrell.

Money for new social studies textbooks for the district is also budgeted. "The textbooks were very outdated," said Piegari.

Given the defeats of three previous school budgets, the board's mood is cautiously optimistic.

"I think we put out a balanced, responsible budget for the public to vote on," said Cottrell.

Grease trap law ammended for dry-cleaners

WALDWICK — Waldwick Borough Council amended the grease interceptor ordinance last week exempting dry-cleaners and some food preparation establishments from an installation requirement.

A grease interceptor is a device that removes grease from the sewer line. The ordinance was necessary because of a sewer blockage that occurred at the Franklin Turnpike shopping center in October 1992. Several businesses had been dumping sewage into the same line and this led to the blockage.

After the initial ordinance was approved, several dry-cleaners complained to the council about having to spend \$3,000 to purchase an interceptor. These proprietors argued that because they used only biodegradable soap, they did not contribute to the blockage.

The council agreed with the dry-cleaners and decided to free them from the requirement. The council also tightened up the definition of a food establishment. Now, only establishments that prepare hot food for consumption will have to purchase the interceptor.

The ordinance was also amended giving businesses until July 1 to comply.

BOE answers likely to be disingenuous

To the editor:

My letter to this newspaper revealed the irrationality of the Waldwick Board of Education's recent attempts to blame Waldwick's declining educational quality on the voters' rejection of the last three consecutive school budgets.

Writing for the board, Paul Cotrell responded by accusing Concerned Taxpayers of Waldwick of distorting figures, misrepresenting events and manifesting "contempt for the citizens of Waldwick." In order to justify his charges, he cited four examples of alleged factual errors contained in my letter. Cotrell, or whoever provided him with his information, is boldly, inexplicably guilty of the very same tactics he accused Concerned Taxpayers of employing. Every statement in my letter was correct, including the four challenged by Cotrell:

1. Verifying Waldwick's cost per pupil of \$10,000 is a simple matter of dividing the total budget (\$14,000,000) by the total number of pupils (1,350). Board President Cotrell's assertion that Waldwick ranks ninth in cost per pupil of the 10 districts in Northwest Bergen County does not refute my original statement, nor does it properly recognize that Waldwick's per capita income is substantially lower than most of the other nine districts. Waldwick's ability to pay is not the same as that of Franklin Lakes. It is time that the board recognized this! It is time to stop comparing our test scores with towns such as Hasbrouck Heights and our school budgets with towns such as Ridgewood and Franklin Lakes.

2. Mr. Cotrell taxes our credulity when he expects us to believe that the construction of 1,500 square feet of additional board office space plus the renovation, modernization and decoration of existing offices cost only \$68,276! Business Administrator Mallen's memo of Feb. 1, 1990 estimated the actual cost at "\$120,000 not including in-house labor and supervision." One full-time custodian was assigned to work on this

project along with two maintenance men who were directed to work on an "all available hours" basis. As a result of this arrangement, the audit report of 1988-89 showed that the Main-

tenance Account was overspent by \$192,030! Approximately \$120,000 was spent on overtime

salaries during 1988-89 and 1989-90 in the Custodian and Maintenance Accounts. We believe that our original estimate of \$300,000 for this luxuriously

appointed Palace of Pedagogy is a conservative figure. To prove his absurd figure of \$68,276, Cotrell need only direct the Business Administrator to fi-

nally release the breakdown of the funds used in this massive project. We formally requested this information in July of 1990.

We are still waiting. The true cost is an embarrassment because the board allowed this expensive project to continue while it deferred necessary

maintenance on other school buildings until conditions became hazardous.

3. Cotrell defended the employment of a teacher for three days a week at \$43,030 to oversee the "Gifted and Talented" program and \$27,400 as the newly-created "Coordinator of

Testing and Evaluation" (total salary \$70,510) by deceptively claiming that her employment is "required by law." In truth, although the state requires a program, the G&T program can take the form of honors classes or extracurricular activities — the manner in which the mandate is fulfilled in many other districts. Scarce funds should be allocated to basic skills.

4. The board did, as we stated, underspend the 1991-92 Instructional Account by \$119,000 while it overspent the Administration Account by \$50,464. One need only subtract the \$6,273,208 spent in

the Instruction Account from the \$6,392,686 budget to arrive at this figure. In declaring the actual underspending to be \$79,947, President Cotrell conveniently overlooked the \$39,531 that was diverted from the account by the slight-of-hand shell game known as "transferring funds."

Although Cotrell invited citizens to "come and review" his statements, he neglected to mention that the board requires that all such requests for information be made in writing, and that, contrary to the Right-to-Know Law, such requests will be answered at the whim of the superintendent and business administrator. Moreover, the public should be advised that any answers provided by the board president are likely to be as devious and disingenuous as the four that I have just exposed.

Take odor woes to DEPE

State officials want state-of-the-art system to fix sewer plant problem

WALDWICK — Residents are still complaining about odors associated with the sewer plant on Wyckoff Avenue. And tensions between Waldwick and the Northwest Bergen County Utilities Authority (NBCUA) still exist. But at least the two parties are talking.

Recently Menelaos Toskos, borough attorney, and Gary

Kratz, borough administrator, met with the Department of Environmental Protection and Energy (DEPE) and the NBCUA in Trenton to discuss why Waldwick was not signing the C-P-1 Permit authorizing the start of the Phase II expansion of the plant. Waldwick Borough Council has maintained that they will sign the permit until steps are taken to resolve the odor problem. The problem, that c

to the 1970's, has intensified in recent years. With an increase in population, larger amounts of sewage have been processed in the plant. And, as more houses were built near the plant, more residents have been affected by the odor.

The council is still leaning towards a scrubber system to combat the odor. The NBCUA however, wants to implement a misting system. This device would spray an odor-fighting mist in the sewage tanks and would be helped by having a cover placed over the tanks.

The DEPE has rejected several permit requests for the

misting system, because it is not "state-of-the-art." The DEPE wants an odor-control system in place and they feel that the scrubber system would meet their specifications.

The NBCUA has responded by asking that the misting system be given a six-month trial run. If the DEPE will not allow a trial, then the authority demands an administrative hearing to discuss the proposed system.

Ken Gardner, a member of the Waldwick Coalition for

Clean Air, thinks the misting system should only be given a two-week trial. He said that most environmental consulting firms recommend a two-week trial for these systems.

Randy Miles, a member of the Waldwick Coalition for Clean Air, wants to see the scrubber system implemented. "It seems fairly foolish that we spend \$150,000 (on the misting). I assume that it's money down the drain. I think we have to have a collective position that the scrubber system is state-of-the-art."

James Gibson, council member, does not think the NBCUA has been responsive to Waldwick's needs. "A public body is about the people, by the people, for the people. The authority is a public body. They should have our interests in mind. If odor is causing anguish it is a moral issue. It's time we realize that technology can change things."

Gibson would like to have the Waldwick Planning Board examine the NBCUA's odor fighting plans. He feels that because Waldwick is directly impacted it should have as much input as possible. "It's high time the town takes the position that it's going to protect its people," he said.

Mr. Garabedian served as undersheriff with Sheriff William D. McDowell for nearly five years, from 1981 to 1986. When McDowell left to become Bergen County executive, he appointed Mr. Garabedian sheriff. Mr. Garabedian held the post for a year before he was defeated in the 1987 election.

"He was a true law-enforcement person. It was his whole life, as a matter of fact," said McDowell, who knew Mr. Garabedian for 25 years. "He was just a good person. He had a great sense of humor. He

didn't take himself or anyone else too seriously."

As undersheriff, Mr. Garabedian was responsible for the bulk of the agency's operations, including court security, the investigations bureau, the foreclosure unit, and the serving of summonses.

After leaving the sheriff's post, he served as assistant director of the Bergen County Police Academy for one year, and then as the county's 911 coordinator. He also worked as vice president of Summit Security Co. of Hackensack.

Mr. Garabedian joined the prosecutor's office in 1955 and worked there for 17 years as a homicide and narcotics investigator. He was involved in investigating the 1957 murder of a 15-year-old Mahwah girl, for which Edgar H. Smith was convicted.

Mr. Garabedian also served as

administrator of the Monsignor Wall drug-treatment center. From 1972 to 1981, he worked as a security manager for the A&P supermarket chain.

Mr. Garabedian attended Ramsey High School and Fairleigh Dickinson University. He served in the Air Force from 1950 to 1954.

He is survived by his wife, Anne; two daughters, Lynn Doto and Lori Meccia, both of Mahwah; three sisters, Natalie Wiseman of Passaic, Janet Ossig of Cape May, and Miriam Landgraf of Edgewater, Fla., and three grandchildren.

(C) Amend the definition of "family unit" as follows:
"Family Unit": Any reasonable number of individuals living together, not as individual residents or transient occupants but as a single, stable, permanent, bona fide, not for profit, housekeeping unit, equivalent to that of the traditional family unit, using rooms, dining and housekeeping facilities in common, the taking in of a lodger or boarder in all or part of the premises or the taking in of a sub-tenant of a portion of the premises shall not be deemed to constitute a "family". This definition shall not include any society, club, fraternity, sorority, association, lodge, federation, group or organization, nor include a group of individuals whose association is temporary or transient in character or nature. The number of individuals constituting a family unit shall be consistent with the standards of the building, fire, housing and health codes of the Borough of Waldwick.

(D) Add the definition for "family day care home" as follows:

"Family Day Care Home": Any private residence approved by the Division of Youth and Family Services or an organization with which the Division contracts for family day care in which child care services are regularly provided to no less than three and no more than five children for no less than 15 hours per week. A Family Day Care Home shall comply with the requirements of the "Family Day Care Provider Registration Act," N.J.S.A. 30:58-16 et seq.

(E) Amend the definition of "Home Occupation" to include the following sentence:

"Board of Health, Fire Prevention Bureau & Environmental Commission approval and a Certificate of Occupancy shall be required for all 'Home Occupations' and 'Family Day Care Homes'". Anyone operating a Family Day Care Home shall file with the Borough Clerk a copy of the Certificate of Registration issued by the New Jersey Division of Youth and Family Services and shall submit a certification of the operator setting forth the operator's name, address and telephone number and the hours of operation.

(F) Amend the definition of "Setback Lines" to read as follows:

A line drawn parallel to a street line or lot line and drawn through the point of a building nearest to the street or lot line. The term "required setback" means a line that is established as a minimum distance from a street line or lot line and within which a building or part of a building, driveway, patio, deck or pool is not permitted to extend towards the street or lot line in order to provide the required yard. Setback lines shall be measured to the nearest portion of any building on the premises.

(G) Article IV, Section 97-18A(6) is amended to read as follows:

Assembly halls, theaters, bowling alleys, tennis courts, racquet ball courts, health/fitness centers, gymnasiums, and similar recreational uses, provided that their activities occur entirely within an enclosed building.

(H) Article IV, Section 97-21A(4) is amended to read as follows:

Government buildings and government uses, by a Municipal Council, State or Federal Agency or authority.

(I) Article IV, Section 97-21A(7) is amended to read as follows:

Facilities used for assembly halls, theaters, bowling alleys, tennis courts, racquet ball courts, health/fitness centers, gymnasiums and similar recreational uses provided that their activities are carried on entirely within the enclosed building.

(J) Article XIII, Section 97-71.1 is amended to include the following:
Family Day Care Homes shall be deemed to be a home occupation use and shall be subject to the same restrictions as all other home occupations in the particular zone in which the family day care home is located.

(K) Article IX, Section 97-33 B is amended to read as follows:

B. Extensions, enlargements and discontinuance.

(1) No existing building or premises devoted to a nonconforming use as permitted by the zoning ordinance of the Borough of Waldwick shall be enlarged, extended, reconstructed or structurally altered unless such use is changed to a use permitted in the district in which such building or premises is located.

(2) No nonconforming use or structure which shall have been discontinued or abandoned for a period exceeding twelve (12) months shall be resumed.

(3) Nothing contained in this Chapter shall prohibit the modernization of existing nonconforming structures; provided, however, that such modernization does not entail any extension, enlargement, addition or change of the nonconforming use.

(4) No nonconforming building or structure shall be enlarged, extended or increased, except that in residential zones, a nonconforming single-family dwelling or a single family dwelling on a nonconforming lot may be enlarged, extended or increased if:

(a) Said enlargement, extension or increase by itself conforms with all requirements of the zoning and site plan ordinances of the Borough of Waldwick and the dimensions and setback of said enlargement, extension or increase, when aggregated with the existing building, do not create or increase any yard, area, height, dimensional, bulk, parking or setback violation of this zoning code of the Borough of Waldwick; and,

(b) The area of said enlargement, extension or increase, when aggregated with the area of the existing building, does not exceed the maximum lot coverage standard permitted in that zone.

(L) Amend 97-92.1 A (1) to read:
"Change of occupancy of the building or premises including the rental of part of or all of the premises"

(M) Amend 97-92.1 E to add the following:

"An appeal of denial may be taken within ten (10) days of receipt of the denial. Such appeal shall be filed with the Board of Adjustment if the basis of the denial involves violation or interpretation of the Zoning Code. If the basis of the denial involves a violation of the Uniform Construction Code the appeal shall be taken to the Bergen County Construction Board of Appeal. If the basis of the denial involves a violation

of the Health Code the appeal shall be filed with the Board of Health."

(N) Amend 97-92.1 G to add the following:

"Transfer of title to real property may be permitted by the Construction Official provided the purchaser represents in writing to the Construction Official that the purchaser shall correct all violations upon which the denial of the Certificate of compliance was based in a reasonable time and provides a reasonable escrow for any repair work."

Section II: Amend 86-8A, to read as follows:

Before consideration of a final subdivision plat, the subdivision will have installed the improvements required by this ordinance or the Planning Board shall require the posting of an adequate performance guarantee, of which ten (10) percent shall be cash unless waived by the Planning Board, to assure the installation of the required improvements.

Section III: Amend 56A-36, entitled "Definitions", as follows:

(A) Whenever a term is used in this ordinance which is defined in C. 291, P.L. 1975, as amended, such term is intended to have the meaning set forth in the definition of such term found in said Statute, unless a contrary intention is clearly expressed from the context of Chapters 56, 77, 86 and 97 of the Municipal Code of the Borough of Waldwick.

(B) Whenever in Chapters 56, 77, 86 and 97 of the Municipal Code of the Borough of Waldwick, the term Planning Board is used in a manner which under C.291, P.L. 1975 as amended grants the Planning Board the privilege of exercising the powers of the Zoning Board, the term Zoning Board shall be interchangeable with the term Planning Board. Whenever the term Zoning Board is used in the above listed chapters in a manner which under C.291, P.L. 1975 as amended grants the Zoning Board the privilege of exercising the powers of the Planning Board, the term Planning Board shall be interchangeable with the term Zoning Board.

Section IV: Amend Chapter 54 to include the following Section:

54-17 Registration of Tenancy

54-17.1 Landlord Defined:

The term "landlord", as used in this ordinance, shall mean the person or persons who own or purport to own, or exercise control of any building in which there is rented or offered for rent housing space for living or dwelling purposes under either a written or oral lease, provided that this definition shall not include owner-occupied two dwelling unit premises.

54-17.2 Certificate of registration; filing; contents

(A) Every landlord shall, within 30 days following the effective date of this Ordinance, or at the time of the creation of the first tenancy in any newly constructed or reconstructed building, file with the Borough Clerk of the Borough of Waldwick in the case of a one-dwelling unit rental or a two-dwelling unit non-owner occupied premises, or with the Bureau of Housing Inspection in the Department of Community Affairs in the case of a multiple dwelling as defined in section 3 of the "Hotel and Multiple Dwelling Law" (N.J.S.A. 55:13a-3), a certificate of registration on forms prescribed by the Commissioner of the Department of Community Affairs, which shall contain the following information:

1. The name and address of the record owner or owners of the premises and the record owner or owners of the rental business if not the same persons. In the case of a partnership the names of all general partners shall be provided;

2. If the record owner is a corporation, the name and address of the registered agent and corporate officers of said corporation;

3. If the address of any record owner is not located in the county in which the premises are located, the name and address of a person who resides in the county in which the premises are located and is authorized to accept notices from a tenant and to issue receipts therefor and to accept service of process on behalf of the record owner;

4. The name and address of the managing agent of the premises, if any;

5. The name and address, including the dwelling unit, apartment or room number of the superintendent, janitor, custodian or other individual employed by the record owner or managing agent to provide regular maintenance service, if any;

6. The name, address and telephone number of an individual representative of the record owner or managing agent who may be reached or contacted at any time in the event of an emergency affecting the premises or any unit or dwelling space therein, including such emergencies as the failure of any essential service or system, and who has the authority to make emergency decisions concerning the building and any repair thereto or expenditure in connection therewith;

7. The name and address of every holder or a recorded mortgage on the premises;

8. If fuel oil is used to heat the building and the landlord furnishes the heat in the building, the name and address of the fuel oil dealer servicing the building and the grade of fuel oil used.

9. The number of tenants occupying each dwelling unit.

(B) The landlord shall file with the Borough or Clerk of the Borough of Waldwick a copy of the Certificate of Registration form and any other documents that Landlord files with the Bureau of Housing Inspection.

(C) The Certificate of Registration must be filed annually, on or before April 1 of each year. In the event that the building is sold and there is a registered unit(s), the new owners shall be required to register the unit(s) as set forth herein above. The fee for registration shall be set forth in Chapter 48 of the Municipal Code of the Borough of Waldwick. The provisions of the ordinance shall be enforced by the Public Officer designated in Chapter 54 of the Municipal Code of the Borough of Waldwick.

Section V: Amend Chapter 48 to read as follows:

§48-9B REGISTRATION OF TENANCY

"The fee for filing a Certificate of Registration of Tenancy shall be Twenty-Five (\$25.00) Dollars."

Section VI: Any ordinance or portions thereof, inconsistent with the terms of this ordinance are hereby repealed as to such inconsistencies only.

Section VII: Should any article, section, sub-section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid,

such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined to the article, section, sub-section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof directly involved in the controversy in which said judgment shall have been rendered.

Section VIII: This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and publication as required by law.

ORDINANCE NO. 4-93

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 75 OF THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF WALDWICK ENTITLED "SEWER USE" PROVIDING FOR THE REGULATION OF WASTE WATER DISCHARGE AND MANDATING THE INSTALLATION OF INTERCEPTORS WITHIN VARIOUS COMMERCIAL ESTABLISHMENTS LOCATED WITHIN THE BOROUGH.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Waldwick that Chapter 75 entitled "Sewer Use" of the Code of the Borough of Waldwick is hereby amended as follows:

SECTION 1A: Chapter 75-2 definition of interceptor is hereby amended to include the following additional sentences:

The interceptor shall automatically or semi-automatically remove and store grease from the sewer. The interceptor shall include a flow control device to regulate the flow into the interceptor. This flow control device must eliminate all siphonage. All removed grease is to be disposed of by the owner or operator of the establishment.

SECTION 1B: Chapter 75-2 is further amended to add the following definition:

FOOD ESTABLISHMENT: An establishment which prepares hot food for consumption.

SECTION 2: Chapter 75-26A is hereby amended to read as follows:

(A) Interceptors are required to be installed in each facility, business or commercial establishments generating liquid waste containing grease, oil, flammable waste, sand, solids, and other ingredients which in the opinion of the Health Officer, Building or Plumbing Code Official are harmful to the building drainage system, or public sewer or sewerage treatment plant or process. All food establishments, and laundromats are specifically mandated to have interceptors. Dry cleaning establishments shall be required to install interceptors except for those dry cleaning establishments which use only biodegradable soaps and provide the Borough Clerk with a certification to that effect on or before January 1 and July 1 of each year. Residential premises are exempt from installing interceptors.

SECTION 3: Chapter 75-27(B) is amended as follows:

(B) An inspection shall be made of each premises required to have an interceptor on a quarterly basis by the enforcement officers. This inspection shall review the operation and maintenance records required to be kept by the owner in addition to inspecting that the unit is operational. There shall be an annual fee established under Chapter 48 for the inspections payable to the Borough Clerk at the beginning of each calendar year. (See Chapter 48: 75-27).

SECTION 4: If any section, sentence, clause or other portion of this ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstances shall for any reason be judged by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or repeal the remainder of this Ordinance or the Chapters it is hereby amending.

SECTION 5: This Ordinance shall take effect July 1, 1993 after passage and publication as required by law.

"AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 97 ENTITLED 'ZONING'; CHAPTER 86 ENTITLED 'SUBDIVISION OF LAND'; CHAPTER 56 ENTITLED 'LAND USE PROCEDURES'; CHAPTER 54 ENTITLED 'HOUSING STANDARDS'; AND CHAPTER 48 ENTITLED 'FEES' WHICH AMENDMENTS REVISE CERTAIN DEFINITIONS IN THE ZONING CODE, IMPLEMENT RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT, AND PROVIDE FOR REGISTRATION OF TENANCIES."

WHEREAS, the Zoning Board of Adjustment of the Borough of Waldwick, pursuant to the provisions of N.J.S.A. 40:55D-7.1 of the New Jersey Municipal Land Use Law, submitted an annual review of applications for development to the Mayor and Council;

WHEREAS, in conjunction with its review, the Board of Adjustment submitted certain recommendations for amending the existing Zoning Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council have reviewed the recommendations and hereby amend the Zoning Ordinance to incorporate the recommendations made by the Zoning Board of Adjustment; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council have determined that further revisions are required to the Zoning Code and other Chapters of the Municipal Code as a result of recent Court decisions and passage of legislation and hereby so amend the Municipal Code;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED AS FOLLOWS:

Section I: Amend Chapter 97 of the Municipal Code of the Borough of Waldwick, entitled "Zoning" as follows:

(A) Amend Article III, Section 97-13 entitled "Definitions" as follows:

"Boarder/Lodger": Include the following new definition:

A person who pays rent in return for exclusive possession of a portion of a home or structure.

(B) Amend the definition of "coverage" to read as follows:

"Coverage": That percentage of the plot or lot area which is improved and covered with any principal or accessory building or structure, parking lot, patio, and deck, but excluding driveways and sidewalks.

"It was the same method as those in Allendale and Ho-Ho-Kus," he said of the Waldwick break-in. "The lock cylinder in the back was removed, and they entered the establishment and stole

cash from the register drawers."

The Waldwick restaurant is on Franklin Turnpike, as is the dry cleaning shop in Ho-Ho-Kus. Police in Ho-Ho-Kus said a small amount of cash was taken from the cleaners and that the bandits also attempted to break into a neighboring liquor store but were unable to get the lock cylinder apart.

In Allendale, Lt. Edward Tellefsen said the thieves entered a

clothing store on West Allendale Avenue. He said they were inside just long enough to grab some rolls of change from the register because they triggered an alarm.

Less than \$100 in cash was taken from the register of the ice cream store in Woodcliff Lake.

Detective Sgt. Mike Arnone said the ice cream store is in the same Chestnut Ridge Road shopping plaza as a stationery store hit last week.

Waldwick homeowners fume over stench

Ken Gardner sniffed around and asked around in August before buying a \$288,000 split-level next to a sewage plant in Waldwick. Odors were not a problem, Gardner concluded, so he closed the deal and moved across town.

But within a month, Gardner had changed his mind. Sewage fumes from the Northwest Bergen County Utilities Authority plant had ruined a Gardner family picnic and forced them to shut their windows on some days.

Now, Gardner is leading a residents group and rallying borough leaders to persuade state regulators to block a proposed \$14 million plant expansion until the utilities authority takes concrete steps to protect local nostrils.

"Had I smelled this odor while we were looking at the house, we would not have bought the house," said Gardner. "There are days when it doesn't smell, but on the days when it does smell you can't go outside your house."

"We're not necessarily opposed to the expansion," said Gardner, who organized the Waldwick Coalition for Clean Air and has written letters to many local and state officials. "We just want to control the odors."

Citing foul odors on two days, the state Department of Environmental Protection and Energy last year fined the utilities authority \$4,000. The authority is appealing the fines.

Emil Porfido, authority executive director, said odor problems are "minimal" but will be corrected.

Call sewage plant the culprit

Monitors on exhaust pipes would measure how much malodorous materials remain.

An earlier application by the utilities authority to control the odors by spraying a chemical mist over several tanks and open channels was rejected by the DEPE as not being "state of the art." Of the four options suggested by state regulators, one was a scrubber system.

While the odor issue lingers, the utilities authority also is pursuing state permits to expand its treatment capacity and plant facilities.

It is applying for a \$7 million, no-interest loan from the DEPE and a \$7 million, market-rate loan

from the New Jersey Wastewater Treatment Trust.

The DEPE project manager reviewing the authority's funding application, Matthew Farr, said odor control should be undertaken.

"We want to resolve the problem," Farr said. "We talked to Northwest Bergen and they are willing to [address] this odor problem within the scope of [the expansion] work.... We are trying to iron everything out so that we can make everybody happy."

The Waldwick Council is not necessarily opposed to a plant expansion, but wants the odors controlled, said Gary Kratz, borough administrator.

"We're trying to eliminate an exacerbation of a problem that presently exists," Kratz said. "The

council would like the authority to install state-of-the-art scrubbers or would listen to alternatives other than scrubbers."

Porfido said that even if the scrubber pilot program is approved, Gardner's odor problems would not all be solved.

"At the end of the summer season, from time to time you will get a slight odor," Porfido said. "I've been to sewage treatment plants around the country, and I've never been to one that doesn't have an odor problem at times."

Gardner, a human resources manager who has two daughters, said he hopes that any state-approved system corrects the problem.

"It's a quality-of-life issue," he said. "I would like my kids to be able to play outside."

Senior citizens with low or modest incomes whose tax returns are not too complex may turn to the Tax-Aide Program of the American Association of Retired Persons for help in completing the forms. Volunteers who have been trained in federal and New Jersey tax laws and regulations will be available through April 15 at various times and sites.

Homeowners and tenants eligible for a New Jersey Homestead Property Tax Rebate should be aware that application for a rebate is made by completing and filing Form NJ-1040 income tax return even though there may be no taxable income to be reported.

Taxpayers should bring to the Tax-Aide Program sites their previous year's tax returns and information on 1992 income, including supporting forms covering earnings, pensions, interest, dividends, and Society Security benefits. If deductions are to be taken a record of taxes paid,

rebates received, medical expenses paid, medical insurance reimbursements, and charitable donations made will be required. For the Homestead Property Tax Rebate application, bring the 1992 real estate tax bill.

Town, NBCUA deadlocked

Waldwick planning board demands detailed site plan for proposed sewer plant expansion

WALDWICK — Waldwick and the Northwest Bergen County Utilities Authority (NBCUA) are still at odds. Odor problems, emanating from the sewage treatment plant on Wyckoff Avenue, continue to plague residents and the borough and the NBCUA have yet to reach an

agreement on how to solve the problem.

The Waldwick Planning Board, members of Waldwick Borough Council and representatives of the NBCUA met recently to discuss the odor problem and the planned Phase II expansion of the plant. Little was accomplished however, because the board wanted to see a

detailed site plan for the expansion and the NBCUA representatives said they were not required to show this to the board.

The plan the NBCUA gave the board was a one-page blueprint showing an outline of the construction work. The board found this blueprint inadequate. Arthur Barthold, council

member, said, "It doesn't tell us what we need to know. The law states we must see a full plan."

Paul Malmrose, consultant to the NBCUA, said that the authority only had to make full site plan application to the Department of Environmental Protection and Energy (DEPE).

The board maintains that the authority has to make a site plan application to them. Christopher Hummel, board member, said, "We believe that it is a requirement that you

make a site plan application."

Robert Ryan, board member, pointed to a 1984 ruling of the Superior Court of New Jersey that said a utilities authority must receive site plan approval from the municipality. "That tells me you folks need to be up here to get permits," he said.

The meeting ended with the board demanding a site plan application from the authority. The board feels that until they see more information, they can not comment on the plan.

Mayor Rick Vander Wende wants the NBCUA and Waldwick to reach an agreement. "We wouldn't want to stand in the way of necessary expansion. We're very eager to work with the authority. But we

WALDWICK — Responding to pleas from property owners, the borough council Tuesday tentatively agreed to refurbish Waldwick Avenue, one of the community's most deteriorated residential streets.

The council introduced an ordinance to spend \$420,000 to repave the road and install new drainage facilities, sidewalks, curbs and driveway aprons on the four blocks between Franklin Turnpike and Ridge Street. The state Department of Transportation is expected to approve a \$150,000 grant to help fund the project.

Homeowners who receive new sidewalks and driveway aprons will be assessed for that work, said Borough Administrator Gary Kratz.

A related project calls for the replacement of a water main and fire hydrants on the same four-block stretch at a cost of \$105,000. Both proposed projects will be subject to a public hearing at 8:15 p.m. on April 13. If approved, the work could begin in late summer, Kratz said.

In other action, the council gave final approval to an ordinance requiring landlords to register their tenants with the borough, paving the way for a crackdown on slovenly, overcrowded houses.

Under the zoning amendments, landlords are required to present the names and addresses of their tenants to the borough clerk by April 1 each year.

The new law also redefines a "family unit" as a "reasonable

number of individuals living together, not as individual residents or transient occupants, but as a single, stable, permanent, bona fide, not-for-profit, housekeeping unit."

The new provisions are designed to help the borough prosecute tenants living in a handful of homes that officials believe violate health and building codes.

Baby boomers to be a boon to housing market: survey

WALDWICK — Aging baby boomers will have a positive impact on the housing demand through the century, according to Georgia Strisik, president of the Northwest Bergen Board of Realtors.

Strisik cites the results of a study recently released by the National Association of Realtors. The report, "The Effects of Demographics on Future House Prices," was written by Dr. Dowell Myers and John R. Pritikin of the University of Southern California. It found that as the baby boom population grows older, people on that age group will continue to buy homes, resulting in steady sales and stable home values throughout the next decade. The study, good news for Bergen and Passaic homeowners, refutes predictions that home purchases by baby boomers will taper off as the generation grows older, thus forcing home prices to decline.

According to Strisik, as baby boomers grow older, their housing needs will continue to change, causing an actual increase in housing demand and prices. "Baby boomers will not stop buying homes just because

they are growing older," she said. "There will be an ongoing need to meet vastly diverse housing requirements — for affluent trade-up couples, baby boomers approaching retirement, and growing numbers of nontraditional households. We are looking for many years of steady growth in the residential sector."

The report contends that shifts in population composition, not just population growth, often drive change in housing demand. "Rapid population change may not alter both the consumption preferences and the effective demand of the total population," the study says.

Tracking the homebuying patterns of the same groups over different periods of time, the study found that, regardless of age, home expenditures increased at the end of each time period. "At least since 1960, per capita housing consumption has, on average, increased for all groups in the United States as they have aged beyond 45 to at least age 70," the study says. Based on the performance of their predecessors, all groups in the baby boom generation will

continue to create activity in housing markets for years to come.

"The importance of this finding is its implication for the future impact on the housing market of the large baby boom generation. This group has matured from the young ages when they entered the housing market (aged 16 to 34 in 1980), and is proceeding to a mature housing market status (reaching age 44 in 1990, age 54 in 2000)," said Strisik.

The study projects that per capita housing for the oldest members of the baby boom generation will not even start to fall off until after 2015 (when they reach age 70).

According to Strisik, the research center counters "doomsday" reports claiming home values will drop owing to the smaller size of the generation following the baby boom group. Such dire predictions are too simplistic and fail to consider the continuing impact the baby boom generation will have, she said.

"As the leading edge of the baby boom through its peak earning years, demand will pick up for second homes and retire-

ment homes," Strisik said. Additionally, some baby boomers previously unable to purchase homes will be buying, she noted.

Increased savings by baby boomers, combined with larger Social Security trust fund and what likely will be a smaller federal deficit, will keep interest rates low over the next several years, added Strisik.

The report concludes that the long lasting impact of baby boom home buyers will offset any drop in young households

entering the housing market. "The baby boom generation will have a continued positive effect on future house values," the study says.

How will police enforce gun ban?

Now that the Republican attempt to repeal Governor Florio's assault weapon ban has failed and the law stands, perhaps it is time to think about just how this law is going to be enforced. Most estimates put the number of formerly legal but now banned semiautomatic guns in New Jersey at 300,000.

New Jersey's police forces can't simply let these law-breaking gun owners hang on to their guns, enforcing the law only when they happen to come across one of the guns or find one used in a crime. This would be a de facto "grandfathering," something the governor and his supporters have decried as evil as the repeal itself. So it looks as if the state's police will have to begin visiting gun dealers, searching their records, establishing who bought what and then visiting the purchasers of these bad guns. If the gun owner no longer has the gun then the police should force the owner to show how they legally disposed of it. If the gun is still in their possession, seize the gun and arrest the owner.

What do these police state tactics have to do with eliminating street crime? Don't the police have better things to do, like look for real criminals? And finally, where are all the civil libertarians?

BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Waldwick, in the County of Bergen, State of New Jersey, as follows:

Section 1. The Borough of Waldwick in the County of Bergen, New Jersey (the "Borough"), is hereby authorized to improve the water system in and along Waldwick Avenue from Franklin Turnpike eastward to a point approximately 650 feet east of Northham Street, including the replacement of (a) fire hydrants, (b) a portion of the water main and (c) service corrections in, by and for the Water Utility of the Borough. Said improvement shall include all work, materials and appurtenances necessary and suitable therefor, and shall be constructed in accordance with plans and specifications prepared or to be prepared by the Borough Engineer, which plans are hereby approved and directed to be placed on file in the office of the Borough Clerk and made available for public inspection during normal business hours.

Section 2. The sum of \$105,000 is hereby appropriated to the payment of the cost of making the improvement described in Section 1 hereof. Said sum so appropriated shall be met from the proceeds of the sale of the bonds authorized and the down payment appropriated by this ordinance. Said improvement shall be made as a general improvement and no part of the cost thereof shall be assessed against property specially benefited.

Section 3. It is hereby determined and stated that (1) the making of such improvement (hereinafter referred to as "purpose") is not a current expense of said Borough and (2) it is necessary to finance said purpose by the issuance of obligations of said Borough pursuant to the Local Bond Law (Chapter 2 of Title 40A of the New Jersey Statutes, as amended; the "Local Bond Law"), and (3) the estimated cost of said purpose is \$105,000, and (4) \$5,000 of said sum is to be provided by the down payment hereinafter appropriated to finance said purpose, and (5) the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes necessary to be issued for said purpose is \$100,000 and (6) the cost of such purpose, as hereinbefore stated, includes the aggregate amount of \$21,000, which is estimated to be necessary to finance the cost of such purpose, including architect's fees, accounting, engineering and inspection costs, legal expenses and other expenses, including interest on such obligations to the extent permitted by Section 20 of the Local Bond Law.

Section 4. It is anticipated that the Borough will receive a loan in the amount of \$105,000 from the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and Energy ("DEPE"), pursuant to the Water Supply Rehabilitation Loan Program (the "State Loan Program"). Such officers and employees of the Borough as may be required are hereby authorized and directed to take such steps and prepare such plans and specifications and enter into any and all agreements, including a loan agreement with the DEPE, that may be necessary to insure participation of the Borough in the State Loan Program.

Section 5. It is hereby determined and stated that moneys exceeding \$5,000, appropriated for down payments on capital improvements or for the capital improvement fund in Water Utility budgets heretofore adopted for said Borough, are now available to finance said purpose. The sum of \$5,000 is hereby appropriated from such moneys to the payment of the cost of said purpose.

Section 6. To finance said purpose, bonds of said Borough of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$100,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Bond Law. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate per annum as may be hereafter determined within the limitations prescribed by law. All matters with respect to said bonds not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted.

Section 7. To finance said purpose, bond anticipation notes of said Borough of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$100,000 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Bond Law in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of notes hereby authorized to be issued shall be reduced by an amount equal to the principal amount

of the bonds so issued. If the aggregate amount of outstanding bonds and notes issued pursuant to this ordinance shall at any time exceed the sum first mentioned in this section, the moneys raised by the issuance of said bonds shall, to not less than the amount of such excess, be applied to the payment of such notes then outstanding.

Section 8. Each bond anticipation note issued pursuant to this ordinance shall be dated on or about the date of its issuance and shall be payable not more than one year from its date, shall bear interest at a rate per annum as may be hereafter determined within the limitations prescribed by law and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law. Each of said notes shall be signed by the Mayor and by a financial officer and shall be under the seal of said Borough and attested by the Borough Clerk or Deputy Borough Clerk. Said officers are hereby authorized to execute said notes in such form as they may adopt in conformity with law. The power to determine any matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance and also the power to sell said notes, is hereby delegated to the Chief Financial Officer who is hereby authorized to sell said notes either at one time or from time to time in the manner provided by law.

Section 9. It is hereby determined and declared that the period of usefulness of said purpose, according to its reasonable life, is a period of forty (40) years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 10. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Borough Clerk of said Borough, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Borough, as defined in Section 43 of the Local Bond Law, is increased by this ordinance by \$100,000 and that the issuance of the bonds and notes authorized by this ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law.

Section 11. Any funds received from the County of Bergen, the State of New Jersey or any of their agencies (except any funds received as loans from the State Loan Program which shall be applied to the payment of the cost of such purpose or to the payment of any outstanding bond anticipation notes, but shall not reduce the amount of bonds authorized for such purpose) or any funds received from the United States of America or any of its agencies in aid of such purpose, shall be applied to the payment of the cost of such purpose, or, if bond anticipation notes have been issued, to the payment of the bond anticipation notes, and the amount of bonds authorized for such purpose shall be reduced accordingly.

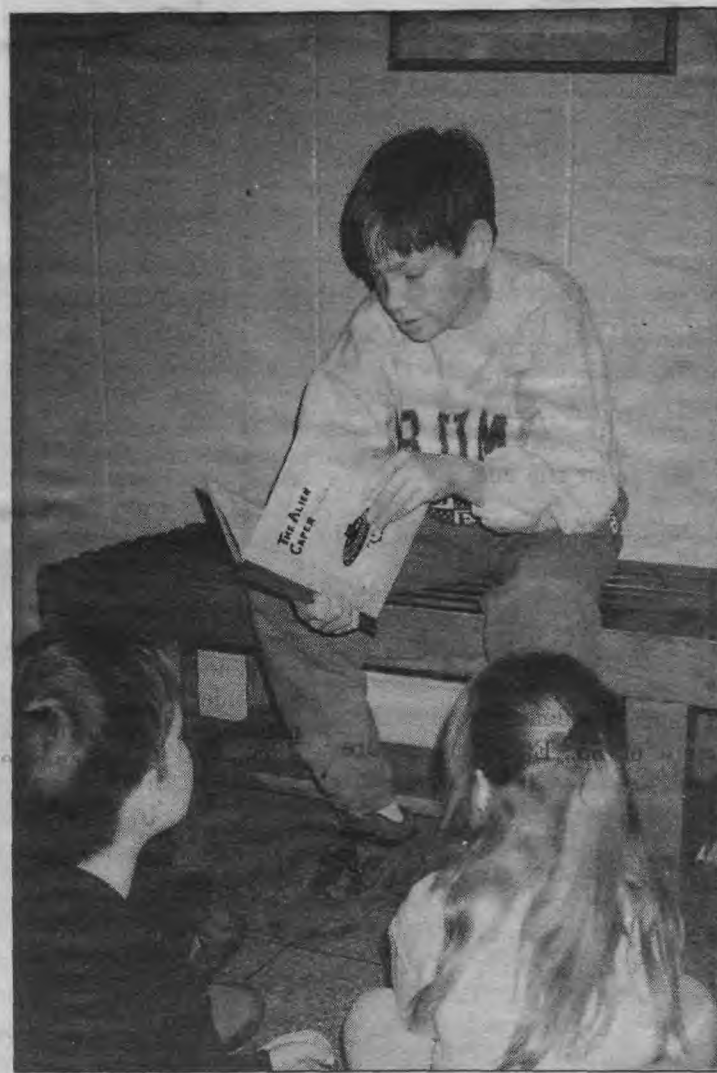

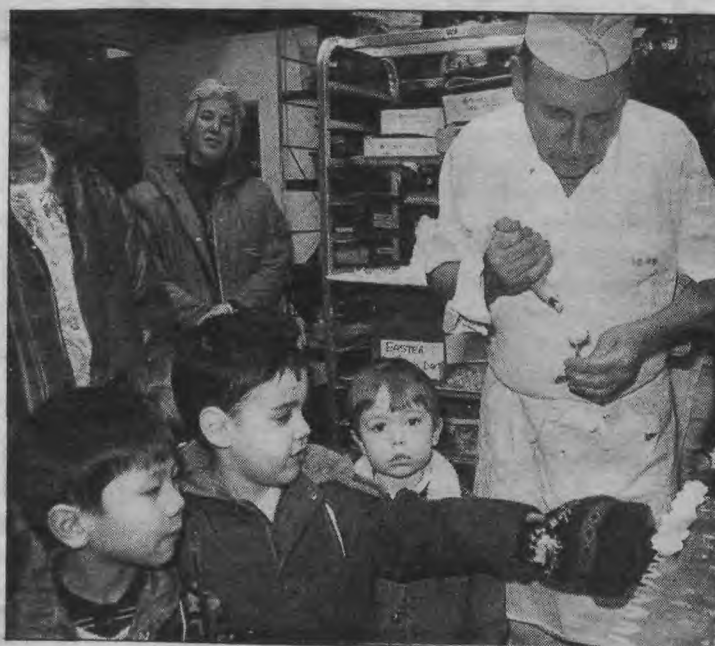

Road repairs authorized

Waldwick Ave. construction costs to be partly paid with DOT funds

WALDWICK — At their last meeting, the Waldwick Borough Council passed a resolution authorizing construction work on Waldwick Avenue.

This will include work on sidewalks, driveways and curbs. Construction will begin in August and will take four to six months to complete.

This resolution is the result of

citizens' complaints about the quality of the road. They had complained for years, but until last year they had not made a formal request to the council.

The \$420,000 project will be paid in part by a \$150,000 grant from the Department of Transportation. The remaining costs will be paid by Waldwick Avenue homeowners.

Gary Kratz, borough administrator, said, "It (the home-

owners' costs) could range from \$200 to \$2,700 depending on the condition of their sidewalks and driveways." He indicated that a resident with a driveway or sidewalk in poor condition would pay more. The residents will have five years to pay off these assessment costs.

But before the work can begin, the water system will have to be replaced. This will include work on fire hydrants and water pipes.

Kratz said, "It doesn't make a whole lot of sense to repair the street and not fix the water

works."

The Council was also concerned that the old underground steel pipes would crack when the road construction began. Denise Anderson, council member, said, "The steam roller could rattle the pipes." The new pipes will be made of copper. These more pliable pipes are less likely to crack.

Replacing these pipes will cost an additional \$105,000. The council expects a loan from the Department of Environmental Protection and

Energy (DEPE) to pay for these improvements.

Kratz expects construction to slow down traffic for a while. "With a project of this magnitude there will be periodic shut-downs." But he added that there would be sufficient alternative routes for residents and, because it is a local road, it would only affect local traffic.

Council will hold a public hearing to discuss the work on April 13.

A Message from the Board of Education

Dear Waldwick Resident,

Currently the Board of Education is carefully preparing the proposed 1993-94 school district budget which will be presented to the public in final form at the March 29 public hearing.

Community Input

To be sure the budget reflects the community's priorities, the Board established a formal review process involving all residents. On January 4 the public was invited to an Open Public Budget Forum. After spending three months evaluating budget proposals, the Citizens' Budget Committee recently submitted its recommendations to the Board. This broad-based committee included representatives from throughout the community.

A Responsive Budget

The proposed 1993-94 budget responds to parents' concerns about increased class sizes by providing additional instructional staff. Although this is a positive development, it is far from a complete answer to the continuing need to keep our graduates competitive in the changing world economy. This small beginning must be followed by a commitment to strengthen our educational programs whenever possible.

Improved Financial Picture

The financial outlook of our district has improved significantly. All of our recent labor contracts have been settled at 4.9% or less. These settlements, which are among the county's lowest, have helped us restore some prior educational cuts, including English and math teachers. Additionally, the Board will help ease the burden on the Waldwick taxpayer by using some of the funds in the surplus, or free balance, account to reduce the amount of money to be raised by taxes.

As we finalize the 1993-94 budget, we believe we have used good judgment in keeping a fair balance between our educational and fiscal responsibilities to Waldwick residents.

Please come to the March 29 public hearing to hear a complete budget presentation.

Cable stations a vehicle for future broadcasters

One of the guests on a recent edition of WJYD-TV's "Dater Dateline" was P.D., a springer spaniel who loves carrots. P.D. might seem an odd choice for a news program. Not at WJYD.

"We had a dog yesterday, too," one of the show's advisers, Mary Rose Campbell, said. "We get lots of dogs."

The "Dater Dateline" news show — produced by fourth- and fifth-graders at the Dater School in Ramsey and now in its 17th year — goes out live from the school cafeteria most mornings at 9 on the local cable channel.

Its distinctive lineup of news, weather, sports, and features — along with special guests leading The Pledge of Allegiance — is just one example of schools across North Jersey taking advantage of public-access cable television.

About 20 schools have broadcast capabilities in the TCI Cable viewing area, which includes towns ranging from Garfield to Wyckoff, said David Capo, TCI's public relations director.

Peter Cooper Elementary School in Ringwood does a weekly show. Waldwick High School has about three hours of public-access programming every month.

Vision Cable, which serves 14 towns largely in southeast Bergen, and Cable Vision, which serves towns in central and northern Bergen, also have local studios used by students, including those at Fair Lawn High School.

TCI Cable has transmitters in every town it serves. If a school can lock into one, the only thing it needs for broadcast is the \$2,700 modulator the company sells and services, Capo said. The company also has two public-access studios.

Dater's principal, Don Warnaar, sees educational value in such programs.

"Naturally, there's value in terms of children writing scripts and learning current events," he said. "But the real value that you almost can't measure is the teamwork and the pride that goes into it. It's very motivational. And they develop such poise and self-

confidence."

This is not to say that students enter a world of high-tech glamour through the shows.

Vision Cable's studio in Fair Lawn's Community School, for example, is far from plush. There's a swatch of fading blue rug that's losing its pile, and a few pieces of dying furniture. One of the incentives the cable company is offering Fair Lawn to secure renewal of its contract, borough sources say, is a new and improved studio.

Still, the spartan space is all television club adviser Arnold Zullo and his loyal band of students need to produce a weekly cable show, "Up Close with Fair Lawn High School."

The show is taped and unedited. Except for extreme goofs, such as one of the hosts, Ira Thor, swearing halfway through, the students get only one run-through.

"It's kind of like 'McLaughlin,'" said Zullo. "It's totally unrehearsed, unscripted."

The show sometimes focuses on student organizations — baseball, music, drama — but on a Wednesday recently there were three panelists, all members of the television club. "We're doing this show,"

Josh Hirsch explained, "because we couldn't find a guest." of being in front of the camera and being recognized in K Mart, they can't get enough," Zullo said.

At last the show began. First-time director Brian Peltzer got a chance to run through the beginning — fade in on camera 2, music up, roll the credits, and cut to camera 1 — before taping began. There were a few hairy moments when the camera stayed with a person who had stopped talking, but soon things were going pretty well in the control room.

In the studio, the panelists were whipping through topics. Ten minutes into the show, they had covered three. At 13½ minutes they were struggling to avoid what they knew they should. At 16½ they conceded the struggle.

"What do you think of the NCAAs?" Charlie Leone asked Ira, referring to the national college basketball tournament. "My own team, Seton Hall, got beat. Now . . . I'm going to pick George Washington or Michigan."

Zullo doesn't mind if the show wanders or stalls. It gives the students a chance at self-expression, he said.

The next morning, at studio WJYD-TV, the same spirit prevailed.

P.D., having spent the first seconds of fame sitting demurely at the side of his young master, Patrick Sullivan, suddenly bounded up and began to bark.

No matter. The show never had stopped for a pet, even one that had relieved himself on air, and P.D. wasn't about to deter them.

The show, the children know, must go on.

The panelists had a number of issues to discuss: the motor-voter bill, the assault weapons ban, docudramas, and the Oscars. They were to stay clear of sports — their favorite topic — as long as they could; it wasn't supposed to come up until the last five minutes of the half-hour show.

At the last minute, Zullo decided one of the panelists should be female. Julie Markman was the only girl there so she was plucked from behind her camera. She began frantically flipping through Time and Newsweek.

"Don't ask me any questions," she commanded. "If I have something to say I'll just say it."

Her addition meant one of the boys had to go. None would go gladly. "Once people have a taste

Senate proposal spurs Realtors to action

WALDWICK — Realtors from around the country recently united to convince the U.S. Senate Budget Committee to drop a proposal by Senator Jim Sasser (D-Tenn.) that would have eliminated certain deduc-

tions, including the deductions for mortgage interest and property taxes.

According to Georgia Strisik, president of the Northwest Bergen Board of Realtors, local board members bombarded

Senator Bill Bradley with calls, letters and faxes encouraging him and the Senate Budget Committee to drop the proposal.

"As Realtors, it is our responsibility to represent local

homeowners. And, on their behalf, we did our part to convince the Senate Budget Committee to continue treating mortgage interest as a tax deduction," she said.

"President Clinton's deficit reduction plan now recognizes the vital role that housing and commercial real estate are playing in sustaining the recovery, and it is sensitive to the importance of providing incentives for working Americans so they can invest in the homeownership dream," Strisik said.

She added that Sasser's

proposal to eliminate the mortgage interest deduction would have discouraged homeownership by hurting property values and property tax bases in a number of areas. "As Realtors, we're pleased that we were instrumental in having the proposal dropped. It's our job to be of service to homeowners in as many ways as we can. Because we're a closely-knit trade group on both the national and the local level, our voice is heard when we speak out to preserve property rights."

Complain about Waldwick sewage plant

Neighbors of the Waldwick sewage plant run by the Northwest Bergen County Utilities Authority have urged the agency's commissioners to clean up foul odors and be more neighborly in dealing with the public.

About 35 Waldwick and Ridgewood residents turned out Thursday to urge the commissioners to push for state approval of a scrubber system to remove the intermittent odors.

The commissioners, who plan to expand the plant's capacity, also got an earful from residents who accused them of being unresponsive in recent months to calls for a deodorizing system.

"We urge you to accept the challenge of becoming customer-focused," said Ken Gardner, a spokesman for the Waldwick Coalition for Clean Air.

Gardner also called on the authority to specify the timetable of its odor-control system, hire an engineering firm to test the effectiveness of the program, and create a residents council to promote dialogue.

Waldwick resident Cliff Koziowski said: "Let the community know what's going on and what you're doing for us. Be nice. I will not scream and holler. I will address you with the respect that I receive."

NBCUA Executive Director

Emil Porfido pledged that the authority would work closely with residents on the odor problem and said it always has tried hard to minimize the plant's impact on the area.

He also promised relief from most odors through a scrubber system that soon will be tested on a six-month basis, pending state approval.

Under that program, the NBCUA would place flat covers over tanks where sewage sludge is thickened and at other points in the plant. Scrubbers would then cleanse the air of noxious odors, which would be moved with an exhaust system.

"Once we have the system in place, there will be more controls to take care of the problem," Porfido said.

Last year, the state Department of Environmental Protection and Energy fined the authority \$4,000 for odor violations. The NBCUA is appealing.

State regulators also rejected an NBCUA application to control odors by spraying a chemical mist over open channels and treatment tanks. The DEPE urged use of a state-of-the-art system.

Residents want the authority to install a system before expanding the plant capacity from 9.5 million gallons a day to 11.5 million gallons.

It was not made clear that there is a distinction between nurse-midwives and lay midwives. Lay midwives cannot get doctor backup so they must act illicitly.

In Tennessee, at a place called The Farm, all births are attended by self-taught midwives and delivered at home. They have better infant and maternal mortality statistics than any hospital. I think you should give equal coverage to how many babies and mothers die in hospitals with doctors attending, if you can get the information.

Unfortunately, for a woman to have a natural birth experience at home, we must turn to lay midwives. Perhaps if more people had the courage of those two couples we would be able to have doctor backup for home births. In any event, I applaud their courage and pray for them.

The act of donating blood stimulates the body to produce new healthy blood cells. After

giving blood, each donor will receive a card with his or her blood type on it, which can be kept in case of emergency.

Each pint of donated blood is processed by the Blood Center Laboratory into three different blood products. Thus, a single blood donor can help save lives of three different hospital patients.

Anyone in general good health, age 17 through 75, and weighing at least 110 pounds can usually donate blood.

BOE's budget approved

CBC endorses plan and urges public to support it April 20

WALDWICK — Board of Education President Paul Cottrell put two questions to Waldwick citizens at the March 29 budget hearing, "Does this budget advance education?" And, "Is this budget financially responsible?"

Cottrell maintained that the 1993-94 proposed budget was a

yes on both counts.

Ken Gardner, co-chairman of the Citizens Budget Committee (CBC), agreed with Cottrell and urged the people of Waldwick to support the budget on April 20.

"We (CBC) feel this proposed budget will meet the needs of our children, without creating an excessive drain on our pocket books," Gardner stated.

The \$13.3 million 1993-94

proposed budget would add \$126 to the average homeowner's tax assessment. This would be a 3.85 percent increase over last year's budget.

This budget would allow the board to restore three full-time and one part-time teaching positions to the schools.

Budget defeats in the past three years have resulted in the Waldwick Borough Council cutting the board's budget by a total of \$600,000.

These defeats have forced the board to cut teachers and this has led to increased class sizes.

Several parents have claimed that the large class sizes have hurt their children's education. At present, six academic classes have over 30 students.

But not all residents want the tax increase. Donald Cannon of Tamaron Drive said, "There are myths that have been perpetrated for years in the publications of the board. Myth number one: There is an anti-education mood in Waldwick. Myth number two: Waldwick education suffers because of

budget defeats. Let me tell you the truth. Waldwick is caught between questionable expenditures and costly teacher settlements. Waldwick schools received, despite the defeat, almost 99 percent of the proposed budget. My advice is to stop blaming the community."

Robert Feldman, a member of Concerned Taxpayers of Waldwick, is concerned about the budget's impact on senior citizens. He said, "It (the budget) affects a lot of people on fixed incomes. They can't pay for their own."

Pat Kehrberger of Barnes Drive supports the budget. "Although it (budget) doesn't advance education as much as I like, this budget does restore some of the cuts. I'm very happy to see this. I urge everyone to support it."

The proposed budget would raise the homeowner tax assessment from \$1.61 to \$1.68 per \$100 of assessed value. That would amount to a \$126 increase for the owner of a \$180,000 house.

Parity will be the by-word for the season, with many teams considered to be early favorites finding themselves held back by the inability to prepare for the season outdoors.

Last spring's All-Suburban teams were senior-dominated, and only five first-team selections return this year. Throw in the fact that the two state championship teams from the area were hit hard by graduation, and pre-season picking is difficult at best.

State defending Group 1 champion Emerson boasts two

of the five allstars in juniors Armen Simonian and centerfielder Damon Giaritta. Simonian was 10-3 last year with a 2.30 earned run average and 87 strikeouts in 82 innings, while Giaritta was a .437 hitter with 22 stolen bases and 45 hits.

Senior shortstop Mark De-Rosa leads a Bergen Catholic team that will again be a strong contender with 12 returning lettermen. He will also see some pitching duty. He was 3-1 last year and allowed only 1 earned run in 26 innings. A duplication of his .402 average and 27 runs batted in will be essential to the Crusader cause.

Hawthorne's mound staff was one of the best last season, and Tom Fleming returns this season to try to wrest the Group 1 laurels from Emerson. He

went 8-1 last season with a 1.01 earned run average and 92 strikeouts in 58 innings and had a .367 batting average. The

Sewer plant compromise

NBCUA will submit plans, but not formal site plan application

WALDWICK — Waldwick and the Northwest Bergen County Utilities Authority (NBCUA) continue to lock horns over the planned Phase II expansion of the sewage treatment plant off Wyckoff Avenue.

The Waldwick Planning Board wanted the NBCUA to submit a formal site plan application, detailing the expansion

work. The authority however, claimed that they were not required to show a site plan to Waldwick.

At present, the two parties have reached a tentative compromise. The NBCUA is meeting with the board and showing them plans, though they will not make a formal site plan application.

Mayor Rick Vander Wende feels that this compromise is in

Waldwick's best interests. He wants to keep dialogue open so that Waldwick can have as much input as possible.

But Councilman James Gibson is skeptical of the authority's concession. "Where's the power," he asked? "We're at the same point we were before. They can do anything they please."

At the last board meeting, the NBCUA gave a detailed account of the planned expansion. This account dealt, to a large extent, with odor control.

Odor emanating from the plant has plagued Waldwick

residents for years. Numerous residents have demanded that the authority purchase odor fighting devices.

The new odor fighting devices will include scrubbers, a chemical misting system and aluminum covers that will be placed over the sewage tanks.

Jack Goldberg, NBCUA representative, indicated that the misting system will actually clean the air. Many misting systems only mask the odor. "What's being discharged is treated air," he said.

Ken Gardner, a member of Waldwick Coalition for Clean Air, wants the NBCUA to hire a third-party engineering firm to examine the new odor fighting devices. "If the authority is willing to work with the residents and the borough, it is realistic to have an operating odor control system working within a few months," he said.

Emil Porfido, NBCUA Executive Director, did not deny the presence of odor. Porfido, however, feels that Waldwick's odor problems pale in comparison to other towns. "I can honestly tell you that I've never visited a plant that has less odor," he said.

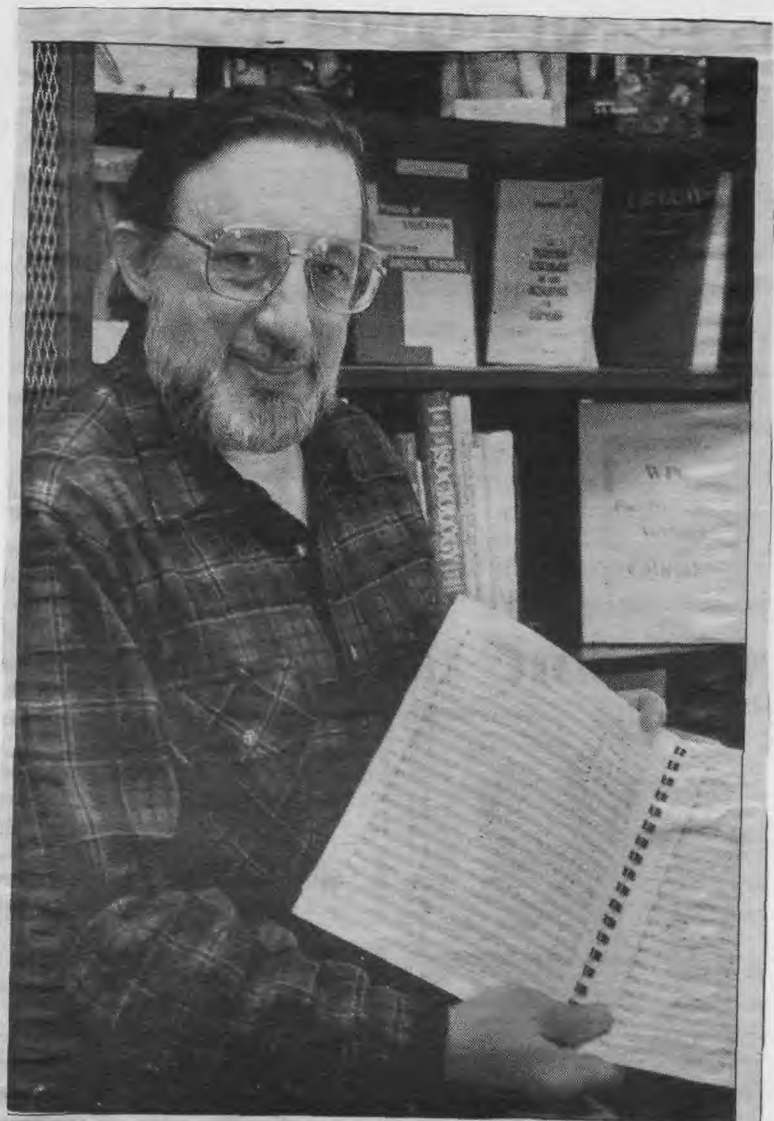

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Waldwick that the agreement entitled "Three Year" Cooperative Agreement: "An Agreement Superseding the Cooperative Agreement Dated May 1990 and amendments thereto for the Purpose of Inserting a Description of Activities for the Twentieth Year (July 1, 1994 - June 30, 1997) Urban County Community Development Block Grant Program", to Clarify the planning and implementation procedures, and to enable the Municipality to make a Three Year irrevocable commitment to participate in the Community Development Program for the Program Years, 1994, 1995, and 1996 (July 1, 1994 - June 30, 1997) be executed by the Mayor and Municipal Clerk in accordance with the provisions of law; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that this Ordinance shall take effect upon final passage and publication in accordance with law.

A fairer way to fund teacher pensions

Columnist Steve Adubato's recent attack on using state funds for teachers' retirement benefits couldn't be more wrong-headed.

The worst problem in public education is the property tax. Property taxes are regressive. They place the most heavy burden on our poorest people. They deny adequate education to many of our children. And they set the old against the young. We will never have

equal education until we find a better way to share the cost.

By pushing for income tax funding of teachers' retirement, the New Jersey Education Association gives support to poor people who struggle to keep up their homes. And teachers will pay their share of income tax dollars to support their own retirement. What is wrong with a labor organization that wants to shift tax burdens from our poorest people toward our more affluent? What is

wrong with teachers who will contribute more dollars from their own pockets to make up for those dollars left in the pockets of the poor?

A state income tax is based on the ability of a person to produce wealth rather than on the false assumption that owning a home means wealth. As long as taxes are necessary it is important that we choose the fairest levy.

Snow is blamed in tax increase

Waldwick cites cleanup costs

WALDWICK — Weekend snowstorms early this year and a lower rate of tax collection than anticipated last year are two of the primary culprits for the 6-cent increase in the tax rate to support the proposed 1993 municipal budget, borough officials say.

"It always seemed to snow on weekends when overtime was involved," lamented Councilman Joseph Musumeci at the budget's recent unveiling.

The \$7.9 million budget represents a 6 percent spending increase from last year, but the share paid by taxpayers would increase by about 13 percent.

For the owner of a \$180,000 house, the borough average, the municipal tax burden would rise by \$106.20, from \$867.60 to \$973.80.

Of the 5.9-cent increase in the tax rate for municipal purposes, 3 cents is from the 0.3 percent tax

collection shortfall, 0.5 cents is from snow removal costs, 0.5 cents is from rising health insurance costs, and 1 cent is from a loss in franchise gross receipts. "There's 5 cents right there," said Borough Administrator Gary Kratz.

The Borough Council has also introduced a \$700,000 capital budget for 1993. The biggest capital improvement item is the reconstruction of Waldwick Avenue at a cost of \$420,000. The Waldwick Avenue improvements have already been approved, but a public hearing on the rest of the proposed capital expenditures is scheduled for April 27.

The capital budget also would fund the purchase of a new garbage truck and a new dump truck, as well as police station improvements, tennis court rehabilitation, and the design of a new community center.

A public hearing on the municipal budget has been set for May 11 in the Council Chambers.

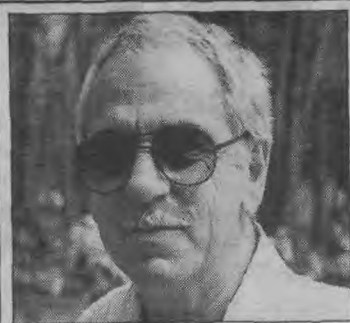

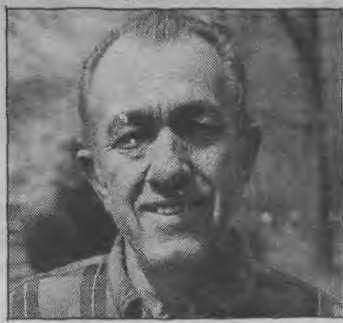

Waldwick presents \$7.8M budget

WALDWICK — The borough council has introduced a \$7.8 million budget that would raise property taxes 12.2 percent.

The \$7,888,072 budget for 1993 represents a 6 percent increase over last year's \$7.43 million spending plan. For the owner of a \$180,000 home, the borough average, taxes for municipal purposes would rise

\$106.20.

The budget will be considered for final approval at a public hearing May 11.

Nearly half the increase is due to a 50 percent jump in the reserve fund for uncollected taxes. Borough Administrator Gary Kratz said tax collections were lower than expected last year.

In addition, health insurance

for borough employees is expected to rise \$40,000 and snow removal costs jumped \$50,000, Kratz said.

A \$709,000 capital budget features \$420,000 to renovate Waldwick Avenue. Other capital items include a new garbage truck for recycling, street repaving, resurfacing of tennis courts, and design work on a planned community center.

Voters OK school budget

Piegari credits CBC for helping proposed levy pass

WALDWICK — The Walldwick Board of Education 1993-94 budget passed by a vote of 784 to 587 on April 20. This was the first time in four years that voters approved the school budget.

The past three budget defeats had forced the board to cut teaching positions and increase class sizes.

This budget will allow the board to restore three full-time and one part-time teaching positions.

Patrick Piegari, superintendent, was worried about voter turnout, because it was a school vacation week. "I was concerned parents would forget to vote or they would be out of town," he said.

The board was concerned because of the opposition to the budget voiced at several public

budget hearings. Despite support from numerous residents, others had criticized the board's policies and denounced the budget.

But the need for quality education overcame opposition, according to Piegari. "There was a concern on the part of the community about class sizes. The parent school organizations played an active role in making parents aware of the class size issue. Also the increase was a responsible one."

Piegari credits the Citizens Budget Committee (CBC) for helping the budget pass. Their

endorsement at the final budget hearing played a positive role, according to Piegari. "Their (CBC's) support was independent of the board. They worked for four months reviewing the budget. That group played a very important role."

Cynthia Rice, board vice president, also feels that the CBC's support played a crucial role. "It think it really made a difference. It wasn't just the trustees (supporting the budget). They went above and beyond what their task was," she said.

Paul Cottrell, board president, believes that greater citizen input in the budget process made the difference this year. "There has been an effort to get more of the town's people involved in committees. All of these (committees) have provided a magnet for people to get involved," he said.

Rice feels that this budget is a step forward for Walldwick. "It will be positive because there are additions to curriculum." She also indicated that this budget will help improve the physical quality of the school buildings.

The \$13.3 million budget will add \$126 to the average homeowner's tax assessment. This is a 3.85 percent increase over last year.

Russell Litchult and incumbent Richard Langheim won the two uncontested three-year seats in the board election. This will be Langheim's third term. Litchult had previously served on Walldwick Borough Council for 21 years.

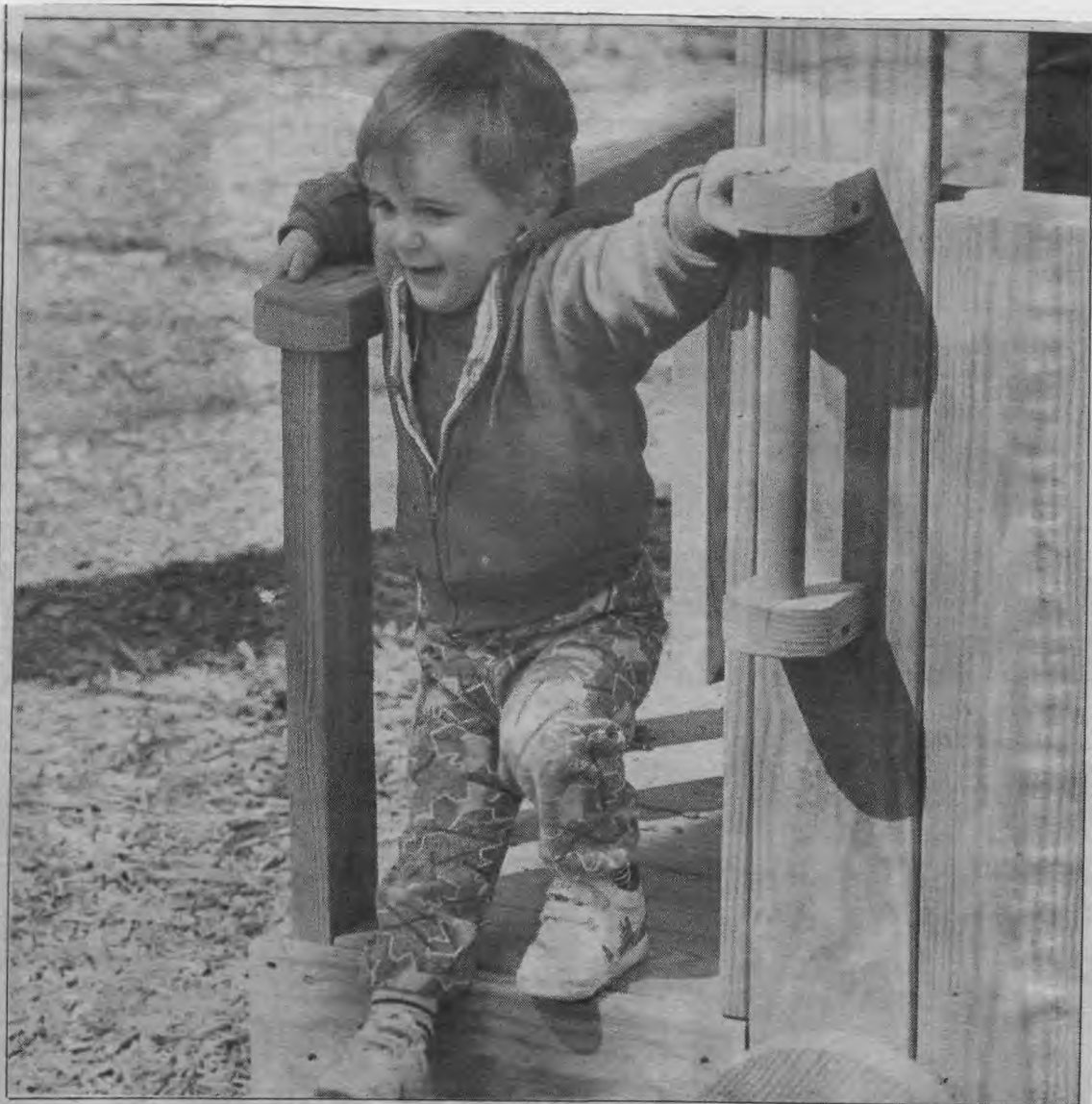

Sewerage agency aims to clear the air

Stung by criticism from its Waldwick neighbors, the Northwest Bergen County Utilities Authority is reaching out to residents to describe its effort to control intermittent sewage odors.

The NBCUA, in a letter sent to the residents, replies to criticisms raised at an April 1 meeting by the Waldwick Coalition for Clean Air, which said that commissioners were unresponsive and were moving too slowly on installing a deodorizing system.

"We did this in answer to people around the plant saying that they did not know how they

could get in touch with the authority," said Executive Director Emil Porfido. "We think we have answered their concerns."

NBCUA commissioners are seeking state approval of a six-month trial for a scrubber system to remove odors at its treatment plant. At the meeting, the coalition urged commissioners to outline a timetable for the system, hire an outside company to test its effectiveness, and create a residents council.

Coalition spokesman Ken Gardner said he is glad that commissioners are moving on an odor system but said the pace is too slow. He is also disappointed

that commissioners don't want a residents council.

"We're very happy with the direction of the authority, but it just seems that there is no sense of urgency," Gardner said. "If they're really interested in reaching and responding to us, they would set up a council."

"We want to deal outside the formal processes of commission meetings so that we can informally come to agreement on problems," he said.

Porfido said commissioners believe that monthly authority meetings are a more efficient way for residents to air their grievances.

"It's the feeling of the commissioners that to operate separately from the full commission only causes confusion and delays," he said. "It's much better if anybody has a concern that they come directly to the meeting."

In separate mailings to residents and coalition members, Porfido described NBCUA's plans to cover outdoor sewage sludge tanks and remove odors with a scrubbing system at the tanks and two buildings.

The covers should be in place by October and a scrubber contract should be awarded by August, he said. Scrubbers should

start working six to eight months later. And an experienced air-quality laboratory would test the three scrubbers to ensure that they remove foul-smelling hydrogen sulfide, he said.

The letters also touted improvements that the NBCUA has made in recent years, including reducing nighttime glare from lights, replacing a chlorine disinfection system with an ultraviolet one, and building a new entrance road.

Porfido also invited coalition members to tour the facilities, which commissioners want to expand. The NBCUA is seeking state funding for a \$14 million expansion of its plant capacity from 9.5 million gallons a day to 11.5 million gallons.

BACKYARD DANGER

Old systems often collapse

Gerhard and Jeanette Oehrlich of Waldwick count themselves lucky.

The ground in their back yard did not cave in while Gerhard Oehrlich was mowing the lawn last week. And it didn't wait until their five grandchildren come to visit next month.

Nor did the 8-foot-deep pit devour their beloved dog, Sammy, the first to notice the hole Tuesday evening.

"You hear about these things happening to other people," said Gerhard Oehrlich, referring to Saturday's tragedy in North Brunswick, where the a 7-year-old boy was killed after falling into a sinkhole. "But you never think it's going to happen in your own yard."

David Zuidema, a Midland Park contractor specializing in septic systems, said it happens to a lot of northwest Bergen County residents who live in towns that converted to sewers in the late 1960s. He said he gets a call like the Oehrlichs' about once a month.

"No one is looking into it," he said.

Bruce Bailey Jr., Bergen County's senior sanitary inspector, said it is up to municipal plumbing inspectors to make sure that when homes are hooked up to sewers, old septic systems are pumped out and filled in.

Zuidema said residents of Midland Park, Ho-Ho-Kus, Allendale, Waldwick, and parts of Wyckoff and Ramsey are vulnerable to septic system collapses.

Although the regulations governing the proper disposal of abandoned septic systems were tightened in the early 1980s, Zuidema said many back-yard systems slipped through the cracks, and he issued a warning to residents and home buyers.

"If you see part of your yard inexplicably sinking, call the

town health official," he said.

Waldwick Borough Administrator Gary Kratz agreed, advising residents to alert town officials if they find depressions in their lawns. He said officials would inspect the problem.

"The responsibility falls on the resident," Kratz said. "The borough's responsibility for the sewers starts and ends at the curb line."

Zuidema said old septic tanks can be anywhere, on the fronts, sides, or back yards of properties. Very old houses can have multiple septic tanks; he has seen as many as four.

About 5 feet across the Oehrlichs' yard was another depression in the ground. Zuidema's inspection with a pole proved that it was another hollow area, about 8 to 10 feet deep and waiting to collapse. He was filling it in Wednesday afternoon, along with the first hole, which was approximately 4 by 6 feet across, and 8 feet deep.

The cost to fill the two holes will be about \$2,000, said Jeanette Oehrlich.

The abandoned septic tank on the Oehrlichs' property was cov-

ered with a piece of wood with concrete on top. Damp ground rotted the wood, and the structure collapsed.

Zuidema said system collapses may increase this year because of heavy rainfall, which contributes to the rotting of underground structures.

He said he knew of no serious injuries that have resulted from the collapse of abandoned septic systems. But the possibility exists, he said: A family in Oakland had the good sense to fill its abandoned septic tank before erecting a swimming pool in the yard.

"Can you imagine, with the weight of the water and a little kid swimming around?" said Zuidema. "It would be like a whirlpool."

In North Arlington, two abandoned copper mine shafts collapsed in late 1989, consuming portions of two yards in the southeast corner of the borough. No one was injured, but the incidents triggered a lengthy search-and-fill process that is likely to continue for another year.

Geologists have identified a total of 33 shafts in a 19-acre area, and 13 of the shafts still need repairs.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 16-91 FIXING THE COMPENSATION, SALARIES AND WAGES OF OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES OF THE BOROUGH OF WALDWICK

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Waldwick, in the County of Bergen and State of New Jersey, as follows:

ARTICLE I

Mayor and Council

Sec. 1: Annual Salary for Mayor: payment periods.

A salary of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) per year, payable in equal quarterly installments with the first payroll in March, June, September and last payroll in November shall be paid to the Mayor of the Borough of Waldwick.

Sec. 2: Annual Salary for Councilmen: payment periods.

A salary of One Thousand Four Hundred Ninety Nine Dollars (\$1,499) per year, payable in equal quarterly installments with the first payroll in March, June, September and last payroll in November shall be paid to each Councilman of the Borough of Waldwick.

ARTICLE II

Officials and Employees

Sec. 3: Compensation for Borough Attorney, Prosecutor, Engineer and Auditor

The compensation to be paid to the Borough Attorney, Prosecutor, Borough Engineer and the Borough Auditor shall be fees which shall be paid upon presentation of vouchers properly sworn or certified to as required by law. The official position is without salary. Compensation is paid for professional services as outlined above.

Sec. 4: Annual salaries for other officials and employees.

A. For the purpose of fixing salary ranges, the annual salary ranges for certain positions in the Borough are as follows: payable in 26 equal installments, with each installment to be paid every other Friday starting January 8, 1993 except as otherwise noted.

BASE SALARY - For calculation of longevity payments, that salary established by resolution of the Mayor and Council falling between the range established in Sec. 4 for each title, exclusive of overtime, extra payments for college credits, extra payments for other duties and longevity.

LONGEVITY YEAR - For employees first appointed in an eligible position between January 1 and June 30, the first longevity year shall end on December 31 following such appointment. The second longevity year, and each succeeding longevity year thereafter, shall begin on January 1 and end December 31. For employees first appointed in an eligible position between July 1 and December 31, the first longevity year shall end on June 30 following such appointment. The second longevity year and each succeeding year shall begin on July 1 and end on June 30 during continuous service.

A. In addition to the compensation as provided for in Article II, Section 4, longevity payments shall be made to eligible employees. The amount of such longevity payments to be calculated as follows: One per centum (1%) of each eligible employee's base salary payable in the fifth longevity year; during the sixth and each succeeding longevity year thereafter, longevity payments shall be increased at the rate of three eighths of one percent (3.75%) of the eligible employee's base salary to a maximum of eight and a half percent (8.5%). Police personnel covered in the labor agreement between the Waldwick PBA Local 217 and the Borough of Waldwick shall be paid at rates as established in the agreement.

B. Longevity payments shall be made in installments which shall coincide with the payment of base salary upon which the longevity payment is calculated and shall become a part of the regular salary.

C. Payment in advance for vacation time.

In order to secure payment in advance for vacation time, employees are required to make such request in writing to the Borough Clerk no less than two pay periods in advance of the pay period for which payment is desired.

Sec. 7.1 Additional compensation for higher education.

A. Shall be paid to employees in accordance with agreement with P.B.A. Local 217, plus Chief of Police.

B. Payments of such additional salary shall be made in installments which shall coincide with the payments of base salary and become part of the regular salary, and shall commence upon presentation to the Committee Chairman of the Borough Council of a proper certification from the institution attended by said employees setting forth the number of credit hours successfully completed.

Sec. 7.2 Police Department - Additional compensation for special duties.

In addition to the compensation named in Sec. 4A (10) the officer named Detective will receive an additional \$500 per year, payable with the first payroll in June and the last payroll in November.

Sec. 7.3 Additional compensation for employees covered by agreement with Waldwick Public Works Employment Association.

A. Definition - For the purpose of this section, the terms used herein are defined as follows: STANDBY TIME - Being available for emergency which may arise over and beyond the employee's normal weekly working period.

B. Employees assigned to standby shall be paid an additional \$151.87 per week while on standby.

Sec. 8 Repealer

All other ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith be and the same hereby are repealed.

Sec. 9 Commencement Date

This ordinance shall be effective and upon passage of a salary resolution unless otherwise noted herein.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Waldwick, in the County of Bergen, State of New Jersey, as follows:

Section 1. The Borough of Waldwick, in the County of Bergen, State of New Jersey (the "Borough") is hereby authorized to make various public improvements and to acquire new additional or replacement equipment and machinery, a new automotive vehicle, including original apparatus and equipment, and new communication and signal systems equipment in, by and for said Borough, as more particularly described in Section 4 hereof. Said improvements and acquisitions shall include all work, materials and appurtenances necessary and suitable therefor.

Section 2. There is hereby appropriated to the payment of the cost of making the improvements and acquisitions described in Sections 1 and 4 hereof (hereinafter referred to as "purposes"), the respective amounts of money hereinafter stated as the appropriation for said respective purposes. Said appropriation shall be met from the proceeds of the sale of the bonds authorized and the down payment appropriated by this ordinance. Said improvements and acquisitions shall be made as general improvements and no part of the cost thereof shall be assessed against property specially benefited.

Section 3. It is hereby determined and stated that the making of such improvements and acquisitions is not a current expense of said Borough.

To finance said purposes, bond anticipation notes of said Borough of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$304,855 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Bond Law in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of notes hereby authorized to be issued shall be reduced by an amount equal to the principal amount of the bonds so issued. Section 5. Section 10 of Ordinance No. 6-92 is hereby amended to decrease the average period of usefulness of the purposes authorized by said ordinance from 15.70 to 15.46 years computed from the date of said bonds, and shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 10. It is hereby determined and declared that the average period of usefulness of said purposes, according to their reasonable lives, taking into consideration the respective amounts of bonds or notes authorized for said purposes, is a period of 15.46 years computed from the date of said bonds."

Section 6. Section 11 of Ordinance No. 6-92 is hereby amended to increase the gross debt of said Borough shown on the Supplemental Debt Statements filed for this ordinance, as amended, from \$298,205 to \$304,855, and shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Borough Clerk of said Borough, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Borough, as defined in Section 43 of the Local Bond Law, is increased by this ordinance by \$304,855 and that the issuance of the bonds and notes authorized by this ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law."

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect twenty days after the first publication thereof after final passage.

Women were responsible for two-thirds of the growth in New Jersey's work force during the Eighties, and they could have a similar impact on management by the turn of the century.

The winner, says one observer, will be American business and the U.S. economy.

"Male leaders of business today have isolated themselves in all-male enclaves," author Patricia Aburdene said at a recent conference of the New Jersey Association of Women Business Owners, or NJAWBO, in Woodcliff Lake. "The boardroom is in desperate need of new ideas."

New ideas, along with new management styles, are behind many of the companies that have been started and run by North Jersey women in recent years. Nevertheless, an old idea — making a profit — remains the No. 1 goal for these female entrepreneurs, as it does for male business owners.

Of almost equal importance in developing their companies, they say, is the ability to balance work and family.

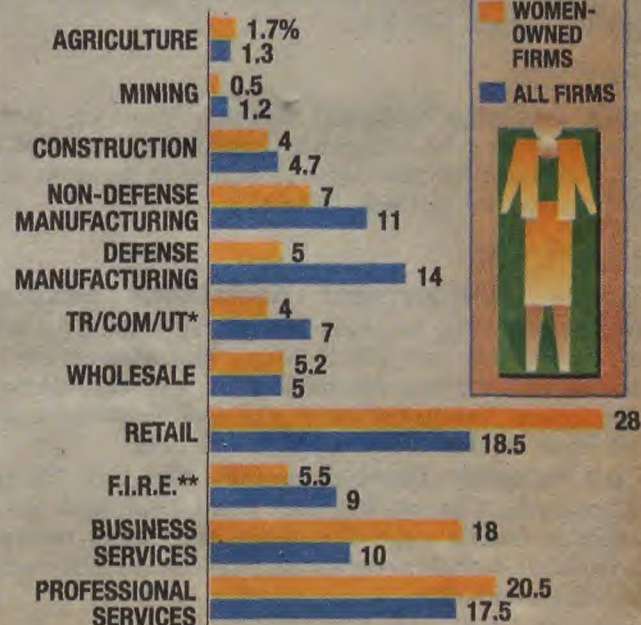
"Having my own business gave me flexibility I didn't have when working for someone else," said Pat Valentine Ziv of Ridgewood, who in 1983 founded PVZ Space Plan & Design, an interior design firm.

"When I worked for someone else and the kids were younger and had plays in schools, I couldn't go," she said. With her own business, she builds her work schedule to accommodate family needs, such as plays or trips to the doctor.

Similar reasons led Bernadette Tiernan in 1986 to start Tiernan Associates, a human-resources management consulting firm in Ridgewood.

Tiernan had been in a fast-track management program at AT&T, with live-in help to care for her young children, but she started her own small business so she could play a larger role in raising her children.

Flexibility is the key, said Sharon Hadary, executive director of the Washington-based National Foundation for Women Business Owners. "We're not suggesting that they're not working a lot of hours," she said. "But they want control over their time."

The balancing act can be difficult, Tiernan said.

"Women go into business with more extraneous responsibilities," she said. "They are still preoccupied with care of the children. Travel is more difficult. Men have less to distract them."

Balancing work and family is just one reason they start businesses, the women say. Most are also seeking the same rewards that men have sought for generations: money, job satisfaction, and control over their destinies.

Ziv, for example, said she wanted to see her designs carried through and to get credit for her work. ("I really felt I could do things others wouldn't let me do.")

An entrepreneurial spirit drove Suzanne and Donald Sykes to start Marpac Industries Inc., which manufactures custom-made plastic containers. The Waldwick couple combined her managerial skills and his creativity to develop a company with more than \$7 million in business and 70 employees.

Hadary said: "Women are leaving large corporations not only because they are bumping against the glass ceiling; they are seeing the glass ceiling and asking, 'Why stay around?' If they want to lead an organization, they see the opportunity with their own organization."

"Many of the women have a passion for thinking they can do something better than someone else. They saw a need that they had which was not being fulfilled. They figured, if they had a need, others would, too. They found market niches related to their own needs, products, and services."

A consensus among women business owners is that their management styles differ from those of their male counterparts. However, there is no good, hard data to support that viewpoint, said Hadary, who is also an adjunct professor of business at the University of Maryland and Georgetown University.

"There are a lot of people who would like to tell you they [men

and women managers] are different," she said, "but there is very little hard research into this. There is a belief that women are different, and women believe they are different, so it doesn't matter if they are. They believe they are."

Hadary is one of those believers. "Women take a much more holistic approach to management," she said. "They are individuals who come to business seeking to fulfill an economic need, but they're not leaving family and personal needs at the door."

"Men and women have the same values for their business — growth and the bottom line — but the order in which those values are expressed is different. Men value growth as a signal of success; women value the relationships they build through the business. They feel that if they run the business well, success will come."

Women-run businesses, she said, are not likely to grow as fast as those run by men, but they also are less likely to fail.

One reason for a more conservative approach, Hadary said, could be that women have less access to capital or perceive that they can't get capital. This limits their ability to grow. Also, they don't want to lose control of their businesses.

Tiernan, who does career counseling with both men and women, said some of the differences may be more generational than gender-related.

"With women, I see more of an ability to nurture longer and more concern about individuals," she said. "However, guys who have kids can relate to employees who have kids. Entrepreneurs who

have working wives can understand [the balancing problems] more than those with wives at home catering to them all the time."

"Traits that help people to success — brilliance, ability to conceive of an idea and build on it — cross the sexes. Ones that do very well have the ability to focus, to set goals and figure out how to get there without being sidetracked."

"Women are still preoccupied with care of the children, the home. Men's issues are not the same, but there could be other distractions."

Ziv says one difference between the sexes is the greater camaraderie among women.

"They work as part of a team," she said. "They don't worry about sharing information. I find that we're very supportive and look forward to the success of everyone. I don't find that in mixed groups or in men's groups."

Tiernan, who is president of the association's Bergen County chapter, said female business owners have worked to help each other, both directly and through professional groups. "These alliances have helped us keep our heads above water during the recession," she said.

"At the NJAWBO conference, I made a number of business connections that were terrific," she said. As a result, she and others women owners will form "virtual corporations" — loose alliances that will allow them to pursue bigger clients.

The caring-and-sharing approach could be a key to women's success in the business world,

Aburdene said. "The military-industrial approach to management doesn't work anymore. No more can leadership consist of issuing orders."

The growth in female-owned businesses has been slow and steady — and it has been a winning formula.

While members of the Fortune 500 have been cutting back, businesses owned by women have been growing steadily to the point where, as evidenced by research by the National Foundation of Women Business Owners, they now employ about 12 million people. That's more than the entire Fortune 500.

Although the overall work force in Bergen County dropped from 454,000 to 417,100 between 1990 and 1992, employment in the service segment held almost even and, last year, grew by 3.8 percent. In Passaic County, the story was similar, with services overcoming an overall drop from 195,800 to 181,400.

Aburdene — who co-wrote "Megatrends," "Megatrends 2000," and "Megatrends for Women" with her husband, John Naisbitt — says these entrepreneurial women from the baby-boomer generation are ready to turn corporate America on its ear.

"The time for women to embrace their power has arrived," she said. "This is the first generation of women with lifelong careers — and they're about to move into power positions. They came into business in the Seventies and polished their skills in the Eighties."

"The next phase is to shift from liberation to leadership."

Waldwick to join 911 net

Shared service will save borough money over creating its own emergency link

WALDWICK — Beginning in January 1994 Waldwick will be employing 911 emergency services. The borough will be joining at least four other towns in the use of this service.

Sharing this state-mandated service with other towns will save Waldwick money. For the first year the borough will pay \$9,757.

This figure is based on \$1 per resident. After the first year the cost will be based on use during the previous year.

Gary Kratz, borough administrator, explained that it would cost Waldwick at least \$80,000 to run its own service.

Running a separate service would force the borough to hire at least three trained dispatchers and purchase a computer system.

Employing 911 will also save the police time. At present, when an emergency call comes into the police, their line becomes tied up.

With 911, a central dispatcher will handle the call while a police officer is enroute to the scene.

Councilman Joseph Musumeci feels that the service will be very helpful to emergency victims. "911 will be funneled through a central dispatch. He (dispatcher) will walk a person through an emergency

situation," he said.

Another advantage of this service is that the computer system will register the caller's name, address and phone number upon receiving the call.

The dispatch office will be located in Ridgewood. Waldwick will be joining Glen Rock, Midland Park, Ridgewood and Oakland in setting up this service.

At present, Oakland has its own 911 operation, but to cut costs they have decided to join the other towns.

By the time the shared operation is set up, Waldwick expects a total of 13 towns to be sharing.

Musumeci added, "It would be a lot more economical to join them (other towns). It's the right move for the borough."

Waldwick will share 911 on a one-year trial basis. After the first year, the Waldwick Borough Council could elect to set up a separate service.

Jump in school taxes

WALDWICK — Residents will see a 4.3 percent jump in taxes for school purposes after voters approved the school district's budget for the first time in four years.

Also, winning uncontested races for three-year terms on the board of education were former Councilman Russell Litchult and board incumbent Richard Langheim.

The \$11,319,613 tax levy backed by voters will suport a \$13.3 million budget for 1993-94, a 3.9 percent jump over this year's \$12.8 million account.

The property tax rate will rise to \$1.68 per \$100 in assessed

valuation from the current \$1.61. The owner of a \$1,800,000 home in the borough will pay an extra \$126 a year in taxes for school purposes.

The budget provides for the hiring of additional teachers to relieve overcrowded classrooms. School officials say three straight budget defeats led to staff cutbacks, sparking complaints from parents. This year, the Concerned Taxpayers of Waldwick, which vehemently opposed past budgets, did not campaign against the new spending plan.

The budget was approved by a tally of 784 to 587, as 25 percent of the borough's 5,443 registered voters cast ballots.

Even after decades of invaluable life experiences, Mulvaney seems to have an insatiable desire for knowledge. But the opportunity to continue his education after high school never seemed to materialize.

Fresh out of high school, he landed a job in 1942 fixing telephones and teletypes for the communications department of a railroad. The job was short-lived, however, since three months later he was called to serve in World War II. Mulvaney was stationed in several areas of Europe for three years until the war ended.

"When I came home, I went back to the railroad," he recalled. "The job was good. I decided to give it all I had. Eventually, I got married in 1950 and had a family. Then, well, we had to bring them up and their education came first."

Then it was Marion's turn. "(She) went back to school and got her degree in nursing," he explained with pride.

Finally, it was his turn.

After retiring, Mulvaney enrolled parttime in Bergen Community College in Paramus in 1988. At that point, there was no stopping him.

"The more I got into it, the more I liked it and the more I wanted to find out more," he said. "When I finished Bergen, I decided to give it a whirl."

At Bergen, he took all his required courses; at Ramapo, he signed up for the courses that interested him.

"I was always fascinated with politics — I found that the most interesting road. I got my information from reading newspapers but that wasn't in-depth. Having served in Europe also sparked an interest," he continued.

"During the war I met several Russian soldiers and became interested in the Soviet government. The Cold War — that fascinated me. I wanted to know what were these people doing, what were they thinking. I just have a desire to find out things."

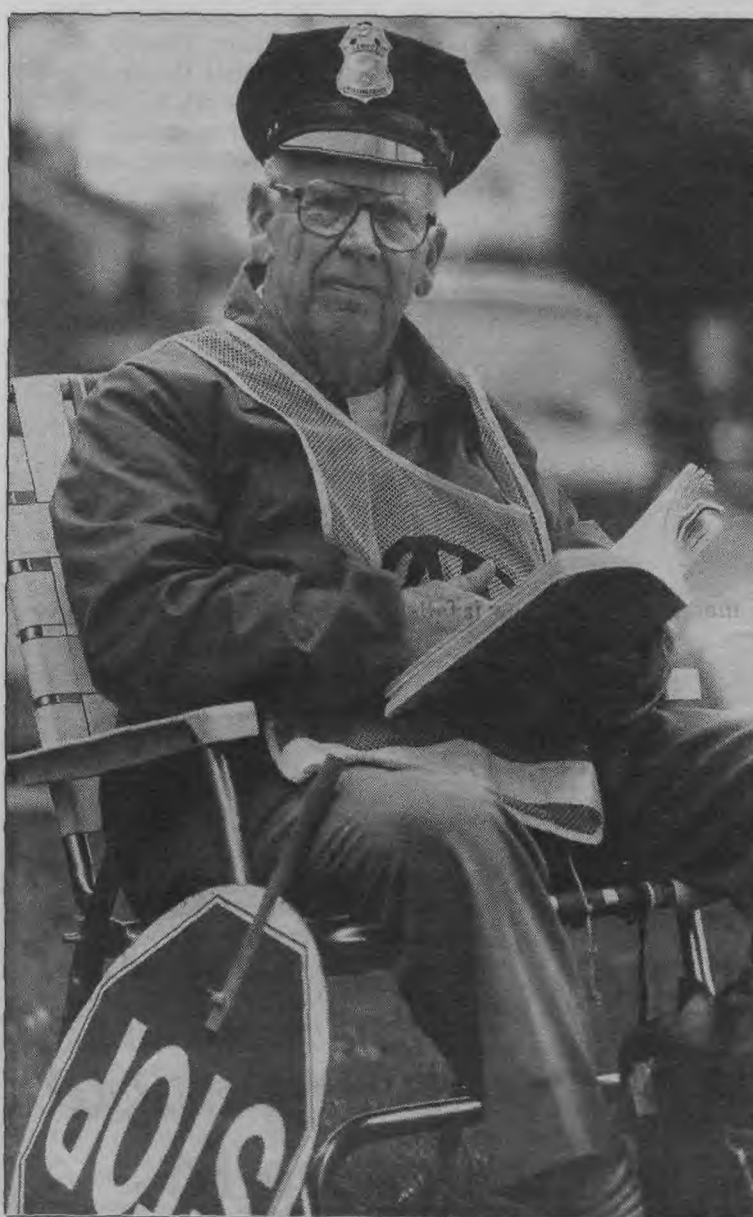
One of his favorite courses was a class on Vietnam.

"That changed my whole outlook on Vietnam. Before I wondered why we spent so much time there and didn't win. Having served in World War II, that was a logical question. But I learned our boys couldn't do anything."

Mulvaney mused about being the oldest student — and sometimes the oldest teacher — in the class.

"Most of the time I'm older than the teacher," he said. "It's very good to be with young people. The majority of them are willing to listen to people like me who have practical experience. Sure, they kid me a lot, but they were great kids."

The teacher would say something. The kids are learning

about it, but I lived it."

He doesn't have a job lined up and doesn't plan to attend graduate school. "But that doesn't mean I wouldn't go back and take more courses," he said.

It may have taken Mulvaney five years to earn his degree, but he wasn't in a rush.

"I wanted to learn. I didn't just want to get through," he said.

NBCUA's plans approved

Board OK's utility's proposed sewage treatment plant expansion

WALDWICK — At the last Waldwick Planning Board meeting the Northwest Bergen County Utilities Authority (NBCUA) Phase II Expansion plans were approved.

This will allow the NBCUA to commence construction work on the sewage treatment plant off Wyckoff Avenue.

The work will involve the installation of odor fighting devices designed to combat odors emanating from the plant. The new odor fighting devices include scrubbers, a chemical misting system and aluminum covers that will be placed over the sewage tanks.

The devices are still awaiting approval by the state's Department of Environmental Protec-

tion and Energy (DEPE). If approved, the covers would be installed in three to four months. The scrubbers and the misting system will be installed in 1994.

This should please residents, many of whom have been plagued by the odor for years.

However, Ken Gardner, Waldwick Coalition for Clean Air member, feels that progress has been too slow. He is pleased that something will be done, but he feels that it should occur sooner.

"We're just concerned that there is a very low sense of urgency to get this solved," Gardner said.

With the board's approval in hand, the authority needs just one more thing from Waldwick — Mayor Rick Vander Wende's signature on the CP-1 Permit.

Securing this signature should not be a problem, because Vander Wende has been pleased with the negotiations. At the last council meeting he said, "I'm relatively pleased

that the authority has done everything we wanted. I think we won on this point."

This approval by the board culminates a series of negotiations that started in March with anger and lack of communication on both sides. The

first meeting between the board and the NBCUA ended early with a demand that the authority submit a site plan application.

When the authority balked on that idea, the two parties reached a compromise. The NBCUA would not have to submit a formal site plan application, but they would show their plans to the board and listen to recommendations.

Fuel tank dumped in DPW yard

WALDWICK — Between the hours of 7 p.m. on May 3 and 6 a.m. on May 4 a 500 gallon fuel tank was illegally dumped in the Waldwick DPW yard on Industrial Park. The tank contained a mixture of oil residue and water.

According to Sgt. R.J.

Litchult of the Waldwick Police Department, leakage from the tank was minimal.

Litchult said that this incident did not damage the environment, but added, "It could cost the town to remove it."

Gary Kratz, borough administrator, indicated that removing the tank could cost the borough as much as \$1,000.

At press time there were no suspects.

Residents complain about high reserve fund

WALDWICK — A chorus of residents, including two former mayors and a former councilman, complained Tuesday that the reserve fund for this year's proposed municipal budget is excessively high and would further burden residents hit by already-steep property tax increases.

After the public hearing on the \$7.8 million budget for 1993, Mayor Rick Vander Wende said the council will "take another look" at the reserve for uncollected taxes. The panel was not able to vote on the spending plan last night because the state has not given its

approval.

Faced with a lower-than-anticipated tax collection rate of 97.5 percent last year, borough officials increased this year's reserve for uncollected taxes by nearly 50 percent — from \$400,000 to \$590,000.

That increase alone would mean an additional \$48 in property taxes for the owner of a \$180,000 house. The total proposed municipal tax increase is 12.2 percent, or \$106 for that average homeowner.

Borough officials attributed last year's low collection rate to the poor economy and the fact that tax bills were sent out late

in the year due to the state's delay in approving the municipal budget.

Borough Administrator Gary Kratz said the extra \$190,000 in this year's reserve fund includes: about \$80,000 to provide a standard cushion in case the collection rate is even lower than last year; \$50,000 to account for a larger tax base; and another \$60,000 to account for the possibility of a still-lower collection rate in case the economy remains sluggish and the state is again late in its approval.

"We felt we had to take a stance," said Councilman Joe

Musumeci. "We chose to take this time to build the surplus up."

But several residents said the cushion is unnecessarily large particularly when residents are faced with rising taxes in tough economic times. If all proposed tax rates are approved, the tax increase for municipal, school and county purposes could total 15 cents per \$100 in assessed valuation — a jump of \$270 for the owner of a \$180,000 home.

"I can't believe this is a prudent decision," said former Mayor Frank McKenna. "Fifteen points in a year is a big hit."

And former Mayor Larry Williams said, "This year, when economic times are toughest, you should be as tight as possible" when crafting the budget.

Added former Councilman Richard Bradley, "If you tend to increase the budget in order to make things more comfortable, people are going to pay more and more taxes."

Kratz acknowledged that borough officials decided to err on the side of caution. "There is some merit in their comments," he said after the meeting. "The town has taken a very fiscally conservative approach."

Waldwick dedicates field to baseball pioneers

Branagh, Orvedahl, Anderson remembered for long service

Waldwick reached back into its long, storied past in baseball April 24, and honored three of its pioneers by dedicating a field to them.

Bill Branagh, Sr., Jesse Orvedahl and the late Dave Anderson, Sr., were accorded, perhaps, the highest honor that any volunteer sports organization can bestow. The Waldwick Baseball Association, founded in 1954, saluted the three men at Boro Park following its Opening Day parade.

Branagh had three two-year terms as president of the WBA, each basically ten years apart (1970-71, 1981-82, 1991-92). His name is now etched on the Minor League field, where the eight, nine and ten-year olds play. It was during his second term as president that the Minor League field was built.

"When I joined the association in 1958, there was just one field (Major League) at Boro Park with a wood fence around it," Branagh recalled. "I never thought then that someday there would be a field named after me."

"This is a great honor," Branagh said. "It's very satisfying, considering all the time and effort I put into the program that it did bring this honor to me. I never did it for that reason, but it is still very satisfying. It was half a lifetime of good times, a great finish to my career."

With the exception of three years, Branagh was an active member through last season, when he officially retired. For 32 years, he served the WBA with distinction.

Branagh was the author of the WBA's first constitution and by-laws. He also served on the board as secretary and treasurer and was one of the first equipment managers.

When he wasn't administering the program, Branagh could be found on the field coaching his three sons — Bill, Michael and Tom — on the Minor, Major and Koufax levels, totaling 15 years. His four grandchildren — B.J., Garrett, Wendy and Michael — also went through the program.

"I am very grateful to the organization and to all those people who, through the years, helped to make the WBA what it is today."

Orvedahl, who also retired from the WBA following last season, took a similar path as Branagh. He joined the WBA as

a coach in 1969, when his son, Jeff, was 10. For the next 24 years, he also served the organization as president (1976-77), vice president, treasurer, team manager, player agent and supervisor and trainer of umpires. But perhaps his most beloved job was making Waldwick's baseball fields a better place to play as the WBA's field maintenance coordinator.

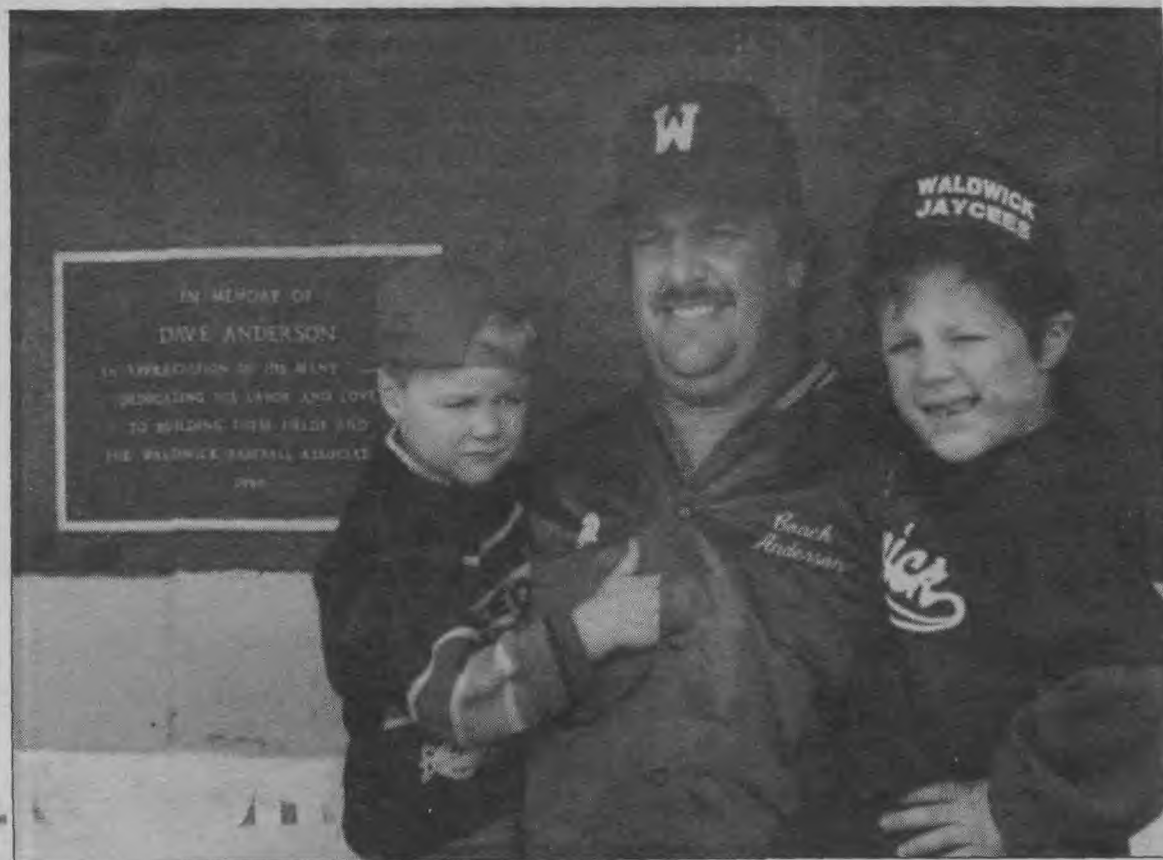
The Sandy Koufax field, where the 13- and 14-year olds play, is now the Jesse Orvedahl Field.

"I had more to do with the building of that field than any other field," Orvedahl said. "There was an existing Little League field there, but, two years before I became president, we cleared some land and made it a bigger field."

"This is an honor I really treasure," Orvedahl said. "It's something I didn't expect. I certainly put in a lot of time and effort in the WBA. I hope I deserve the recognition I got, because I certainly received it."

"It's very gratifying to find that the things you've done have been appreciated. It's humbling to realize you have received recognition of this nature when there have been so many other people who were instrumental in getting things done."

Such was the legacy of Jesse Orvedahl to the Waldwick Baseball Association, as was Bill Branagh's and Dave Anderson's.

Dave Anderson's softball legacy

Dave Anderson would have been proud. The man who was almost single-handedly responsible for starting the girls' softball program in Waldwick in 1975 now has a field bearing his name.

It's the girls' softball field in Boro Park, a field that Anderson also played a major role with its construction. The honor for Anderson, who died in

January of 1990 at the age of 55, was given to him by the Waldwick Baseball Association on Opening Day April 24 and accepted by his son Dave, Jr.

"It was appropriate to name the softball field after my father," Anderson said. "I'm sure he would be happy to know that all of his efforts in girls softball were appreciated by the

people of Waldwick. My father was very instrumental in the development of the girls' softball program and getting it off the ground. It's really a great honor."

Ironically, the elder Anderson's name was more synonymous with baseball, not only in Waldwick but in North Jersey as well. At the time of his death, he was general manager of the Waldwick Senators of the Met League. His son still manages the ballclub.

Anderson's involvement with the Waldwick Baseball Association began as a coach in 1971. He later managed at the Sandy Koufax (ages 13-14), Mickey Mantle (15-16), Connie Mack (17-18) and Suburban League (over 18) levels.

Anderson was the WBA president for two different terms (1978-79 and then 1981). He also served two terms as vice president and one as secretary.

Anderson, who was a self-employed contractor, was directly involved with almost all of the construction the WBA has undertaken — the Koufax field, the equipment fieldhouse, the rebuilding of the Pee Wee Reese dugouts, the Minor League storage shed, the remodeling of the refreshment stand, the dugouts at Traphagen Field and, of course, the girls' softball field. — FARRELL

WALDWICK — It was a short, silent bus ride from Midland Park to Waldwick on Wednesday afternoon. But the return trip sounded like New year's Eve after the Panthers had outgunned Waldwick, 15-6, to clinch at least a share of the Bergen-Passaic Scholastic League Carpenter Division championship.

Council will sell unbuildable lots to raise cash

WALDWICK — To raise funds, Waldwick Borough Council is considering the sale of several pieces of land.

But there could be a problem with an undeveloped piece of land on Hewson Ave. New Jersey Transit and two abutting property owners have expressed an interest in the site.

New Jersey Transit wants to purchase the land to expand an existing park and ride facility. The property owners want the land to fill out their property.

The council is leaning towards selling it to the proper-

ty owners. Gary Kratz, borough administrator, said, "The town is not anxious to have a roadway there."

At present, it is not clear whether this property is 40 or 50 feet wide. The council thinks that it is 50 feet, but it wants to be sure before the land is sold.

New Jersey Transit maintains that the land is 40 feet wide and that the other 10 feet is their property.

Kratz said, "If we're correct there could be a property dispute over the last 10 feet."

The council will conduct a title search.

The other 12 pieces of land are non-conforming lots, of substandard size and therefore not buildable. The minimum legal size for building is 50 by 100 feet. Some of the lots measure 5 by 100 feet and the council will give adjoining property owners first shot at these lots and Kratz suggested letting the owners suggest prices.

Councilwoman Denise Anderson wants the council to set a price. She feels that letting adjoining property owners set the value could be too arbitrary.

"I think you'll get more offers if you put a price tag on it," she said.

Before the land is put up for

sale Kratz will speak with the Tax Assessor and council will then decide whether to set prices on the lots.

Team Zett of Waldwick, fresh off its November baseball excursion to Phoenix for the Over-30 World Series, has picked up where it left off last season, when manager Bobby Mainenti's club went 20-0 in league play.

Team Zett sports a 5-0 record in the young season in the Men's Senior Baseball League. This year, Mainenti, the starting second baseman, has a nucleus of six players, himself included, who played baseball together in the 1970's. Totally, there are 15 players on the roster.

All graduates of Waldwick High School, Mainenti (Class of 1975) is joined by catcher-third baseman Bill Stegle ('75), right fielder Roger Turley ('76), first baseman Bill Figart ('76), catcher-third baseman Jim Marciano and his brother, left fielder Mark Marciano ('78).

"I enjoy it," said Mainenti. "It's something that you wouldn't have imagined 18 years later that you would be playing together on the same team again."

Team Zett is in its second year of existence, and Mainenti sees some differences from last season.

"This year, all of my players have accepted this level of play, and that's an important ingredient of my team," he said. "Secondly, the league is a lot more organized up to this point. There are less teams, and the teams seem to be organized much better. The control is there, whereas in the past, there were teams not showing up or not having their fields available. The main point is that we're just out there to have some fun."

Team Zett's main pitcher is John Soderman of Paramus. He was 11-0 last season and has won all five games this year.

"For the most part, players in this league are not accustomed to seeing a curveball, and John throws a good one," Mainenti said. "They are looking for a straight pitch — a fastball right in there — so the curve keeps them off stride."

The veteran shortstop was the player-manager for Ridgewood in the Suburban League from mid-1983 through the 1990 season.

"Pergo is really solid at short," Mainenti said. "He keeps the infield together."

Allen Goldberg, a 1981 graduate of Waldwick, returns to third base. Goldberg is the regional sales manager for Zett Corp., the world's largest wholesale distributor of sporting goods. Zett, based in Osaka, Japan, has national headquarters in Greenville, South Carolina.

Dennis Jiffas travels from Baltimore, as he did last year, to play centerfield. Sharing leftfield with Mark Marciano is Gary Sernack, the owner of Natale's Pizza of Waldwick.

Reserves include infielders John Spinella of Waldwick and Mark Scarmazzino of Edison and pitcher-first baseman Ernie Sutton of Hawthorne.

Waldwick's Stan Biernacki is the scorekeeper. Jim Marciano, Sr., also assists in the team's operations. Batboys are Justin Figart, Roger Turley and John Soderman.

Team Zett has an 18-game schedule and only plays on Sundays. Its next home game at the Waldwick High School field is June 13 at 3 p.m. against the Glen Rock Royals.

Mainenti plans on returning to Arizona for the World Series, which starts Nov. 1. Zett went 3-3 last year in the six-game format.

"We went out there with only 12 players," he noted. "This year, we want to get more players, especially pitchers. We need them now, so we can strengthen our staff for the Arizona trip."

Moundsmen mature and win for Waldwick

Coming into this season, the Waldwick baseball team had a pitching staff with 16 innings of varsity experience and some questions in the infield. For head coach Steve Konde, it was a crossroads point at game one.

"We knew that we had a talented group of pitchers," he explained, "but it was a matter of how fast they would mature that was going to dictate how our season would go."

From all indications, the staff grew up in a hurry, and with some tinkering on defense and some strong offensive support, the Warriors are going to make it hard on the selection committee for the Bergen county baseball tournament.

Even though their seven-game winning streak was snapped by Midland Park on Wednesday, Waldwick is a solid 17-5-1 and should be one of the 16 teams selected for the tournament.

"We are still on the bubble," Konde said. "I felt that we had to win our last five games before the tournament selections, and

we got four of them, so hopefully it is good enough.

A bid would be the eighth in 11 years for the Warriors, and a chance to turn their county fortunes around, a 1-7 mark with the only win coming in 1988.

Their chances for the B-PSL Carpenter Division title were

dealt a severe blow with the 15-6 loss to MP, which now holds a 1½-game lead over Waldwick.

The fact that there is championship talk is a credit to the pitching staff and the early season repositioning in the infield. Konde moved Mike Read from third base to second base, Rich Parks from second to short and Doug Finale from short to third.

"Those moves helped make us more sound defensively," Konde noted, "and after a 2-3 start we played much better baseball."

An eight-game winning streak followed the moves, and only a loss to Passaic Tech came in the next 16 games before the Midland Park setback.

Konde also saw the pitchers gain confidence and begin to come of age, with junior Tom Hayes (5-0), junior Mike Finnegan (5-1) and senior Pat McKeon (4-0) leading the way.

"Tom has come a long way," Konde said, "and he will get better as his stamina improves. Mike keeps us in every game,

and Pat has been a real good arm when the games pile up."

Konde also had praise for sophomore Mike Branagh, who has pitched a lot better than his 2-3 record shows, as well as junior Jay Bain, who is 1-1 on the year.

"Mike goes against all the top teams, and he is the most advanced sophomore pitcher I have seen in my 10 years," he said. "Jay, at 6-foot-4, is our most improved pitcher and has the potential to be a good college prospect."

The hurlers can't win games by themselves, and the Warrior offense is keyed by the power performances of junior leftfielder Mark DeMenna. A second-year varsity player, he has a .430 batting average with three doubles, three triples and eight home runs batting in the leadoff spot.

He leads the team with 30 runs batted in, and also has stolen 30 of 30 bases this year, prompting Konde to say, "He is only going to get better."

Senior Read is also putting some sting on the ball, hitting

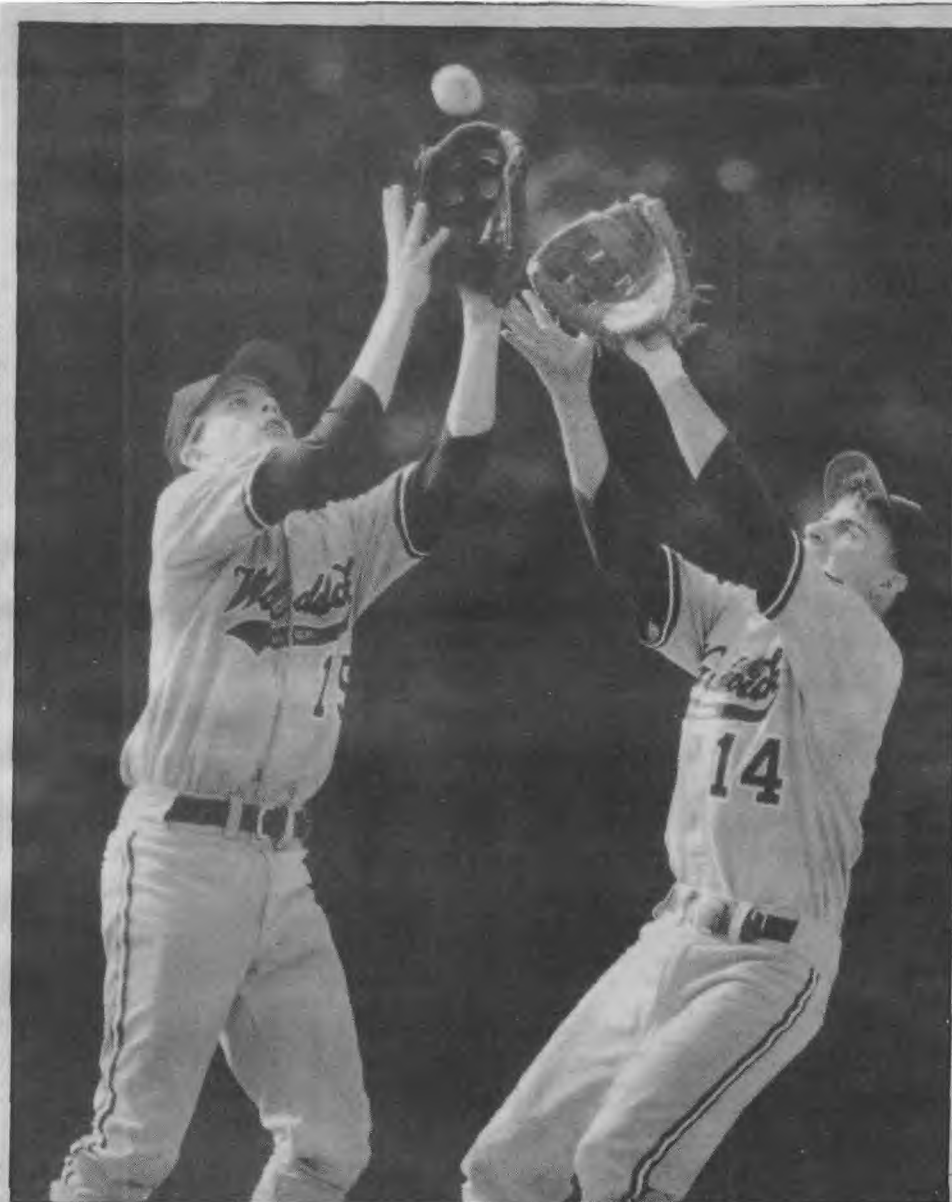

She has learned from adversity

While playing basketball one weekend last spring, Kim Kehrberger felt a sudden pop, crack, then two more cracks, and knew she would have to call a timeout on making her summer recreation plans.

The varsity basketball guard at Waldwick High School had torn a ligament in her left knee.

"I was coming off a very good junior year," said the 5-foot-10 senior about her academic and athletic achievements. The injury was a disappointment and a setback.

She underwent surgery, spent six months in rehabilitation, and was back on the court by the first game of the fall season.

The 18-year-old said that her comeback took a lot of determination.

"You can have dreams and visions, but you can't rely on them because you never know what will happen in the future," she said. "I was active; then I just stopped. I was pretty independent, and then there I was needing help."

After surgery, the Rutgers Scholar got around by using crutches, then a mobilizer brace, and finally a functional brace. It was four months before she regained full motion in her knee.

Kehrberger, the National Honor Society president who ranks first in her class of 101 students and plans to study engineering in college, said she missed the summer's sports, but a well-rounded education at Waldwick provided her with numerous extracurricular options.

A New Jersey Girls State delegate, Kehrberger is a volunteer member of Project IDEA, a gifted and talented program at Waldwick High School that holds lunchtime meetings to study art, music, and literature. Although math, science, and sports are her main interests, four years of participation in the project broadened her artistic horizons.

In fact, the Model Congress delegate was first exposed to the art of French painter Claude Monet through IDEA and has since become a fan.

"I can be in awe and be fascinated by his work," she said about decorating her room with

his art. "I find it soothing — just the experience of being overwhelmed by something flat and two-dimensional."

She recently participated in Academic Decathlon and said her arts education proved beneficial.

"It tied into IDEA because it showed me I had interests in other areas other than science and math," she said. She was at an advantage, she said, when competing in the decathlon's fine arts as well as language and literature categories.

"It's given me an awareness of the importance of culture and artist's perspectives — whether it's an artist, sculptor, or musician. ... They can take an abstract idea and make it last forever," she said.

Kehrberger, who is studying advanced-placement calculus, history, and humanities plus Spanish and advanced chemistry, is a paid science and calculus tutor. Last year, she scored a 5 — the highest achievable score — on her advanced-placement calculus exam. The winner of a certificate of high honors for math and science from the Society of Women Engineers, she said she is thinking about participating in college sports.

Marcia Schulze, Kehrberger's former calculus teacher and her National Honor Society adviser, said: "Kim is a natural as far as math is concerned. She has a good natural ability as well as an understanding and puts the effort in. She enjoys a challenge and shows outstanding initiative — and that's just not in math. That's overall."

Judith Pinder, coordinator of the gifted and talented program and team coach of the Quiz Bowl and Academic Decathlon, said: "Kim is always there for everybody else. In whatever she attempts, she succeeds and is not afraid of risking or attempting something different. She is both the athlete and a contributor to every other aspect of this school."

Kehrberger said having three sisters has certainly built self-assurance in and out of school.

"We're all alike in that we're good students and like sports, but we each have different personalities, likes, and dislikes," she said. "But they've helped me deal with people." ■

Sewage plant restricts connections

Due to excessive snows, rain-fall and flooding during the past few months, abnormally high flows of wastewater were received at the Northwest Bergen County Utilities Authority (NBCUA) treatment plant in Waldwick.

Because of these high flows, a low permitted plant capacity and regulatory delays in approving plant expansion, the authority, in compliance with state regulations, imposed a sewer connection ban, effective last week. These regulations require the ban even though no pollutant limitations were exceeded during this period of high flow.

This ban requires that the authority deny, except in limited circumstances, all requests for sewer connections to the facilities until such time as the

ban is lifted. This will halt all new construction that requires sewer connections in the NBCUA service area, including Allendale, Franklin Lakes, Ho-Ho-Kus, Midland Park, Ramsey, Ridgewood, Saddle River, Upper Saddle River, Waldwick and Wyckoff.

State regulations, which are enforced by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and Energy (NJDEPE), require the imposition of a sewer connection ban whenever the average flow for three consecutive months exceeds the limitations set forth in NBCUA's New Jersey Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NJPDES) permit. No extenuating circumstances, such as excessive snows, rains and flooding like that experienced in February, March and April, are considered by the

NJDEPE.

The authority is concerned that the ban will create hardship and job loss in the construction industry, which is beginning to recover after several years. According to the NJDEPE, the ban can be rescinded as soon as the three month running average of flow drops below the NBCUA's permit limitation of 10.5 million gallons per day. It is expected that the ban will be lifted in July or August.

Barring any further delays by the NJDEPE, the NBCUA expects to advertise for bids to complete plant expansion late this summer and award the contract in September. It is also expected that the NJDEPE will consider the authority's request to expand the plant and increase its permitted capacity.

Academy graduates 31 new cops

MAHWAH — Thirty-one new police officers — the first class ever to receive training in community policing — graduated from the Bergen County Police and Fire Academy in ceremonies Wednesday afternoon.

The one woman and 30 men, representing police departments in Bergen and Hudson counties, completed 20 weeks of training at the academy in Mahwah.

The class is the smallest in at least 25 years. Robert Re, the chief of administrative services police, said he believes towns held back from hiring until their budget situations were clear. But communities are now doing more hiring. The incoming class in August — at 112 — will be one of the largest in the past 25 years, Re said.

Re said the new course in community policing was added because of the increasing popularity of the community policing approach.

"The major goal is to make the police officer on the beat a free-thinking, problem-solving professional," Re said. "The thrust of community policing is to get the officer familiar with all the people in the area he serves, the beat he serves, and know the people on his beat — instead of being reactive, to be proactive."

Sgt. Louis Ghione of the North Arlington police taught the course. Ghione said he tried to convey to the recruits the importance of how police officers work with members of the public and the impression they leave with the public. Even in a major

city, Ghione said, only 20 percent of all calls to police deal with crimes, and the rest are from people seeking information or other assistance.

"In the old days you saw an officer walking the beat. Now you see policemen driving by. We suggest when officers see groups of people, get out [of the patrol car] and talk with them," Ghione said.

One of the recruits, Officer Daniel Hippe, 22, of Ridgefield Park said he was impressed with the emphasis of the course. "I think it's half the battle. I've worked with children in the past. I love people, and I think it's the reason I took the job."

Another recruit, 23-year-old Officer Joseph Horn of Mahwah added, "We're out to help people. We don't want to be there just when something goes wrong."

The Great War's dwindling ranks

Vets in demand at parade time

The annual convention of New Jersey's World War I veterans — that is, the four fellows who could make it — was held Thursday in a corner of a restaurant in Toms River.

The four elected officers dispensed with a few business matters, had lunch, and "talked about what we did last weekend and what we'll do this weekend," said Lou Brooks, the organization's commander.

So it goes for the survivors of the Great War, the grinding, bloody conflict that snuffed Europe's 19th century imperial fantasies while ushering in the American Century.

More than 8 million servicemen on both sides died in the trenches, in aerial dogfights, or on the high seas, victims of submarine warfare. Disease and mustard gas were enemies every bit as lethal as bombs and bullets.

Of the 4.7 million men the United States eventually sent over there, 116,000 never returned.

Time has proved far more devastating than anything the Central Powers could throw at Sergeant York and the other doughboys. The Department of Veterans Affairs in Washington estimates that as few as 35,000 World War I veterans are left, and that they are dying at a rate of about 25 a day.

The veterans number only in the hundreds in New Jersey, and most are in nursing homes. Few Veterans of Foreign Wars posts in the area have members from the Great War, and many towns cannot find a World War I representative for Monday's Memorial Day parade.

Harvie Davis of Mahwah, a 96-year-old Army veteran, will be in Waldwick's parade — "I haven't been doing any marching, just riding in the cars with the grand marshals."

In Lyndhurst, 93-year-old Jimmy Ciolino — he was born Vincent, but his Navy mates dubbed him "Jimmy" — won't even ride in the car because he has kidney trouble "and my doctor said not to bounce around too much."

When George Gandenberger died last week at 98, it left Ciolino as Lyndhurst's only remaining World War I veteran, and the only one of 60 charter members of the local VFW post.

Like many World War I vets, Ciolino isn't the Lost Generation type.

"I don't want nothing to do with the other side," Ciolino says, referring to Europe. Born in Palermo, Sicily, in 1900 and brought to Bergen County by his parents later that year, Ciolino and his wife, Rose, have never returned to the Continent. "Just a trip to California," she says.

When Jimmy Ciolino signed up for duty in 1917 in Paterson, he had to get his mother's permission because he was too young. "All my friends enlisted, so I enlisted," he says.

But at 108 pounds, Ciolino was too light for the Army, and he just made it into the Navy by eating bananas and drinking lots of water before the physical. He rose to the rank of Carpenter's Mate 3rd Class, sending \$15 of his initial \$17-a-month paycheck to his mother.

"I was on a destroyer, what they called a 'tin can,'" he says. "I stayed in France 13 months... We convoyed transport ships coming across the North Atlantic."

Ciolino's ship, the USS Little, ended up at the bottom of the Pacific during World War II.

Ciolino returned to Bergen County, started a tailor business that failed in the Great Depression, and then "did everything I could just to make an honest living." Having retired from the Passaic Valley Sewer Commission in 1965, he lives with his wife in an apartment above his daughter's

house and covers the walls with pictures of six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

Brooks is a widower now, and the World War I veterans group occupies much of his time. Brooks will be heading out to Chicago on Labor Day for the organization's national convention, which of late has attracted 50 to 60 people.

"They expect this'll be a big one," Brooks says. "But there are so few left, how big can it be?"

County baseball tournament starts

Memorial Day weekend sees the annual county baseball tournament played, and in this year's 35th edition of the event, a rarity has taken place among the field.

In most seasons, the 16 best teams are paired off to determine the champion, but this season, the selection committee could not make a concrete decision among the final four teams.

Therefore, they created a pair of out-bracket games to determine the final two places in the first round, giving 18 teams a shot at the county title.

Three local teams were involved in those brackets, with Paramus Catholic (16-9) traveling to Park Ridge (13-6) and Ramsey (16-8) hosting Wallington (15-7) on Thursday.

The winners of those games drew the top two seeds, with the PC-PR victor going up against top-seeded and undefeated Rutherford (22-0). Second-seeded Hackensack (20-3) faces the Ramsey-Wallington winner.

The first round, weather permitting, is set for Saturday, with four games each at Emerson and Demarest, while the second round is to be played

Sunday at Emerson. Rain will cause games to be rescheduled for Monday.

Six other local nines are in the first-round games, with St. Joseph the highest seed at number four. The Green Knights look to return to the championship game, where they were beaten by this year's third seed, Demarest, 1-0, despite a three-hit pitching performance from Bryan Couch, who is 8-2 this year.

St. Joe's will face Queen of Peace in the first round, and the Knights will need the strong hitting of Mike Capra (five home runs) and T.J. Fay (.485) to get through the field. Ron Colonna has also been on a tear lately, with seven doubles and a near .400 average over the last nine games.

Bergen Catholic brings a 17-5-2 record into its game with Waldwick (19-6-1), and Mark DeRosa has been the power-hitting leader with three doubles, seven triples and four homers. Tom Bochynski (5-1) and Dave Deramo (5-1) are the mound leaders.

Waldwick presents a team long on hitting, led by Mark DeMenna's nine round-trippers and .400-plus average. Doug Finale is also closing in on .400,

while Tom Hayes (6-1) and Mike Finnegan (6-1) are expected to do the pitching.

Pascack Hills comes in as the seventh seed and faces a Midland Park team that is making its first appearance in the tourney since the 1970's. The Cowboys, Group 2 sectional finalists along with Rutherford, rely on the long ball, with Mike Frezza smashing 13 home runs and Andrew Mariniello adding seven dingers out of a team total of 29. Bob Buonanno is 8-2 on the hill for the 20-6 Cowboys.

Midland Park has been no slouch with the stick, either, as the 17-5 Panthers average nine runs a game. Dave Etterbeek and Todd O'Neill provide power with four and three homers, respectively, while Jay Hagedorn is hitting over .400 with 10 doubles. Etterbeek (6-1) and Shawn Tracy (4-2) should be on the mound.

Defending Group 1 state champion Emerson, a sectional finalist this year, will face fifth-seeded Garfield (19-4). The 19-8 Cynos are led by the pitching and hitting of Armen Simonian, who is 7-2 on the hill and hitting over .500 with an on-base percentage near .750. He has 12 doubles, a triple and a homer with 30 RBI, and is at his best late in the season.

Housing plan approved

Townhouses will represent borough's first state-mandated affordable housing units

WALDWICK — A planned 35-unit townhouse complex, which will contain the borough's first state-mandated affordable housing units, cleared its final hurdle last week when the council approved the developer's agreement.

The complex, to be built at

Wyckoff and Wanamaker avenues, will contain seven single-family townhomes, priced for low- and moderate-income residents, said Borough Administrator Gary Kratz.

The developer, Greenway Development Corp. of Ramsey, is expected to begin construction within a few weeks, Kratz said.

Under the state's Mount Laurel court decisions, Waldwick must accommodate a

total of 96 affordable units by the year 2000, but, Katz said, in the current economy, "there just aren't a lot of people building."

He did say there have been several zoning changes passed in the borough to accommodate at least part of the rulings.

"It's hard to find room for development when you look at a town that's already about 98 percent developed," Katz said.

In other business, the council introduced an ordinance establishing a new three-month parking permit for the Park and Ride facility. The permit would cost \$45 and would be issued only in May or June. The public hearing is set for June 8.

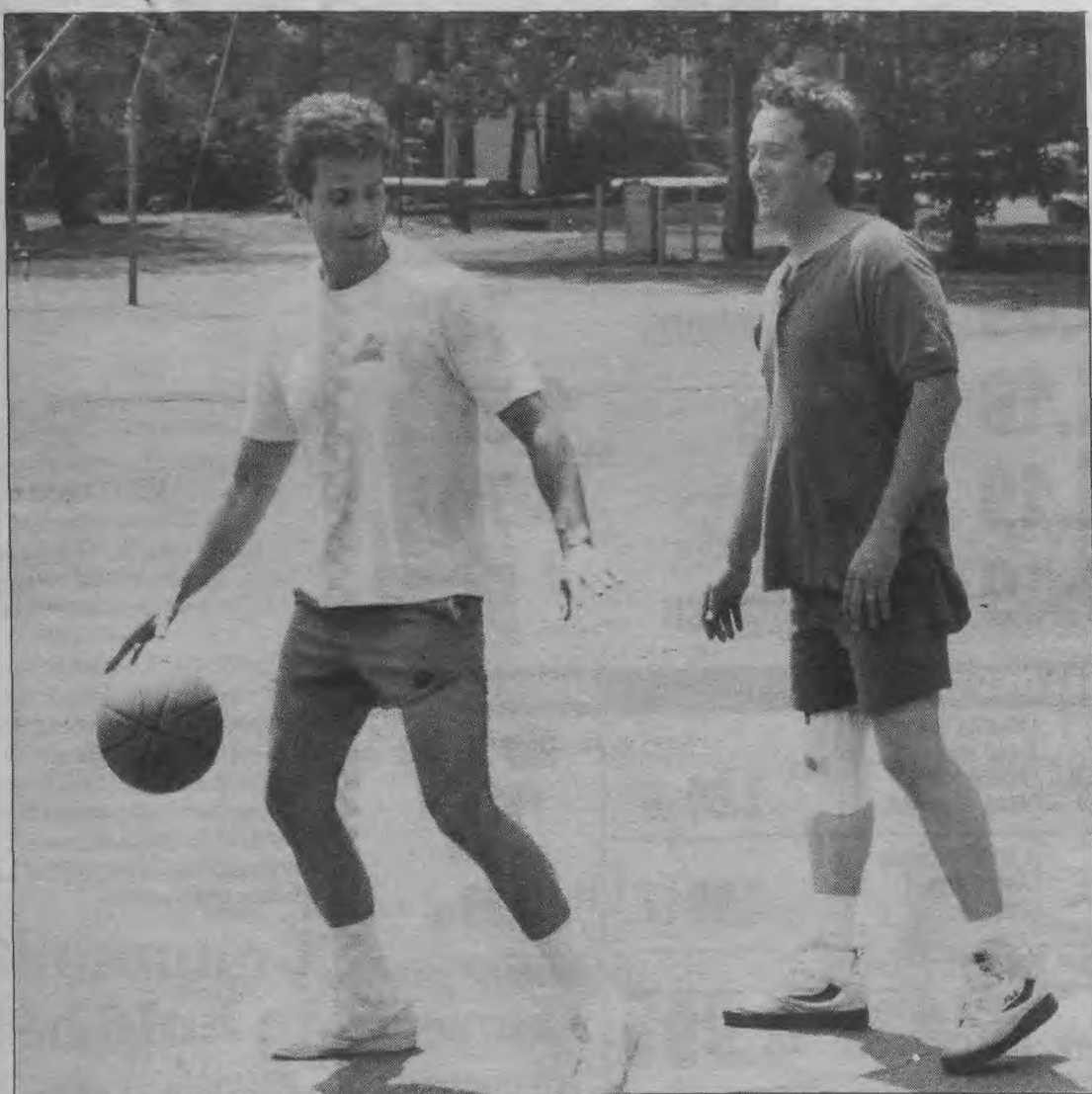
As of now, only six- and 12-month permits are available at a cost of \$80 and \$140 respectively.

The proposed three-month permit is largely designed to accommodate college students who travel by train during the

summer, said Mayor Rick Vander Wende.

"We had some residents, college students, who are working in New York City this summer, ask for the three month parking," said Katz.

The lot, located next to the train station off of Houston Avenue, has roughly 150 parking spaces. Katz said that because of the shrinking economy, more spaces have opened up. "We used to have a waiting list, now there are at least 20 openings for six- and 12-month parking."

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 48:63-3 ENTITLED "PARK AND RIDE" FEES TO INCLUDE THE ISSUANCE OF NON-RENEWABLE THREE MONTH PARK AND RIDE PERMITS FROM MAY TO SEPTEMBER AND TO ESTABLISH A FEE FOR SAID PERMIT.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Waldwick that Chapter 48:63-3A is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. 48:63-3A Fees.

Council considers upgrading boro dam

WALDWICK — At a recent meeting Waldwick Borough Council heard a proposal on upgrading the Whites Pond Dam on Hopper Avenue.

The Department of Environmental Protection and Energy (DEPE) has required Waldwick to meet the provisions of the 100 Year Flood Plan. This would mean that the dam could withstand a severe flood expected to happen only once in a hundred years.

Thomas Otto, of the engineering firm A.G. Lichtenstein & Associates, gave a detailed account of an emergency spillway that would direct excess water into a stream.

Otto feels that this spillway is a reasonable shortcut to meet DEPE standards. For a long time the DEPE had required most towns to raise the dam banks to handle extreme flooding.

But now that Waldwick's dam has been reclassified from a Class 1 dam to a Class 3 dam, Otto thinks the DEPE may relax its standards. The flood of a Class 1 dam would cause loss of life and damage to property, while the flood of a Class 3 dam would only create an inconvenience.

Otto said, "I think they're (DEPE) very open to suggestions. And now that you're a Class 3 dam they would be open to this."

If Waldwick decides to go ahead with Otto's plan, Lichtenstein & Associates would do a detailed survey of the dam. The council would then put together a proposal to the DEPE.

Riordan and her peers heard speeches by The Record's executive editor, Glenn Ritt, and Dr. Harold J. Raveché, the president of Stevens Institute of Technology in Hoboken, urging them not to let up in their efforts to stay ahead of the competition.

Ritt told the valedictorians that as the country faces a possible turning point, they should seize the reins and guide their world in a positive direction.

"You're graduating into an economy that is undergoing fundamental change," Ritt said. "You, at this dramatic time in your life, represent the haves."

Truck-school bus crash injures 3, snarls Rte. 17

WALDWICK — A school bus and a small truck collided Monday afternoon on Route 17, tying up traffic for about two hours and sending three people to area hospitals. No children were aboard the bus.

The accident occurred at about 1:45 p.m. in the northbound lanes of the highway at the Sheridan Avenue exit. Police said the bus, which was in the left lane, and the truck, in the right lane, tried to enter the center lane at the same time.

The truck's front bumper became locked in the rear bumper of the bus and the vehicles careened out of control for several hundred feet before separating, police said. The truck spun completely around before flipping onto its side, coming to rest on a grassy island be-

tween the exit ramp and the right shoulder of the highway.

The school bus crashed into and climbed onto the 3-foot-high concrete barrier that separates the northbound and southbound traffic lanes. It skidded for about 25 feet before coming to rest straddling the divider.

Police refused to release the names of the three people in the two vehicles. There was an aide on the school bus, which was owned by a private company, police said.

Officials at Hackensack Medical Center identified the truck driver as Carlos Calderon, 37. He was being evaluated Monday night. Police said he may have fractured an arm in the accident.

The two people from the bus, both women, were taken to The Valley Hospital, Ridgewood, which refused to release their names or conditions. Police said

the bus driver was the most seriously injured, with hip and facial injuries. The aide may have broken a leg in the crash, police said.

Traffic quickly backed up after the highway was closed, with drivers saying they waited up to two hours to move. The line of cars and tractor-trailers extended as long as four miles, back to Paramus Park.

Along the shoulder of the highway, cars sat overheated with their hoods up, victims of the nearly 80-degree heat. Many people stuck in the traffic got out of their cars to chat with other motorists.

"This is what the New York Thruway is like even when there's no accident," said John Leichter, 37, of Orangeburg, N.Y. He shrugged off the 40 minutes he had to wait to get off the highway, saying that long traffic jams are a ritual in the area.

A better way to retrain workers

As an adjunct professor of management at William Paterson College, I would like to offer an idea that may be of help to those puzzled by continuing unemployment in an improving economy.

In the late Sixties, Peter Drucker wrote "The Age of Discontinuity," in which he pointed out that manual laborers soon would be replaced by information workers. As a result, classic organization charts, with myriad middle management slots, have become dinosaurs.

Add to this the impact of computer-

assisted design and computer-assisted manufacturing and we see the underlying reason for high unemployment that won't go away.

For all these reasons, the central government, in its moves to provide worker training, can do nothing that will be effective in the long term. No one can know, right now, just what jobs will need to be filled, and therefore exactly what skills will be required.

What is needed by potential workers in this new age is solid training in the physical sciences — all of them. And the unfortunate truth is that the average worker is abysmally illiterate in the sciences.

The bottom line is that the billions now being spent by government in worker training programs are virtually a total waste! And adding more, as Congress is now debating, will do no more than raise taxes and add to the national debt.

The solution is to stimulate on-the-job training by offering business and industry tax incentives to invest in their own people directly, through worker training for specific contemporary functions, as they emerge.

2 people involved in Route 17 crash remain in hospital

Two of the three people involved in an accident in Waldwick on Monday afternoon that closed northbound Route 17 for nearly two hours remained hospitalized Tuesday.

Vera Lee, 69, of West New York was listed in stable condition Tuesday at The Valley Hospital, Ridgewood, a hospital spokeswoman said. The hospital would not comment on the extent of Lee's injuries, but police said Monday that she suffered hip and facial injuries in the crash.

Carlos Calderon, 37, of the Bronx was admitted Monday night to Hackensack Medical Center for treatment of a fractured rib and lacerations. He was listed in good condition, a spokeswoman said.

Martha Acevedo of Fairview was treated for minor injuries and released from The Valley Hospital on Monday evening.

The school bus Lee was driving and a truck driven by Calderon locked bumpers in the northbound lanes of Route 17 at about 1:45 p.m. Monday as the two converged on the same lane. Acevedo, a driver's aide, was a passenger on Lee's bus. There were no children aboard the bus, which is owned by Taranto Bus Co. of Englewood.

The truck spun out of control and flipped onto its side. The bus then climbed a concrete divider between the northbound and southbound lanes of Route 17. Traffic was backed up nearly four miles to Paramus Park, and drivers faced delays of more than two hours while the roadway was closed.

would cost \$2.5 million.

Irene Alderisio, Passaic River Coalition Environmental Specialist, is concerned because the tunnel would destroy 500 acres of wetlands.

The tunnel proposal includes the construction of man-made wetlands, but Alderisio feels that these new wetlands would be inferior to the natural ones.

Alderisio also supports the buyout because it would be a state-run program that would create jobs for New Jersey citizens. She opposes the tunnel because this federal project would not be contracted out to New Jersey companies.

Over 20 local municipalities have stated their opposition to the flood tunnel. Also several members of the New Jersey State Senate, including Gerald Cardinale, 39th District and Henry McNamara, 40th District, have voiced their opposition.

Council opposes tunnel

Consider Passaic flood control project not answer to problem

WALDWICK — Concerned that municipalities in the northern part of the state might have to share the cost burden for building and maintaining the Passaic River Flood Tunnel, the Waldwick Borough Council met to discuss the feasibility of the project.

The project, proposed by the Army Corps of Engineers, would create a drainage tunnel that would divert floodwater from Passaic River wetlands into Newark Bay. It is not a sound answer to the problem, according to the borough council.

Councilman James Gibson feels that the project would only waste money. "It involves long

term maintenance and you and I will pay for it out of our pockets. I don't think it (flood tunnel) would alleviate the problem at all," he said.

The tunnel would cost \$1.3 billion to construct and would cost \$2.1 million to maintain. New Jersey would pay 25 percent of the construction costs and 100 percent of the maintenance costs.

Gibson thinks that the project could be even more expensive because of damage claims from homeowners.

"They'll be tunneling under people's houses. When they built the New York City subways in the 1950's they had tremendous damage claims due to vibrations."

Instead the council supports a buy-out of houses in flood-prone areas.

The Passaic River Coalition, based in Basking Ridge, also supports a buy-out program. Its proposal would result in the purchase of 775 homes and

Waldwick team copes with 'Majors' struggle

Waldwick is struggling in the North Jersey Majors, but, in baseball, as in any sport, winning streaks are born from losing trends, and manager Joe Licari's club is waiting to bust at the seams.

Just two years ago, Waldwick made the playoffs in the Bergen Stan Musial League and, as a result, received a promotion in 1992 to the more competitive North Jersey Majors — two leagues, same governorship. However, Waldwick's baptism in its new surroundings led to an 8-17-1 season.

Licari admits that it might have been too soon to take the big step up to the Majors.

"We went in kind of weak in '92," he said. "We struggled last year because we just didn't have the quality pitching. We lost our ace, John Rooney (who went to the other Waldwick team in the Met League) and Eric Fisher (who went to the Fair Lawn A's in the Majors).

Despite their team's mediocre performance, Licari and his assistant, Paul Albarella, remained committed to staying in the higher-bracket league, figuring they would rebound with a couple of key additions and improve upon their 1992 showing.

But, as is the case with the semi-pro leagues that take in ages 18-and-over, players, especially the young ones, come and go for various reasons (i.e. employment, retirement), and Licari lost a good backbone to his '92 club.

Gone this season are Garett Branagh, Gabe Terlemezan, Tom Russo, Tom Kwiakowski (Met League) and pitcher Mark Cifarelli.

"We lost a lot of good hitting," Licari said. "I only found out about this in January and February."

Still, Licari and Albarella figured they had enough time to come up with good replacements to field a competitive team.

And this year, it is a young Waldwick club, still with a good nucleus, that is in the Majors. Despite a 3-8-1 record through Tuesday's loss to the Wayne Pirates, Licari remains optimistic that his pitching will come around to complement a steady offense and defense.

"This is a tough league," said Albarella, who is in his third

season as Licari's assistant coach. "In a league like this, it's a matter of maintaining your concentration, trying to execute fundamentals and trying to keep the spirit up. We're losing a bit now, but we do have a good team. We're in practically all the games."

Licari's number-one pitcher now is his youngest son, Joe, 22, who owns a four-year, semi-pro record of 12-8. The 1989 Waldwick graduate is 1-1 this season, beating Paramus, 2-1, on a two-hitter with five strikeouts and one walk in seven innings. Paramus' run and two hits all came in the first inning.

Next is Tom Zagari, 20, of Cliffside Park. He's 0-2, but has 22 strikeouts in 16.2 innings with an ERA of 4.20.

Mahwah's Scott Merlino, 22, is in his third season with Waldwick. The 1989 Mahwah graduate is 0-3 with a 3.96 ERA and has issued only six walks while striking out nine in 17.2 innings.

Paul Albarella is familiar with the distance of 60 feet, six inches from the mound to the plate than most catchers. As a spot starter and reliever, he's chipped in with 11 innings of work, allowing just one earned run for a sparkling 0.64 ERA. The 1990 graduate of Don Bosco Prep, where he did some pitching his senior year, has yielded just seven hits and two walks while striking out five.

Albarella, 21, beat the Wayne Dodgers, 6-5, in a route-going, eight-inning effort, in which he gave up his one earned run. His three innings of no-run, hitless relief against Allendale also contributed to a win.

"Paul has good control, and that's what we need now to keep us close in the games," Licari said.

The main relief pitcher is Dom Ponzo (see related story). He is joined by Waldwick's Scott Coppola, a 1986 Waldwick graduate, Jim Mistretta, a 1988 graduate of Don Bosco, and veteran Jeff Bennett (1-0), who, in a starting role, beat Fair Lawn, 6-4, with four innings of no-run, three-hit ball, walking one and striking out two.

As a help, Waldwick picked up two players from the disbanded Westwood team — shortstop Joe Ashenbrand, 22, and catcher-DH Howie Hein, who's hitting .261.

Fireman Ponzo to Waldwick's rescue

Dominick Ponzo is back on the mound in Waldwick, hurling relief with his left-handed arm.

"Dom is just a fighter, a sparkplug on the team," said manager Joe Licari. "He's something we needed as a team."

Ponzo, 27, last pitched a couple of seasons ago for the Waldwick Senators in the Met League. Now, Ponzo comes out of the bullpen for Licari and has had impressive results.

In 11 innings, the 1984 Waldwick graduate has an earned-run-average of 0.62, yielding only one earned run and five hits while striking out eight. Ponzo has saved one of Waldwick's three wins.

"This is the first time in my four years of managing the team that I have a decent bullpen," Licari said. "That's what hurt us last year, the lack of relief. Dom's control is very good. If the game is close, I have confidence that Dom is going to keep the game close."

"Dom is very calm and in control, and that's what you need in a relief pitcher," Licari said. "His experience has helped us a lot."

Ponzo's bat has also made an impact. When centerfielder Scott Ives could not make a recent game, Ponzo told Licari he could play out there. Ponzo went 2-for-3 and scored two runs, including the game-winner in the bottom of the eighth in a 6-5 victory over the Wayne Dodgers.

"Dom is an all-around athlete," Licari said.

Licari's batting order reads as follows: second baseman Danny Mistretta (.351, 6 RBIs), shortstop Joe Ashenbrand, third baseman Frank Licari (.289), first baseman Bob Wagner, DH Howie Hein (.261), Ives (.300), catcher Paul Albarella (.298 after a 3-for-3 performance Tuesday), right-fielders Dave Hajduk (.250) and Tim Wakeman and leftfielder Jim Mistretta, who is batting a

team-leading .400 (8-for-20) despite missing two weeks with an ankle injury.

Jim Mistretta last played baseball in 1988, when he was a senior at Don Bosco Prep. The swift Mistretta, who also played football at halfback, complements the speed of his younger brother, Danny, 19, as a tandem in the order.

"Jim Mistretta has picked up the slack for Tom Russo," Licari said. "He has always been a good athlete."

Licari also has outfielders Gene Dunnigan and Chris Maimone on his roster.

Wagner, 26, a 1985 graduate of Waldwick, also serves as a coach.

"Bobby has settled the workings of our younger players, and that has helped Joe and me," said coach Paul Albarella, Sr. "He's done a good job in practice and has been a great complement to our team. It shows in the little things, and that's important." — FARRELL

Waldwick schools hold workshop

WALDWICK — As part of a district focus on extending opportunities to all students, including those with disabilities, the Waldwick schools recently provided workshops for teachers and for parents on a student's rights to belong.

According to Dr. Carol Lynch, director of special services, Waldwick school administrators believe students with disabilities should be educated in the district, whenever possible. Although many attend special education classes, sev-

eral students recommended by the Child Study Team are included in regular Waldwick classes.

Two students from the Bergen County Day Training Center currently participate in some classes at Traphagen School with the help of an aide. In September an autistic child will attend kindergarten at Crescent School with an aide. At Waldwick High School a student with Down's syndrome has been very successful both in regular classes and in the after-

school sports program.

At the district's staff development program in late March, education consultant Norman Kunc spoke to faculty members about improving self-esteem and creating a sense of belonging for the special education students included in regular classes. He also explored many of the attitudes, assumptions and fears which prevent inclusion of these students in regular classes in their neighborhood schools.

Waldwick water woes force new restrictions

WALDWICK — Hot, dry weather and the temporary incapacity of two wells have forced borough officials to declare a water emergency.

Residents are restricted as to how water is used outdoors. They may do such chores as watering lawns and washing cars every other day only.

Those living to the north of Franklin Turnpike have outside watering privileges on even-numbered dates, and those located to the south can water on days with odd-numbered dates.

The use of hand-held hoses for gardening is exempted, said Michelle Colettis, the borough's senior clerk. The restrictions went into effect last Thursday, after fire officials were dispatched in their trucks to inform residents of the

plan, she said.

Waldwick is the fourth Bergen County municipality to restrict the use of water in the past month. The others are Allendale, Ramsey, and Mahwah.

Officials acted after the water level in the borough's two tanks dipped to the 9.5-foot mark last week, said Tom Joaquin, supervisor of the Waldwick Water Co.

That meant possible water-pressure problems, which in turn could cause trouble if there were a fire, Joaquin said. The tanks are fed by the borough's wells, which last week were unable to pump fast enough to keep the water levels at the desired 20.5-foot level, he said.

Joaquin said the water shortage has been exacerbated because two of the borough's six wells have been out of commission for many months. To address the water problem, one will soon be put back on line temporarily, he said.

NBCUA drags its feet

WALDWICK — The Northwest Bergen County Utilities Authority (NBCUA) is dragging its feet on installing an odor control system at the Wyckoff Avenue sewage treatment plant, according to the council.

Before the system is installed the NBCUA must have its application approved by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and Energy (NJDEPE). At present, the NJDEPE has not received all of the application information from the NBCUA.

Since the late 1970's Waldwick residents have been plagued by odors from the sewage plant. Recently, the borough and the NBCUA reached an agreement. The NBCUA would install an odor control system and Mayor Rick Vander Wende would sign the C-P-1 Permit authorizing the start of the Phase II expansion

of the plant. 6-24-93

But now the council feels cheated. Vander Wende has already signed the permit and the NBCUA is holding up progress on odor control.

Councilman James Gibson said, "They're playing games to their advantage."

Ken Gardner, Waldwick Coalition For Clean Air member, said, "I spoke with Haven's and Emerson, the authority's engineering firm, and they informed me that the missing data is in the mail. So is my check."

Councilman Joseph Musumeci said, "We'll be on top of it. If they cause delays delays for us, we'll cause delays for them."

Gardner suggested the the council meet with Waldwick's NBCUA Commissioner at the June 30 session to speed up the process.

ORDINANCE NO. 14-93

"AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 77, OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF WALDWICK, ENTITLED, "SITE PLAN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF WALDWICK, ENTITLED "SITE PLAN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF WALDWICK TO CLARIFY WHEN APPROVAL IS REQUIRED.

WHEREAS, the purpose of the Site Plan Ordinance of the Borough of Waldwick, is to encourage appropriate development of all land within the municipality; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the Governing Body that a change in occupancy of a building require site plan review; and

WHEREAS, while the present ordinance states that site plan review is required prior to the issuance of a building permit or certificate of occupancy, this has not been uniformly interpreted to require site plan review for change in occupancy; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council wish to amend the existing site plan ordinance in order to clarify when an approval is required;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained that Chapter 77 of the Municipal Code of the Borough of Waldwick, entitled "Site Plan Ordinance of the Borough of Waldwick" is hereby amended as follows:

Section I: Amend Section 77-1 entitled "Short Title." TO delete this section in its entirety and replace it with the following:

§ 77-1 "Short Title - Purpose and construction of provisions."

A. This chapter shall be known as the "Site Plan Ordinances of the Borough of Waldwick."

B. The purpose of this ordinance is to guide and encourage the appropriate development of all land in the Borough of Waldwick in a manner which will promote public health, safety, morals and general welfare. The provisions hereof shall be construed liberally to effect such purpose. Whenever a term is used in this Ordinance which is defined in the Zoning Ordinance or Land Subdivision Ordinance of the Borough of Waldwick, such term is intended to have the same meaning as is set forth in said ordinances, unless a contrary intention is clearly indicated from the context of this ordinance.

Section II: Amend Section 77-2 to delete in its entirety and replace it with the following:

§ 77-2 "Site Plan Approval Required."

Except as provided in Section 77-3 and Section 77-4 below, no person shall construct a new building, add to an existing building or make any alteration to any building or part thereof, or permit or participate in a change in occupancy of an existing building or part thereof, or alter, increase or reduce parking facilities or vehicular or pedestrian ways or areas or landscaping, or make any other change in the layout, design or plan of any premises nor shall any building permit or certificate of occupancy therefor be issued until a site plan therefor shall first been approved by the Planning Board or, where applicable, the Board of Adjustment.

Section III: Delete § 77-3 in its entirety and replace with the following:

§ 77-3 "One and Two Family Development" - Site plan approval shall not be required for construction or alteration of a detached lawful single one-family or two-family dwelling unit or any lawful accessory use thereto provided that the same are not part of an attached housing, multiple-dwelling, planned unit development or development involving the construction of more than one single family or more than one two-family dwelling unit.

Section IV: Amend § 77-4 to read as follows:

§ 77-4 "Waiver of Requirements" - The Planning Board may waive some or all of the procedural requirements for site plan approval required for a change of occupancy, by expressly making specific findings that the proposed change of occupancy;

A. Does not involve the construction of a new building or the extension of an existing building;

B. Does not require addition parking;

C. Does not affect existing parking facilities, vehicular or pedestrian circulation, drainage, relationship of buildings to each other, buffering, landscaping or lighting.

Section V: Add § 77-18, 77-19 which are to read as follows:

§ 77-18 "Penalties" - See Chapter 1:14-1

§ 77-19 "Administration and Enforcement"

A. It shall be the duty of the Zoning Officer of the Borough of Waldwick to administer and enforce this Ordinance. In no case shall a permit be granted for the construction or alteration of a building where the proposed construction, alteration or use would be in violation of any provision of this ordinance. It shall be the duty of the Zoning Officer to cause any new building, plans or premises to be inspected or examined and to order in writing to the owner that any condition be remedied which is found to exist in violation of any provisions of this Ordinance. He shall have the right to enter any building or premises during the daytime in the course of his duties.

B. In case any building or structure is or reconstructed, altered or converted, or any building or structure is or is intended to be used in violation of or contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance, the Borough Attorney shall, after authorization by the Governing Body and in addition to other remedies set forth in the statutes of the institute an action to enjoin, or any other appropriate action or proceeding to prevent, such erection, construction, reconstruction, alteration, conversion or use.

Section VI: Any ordinance or portions thereof, inconsistent with the terms of this ordinance are hereby repealed as to such inconsistencies only.

Section VII: Should any article, section, sub-section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined to the article, section,

sub-section, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof directly involved in the controversy in which said judgment shall have been rendered.

Section VIII: This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon passage and publication as required by law.

Hot Waldwick completes sweep

WALDWICK — Beating Bergen Catholic once in a season is tough. Sweeping the Crusaders is nearly impossible.

Waldwick players were saying "Sweep, sweep" Tuesday night after coming from behind to shock the Bergen Crusaders, 13-5, to sweep a two-game series in Passaic/West Bergen Connie Mack action. Waldwick captured the first game of the series Sunday, 9-2.

Two victories in three days places Waldwick (8-0) in strong position to earn one of two State tournament bids awarded to the Passaic/West Bergen Mack. Waldwick likely can go 6-2 over the second half of the season and still receive a bid.

Conversely, Bergen (6-2) might need to win its last eight games to qualify for the State tournament. The Crusaders have been the State's most successful Mack team in the Nineties, earning a State bid each of the last three summers and coming within one win of the Mack World Series title in 1991.

"This builds up our confidence for the rest of the season," Waldwick second baseman Mike Read said. "This proves we can play with anybody."

Waldwick stunned Bergen by scoring 11 runs in the sixth inning of a darkness-shortened six-inning game.

Waldwick's 11-run inning lasted more than a half-hour and featured one double, six singles, three walks, three errors, and one hit batter.

Each of Waldwick's first nine batters reached base and scored, with Read and winning pitcher Jay Bain each scoring twice in the inning. Read had the pleasure of producing two singles to left in the fateful sixth.

Center fielder Doug Sneyers gave Waldwick a 7-5 lead with a two-run double to center field. It was Sneyers' second double of the game and third hit in four at-bats. He scored three runs.

Infielder Ed Abruzzese also drove in two runs in the sixth. His bases-loaded single through the left side made it 9-5.

Waldwick also came from behind in Sunday's win over Bergen. It trailed 2-0 after two innings, then scored three runs in the third and five in the fifth, with Mark DeMenna's grand slam the key hit.

The sweep was especially satisfying because Waldwick lost to Bergen Catholic in the 1993 Bergen County tournament.

Teach students to read and write effectively

To the editor:

The eighth grade Early Warning Test (EWT) was introduced in March of 1991 in order to determine whether New Jersey's eighth grade students are making sufficient progress toward mastering the basic skills in reading, mathematics and writing necessary to pass the 11th grade High School Proficiency Test—a state prerequisite for a high school diploma.

Last spring, Concerned Tax-

payers of Waldwick published a comparison of the EWT scores of Waldwick and the 13 school districts that surround it. Of the 13 surrounding districts, Waldwick scored second lowest in reading and fourth lowest in math and writing. Superintendent Piegari and the trustees indignantly protested that it was unfair to compare Waldwick's scores with those of the surrounding districts because many of these communities are more affluent than Waldwick. They complained that any comparisons should be limited to the dis-

tricts that share Waldwick's "socio-economic classification." This year, we followed their suggestion in reviewing the EWT administered in March of 1992.

The New Jersey Department of Education classifies nine other Bergen County districts as similar to Waldwick in socio-economic status. In math, Waldwick's score was the fourth highest of the 10 districts. Waldwick's math score was also higher than the average score of the county and similar districts in the state. However, for the second consecutive year, Waldwick's results in reading and writing were extremely poor. Of the 10 similarly classified districts, Waldwick's writing score was the second lowest (nine out of 10). In reading, Waldwick's score was the fourth lowest (seven out of 10). More importantly, the district's scores in reading and writing were lower than the mean score for the county and for similar socio-economic districts statewide.

Although Superintendent Piegari received the EWT scores from the Department of

Education in June of 1992, he failed to inform the trustees of the results until the Feb. 8, 1993 work session. The school district has yet to make a public report of the results of the test at a regular meeting of the board of education as it is required to do by law. The EWT scores were even withheld from the public present at the work session. But the comments from the trustees indicated that they were troubled by the report. The superintendent spent a great deal of time defending the results, prompting one trustee to angrily exclaim, "Our students don't know how to put a sentence together."

In the past, the superintendent has boasted that our children "consistently score high on standardized achievement tests." He recently told us that "students in grades eight through 11, on average, scored at the highest possible grade equivalent (12.9) on all sections of the test." The latest results of the EWT, added to the fact that an unacceptable number of our high school graduates must take remedial courses in math and English before proceeding

with their college studies, paints an entirely different picture of the effectiveness of the district's educational programs.

We must not permit the superintendent to continue to hide behind the meaningless, inflated results of self-serving "achievement tests" purchased by the district, or to persist in asserting that the per-capita income and collective real estate values of our community limit the intellectual potential of our children. At a cost of \$10,000 per pupil, it is reasonable to expect that our students are taught how to read and write effectively.
