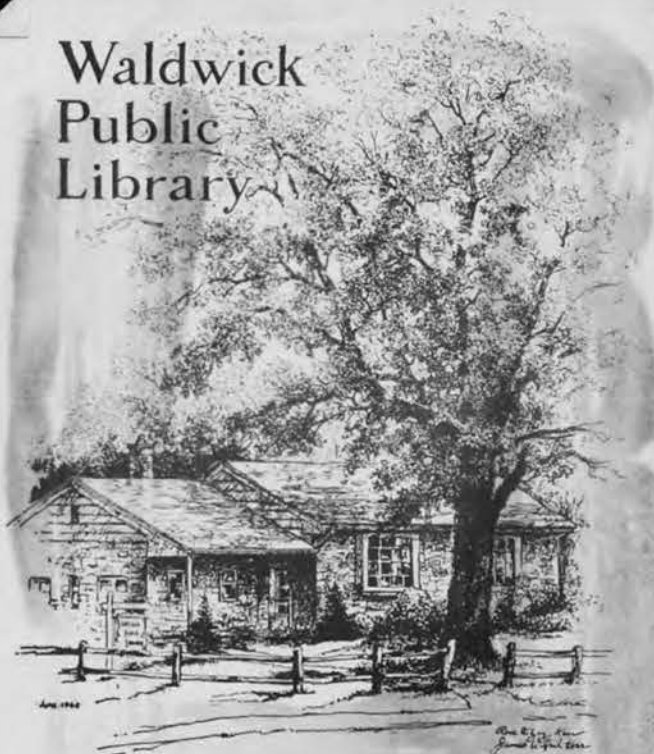

ORDINANCE NO. 27-93
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF WALDWICK TO PROVIDE FOR LICENSING OF CONTRACTORS BY ADOPTING CHAPTER 40 ENTITLED "CONTRACTORS, LICENSING OF" AND AMENDING CHAPTER 48 ENTITLED "FEES".
Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Waldwick that the Municipal Code of the Borough of Waldwick is hereby amended to include the following Chapter 40 entitled "Contractors, Licensing of" which reads as follows:
Sect. 40-1 Applicability
This chapter shall apply to all persons, the term "persons" to mean partnerships, corporations or other entities who shall undertake any services in the Borough of Waldwick for a fee, the purpose of which is to add, repair, or remove roofs, siding, rooms, dormers or other structures or to improve, modernize or modify existing rooms or structures or to install, resurface or improve driveways, patios or sidewalks, remove trees and stumps, or any improvements, provided that such work shall apply to any premises in the Borough of Waldwick where persons reside, and further provided that the persons offering the service shall not be otherwise licensed by the State of New Jersey.
Sect. 40-2 Application and registration required.
Any person to whom this Chapter applies, as set forth in Sect. 40-1 above, shall, prior to commencing any work or service in the Borough of Waldwick, make application to the Construction Code Official to register for performing work or services. The failure to register and have the application approved prior to commencement of work or performance of services shall constitute a violation of this chapter.
Sect. 40-3 Applications form to be provided.
All applications shall be submitted, in writing, upon the forms provided by the Construction Code Official.
Sect. 40-4 Expiration, annual renewal.
All Registrations approved pursuant to this chapter shall expire one year after the date of registration and may be renewed annually upon payment of the fee hereinafter set forth. Any change in the information supplied on the original application shall be reported at the time of renewal.
Sect. 40-5 Fees.
Fees shall be as indicated in Chapter 48, "Fees".
Sect. 40-6 Revocation; denial of registration or renewal.
The following shall constitute the sole grounds for which the Construction Code Official may revoke an approved registration or deny an initial registration or the renewal thereof:
A. Failure to carry worker's compensation insurance when required;
B. Failure to comply with construction standards required by state laws or regulations or local ordinance or codes after having been given a notice to cure such noncompliance and after the person's having failed to effect compliance without just cause;
C. Failure to comply with the lawful instructions of the Construction Code Official;
D. Allowing plans submitted for the obtaining of the building permit without first receiving the approval of the Construction Code Official;
E. Failure to obtain a permit when required; or
F. The applicant has had a license or registration revoked by any municipality in the State of New Jersey for any cause other than failure to pay licensing or registration fees.
Sect. 40-7 Appeals
In the event that the Construction Code Official has revoked or denied registration to an applicant or has refused to renew such registration upon submission of the required fee, the aggrieved person may appeal such denial, in writing, to the Borough Council. Upon such appeal, the following steps shall be taken:
A. Upon receipt of the written appeal, the Borough Clerk shall set a date for the Borough Council to hear such appeal. This date may be adjourned for a reasonable time at the request of the Borough Council or the person.
B. At the time, date and place set for the hearing, the Borough Council shall conduct an inquiry into the reasons for the denial by the Construction Code Official and shall hear the person as to why such denial was unreasonable or improper. At the hearing, the persons shall be entitled to call witnesses and to be represented by Counsel.
C. At the conclusion of the hearing, the Borough Council shall immediately determine whether or not the denial or the registration was proper under the circumstances and, if determined to be improper, the Council shall direct the Construction Code Official to permit the registration. If the Council determines that the registration denial was proper, it shall, in its discretion, take one (1) of the following actions:
1) Uphold the denial without further action.
(2) If circumstances warrant, permit the registration conditioned upon the person's adherence to steps imposed by the Borough Council which are designed to reasonably ensure compliance by the person with this chapter.
(3) If circumstances warrant, permit the registration by the person at such time as any deficiencies which were the grounds for the denial have been cured. The Council shall set forth the deficiencies in its ruling.
D. Within ten (10) business days of the hearing date, the Council shall notify the Construction Code Official and the aggrieved person, in writing, of its determination and any conditions which have been imposed.

Sect. 40-8 Duties of Construction Code Official.
In addition to the enforcement of this Chapter, the Construction Code Official shall ensure the following:
A. That the information contained in the application and registration is current.
B. That the applications are available for inspection and copying by any interested person.
C. That notification is made to the owner or resident of the property which work is to be done of the failure of the person to comply with this chapter.
Sect. 40-9 Violations and penalties
Any person who fails to register and have an application approved shall, if work is commenced, be subject to a penalty of a fine of up to five hundred dollars (\$500.) or imprisonment for not more than six (6) months, or both.
Be it further ordained, that Chapter 48 be amended to include a new section, 48.40 entitled "Contractors Licensing" which shall read as follows:
Sect. 48.40 "Contractors Licensing"
Licensing of contractors performing services in the Borough of Waldwick in and about residences and other structures, except electric and plumbing contractors or general contractors licensed by the State of New Jersey for erection of one or two family homes shall be as follows:
A. For original registration: twenty-five dollars (\$25.).
B. Renewal of registration (yearly) within sixty (60) days after expiration original registration or renewal; ten dollars (\$10.). The renewal date shall be on a yearly basis from the date of original registration.
C. Renewal of registrations on more than sixty (60) days after expiration of previous registration shall require an original expiration and fee.
Be it further ordained, that this Ordinance shall become effective upon passage and publication as required by law.

Waldwick teachers to rally against contract impasse

WALDWICK — Teachers who have been working without a contract since June will rally today to protest the impasse.

Michael Beatrice, the attorney for the 130-member Waldwick Education Association, criticized the Board of Education for using newspaper advertisements to "manipulate the public perception of the contract negotiations."

He said Thursday that teachers are particularly upset about an advertisement in The Record on Sunday that blamed them for the lack of progress and for refusing to negotiate.

The union will be running its own advertisement in the paper this Sunday, asserting that it had sought to conduct serious contract talks in September but that the

board "attempted to change the format of the negotiations."

Beatrice blamed board President Paul E. Cottrell for the deadlock, saying he has taken charge of negotiations rather than relying on a labor attorney or his negotiating team.

The meeting in September failed because of "personality conflicts" with Cottrell, who lacks experience in contract negotiations, Beatrice said.

Cottrell said the board resorted to newspaper ads to challenge inaccuracies in earlier union ads.

"The impasse is not a personality-based thing, it's factual," Cottrell said. "Our concern is that we've met only one time since May 26 to gain a settlement. We need both parties at the table. That's the only viable means of reaching a settlement."

Cottrell said the union has refused to meet and faulted Beatrice for the delay in seeking a state mediator. "This attorney didn't do his job," he said.

Representatives of the board and the union will meet with a state-appointed mediator Dec. 15.

Giordano: All-star

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE CITIZENS OF WALDWICK

The Waldwick Education Association is being accused of not wanting to negotiate with the Board of Education. **This is not true;** impasse must be declared by both sides before the state assigns a mediator.

The September meeting mentioned in the Board's open letter was an honest attempt to continue negotiations by our association. At that meeting the Board's team attempted to change the format of negotiations. The new method has been successfully used by some districts only after both sides have been intensively trained at considerable cost.

The dates selected for mediation were scheduled around various school concerts and functions, not the last possible date chosen by the WEA as claimed by the Board.

Public Law 123 provides for both parties to negotiate at the table as equals. The Waldwick Board of Education must acknowledge this so that the process can move along toward a successful contract that is fair to both parties.

We urge the Board to resume negotiations in good faith.

New ordinance sets guidelines for garage sales

WALDWICK— The borough council voted unanimously to amend the municipal code to tighten up laws regarding yard/garage sales in the borough.

The new ordinance now sets guidelines for garage sales

ranging from the time garage sales are permitted in the borough to what may be printed on garage sale signs.

According to the council, the municipal code was amended because some residents were taking unfair advantage of the garage sales and it was becoming a problem for their neighbors.

The ordinance now prohibits anyone from conducting a garage sale in the borough without first filing for a permit. The permit can be obtained from the borough clerk for a fee of \$5.

The ordinance states that a

permit will be issued to any one household only two times within a 12-month period and no permit will be issued for more than three consecutive calendar days.

Also regulated is the time that a garage sale can be held—9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The ordinance also states that four temporary signs are permitted to be posted in the borough. These signs may be posted for a period of two days prior to the sale and one day after the sale. All signs that are posted on a right-of-way, street or alley must be with the consent of the private property owner.

Information that is allowed to be placed on the sign includes the name and address of the person running the sale and the permit number.

Mayor Rick Vander Wende said that reason for the ordinance is because some of the town's residents had taken unfair advantage of the borough and actually had set up garage sales as businesses.

Vander Wende also raised some concerns about the traffic problems that had arisen due to the signs that had been posted in the borough, especially during the weekends.

"Cars were stopping short and almost causing accidents in the borough because they were trying to read the signs to get to these sales," said Vander Wende.

The mayor stressed that it was not all the residents who were abusing the law, just a small minority.

The penalty for any violation of the ordinance will be a minimum fine of \$15 and a maximum of \$200.

The borough also noted in the ordinance that non-profit charitable, religious or civic organizations may be exempted from the amount of days an event can be held with approval of the mayor and the council.

In other business, the council also unanimously approved the contract with Paramus to become part of their "E-911" system.

Waldwick now joins Oradell, New Milford, Tenafly and Rochelle Park as contractually committed to the regional E-911 system in Paramus.

Waldwick had previously been committed to join the Ridgewood E-911 system, but the borough received an offer from Paramus that will save the borough an estimated \$7,000, according to Councilman Joseph Musumeci.

The contract with Paramus will run for the next two years.

Teachers stage protest

Demonstrate over lack of contract since June

WALDWICK — Carrying signs that said "United We Stand" and "Settle Now," the Waldwick Education Association staged a protest in front of the Waldwick Junior and Senior High School last Friday.

The protest stemmed from the lack of a contract with the Waldwick School System since last June when the teachers' contract expired.

Michael Beatrice, the lawyer for the teachers' union, explained the status of the impasse to teachers during the protest.

He told them that the reports they have been hearing are "grossly inaccurate."

He said the reason there were no meetings over the summer was because the teachers were not around to consult on contract negotiations. "This is the way that this has been traditionally done since I've been around," he said. He has represented the teachers for the last three contract negotiations.

Beatrice blamed the breakdown of the negotiations on the "fact that no one from their (BOE) side has facilitated bringing the sides together."

Beatrice also had some harsh words for Board of Education President Paul Cottrell. He said that the breakdown was due in part to Cottrell's "inexperience in the process, perhaps because of a personality conflict or perhaps just lack of training or knowledge, something he admitted to me."

Cottrell disputed these

claims stating, for example, that he had negotiated the principals' contract with their union and had come to an agreement with them without the use of a mediator.

Cottrell was unhappy with the way the paperwork on the filing for arbitration was handled by the union lawyer.

"An impasse was declared on May 26 by the union, but the papers to file were not completed until mid-October," said Cottrell. "We could have held six or seven negotiations during this time."

Beatrice said the reason that the papers had not been filed right away was due to a representation by the superintendent of schools that there was still some hope that a contract agreement could be reached without going to mediation. "When it became clear to the union that this was impossible, which was September, we filed immediately for mediation," Beatrice noted.

Beatrice also stated that he felt the union and the board were very close to a settlement at one point, but the board had come back to the union with "different numbers."

Beatrice stated that the deadlock was reached over the specific issues of proposed health care benefits and teachers' pay, but he declined to be specific on the differences on the issues.

This is not the first time the union has demonstrated this year. The teachers had previously protested at a school board meeting on Nov. 22 to show their displeasure with the lack of progress in talks for a new contract.

The Waldwick Education Association represents 130



teachers in the school system including the high school and two elementary schools, according to the union's president, Christine Smith.

The teachers, at present, are only performing duties that are outlined in their contract, excluding activities that have included after-school clubs and late conferences with parents.

The teachers' attorney said that "labor negotiations are usually not about money, but about dignity...we need to be treated with respect...and this has not been occurring during this negotiation process."

Cottrell said that he looks forward to the negotiations that are scheduled for Dec. 15 so that "this issue can finally be settled."

Waldwick Students Recognized for Scholarship

Waldwick students consistently rank well above average in academic competitions and standardized tests held throughout the year. In this issue of *Focus* are numerous examples of the exceptional accomplishments of district students.

The 1993 Academic Decathlon team was among the top three teams in both the state and the region. Six Waldwick seniors have been recognized by the 1994 National Merit Scholarship Program. Seven current seniors have also been named Edward J. Bloustein Distinguished Scholars and another two have been designated Garden State Scholars.

These top-ranking award-winners only tell part of the Waldwick story. The great majority of district students exceed state and national standards on a variety of assessment tests, including the High School Proficiency Test, SAT, and California Achievement Tests. In addition, the profile of the class of 1993 indicates significant achievement by many students.

In October, the state issued Report Cards for every New Jersey public school to provide citizens with data on enrollment, instruction, student performance, finances, and other school characteristics. As expected, Waldwick statistics were exemplary.

District parents were sent the profiles of their child's school. Other residents may obtain Report Cards for district schools at the Board of Education office. Highlights are included in this issue.

1993 Waldwick Decathlon Team Ranked 3rd in State

According to advisor Judith Pinder, each member of the 1993 Waldwick High School Academic Decathlon team spent

about 120 hours preparing for competition. As a result, the team did better than ever before, winning the Super Quiz event, earning 35 individual awards, and placing second overall in February's Bergen West Regional competition. The students also won the third place trophy and fifteen individual medals in the state competition held in March.

In addition to numerous study sessions covering the various competition categories, the students participated in field trips to the New York Philharmonic, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and the Museum of Modern Art. They attended workshops on Asian history and on economics and participated in Mission Decathlon, a workshop and competition on the Pacific Rim. At the Mission Decathlon competition, six Waldwick students won individual awards and the team

had the highest overall mean score of any of the twenty schools involved.

The Decathlon included competition in the following categories: language and literature, economics, essay writing, interview, fine arts, social science, math, science, speech, and a Super Quiz on cultural diversity, the 1993 theme.

The 1994 regional Academic Decathlon, with a theme of Documents of Freedom, will be held on March 5 followed by the state contest on March 26.

state of New Jersey. As a semifinalist, Andrea will continue in the competition for some 6,500 Merit Scholarships, worth over \$25 million, to be awarded next spring.

Also recognized by the National Merit Scholarship Program were Waldwick High School seniors Reefat Ahsan, George Galvin, Adam Kendall, Vivian Lam, and Jennifer Thompson who were designated Commended Students.

More than one million juniors in over 19,000 U.S. high schools entered the 1994 Merit Program by taking the 1992 Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT). Only 15,000 students nationwide were selected as semifinalists. The 35,000 Commended Students from across the country placed among the top five percent of the program entrants. The National Merit Scholarship Program honors individual students who show exceptional potential for academic success in college.

Nine Seniors Selected for Garden State Scholarship Program

In recognition of their academic achievement, seven Waldwick High School seniors have been selected as 1994-95 Edward J. Bloustein Distinguished Scholars and are eligible for a \$1000 annual scholarship if they attend a New Jersey college or university. An additional two seniors have been designated 1994-95 Garden State Scholars and are eligible for a \$500 annual scholarship if they attend a college or university in the state.

The following Edward J. Bloustein Distinguished Scholars placed in the top 10% of their class and had a combined Scholastic Aptitude Test score of at least 1200 at the end of their junior year: Reefat Ahsan, Mario delValle, George Galvin, Adam Kendall, Vivian Lam, Andrea Pinyan, and Jennifer Thompson.

Junko Akiyama and Mary Jo Casey were named Garden State Scholars. To be considered for this designation, the students had to place in the top twenty percent of their class and achieve a combined SAT score of at least 1000 at the end of their junior year.

Waldwick H.S. Class of '93 Profile

□ Ninety of the 101 members of the class of 1993 are continuing their education after high school, with most attending four year colleges.

□ Five students received Letters of Commendation from the National Merit Scholarship Program.

□ Fourteen students were designated either Edward J. Bloustein Distinguished Scholars or Garden State Scholars, making them eligible for state scholarships.

□ Thirty members of the class participated in the Middle College Program, a cooperative venture with Fairleigh Dickinson University that makes it possible for Waldwick students to earn college credit while still in high school.

□ Twelve members of the class received more than twenty-eight local scholarships and awards totalling more than \$15,500. A substantial number of other 1993 graduates received college and university scholarships totalling over \$265,000.

□ College acceptances for this class include some of the most competitive and prestigious institutions in the country, such as Cooper Union, Cornell, Johns Hopkins, Trenton State, Notre Dame, Williams College, and the United States Naval Academy.

□ All the Waldwick students who took the AB Calculus Advanced Placement Examination in May 1993 achieved a score of three or higher, making them eligible for college credit in the subject.

□ The graduation rate for the class was 99%.

Waldwick CAT Scores in Top 25% of Nation

Despite the new, more demanding California Achievement Tests administered last spring, Waldwick children continue to achieve competitive results. In every subject area tested, district students averaged in the 75th percentile or better in the nation.

According to Superintendent Dr. Patrick Piegari, these new tests, which measure students against a higher standard than previous tests, include longer, more demanding reading passages, multi-step problems and open-ended questions. Waldwick was one of the first schools in the area to pilot the advanced testing program.

Job Placement Program

As a result of a \$40,000 federal grant administered by the Bergen County Private Industry Council, the Waldwick Board of Education is sponsoring a job placement program for workers 55 or older who meet income requirements set by the federal government.

Known as the "Golden Pass" program, the venture provides a fifteen-week training session followed by local job placement. Participants, who learn computer and job search skills, prepare thirty-second video resumes for broadcast over Waldwick's cable television station.

Ninety percent of the students in last spring's session of the program were placed in jobs. For more information, contact pro-

gram coordinators Janet Sobkowicz and Bob Finkelstein at Waldwick High School, 652-9000. Sessions, which will begin in December and again in February or March, are open to all eligible area residents.

Families and Schools Together

An early intervention and prevention program for elementary school children has begun this year as a joint effort of the Waldwick schools and the Family Counseling Service of Ridgewood. Known as Families and Schools Together (FAST), the project was funded by a grant from the MONY Foundation and the United Way with additional contributions from local merchants. Waldwick is one of only four communities in New Jersey that received funding to pilot this program.

FAST is designed to strengthen parent-child relationships, enhance overall family functioning, and build self-esteem in children at risk for school failure.

1863 riots had racial overtones

A Dec. 3 letter from Robert G. Tuck claims that the 1863 riots had nothing in common with the recent Los Angeles riots. I agree with Tuck that the 1863 riots had little to do with poverty. However, they had a lot to do with race.

Tuck's explanation for the 1863 riots is simplistic. Although the draft was a cause, it was by no means the only cause. Remember, emancipation had just been issued. Many newly arrived immigrants feared a huge influx of ex-slaves into the Northern labor market

would drive down wages. Therefore, racial friction caused by intense labor competition between Northern blacks and lower-class whites was a major contributing factor to the riots.

Also, Tuck seems to forget to mention that the violence surrounding these riots was directed at black Americans. For example, the 1863 riots in Detroit involved a white mob invading a black neighborhood and murdering several blacks. Furthermore, dozens of homes in the same neighborhood were completely destroyed, thus leaving hundreds of people homeless. During the New

York City draft riots, dozens of blacks were dragged from their homes and lynched in the streets; contemporary newspapers even reported some were hanged on lampposts.

Tuck is right in referring to the L.A. rioters as thugs and misfits. However, he is dead wrong in asserting that the draft rioters who beat, murdered, and lynched innocent blacks were any less cruel and inhumane than the thugs responsible for the L.A. riots.

School boards in a fighting mood

A quiet rebellion is brewing among the member districts of the New Jersey School Boards Association, and Wyckoff school officials are leading it.

Bergen County's 75 school districts pay almost \$1 million a year in dues to the NJSBA, and in return they get the association's lobbying services in Trenton, as well as education and training for school board members. Wyckoff officials say they're not getting enough for their money — about \$16,000 a year — and at

least 15 other school boards are complaining, too.

Wyckoff has gone so far as to refuse to pay its dues, at the risk of a lawsuit. School trustees say the NJSBA wastes money and no longer represents the town's interests. They only want to pay for the services Wyckoff uses, which they say are minimal. And they've been poll-

ing other school districts to see how many feel the same way.

"We would like to create a revolt," said Stephen T. Boswell, president of the Wyckoff school board. "To spend \$16,000 in dues for services we don't use goes against our responsibility to our taxpayers and children."

Instead, Wyckoff has proposed that the NJSBA itemize or "unbundle" its services, so districts can pay only for what they use.

It's the latest twist in Wyckoff's cam-

paing to free itself from the NJSBA. By law, all the state's 610 school boards must belong to the organization and pay dues.

Wyckoff may be the instigator, but it isn't the first or the only district to rebel.

Woodcliff Lake also has voted not to pay its \$6,000 in dues. Board trustee Roger Berkely said the NJSBA has "turned its orientation away from the smaller districts. We want to make sure the point is made." Woodcliff Lake is a 640-student, K-8 district.

In August, Clifton school trustees were grumbling about having to pay their annual \$23,000 in dues. "If something is so wonderful, why do they have to put a gun to your head to make you join?" asked board member Kenneth Kurnath. In the end, the board voted 7-2 to pay the fee, though the issue of mandatory membership was still a sore point.

Waldwick, and Wayne have in the past also threatened to withhold NJSBA dues.

Assemblyman Gerald Zecker, a Clifton Republican, has introduced a bill that would lift the state mandate on membership in the association, but it is given little chance of success. Other similar proposals have died in committee.

The NJSBA was established by law in 1914 as a federation of local school boards to foster education, and membership was made mandatory at that time.

In the past, Wyckoff officials had sought to form a rival associ-

ation of suburban school districts. They wound up joining the Garden State Coalition of Schools, which charged them only about \$500 a year in dues.

The Wyckoff board has supported efforts to make membership in the NJSBA voluntary. School officials have also opposed NJSBA decisions which they perceived as too favorable to urban districts.

"The type of lobbying the NJSBA does on behalf of urban districts by necessity takes funds away from districts like Wyckoff," said Wyckoff trustee Michael Becker. "Monies that could be used in suburban districts are gobbled up in special programs for urban districts."

Boswell is also concerned about some questionable financial practices that have earned the NJSBA a measure of bad publicity in recent years. He referred to a 1990 probe by the State Commission of Investigation which cited Octavius T. "Ted" Reid, executive director of the NJSBA, for "irregularities" in his expense reimbursements and an improperly filled out credit card application. In March 1991 the SCI cleared Reid of criminal wrongdoing.

The association also came under critical scrutiny after it paid more than \$900,000 in legal fees to a firm headed by former NJSBA President Lawrence Schwartz over a five-year period. "I think that the association was overcharged," said Frank Weir, a member of the Montvale Board of Education, who also sat on an NJSBA committee which studied the association's policies on hiring outside counsel.

In October Wyckoff conducted a poll of Bergen County school districts to gauge support for its campaign to itemize services. Of the 31 responding districts 15 — including Bergenfield, Emerson, Hackensack, Ho-ho-kus, and Park Ridge — said they supported Wyckoff's position.

"The poll was not encouraging," said Boswell. "But we're going to see how this plays out."

Wyckoff business administrator Richard Davis said the board will meet in January with disaffected school officials from other districts to see if they would be willing to join in defending against a potential NJSBA suit.

Janet Lobsenz, NJSBA's northwest Bergen County field service representative, said a more proper forum for complaints would be the association's delegate assembly. Itemizing services, as Wyckoff is proposing to do, would be impossible, she said, adding that the district faces a cutoff of services and a lawsuit if it goes through with its threat.

"We can't lobby for some school districts, and not others," Lobsenz said. "They claim we don't represent their interests, but we maintain we represent all students."

She said the NJSBA has saved school boards "five to six times their dues payments in its lobbying efforts alone."

Larger school districts like Hackensack, with 4,000 students, do not make use of all NJSBA's services because they have large staffs of their own, said board president Daniel Kirsch. Hackensack pays \$23,396 a year, which is assessed as a percentage of its \$43 million school budget.

But the more critical issue, said Kirsch, is NJSBA's ability to represent the needs of urban and suburban districts, which can sometimes conflict.

Kirsch's point was reflected in the furor incited by the Quality Education Act, Governor Florio's controversial strategy for reappropriating state funding to public schools. The measure reduced aid to wealthier, suburban districts in favor of poorer, urban districts.

Kirsch said all the districts facing a phaseout of state funds joined the Garden State Coalition because they felt it better represented their interests.

Yet Ridgewood, Bergen County's largest school district with 4,600 students, favors NJSBA, despite its high annual dues of \$21,000.

"NJSBA offers many services that have proven to be helpful," said Charles V. Reilly, vice president of the Ridgewood school board and a member of NJSBA's finance committee. "Without them, we'd have no input to any legislation . . . It's more effective than any one school board could be."

In a memorandum to its member districts, NJSBA president Carolyn R.S. Smith said the association's board of directors has taken into consideration the economic pressures on school districts. The NJSBA board in May approved only a 4 percent dues increase for 1993-94.

"This represents the smallest dues increase in the last three years and the second lowest since the current dues formula was adopted in 1980," Smith wrote. Dues have increased by about 4 percent over each of the last three years, she added.

Association spokesman Frank Belluscio said the NJSBA board is appointing a new committee to examine the dues structure. He said the new year will bring changes in state funding to local boards, and these changes, if suburban districts are slated for less money, will be reflected in the dues structure.

Contractors need permits

Council cites protection of citizens, especially elderly

WALDWICK—The Waldwick council recently passed a resolution to amend the municipal code which states that all contractors who do private work in the borough must obtain a permit.

The law applies to all individuals or corporations that are scheduled to do structural im-

provements in the borough.

Cited in the ordinance are the repair of roofs, modernizing or modifying existing structures, and the installations or improvements to driveways, patios or sidewalks.

Councilmen Art Barthold said that the reason the council was introducing the resolution was a "safety issue." The council was worried that they were not protecting the citizens

enough, especially the elderly.

The resolution states that prior to starting work on any of the projects listed in the proposed ordinance, the contractors must make an application to the Construction Code Official (CCO) to register for performing work or services.

The code also states grounds for the revocation or denial registration that the construction code official may use.

The six items that are listed in the code that will result in the denial of a permit are: 1) the failure to carry workers' compensation when required; 2) the failure to comply with state

borough construction codes; 3) failure to comply with the instructions of the CCO; 4) altering plans submitted for the obtaining of the building permit without first receiving the approval of the CCO; 5) failure to obtain a permit when required; 6) the applicant has had a license or registration revoked by any municipality in the state.

The fees to register with the borough are \$25 for an original registration. Renewal of registration will be yearly, with a 60 days grace period, for a \$10 fee.

Exempted from the paying

the annual fee will be electric and plumbing contractors or general contractors of one- or two-family homes, who are licensed by the state, because they have to pay a fee to the state to be licensed. The council felt that it would be a double expense on these groups to pay twice for a permit.

If a person does have their permit revoked, the council has set up an appeal process that will allow them to contest the

denial by writing to the borough council.

After the appeal has been received by the council, a hearing will take place where the council will decide immediately whether the denial will be upheld or set conditions that will allow the permit to be issued.

Any person who fails to register and have a application approved before starting work, will be subject to a penalty of up to \$500 or possible imprisonment for up to six months.

The resolution will be voted on Dec. 14 by the council at an open public meeting.

Turns in Waldwick tougher

WALDWICK — To combat traffic problems the council voted unanimously Tuesday to prohibit left turns onto a number of streets.

The ordinance prohibits left turns onto Lee Court from Wyckoff Avenue and left turns onto Wyckoff Avenue from driveways at the north side of Wyckoff Avenue between 7:45 to 8:15 a.m. and 2:30 to 3:30 p.m.

Beatrice had criticized Cottrell for wanting to change the negotiation format claiming the board president was an inexperienced negotiator. Cottrell had blamed Beatrice for a late mediation filing that held up the negotiation process.

Seniors dot All-Suburban boys soccer roster

With seniors holding down all but two spots, this year's All-Suburban boys soccer team is loaded with experience in addition to some explosive scoring and strong defense.

Five players return from the first team of 1992, while three others move up from the second team to the 13-member first unit.

Ridgewood takes team honors with three selections, while Don Bosco, Ramapo, Northern Highlands and Waldwick each have a pair of representatives. Ramsey and Midland Park each placed one player on the team.

Tim Clark of Mahwah was chosen as the sophomore of the year, while Roy Nygren of Northern Highlands took away coach of the year honors.

The player profiles:

DEVIN VANDERWEND, Midland Park

A second team selection as a defender last year, he was forced by an ankle injury to move to the goaltending spot, and he delivered a solid performance. His 0.32 goals against average included 12 shutouts, including five in a row before a 1-0 loss to Waldwick in the sectional championship. No team scored more than two goals on the senior, and he also used his field skills to start the offense with good ball distribution. "He does everything well," said head coach Jeff Hackett.

JASON CHOU, Ramapo

Another defender who was a second team choice last season, he anchored the Raider defense

that allowed only 16 goals in 20 games and produced 11 shutouts. The junior showed some offensive ability with three goals and two assists, but his talents were in marking opposition forwards and initiating the transition from defense to offense.

MARK DeMENNA, Waldwick

Coach George Farago called his sweeper "a complete player who could be a strong offensive player if he played forward, but as a fine tackler who is very strong in the air, he is a tremendous defender." He had four goals and five assists, but his finest moments came in the Bergen and state tournaments, with the team reaching the finals in both. He assisted on both goals in a pair of 1-0 wins that clinched the sectional title.

JON LLOYD, Ridgewood

"He is one of the finest defensive backs in a rich tradition of outstanding defensive players at Ridgewood," head coach Dick Bennett says of his fullback. The team allowed only 20 goals in 22 games and had 12 shutouts, and a lot of that success was due to the leadership shown by the senior. His offense was limited to a single assist, but he could make forward runs when necessary.

ROB MORRISSEY, Northern Highlands

A midfielder the past two seasons, head coach Nygren moved him back to sweeper to shore up the defense and he made the transition very smoothly — giving experience to an otherwise rookie defense. An ironman who missed only five minutes all year, he had three goals and six assists. Nygren said, "He was the team leader, and a technically sound player from sideline to sideline." The senior is looking to continue playing in college and among the possibilities are Middlebury, Vassar, Bates and Christopher Newport.

FRANK COLLADO, Ramapo

A repeat selection from last year, the senior had 14 goals and five assists this year — upping his three-year total to 36 goals and 16 assists. Richmond is among the schools interested in the midfielder's talents. Head coach Evan Baumgartner notes, "His ability to beat players off the dribble makes him a dangerous player in the box." He had back-to-back three-goal games against Old

Tappan and Northern Highlands.

DONATO D'ANGELO, Ramsey

Another two-time first team choice, he broke out with 19 goals and 13 assists — including a school-record six goals in a game against Pascack Hills. The senior raised his three-year scoring totals to 51 goals and 23 assists and was involved in 32 of the team's 37 goals this season. With six game-winning scores in the Rams' 11-6-2 year, he has 10 game-winners the past two seasons.

RICH MEYER, Don Bosco

The midfielder showed his versatility and talent when he moved to sweeper in the Parochial A championship game and spearheaded a 1-0 win over Christian Brothers Academy. The senior, a second team selection a year ago, had six goals and three assists, and head coach Rich Zawacki said, "He's probably one of the best midfielders I've had, a finesse player who is also a strong player who is good in the air."

KEITH O'CONNOR, Ridgewood

Even though a knee injury in the season opener cost him nine games, this senior four-year starter made an impact upon his return. Bennett calls him "one of the best players I've coached in my 25 years at Ridgewood." He scored 10 goals and added eight assists, with six scores coming in five state tournament games and he scored the game-winner in the county final against Waldwick. A complete player who works equally hard on defense, Hartwick could be his next stop for college ball.

STEFAN APS, Ridgewood

The other junior on the team and a two-time selection, he is the single-season record holder for goals with his 34 tallies this year. He added eight assists and is called "a consummate goal scorer" by Bennett. His three-year total of 58 goals is also a school standard, and he has 12 assists in his career. He scored or assisted in each of the four county games and had a pair of five-goal games — two four-goal games and a hat trick during the season.

ED GILMARTIN, Don Bosco

On a team that had a very balanced scoring attack, this senior was the second-leading scorer with 12 goals and nine

assists. He had two game-winning goals and was adept at making the key pass to set up scoring chances for teammates. His goal and assist in the Parochial A sectional semis keyed a 3-0 win and he had eight goals in the second half of the year.

MIKE RAI, Waldwick

Back on the first team for a second straight season, this senior forward had 16 goals and 9 assists, accounting for 25 of the team's 53 total goals. His three-year scoring totals are at 30 goals and 25 assists, and he had five game-winning scores — including all the goals in the sectional final and state semifinal wins. He also scored the lone Warrior tally in the county final in leading the team to its best season ever at 16-5-2.

ERIK SANDERSEN, Northern Highlands

The senior opened the season like a house on fire, scoring five times in the first two games and establishing himself as the go-to guy for the Highlanders. He ended the year with 24 goals and 13 assists, notching seven game-winning scores and two three-goal efforts along the way. He had five goals in five state tournament games and a hat trick against Leonia in the county tournament.

TIM CLARK, Mahwah

His freshman season was cut short by a leg injury, but there was no sophomore jinx for this T-Bird netminder. He had nine shutouts for the 12-5-2 team, allowing 26 goals in 19 games, a 1.37 goals-against average. He strung five shutouts together late in the year during a 6-0-1 run and even recorded an assist

Expect champs to repeat

There's a burning question that will cling to the lips of Bergen County girls basketball fans during the cold winter: What team will meet Ridgewood in the Bergen final in late February?

The Maroons will retain their title, sure as Tuesday follows Monday. But there are a few teams that will duke it out for the chance to upset the defending champs.

But let's first examine why Ridgewood is such a favorite to repeat. There's Shannon McGarrigle, a playmaking guard with a soft shooting touch who has been scooped up by Northwestern. She entered the season with 1,400 career points. Then there's Aimee McGuire, another talented backcourt threat who will be playing next season at Boston College. She began the campaign with 1,058 points. Not a bad pair of reasons to stay on the Ridgewood bandwagon.

Add to the mix Kelty Weeks, perhaps the most underrated outside shooter in the county. When Bergen County conducts its first three-point contest later in the season, don't be surprised if Weeks gets to the finals.

Last season, those who thought Ridgewood would stumble along the way said the Maroons' lack of size would do them in. But even without a menacing inside game, Ridgewood dominated. Again, the Maroons aren't blessed with bruising forwards or centers, but they do have Erika Bauer and Laura Picarelli, who can hold their own while giving up height and weight.

Put simply, a potent three-guard offense and the coaching of Rebecca Gattoni will enable the Maroons to repeat.

Though Pascack Valley, which lost to Ridgewood in last season's final, is probably the leading contender for Ridgewood's title, the choice here is for Ramsey to improve on its semifinal appearance and square off with Ridgewood in the championship.

The Rams, behind coach Janet Schwarz, don't have weaknesses, and they do have center Heather Champion and a backcourt of Jen Wright and Lori Jacobs. Ramsey knocked on the door in the final weeks of the '92-93 season. Don't be surprised if the Rams find the key in February.

Coach Jeff Jasper and Boston College-bound guard Kim Beezer will take Pascack Valley to the semifinals because a basketball season wouldn't be a basketball season without the Indians at least going to the Bergen final four.

As for the last piece to the final-four puzzle, the long-shot selection is Waldwick, coached by Bob Klie. Junior Jeanne Kehrberger and sophomore Erin Harvell are clutch players. They can make others around them better.

Now a quick look at some of the leagues in the area. Ridgewood doesn't have an equal in the Northern New Jersey Interscholastic League Atlantic. The Pacific battle will come down to Immaculate Heart, Paramus Catholic, and Nutley. Look for the Blue Eagles to emerge in a close race.

Wayne Hills is the surprise choice to take the Northern Bergen Interscholastic League Division 1 title, even though the consensus has Northern Valley at Old Tappan hanging on to the crown. Look for Mahwah to win the Bergen-Passaic Scholastic League King title and Waldwick to handle the competition in the Carpenter.

River Dell is the pick to edge out Queen of Peace for the Bergen County Scholastic League American Division prize. Rutherford again will roll through the National field, and Bogota will nose out St. Mary's for the Olympic title.

Council proposes traffic changes

WALDWICK — The Waldwick Borough Council has proposed an ordinance that will eliminate left turns at five sites in the borough.

The streets involved in the proposed ordinance are Crescent Avenue, Franklin Turnpike, Lee Court and Wyckoff Avenue.

Two of the left turn ordinances have to be approved by the planning board, according to Borough Administrator Gary Kratz. These deal with making a left for Home Hardware and Walgreens in the borough.

For Franklin Turnpike, the proposed legislation will prohibit making a left turn onto Franklin Turnpike from any private right-of-way or driveway within 250 feet north of the Wyckoff Avenue/Franklin Turnpike intersection.

No traffic will be permitted to make a left turn entering Wyckoff Avenue from any private right-of-way or driveway on the north side of Wyckoff Avenue within a distance 275 feet west of Crescent Avenue.

Similarly, traffic will not be permitted to make a left turn to enter a private right-of-way or driveway on the north side of Wyckoff Avenue within the

span 275 feet west of Crescent Avenue.

Left-turning traffic onto Wyckoff Avenue is prohibited from any private right of way or driveway on the north side of that street at a point 1,134 feet west of Hopper Avenue. These restrictions will be in effect from 7:45-8:15 a.m. and from 2:30-3:30 p.m.

The left-turn restriction on entering Lee Court from Wyckoff Avenue will be in effect from 7:45-8:15 a.m. and from 2:30-3:30 p.m.

Councilman Joeseeph Musumeci said that the police have expressed a desire to eliminate these left turns for reasons of safety.

The mayor also said that the ordinance was being proposed to improve traffic flow through the town, especially in the area of the high school.

Part of the proposed ordinance was an amendment to the overnight parking laws of the borough. This amendment would allow that no vehicle having other than passenger registration plates — excluding marked law enforcement vehicles or emergency vehicles — are allowed to park in the streets of the borough between the hours of 2-6 a.m.

A vote on the ordinance is set for Dec. 28.

The Wyckoff Avenue bridge will honor the memory of Army PFC Raymond E. Estes, killed in action in Korea, Oct. 26, 1952.

The Hopper Avenue bridge will be named in honor of Army Captain Earl R. Thompson, who died of wounds Nov. 29, 1944 at Hurtgen Forest, Germany.

"Dedicating these bridges to fallen veterans would honor the many Bergen County residents who have served their country through the military," Freeholder Sheehan's resolution stated.

The county is currently rehabilitating and reconstructing each of the bridges which has been renamed. The request to rename the bridges was made to the freeholders by the Waldwick Borough Council.

Ten members of Waldwick's Walter Nightingale Post 57 of The American Legion recently entertained the veterans at the Paramus Veterans Home. Instead of the usual Bingo cards, the veterans were treated to fun at the carnival wheel with cash prizes. This event has become an annual ritual for the Waldwick-based post, we're told by John E. Lyons Sr. of Waldwick, vice commander of the post.

Teen is devoted to his trombone

When Adam Kendall landed the lead role of Harold Hill in "The Music Man," he was overqualified for the job — musically that is.

The character of Harold Hill was hardly a first chair trombone player, but Kendall, playing Hill earlier this year when he was a junior at Waldwick High School, is an accomplished trombonist who also plays the baritone, piano, bassoon, and tuba.

The 17-year-old senior, who ranks first in his class of 100 students and maintains a 4.157 grade-point average, has played the instrument since he was in eighth grade.

"I already knew how to play the piano," he said of choosing to study the trombone privately and participating in the school band. "I just wanted to take something different, but nothing attracted me to it."

Kendall praises the range and tone of the instrument.

"It's the closest to the human voice out of all the instruments," he said. "In the choral music era, when they didn't have enough voices, they just substituted the trombone in."

"I love playing it," he said of practicing one hour daily. "I'll probably continue it the rest of my life."

Kendall will bypass music as a college major, however, and concentrate on making it his minor. "I like physics and chemistry, which is probably why I'll go into the psychiatry area," he said. Kendall also is interested in veterinary medicine.

His parents — his father is a civil engineer and his mother, a registered nurse — are pleased because he has selected to stay in school for "another 10 years" to attain his medical goals.

Kendall also is an Eagle Scout, earning the honor as a member of Waldwick Troop 88. As a child, he spent eight vacations at the 8,000-acre Kruger National Park in the northeast corner of South Africa, where he originally became interested in wildlife, Scouting, and pioneering. He was born in South Africa.

The times he spent at Kruger

were special, he said, because of the "dedication to preserving the animals in South Africa." The Philadelphia Zoo has even acquired white lions from its preserve.

To this day his love of the outdoors "erases all the stress" of school.

"I came from a district in South Africa that was probably the best pioneering district in the country," he said.

His troop in South Africa built log bridges that were strong enough to withstand heavy trucks. Here, he said, pioneering is not a grand scale event.

"It was a big competition in South Africa," he said. "The competition between the troops was intense."

Kendall has worked in the Adirondacks as a camp pioneering instructor, and as part of his Eagle Scout project supervised the renovation of the trail at the James A. McFaul Environmental Center in Wyckoff. Some 22 tons of gravel were spread on the McFaul trail, one bridge was rebuilt, and protection against erosion was installed.

"It was a different challenge," Kendall said. "It was a project supervising everything." That translates, he said, into discipline.

"Scouting develops organization," Kendall said. "It prepares you for life and gives you tests or challenges that are similar to real life that you won't get from just school — because everything is set forth for you at school."

"It's calmed me down quite a bit," he said, keeping an even keel as a result of his Scouting and pioneering experiences. "Panicking doesn't get you anywhere."

Kendall applies that discipline as a member of Waldwick High School's Academic Decathlon.

"It's a way teens can get together for academics instead of athletics," he said of competing in fine arts, social studies, economics, language and literature, science, and five other categories. "We have an incredible amount of team spirit and last year came in second in the region and third in the state. The feeling was just incredible."

Kendall is studying advanced-

In the April 14, 1992, edition of The Record, there was an article about the arrest of Jerome Dennis, charged with the murder of five women. Some were stabbed to death, one was beaten to death, and one death was undetermined.

What made this individual think he could use violence to vent his frustrations? What made Colin Ferguson resort to violence to vent his hatred of whites, Asians, and what he called "Uncle Tom" blacks?

Outlawing the sale and possession of all handguns might have prevented the murders on the Long Island Rail Road, but what do we do to stop individuals like Jerome Dennis?

A task force of the American Psychological Association recently reviewed the effects of television. The results of this review were published in a book, "Big World, Small Screen" in 1992. Some of the findings:

● The rate of violence on prime-time television has remained at about five to six incidents per hour, whereas the rate on children's Saturday morning programs is typically 20 to 25 acts per hour. There is clear evidence that television violence can cause aggressive behavior and can cultivate values favoring the use of aggression to resolve conflict.

● Exposure to erotic content does not appear to induce antisocial behavior, but watching sexual violence or violence in a sexual context leads to increased acceptance of rape and other forms of sexual behavior and instigates antisocial values and behavior.

The disease that is destroying this country is the use of violence to solve problems or vent frustrations. Unless we attack the causes of violent behavior, we will have to live with future Colin Fergusons and Jerome Dennises and the horrors they cause.

Boy killed in collision

"Our hearts are with the Kelly family right now," said Debra Jackson, superintendent of The Ho-Ho-Kus School, where Daniel was a student. "We're offering support to family and friends as a school community."

Funeral arrangements for Daniel Kelly were handled by Feeney Funeral Home in Ridgewood. The funeral mass and interment took place Tuesday, Dec. 22.

At the borough council meeting on Tuesday night, a petition with 115 signatures was presented to the council asking for a four-way stop sign at the intersection.

The council will put the matter on the agenda for the next meeting.

Wallington firm fined \$7,250

OSHA cites violations in death of plumber

Federal investigators have recommended \$7,250 in fines against a Wallington plumbing company for alleged violations uncovered after a worker died while repairing a sewer line.

The Occupational Safety and

Health Administration cited John Bogush Plumbing & Heating Inc. in connection with a Sept. 25 accident that killed Wladyslaw Bak, 52.

Bak was buried alive after the pit in which he was working collapsed. He had been repairing a

sewer line at the Tamaron Condominium Association in Waldwick. Co-workers were able to free Bak's head, but an autopsy showed he died of a skull fracture and brain contusion.

OSHA cited Bogush on Dec. 17 for four "serious" violations:

inadequately protecting the pit against cave-ins, having employees work without protective helmets, using an aluminum ladder with a broken top rung, and placing excavated material less than 2 feet from the pit.

The censure and penalties have been contested by the company, which is entitled to a hearing before an adm

Towns deny outsiders the use of facilities

It was on a bright weekday morning last summer — "a good day to play basketball" — that William Cosme's four-man pickup game on otherwise empty courts was interrupted by police.

Cosme, a 21-year-old Paterson resident, had been kicked off the Hawthorne basketball courts twice in previous months, and he guessed the police officers would once again tell him that as an out-of-towner, he was not welcome there.

"They said that somebody called and said people are playing on the court who are not supposed to," Cosme said. "They didn't know whether we were residents or not."

Officials in several North Jersey towns say such a scenario is not uncommon on basketball courts, fields, playgrounds, and other athletic and park facilities.

Some of the confrontations have resulted in outsiders' leaving without question, but restric-

tions on taxpayer-financed facilities also have met with resistance, indignation, charges of racism, and, now, a legal challenge.

While opponents contend that residents-only laws are unnecessarily restrictive and inconsistently enforced, supporters say they prevent damage, keep space available for residents, and help avoid costly lawsuits by out-of-towners injured while using municipal facilities.

"We've had problems with people coming in from out of town and drinking in the parks — broken glass and other problems. It's the people who live in this town who have pride in the parks and who will take care of them," said Edgewater Mayor Bryan Christiansen, who contends that the parks "are supported by the local taxpayers and should be used by local taxpayers... exclusively."

Edgewater, Ramsey, Upper Saddle River, Montvale, Teaneck, Garfield, Wallington, Rutherford, Hawthorne, Prospect Park, Haledon,

tor general's office says the system states use to charge the federal government for those administrative costs has "degenerated into a highly technical accounting and allocation maze."

That report also suggests that consultants are taking advantage of outdated federal policies to reap bigger payments for the states.

The investigators say the system municipal pool, Cosme said.

But Cosme, who is Hispanic, said he found it disturbing that someone would complain about his "quiet" game when the rest of the athletic area was vacant. He said he believes the Hawthorne rules have an undercurrent of racism because police, acting on complaints from residents, questioned him on previous occasions while players on other facilities were left alone.

"I guess when they see someone of color, or Hispanics, they always come around," Cosme said. "When the other kids are playing — the white kids — they don't tell them nothing."

Mayor Anthony Ross said he considers Hawthorne "a pretty fair town," and he was skeptical of Cosme's allegation.

"Maybe [the police] knew the people on the other courts, and besides, it's hearsay that they didn't check the people on the other courts," Ross said. "How would they know which [group] it was unless they knew who the other kids were, or unless they were repeat offenders?"

Ross also defended the ordinance as a way to preserve facilities for the taxpayers who finance them.

"It is enforced when we're made aware of a problem," he said. "We don't have somebody routinely go down to see if there are out-of-towners on the ball fields."

Charges of discrimination also were raised in Haledon in the fall, after a Prospect Park woman was convicted of trespassing in a park. Critics said the case had racist overtones because the woman — wearing a traditional Arab dress — was issued a summons even though police usually issue warnings.

Police rebutted the argument by saying that the Syrian native, Hwida Barkawi, had been warned the day before that the Roe Street Field was for residents only.

"If we get a complaint, we ask people to leave," Haledon Deputy Police Chief Michael Del Vecchio said. "We don't just start writing summonses."

Del Vecchio said the department had written no more than a dozen such summonses during his 24 years on the force.

Barkawi's attorney, Marianne Tolomeo, said her client was waiting in the park to meet a Haledon resident and, therefore, was a guest. Municipal Judge Leon Consales didn't buy that argument, and fined Barkawi \$200 in October.

"The simplification of assistance programs at all levels of government has been the 'holy grail' of welfare reform — always sought, never realized," the task force says in a draft report. "The reasons are many... yet everyone agrees that recipients, administrators, and taxpayers are all losers due to the current complexity."

As a first step, the task force recommends that HUD and HUD accommodate the residents of the borough, but it's small; it's not Yellowstone Park," he said. "If it was open to everyone, I'm sure it would have a detrimental effect on residents who pay the taxes."

Van Sickle said that like Edgewater and other municipalities, Haledon has made it a point to refuse state grants for parks, which would require the borough to open its facilities to all. Some towns with restrictions, such as Garfield and Montvale, have areas that are open to outsiders because the facilities benefitted from state funding.

Some towns, such as Hackensack and Old Tappan, do not chase individuals or small groups from their parks, but require permits — granted only to local groups — for organized use of fields and facilities.

Teaneck, which already restricts parks to residents in its administrative code, recently passed an ordinance making certain fields usable by permit only, and the permits are granted only to local groups, Recreation Director Glena Crockett said.

Some of the towns that prohibit outsiders from using their parks don't have official prohibitions on the books. Totowa and Park Ridge have residents-only signs posted, and police kick out non-residents, even though there is no law that explicitly gives them the authority to do so, officials said.

"We don't need an ordinance," said Robert Corrado, Totowa's borough attorney. "If we pay the bill, we can control the park."

Park Ridge Mayor Richard Mancinelli said his borough has had residents-only signs posted for as long as he can remember, and police sometimes request proof of residency at basketball courts.

"Unless there's something noticeable, like out-of-state plates, we don't harass anybody on the fields," Mancinelli said.

Several other towns near the New York State border cite the presence of cars with out-of-state plates as reasons why they have restrictions.

Last month, Montvale passed an ordinance barring out-of-towners from parks because basketball courts were being dominated by people arriving in cars with out-of-state plates, officials said.

The situation flared up last summer when an out-of-towner allegedly knocked several teeth out of a resident's mouth during a rough basketball game, and witnesses saw another outsider breaking one of the area's four new bas-

Boro center back on track

Council reviews reworked cost estimates, calls for new bids

The ball for Waldwick's proposed community center started rolling again, due to the efforts of the borough council.

Councilman Ed Sherman came back to the council with cost projections showing how much would have to be spent to construct the center.

The council was advised that each of his five estimates would all come within the \$440,000

range.

These were not new revelations to the council. Back in mid-October, the council was told that the project would cost over \$400,000 by Wells Associates, the firm that has been handling the project for the borough.

At that time, Wells Associates felt that the \$400,000 estimate provided a good starting point for the borough when considering budgets for the project. The firm also informed

borough officials back then that they had received six bids, four of which were within \$10,000 of each other but each costing in excess of \$400,000.

The community center project deals with the rehabilitation of a house located at Hopper and West Prospect streets. The structure would be converted into a multiple-purpose facility that can be used by any borough resident or group.

At that time, the council hoped to spend only \$300,000 for the project.

Sherman, head of the Buildings and Grounds Committee

that is overseeing the project, told the council that nothing else could be trimmed from the project and this was the best way to go.

The council also discussed the possibilities of fund-raising to obtain needed additional funding. Mayor Rick Vander Wende informed the council that he had contacted Sen. Bill Bradley and Congresswoman Marge Roukema to see if the borough was eligible for some form of financial aid from the federal government.

Councilman Joseph Musumeci suggested some form

of community fund-raiser with such ideas as a "wall of fame" that will be displayed somewhere in the building.

Borough Administrator Gary Kratz also warned the council that there will be additional funds needed for interior furnishings. He also advised that landscaping will also be needed in the future.

None of these costs have been included in the proposed budgets thus far, according to Sherman.

The mayor proposed that the borough might act as a subcontractor for the project to help lower costs.

Ultimately, the council decided to have Wells Associates complete the drawings for the community center. The council expects to have those renderings back in about six weeks at which time the public can see what the proposed community center will look like.

The council also instructed Wells to issue a new call for bids.

Model railroading — more than a mere plaything

It started 12 years ago to fulfill one man's desire to show off the model trains he had used as a child. Now, according to John McHugh, spokesman for the Bergen County Model Railroad Club, that same model train show attracts more than 3,000 people over the course of the Thanksgiving weekend.

The show, co-sponsored by the Friends of The Waldwick Library, where the show is held, and by the county railroad club, is the most popular train show in the area, according to McHugh.

On display was an assortment of model railroad stock — from ones dating back to the early 1900's to modern versions targeted at preschoolers.

Set up throughout the library were five separate displays. The trains that circled several of the displays were principally Lionel and American Flyer products from the post-World War II period. There was also a collection of older equipment on display dating from the pre-World War I period through 1939.

John Huska, a Waldwick resident, is considered the man

responsible for starting the local show and the model railroad club, according to McHugh. Huska's private collection, in one of those separate displays, includes his "President" set — considered the finest model train produced by American Flyer electric trains in the 1920's, it represents a Pullman train of the type pulled by a New York Central electric locomotive that powered that line's commuter trains between Grand Central Terminal and Croton-Harmon, New York.

Electrification was considered state-of-the-art in railroading back in the days when these trains were built, particularly in urban areas where residents sought relief from the smoke and soot by-products of steam locomotion. The toys of that era mirrored the public's perception of what a modern railroad should look like.

Hilmar Roberts, another Waldwick resident, added the oldest train models to the show. His collection, also given its own display area, dates from World War I and consists entirely of trains he received from his family during the Christmases of his youth.

The main display, mounted on a 15 x 17-foot layout in the library's main reading room, included several sets on trains on numerous tracks all operating simultaneously in miniature scenic settings.

The reason for the elaborate settings, McHugh admitted, is that "trains can get pretty boring after running around the track two or three times. Besides, setting up the scenery puts some fun into it."

This year's major attraction featured a new mountain setting, replacing the eight-foot peak which has dominated the layout for the past seven years. Ernie Delcher of Mahwah is the architect of the new mountain built largely in his garage. And, if you have mountains, you must have deep canyons and tunnels. Since trains served the populace, no layout would be complete without a small town, a train station and a freight yard. These set-ups typically attempt to re-create the department store displays which marked the Christmas season

from the early 20's until the late 50's.

Among the features that were included in the three-tiered display were trains that went around the mountain, a trolley car that ran from the mountain into the 'town' and trains that crossed through the mountain via tunnel.

On the 'town' level was a series of tracks that ran trains continuously. One of the trains even puffed out smoke as it went around the track.

In the town, people and vehicles could be spotted along the main street of the classic American town. Adding to the realism were billboards, general stores, telephone poles with lines, bushes and bridges.

One of the more unusual features in the town was that of a house afire. This was accomplished by "placing an old smoke stack from a model train and putting it into the building" to create the effect, according to McHugh.

In addition to the show's train sets, one of the most interesting and eye-catching was a fully operational model circus. Complete with large

canvas tent with acts in progress, it also featured an amusement park with rides and several other fully animated displays. It recaptured the glory of the great traveling circuses of yesteryear.

For the younger train enthusiast, Thomas the Tank Engine and Percy the Green Engine also appeared at the Waldwick event. Thomas, the star of the popular PBS children's show (and of the Waldwick show for those kids attending), and Percy were contributed to the show by Frank Van der Wiede of Fair Lawn. This year's show marked their third straight appearance.

According to McHugh, these two trains were a big hit with the kids who came with their parents who, in turn, had come to show their kids the kinds of toys they played with in their childhood.

"Many people think of Christmas when they see the toy trains," said McHugh. "This is a tribute to the Lionel Company and Joshua Lionel Cohn, who set out to associate these two things by setting up

Christmas scenes in his train catalog."

"The ironic part is that the most expensive toys are the ones that were built after a corporate raider took the company over," said McHugh. "New management effectively ruined the company that Lionel Cohn had built."

"The quality of train that was built was awful and was easily broken. Thus there are not many of these around and the price has gone up on these trains," said McHugh.

"Here were trains built for children to use," said McHugh, "but the collectors have bought them all up and made them too expensive to be played with as toys. The collectors of trains have driven up the price so much that it is not wise to have them as toys for kids anymore."

However, the shows go on!

The next event sponsored by the Bergen County Model Railroad Club will be at the Methodist Church in Pearl River, N.Y. during the last three weeks of February.

Pickup schedule dominates Waldwick council work session

WALDWICK — The discussion of leaf pickup dominated the Waldwick Council's work session last week as Councilman Art Barthold reiterated his request for a revamping of the collection schedule next year.

Barthold brought the issue before the council, stating there had been only one pickup in his area. He felt that a new system

should be adopted by the borough for next year.

He suggested to the council that a schedule be worked out involving two pickups for each of the five zones in the borough, with the last date for any possible collection set for late December.

Borough Administrator Gary Kratz defended the Department of Public Works (DPW), saying that in the past the leaves had been picked up on

time. He cited that the availability of, or lack of manpower in the DPW late in the year and the surprise snowstorms that came in November hindered the department's normal routine.

Barthold also complained that some in the community have been putting their leaves in the street after the scheduled pickup.

"The residents that do this are destroying the hard work that the council has done for the beautification of Waldwick," said Barthold.

Barthold felt that these residents should be warned, and maybe even issued a summons,

for breaking the law by littering the street.

Kratz commented that one of the problems is that not all the leaves fall at the same time and this extends the pickup period.

Barthold then suggested to the council that residents then be allowed to take their leaves to the compost site that is located off Wyckoff Avenue.

Kratz said that before the borough had the tub grinder, the borough had allowed residents to deposit their leaves there. However, he felt that allowing people to go there

while the tub grinder was working could be a "disaster."

Kratz indicated another alternative would be for residents to bring bagged leaves to the recycling center located behind the DPW building, but the borough does not have a garbage truck at this time that could handle the job.

He added that the idea of allowing residents to go to the recycling center was looked on with a degree of caution by DPW Superintendent Ray Schmidt. Schmidt had expressed the fear that residents would bring garbage to the recycling center.

Barthold also expressed his displeasure with the upkeep of the recycling center. He felt there should be somebody there every day to make sure the center was clean.

Kratz commented that according to the DPW work schedule, a worker is stationed there every day to make sure that the place is kept neat, but due to the manpower shortage the DPW had been experiencing recently, the borough had to pull that man off the job and have him collect leaves and help with snow removal.

The council expressed an interest in hiring another person for the DPW who will concentrate solely on the recycling center.

Oakland to vote on non-district children

Thirty-four disabled and neurologically impaired students who are bused to Oakland from other school districts could be forced to attend classes elsewhere if the town's Board of Education adopts a recommendation to charge more for their tuition.

Dr. Joseph Mas, a consultant hired in October to study cost-saving measures in Oakland's special-education program, has urged the board to begin charging outside districts as much as \$3,000 more per student.

Oakland receives \$3,771 each for 19 disabled preschool students from other districts and \$15,061 for each of 15 neurologically impaired K-8 students as part of a 1992 funding formula worked out with the Northwest Bergen Council on Special Education.

Mas maintained that the extra \$100,000 in funds would partially compensate Oakland for nearly \$130,000 in costs, such as support-staff salaries, that have not been factored into the council's reimbursement tuition formula. Mas made his recommendation at a board meeting on Thursday.

He argued that Oakland has one of the highest percentages of special-education students from outside districts.

Of Oakland's 53 special-education students, 34 come from other districts. By comparison, Allendale has 24 students with nine coming from other districts, Wyckoff 41, with eight from other districts, and Mahwah has 30 with five from other districts, Mas said. This imbalance, he said, puts an unfair financial burden on taxpayers.

Although the board has taken

no official position on the recommendation, it apparently has the support of the board president, James Mokhiber, who said Oakland will consider pulling out of the Northwest Bergen Council on Special Education if outside districts don't agree to pay the higher reimbursement. The council was formed in 1972 to pool resources and administer special-education programs more efficiently.

Tom Morton, council chairman and Allendale superintendent, objected strongly to the recommendation. He said demanding a tuition hike after most districts have settled their annual budgets would be like "cutting their throats."

"I think they may be manipulat-

ing the numbers to show a one-sided story," Morton said. He called the formula "fair and equitable."

Mokhiber said Mas's 58-page report will be made public on Jan. 21 after board members have an opportunity to read and discuss it. A decision on whether to adopt the recommendation will be made no later than March after a public comment period. If adopted, the decision would take effect in September 1994, he said.

The preschoolers who are being bused to Oakland would then have to be sent to one of three other council districts: Wyckoff, Mahwah, or Ramsey. The neurologically impaired students would have to

be mainstreamed into their own districts or sent to districts that have similar programs.

Mas, who has served as schools superintendent of the Ramapo-Indian Hills Regional district and at districts in Waldwick and Glassboro, said that despite the tuition inequity, Oakland should remain in the council and take advantage of its benefits, such as expertise in grant applications, teacher training, and new programs.

He also recommended that Oakland accelerate mainstreaming of special-education students, demand more on-time payments from sending districts, and bus students to closer districts to save transportation costs.

State's cost per pupil is nation's highest

In typical fashion, some of our state legislators continue to thumb their noses at the taxpayer while they work unabashedly on behalf of the New Jersey Education Association (NJEA) - the powerful teachers' union that campaigned to defeat Governor-elect Christie Whitman.

In the December 1993 issue of "NJEA Reporter," the teacher's union declared their top legislative priority to be the passing of the "NJEA's" anti-privatization bill. Governor-elect Whitman has indicated her support for privatization. Schools that have implemented the privatization of some school services have been able to affect savings that have freed up hundreds of thousands of dollars for

educational programs.

The anti-privatization bills drafted by Senator Kosco (S-1779), Senator Ewing (S-2018) and former Assemblyman Martin (A-1220) have been touted as a protectionist form of legislation for school employees on behalf of the NJEA. If passed, this legislation would make it virtually impossible for school boards to subcontract school services such as cafeteria, transportation and maintenance.

It is time that our legislators were reminded that the public schools were created for the sole purpose of educating students. Schools were not created to serve as public employment agencies. School boards must be permitted to provide a "thorough and efficient" educational system by maximizing the productive and efficient use of public funds (taxpayer

dollars). For the third consecutive year, New Jersey's average cost per pupil of \$10,500 is the highest in the nation.

Our elected representatives in Trenton have an obligation and responsibility to place the welfare of the children of the state of New Jersey above the welfare of the teachers' union (NJEA). Tearing up these anti-privatization bills would be a step toward fulfilling that commitment.

Nary a grain of salt's left

Waldwick, like other area towns, has no reserves to handle future storms

WALDWICK— The harsh winter that's hit the local area has had a devastating effect on the borough of Waldwick's salt supply.

"The borough is out of salt," Mayor Rick Vander Wende reported to the borough council at their last work session.

Vander Wende explained to the council that the borough is supplied with salt by the

Bergen County Department of Public Works. Unfortunately the county has been unable to keep up with the demand to meet the borough's needs.

"We have ordered, so far this season, 100 tons of salt from the county," explained Vander Wende. "But we have only received 25 tons of that order."

The mayor said that the borough shares its salt depot with the borough of Allendale.

That depot is completely "tapped out," according to Van-

der Wende.

According to the mayor, the borough has an agreement with the county to be supplied with 49 tons of salt per winter storm. But due to the frequency of recent storms, the county has been unable to deliver this amount.

Vander Wende told the council that the county is helpless in this matter because there are priorities for the salt. He said the county receives its salt from a Port Newark base. The state gets first shot at the salt to take care of state roads; the county then takes what it needs for county roads; and the re-

mainder of the salt is then distributed to municipalities throughout the county.

He also told the council that the borough is not the only town in the area that is experiencing this predicament.

"The Northwest Bergen Mayor's have been trying to get salt for our area," he reported. "Everybody in this area seems to be in the same boat."

In the meantime the borough has been using salt obtained from a local salt distributor. Unfortunately, said Vander

Wende, the local salt man has been unable to give the borough anymore because he is starting to run low himself.

If it does snow again, the borough will try to plow as best they can, said Vander Wende.

If it does snow again, in the absence of salt the borough is looking into buying sand to help road conditions.

Also affected by the weather is the Water Department. Chief Financial Officer Mary Ann Viviani informed the council that the recent weather has altered

some of the duties of the water department.

In addition to helping with the removal of snow in the borough, the water department also has had to help residents with frozen water pipes caused by the bitter cold that continues to sweep the area.

"The common problem that we have been seeing is that of homeowners not keeping the house temperature high enough if they are away for a weekend," said Viviani.

If house temperatures are set too low, she explained, the water in the pipes freeze and the pipes burst.

Drug bust close to school

WALDWICK — The Bergen County Narcotics Task Force and Waldwick Police Officer John Unger arrested a steroids dealer on Monday, according to Bergen County Prosecutor John J. Fahy.

Norman Chidiak, 27, of Paterson has been charged with distribution of a controlled dangerous substance and distribution of a controlled dangerous substance within 1,000 feet of a school, Fahy said.

Fahy said the county and Waldwick Police had carried on a joint investigation for three months and that Chidiak

was captured after he attempted to sell primobolan, a form of anabolic steroid, to an undercover police officer near the E.C.L.S. School on Franklin Turnpike in Ho-Ho-Kus.

"We had information that he had been doing it," Fahy said.

If convicted, Chidiak could face up to five years in prison and a fine of \$15,000. He would have to serve at least three years in prison because the violation occurred within 1,000 feet of a school.

In most cases, a convicted criminal only serves 15 to 20 percent of his sentence, Fahy said.

Fahy said he was released on

his own recognizance and will appear in Waldwick Municipal Court on Feb. 10.

Fahy added that Chidiak was released without bail because this was his first offense.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council believes that outdoor displays and sales are in the best interests of the Borough by promoting our business community; and
WHEREAS, these displays and sales should be regulated such that they do not become a nuisance or hazard to pedestrian traffic;
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Mayor and Council of the Borough of Waldwick, in the County of Bergen, New Jersey as follows:

Section 1. The Code of the Borough of Waldwick is hereby amended to include a new Chapter 62A which will be entitled, "Outdoor Displays and Sales," and reads as follows:
62A-1 - Permit Required.
On application to the Borough Council, the Borough Council may by resolution permit the outdoor display and/or sale of merchandise on sidewalks and adjoining areas subject to the conditions contained herein. Following the adoption of the enabling Resolution, permits shall be issued by the Borough Clerk.

62A-2 - Application Procedure.
The applicant shall provide a sketch drawing showing the area to be used for outdoor display or sale. This area shall not be an off-street parking place nor shall it be obstructive to easy ingress and egress from the building or create a fire hazard. Outdoor displays or sales shall about the principal building and shall leave a minimum of four feet of unimpeded sidewalk as measured from the curb for pedestrian traffic. Merchandise shall be securely and adequately placed so that it will not endanger passers-by, or be stored indoors as to create a safety or fire hazard.
The applicant shall also certify to the following as part of the application package:
A. No food or food stuffs be displayed or offered for sale unless approved and permitted by the Board of Health.
B. The outdoor display and sale be restricted to areas zoned for business and be in accord with all zoning regulations pertaining thereto.
C. All participating displays or sellers shall own or lease permanent premises where the outdoor display or sale will be conducted.
D. The permit would not adversely affect the public welfare.
E. No additional signage for the outdoor display merchant is required.

62A-3 - Application Fee.
The application will require a fee as per Chapter 48 of the Code.

62A-4 - Permit Term.
The permit shall be good for one year and shall run from April 1st through March 31st. If, during the course of the permit, the area used for outdoor display is expanded, a new application and permit shall be required for the balance of the term.

62A-5 - Merchant Days.
The provisions of this chapter shall not apply to Borough Council sanctioned Merchant's Days.

62A-6 - Enforcement and Penalties.
Enforcement of the provisions of this chapter shall be under the jurisdiction of the Zoning Code Official and the Police Department. Penalties for non-compliance are contained in Chapter 1-14.1.

Section 2. Chapter 97-34 entitled "Display of Goods for Sale" is hereby deleted in its entirety.

Section 3. Chapter 48 is amended to include a fee for outdoor displays and sales as follows:
48-62A-3 - Application fee for outdoor displays or sales - \$25.
Section 4. Chapter 82-1 is hereby amended adding the following sentence at the end of this section.
Outdoor display of goods and sales authorized under Chapter 62A are excluded under this section.

Section 5. This ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication in accordance with State law.

Road Warriors are winners in '93-94 basketball battles

On the road have the Warriors of Waldwick marched, and coach Paul Puglise's boys' basketball crew has fared quite well. Playing eight of their first 12 games away, they are 8-4 after Tuesday night's win at home over Manchester.

With only one senior, captain Jason Bain, on the roster, Waldwick, 10-13 last season, has an outside chance of making the county tournament, with games against Hawthorne and powerful Passaic Tech before next Wednesday's cutoff.

"We're a fun team to watch," said Puglise, now in his 19th season as head coach. "We play an up-tempo game and aggressive defense and run a decent motion offense. The kids have played great."

It is a young team, though, with one senior, two juniors and two sophomores starting. But the talent has been there. The Warriors had an impressive 4-0 start and a number-two ranking in the Group 1-2 county poll behind Pascack Hills.

The Warriors placed second in an eight-team Christmas tournament at Dwight-Englewood High School, going 3-1. They lost to Group 2 Pascack Hills, 42-39, in the finals after an impressive win over Group 2 Ridgefield Park.

"It was kind of strange," Puglise said, "in that four of our first five games were at one place and away. But the kids have handled the road games very well."

Powerful Paterson Catholic, which has two nationally-ranked players, is in Waldwick's B-PSL Carpenter Division. The Cougars beat the Warriors, 82-39, in their first meeting. So, Puglise says, "One of our goals now is to be among the top three teams in our division."

"We played a great opening quarter against them," he noted. "We were up, 6-1, after the first four minutes and then 8-4. But they went on a 10-2 run in the last three minutes and went up, 14-10. In the third period, they shut us

out 27-0. We played as good as we could possibly play in that first quarter."

Waldwick's two other losses have come in overtime, 45-39 to rival Midland Park and 65-62 to Pompton Lakes.

"Midland Park played a great game against us, but we got caught in a no-practice situation because of the weather," Puglise said.

Bain, a tight end in football, stands at 6-foot-5 and is the Warriors' leading rebounder.

"Jason very seldom comes off the court," Puglise noted. "We really don't have someone at this time we can replace him with. It's very difficult to take him off the court, because he is our lone power player. It's a tough situation for Jason, but he is doing a great job off the boards."

Forward Mike Branagh, a 6-4 junior, is the Warriors' leading scorer, averaging 13 points. Branagh, also the quarterback in football, is a second-year varsity starter.

"The one thing that I feel very confident with Mike is that he is pretty much under control whatever the situation is," Puglise said. "We always rely on Mike to make a good pass and handle the ball if we're pressured. He is just cool under fire."

Junior Rich Parks is the point guard, and his backcourt partner is 5-10 sophomore Matt Sugrue, the team's second-leading scorer.

"Matt can put the ball in the basket quite well," Puglise said. "He is a good, solid player with great fundamentals and good quickness. Matt can also play the point when necessary. He had three three-point baskets against Pompton Lakes. When teams are looking to collapse on Branagh, Matt and Rich have been able to step up and make some big baskets."

Another sophomore, 6-foot forward Paul Del Dalle, rounds out the starting five. "Paul does a real nice job for us," said Puglise. "He is very much under

control and handles the ball well. He doesn't make many turnovers and does a good job of rebounding, using his body well to position himself."

Puglise is using a seven-man rotation, and two other sophomores, guard Mike Jones and forward Don Smialowicz, have contributed to the team's success. Along with Del Dalle, Jones and Smialowicz were starters on Waldwick's soccer team that made the Group 1 state finals.

"Mike has done a very good job of coming in for Parks and Sugrue," the coach noted.

Smialowicz enters the game to give the forwards a rest, although he can be used at a guard spot, too. "Donnie jumps extremely well and is pretty quick and strong," Puglise said. "He uses his body inside very well."

The remaining varsity players are twin brothers Chris and Mike Bryson, 5-11 forwards, junior guard Earl Alcalde and 6-1 sophomore Matt Marquis.

"When it's necessary, I can put Matt Marquis in for Bain," Puglise noted. "He has great hand and eye coordination and good skills."

Young Warriors uphold Klie's winning tradition

At this point last year, the Waldwick girls basketball team was undefeated heading into the county tournament en route to a 21-4 season and the Group 1, North Section 1 state championship.

After Tuesday's 42-20 win over Manchester, the Lady Warriors were 7-3, but that's okay with veteran coach Bob Klie, who says, "The fact that we are so young, I didn't have a grip on where we would be after ten games. The best I could have hoped for is 8-2."

Not far off the mark are those seven wins, but, then again, winning has become a pastime for Klie teams, who average just four losses a year. Waldwick's dean of students has a varsity career mark of 281-62 in this, his 14th season as the Warriors' head coach.

The Warriors, who graduated three starters from last year's squad, have lost to Bogota, Emerson and Glen Rock by considerable scores. The latter team, 21 points better than the Warriors that night, is Waldwick's chief competitor for B-PSL Carpenter Division honors, an accolade Klie has received 10 times in his career.

"If we can steal a win from Glen Rock (6-0 in the division) next time, we have a good shot at sharing the league championship," said Klie, whose club is 5-1 in the Carpenter circuit. "I believe we will get better as the season goes on. When you have younger kids, you tend to improve faster than when you have a group of veterans."

Graduated are last season's top three scorers — Kim Kehrberger, Megan Schu, and Christine D'Annibale. "We averaged 46 points last year, and we lost 37 points per game from those three seniors," Klie noted.

Still, Klie has woven one senior, three juniors and one sophomore into another winning unit.

His two returning starters — junior Jeanne Kehrberger and senior Christine Shenkberger — have kept the Warriors competitive along with sophomore Erin Harvell, who was the first player off the bench last season.

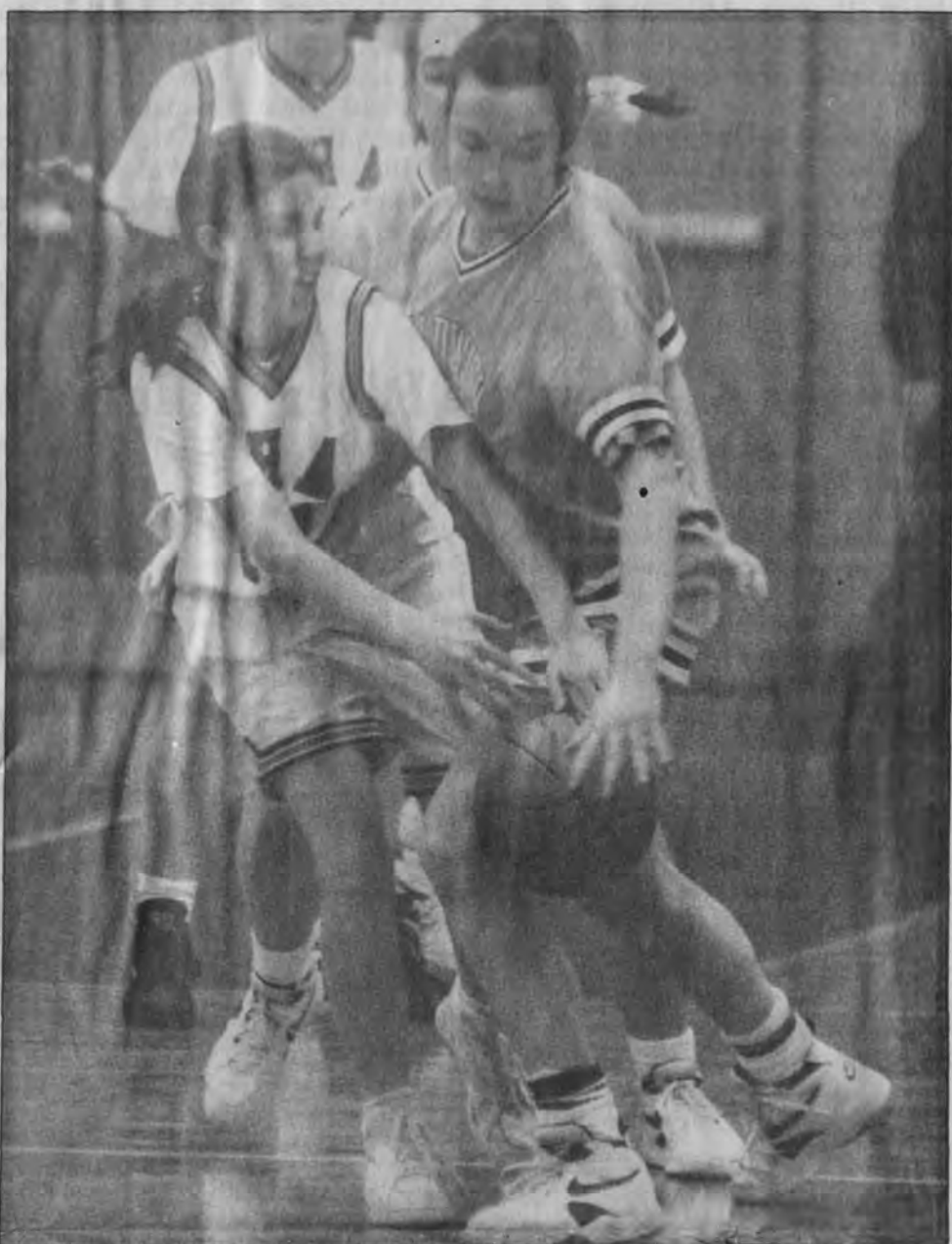
Newcomers to starting varsity roles are juniors Lisa Porfido and Kerri Fusco. First to enter the game is sophomore Kellie Woetzel; the next player is freshman Erin Kenny.

"We are having a lot of trouble putting the ball in the basket," noted Klie. "We've had four different leading scorers. And we don't rebound well at all. To me, rebounding is five percent technical and 95 percent heart. I think anyone can be a rebounder if he or she wants to be."

Shenkberger, a 5-9 center, is the

Warriors' leading rebounder.

"Christine epitomizes the word Warrior," Klie said. "She gives away three or four inches every game to the biggest player on the other team, but she just battles and battles. She comes away black and blue every game."

Klie calls Harvell, a 5-6 guard-forward, "our street fighter."

"Every year we have one," Klie said. "Last year it was Megan Schultz. Erin is a bruiser, but she has a wonderful, natural talent. If we can just keep her healthy (she missed part of last season and the first five games this year with an ankle injury), she does every part of the game well."

At shooting guard is the 5-foot-4 Porfido.

"Lisa is probably the best pure shooter on the team," Klie said. "She leads us in three-pointers with 15. She's led the team in scoring twice and had 19 points in our win over Manchester, but the problem is that she will go for games and not score anything. I think Lisa will develop into a nice player, but we must make her more aggressive."

Guiding the Warriors from the point is Fusco.

"Offensively, Kerri is starting to do the things a point guard has to do, like penetrate and shoot the jump shot to keep the defense honest," said Klie.

"She is beginning to play good defense and is starting to understand what her role is as a defensive player. We will be a much better team in late February and early March, and Kerri will be one of the reasons for that improvement."

Klie calls Woetzel "the most improved player I have from last year, without a doubt. Kellie had no varsity experience coming into this year, but she's a terrific athlete. If she puts in the time necessary to practice, I'm not sure there is any telling how good she can be."

Kenny, the point guard for the jayvee team, plays forward for the varsity. Klie calls her "a terrific prospect," adding that "Erin's skills are good; she's a multidimensional player, and I think she can play anywhere. Plus, Erin is a delightful kid."

Junior Sara Harvell, a guard, and freshman Kate Gall, a 5-8 guard, round out the team.

Tracy D'Annibale, a 1984 Waldwick graduate who was a First Team All-County guard her senior year, is in her fifth season as the junior varsity coach.

"We only have 15 players in the entire program," Klie noted. "We've been down in numbers for four or five years now. I don't think we've broken 20 since 1988."

Kehrbergers a basketball staple at Waldwick High

"I can count my successes in basketball in Kehrbergers," says Waldwick coach Bob Klie. "They have probably been around for pretty close to 200 of my wins."

First, there was Liz, a 1990 graduate; next was Kim, a 1993 grad. Now, there's Jeanne, a 5-8 junior guard-forward, gracing the court. Soon, eighth grader Katie will join her.

"They're just great kids," Klie said. "They have a great work ethic, are intelligent and have a good sense of humor."

Jeanne already is a three-year varsity starter. Liz and Kim started varsity their sophomore years. Kim and Jeanne played varsity together for two seasons.

"They all have a real knack for finding a way to win," said Klie. "I've seen it the most in Liz and Kim, but I'm remembering them as seniors. I think Jeanne has the same thing —

whatever it takes to win a game, she will do."

That knack, says Klie, "is something you don't find in a lot of kids, but the Kehrbergers have been able to find a way to combine the general concept of the game with the skill work."

"Jeanne has a very good attitude," said Klie of his current Kehrberger. "She isn't afraid to try new things. Jeanne has the potential to average 25 points a game. She not only has the potential, but the skills to match that potential."

Liz is a senior at Tufts University in Massachusetts where she is a three-year starter on the women's basketball team.

Kim is a freshman at Williams College in Williamstown, Mass., where she was seeing between 10-to-15 minutes of playing time on the varsity before recently sustaining a knee injury. — FARRELL

Sidewalk sale resolution passes council

Officials hammer out resolution termed 'reasonable for merchants'

WALDWICK — A resolution, billed as "reasonable for merchants" by Waldwick Mayor Rick Vander Wende, was passed by the borough council. It will allow local merchants to have outdoor displays and sales.

The resolution requires merchants to request a permit to conduct a sale of merchandise on sidewalks and areas adjacent to their business.

Among the requirements involved in the permit process is submission of a sketch showing the area to be used for outdoor displays. This will be reviewed

by the council.

The resolution also requires that outdoor displays or sales must abut a merchant's principal building, leaving a minimum of four feet of unimpeded sidewalk, as measured from the curb, for pedestrian traffic.

"The sidewalk law is still in effect," said Councilman Art Barthold. "What this new ordinance allows for is a more controllable law than what was previously in the books."

The resolution also states that all merchandise shall be securely and adequately placed so that it will not endanger passers-by or be stored indoors as to create a safety or fire hazard.

The outdoor display and sale is restricted to areas zoned in the borough for business and the displays must be in accord with all zoning regulations. Those erecting displays must also own or lease permanent premises where they conduct their business.

The new resolution also prohibits the display of food for sale unless the business has previous approval by the Board of Health.

A permit will be good from April 1 to the following March 31. The application will require a fee of \$25 for an outdoor display. The maximum penalties for non-compliance with the new law include a fine

up to \$1,000 and up to 180 hours of community service.

The resolution stipulates that the annual Merchant Days in the borough will be excluded from the permit requirement.

Barthold also said that the way the law reads now, a business — such as a florist who put flowers out in front of his shop — would be in violation of the current law. With the new ordinance, the florist and other stores in the borough will now not be in accordance with the law as long as they have a permit.

Vander Wende added that the council has invested quite a bit of time on this issue in order

to develop a statute that was not only tough and enforceable law, but one that was also reasonable for merchants.

In other news, Councilman James Gibson informed the borough council that the borough had received a complaint from a Ridgewood resident about odor coming from the compost site located off Wyckoff Avenue.

Gibson felt that the cause of the odor was due to the late arrival of Oradell's leaves.

"Due to the fact that our DPW has been stretched out with snow duty, they have been unable to get to the leaves fast enough," said Gibson.

Flooding averted by fire dept.

WALDWICK — A flood would have destroyed the Northwest Bergen County Utility Authority (NBCUA) sewage treatment plant Saturday morning had it not been for the quick response of the borough fire department, according to authorities.

At 12:30 a.m. on Jan. 29 the fire department was called to the Wyckoff Avenue plant to stop flooding that was threatening to submerge the plant.

Fire Chief James O'Connell said, "It would have put the plant out of operation. The pumps were inches from being underwater."

It took 20 men working 2½ hours to keep the water back by plugging two air bags into holes in the drainage pipe, then inflating them.

The flooding came after the Ho-Ho-Kus Brook rose as a result of heavy precipitation and too much water flowed into the plant's excavation pit.

O'Connell added that the plant would have been out of operation in an hour if the operation had not succeeded.

NBCUA Executive Director Ted Vandervliet said the plant was operational throughout the day.

Blaze damages Waldwick home

WALDWICK — A short in electrical wiring caused a blaze Monday that left a borough home with severe fire and smoke damage.

Borough firefighters responded at 5 p.m. to a Lindbergh Parkway home, where 40 men plus firefighters from

Allendale and Wyckoff took two hours to put out the blaze.

The fire was so severe it caused partial collapse of the roof. The first floor sustained damage from the water used to extinguish the fire.

None of the residents were injured. One firefighter suffered cuts on the

hand.

Fire Chief James O'Connell said the house was undergoing renovations and the old electrical wiring shorted out, causing the blaze.

O'Connell estimated the damage at \$30,000.

Sewer charges OK'd

AREA — The Northwest Bergen County Utilities Authority (NBCUA) approved 1994 sewer charges totaling \$8,563,943, an increase of \$50,196 over last year.

Charges will decrease for Mahwah, Ramsey, Midland Park, and Ho-Ho-Kus, but they will go up for Allendale, Waldwick, Wyckoff, and two streets in Ridgewood.

Mahwah will pay \$2,053,804, a decrease of \$6,900 from last year. The township pays 24 percent of the total service fee, followed by Ramsey at 19 percent. Ramsey's \$1,630,709 fee is \$8,238 less than last year.

Ho-Ho-Kus sees the largest decrease with a drop of \$54,941, down to \$521,292. The fee for Midland Park is \$877,546, a decrease of \$49,180.

The fees charged to individual towns are based on the proportion of waste each town sends to the wastewater treatment plant in Waldwick.

The charges are calculated by a formula which includes adjusted meter flow, water used in the sewer area, and equivalent dwelling units.

Wyckoff will see an increase of \$67,657, up to \$1,079,563. Allendale will get an increase of \$66,621, up to \$965,596.

Waldwick, whose charges are the third highest of the eight towns, gets an increase of \$32,333, up to \$1,414,556. The portion of Ridgewood served by the NBCUA gets an increase of \$2,844 up to \$20,877.

While the borough has an ordinance on the books requiring residents to clear cars off the streets on snow days, the law hasn't done much to put cars in the driveways.

Part of the problem results from residents who do not have driveways.

Councilman Arthur Barthold said residents who do not have

driveways should ask if they can park in their neighbors' driveways.

Borough Administrator Gary Kratz said sometimes cluttered streets result when the snow hits early in the morning.

But Barthold said the people should know from weather reports that the snow is coming and move their cars early in the evening.

Mayor Rick Vander Wende suggested the council send out mailings to residents in the fall explaining the parking rules for snow days.

Street 'snow place to park

Council asks residents for their cooperation during snow removal

WALDWICK — The Waldwick Borough Council heard an impassioned plea from Councilman Art Barthold asking residents of the borough for cooperation with the Department of Public Works' efforts to remove snow from the streets.

Barthold told the council that he "felt it very important for us to pass an ordinance that requires me to move my work

truck — which is similar to or exactly the same as other trucks or cars in the borough that park overnight in the streets — because I have work plates."

"Now we have the problem of residents' cars being parked in the streets overnight when a snow storm hits," continued Barthold. "These people are parking their cars in the streets for 24 to 36 hours at a time."

"This is impeding my guys at the DPW from properly remov-

ing the snow in the streets," he continued. "People must know that a storm is coming. It's on the television every 30 minutes."

Barthold then asked "Don't we have a law on the books that will enable us to get these cars off the streets?"

Borough Administrator Gary Kratz advised the council that a law exists that could be used to get the cars off the street in case of an emergency, but that there had to be a warning period of between 24 and 36 hours for the borough to notify the residents so they could remove their cars.

Kratz said he advocated

eliminating overnight parking from early November to mid-March. This would help the borough with both leave collection in the fall as well as with snow removal.

He also told the council that alternate side of the street parking would not alleviate the problem since many residents would just move the snow from one side of the street to the other.

Barthold reminded council members of concerns expressed in previous meetings about those borough residents not

having driveways and are therefore forced to park in the streets. Their needs must be superseded by a concern that emergency vehicles might have problems getting through streets because of the combination of parked cars and hampered snow removal efforts.

Barthold said, "I guarantee you that we will cut costs in overtime with the DPW if we can get these cars off the streets."

Mayor Rick Vander Wende suggested that the problem may be a lack of communication between the residents of the borough and the council.

"Let's put out a mailing to the residents of the borough some time next fall and outline our parking rules for the leaf removal season followed by another mailing later in the year explaining our rules for parking during the snow season," the mayor suggested.

According to Vander Wende, the basic rules call for no streetside parking 72 hours before a scheduled pickup of leaves and that cars must be off the streets if snow fall is forecast.

The council also decided to look into posting signs on the three major roads that lead into the borough stating there will be "no parking on the streets in case of a snow emergency."

Man charged in drug deal near school

WALDWICK — A Paterson man accused of distributing steroids in a school zone had his case referred to a Bergen County Grand Jury in Hackensack on Thursday.

Norman Chidiak, 27, was not asked to enter a plea, but after the hearing, his attorney Frank Flaccavento of Wayne said his client was not guilty of the charge. Flaccavento refused to comment on specifics of the case.

Chidiak was arrested on Jan. 24 by county and borough authorities for distribution of a controlled dangerous substance within 1,000 feet of a school.

Bergen County Prosecutor John J. Fahy said the county and Waldwick had carried on a joint investigation for three months and that Chidiak was captured after he attempted to sell primobolan, a form of anabolic steroid, to an undercover police officer near the E.C.L.S. School on Franklin Turnpike in Ho-Ho-Kus.

If convicted, Chidiak could face up to five years in prison and a fine of \$15,000. He would have to serve at least three years in prison because the violation occurred within 1,000 feet of a school.

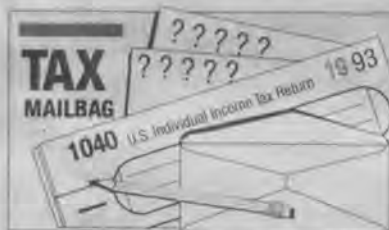
Retiree may delay Social Security

Q. I retired in 1993 and took a lump-sum distribution, which was rolled over into a balanced portfolio of mutual funds worth about \$500,000.

Starting this year, I will need about \$4,000 a month, after taxes, to support myself as a single person.

I am 67 years old. Would it make sense to start accepting Social Security checks this year (about \$1,100 a month) to minimize withdrawals from my portfolio, or would I be better off waiting until I reach 70½ before accepting my checks?

The new tax law makes this question difficult for me to figure out. — H.H. Waldwick



A. The calculation of taxable Social Security benefits has indeed become tricky for tax years beginning after 1993.

The portion of Social Security benefits over a new second threshold (\$34,000 of income for single taxpayers and \$44,000 for married taxpayers filing jointly) that is included in gross income and subject to tax has been increased to 85 percent.

The calculation is as follows: For taxpayers with provisional income above the new threshold, gross income includes the lesser of:
(1) 85 percent of the taxpayer's

Social Security benefits, or

(2) The sum of 85 percent of the excess of the taxpayer's provisional income (modified adjusted gross income plus one-half of Social Security benefits) over the applicable new threshold amounts, plus the smaller of (a) the amount included under present law or (b) \$4,600 (\$6,000 for married taxpayers filing jointly).

One-half of Social Security benefits between the thresholds under current law and the new thresholds will continue to be included in gross income. Thus, the Social Security benefits of taxpayers with incomes over \$25,000 (\$32,000 for taxpayers filing jointly) but not over \$34,000 (\$44,000 jointly) will be subject to inclusion at the 50 percent rate.

Unfortunately, we cannot determine how Social Security benefits will be taxed in the year you turn 70, so it's impossible to say whether you would be better off by deferring your benefits.

But the income you withdraw from your portfolio this year will be fully taxed, and should you decide to receive \$13,200 (\$1,100 times 12), approximately \$10,800 would be included in your taxable income, based upon my calculation and the information you provided. — Lisa Cerepak, certified public accountant, Debra L. Morrison and Associates, Fairfield

Mardi Gras artist puts the big in Big Easy

New Orleans. Its name evokes ribbons of vintage jazz, a savory banquet of exotic cuisine, flavorful blends of its famous chicory coffee, and a night life that wraps right round the clock. But perhaps New Orleans is best known for the ageless magic of its Mardi Gras.

In a somewhat ironic spin of fortune's wheel, one of Mardi Gras' most prominent guests resides in Bergen County.

The Mardi Gras poster art of free-lance illustrator Andrea Mistretta has reached thousands of people, both on this continent and abroad. Mistretta's work is so widely known, in fact, that the mayor of New Orleans will be naming the Waldwick artist an official citizen of the city this month.

Mistretta's work can be seen in France (at Euro Disney), Belgium, and Great Britain. Her unique style is the only non-Disney related Mardi Gras art displayed at Port Orleans, a resort hotel at Disneyworld in Orlando, Fla.

To top it off, Mistretta has been the official Mardi Gras artist for Miller Lite beer, three years running.

"Since I was a teenager, I wanted to see Mardi Gras," Mistretta said. "The color, the mood, the place. If things hadn't worked out the way they had, I don't know when I would have seen it. Mardi Gras is theater, it's people dressing up in costumes. It's a place over the rainbow."

Drawing for 33 years

Mistretta's goals are set as high as any rainbow and she has reached them as well, year after year. A free-lance artist since 1978, Mistretta has spent more than three-quarters of her career as a bona fide success. But her seemingly sudden success was actually long in coming because Mistretta, 36, has been drawing with ambitious intent for roughly 33 years.

"I always drew. At age 3, I could sit for four or five hours," Mistretta said. "I didn't like coloring books either. My dad used to

bring home these blank pads of paper for me to work on."

Mistretta's father is a retired screen printer and artisan in his own right. His encouragement, as well as her mother's, fueled Mistretta's fire.

"By age 18, I knew I wanted to be an illustrator," Mistretta recalled. "My parents were instrumental in helping and encouraging me. They never said [that my] wanting to be an illustrator was too offbeat."

After graduating from Waldwick Public High School, Mistretta toyed briefly with the idea of studying theatrical costume design. But that wasn't for her, she soon decided. In the meantime, she worked in her dad's one-man screen printing business and took free-lance illustration jobs on the side.

By age 21, Mistretta was working as a free-lance artist. By age 22, she set up shop as the Andrea Mistretta Illustration Studio, the business she runs today out of her home.

"In the beginning, I did every and any job that came along to survive as an illustrator," Mistretta recalled over a cup of tea in her warmly decorated kitchen. Her story occasionally was interrupted by the ringing of her studio phone and some strategic plays for affection by her cat, Bacci — which means "kisses" in Italian.

"Honestly, if I knew then what I know now, I don't know if I would have braved this career," Mistretta said.

In 1985, there was work, but Mistretta had hit what she referred to as a "downswing" in her career. She was taking jobs here and there when a friend and fellow artist, Karen Charatan, told Mistretta she was heading to New Orleans. Charatan suggested that a painting Mistretta had done three years earlier might sell there.

The painting of a harlequin was to be a mere gift to a friend, but Mistretta soon realized that she could not part with it. "I couldn't let go of it," Mistretta recalled. "It doesn't usually happen, but I'd given so much of myself to that particular piece, it had become

something personal to me. That's the only piece I've ever felt that way about."

The first gallery Charatan walked into wanted to buy Mistretta's work. Charatan had shown them a photo of Mistretta's painting and they placed a call, New Orleans to Waldwick, on the spot, with Charatan still in the room. The painting, published in poster format in 1986, sold roughly 15,000 copies and Mistretta's life, and career, were forever changed.

"A runaway success"

"It was a runaway success," Mistretta said, beaming. "Karen gets a big gold star from me. If that hadn't happened, I don't know when I would have made it to Mardi Gras."

From that day forward, Mistretta's career has been like Carnival. She has been cited by both the Society of Illustrators, based in New York, and the New Orleans Ad Club.

She is expected to be in New Orleans for another successful season as a Mardi Gras poster artist for Cunningham Enter-

prises, her New Orleans-based publisher, as well as celebrating another year of Mardi Gras work for the Miller Brewing Co. This year, Mistretta is also starting her own postcard series of her nine original poster prints.

Mistretta is concerned that too much of her work printed at once isn't necessarily a good thing. "People have offered me money to do mass-produced T-shirts," Mistretta said. "But, if you let the images oversaturate the market, your work could lose the charm it has."

One way Mistretta steers clear of the problem is by working for a variety of markets and employers, illustrating a number of themes. In fact, Mistretta jokingly refers to herself at times as a "three-ring circus."

Indeed, her client list reads like a who's who of just about everybody. ABC, CBS, and WCBS Radio, and WPLJ-FM 95.5 are just some of the broadcasters who have asked her on board. Corporate sponsors benefiting from Mistretta's unmistakable style include Hoffmann-LaRoche Inc.; Kmart Corp., for which she illustrated a poster for the Michael Jordan sneaker, Air Jordan; the New Jersey State Lottery Commission; MacMillan Publishing Co., and Land Rover North America Inc., for which she is illustrating part of a campaign for the Range Rover.



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From Forbes to M&M's

Her work has been on the cover of Forbes magazine and a Nintendo game cartridge. Mars M&M's, the Three Musketeers bar, and

Good Humor ice cream advertisements have also taken a bite out of the busy artist's schedule.

"Given a job in its rough state, I can predict how long it will take me. I have to turn jobs down nowadays," Mistretta said. One such job was a "Joe Camel" cigarette campaign. After some consideration, Mistretta said she gave the offer a thumbs down because of "its potential negative effect on children."

Youth entertainment

Mistretta is branching into youth-entertainment material. The illustrator has designed jackets of children's classics for Peter Pan Industries of Newark — some of which were on display at the Waldwick Public Library in January alongside some of her Mardi Gras work.

Mistretta says that her 5-1/2-year-old niece, Kristen, has sat as a model for some of her work in the children's market. In fact, Mistretta has also given her niece a corner of the studio so she can do some of her own artwork.

Despite success, Mistretta refuses to rest on her laurels, and is always looking toward the future. She places ads in artist directories, and articles on her work have been featured in Step By Step Graphics magazine. Although Cunningham Enterprises doesn't actively solicit buyers of her Mardi Gras work, buyers look up, and buy, her paintings. Representatives from the Disney company, who were in New Orleans at the time, saw her work and

She crimps copycats' style

Almost two years ago to the day, Andrea Mistretta took the company Hunt Graphics of New Orleans to court, claiming their posters infringed on her copyright by being "substantially similar" to the "look and feel" of Mistretta's work.

"I was between the devil and the deep blue sea," Mistretta said. "I was with a Ma and Pa that just didn't have the advertising dollars to compete [with Hunt Graphics]. I knew if I didn't stop them, it would be the end of my Mardi Gras poster series."

Just a few days shy of Mardi Gras, a federal judge in New Orleans agreed to grant an injunction of Hunt Graphics's work. Oddly enough, the day the injunction was passed, Mistretta said her publisher informed her that the Louisiana State Lottery Commission, along with a North Brunswick printing company, Webcraft Technologies used the exact image of her 1991 Mardi Gras poster on the 1992 Mardi Gras Doubler lottery ticket.

According to Mistretta, they settled out of court.

But the artist had little time to celebrate. Shortly afterward, Mistretta was informed that an amusement company in Great Britain had used one of her images on one of their arcade games. They, too, settled out of court, Mistretta said.

"I wasn't in it to win big money," Mistretta said. "I just wanted to stop people from copying my work. When I'm asked by art directors to copy style, I turn them down flat."

contacted her immediately.

"Lots of artists compete to get in the Disney market," Mistretta said. "I'm very proud of that one."

And so she should be. Her home studio is a well-lit jungle of pen carousels, books, paint tubes, ta-

bles, canvases, and poster boards. When asked whether she ever has to leave New Jersey to work, Mistretta just laughs.

"I don't need to leave my house to work," Mistretta said.

At one point she took her phone off the hook long enough to go to

the Waldwick train station. Not to get on a train, just to draw one. Her hometown, celebrating its 75th anniversary, asked Mistretta to design a T-shirt, sweatshirt, and baseball-cap logo of Waldwick's historic train depot, signal tower, and Erie Pacific train that used to rumble through town. Mistretta is donating all proceeds to help pay for the borough celebration and June 4th

parade.

Mistretta is expected to be in New Orleans in time for Mardi Gras. In many ways, the city is Mistretta's second home, and perhaps one day, her permanent home. ("As they say in New Orleans, I'd move down there in a New York minute," said Mistretta.)

But to this artist, it is really the

attitude, and not the place, that makes or breaks an artist.

"I don't feel I was born spectacularly talented. I don't think anybody necessarily is," Mistretta said. "But, I was born with a spectacular desire to be an artist and that is what drives me. I got lucky. I had the right stuff, at the right place, at the right time. I took the rare opportunity and I didn't let go."

Council looks to summer

Waldwick officials propose to hike pool memberships

WALDWICK — While the region lie under a blanket of snow and ice, the thoughts of the Waldwick Borough Council turned toward summer.

Councilman Edwin Sherman laid out a proposal that will raise the rates for passes for the next two summers at the borough's pool.

The rates for the past year

had been \$22 for adults and children. Under the proposed rates from Sherman, the cost for a badge would climb to \$27.50 for the coming summer and to \$30 in 1995.

Rates for children would rise to \$22.50 for the 1994 summer and \$25 for the following summer.

The fact that the facility has been operating at a substantial loss is the main reason given for

the cost increase. Operating losses last year reached an estimated \$10,000.

Sherman cited such major expenses as repairs to the pool, which cost an estimated \$2,000 to \$3,000, and \$5,000 for pool chemicals.

Councilman Art Barthold also raised the point that revenue could be raised with stricter enforcement at the pool area. He said he had been at the pool several times last year and saw people there without badges.

Sherman also raised the idea of revamping past membership rules. He suggested that the

borough should consider opening up pool membership to non-residents.

Council members pointed out that there had been a problem with the idea of having non-residents being members. In the past, some borough residents had objected because they felt that residents' tax dollars had paid for the pool.

Sherman suggested that a procedure the council might consider is to have a non-resident be sponsored by a current borough resident. He felt that this would ensure some type of

"quality of life" for the local residents who use the pool.

That would not be all that different from the current policy of allowing guests of municipal residents use the pool during the summer, Sherman stated. The guest must be sponsored by a resident of the town in order to use the facilities.

The council also felt that since the prices were being raised, the pool could be made to look better.

Parked cars impede plows

WALDWICK — Signs that inform residents not to park on the streets on snow days will be put up to make plowing the streets easier and safer for borough workers.

During the most recent storm a truck came close to turning over and damaged its plow as the driver tried to maneuver around parked cars, according to officials.

Councilwoman Denise Anderson said, "The reason it's important is people will get hurt. A man could get killed. We've had a truck almost topple over."

Councilman Arthur Barthold wants the police to start enforcing the laws,

but he admits part of the problem is a very vague law. He said there was nothing in the law to stop a resident from blowing snow from the south side to the north side of the street. Barthold wants the council to look at other towns' laws before making a revision.

Cars parking on the road on snow days also results in narrower roadways and this can impede the progress of emergency vehicles.

Barthold said, "If an ambulance wanted to go down my block he wouldn't make it."

He said residents without driveways should ask their neighbors if they can park in the neighbors' driveways.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF WALDWICK CREATING A NEW CHAPTER 62A ENTITLED "OUTDOOR DISPLAYS AND SALES" AND AMENDING CHAPTER 97 DELETING SECTION 34 ENTITLED "DISPLAY OF GOODS FOR SALE" AND AMENDING CHAPTER 82 ENTITLED "STREET AND SIDEWALK USES" TO ALLOW FOR OUTDOOR DISPLAYS AND SALES AND AMENDING CHAPTER 48 TO PROVIDE FOR A PERMIT FEE FOR OUTDOOR DISPLAYS AND SALES.

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council believes that outdoor displays and sales are in the best interests of the Borough by promoting our business community; and,

WHEREAS, these displays and sales should be regulated such that they do not become a nuisance or hazard to pedestrian traffic,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Waldwick, in the County of Bergen, New Jersey as follows:

Section 1. The Code of the Borough of Waldwick is hereby amended to include a new Chapter 62A which will be entitled "Outdoor Displays and Sales" and reads as follows:

62A-1 - Permit Required.

On application to the Borough Council, the Borough Council may by resolution permit the outdoor display and/or sale of merchandise on sidewalks and adjoining areas subject to the conditions contained herein. Following the adoption of the enabling Resolution, permits shall be issued by the Borough Clerk.

62A-2 - Application Procedure.

The applicant shall provide a sketch drawing showing the area to be used for outdoor display or sale. This area shall not

be used for outdoor display or sale.

Says Beaver was headed for trouble

It seems TV isn't just an escape

Will Miller tells 'Why We Watch'

Presidents Clinton, Reagan, and Bush (in the person of comic impressionist Jim Morris) take to the couch tonight at Stand-Up New York for a little overdue Presidents' Day psychotherapy, courtesy of Dr. Will Miller.

It's a slight departure for Miller. Or, rather, the most recent in a slew of slight departures for this on-again, off-again stand-up comedian, therapist, drug counselor, teacher, and onetime chaplain at The Valley Hospital in Ridgewood. (His wife, Sally Downham-Miller, was the principal at Crescent School in Waldwick).

Miller, who now calls Indiana home, has become known to cable television audiences during the last year as Nick at Nite's resident shrink: that soft-spoken, all-knowing expert on "Why We Watch" (and continue to watch) all those wacky housewives, wisecracking kids, identical cousins, resourceful castaways, nose-twitching witches, dreamy genies, and talking horses.

What is it that draws us to Mary Richards, steers us away from "My Mother the Car," and makes some of us so uncomfortable when Mr. Ed gallops by?

Miller knows — and tells — with cagy observations that manage to be both psychologically sound and satirically hilarious. His "Why We Watch" insights, which began popping up on Nick at Nite in quick 30-second spots, have since made him an in-demand guest for television talk

shows, where he skillfully dissects everything from "I Love Lucy" to "The Brady Bunch."

Miller knows why we watch "The Donna Reed Show," but does he know why we watch him?

Of course he does.

"I think what I've been saying has touched a chord," Miller says, "because it connects with what people have been suspecting for a long time — that there's something very powerful going on when we watch TV. They say, 'Tell me why I just sat down for 30 minutes and watched "Dragnet"?' They want to know what it means."

Miller's TV shtick has also jump-started a stand-up career that stalled in the mid-Eighties because, as Miller himself says, "I was just boring."

Born in Brooklyn and raised on Long Island, Miller made his stand-up debut at Richard M. Dixon's White House Inn in North Massapequa, owned and operated by the then-ubiquitous comedian and Nixon impersonator. The club also launched the careers of Eddie Murphy, Bob Nelson, and dozens of other familiar names. (Jerry Seinfeld lived blocks away.)

Like so many comedians, however, Miller was never able to parlay his stand-up into stardom. By the mid-Eighties he was still locked into a generic nice-guy routine that he describes as "Jay Seinfeld," a little like Leno and a little like Seinfeld, neither of whom seemed able to captivate the public in quite the same way as up-and-comers Emo Philips, Sam Kinison, and Andrew Dice Clay.

"By the mid-Eighties," Miller recalls, "Seinfeld was so out, so passe, they were making fun of him on 'Saturday Night Live.' There was a move towards more edgy comedy, and I was just this yuppie with no edge at all."

At the time, though, Miller was in analysis, and he loved it. So, with a comedy career that seemed unlikely to make him rich, he went back to school and became a therapist, eventually landing a job, in 1990, at a crack cocaine clinic on Manhattan's Lower East Side. He was working with psychotic crack addicts during the day, still doing stand-up at night, and suddenly the pressure was off. He became more relaxed onstage. More natural. More in control. And, he says, "little by little, my material became more psychological."

His stint at The Valley Hospital came next, and it was grueling. As chaplain, he often was called upon to comfort the family of someone who had just died. "One night," he recalls, "I was onstage at Bananas in Fort Lee when my beeper went off. I had to finish my set and rush to the hospital."

At around the same time, a comedian friend of Miller's in Philadelphia invited him to come onto his radio morning show there — as a goof. "I think it was like the 33rd anniversary of 'Leave It to Beaver,' and he said to me, 'Come on the show and talk about it.' So I did," Miller says.

"I was introduced as Dr. Will Miller of New York, who had allegedly written a book called 'Leave It to Beaver: Window on the White Psyche.' And my whole thesis, supposedly, was that you could really understand the American psyche by looking at TV."

His thoughts on 'Beaver' have since become part of his act: "The family looked perfect on the outside," he says, "but it was about to become a severely dysfunctional family. The pathology was about to flower."

"If you'll recall, the show cuts off when Beaver turned 13 and entered puberty. I believe that at that point he would have realized several things. One, that he was on the wrong end of a virulent sibling rivalry. His parents had much more affection for Wally. Plus, he would have comprehended the demeaning nature of his name. And I think he would have gone into a profound rebellious reaction to his parents. He would have been a very difficult teenager. And, knowing Beaver's tendency toward depression, I believe he would have become extremely passive and probably developed an eating disorder and stayed at home and refused to leave the house."

Five minutes into his radio spiel, Miller recalls, "the phones lit up and people were like, 'Is this guy for real? If he's for real, he's crazy. If he's not for real, that's a funny bit.'"

Nick at Nite thought so. So do comedy club patrons and — not surprisingly — college audiences, who turn out in droves for Miller's guest lectures, which include slide presentations.

"Shrinking the President," tonight's show at Stand-Up New York and starring Dr. Will Miller and Jim Morris, begins at 9 o'clock. Tickets are \$7. The club is at 78th Street and Broadway in Manhattan. (212) 595-0850.

Waldwick coaching legend steps down

After 17 seasons, Ozzie O'Keefe leaves the junior football sideline

A legend in Waldwick football coaching has decided to step down after 17 seasons of guiding hundreds of junior players and preparing them for the high school gridiron.

Robert "Ozzie" O'Keefe, who started coaching in the Waldwick junior program at St. Luke's Church in 1977, the year he graduated from Waldwick High School, is leaving the sideline after, most notably, producing a 56-28-6 record, a .670 winning percentage, in 11 seasons as the head coach of the 7th-8th-grade team.

"It was time to just move on," said Ozzie, who turns 35 on March 1. "I plan to improve my golf game and continue boxing at Surugi's Gym in Highland Lakes (N.Y.)."

Ozzie, a resident of Warwick, N.Y., adds, "But St. Luke's football will always be very special in my heart, and I want to thank every kid who played for me down there, because it was just as much fun for me as it was for them. One thing I know I will miss for sure is 'Bull in the Ring', a drill we used to do religiously in the early years. Yes, I'm going to miss those Saturday mornings."

In December at the Waldwick Junior Football Association's annual awards dinner in the basement of St. Luke's, Ozzie was saluted by his assistant coach of 15 years, Ray Jimenez. He was presented with a gold watch, with the inscription "Waldwick football 1993."

Ozzie started his coaching career as an assistant to head coach Gene Smith on the 5th-6th-grade team. He continued as an assistant the following year before becoming that team's head coach in 1979, the year Jimenez joined forces with him.

"I owe a big thanks to Gene Smith for giving me the opportunity to begin coaching right out of high school in August of 1977," Ozzie said. "Gene was a positive influence on getting me started."

"Through the years, Ray Jimenez has been a strong influence on the kids, and he is great at game adjustments besides organizing and operating a successful program for many years," Ozzie said. "It was a pleasure working with Ray."

Ozzie spent four seasons as head coach of the 5th-6th-grade team until taking over the big squad in 1983. And what a

debut Ozzie had, as he went undefeated at 9-0 and followed that up with a 7-0 mark in 1984. His other stellar marks were 7-0-1 in 1986, 6-1-1 in 1987, 6-2-1 in 1990 and 6-2 in 1993.

"I always believed that you can't win if you can't score, and nobody plays football for a tie, not in Waldwick anyway," Ozzie said.

Ozzie also credits Terry Byrne, Waldwick High School's head football coach the past five seasons, with helping him become a better coach.

"I played for Terry in eighth grade, and I owe a lot of my success to him," said Ozzie, who was a tight end and a cornerback in that 1972 season. "Terry always would drill us about execution on offense, which I definitely carried through to my teams. I really respect Terry a lot."

In his 11 seasons coaching the big club, the game that Ozzie always looked forward to was the Friday night before Halloween, when his young Warriors would travel to Midland Park to meet their arch-rivals. Only once was the game played at St. Luke's, since Midland Park has a lighted field.

"I've always taken pride in

the fact that we were able to beat Midland Park ten times in a tough game every Halloween," said Ozzie, whose 1985 club played the Midland Park Colts to a 0-0 tie.

Ozzie also thanks his wife, Barbara (Parks), a former sports standout at Waldwick High School, where she starred in soccer, basketball and softball before graduating in 1986.

"Barbara always showed great support for me, because she understands the game of

football and the competition in sports," he said.

Ozzie, in fact, has played semi-pro baseball the past 16 years. Since 1978, he has been a starting outfielder, mostly in rightfield, for the Waldwick franchise under the management of Bill Mainenti, Stan Goldberg, Dave Anderson, Sr., and Dave Anderson, Jr.

"I remember when I was 10 years old in 1969 walking up the back way to St. Luke's and listening to the sound of the

referee's whistle," Ozzie said. "You knew it was St. Luke's football, and it didn't get any better than that."

"As a football coach, the big part of my game was motivating," Ozzie said. "But you can't win races without good horses, and, in Waldwick, we've always had those good horses. The thing about the kids from Waldwick is that they play with a lot of heart."

So do the coaches.

Ozzie's '84 team became state champs in '88

And so it was that Ozzie O'Keefe's 1984 football team at St. Luke's went undefeated at 7-0. Four seasons later, most of those eighth graders were on the same team that won Waldwick High School's first state championship in football.

"The big trio on that '84 team was quarterback Mike "Buck" Buchanan, fullback Marc Del Gaudio and tackle Kevin "Kong" Fall," Ozzie said. "They were great players for me and for Howie Reed in the 1988 season."

DelGaudio is Waldwick's all-time leader in single-season and career rushing yards and touchdowns scored.

But without hesitation, Ozzie says the best all-around player he ever coached was halfback-

linebacker Jim Mistretta, who went on to star at Don Bosco Prep from where he graduated in 1988.

"I've never seen a kid dominate the game like Jimmy did," Ozzie said. "He scored 24 touchdowns and had five called back as an eighth grader in that 1983 season (a 9-0 one)."

This year, halfback Jimmy Fox, an eighth grader, led the team in scoring with eight touchdowns. Ozzie likens Fox to Mistretta.

"Jimmy Fox is similar to Jimmy Mistretta in that at times he can be explosive. Jimmy should be a great all-around athlete in high school and probably beyond that."

Ozzie says his best passing-receiving combination was

quarterback Mike "Moon" Branagh to Mike Fox, Rich Parks and Matt Sugrue in the 1990 season.

"Those three combined to catch 48 passes as eighth graders, which is unbelievable at that level," Ozzie noted. "Most junior football teams just run. We tried to prepare them for a good high school passing attack, and it paid off for all of the quarterbacks that came out of our program and went on to star in high school."

"I've been fortunate to coach many brother combinations, like the Mistrettas, Eitners, Scavones, Terlemezians, Guys, Branaghs, Foxes, Sneyers, Avagnanos, Schultzs, Leonards, Falls, DeSiminis,

Finales and Belisles. And if there is any other brother combination I've left out, I'm sure they played down at St. Luke's also."

Ozzie leaves behind a good nucleus for the 1994 season. Among the leaders will be quarterback Tommy Guy, who threw 13 touchdown passes last year. Tommy's brother, Ed, a 1991 Waldwick graduate, was Ozzie's starting quarterback in the 1986 season.

"I'm glad I coached Tommy for a year to help his confidence for next season, as long as they continue to pass," Ozzie said.

"Both Eddie and Tommy are quiet leaders in their own way, and both are impact players."—FARRELL

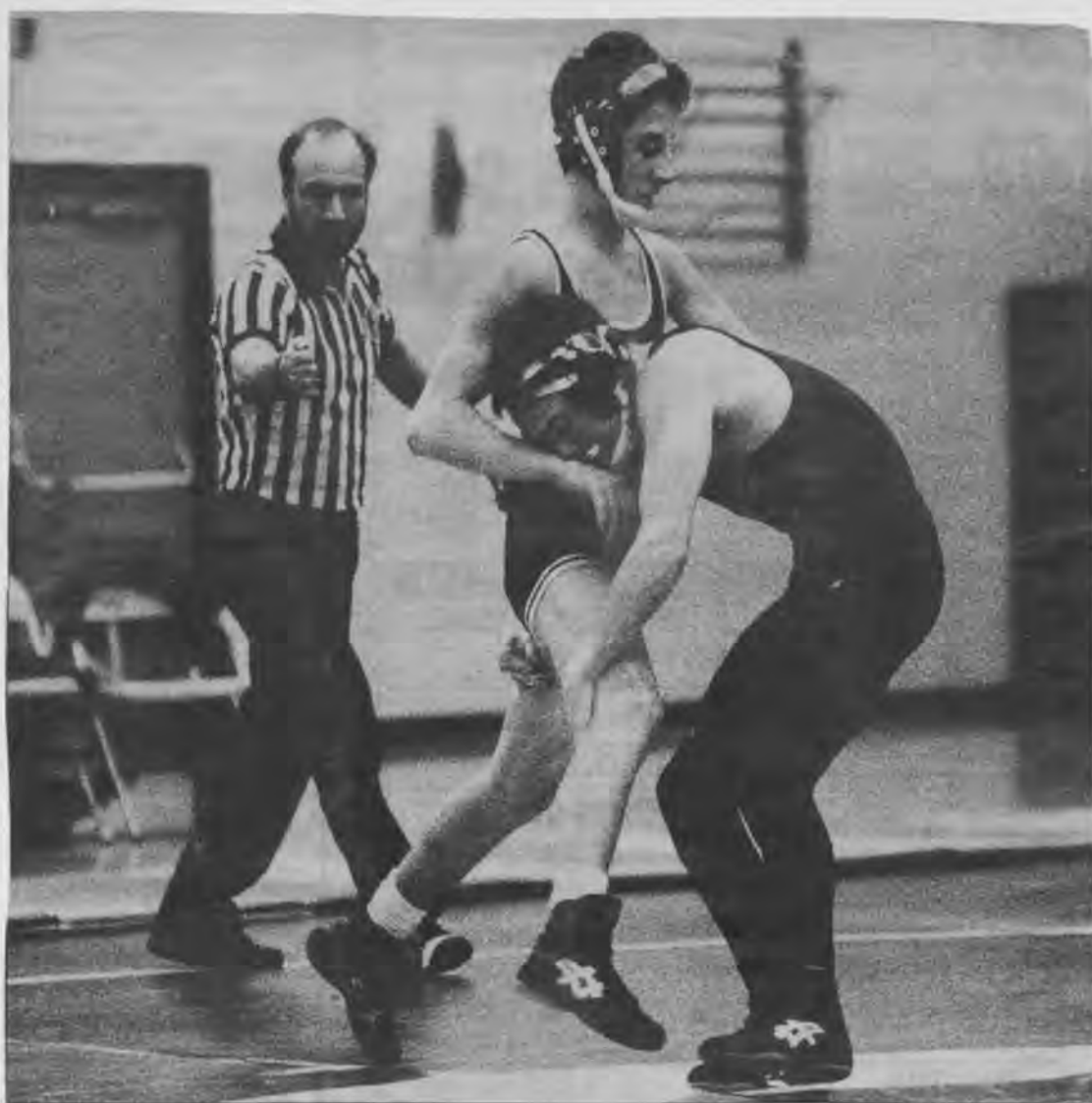

Snow removal's hot topic

Council discusses clearing sidewalks and driveways

WALDWICK— After weeks of debate, the borough council is determined to write new laws regarding snow removal that will be in effect next winter.

Councilman Arthur Barthold stressed to the council his determination to finalize some plans after the storm of Feb. 11 hit the borough.

Barthold told the council that he "received numerous calls

this past weekend from borough residents complaining about snow removal by other residents in this community."

Throughout the winter, Barthold has pleaded with the council to find a way to remove cars from the streets when a snow storm hits so borough trucks and plows can remove the snow in a more orderly fashion. This time, his focus was on the removal of snow from driveways and sidewalks.

He told fellow councilmembers that he had read the borough law concerning snow removal from sidewalks and driveways and considered it too vague.

"We just passed a law that specifies that there must be four feet of space left (by local businesses) so that residents of the community can walk on the sidewalk," he stated, referring to the "display of goods" ordinance recently passed by the borough council. Nothing specific exists with regard to pedestrian rights-of-way in residential neighborhoods.

"But we don't have any speci-

tics on how the sidewalk has to be shoveled? We must get something on the books," he insisted.

Councilman James Gibson also commented that with the impassable condition of the sidewalks in some points and the snow jutting out from the curb, people are forced into the dangerous situation of walking in the street.

This topic brought the council back to the problem of on-street parking. Although the council felt that there was a marked improvement from previous

snowstorms, there were still some problem areas.

Gibson cited West Prospect Street, saying it was almost impossible to drive through on the Sunday after the storm. He also advised the council that according to Ray Schmidt,

Superintendent of the Department of Public Works which oversees snow removal, a borough snow truck almost toppled over due to cars parked on the street. The truck did sustain some damage.

In fact, Borough Administrator Gary Kratz said that there had been 94 summons issued to residents who had not

removed their cars from the streets during the last storm.

Barthold expressed his concern that emergency vehicles would have trouble getting down some on the streets in the borough, including his own.

Gibson and Barthold agreed that the borough could save money in removing the snow if residents cooperated by remov-

ing their cars from the streets.

"We must get control of our streets" during these snow storms, commented Barthold.

The council agreed to a three-pronged approach to clarify the situation. It will erect signs after all snow melts away this spring. The signs will declare that there will be no parking on the streets of the town during a

snowstorm.

The council also directed the borough administrator and municipal attorney to look into getting copies of ordinances from other municipalities to see how they deal with the shoveling of driveways and sidewalks issue. This review of existing statutes will enable Waldwick to draft a clear law with regard to residents' responsibilities.

The council also indicated it would look into the hardship cases of certain borough residents who do not have driveways in an effort to further clarify snow-related on-street parking regulations.

Mothers group blasts plan for go-go bar

Doesn't want 'unsavory characters' near church, school

A group of Hopatcong mothers is opposing a Waldwick councilman's attempt to turn a restaurant he owns in their town into a nightclub featuring scantily-clad go-go dancers.

"We don't want any unsavory characters near our children," said Liz Collins, the president of "Modick Moms," a group dedicated to improving Modick Park in Hopatcong.

Collins and about 60 other residents appeared at a Hopatcong Planning Board meeting last week to oppose construction of a raised platform and reconfiguration of the bar at Councilman Joseph Musumeci's Savannah's Restaurant and Comedy Club.

"There's a place in society for

go-go bars," Collins said, "but not smack in the middle of our town. It's right near homes, two day-care centers, a church, and an elementary school.

Collins appeared at a Waldwick Borough Council meeting on Tuesday to confront Musumeci about why he didn't open a go-go bar in his own town. She was ruled out of order. Waldwick has no such bars in town, Police Chief Daniel Lupo said.

"I own a liquor license in Hopatcong," Musumeci said. "My house is in a different town. This has nothing to do with Waldwick."

Cliff Lundin, the mayor of the Sussex County resort community, said the increase of male and fe-

male dance revues in Hopatcong has sparked an effort to regulate the clubs by limiting their proximity to schools, religious institutions, and homes.

But Musumeci claims he's being unfairly persecuted because he is a councilman in another community.

"They're picking on me," said Musumeci, a Waldwick soccer and baseball coach who is president of CJM Planning Corp., a Fair Lawn-based investment company. "They never did this in the past. It's an infringement of my First Amendment rights to pursue my business."

Lundin said the Hopatcong Planning Board denied the permit

to build a stage because it would have meant a change of use from a restaurant to a nightclub. But Musumeci claims he has had dancers in his club before, and that the use of the space has not changed. "We're still serving food," he said, adding that he has a summer lakefront deck and a dining area on a lower level where music and comedy are performed.

"It's like no restaurant this planning board had ever seen," Lundin said. "He's going from 25 tables to three. That's a change in operation."

There are two bars in town that feature go-go dancers; one is operating without zoning approval and is being pursued by local enforce-

ment officers; the other is operating legally, Lundin said.

Musumeci said he wants to eliminate seating so customers can have a better view of the stage. Shows will feature various forms of entertainment including go-go dancers gyrating to rock music, he said. "Business is down right now. I'm just trying to survive."

Musumeci added: "They won't ever be topless. It is illegal in New Jersey to serve liquor with nude dancing. I intend to abide by the laws."

Lundin said Musumeci will have to apply to the Hopatcong Zoning Board to get a variance. But officials are already preparing to lay other obstacles in his path.

"There were cameras and reporters running all over the place, and we weren't privy to that information," Contaldi says. "It was a circus, and Scott had to live with what happened that night."

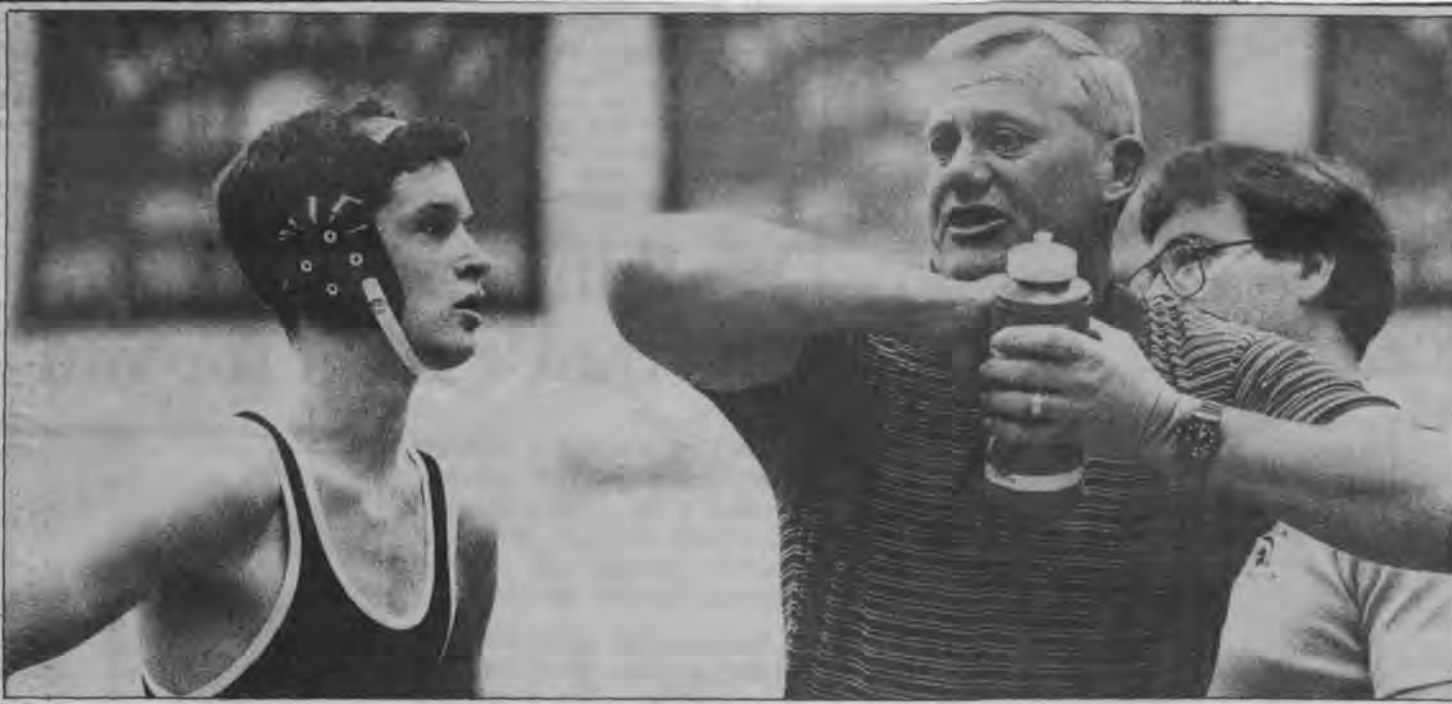

Flooding: Ex-mayor claims no action 2-27-94

WALDWICK — Former Mayor Frank McKenna came before borough officials to see how far they had progressed in remedying a flooding situation that he and his neighbors have been experiencing.

He learned, however, that little in the way of progress has been made.

The waterway in question enters the community from Midland Park in an easterly direction, runs behind the high school to underground piping which then brings the water to Whites Pond, according to McKenna.

The problem that arises is that a screen, set up at the mouth of the pipe to prevent debris from entering the tunnel, accumulates refuse which blocks stream flow. This in turn leads to flooding of low-lying areas on Yvonne St., West Prospect St., Lindbergh Parkway and Lakeview Drive.

According to McKenna, when the screen is blocked with such varied items as firewood, toys and garbage bags, residents in the area experience flooding such as that which occurred last Thanksgiving weekend.

At the public meeting on Dec. 15, McKenna came to the council to voice his concerns about the situation. At that point, the council directed the borough's engineering firm, Boswell/McClave, to investigate.

Borough Administrator Gary Kratz told the council that the engineering firm's report was just received. He characterized the report as a past history of

what had been done at the area in question with no specifics on what should be done.

McKenna was upset with what he perceived as an apparent lack of interest by Boswell/McClave.

"I have not seen them do anything about the problem," stated McKenna. "What I would like them to do is to come at look at the area. The fact is that the council has done more for the flooding by building a little break (at the site) then the engineers have."

"To tell you the truth, I don't think much of Boswell/McClave," McKenna continued. "If we wait around for them to do something, we will all be old and gray."

There was also concern that with melting snow and the

spring coming, the stream would rise and there would be more flooding problems in the near future.

McKenna said he would have to consider moving out of the borough if the problem was not fixed.

Councilman Arthur Barthold and James Gibson promised that they would make sure that the engineers make a site inspection. They also asked the former mayor to be there when the engineer went for the on-site look so that he could explain the problem.

The council said that as they proceed with the budget process, they would have to keep the flood problem in mind and try to allocate some money to rectify the situation.

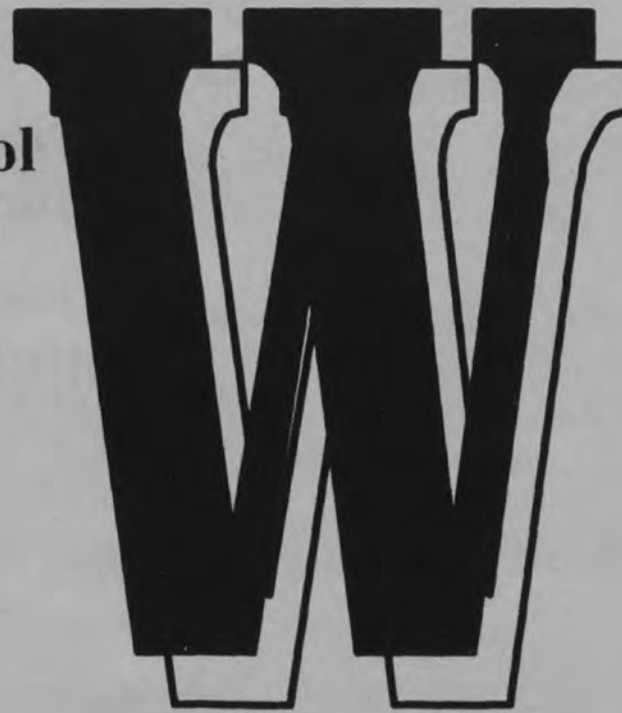

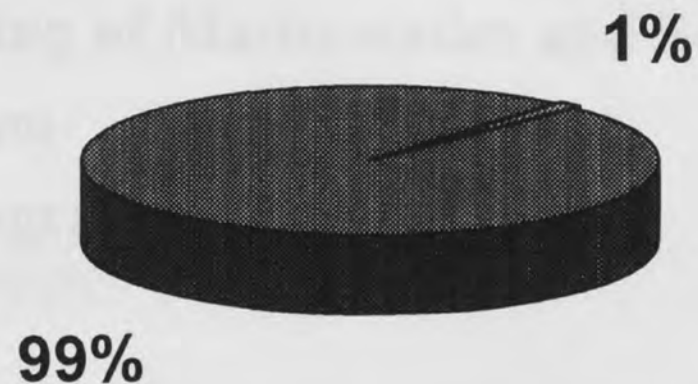
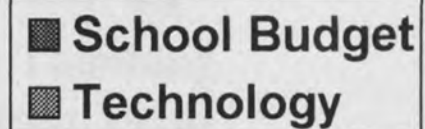

District Tech Plan Due in April

The district Technology Committee, which includes some fifteen administrators and teachers, will present a Five-Year Technology Plan to the Board of Education in April. The Plan will include a mission statement as well as specific recommendations on hardware and software purchases, teacher training, and financing.

The Technology Committee is currently analyzing the comprehensive report on educational technology presented to the Board on February 1 by the Citizens' Advisory Committee (CAC) for Technology. That Committee was created by the Board in 1992 to evaluate the current level of technology in Waldwick schools and recommend a plan to integrate new technology into the curriculum.

"Before adopting a Long-Range

District Invests in Technology

Recognizing the need to provide current Waldwick students with access to new technology while a long-range technology plan is developed for the future, the district has been making a significant investment during the last few years in computers, CD ROM and video disc players, software, and scientific and graphics calculators.

As a result, an enhanced curriculum in a variety of subject areas is now benefiting students at all grade levels. Most district educators agree, however, that much more is needed. In fact, one high school lead teacher noted that, although he had purchased a video disc player for his department, he still needs appropriate discs.

A Five-Year Technology Plan with specific hardware and software recommendations will be presented to the Board of Education in April. See the story at the left.

Technology Plan for the district, Board members wanted input from knowledgeable parents and other community residents," noted Superintendent Dr. Patrick Piegari, who explained that the district's professional educators are examining the educational and financial implications of the citizens' recommendations before recommending a Five-Year Plan to the Board.

The CAC report emphasizes both the educational needs of students in grades K-12 and the training of teachers. It recommends that most of its 33 specific objectives be implemented by September 1, 1994 "to give Waldwick students the same oppor-

tunities as other Bergen County students" and suggests financing equipment and software through a lease-purchase plan.

The Citizens' Advisory Committee Technology Report concludes, "The implementation of a Technology Plan with specific performance-related goals will result in students with higher standardized test scores, improved writing capabilities, and increased problem-solving and critical thinking skills."

COMPUTERS IN SCIENCE

Computer use in the high school science department has increased because of the purchase of three new machines and interface equipment to allow direct data retrieval. "Physics students now enthusiastically use computers to analyze the results

of most of their labs," said Paul Puglise, lead science teacher at Waldwick High School. "Last year, for the first time in my 22 years of teaching, I had seniors who were still eager to do lab work on the computer during the last two weeks of school," he added.

COMPUTERS IN BUSINESS

The purchase of several state-of-the-art computers, the newest versions of such software as *PageMaker* and *Lotus*, a scanner, and a color paint-jet printer has greatly enhanced the curriculum in Desktop Publishing and other business courses, according to Janet Sobkowicz, lead teacher for the department.

"Students have been using this new equipment to prepare professional-looking college applications, reports, presentations for various academic departments, and brochures for school activities and the Waldwick Education Foundation," she said, noting that the community has also had access to the equipment through the Golden Pass program, a re-training and job placement program for mature workers.

COMPUTERS IN INDUSTRIAL ARTS

The district's purchase of new Gateway 486 computers and a Hewlett Packard plotter has permitted the addition of computer assisted design (CAD) to the industrial arts curriculum.

"Students still learn mechanical drawing because those skills are the foundation for computer assisted design," noted teacher James Drechsel, explaining that Mechanical Drawing I students spend 25-40% of their time on the computer whereas second year students use the computer most of the time.

"Computer skills learned in Industrial Arts classes can be applied to other courses and have made our students more competitive for employment," added Drechsel, who hopes to introduce robotics, 3-D animation, and computer simulations to future students in junior/senior school Technology classes and to Technology Club members who may participate in design competitions.

TECHNOLOGY IN MATH

In the last two years the math department has emphasized the purchase of graphics and scientific calculators necessary to prepare students for new versions of such standardized tests as the SAT, according to lead teacher Kenneth Teopfer. Recently, the math department also replaced two old computers and purchased an additional four machines for use in junior school Computer Applications courses and the high school AP Computer Science class.

COMPUTERS IN THE LIBRARY

A new talking computer program has been helping primary grade students at Crescent and Traphagen Schools learn to read, write, and spell as they become familiar with computer use.

"The children rush to get one of the new computers," said Traphagen librarian Marjorie Murphy explaining the children's enthusiasm.

The district recently purchased three Macintosh computers with built-in CD ROM players and one laser printer for each elementary school. Students now have access to word processing/desktop publishing software which allows them to incorporate pictures into their writing, a program which reads aloud what a child has written, and an encyclopedia and atlases on CD ROM. Using the CD ROM encyclopedia, a student can read about an animal, see its picture, and hear its sounds.

Elementary school students currently spend two periods a week in the library, one to learn library skills from the school librarian and one to learn computer skills from their classroom teacher. All district fourth graders learn keyboarding skills during their computer period.

Junior/senior school librarian Ruth Sloan is currently comput-

erizing the library's holdings and borrower information. "A new program, *Magazine Express*, has been the most popular feature of the library this year," she noted, explaining that the program uses compact discs to provide easy access to magazine articles and is much simpler and faster to use than the *Reader's Guide to Periodical Literature*.

Junior/senior school library patrons also have computer access to the holdings of other libraries in Bergen County and in the state and may borrow these materials through inter-library loan.

Satellite Dish Installed At Waldwick H.S.

A federal grant, which paid a portion of the cost, has enabled the district to install a satellite dish at Waldwick High School to receive staff development and other educational programs from telecommunications satellites orbiting the earth.

This spring district teachers will participate in video conferences offered by the Satellite Educational Resources Consortium (SERC) on several important staff development topics in the fields of science, math, geography and technology. Plans also include taping programs for use in the classroom.

"The district's satellite dish also provides access to emergency service teleconferences and training programs, all of which can be taped on request for the Waldwick Ambulance Corps and Police and Fire Departments," noted Superintendent Dr. Patrick Piegari.



1993-94 District Goals Stress Technology

The district's commitment to technology is evident in its 1993-94 educational objectives. Two of the four objectives involve technology.

By the end of this school year, 70% of grade four students in both Traphagen and Crescent Schools will be able to type a given selection on the computer with 75% accuracy using correct techniques.

In addition, junior/senior school students in Algebra I classes will achieve a mean score of 80% on a test involving the use of a calculator to evaluate expressions using order of operations and to find the solutions to fundamental algebraic equations. During the 1992-93 school year, the district met its objective that 75% of the students in grades 2-4 improve their accuracy on calculators.

Other 1993-94 objectives challenge the elementary schools to improve the awareness of environmental issues among third graders and challenge the junior school to increase the holistic writing scores of eighth graders taking the 1994 state Early Warning Test.

Technology Training for Teachers Underway

Before the 1993-94 school year began for students, Waldwick elementary school teachers were in class for one and a half days of required training on the new Macintosh computers installed in the Traphagen and Crescent libraries. These teachers are now using the machines

and software, such as *The Writing Center* and *Kid Works 2*, with their students. Additional training will be provided for elementary school teachers next summer.

Two after-school computer courses were also offered last fall for staff members in the junior/senior school. Curriculum-specific computer training for these teachers is scheduled for the spring.

Flooding problem aired

Former Mayor McKenna requests relief for residents living near Whites Pond

In a night that began with the students of Waldwick being honored for their environmental recycling activities, the borough council was reminded of an environment-related assignment of their own.

Former Mayor Frank McKenna came before borough officials to see how far they had progressed in remedying a

flooding situation that he and his neighbors have experienced.

However, he learned that little in the way of progress has been made since the council was first being apprised of the problem.

The waterway in question enters the community from Midland Park in an easterly direction, runs behind the high school to underground piping that brings the water to the

Whites Pond, according to McKenna.

The problem that arises is that a screen, set up at the mouth of the pipe to prevent debris from entering the tunnel, accumulates refuse which blocks stream flow. This in turn leads to flooding of low-lying areas on Yvonne Street, West Prospect Street, Lindbergh Parkway and Lakeview Drive.

According to McKenna, when the screen is blocked with such

varied items as firewood, toys and garbage bags, residents in the area experience flooding like occurred last Thanksgiving weekend.

At the public meeting on Dec. 15, McKenna came to the council to voice his concerns about the situation. At that point, the council directed the borough's engineering firm, Boswell/McClave, to investigate.

Borough Administrator Gary Kratz told the council that the engineering firm's report was just received. He characterized

the report as just a past history of what had been done at the area in question with no specifics on what should be done.

McKenna was upset with what he perceived as an apparent lack of interest by Boswell/McClave.

"I have not seen them do anything about the problem," stated McKenna. "What I would like them to do is to come and look at the area. The fact is that the council has done more for the flooding by building a little break (at the site) than the engineers have."

"To tell you the truth, I don't think much of Boswell/McClave," McKenna continued. "If we wait around for them to do something, we will be all old and gray."

There was also concern that with melting snow and the spring coming, the stream would rise and there would be more flooding problems in the near future.

McKenna ended by adding that he would have to consider moving out of the borough if the problem was not fixed.

Councilman Arthur Barthold and James Gibson promised that they would make sure that the engineers make a site inspection. They also asked the former mayor to be there when the engineer went for the on-site look so that he could explain the problem to the engineer.

The council said that as they proceed with the budget process, they would have to keep the flood problem in mind and try to allocate some money to rectify the situation.

Education is apathetic and without conviction

I have been displeased with our Board of Education concerning teachers contracts. Every time there are negotiations, contract settlements are delayed and this is unacceptable. Are the requests of the teachers union and the board of education reasonable? Additionally, in the last 10 years, the general population has voted down more school budgets than they have passed. All of this, unfortunately, has a negative effect on the quality of our children's education, our property values and our pride as residents of Waldwick. Fortunately for my daughter and her classmates, their teacher has a tremendous amount of integrity and is truly a professional. There are, however, many teachers who aren't willing to give 100 percent without a contract and that is understandable. How can we expect our students to get a good education if we don't sup-

port our teachers with good contracts — good working contracts and the best of supplies. My checkbook is open when it comes to my children's education, and if that isn't the attitude of the board of education, then I've definitely chosen the wrong town in which to live and raise a family. If you think education is expensive — try ignorance.

There are solutions to these problems: 1. The State Department of Education should have a standardized contract for all teachers in the state and simply mandate the amount of money to be granted as pay raises; 2. School budgets should not be voted down by the general public. Board of Education members are elected and should be completely in charge and oversee implementation of a budget that is within the boundaries specified by the state.

Renovators may get tax relief

Some believe it would generate revenue

WALDWICK — Residents who are renovating their homes may get tax relief if the council decides to go ahead with a proposed tax abatement program.

The program would allow homeowners who are making minor renovations such as adding siding and fixing their kitchens and bathrooms to avoid the full weight of an added tax assessment for five years.

The first year of the program the homeowner would receive no added assessment and the during next four years the added tax levy would be phased in.

The program would not cover renovations that increased the size of the home.

Councilman James Gibson believes tax abatements would encourage home renovations, lead to more valuable homes and generate more revenue for the borough.

"We're working on a budget that does not provide tax relief," Gibson said. "I see this being used by young couples and the elderly person who are scared to death to do it (renovate)."

Mayor Rick Vander Wende is not opposed to the program, but he is concerned about lost tax revenues.

"I would like to know how much it's really going to cost us," he said.

In the long run the program will generate greater revenues for the borough because of increased property values, Gibson said.

"The town is the one who will benefit four or five years from now. If we don't (institute the program), the tax base

erodes," he said.

After a tax abatement proposal was shot down last year, Gibson said he received several calls from residents

who favored the idea.

Gibson reported that one woman said, "Thank God someone's thinking about the future of the town."

Waldwick councilman balks at Hopatcong go-go charges

WALDWICK — A group of Hopatcong mothers is opposing a Waldwick councilman's attempt to receive a renovation variance for his restaurant that the group claims would pave the way for scantily-clad go-go dancers.

"It is within a half mile of houses of worship and two schools. The location for such a place is horrendous. It would define Hopatcong as a go-go haven," said Liz Collins, president of Modick Moms, a group dedicated to improve Modick Park in Hopatcong.

Collins and several other residents attended a recent Hopatcong Planning Board meeting to oppose reconstruction plans that include a raised platform and renovation of the bar at Councilman Joseph Musumeci's Savannah's Restaurant and Comedy Club.

Collins said, "Eventually it's only going to draw people who are interested in go-go bars. It will take money out of the community. It won't add anything to the community."

Last week Collins confronted Musumeci at a Waldwick

Borough Council meeting and asked him why he didn't open a go-go bar in his own town.

Musumeci feels the question is irrelevant because he does not own a restaurant in his town.

Musumeci claims he's being singled out for attack because he is a council member and that the controversy has damaged his reputation.

"The only reason it became public was because I'm a councilman. It was done to slander me," he said.

Hopatcong Mayor Clifford Lundin said he is opposed to a go-go bar in his town and he expects an ordinance to pass on Thursday forbidding sexually-oriented performances within 1,000 feet of a school and less than 500 feet from a bus stop or residential area.

"I would think a sexually oriented business adjacent to a residential zone would lower property values," he said.

Lundin said the Hopatcong Planning Board denied Musumeci's permit to build a stage because it would have been a change of use from a

restaurant to a nightclub.

But Musumeci said because his establishment had always featured entertainment, it was not a change of use.

Musumeci also said he had no plans to include go-go dancing in his establishment and that he only intended to renovate the stage so he could sell his business.

"I didn't mention go-go. They assumed go-go because of the shape of the stage," he said.

Musumeci said the stage could be used for anything from a magic show to a musical performance. If go-go dancing ever hits the stage it will be because the new owner wants to do it, he said.

"All I wanted to get was a permit for the stage. I have no say about what the next owner puts there," he said.

On March 9 Musumeci will appear before Hopatcong Zoning Board. He believes he will receive the variance because his plans comply with the law.

Musumeci has owned the establishment since 1981. He said he purchased it as a business investment and that he has rarely been in the place.

A confused attack on NJEA

Editor, The Record:

Columnist Steve Aduabato's attack on the New Jersey Education Association for opposing teacher recertification is confused.

Aduabato teaches at Rutgers. His own colleagues and his own union, the American Association of University Professors, oppose certification for themselves because they believe that scholarship in one's own field is the best preparation to teach. Of course, college is different from high school. But it is hard to see that teaching English composition to a college sophomore requires no teaching skills whatsoever while teaching English composition to a high school junior requires a full course in education.

St. Benedict's, the private school that prepared Aduabato for college, is not required by law to hire certified teachers but still provides an excellent education to those it graduates. Does Aduabato now downgrade his own education because the law does not require certified teachers at St. Benedict's?

Aduabato points out that we do recertify accountants, dentists, optometrists, and pharmacists, but not public school teachers. He overlooks the fact that we pay accountants, dentists, optometrists, and pharmacists more money than we pay teachers.

Aduabato displays a real cynicism by ignoring the facts that recertification is linked to high salaries and the NJEA rejects this as a strategy to raise teacher pay scales while he attacks the group for putting money before education.

My concern is that Aduabato seeks to influence my life when his views are in such conflict with his own situation and his own history. I am also concerned by his omission of important details that just happen to rebut his own position and his practice of intellectually jeering at the people who teach my children. Perhaps Aduabato could benefit from a course in values clarification.

Center controversial

WALDWICK— The construction of a community center has the support of several community groups, but other residents are not so sure that spending \$400,000 to renovate a building on the corner of Hopper Avenue and West Prospect Street is a good idea.

Shirley Feldman, president of Concerned Taxpayers of Waldwick, said, "I don't think we really need a community center. There are so many projects that should be addressed. Has anyone thought what the cost would be to maintain the facility?"

Bill Smith of Summit Avenue said it was not wise to spend money on a community center when the economy was in poor shape and so much road repair needed to be done.

But Mayor Rick Vander Wende said present facilities do not meet the borough's needs and the center could be used by almost any recreational organization.

"We had a number of public hearings. Almost unanimously, the 33 organizations that we canvassed thought it was a good project. I believe it will be a great asset to that region physically," he said.

Former Mayor Frank McKenna wants the council to hold a special meeting to discuss the community center because he feels the public is not well informed on the project.

"I think there is a need in the community for an information sharing session. I don't know what the com-

munity center will be used for. Invite the public in," he said.

Vander Wende said the council was taping a half hour program on the project that would be broadcast on WPL.

Feldman also complained that the council had not done a good job of informing the public and she did not think the issue should only be discussed during the budget session.

"It's a big ticket item. I think the public should be able to interact with the council. I think to co-mingle it with the budget is not a good idea."

Councilman Arthur Barthold said, "I find it hard to believe Mrs. Feldman does not know about the community center when it was put in the Master Plan six years ago. Many articles have been written about this."

To soften the financial blow, the council is applying for a \$180,000 state grant. Vander Wende thinks there is a good chance the borough will get at least \$120,000.

New tax plan discussed

Council considers deferral package aimed at improving existing homes

WALDWICK— The Waldwick Borough Council set in motion a more in-depth look into a tax abatement program for borough residents.

The plan was presented to the board by Councilman James Gibson, who referred to the program as more of a "tax deferral program" rather than an abatement.

"I'm looking to help the people in this town," said Gibson. "This is a way to give people a choice if they so choose."

The program discussed by the council would apply only to residents that would be making improvements to pre-existing houses.

"Projects such as installing aluminum siding or improving the kitchen are the areas that would be applicable," said Gibson.

Gibson stated that this program would benefit the borough in a number of different ways.

"Property values for homes that are in the area around the house that is being improved would go up," said Gibson. "And, hopefully, business will be kept in the community by using local contractors to do the work."

He told the council that there would be an application process to determine which residents would be eligible for the program that would begin next tax year.

Borough Tax Assessor Mary

Ann Gordon felt that the program had its "heart in the right place," but she worried that the program would cost the borough tax revenue money.

Mayor Rick Vander Wende was also cautious about the program, asking if people were really concerned that a \$50 or \$60 tax deferral, like the one proposed by Councilman Gibson, would be the difference in deciding whether or not to consider home improvements.

Several councilman felt that residents would react positive-

ly. Councilman Edwin Sherman said that he personally heard of cases in two Bergen County towns where a tax abatement program was a deci-

ding factor for the start of a home improvement project.

Gibson stated that this was the right time for such a program. He cited the recent home refinancing activity reported by banks and the upturn in the economy seen in the area.

Gibson said that this abatement would be targeted at young couples that are moving into the community and elderly residents who have been living in the borough.

"I had a woman call me last year when we brought up the proposal and she said that she was glad that somebody was looking to the future of the community. That's what this is all about because improvements in houses now will improve the tax base of the community in the long run," Gibson noted.

There would be limitations placed on the types of improvements that would be available for the tax abatement. The limitations that were discussed by

the council were that homes be pre-existing houses, 25 years or older and that the improvements to the house would not increase the square footage. Among the items that would be excluded from the abatement would be additions to houses, new houses under construction and decks.

The major concern that

Mayor Vander Wende had was, "How much would it cost (the borough)?"

Vander Wende asked that the borough administrator, borough attorney and Gibson get together and make a more formal proposal that would include a phase-in plan for the abatement.

WHEREAS, pursuant to P.L. 1993 Chapter 81 the Commissioner of the Department of Environmental Protection and Energy, in cooperation with the Commissioner of the Department of Community Affairs prepared a model ordinance for adoption by all municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the model ordinance has recently been approved by the New Jersey Legislature; and

WHEREAS, the model ordinance provides for incorporation into site plan and subdivision ordinances of the municipalities provisions for recycling in multifamily housing developments;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL of the Borough of Waldwick in the County of Bergen and State of New Jersey Chapter 77 and Chapter 86 each be amended to include the following new section in each Chapter, which section shall be designated 577-18 and 586-36A respectively as follows:

577-18 and 586-36A Multifamily Recycling Area
There shall be included in any new multifamily housing development that requires subdivision or site plan approval an indoor or outdoor recycling area for the collection and storage of residentially-generated recyclable materials. The dimensions of the recycling area shall be sufficient to accommodate recycling bins or containers which are of adequate size and number, and which are consistent with anticipated usage and with current methods of collection in the area in which the project is located. The dimensions of the recycling area and the bins or containers shall be determined in consultation with the municipal recycling coordinator, and shall be:

Once again, it's cities vs. suburbs for education aid

Both find little to cheer about

Governor Whitman's proposal to shift \$28.5 million in state aid from affluent school districts to poor districts has again pitted the suburbs against the cities in the fight for increasingly scarce education dollars.

For suburbs, faced with tight limits on what they can raise from property taxes, the proposed cut in "transition" aid next year would mean reductions in programs and fewer teachers.

In urban districts, where the state is under a 1990 court order to raise per-pupil spending to equal that of suburban schools, the \$28.5 million represents only a fraction of what is needed to bridge the gap.

And Whitman's proposal to boost aid to poor districts comes as the state Supreme Court prepares to hear an appeal of the 1990 Abbott vs. Burke case, in which the court found the state's educational funding system unconstitutional.

A lower court ruled in the summer that the state had not adequately addressed the financial divide between districts, and ordered that \$450 million be allocated to help 30 of the poorest school systems.

"In effect, the court mandate was issued in 1990 and the Supreme Court could rule that it's a bill that's five years overdue," said Frank Belluscio, a spokesman for the New Jersey School Boards Association.

With no increase planned in overall state aid, urban and suburban districts are finding little to cheer about in Whitman's proposed budget.

"The very little we get from the state to begin with is being peeled away," said Harry Galinsky, superintendent of Paramus schools, which will lose \$152,000 of its \$452,000 in transition aid next year if the Legislature approves the aid shift.

In many cases, districts won't be able to make up the loss of state aid by increasing local taxes. Galinsky said the state is expected to limit school district budget increases to less than 5 percent next year.

"These districts are going to look at their priorities and will have to dismantle and eliminate programs," he said.

Fifty-eight of Bergen County's 76 school districts received a total of \$15.5 million in transition aid for the 1993-94 school year. Bergen districts stand to lose a total of \$5.2 million next year.

In Morris County, 25 districts received \$5.6 million in transition aid. A one-third cut next year would mean the loss of \$1.9 million. In Passaic County, eight districts received \$3.3 million and face a one-third cut.

Transition aid is a remnant of former Gov. Jim Florio's Quality Education Act of 1990, which increased taxes to boost spending on urban schools while cutting state aid to suburbs.

Transition aid was intended to help ease the burden for districts that were slated to lose state aid under QEA. The money was to have been phased out over four years, ending in the 1994-95 school year.

But with rising costs, many districts came to depend on transition aid. Last year, the Legislature decided against a scheduled cut in the program.

Clifton school officials say they will be hard pressed to make up the loss of \$476,109 in transition aid next year. "There's a strong possibility that people will be laid off and some programs will be cut," said Board of Education President Frank Pecci. "We have to see where we can make cuts. It's going to be difficult."

The Wayne school district received \$492,107 in transition aid for this school year, said Business Administrator Rhua C. Ernst, who added that property owners may end up making up the cut.

"Wayne taxpayers support a major part of the budget because we get so little aid to begin with," Ernst said. "Any money that comes out of state aid has to drop right on the taxpayer's bill."

For Upper Saddle River, the loss of a third of its \$105,000 transition aid would force the district to cut one teacher from its staff, said Nathan Parker, superintendent of the K-8 district with 840 students.

He said budget caps and rising costs have forced the district to cut programs in foreign languages and art. "We have an environmental science center sitting empty because we have no one to staff it," he said.

But officials in some of the state's 30 special needs districts — mostly in cities — said the extra aid, and more, is desperately needed.

"Every little bit helps, but I don't think anyone would seriously think it would make that significant a contribution to an urban district," said Chuck Coligan, spokesman for Paterson schools. "It helps, but we need more."

Paterson alone needs \$60 million to replace four schools so old they have no gym, cafeteria, or libraries, and for a fifth school to serve students who must now be sent out of the crowded district.

"I understand what [suburban schools] are saying about losing a science lab here and there. I don't have science labs to lose," said Coligan, whose 36 schools include one elementary school with a science lab.

In Passaic, funding is needed to buy more computers for students, to add full-day kindergarten at more schools, and to teach parents how to help their children with homework, said Superintendent Robert Holster.

Center under microscope

Community facility's costs, staffing, maintenance come under questioning

WALDWICK—Questions about the proposed community center were raised at a public council meeting last week.

The community center project deals with the rehabilitation of a house located at Hopper and West Prospect streets. The structure would be converted into a multiple-purpose facility that could be used by any borough resident or group.

Questions raised referred to the benefits the project would bring to the community and how much it would cost.

Shirley Feldman cited the cost issue and asked the council if money was being set aside in the upcoming budget for the community center.

Mayor Rick Vander Wende answered that this has not been done yet as the budget process is ongoing, but that the total project has been estimated to cost \$400,000. He added that

\$50,000 had already been spent on the project with the repair of the roof awhile back.

Feldman said she felt there was "no need for this center. We have room at our schools and the senior center that could be used."

She also questioned who would actually use the center when it was ready and what would be the cost of maintaining the center when it was completed.

Vander Wende responded that 33 community organizations had expressed interest in using the facility. He said that "(the council) at first started off with a one-story building that

would have cost \$300,000. But then these community organizations suggested some changes that increased the cost of the project."

He cited the example of adding a second floor to the structure at the suggestion of one of the organizations so that the center would be more flexible to the total community's needs.

He envisioned the center would be used during the day by adults and after school, on weekends and during the summer by children.

Feldman wondered if that would necessitate adding a staff member to oversee the building and questioned how much that would cost.

Vander Wende felt that the job of overseeing the center could be filled by a part-time employee, especially during the summer months.

With regard to the overall cost of the project, he stated that the \$400,000 estimate could be reduced by as much as \$180,000 in Community Development grants for which the borough has already applied. The council was also looking for private grants to finance the project.

Regarding the maintenance question, the mayor thought that the community center could be incorporated into a contract that would involve maintenance of all public build-

ings throughout the borough.

He added that this would be a cosmetic upgrade for that area of town that also includes Whites Pond and the borough swimming pool.

Feldman commented that she had talked to people in the community who did not support the project and wondered if a public information hearing on the community center could be held to gauge public opinion.

Vander Wende commented that people he had talked to in the community were enthused about the project, citing the 33 organizations that provided input.

The mayor commented that borough residents also will be able to see plans for the project on WPI-TV. He said that the television station was shooting a feature about the borough and the planned community center would be one of the segments. He felt this would provide residents with useful information about the community.

Treasurer Mary Ann Viviani said the governing body will take out the loan by early May and it hopes to get an interest rate of no higher than 3.25 percent.

Aspiring doctors gravitate to primary care

51% in nation opt to be generalists

For the first time in recent memory, the majority of medical-school graduates in the nation — and in New Jersey — chose to enter primary-care fields such as family practice and pediatrics rather than specialties such as orthopedics or plastic surgery.

The balance tipped on Wednesday, known as Match Day 1994 to more than 13,000 medical-school seniors, some 300 of them in New Jersey. That was when the results of a nationwide match of students and residency programs were announced at medical schools around the country, to cries of relief and tears of frustration.

The lopsided numbers of specialists practicing medicine is one factor that drives up health-care costs, while leaving inner-city and rural areas short of doctors to meet their residents' basic health needs. Most national health-care reform plans include as one of their goals increasing the number of primary-care doctors.

In New Jersey, 167 members of the class of 1994, or 53 percent, chose residency programs in family practice, internal medicine, pediatrics, and obstetrics and gynecology. Nationally, 51 percent of medical school seniors did. Family practice alone accounted for 14 percent of the placements, an increase from 1,636 students to 1,850.

"These are encouraging numbers, there's no doubt about it," said Patty Shea of the Association of American Medical Colleges, which runs the match program. Whether they will hold true in two or three years depends on how many residents branch off from general areas like pediatrics or internal medicine into narrower sub-specialties, she said.

But this first signal of a potential sea

change in the lopsided entry of doctors into specialty areas occurred even before lawmakers and academic experts could agree on reforms that would turn young doctors toward primary care.

Perhaps anticipating the direction of reform, students made choices that would position them well to benefit from it, just as pharmaceutical companies over the last year held drug prices to a lower rate of increase than before the national focus on health-care reform.

"The students are looking at the na-

tional news, reading the tea leaves, and it looks like the opportunities are going to be in primary care," said Dr. Norman Edelman, dean of the Robert Wood Johnson Medical School in New Brunswick. "There's no question that when a health maintenance organization hires a primary-care doc, they're paying more than they used to."

At Edelman's school, one of three in the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, 66 percent of the class chose primary-care fields, compared with 47 percent last year.

Susan Loeb, a senior at the New Jersey Medical School in Newark, said her legs were shaking as she opened the envelope that told her where she would spend the next few years. She was elated when she saw her first choice — a residency in obstetrics and gynecology at New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center.

"I always knew I wanted to do something in primary care," said the Teaneck resident, 24. "I had planned on doing pediatrics, but during my third year, I chose obstetrics. It has the perfect mix: primary care and a little bit of surgery."

Thomas Barrett of Closter, also a senior at the Newark branch of UMDNJ, learned he'd been accepted in a five-year program in orthopedic surgery at the Geisinger Medical Center in Pennsylvania. Although familiar with primary care as the son of an emergency physician, he based his choice on satisfaction. "I personally enjoy using my hands," he said, "seeing what I'm doing right in front of me."

Only a third of America's practicing physicians currently work in fields such as general medicine, family practice, internal medicine, or pediatrics. They are paid salaries that are half as big, on average, as those paid to specialists such as neurologists, dermatologists, or surgeons.

But managed care, with its emphasis on seeking care first at the primary level and then being referred to a specialist, will increase the need for generalists. The primary-care doctors serve as gatekeepers. Most of the reform plans under discussion in Congress increase the reliance on managed care.

President Clinton's "health security act" would use a carrot-and-stick approach to redressing the balance of generalists and specialists. Scholarships, bonuses, and adjustments in physician payments from Medicare would induce entry into primary-care fields, while proposed limits on the residency slots for specialists would contain their growth.

the current 855 beds to 1,100 beds at a cost of \$45 million. Phase One A will spend an additional \$2 million to build the Sheriff's Bureau of Criminal Investigation. Phase Two will increase the jail's capacity to 1,700 beds at an added cost of from \$20 to \$27 million. The total expansion plan will double the jail's capacity at a total estimated cost of \$67 to \$74 million, excluding the inevitable cost overruns.

We can find no credible information to justify the proposed grandiose expansion of the county jail. Since 1989, the county's inmate population has actually declined from a total of 710 inmates to the current population of 595. In addition, the "New Jersey Uniform

Crime Report" reveals a decline in the total crime index for Bergen County. The expansion "Master Plan" incorrectly projected the county's 1993 population at the jail to rise to approximately 750 — an increase that never materialized. In fact, the 1993 designated "county" inmate population averaged under 600. The "Master Plan" contains similar artificially-inflated county inmate population projections: 792 by 1994, 940 by 1996 and 1,045 by the year 2000 — a 75 percent increase in seven years. Despite the fact that the New Jersey Supreme Court has ruled that county jails can no longer be required to house state felons after April, 1994, the expansion

plan provides for the housing of 300 state inmates. Bergen County has voluntarily agreed to house 200 state prisoners until June, 1998.

The primary purpose of a county jail is to serve as a place of confinement for pre-trial detainees and for individuals sentenced to jail terms of twelve months or less by the Municipal and Superior Courts. Programs are available for "non-violent" offenders that would help re-

duce the inmate population. However, the Sheriff has failed to fully explore the alternatives to the incarceration of such offenders: Work Release Program, Community Service and Home Custody through electronic monitoring. The Sheriff estimates the cost of housing an inmate in the county jail to be \$25,000 per year. Although the cost of home custody is only \$4,500 per year, only six individuals are presently participating in this program.

Instead of creating an unneeded state maximum-security facility in Hackensack, our elected officials should return the Bergen County Jail to its proper role as a "county" jail. Bergen County taxpayers are already taxed to the max. We should not be required to provide \$74 million to replicate Rahway on River Street simply to satisfy a politician's ego.

Cracking down on illegal gun sales

Editor, The Record:

In your March 3 editorial, "Gaining some ground in the fight against guns," you mention the murder statistics in Great Britain, Japan, and Canada. But you do not mention that Great Britain does not have drug-related murders because it has legalized the use of drugs.

Great Britain also censors television and radio, so that the antisocial behavior seen on American television media is not a contributing factor. Great Britain does not treat juvenile offenders as we do. If you check the time a criminal spends in jail for violent crimes in Canada and Japan, against the time spent in our jails, you will find other reasons for the difference in murder rates.

You also mention a bill that will crack down on fly-by-night gun dealers. Who made it possible for these dealers to exist in the first place? The government put gun control under the jurisdiction of the Treasury Department.

The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms should have used its resources to monitor and re-

quest stricter guidelines before issuing federal gun dealer permits. Instead, the BATF and FBI created fiascos in the Randy Weaver case in Idaho and the Branch Davidians case in Texas.

In the Weaver case, the people charged by the government were found not guilty. In the Branch Davidians case, the government did not get the verdicts it needed to justify the massive toll in human lives.

The government should have established guidelines to make it harder for fly-by-night gun dealers to do business when the BATF was created. That was their job. Instead of increasing the appropriations for the BATF, our government should pull back these agents and teach them how to monitor and investigate requests for gun dealer licenses.

Your editorial should be condemning Congress for not demanding from the BATF a plan to control the issuing of licenses before it became a problem.

Budget measures adopted

Council acts to meet traditional mid-year cash flow problems

WALDWICK— The Waldwick borough council has set into motion a plan that will provide emergency funding should the community run short of money to pay its bills later in the year.

The proposal, prepared by Chief Financial Officer Mary Ann Viviani and Borough Administrator Gary Kratz, was their "best guesstimate" of the borough's financial liability for

the remainder of the 1994 budget year.

The council was given a proposed cash flow chart from January to December 1994. January and February data was "real" data, reflecting expenses that had already been incurred. Data for the rest of the year was derived from spending patterns established in previous years.

Viviani and Kratz told councilmembers they believed there

would be a cash flow problem for the June through mid-September time period.

Kratz advised the council that state funding makes up 35 to 40 percent of the borough's yearly budget. The other 60 percent comes from local property taxes, plus various fines and fees. The property tax monies become available on a quarterly basis. From quarter to quarter, the municipal spending pattern constitutes a series of peaks and valleys.

The borough handles its annual bill paying dilemma in two ways.

One method that has proven

successful was deferring bills owed by the Waldwick Board of Education, the Waldwick Library as well as other payments due a number of county organizations.

Another helpful alternative has been the borough's application for Tax Anticipation Notes (TANS). According to Viviani, TANS are loans from an area bank or banks that enable the borough to ride out its cash flow problems until it receives its allotted state aid monies.

"We didn't receive state

money until December last year," said Kratz.

Viviani was hopeful that Waldwick would obtain its state allocation earlier this year. Her cautious optimism is based on the fact that the state has set up a May meeting to review municipal budget requests. The state usually waits until late in the calendar year to conduct this meeting, Viviani added.

Kratz indicated that another historic delay in state subsidization is the legislature's delay in passage of its annual budget. This, in turn, has an impact on fund availability at the municipal level.

Viviani said there are many

months that the borough is in the red because the state does not release the funds in a timely manner.

She said the borough applied for a TANS last year and, in fact, the borough had to dip into the fund to pay some of its bills.

Mayor Rick Vander Wende pointed out that, although the borough did have to reach into the fund, the borough was able to pay back what it borrowed.

Last year's TANS was valued at \$900,000 and the council decided to try to apply for a similar amount to meet this year's obligations.

Viviani was hopeful that the loan would carry a 3.25 percent interest rate, but she advised that the borough would shop area banks to find the best deal.

BOND ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE MAKING OF VARIOUS PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS AND THE ACQUISITION OF NEW ADDITIONAL OR REPLACEMENT EQUIPMENT AND MACHINERY AND A NEW AUTOMOTIVE VEHICLE, INCLUDING ORIGINAL APPARATUS AND EQUIPMENT, IN, BY AND FOR THE WATER UTILITY OF THE BOROUGH OF WALDWICK, IN THE COUNTY OF BERGEN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, TO APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$166,100 TO PAY THE COST THEREOF, TO MAKE A DOWN PAYMENT, TO AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS TO FINANCE SUCH APPROPRIATION AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF SUCH BONDS.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Waldwick, in the County of Bergen, State of New Jersey, as follows:

Section 1. The Borough of Waldwick, in the County of Bergen, State of New Jersey (the "Borough") is hereby authorized to make various public improvements and to acquire new additional or replacement equipment and machinery and a new automotive vehicle, including original apparatus and equipment, in, by and for the Water Utility of said Borough, as more particularly described in Section 4 hereof. Said improvements and acquisitions shall include all work, materials and appurtenances necessary and suitable therefor.

Section 2. There is hereby appropriated to the payment of the cost of making the improvements and acquisitions described in Sections 1 and 4 hereof (hereinafter referred to as "purposes"), the respective amounts of money hereinafter stated as the appropriation for said respective purposes. Said appropriation shall be met from the proceeds of the sale of the bonds authorized and the down payment appropriated by this ordinance. Said improvements and acquisitions shall be made as general improvements and no part of the cost thereof shall be assessed against property specially benefited.

Section 3. It is hereby determined and stated that the making of such improvements and acquisitions is not a current expense of said Borough.

Section 4. The several purposes hereby authorized for the financing of which said obligations are to be issued are set forth in the following "Schedule of Improvements, Purposes and Amounts" which schedule also shows (1) the amount of the appropriation and the estimated cost of each such purpose, and (2) the amount of each sum which is to be provided by the down payment hereinafter appropriated to finance such purposes, and (3) the estimated maximum amount of bonds and notes to be issued for each such purpose, and (4) the period of usefulness of each such purpose, according to its reasonable life, computed from the date of said bonds:

Section 5. The cost of such purposes, as hereinbefore stated, includes the aggregate amount of \$20,000 which is estimated to be necessary to finance the cost of such purposes, including architect's fees, accounting, engineering and inspection costs, legal expenses and other expenses, including interest on such obligations to the extent permitted by Section 20 of the Local Bond Law.

Section 6. It is hereby determined and stated that moneys exceeding \$5,600, appropriated for down payments on capital improvements or for the capital improvement fund in Water Utility budgets heretofore adopted for said Borough, are now available to finance said purposes. The sum of \$5,600 is hereby appropriated from such moneys to the payment of the cost of said purposes.

Section 7. To finance said purposes, bonds of said Borough of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$110,500 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Bond Law. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate per annum as may be hereafter determined within the limitations prescribed by law. All matters with respect to said bonds not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolutions to be hereafter adopted.

Section 8. To finance said purposes, bond anticipation notes of said Borough of an aggregate principal amount not exceeding \$110,500 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Bond Law in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of notes hereby authorized to be issued shall be reduced by an amount equal to the principal amount of the bonds so issued. If the aggregate amount of outstanding bonds and notes issued pursuant to this ordinance shall at any time exceed the sum first mentioned in this section, the moneys raised by the issuance of said bonds shall, to not less than the amount of such excess, be applied to the payment of such notes then outstanding.

Section 9. Each bond anticipation note issued pursuant to this ordinance shall be dated on or about the date of its issuance and shall be payable not more than one year from its date, shall bear interest at a rate per annum as may be hereafter determined within the limitations prescribed by law and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law. Each of said bond anticipation notes shall be signed by the Mayor and by a financial officer and shall be under the seal of said Borough and attested by the Borough Clerk or Deputy Borough Clerk. Said officers are hereby authorized to execute said notes in such form as they may adopt in conformity with law. The power to determine any matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance and also the power to sell said notes, is hereby delegated to the Chief Financial Officer who is hereby authorized of sell said notes either at one time or from time to time in the manner provided by law.

Section 10. It is hereby determined and declared that the average period of usefulness of said purposes, according to their reasonable lives, taking into consideration the respective amounts of bonds or notes authorized for said purposes, is a period of 18.25 years computed from the date of said bonds.

Section 11. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Borough Clerk of said Borough, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Borough, as defined in Section 43 of the Local Bond Law, is increased by this ordinance by \$110,500 and that the issuance of the bonds and notes authorized by this ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law.

Section 12. Any funds received from the County of Bergen, the State of New Jersey or any of their agencies or any funds received from the United States of America or any of its agencies in aid of such purposes, shall be applied to the payment of the cost of such purposes, or, if bond anticipation notes have been issued, to the payment of the bond anticipation notes, and the amount of bonds authorized for such

purposes shall be reduced accordingly.

Section 13. The Borough intends to issue the bonds or notes to finance the cost of the improvements and acquisitions described in Sections 1 and 4 of this bond ordinance. If the Borough incurs such costs prior to the issuance of the bonds or notes, the Borough hereby states its reasonable expectation to reimburse itself for such expenditures with the proceeds of such bonds or notes in the maximum principal amount of bonds or notes authorized by this bond ordinance.

Section 14. The full faith and credit of the Borough are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal of and the interest on the obligations authorized by this ordinance. Said obligations shall be direct, unlimited and general obligations of the Borough, and the Borough shall levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable real property within the Borough for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds and notes, without limitation as to rate or amount.

Section 15. BOND ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE MAKING OF VARIOUS PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS AND THE ACQUISITION OF NEW ADDITIONAL OR REPLACEMENT EQUIPMENT AND MACHINERY, NEW AUTOMOTIVE VEHICLES, INCLUDING ORIGINAL APPARATUS AND EQUIPMENT, AND NEW COMMUNICATION AND SIGNAL SYSTEMS EQUIPMENT IN, BY AND FOR THE BOROUGH OF WALDWICK, IN THE COUNTY OF BERGEN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, TO APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$716,825 TO PAY THE COST THEREOF, TO MAKE A DOWN PAYMENT, TO AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS TO FINANCE SUCH APPROPRIATION AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN ANTICIPATION OF THE ISSUANCE OF SUCH BONDS.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Borough Council of the Borough of Waldwick, in the County of Bergen, State of New Jersey, as follows:

Section 1. The Borough of Waldwick, in the County of Bergen, State of New Jersey (the "Borough") is hereby authorized to make various public improvements and to acquire new additional or replacement equipment and machinery, new automotive vehicles, including original apparatus and equipment, and new communication and signal systems equipment in, by and for said Borough, as more particularly described in Section 4 hereof. Said improvements and acquisitions shall be made as general improvements and no part of the cost thereof shall be assessed against property specially benefited.

Each bond anticipation note issued pursuant to this ordinance shall be dated on or about the date of its issuance and shall be payable not more than one year from its date, shall bear interest at a rate per annum as may be hereafter determined within the limitations prescribed by law and may be renewed from time to time pursuant to and within limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law. Each of said bond anticipation notes shall be signed by the Mayor and by a financial officer and shall be under the seal of said Borough and attested by the Borough Clerk or Deputy Borough Clerk. Said officers are hereby authorized to execute said notes in such form as they may adopt in conformity with law. The power to determine any matters with respect to said notes not determined by this ordinance and also the power to sell said notes, is hereby delegated to the Chief Financial Officer who is hereby authorized of sell said notes either at one time or from time to time in the manner provided by law.

Truman began Cold War

Tragedy steers student toward medicine

When Brian Gebhardt's best friend died, the senior at St. Joseph Regional High School in Montvale set new goals for his future.

"Freshman year, I wanted to be a teacher," Gebhardt said. "Then when Doug died sophomore year, I became interested in medicine. He died of acute leukemia, and I thought that maybe I could do something to prevent that from happening to others."

Gebhardt, a Garden State Scholar who lives in Waldwick, already is doing the groundwork. This year, despite the enormous stress involved, he took two advanced-placement science classes: physics and biology. He also is taking advanced-placement English, calculus, and history.

"I was concerned in the beginning that two science classes would be too much, and I didn't want my grades to suffer," he said. "But I know these classes will help me get a head start in pre-med."

Russell McConnell, who heads the guidance department, said students don't generally double up on advanced-placement science classes.

"There is a significant amount of extra work to be done," said McConnell. "Brian's a guy who sets high goals for himself and then works to reach them. The pressure is there, but I think it forces him to organize his time and he is very successful at this."

Finding physics class more difficult than biology, Gebhardt said he thinks it helps that his teacher, Tom Piccate, has taught him before.

"Mr. Piccate taught me chemistry sophomore year and physics junior year," Gebhardt said. "I think that helps because the teacher knows you a little better — knows what kind of a worker you are."

Gebhardt is becoming familiar with the medical environment by volunteering at The Valley Hospital in Ridgewood, where he makes beds and keeps patients supplied with drinking water. Through the Boy Scouts, he got to know members of the medical profession on a more personal basis at Pascack Valley Hospital, Westwood.

"I was part of the Scouts' 12-week Explorer Program," Gebhardt said. "We got tours of the different areas of the hospital and got to see the different professions within the medical field. A doctor came and spoke to us as a group about his experiences."

Gebhardt was impressed.

"He said that besides what people normally say about the lifestyle — that doctors make a very comfortable living — there is nothing better than the feeling you get when you help people."

When asked what has been his biggest commitment to his school, Gebhardt doesn't hesitate.

"Track — definitely track."

He feels that this sport has helped him to discipline himself in all other areas.

"With track, you have to take a lot of responsibility on yourself. You have to set a schedule for yourself," said Gebhardt, a member of the indoor and outdoor track teams. "And I think that type of training falls over into academics as well."

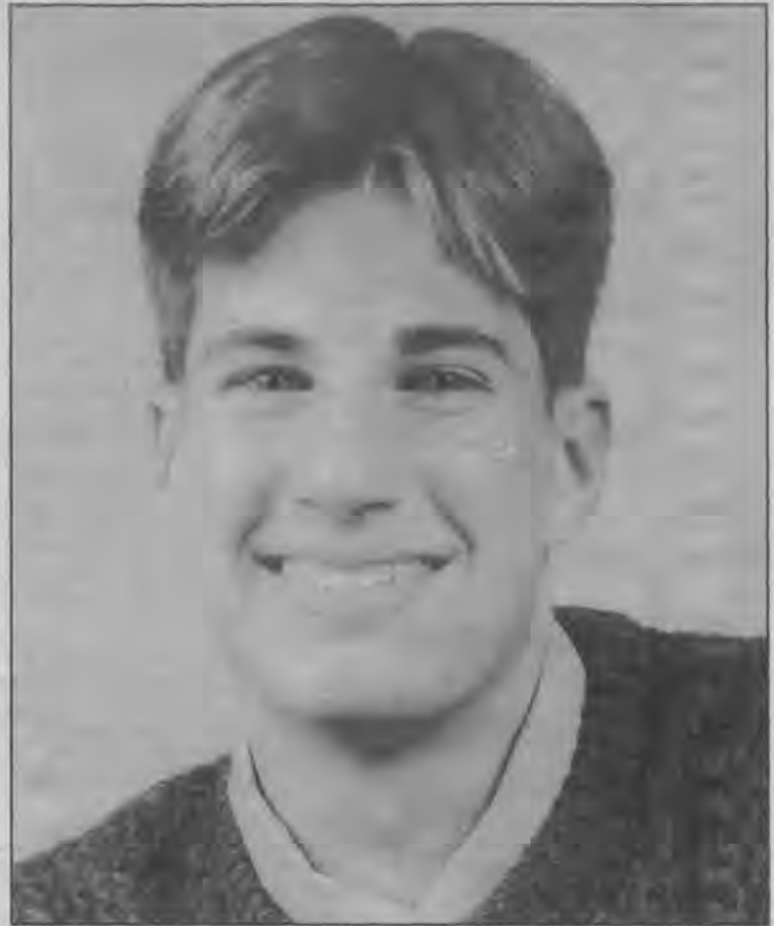
Gebhardt also learned responsibility as part of a 16-student team competing in the Model United Nations program the past two years.

This year, St. Joseph students represented Guatemala when they went to Washington, D.C., to compete with schools from all over the United States. Gebhardt and his partner, Pat Gomez, were responsible for economics and finance.

Each member of the St. Joseph team had to do a lot of research on his own because the team met only once every two weeks, Gebhardt said. "I learned a lot about Guatemala. I didn't realize that it was so involved with the rest of the world."

Students begin preparing for the Model U.N. in October, then spend four days in Washington in February.

I've just finished reading the article, "On the inside looking at Down's" (March 14) about Mitchell Levitz and Jason Kingsley, two young men who have written a book about the disorder, which they have. I am amazed by the myth that Down's syndrome is something other than mental retardation: that given proper nurturing, the affliction will go away.

Down's syndrome cannot be cured. Yet proponents of the mainstream philosophy will have you think that deinstitutionalization is a panacea for those with Down's syndrome. If only this were true. The disabilities inherent in Down's syndrome are many and varied. The degree of mental retardation can be mild, almost inconsequential — or severe and profound, hampering even the most basic functioning capabilities (not to mention physical ailments). A policy that bars from institutions all individuals with Down's syndrome regardless of their handicap is a prejudicial policy. The operative word when speaking about Down's syndrome is individual.

The media has done much to enlighten the public on the plight of the handicapped; it has helped to elevate their living standard. But it has also helped to contribute to a myth — a belief that all persons with Down's syndrome can become normal if given the proper surroundings. No wonder there are up to 100 families waiting for the chance to adopt one Down's syndrome baby, as the article says.

We need to address each person's

needs and capabilities. We need to continue to enrich the lives of those less fortunate than we are. But we need to do so with common sense: not every individual with Down's syndrome is a Mitchell Levitz or a Jason Kingsley — no matter how much we would want them to be.

Public to discuss center

Council adopts resolution to solicit residents' views on community facility

WALDWICK— The borough council passed a resolution that calls for a public meeting to gather and evaluate public opinion concerning the proposed community center.

The decision to hold the meeting was in response to requests by local residents who claimed to the council that the community center project was not needed.

3-30-94
The center project deals with the rehabilitation of a house located at Hopper and West Prospect streets. The structure would be converted into a multiple-purpose facility that could be used by any borough resident or group.

Shirley Feldman again raised the issue before the board after she had questioned the usefulness of the center at the last public meeting on March 8.

She told the council that she had gone back to the committee

report that recommended the center, saying she had seen only nine organizations listed out of a total of 33 cited by Mayor Rick Vander Wende. The mayor indicated that the larger number represented groups that had been polled for their views on the viability of the proposed facility.

Feldman said that of these nine groups, only three had suggested some sort of multiple-purpose facility.

At that point, Borough Attorney Menelaos Toskos told her that he had been the head of the committee that suggested proceeding with the center and

that the nine organizations that were referenced in the report were not the only ones who reported back to the committee.

"As I remember, there were letters written to the 33 organizations. Some responded by letter, others with phone calls or in person to committee members," Toskos said.

When pressed for more details, he told Feldman that she could come and review the committee's files.

Feldman also told the council that she went back through

borough Master Plans dating back as far as 1978 and that there were only fleeting references of a community center.

Councilman James Gibson stated that fact. He brought

to the council's attention minutes from a public council meeting in 1984 in which then Mayor Frank McKenna signed a resolution allocating money for the use of the building to be renovated into some type of community center.

McKenna disputed this

claim, saying that he believed that the resolution was written in a nondescript way in case money needed to be transferred to another area of the budget.

"I really didn't think we need a community center," McKenna added.

that one of the master plans said that the borough should refrain from duplicating facilities that serve the same purpose.

She reiterated the point that senior citizens have their own center and that Board of Education President Paul Cottrell had told her that organizations could have access to school system buildings six nights a week.

Councilman Art Barthold told Feldman that one of the reasons that the community center was going ahead is the fact that the teen canteen, which is currently housed in the Waldwick schools, has been looking for a facility that would be available for an expanded program.

Feldman also detailed to the council that the population of the town has steadily decreased, specifically the population of school-age children had dropped 152 percent since 1970.

"I feel that because of the demographic changes in the Waldwick school system, the borough will eventually go into some kind of regionalized school system that may close one of the schools in the borough," Feldman stated.

She felt the possibility that one of facilities could be used as

a community center should also be looked into.

Another borough resident, Bob Smith, raised an objection to the proposed center. His main concern was the way that the center would be run after it was built.

"What is the salary going to be for the person who runs the community center?" asked Smith the council.

When informed that the borough council believed that there would be a part-time employee needed for the summer, Smith wondered "How will a part-time employee be able to keep track and schedule a facility that may be used by all of these town organizations?"

Feldman told the council that "if the people in the community want it, so be it." But, she asked the council to hold a separate meeting about the project so that the merits of the center could be debated in order that this issue doesn't dominate the rest of the budget when it is presented to the public.

Councilman William Paterson then asked that a resolution be passed to establish a special public meeting to discuss the community center. The resolution was passed unanimously.

Jail decision to cost taxpayers

3-30-95

Urged by County Executive "Pat" Schuber, the Bergen County Freeholders have decided to expand the county jail and renovate it to a "state-of-the-art contemporary correctional facility. The decision will prove to be costly for Bergen County's taxpayers.

The first phase of the "Master Plan" for the Bergen County Detention Center will increase the jail's capacity from the current 855 beds to 1,100 beds at a

cost of \$45 million. Phase 1-A will spend an additional \$2 million to build the Sheriff's Bureau of Criminal Investigation. Phase 2 will increase the jail's capacity to 1,700 beds at an added cost of \$20 to \$27 million. The total expansion plan will double the jail's capacity at a total estimated cost of \$67 to \$74 million, excluding the inevitable cost overruns.

We can find no credible information to justify the proposed grandiose expansion of the county jail. Since 1989, the county's inmate population has

actually declined from a total of 710 inmates to the current population of 595. In addition, the "New Jersey Uniform Crime Report" reveals a decline in the total crime index for Bergen County.

The expansion "Master Plan" incorrectly projected the county's 1993 population at the jail to rise to approximately 750; an increase that never materialized. In fact, the 1993 designated "county" inmate population averaged under 600. The "Master Plan" contains similar artificially-inflated county inmate population projections; 792 by 1994, 940 by 1996 and 1,045 by the year 2000 — a 75 percent increase in

seven years. Despite the fact that the New Jersey Supreme Court has ruled that county jails can no longer be required to house state felons after April 1 1994, the expansion plan provides for the housing of 300 state inmates. Bergen County has voluntarily agreed to house 200 state prisoners until June 1998.

The primary purpose of a county jail is to serve as a place of confinement for pre-trial detainees and for individuals sentenced to jail terms of 12 months or less by the municipal and superior courts. Programs are available for "non-violent" offenders that would help re-

duce the inmate population. However, the sheriff has failed to fully explore the alternatives to the incarceration of such: Work Release Program, Community Service and Home Custody through electronic monitoring.

The sheriff estimates the cost of housing an inmate in the county to be \$25,000 per year. Although the cost of home custody is only \$4,500 per year, only six individuals are presently participating in this program.

Instead of creating an unneeded state maximum-security facility in Hackensack, our elected officials should return the Bergen County Jail to its proper role as a "county jail." Bergen County taxpayers are

already taxed to the max. We should not be required to provide \$74 million to replicate Rahway on River Street simply to satisfy a politician's ego.

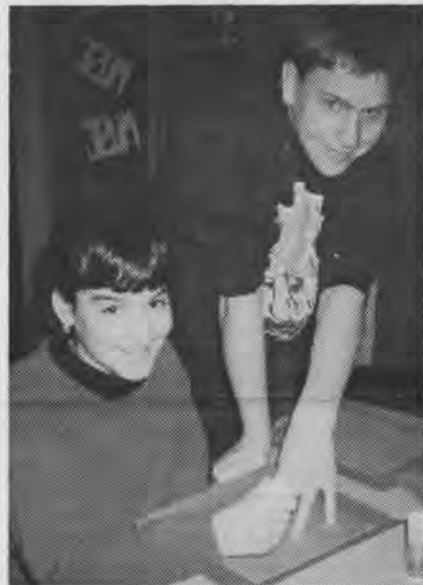

Boro spending outlined

Over \$800,000 will be needed to finance improvement projects

WALDWICK— With an eye toward this year's budget, the council passed two resolutions that will appropriate funds for the coming year for various public improvements in the borough.

The two separate resolutions will set aside a total of over \$800,000 for 14 different expenditures to be financed by the borough.

The expenditures were broken down into individual resolutions showing how much the total project would cost, a down payment for each project, and the remaining cost that would be financed by bonds.

The 14 budgeted items come to a grand total of \$832,925. Of that amount, the borough will authorize \$29,825 for down-payments on the disbursements and bond the remaining \$793,100.

The largest cost will be the acquisition of a new pumper fire engine, including extra equipment for a total of \$250,000. According to Councilman Joseph Musumeci, head of the council's Public Safety Committee, "The truck needs to be replaced because it's 27 years old."

Musumeci continued, "The truck will be delivered in one year's time, so if we had waited until next year's budget to approve the new truck, we would not have it for another two years."

Musumeci said an example of how badly the truck needs re-

placing is that when the truck recently went in for some brake work, the mechanic had to reconstruct the brakes because there were no replacement parts available.

The fire department is also set to acquire additional fire equipment that will cost the borough \$10,000, in addition to confined space entry equipment for the DPW and Fire Department totaling \$20,975, along with a vacuum machine for the Department of Public Works (DPW).

A new communication and

signal system, consisting of traffic devices for the DPW, and radios and pagers for both the DPW and the fire department were also appropriated at \$21,900.

"None of this is a frivolous expenditure. We need this equipment either to update broken or outdated equipment or come into line with safety regulations for insurance purposes," Musumeci said.

A total of \$90,000 has also been set aside for a four-wheel drive vehicle for the police department, and a dump truck for the DPW.

Two public buildings will get some needed improvements. A total of \$105,000 has been budgeted for the interior renovations at Fire Company #2 and replacement of the roof at the DPW garage.

Resurfacing of seven streets will be undertaken by the borough. Five of those streets (Douglas Street, Campbell Street, Park Place, Astor Place and Ridgewald Avenue) will be fully repaved.

The other two streets will only be repaved in certain sections. Bergen Avenue will be repaved from Franklin Turnpike to Centre Street while Highwood Avenue will be paved from Nordham Street to its eastern end. The total cost of these repaving projects will be \$75,000.

Another scheduled road project is the reconstruction of Maple Avenue. Included in this will be road resurfacing, construction of barrier-free ramps and drainage improvements.

The borough has set aside \$85,000 for this work. The borough anticipates that a grant in the amount of \$75,000 from the New Jersey Department of Transportation will be received to finance the cost of the improvements to Maple Avenue.

The borough has allotted \$5,000 for the acquisition of easements in connection with the improvement of bridges in the borough located at Hopper Avenue and Wyckoff Avenue.

Improvements of public property will consist of the rehabilitation of the tennis courts at Veterans Park and the rem-

ediation of soil at the Municipal Building to remove petroleum contaminated soil, install monitoring wells and site clean-up, as required by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection and Energy (DEPE), and this will be done at a total cost of \$50,000.

The council also approved the acquisition and installation of a rooftop air conditioning unit at the Free Public Library for a total cost of \$3,950.

In its other resolution, the council appropriated a total sum of \$116,100 for the Water Department.

The budget for the water department includes \$57,600 for the new or replacement equipment and machinery consisting of well pump equipment and an emergency generator for the Malcolm Street well house.

A van for the water department's use has been assigned for \$21,000 and \$17,500 for renovations to the exteriors of well houses #2 and #3. There was also \$20,000 approved by the council for replacement of water mains and fire hydrants, where necessary.

A public discussion will be held at the April 12 meeting.

Withheld state funds may drive up property taxes

WALDWICK — A classic case of "robbing Peter to pay Paul" has forced a rise in taxes in Waldwick, according to the borough council.

"I had a dream of presenting to the borough residents a zero percent tax increase for the last three years," stated Mayor Rick Vander Wende.

"And we had accomplished his until we received word that we would not receive funds from the state that are rightfully due us," Vander Wende added.

Vander Wende then read the council a strongly worded letter from Governor Christie Whitman, asking that the money, that she was withholding, be released to the municipalities in the state

that deserve them.

The funds being withheld are supplemental, franchise and gross receipts taxes that total \$257,680 that the borough was counting on in the budget.

With the knowledge that these funds will probably not be returned, the council was forced to raise the tax rate to .548 per \$100 of assessed value for property in the borough.

This means that the average taxpayer in the borough who has property valued at \$180,000 can expect a \$72 increase in their tax bill.

This increase comes in spite of the fact that the budget was reduced by \$30,000 from last year's budget.

The reason for the increase? According to Borough Administrator Gary Kratz, the

state legislature has to balance its budget.

"With the five percent tax reduction by the state, that revenue difference has to be made up somewhere," said Kratz.

Thus, that "somewhere" comes in funds that local municipalities had been counting on in their budgets.

Kratz stressed that the borough had been well within its means when working on this year's budget.

"We are below the 2.5 cap level by \$50,000, and we cut our spending from last year," Kratz stated.

The budget will be introduced to the public record on April 12 and a public hearing is scheduled for May 10.

The council also set a date for

a public meeting on the community center for April 26.

The meeting comes in the wake of a controversy that has developed over the need for a community center.

The community center pro-

ject deals with the rehabilitation of a two-story building located at Hopper and West Prospect streets. The structure would be converted into a multiple-purpose facility that could be used by any borough resident or group.

School budget increases

Board's line-by-line review holds gain to 3.2 percent

WALDWICK— The Waldwick Board of Education has seen the writing on the wall for public education and the message is regionalization.

At a special public meeting for the proposed school budget, Board of Education President Paul Cottrell presented the school budget as a "responsible" budget for the borough.

The total school budget for the borough for tax purposes

will be \$11,814,529. The grand total of the school budget with public aid comes to \$13,739,653.

According to the council's figures, the property tax would increase by eight points for the average Waldwick homeowner.

This increase on the average home of \$180,000 comes out to \$144 a year, or \$12 a month, according to figures released at a meeting on April 4.

The school tax rate for 1993 was \$1.68 per \$100 of assessed value in the borough. Under the

proposed budget, the tax per \$100 would go up to \$1.76.

The council president was most proud that the school board was able to increase the tentative budget by only \$86,227, or 3.2 percent higher than last year's budget.

This increase is lower than the New Jersey state mandate which caps school board budget increases at 4.88 percent.

Cottrell advised that the major reason for the lower increase was because the BOE was able to have better contract settlements, notably the teachers' contract that was settled this year.

The board cited major expenditure areas for the borough

would be in the gifted and talented programs, updating the school technology programs and the acquisition of new text books for the elementary level.

The BOE also has a leasing agreement for three trailers to be brought into the borough schools. The trailers, 54' by 17', are fully air conditioned and heated.

Two trailers will be used at the Crescent School and one at the Traphagen School for the purpose of more classroom space for the lower elementary grades.

Cottrell said that in order to

maintain the same level of education, new avenues would have to be explored. State funding of programs will no longer be there.

Cottrell stated that the Waldwick BOE was "actively looking" at other boards of education in the area with an

eye toward regionalizing certain programs with other school systems.

"We need to keep our options open if we hope to keep the education levels where they are at now," Cottrell said.

Cottrell looks to pass a resolution at the next meeting which would authorize inquiry with area schools to see if they are interested in regionalization programs at the high school level.

Two schools that would be contacted are Midland Park and Northern Highlands, he stated.

Cottrell hoped that the budget would be passed by borough residents.

"We went line-by-line to see if we could cut any expenses," he commented. "This is a responsible budget that we have put forth."

The school budget vote will take place April 19.

Residents say they smell a rat

WALDWICK — During the public hearing of the council meeting Tuesday night, Glen Veltman of 81 Hudson Street complained about rats on his street.

He told the council members that there is a garbage problem by the catch drains, and the rats come out during the daylight hours as well as at night. He said they nest in the piles of debris by the catch drains, the wood piles, and the old sheds and shacks. He stated that it has gotten so bad that his children can't even play in the backyard for fear they may encounter one of the big rodents.

He was joined by another Hudson Street resident, Neil McClelland. The two men went

on to explain that an exterminator was hired and that one of the rodents was caught in a trap.

The trap is an industrial-strength trap and even though it slammed shut on the rat, the rodent still managed to escape and walk around the yard for about ten minutes before dying, Veltman said. He provided photos of the rat and the area, along with two drawings of his four-year-old child. The drawings depicted a family outing in the backyard complete with a rodent intruder. The board agreed to address the problem soon as possible.

In other business, several ordinances were voted on and passed.

One would require a person applying for representation by

a public defender to pay an application fee of \$50.

Another set new seasonal fees for use of the public pool facility. Residents between the ages of 18 and 62 will pay \$27.50; age 62 and over \$18.50; and children 4-18 \$22.50. Children under 4 are permitted to use the pool free of charge.

Guests will pay \$5 per day per guest for age 18 and older; those under 18 will pay \$3. All guests must be accompanied by a resident.

Other ordinances regarded the set up and installation guidelines for satellite dish cables and antennas, public improvements and the purchase of new automotive vehicles, equipment, and machinery.

ORDINANCE NO. 10-94

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 48 OF THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF WALDWICK ENTITLED "FEES" INCREASING THE FEES FOR VARIOUS PERMITS ISSUED BY THE CONSTRUCTION DEPARTMENT. BE IT ORDAINED BY the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Waldwick that Chapter 48:39-2 is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 48:39-2 is hereby amended to read as follows:

A. The fee for a construction permit shall be the sum of the subcode fees listed in Subsection A (1) through (12) hereof and shall be paid before the permit is issued.

The building subcode fee shall be:

(a) For new construction: three cents (\$0.03) per cubic foot of building or structure volume for all use groups as defined in the Uniform Construction Code of the State of New Jersey.

(b) For renovation, alteration and repairs: thirteen dollars (\$13.00) per one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) of the estimated cost of the work.

(c) For additions: two and one half cents (\$0.025) per cubic foot of building or structure volume for the added portion.

(d) The minimum fee to be charged on the building subcode application shall be forty dollars (\$40.).

(2) The plumbing subcode fee shall be:

(e) Fill/abandoned tanks in place, 1,000 gallons or less: forty dollars (\$40.).

(f) The fees for Fire Subcode permits shall be as follows:

from 1 to 20 smoke/heat detectors/sprinkler heads

from 21 to 100 smoke/heat detectors/sprinkler heads

from 101 to 200 smoke/heat detectors/sprinkler heads

from 201 to 400 smoke/heat detectors/sprinkler heads

401 and over of smoke/heat/fire heads

(g) Installation of commercial kitchen exhaust system: fifty dollars (\$50.).

(h) Standpipes: two hundred dollars (\$200.).

(i) Suppression Systems: eighty five dollars (\$85.).

(j) The minimum fee for fire subcode shall be forty dollars (\$40.).

(5) This section remains unchanged.

(6) The fee for a permit for the demolition of a building or structure shall be fifty dollars (\$50.) for accessory buildings under four hundred (400) square feet; two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.) for one or two family dwellings or farm buildings; and five hundred dollars (\$500.) for all others.

(7) The fee for a permit for the removal of a building or structure from one lot to another or to a new location on the same lot shall be fifteen dollars (\$15.) per one thousand dollars (\$1,000.) of the sum of the estimated costs for moving, for new foundations and for placement in a completed condition in the new location, provided that the minimum fee shall be fifty dollars (\$50.).

(8) The fee for a permit to construct a sign shall be a flat fee of twenty five dollars (\$25.) plus one dollar (\$1.) per square foot of the surface area of the sign. In the case of double-faced signs, the area of the surface of only one (1) side of the sign shall be used for purposes of the fee computation.

(9) This section remains unchanged.

(10) The fee for construction or installation of a swimming pool on a one or two family residential lot shall be fifty dollars (\$50.) for an aboveground pool; or one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.) for an inground pool. The fee for construction or installation of all other swimming pools shall be one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.).

(11) Certificates of occupancy.

(a) The fee for a certificate of continued occupancy shall be thirty-five dollars (\$35.) for one and two family residential structures and seventy five dollars (\$75.) for all other structures.

(b) A temporary certificate of occupancy may be issued for a period of three (3) months and extended for an additional three (3) months upon payment of a new certificate of occupancy fee.

(c) The fee for a certificate of occupancy granted pursuant to a change of use shall be seventy-five dollars (\$75.).

(d) The fee for a multiple certificate of occupancy shall be fifty dollars (\$50.); in addition, each tenant shall be required to apply for a certificate of continued use.

(e) The fee for a certificate of occupancy for new construction shall be fifty dollars (\$50.) for one or two family and multi family residential structures and one hundred dollars (\$100.) for all other structures.

Said surcharge fee shall be remitted to the Bureau of Housing Inspection, Department of Community Affairs, on a quarterly

basis for the fiscal quarters ending September 30, December 31, March 31 and June 30, and not later than one (1) month next succeeding the end of the quarter for which it is due.

(2) The enforcing agency shall report to the Bureau of Housing Inspection, annually, at the end of each fiscal year and not later than July 31, the total amount of the surcharge fee collected in the fiscal year.

The day after the meeting, Preiss contacted the Veltmans and told them he and the zoning officer would be around to view the situation and pass out information and that they would also be doing a property-by-property investigation.

In a crawlspace under the Veltman's kitchen, the cement floor is dotted with large rat traps. The rats access through the sides of the house and the crawlspace door. Veltman tried a screen door behind the crawlspace door but the rats just found another entrance. It was here that he caught "the big rat." This particular rodent was caught in an industrial strength trap and managed to pull itself from under the heavy springbar and proceed to walk

toward the entrance hole it came in through. Where the rat died is now marked by a tiny dried pool of blood, around which portions of the broken trap were scattered.

Along the fences of the well-manicured yards are bait traps set near burrows. Each trap contains poison. The idea is that the rat will go in, eat the poison, and then return to the nest to poison and kill the other rats.

"Rats all around. They're digging holes all over my property, leaving their droppings along my house. So I trap them," said John Millano of 92 Hudson Ave.

The rats have eaten through the bases of stockade fences, cement foundations and, in one case, the lower right corner of a metal shed.

Said Preiss, "We surveyed the properties, issued violations to those whose yards were scattered with debris, and

passed out pamphlets on how to prevent a rat problem. If you have wood piles, you should elevate them because rats and mice like to crawl underneath to sleep and hide. If you have a shed, place it on a cement foundation, not on grass or wood. Also store garbage in bins and remember to make sure all doors are tightly sealed.

"People have to understand that, unfortunately, rodents are a part of suburban life," he added. He said the board of health cannot exterminate and that if extermination is needed, individual homeowners will have to hire an exterminator themselves.

"I think it would be a good idea if they get one exterminator who would then be familiar with the problem," said Preiss. He urged anyone who sees a rat to call the Northwest Bergen Regional Health Commission at 445-7217.

Residents claim rats run rampant in area

WALDWICK — For the residents on Hudson Street, suburbia means rats, not green grass and safe neighborhoods.

Glen and Cathy Veltman are one of the couples on the street who complained to the council. The Veltmans began noticing the problem in August of 1993 and they sent a letter to the council in November. The board reviewed the problem and the Veltmans say the council agreed to take care of it and also take care of a water problem on the street. They claim the results of their first efforts were not successful.

Veltman had contacted Health Officer Rod Preiss and the two met to discuss the problem. "Preiss made some suggestions and his statement was pretty much 'Well, stay in touch,'" Veltman said he felt Preiss should have stayed in touch with them as to what was being done.

When winter arrived, the rats disappeared and sightings were less frequent. With the return of spring, they were back.

Immediately Cathy Veltman called the town and claims she got no response. Veltman organized several neighbors and returned before the council this week. He presented the letter he had given them at the November meeting and wrote another letter petitioning the council for immediate help.

The Veltmans at one time would put a little play pool on their deck so their children could play in the summer. But since the rat problem, they are unable to do so. "If you put water in the pool, and then you dump it under the deck, that attracts them," explained Veltman. Said Mrs. Veltman, "They're burrowing under the decks in the neighborhood."

Waldwick's Branagh is in control

POMPTON LAKES — It was only the second inning in a battle of unbeaten baseball teams Monday when Waldwick pitcher Mike Branagh snuck a pitch over the outside corner for a called third strike with a Pompton Lakes runner on third.

The batter returned to the Cardinals' bench looking quizzical. "It wasn't a curve," he said to no one in particular. "What was that?"

After a tight game disintegrated into a 10-0 Waldwick blowout, Branagh had the answer. "It was a forkball," the junior right-hander said. "I really had good control today."

Branagh threw 104 pitches (62 strikes), got the first pitch over the plate against 19 of 28 batters, kept the Cardinals' most dangerous hitters off balance, and struck out six, while surrendering four hits. The two walks he issued came in the second inning, but the rally ended on a half-swing strikeout.

Branagh said he is known as "Moon" because he once wore uniform No. 1 — Warren Moon's number while with the Houston Oilers — and because his uncle, also a Mike Branagh, bears the same nickname. Reaching this Moon for a hit was like reaching for the moon.

The hits against him were all singles: one chopped in the infield and beaten out by Matt Finnigan in the third, liners by Mike Klepacky in the fifth and Jason Mulvihill in the sixth, and a soft liner off an infield glove by Klepacky in the seventh.

"Pompton's got a great hitting team, but Mike's got control of three good pitches, and he puts the ball where he wants it," said Waldwick coach Steve Konde. "He's 2-0 and he's got two saves, too." Branagh was so in control, it seemed fitting when he pulled on an Atlanta Braves jacket between innings and after the game.

Branagh and the Cardinals' Jade Kendall pitched similar games for five innings — Kendall threw 68 pitches and allowed two hits in that stretch to 72 pitches and two hits allowed by Branagh. But the Warriors (8-0) led, 2-0, on a two-run, 310-foot home run by freshman shortstop R.J. Giordano, who also had a double.

"R.J.'s first start was against Fair Lawn, and he went 3-for-4," Konde said. "He's very smooth and extremely confident."

In the sixth, a hit batsman, two walks, and two-run doubles by Doug Sneyers and Dave Bernal widened the gap.

"We were tested today, and we just didn't hit," Pompton coach Dennis Arnold said afterward. "Their kid threw a great game."

Questions need for community center

To the editor: 4-20-94
Waldwick homeowners will face an additional tax burden if the mayor and council approve their plan to convert the old Department of Public Works building into a community center. They have already spent \$80,000 on this "white elephant." But that is only the beginning. The original estimate for this "conversion" was

\$200,000, then the figure jumped to \$300,000, and the latest word from the architect is that \$530,000 is only a "starting point" in estimating its total cost. Present plans are for the borough to borrow approximately \$450,000 to finance this unneeded project. The public has been told neither the final cost of the building conversion nor the permanent costs related to its operation if it is completed. Expenses such as interior furnishings, land-

scaping, maintenance and staffing have all been excluded from the ball-park estimates given thus far. But the expense seems to be unimportant. Mayor Rich Vander Wende has stated that he is determined to have the community center regardless of the cost. Is he prepared to cut back services in order to provide the funds to keep this "white elephant conversion" alive, or will the burden be added to a tax bill that is already too high?

Waldwick already has public facilities that accommodate our senior citizens, our children, and our various community organizations. We do not need a new center that duplicates facilities that already exist. This "white elephant" should be allowed to die, no matter which local politician has chosen to make its salvation his personal goal.

It appears that Waldwick's total tax package increase for

1994 (school, county and municipal) will be 13 points. A home assessed at the town average of \$180,000 will have to pay an additional \$234, not including the effect of the proposed community center. This average \$180,000 home will be paying an astonishing \$4,698 in 1994 total real estate taxes. Clearly, the mayor and council should be more concerned with reducing our tax burden than with adding to it by committing to frivolous construction projects for which no need has been established.

Because of public criticism of the community center project, the council has scheduled a hearing on the subject at the Municipal Building on April 26 at 8 p.m. Although it was pointed out to them that this date falls within the school district's spring recess period, when many families will be out of town, the council refused to consider rescheduling the hearing date. Whatever your opinion is on this project, let your voice be heard on April 26. You should have a say in how the politicians intend to spend your money. Get involved now. When your tax bill arrives, it will be too late to complain.

Center is focus of debate

Councilman, resident wrangle over scheduling of a public hearing

WALDWICK—An exchange between a borough council member and the president of a taxpayers group highlighted the recent round of discussion involving the community center that has been proposed by the council.

The exchange, which occurred at a public meeting on April 12, took place between borough resident Shirley Feldman, president of the

Bergen County Taxpayers Coalition, and Councilman Arthur Barthold. It is just the latest round in the controversy surrounding the proposed center.

The community center project deals with the rehabilitation of a two-story building located at Hopper and West Prospect streets. The structure would be converted into a multiple-purpose facility that could be used by any borough resident or group.

Feldman has spearheaded

the fight against the board, questioning whether there is a need for the center in the borough.

She forced the issue of a separate public meeting on the issue and the council finally relented at the March 22 meeting to set up a public hearing.

Mayor Rick Vander Wende and members of the borough council discussed a date for the meeting at their last executive session on April 5. Vander Wende first suggested that April 19 be the date for the public meeting of the proposed center.

That date was ruled out, however, when it was realized that the school budget election was

scheduled that day. The date of May 10 then was suggested to the council.

It also was ruled out by the council because this was the date that the borough budget would be open for public debate and vote.

Vander Wende and the council finally settled on April 26 so that the public meeting seemingly would not interfere with any other borough business.

Feldman felt the April 26 meeting date would hold down attendance on the public debate because the Waldwick schools have a two-day spring break scheduled.

The basis of her feeling is that some families may have made plans to be away on vacation for the full week. Spring break was originally scheduled for the week of April 25 until numerous snow days forced the Waldwick school system to cut the break short.

She asked the council to push the meeting back so there would be a better public turnout.

Barthold answered the request by saying that the council would consider pushing the meeting back at its next work session.

Council President Denise Anderson then stated "the fact is that there is only a two-day break and I believe that many residents have not made plans to go away and will be in town."

Feldman then asked if her request would be honored.

"You are telling us what to do! We will discuss moving the (community center) meeting at the next work session," said Barthold.

Feldman, startled by the councilman's statement, disagreed with Barthold, saying that she was not telling them what to do but rather she was just acting as a taxpayer. She asked him why he was angry and why they could not push

back the meeting now.

"I'm not angry... You say that there is no rush for this meeting, yet you want a decision now because you do not like the date," stated Barthold.

Anderson then told Feldman that she felt that the public had been informed when the meeting was to take place and she felt confident the public would turn out for the meeting.

Feldman then stated, "So you've refused my request," and stormed away from the public microphone.

She later came back up to address the council when Anderson stated she feared that the public would not be informed if the public meeting date was changed. Feldman stated that her group would be handing out flyers around town and putting up posters that would inform the public about the meeting.

But Anderson told those attending that the April 26 date should still stand.

Council, health officer try to find rodent solutions

WALDWICK — At the council worksession on Tuesday, one of the major topics discussed was what is being done about the rodent problem that has residents of certain areas up in arms.

Council members asked Rod Preiss, the borough health officer for the past eight years, why the problem hadn't been taken care of prior to this when the first complaints were made by Glen and Cathy Veltman, who appeared at last week's public meeting with complaints about rats in their neighborhood on Hudson Street.

Preiss said when the first complaint was lodged he responded immediately, surveyed the situation and asked Mrs.

Veltman to call if there were any further sightings. When he didn't hear from them, he said he assumed it was corrected. Currently, he has inspected properties in the area and, along with the zoning officer, has issued violations to those whose yards contain debris.

The council had suggested that Preiss bait the area but he refused, explaining that "no health officer will put out bait because of the liability factor. If the rat doesn't want the bait, it may push it out of the hole and a dog or cat or even a child may pick it up and eat it."

He explained that there are three things rodents need — "harborage, food and water. If you take one of these away the rats will leave."

The suggestion of glue boards was made but due to the inhumane way the rodent is killed, Preiss was not in strong support of the method. With a glue board, the rodent gets stuck on the board. As it tries to escape, it literally dies from exhaustion.

When asked about using the "Have a Heart" live animal traps, Preiss asked the board what they would do with the live rats they catch. There is no humane answer, he said.

Mayor Vander Wende, along with the council, had requested that Preiss keep the council updated on the progress of the situation. The council asked that Preiss do follow-up inspections on those who were issued violations.

DeMenna, batting leadoff, has 6 home runs, 23 RBIs

Bergen-Passaic Scholastic League pitchers are already taking cover from the heavy barrage of hits coming off the bats of Waldwick this season.

There is one batter in particular they would like to avoid most of the times by pitching around him. They can't do that too often, however, for Mark DeMenna is hitting in the lead-off spot, and his six home runs and 23 runs-batted-in after nine games most likely is leading Bergen County in the production department.

DeMenna's coach, Steve Konde, has sound logic as to why he places his best hitter and slugger on top of a potent lineup, as he did last season.

"Mark is our premier hitter, and if there was one player I wanted to get the maximum number at-bats, it would be Mark. If he was hitting third or fourth, they would definitely pitch around him with men on base. If they try to pitch around him and walk him, he can steal second and probably third."

That's another element of DeMenna's game — speed. He has 15 stolen bases in 17 attempts.

Batting behind DeMenna to deliver him are Rich Parks, Mike Raia, Doug Sneyers and Jason Bain — good hitters in their own right.

"As long as Mark remains disciplined and waits for his pitch, people are going to have a very difficult time getting him out," Konde said. "He is patient enough to accept a base on balls. If Mark expands the strike zone, then he is getting himself out; the pitcher isn't. But what helps is that Mark has a very good eye for the strike zone."

DeMenna, who has walked nine times, has at least one hit in every game for the Warriors, who were 9-0 heading into Friday's game against Mahwah. He's batting .581 (18-for-31) overall with two doubles and one triple and, in the B-PSL, .600 (16-for-25). As a leadoff hitter should, he has a high on-base average (.698), reaching 30 times in 43 at-bats and scoring 24 runs.

The 5-foot-9, 170-pound DeMenna enjoys his spot at the top.

"I do actually like that first pitch of the game," the leftfielder said. "The pitcher is always looking to get ahead and groove a fastball, and I just look for that pitch. If it's there, I'll hit it."

During one stretch, DeMenna was on a tear, ripping 14 hits in 17 at-bats.

"Mark uses the entire field, and he puts the ball in play with

authority," said Konde of the left-handed batter. "He has no cheap home runs. All of his homers have been 350 feet or longer. Mark has just clobbered the ball."

The senior had a career game against Paterson Catholic. DeMenna slammed three home runs and drove in 11 runs in an 18-1 victory.

"The wind was blowing across the field from left to right and in," Konde said. "None of our players came close to reaching the fence, but Mark belted three pitches over it."

The game was reminiscent of the one DeMenna had last year against Eastern Christian. He batted 3-for-3 in the first inning alone with two home runs and a single.

At Glen Rock this year, DeMenna crushed a fastball that landed halfway down the lower field in right.

But he is especially proud of his runs scored.

"I'm getting a lot of them this year, because one of the big bats

after me will drive me in," he said. "We're pretty much solid in our lineup, one through five, but we're all hitting pretty well."

"Parks (the second batter) is a clutch hitter; he rises to the occasion," Konde said. "Raia is a self-disciplined hitter, and he knows the strike zone well. Sneyers is a tough competitor, and he can hit the ball with authority, and Bain has been hitting well also. With our lineup, you just can't keep pitching around someone."

DeMenna says playing in the semi-pro Met League with the Waldwick Senators last summer has helped his batting eye.

"Seeing the pitching there has helped me to pick up the ball really well this year," he said.

"Mark has to be one of the premier players in Bergen County," said Konde. "He does everything well. He's a prime-time player."

And number one when Waldwick dials up the hits.

Entering the sixth inning, Waldwick only led, 2-0, on a home run by freshman shortstop R.J. Giordano in the third. But Doug Sneyers' two-run double keyed a four-run sixth and Mark DeMenna's two-run single highlighted a five-run seventh.

Branagh's other victory came at Glen Rock. He left after six innings with the score 15-2, having thrown just 81 pitches.

Rodent problem returns

Hudson Street houses cited for garbage and debris violations

WALDWICK— The borough health officer was asked to appear before the borough council and he did something that he hasn't done the last three times his presence was requested. He showed up for the meeting.

Rod Preiss, health officer for the borough and the Northwest Bergen Regional Health Commission that serves eight communities in the area, came to answer questions that were

raised at the April 12 public meeting by borough resident Glen Veltman of Hudson Avenue regarding an ongoing rodent problem.

The council and Preiss discussed the history of the problem in that area at the borough's work session April 19.

Preiss said that the rodent problem had begun in the Hudson Street area just past Route 17 in the winter of 1992/spring of 1993 and had been

investigated then.

When he made his first inspection of the area, he had not seen a rodent. Preiss said that at that time he asked the Veltmans to keep in contact with him if there was a sign of rodents again.

He then stated that he did not know about the reoccurrence of the problem again until Friday, April 15. At that point, Preiss and Mike Leonard, zoning officer for the borough, went up and down the Hudson Street and cited houses in the area that had violations of garbage or debris that would encourage the rodent population.

Council members asked the health officer if traps or bait

could be put out by him to alleviate the problem and he stated to the council that "I don't put out bait."

He said that the health officer doesn't do this due to liability and insurance reasons. If residents wanted traps or bait put out, they would have to contact professional exterminators to do the job.

Preiss stressed that it is up to residents to keep the lines of communications open when problems like this arise.

"Residents must keep in contact with me so that we can help out," said Preiss.

He said that when he found out about the rodent problem, he was there at the house in five minutes.

The meeting then focused on the relationship between the borough council and Preiss. Councilman James Gibson said that Preiss had been asked to attend three other meetings to answer questions about the rat issue on Hudson Street and Preiss had not attended.

"Quite frankly, I am surprised that you showed up for this meeting," said Gibson.

Preiss explained that as health officer for eight other communities there had been scheduling conflicts, such as an appearance in court, that had forced him to miss the three previous meetings.

Gibson said that his main problem was that there were no follow-up reports on matters that Preiss investigated in the borough.

"We get nothing (follow-up reports). I am angry because we have been blown off since November on this issue," stated Gibson.

He then asked what the follow-up procedure would be in investigating this issue.

Preiss said that after the summons had been issued, he would go back to the violators in five days to see if the violation had been cleaned up.

Councilman Arthur Barthold also asked that reports submitted to the council be more detailed.

"All we see is a monthly violation list. I have not seen reports on follow-up inspections or procedure reports so that I can back up my information to the public," said Barthold.

Mayor Rick Vander Wende also asked that Preiss take the initiative to make inspections before the public has to call back with a problem.

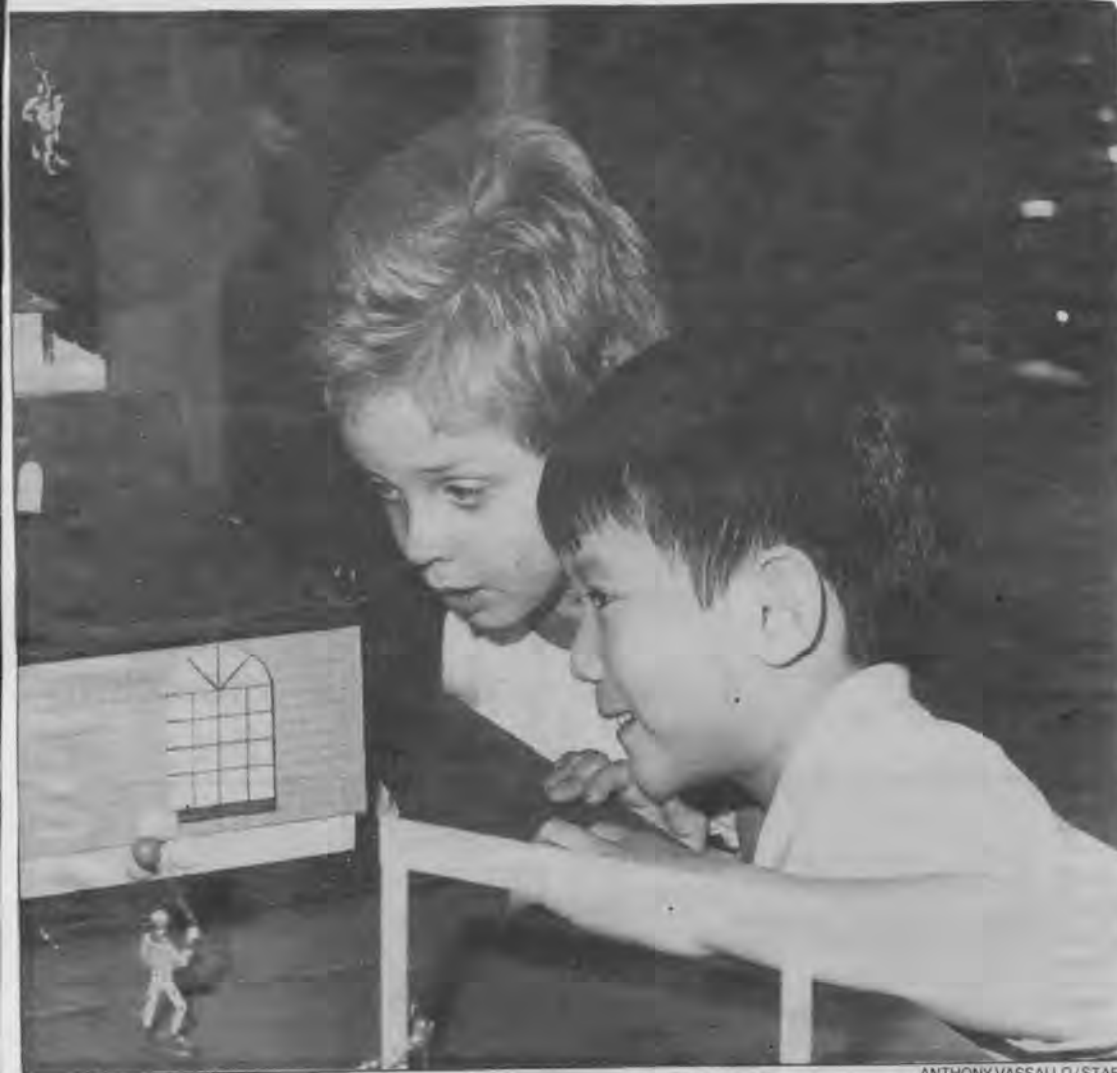

- The state Department of Education should have a standardized contract for all teachers in the state and simply mandate the amount of money to be granted as pay raises.
- School budgets should not be voted on by the general public. Board of Education members are elected and should be completely in charge and oversee implementation of a budget that is within the boundaries specified by the state department.

On June 19, 1981, in response to prison overcrowding that he said had created a "state of emergency," Gov. Brendan Byrne issued an executive order that mandated the housing of state prisoners in county jails. The governor declared his order to be a "temporary measure," to remain in effect for 90 days. This "temporary measure" has routinely been renewed by our various governors for 13 years, causing even greater overcrowding at the county facilities. Figures from 1990 indicate that while the county jails were operating at an average of 167 percent of capacity, the state's prisons operated at a projected 1991 average of 108.6 percent of capacity.

In April 1993, the New Jersey Supreme Court rescinded the mandate for county jails to house state prisoners. In their decision, the judges wrote: "As the parade of annual executive orders passes before us, it is our function to state that 'the emperor has no clothes'; there is no emergency. There is rather an ongoing condition that must be recognized by the state." In an attempt to circumvent the Supreme Court decision, our legislators approved bills that permit the state to continue dumping state felons in the county jails.

Per-diem reimbursement for state prisoners housed in county jails does not begin until the 15th day of incarceration. In addition, the daily state stipend of \$58.50 per prisoner does not fully reimburse the counties for all related expenses.

The ambitious expansion plan for the Bergen County Jail will double its present size, increasing its capacity from 855 beds to 1,700 beds. The jail's increased size will provide an incentive for the state Department of Corrections to continue to use it as a dumping site for convicted state felons.

Our legislators in Trenton are not elected to craftily pass on problems; they are elected to solve them. The emperor, it seems, not only lacks clothing — he lacks courage.

Residents thumbs down on center

WALDWICK — More than 100 residents showed up at the council meeting on Tuesday to hear discussion on the controversial proposed community center and most of them were adamantly opposed.

"I would like to point out that I believe in this project and that I feel it will upgrade the community," said Mayor Rick Vander Wende.

At this point one Waldwick resident shouted, "If you want to fix the community, why don't you fix the roads!"

Tom Price of Waldwick Avenue said, "Mr. Mayor I've listened to your speech about how great this will look and so on but I never heard you once mention the word need. There is a need for classrooms, a need for road repairs, there is even a need for taxes, but is there really a need for a community center?"

Resident Dan Sweeney of the same street said, "Not to get sidetracked, but I have a rat problem. Do we need to get a pied piper? The rats aren't waiting to be seen. I've been living here for four years and in that time my taxes have gone up \$1000 and I haven't seen anything for it. Before we need a community center, let's clean up the town."

President of the Taxpayers Association Shirley Feldman said the council has already dumped \$80,000 into the proposed site for a new roof. "This project is unnecessary and unaffordable. The mayor and council should worry about getting rid of our tax problem rather than add to it."

Cries from the crowd ranged from "We don't want it" to "Put it up for a vote."

Attorney Menelaos Toskos, who vol-

unteers his services to the council, said, "I can't convey how upset I am tonight. The generation I have admired comes down here and screams and yells at people for expressing their own ideas."

One town member pointed out that when Mayor Vander Wende took office he suggested in his inaugural speech, "Instead of taxpayer power, how about people power. The money is better spent in the people's pocket than at city hall."

Those in favor of the center claimed the center will prevent the kids from going to parties and drinking and doing drugs. This idea was dismissed by several parents who said it's not the responsibility of the taxpayers but rather the responsibility of the families.

Paul Cottrell, president of the school board, said, "We have not been asked to use our school facilities. We will work in any manner to provide a facility to use as a community center. If there's a better way to use what

we already have, then let's do it."

Cliff Kososowski of 42 Wyckoff Ave, said, "Let's rebuild Waldwick first rather than continue to build it up. I can't afford it and I don't think anyone else can."

"There'll be another meeting

considering putting the issue to a referendum or dropping the idea completely and moving on to an alternate plan," said the mayor afterwards. "I was surprised there wasn't more support. As mayor and council, we want to do what the people want."

Irate Waldwick residents 4-28-94 oppose community center

WALDWICK — Fed up with the prospect of higher property taxes, about 200 residents packed a hearing of the Borough Council on Tuesday to denounce a proposal to convert an old Department of Public Works building into a \$450,000 community center.

"Every nickel and dime you take out of our pockets hurts," Dan Sweeney said to the all-Republican council. "We just can't afford it anymore."

Conversion of the two-story, 5,700-square-foot concrete structure into a meeting place for local civic, youth, and seniors groups would require passage of a 12-year bond at 5.5 percent interest, said Mayor Rick Vander Wende. That translates into a tax increase of \$15.75 a year, he said.

After listening to the residents, Vander Wende said that the council will be discussing the project in coming weeks and will consider placing the issue on the ballot for 1995.

The DPW building at Hopper Avenue and West Prospect Street is adjacent to the town's municipal and recreation area. Vander Wende said the community center would complement those existing facilities, and rid the town of an eyesore. He said it also would provide a haven for local youths not

involved in other recreational programs.

He said plans for a community center have been discussed by the Borough Council since 1976, leading to the formation of an ad hoc committee in January 1991 and the hiring of an architectural firm in June 1993, Wells Associates, for \$22,000 to design the project.

In March 1992, the borough spent \$55,000 to install a new roof and second-floor extension on the DPW building to retard its deterioration.

"I believe this program will be a positive addition for residents by upgrading property values, for kids, and the community at large," Vander Wende said to catcalls from the audience and shouts of "You pay for it."

However, residents at the hearing said they'd much rather have their streets repaired and a spring rat problem eliminated before launching into any new costly projects.

School Board President Paul Cottrell warned the council that

the borough will already be coping with higher school taxes due to state cutbacks and spending for new classrooms. He volunteered school facilities for community use.

"This project is unnecessary and unaffordable," said Shirley Feldman, president of Concerned Taxpayers of Waldwick, whose 20 members picketed across from Borough Hall last weekend.

Feldman said her group polled the town's 33 community organizations and found that most needed storage space rather than a meeting place.

Former Mayor Lawrence E. Williams suggested that the DPW building be used as a home for the town's Police Department, currently located in a back office of the Municipal Building.

Only Elaine Krulish, director of Waldwick Youth Nights, a youth program for ninth- and 10th-graders, said she favored the project as a way of providing an alternative to young people who may be susceptible to substance abuse.

TIRES, WOOD WASTE AND CAR/TRUCK BATTERIES - On May 7th the Borough will hold a one day collection of tires, wood waste, and car/truck batteries at the recycling center located behind the DPW garage on Industrial Park (off Hopper Ave.) from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Tires with or without rims from autos, vans, and pick-up trucks will be accepted. No truck tires will be accepted. All types of wood, painted or stained, except pressure treated or wolmanized lumber will be accepted. Screens and glass must be removed from any wood being recycled. No household batteries will be accepted. No stumps, large limbs and logs will be accepted, split wood in small pieces will be accepted. Residents only, no commercial businesses.

The Waldwick Fire Department requests all residents to thoroughly check out their propane grills for leaks and any insects that might have found a home in the lines. Check your tank for rust and damage before using. There have been some fires that have led to damage to homes. A few minutes spent checking out your grill could save you from a visit by your local fire department.

If you have any questions regarding your propane tanks, contact the Police Department at 652-5700 and they will contact a Fire Officer for you.

TENANT REGISTRATION - The Borough Council has recently passed an ordinance requiring landlords to register residential homes/apartments. Applications must be filed with the Borough Clerk's office.

GARAGE SALES - Permits are now required for the holding of yard/garage sales. The permit is \$5 and can be obtained at the Borough Clerk's office in the Municipal Building.

CONSTRUCTION DEPARTMENT - Permits for hot water heaters are required by the local construction department even if the homeowner does the installation. The construction department inspects the pressure relief valve as well as the vent to your chimney. Both of these items, if installed incorrectly may cause injury and health problems.
