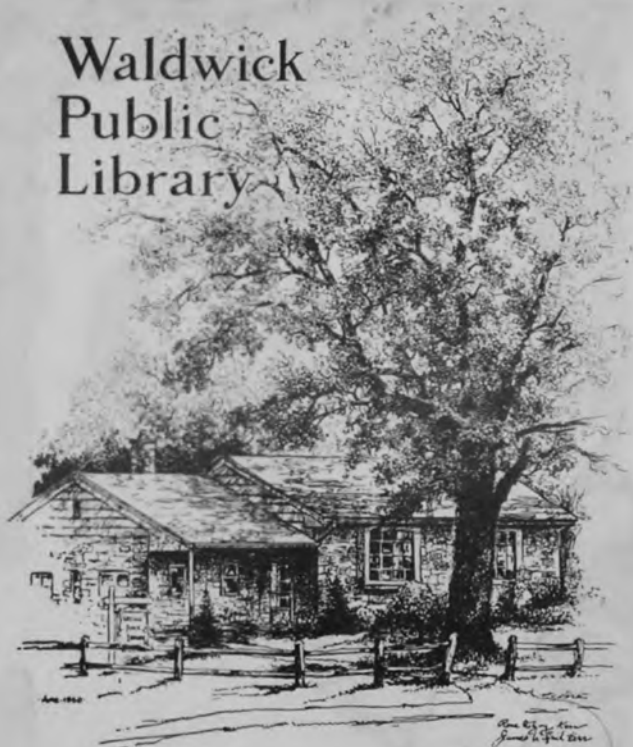

Kudos to local high schools

This month's New Jersey magazine's cover story is a blue ribbon panel's choices of 45 outstanding high schools in the state.

Bergen County can be proud that it is represented by the following high schools: Northern Highlands in Allendale; Ridgewood; Glen Rock; Waldwick; Fair Lawn; Northern Valley Regional in Demarest; Dumont; and Tenafly.

The judges chose schools that are successful coping with their own special circumstances and gearing their curriculum to the needs of their individual students.

Fair Lawn's students are actively involved in their community. Glen Rock prides itself on education that is personalized, humanistic and student-centered. Northern Highlands always ranks high with its 10-1 pupil/teacher ratio

and its consistently successful students. Ridgewood, with 84 percent of its graduates going on to four-year colleges, features interrelated courses studied together. Tenafly's seniors had a combined average SAT score of 1077 and 90 percent went on to four-year colleges. Waldwick's small student body has taken top prizes in the Academic Decathlon in recent years and in 1994, its team performed well in the national Quiz Bowl against much bigger schools. Runners-up Dumont and Northern Valley Regional cited many scholarship and technology successes.

The schools that make up the list of winners represented both inner-city schools and affluent suburban schools. The judges looked at how the schools coped with their special circumstances, which, obviously, vary from town to town.

A Jersey City school system may find a successful formula for coping with the drop-out rate while a suburban system may have to add an extra physics course to provide what students need.

No matter where the town is, it is impossible to have an outstanding school system without the full cooperation of faculty, administration, board, student body and parents. And that's not all.

The entire town must get involved. From business owners to senior citizens to those without children, everyone must take an interest in how well the next generation is educated.

So we congratulate those schools who have been chosen as outstanding examples in the state of New Jersey. It's important that we support such excellence. Our future depends on it.

The Waldwick Council recently held a public hearing to discuss traffic concerns with a group of residents from newly repaved streets intersecting Franklin Turnpike and Route 17.

Very constructive conversations occurred among New Jersey Department of Transportation officials who surveyed the area at the borough's request, residents, and the mayor and council. One of the most distressing comments was that during a recent three-hour posting, the Waldwick police stopped 28 cars in the target area for speeding and traffic violations. Twenty-four of those violators were Waldwick residents.

While improved signage and enforcement are important and will be vigorously pursued, drivers must take personal responsibility for reckless behavior on residential streets. For the safety of our neighbors, particularly the children and seniors who are most vulnerable, I urge all Waldwick residents and visitors to use caution and drive with care, observing all local speed limits and traffic laws. Let's spread the word that Waldwick is serious about traffic safety because we care for each other.

Lessons from an ancient tale

"If only the people could sit down in the same room, and tell these stories to each other the way they told me, there wouldn't have been the kind of problems there were," Record columnist Mike Kelly says in an article about his book, "Color Lines." Maybe he's right. Maybe the problem is that we don't tell these stories to each other any more. But English-speaking people did for hundreds of years.

The story is "Beowulf." It begins:

Listen! We have heard of the glory of the Spear-Danes in the old days, the kings of tribes — how noble princes showed great courage!

The plot is a fantasy; Beowulf fights with monsters. But the story also records blood feuds among Northern European tribes who are so alike it is hard to tell them apart. And these blood feuds are rooted in history. For example, the writers report the killing of On-gentheow. Today On-gentheow's grave stones may be seen in Sweden. The story includes after-the-battle scenes when fighters on both sides would see their fallen comrades being eaten by wolves and ravens.

"Beowulf" ends with a grief-song about his death:

Over and over she said that she feared the attacks of the raiders, many slaughters, the terror of troops, shame and captivity. Heaven swallowed the smoke.

Why should we read "Beowulf"? How can a poem by dead white European males which includes fire-breathing dragons and is written in English so old we have to read it in translation possibly speak to us today?

Both "Beowulf" and "Color Lines" are about leadership and loyalty and dealing with one another. If we read about it now we may not have to live through it again. But if we do not read about it we certainly will have to live through it. And the best we can hope for is that heaven will swallow up the smoke.

Got a minute? Probably not.

And that's the fuel that's firing a growing industry that provides good home-cooked meals when you're unable to cook them.

"Nationwide, there's a dinner problem," says David MacKay, founder of the three-year-old U.S. Personal Chefs Association, based in Corrales, N.M. "Baby boomers who were content to live on fast food now realize that they are at an age where they can't continue to eat like that."

"They want healthier food, healthier than they can pick up at most places, and they want variety. We satisfy the growing need for professional services at home without having to incur the expense of employing someone to cook for you."

Catharine Lenz is at home in the kitchen no matter whose home the kitchen is in.

As a personal chef, she works for many clients as part of her Waldwick business called Custom Cuisine, which specializes in cooking for people who don't have time or energy to cook for themselves.

"I do everything," said Lenz, "the cooking, the planning, the shopping — I bring my own pots and pans, I clean up, I even take away the garbage."

She'll also count the calories, since her perspective on food is healthful — less meat, less butter, no heavy sauces. She shows up biweekly or monthly and cooks up a storm, leaving as many as 10 days' worth of dinners (20 entrees) in the refrigerator. The \$300 cost includes groceries.

There is a basic menu plan that can be adjusted and customized for her clients. It's not gourmet, she says, but it's not hamburgers, either. Examples of her fare: halibut Francisco, glazed chicken with apples, Mandarin meatballs with hot sauce.

Warriors offense descends

With the graduation of standout quarterback Michael Branagh, the one certainty for Waldwick this season is that last year's passing offense will come back down to earth in 1995.

"We must have thrown close to 90 percent of the time last year, but that was because of Michael," says Waldwick coach Neil Johnson. "This year, percentage-wise, we'll be running a lot more, but I still would like to utilize the shotgun on occasion if we can."

That will depend, however, on finding a replacement for Branagh, a solid, three-year starter for the Warriors. There are two candidates for the position but both are unproven on the varsity level.

Tom Willoughby, a 6-foot-3, 185-pound senior, played the position as a freshman but didn't play at all the last two years. Marlin Falco, a 6-1, 185-pound senior, has varsity experience but not at quarterback.

The rest of the backfield is more stable with Matt Servilio at tailback. Falco also has experience at that spot, while juniors Jeff DeManna, Tony Stanziano, and Sean Wilson provide depth.

When the Warriors opt to pass from the Power-I formation, favorite targets likely will include wide receivers Chris Heid and David Bernal or tight ends Steve Haupt and Frank Accipinti.

"We certainly have people to throw to, especially Chris, who is coming off a very good year including a game-winning, diving catch in the season finale against Midland Park," says Johnson. "And we should be able

to pass block. The whole key will be how well we can run block where the kids have to fire out rather than sit and wait."

The offensive line returns almost intact, led by Kevin Luccarelli at center. Matt Marquis, the team's biggest player at 6-2, 230, returns at tackle, and Eric Anderson is back at guard.

"Offensively we have a lot of work to do," says Johnson. "Last year because of the experience, all we had to do was put the formations together, go to the shotgun, and just give Michael the time to throw."

"Defensively, my main concern

is stamina, since we will be using pretty much the same players we do offensively, especially along the defensive line.

Luccarelli, Marquis, and Anderson will anchor the five-man front, along with Haupt and Accipinti. Joe Calafiore and Chris Cavaliere add depth.

Silvileo and Falco will lead the linebacking unit, along with Mike Echevarria, a junior who started the last two games of the 1994 season. Heid and Bernal return with experience in the secondary and could be joined by Willoughby at safety, where he can best use his size and range.

Senior James Patunas should contribute either at linebacker or in the secondary.

On special teams, placekicker Don Donarski is off to college at RPI, but he helped Heid perfect the position in the off-season. The punting job, previously held by Branagh, is up for grabs. Luccarelli will handle kickoffs only. Punt and kickoff returns likely will fall into the hands of Heid, Patunas, Silvileo, and Stanziano.

The overall turnout has been one of the best in years at Waldwick, including a solid freshman group.

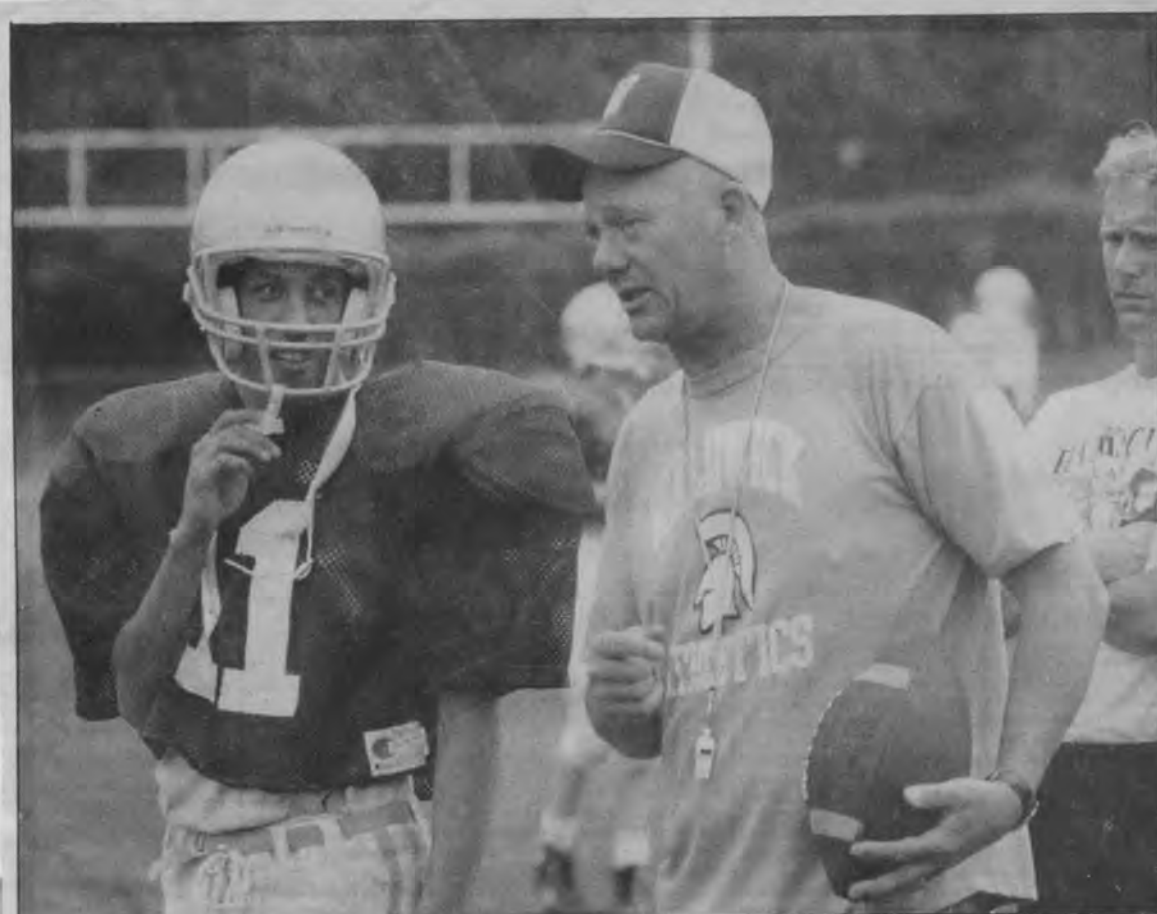

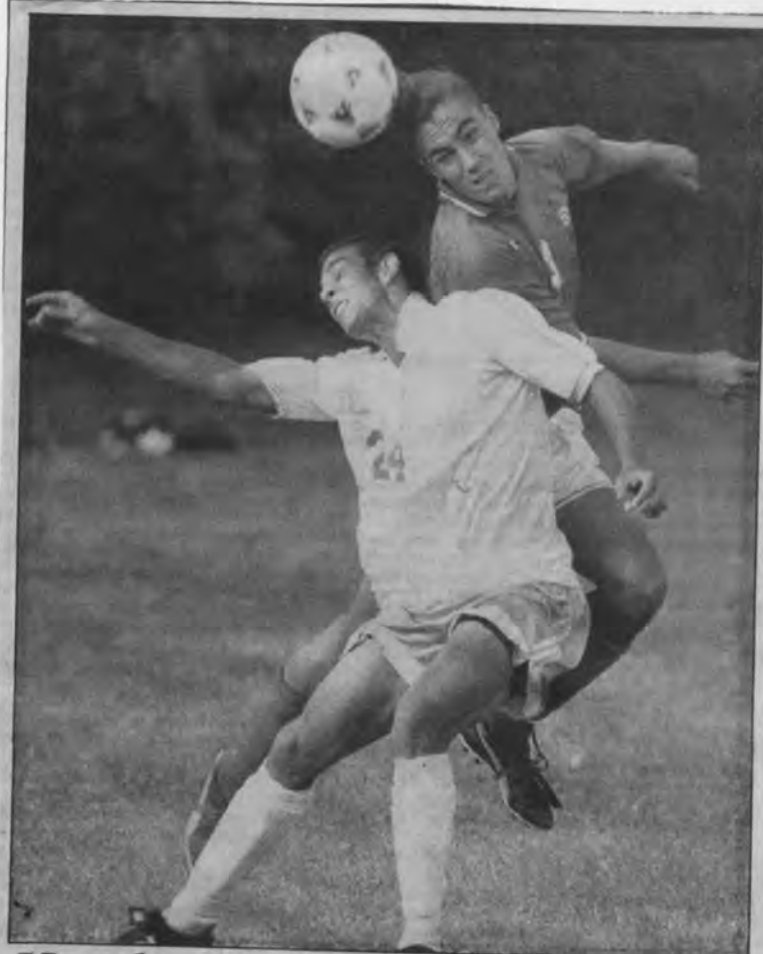

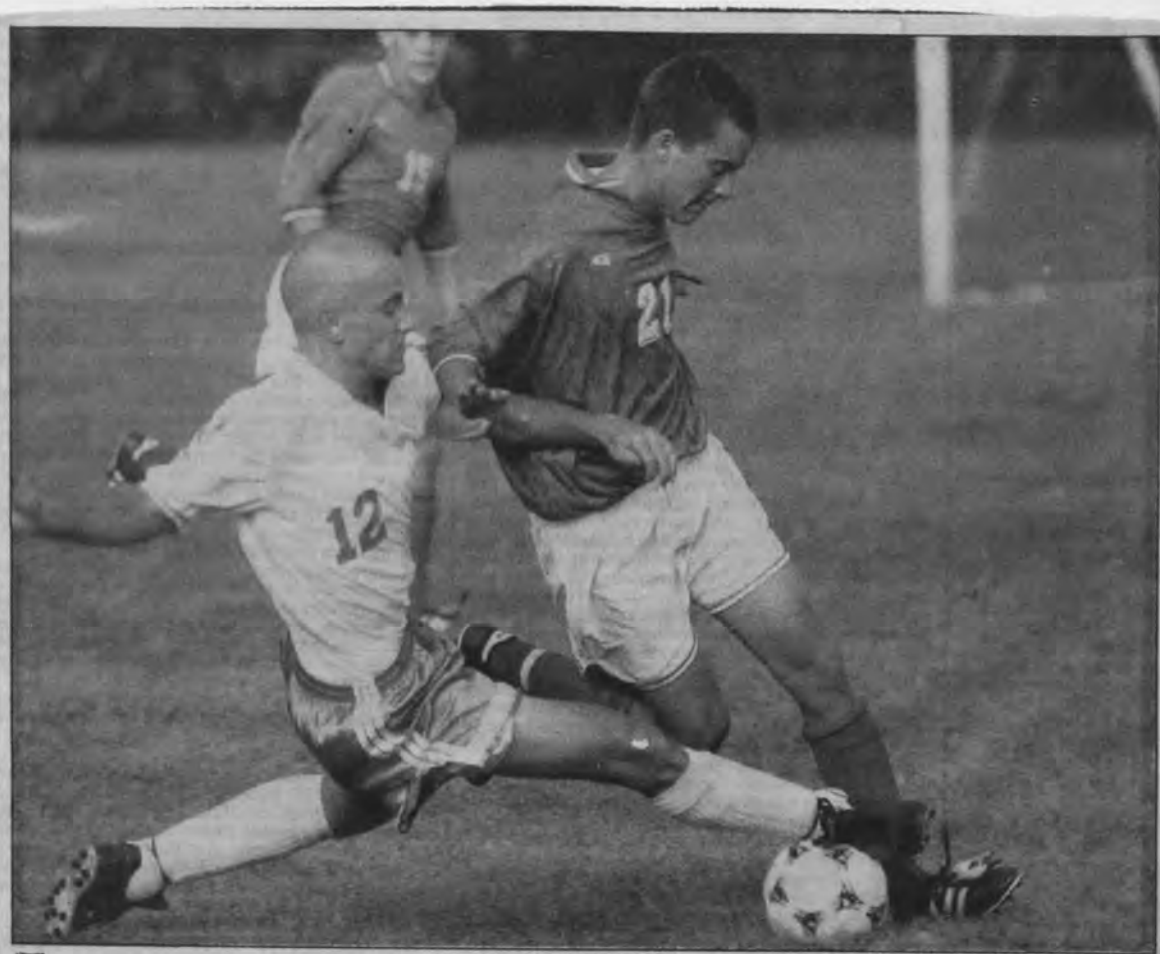

From the air to the ground, Warriors land

WALDWICK — The runway is now open in Waldwick this football season, and the Warriors are cleared for landing.

Gone is the potent, active arm of Air Marshal Mike Branagh and his 1,758 yards passing on 204 completions (18 for touchdowns) along with his hard-nosed, crafty receiving corps of Mike Fox, Adam Wolfson and Richie Parks.

Neil Johnson, after a 4-5 campaign in 1994 in his first season as head coach, has been forced to land himself in his offensive approach to the 1995 season. It's not exactly a crash landing, but ground chuck will be the main course on Warriors' plate this campaign.

"We're taking a 360-degree turn with our offense this year," he said. "We won't even resemble our offense of last season, since we have two inexperienced quarterbacks. We will have to grind it out. Maybe 12 yards is going to be a big gain for us this year. We have to keep forcing the issue that there aren't going to be any long-breaking touchdowns."

"Last year, 95 percent of our game on the line was pass blocking," Johnson noted. "This year, it will be more drive blocking for the running game, and it's much more difficult to teach the techniques of that compared to pass blocking. It's more tiresome on the kids, and that's why we must be in shape!"

Johnson has a decent turnout of 49 players — 12 seniors, nine juniors, 10 sophomores and 18

freshmen — from the 66 that signed up in June.

"We do have a decent line; if anything, that will be our strength this year," the coach noted. "Our running backs are decent, but they're small."

Johnson will go with a two-platoon ground attack in his power I formation.

The first unit is comprised of junior Matt Servilio (5-9, 150) at tailback, senior Marlon Falco (6-1, 190) at fullback and seniors Kevin Luccarelli (5-8, 160) or Jim Patunas as the power back.

The second set has junior

Tony Stanziano (5-9, 140), junior Sean "Little Willie" Wilson (5-9, 140) and sophomore Greg DeSapio (5-9, 145) at tailback, junior Jeff DeMenna (5-7, 160) at fullback and senior Jim Patunas (5-8, 140) as the power back.

"We're going to use all our runners," Johnson said. "We will keep them fresh by alternating them. At times, I might send in an entirely new backfield."

Senior Chris Heid (5-10, 165), whom Johnson calls "an" all-purpose player and just a good athlete, can play quarterback,

tailback, wingback and receiver.

Senior Tom Willoughby (6-3, 170), although he did not play football the past two seasons, is the Warriors' field general.

"Once Tom gets the fundamentals of the position and his timing down, he's going to do very well," Johnson said. "He can throw the ball, and he's intelligent."

A third quarterback in the Warrior camp is just a freshman, Tom "The Bomber" Guy, but, as his nickname suggests, he can wing the ball.

"I wouldn't hesitate one sec-

ond putting him into a game," Johnson said. "Tom has tremendous football ability and smarts. He has mastered the offense."

Seniors Matt Sugrue (5-9, 145), a first-time high school football player, and Yamil Aranda (5-10, 145) join Heid as wide receivers.

The offensive line has senior Frank Occhipinti (5-9, 170) or junior Steve Haupt (6-0, 215) at tight end, junior Mike Echevarria (5-8, 150) at center, seniors Eric "The Bull" Anderson (5-10, 200) and Joe Calafiore (6-2, 190) at guard and senior Matt Marquis (6-3, 230) and sophomore Ryan Candrilli (6-0, 185) at tackle. In reserve is junior Brian Andrychewicz (6-0, 240).

gation and responsibility to provide the students in the district with the proper delivery of service and educational needs. They also have an obligation and responsibility to provide accountability to the taxpayers of Bergen County. Thus far, both have been woefully lacking from this board.

Ott retires after 60 years

UPPER SADDLE RIVER — Harold Ott, organist of Bergen Highlands United Methodist Church, retired this month after over 60 years as a church organist and choir director.

Mr. Ott announced his retirement on his 85th birthday this past February. During festivities held on Sept. 10, Bergen Highlands honored him for his years of dedicated service to the Christian music ministry.

A life-long Lutheran, Mr. Ott was confirmed in St. James Lutheran Church in Queens, N.Y. In his youth, he sang there in the church choir and in the Lutheran Chorus of Brooklyn.

He began organ study in 1930 under Jack Ehm. Since then, aside from his Army duty, he served continuously as organist and choir director in area churches. During World War II, Mr. Ott spent over three years in the 118th U.S. Army Signal Corps, breaking down enemy codes.

He began his career as organist at St. John's Lutheran Church in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, N.Y., and moved on to posts as organist and choir director at St. Peter's Lutheran Church in Brooklyn, N.Y., St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Teaneck, Church of the Savior in Paramus and then Grace Lutheran Church in River Edge for 22 years. Meanwhile, he pursued a full-time profession auditing Inland Marine insurance claims.

In 1951, Mr. Ott moved with his family from Richmond Hill in Queens, N.Y., to his current home in Waldwick. Known locally in music circles, he sang with the Ridgewood Singers for many years. Waldwick chose one of Mr. Ott's compositions as its contribution to the rededica-

tion of the Statue of Liberty, placing the manuscript in a time capsule in Washington, D.C.

In 1984, Mr. Ott came to Bergen Highlands Methodist Church as organist for its music program. For 11 years he has played for services, accompany choirs and soloists and perform for festivals and visits to nursing homes.

Mr. Ott and his wife, Catherine, plan to remain in their Waldwick home during his retirement years. After all these years, his interest in music is undiminished. He will use his free time to visit his son, David, his daughter and son-in-law, Carolyn and Eric Sloane, and his grandchildren, Kristin and Geoffrey Sloane.

Tax break aids town's image

Home improvement incentive

WALDWICK — When Paul Papendick decided to enlarge the kitchen and bathroom at his Campbell Street home, he expected that both projects would add to his next property tax bill.

Then he received a notice from the borough stating that under a newly adopted tax abatement ordinance, he could make up to \$15,000 in improvements without seeing a tax increase for five years.

"I had already started to do the work," Papendick said. "So this was an added bonus. I was surprised."

Papendick was not alone. Since the ordinance was passed early in the summer, more than 200 home improvement applications — more than double the number submitted to the borough last year — have been turned in, Waldwick Tax Assessor Mary Ann Gordon said.

Borough officials see the increase in applications as a sign that the tax incentive is working. Waldwick is the latest of several Bergen County towns — including Ridgefield Park, Rutherford, and Bogota — to use the abatement ordinance to spruce itself up and boost lagging property values.

"I think this gives people an incentive to do things with their homes that they wouldn't have done before because they couldn't afford it," Papendick said.

Councilman Art Barthold said reports from building officials that a number of the borough's older, wood-constructed residences were rapidly deteriorating was one of the major reasons the ordinance was drafted.

"There are a lot of depressed areas around Bergen County," Barthold said. "Waldwick may not be as depressed, but we have some pretty old homes and we need to revitalize them. ... People were getting a little lax, and we felt they needed some prodding."

Under the ordinance, improvements are classified as any work

that enhances or adds to a home and increases its property value. General repairs do not fall under that description.

Under the new law, the monetary value of improvements to houses 20 years old or over would be exempt until 2000, at which time the amount would be added to the assessed property value, Gordon said. The average home in Waldwick is valued at about \$180,000. Residents with delinquent property taxes are not granted exemptions, she said.

Regardless of the ordinance, some Waldwick residents said the borough should not tax any improvements to a home.

"We had already done some work on the exterior of our home and the roof and now it looks beautiful," said Jacqueline Backhaus, a Waldmere Place resident who also filed for the abatement. "But it needed to be done. I think it's a silly thing to tax for things like siding."

Other residents said the borough is asking people to make improvements without explaining why they are necessary or the specific benefits.

"It didn't seem very clear," said Joan Mefford, who has lived on Waldwick Avenue for more than 40 years. "If you're going to get [the increase] in five years, what's the difference?"

Officials in at least one other community where the ordinance was passed said that while it provides an incentive for people to improve their homes, it has not worked miracles for sagging property values.

"It hasn't been a huge success here," Bogota Councilman John Scalzo said. "There's a lot of houses for sale in this town. I think it's a darn good idea, but you have to get people to want to stay here first."

WALDWICK — As it did last season, Waldwick scored first in its B-PSL football match with Glen Rock on Saturday. But unlike last year, when the Warriors had a 7-0 halftime lead en route to a 23-14 loss, the weapon-laden Rocker attack scored five unanswered touchdowns to roll over its second straight opponent, 35-6.

Glen Rock followed its 35-0 rout of Saddle Brook by out-gaining Waldwick (0-1) in total net yards, 305-to-106. The Panthers showed a balanced attack — 148 yards rushing on 17 carries and 157 yards passing.

Two factors loomed prominent in the game — Glen Rock's team speed and nine interceptions, five by the Panthers, who used the aerial sabotage to thwart the Warriors' last four possessions of the game.

But there was another fact that was strange, and unnecessary, in the fourth quarter on Glen Rock's last two series. With a 35-6 lead (that's a 29-point bulge), the Rockers took to the air three times, and not on screen passes or short tosses over the middle, but on much deeper patterns downfield.

After Mike Henzel returned an interception to the Waldwick 21-yard line, quarterback Chris Leonard, on a 3rd-and-15 from the 26, threw a long incomple-tion with 8:20 remaining. On fourth down, his pass was picked off by middle linebacker Marlon Falco and returned to the Warrior 37.

Mikkel Brown was next up to intercept a Waldwick pass. On first down from the Glen Rock 48 with 2:42 left, another long pass was intercepted, this time by Chris Heid, and returned to the Warrior 39.

The point here is that Glen Rock had already proven it was the superior team. So what was the Glen Rock coaching staff thinking of by utilizing the pass — after all, the air is a quicker avenue in which to score points than the ground — when the game was already won? Why try to pour it on and make the team with a 29-point deficit feel even more demoralized?

On the opening kickoff, the Warriors were pumped up after Yamil Aranda recovered a fumble at the Glen Rock 30. However, the drive fizzled at the 23.

Varsity rookie Frank Desimini, a sophomore, gave Waldwick another lift later in the quarter by intercepting a pass at the Warrior 32 and returning it 38 yards to the Glen Rock 30. From there, Matt Servilio picked up nine yards, Jim Patunas eight and Kevin Luccarelli six to put the ball at the seven.

After a one-yard loss, senior Tom Willoughby, in his varsity debut at quarterback, completed his first pass in his first attempt — a seven-yard strike to tight end Frank Occhipinti. From the one, Luccarelli bulled in for the touchdown with 37 seconds left in the period. Heid's extra-point kick was

TIRES, WOOD WASTE AND CAR/TRUCK BATTERIES - On October 7th the Borough will hold a one day collection of tires, wood waste, and car/truck batteries at the recycling center located behind the DPW garage on Industrial Park (off Hopper Ave.) from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Tires on or off rims from autos, vans, and pick-up trucks will be accepted. No truck tires will be accepted. All types of wood, painted or stained, except pressure treated or wolmanized lumber will be accepted. No tree stumps, large limbs or household batteries will be accepted. Residents only, no commercial businesses.

BRUSH & TREE LIMB COLLECTION - The Borough is expanding their recycling program to include bushes, branches and tree limbs less than 6" in diameter. Monthly curbside collection will begin on the 4th Monday starting in October by appointment only. Contact the Borough Clerk's office at 652-5070 to schedule a pick up.

METAL PICK UP PROGRAM - STOVES, REFRIGERATORS, WASHERS, DRYERS, WATER HEATERS, FURNACES, AND OTHER ALL METAL ITEMS except car parts, are being recycled. The collection occurs on the 1st and 3rd Monday of each month, and residents are to call the Borough Clerk's office at 652-5070 to be placed on the list for pick up for the next collection day. We will only collect items from residents who call and are placed on the list and items are to be placed at the curb the night before. Items other than kitchen appliances and heaters (both water and household) are to be disassembled into manageable pieces for collection. Items such as mattresses, upholstered furniture, wooden furniture, etc. are accepted by the regular garbage collection and do not require an appointed pick up.

If our schedule is not convenient and the item is manageable, it can be taken to the recycling center.

Prospect street, Waldwick, New Jersey, at which time and place all persons interested therein will be given an opportunity to be heard concerning the same.

The above-mentioned proposed ordinance is as follows:

ORDINANCE 95-1

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE SALE OF TOBACCO/CIGARETTES TO MINORS AND LIMITING USE OF TOBACCO/CIGARETTE VENDING MACHINES AND FREE STANDING OR ATTACHED DISPLAYS OF TOBACCO/CIGARETTES IN THE BOROUGH OF WALDWICK, COUNTY OF BERGEN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY.

BE IT ORDAINED AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, the Surgeon General of the United States has called for ban on the sale of cigarettes by vending machines and

WHEREAS, the State of New Jersey has banned the sale or furnishing of cigarettes or tobacco in any form to minors under N.J.S.A. 2A-170-51 and

WHEREAS, the Waldwick Board of Health is unable to prevent the sale of cigarettes to minors by vending machines and no penalty has been imposed by State Statute upon minors for the purchase of cigarettes and

WHEREAS, the Waldwick Board of Health is authorized to enact ordinances not contrary to the laws of this State or of the United States as it may deem necessary and proper for the protection of persons and for the preservation of the public health, safety and welfare of the Borough of Waldwick and its inhabitants

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Waldwick Board of Health as follows:

Section 1. Prohibition of Tobacco Sales to Minors

(a) It shall be unlawful to sell tobacco/cigarettes to a person under eighteen (18) years of age.

(b) Sign Requirements

The following 6 inch by 8 inch (6" X 8") sign shall be posted in a conspicuous place near each cash register in all retail establishments which sell tobacco products.

SALE OF TOBACCO PRODUCTS TO MINORS UNDER THE AGE OF 18 IS PROHIBITED BY LAW. Legal proof of age must be shown. A person who sells or offers to sell a tobacco product to a person under 18 years of age may be prosecuted in accordance with state and local ordinance.

Section 2. Identification Required

It shall be unlawful for a tobacco/cigarette retailer to sell or permit to be sold tobacco/cigarettes to any individual without requesting and examining identification from the purchaser positively establishing the purchaser's age as eighteen (18) years or greater unless the seller has some other conclusive basis for determining the buyer is over the age of eighteen (18) years.

Section 3. Restriction of Tobacco Vending machines and Sales

A. It shall be unlawful for a tobacco retailer to offer for sale or to sell any tobacco products through a vending machine within the Borough of Waldwick, unless the machine to vend tobacco products can operate only by the activation of an electronic switch or other device, which is controlled by the proprietor or an employee over the age of eighteen, and only after the proprietor or employee has been presented with identification and has determined that the person wishing to use the tobacco vending machine is eighteen years of age or older.

B. It shall be a violation of this ordinance for any person, including any tobacco retailer responsible for the operation of tobacco vending machines, to remove, disconnect, or otherwise disable the remotely activated electronic switch or device on a tobacco vending machine.

Section 4. Free-Standing or Attached Tobacco/Cigarette Displays

All free-standing or attached tobacco/cigarette displays shall be located within two feet of a sales counter, and shall always be in plain view of, and under the control of, the proprietor, or an employee of eighteen years of age or older.

Section 5. Definitions

(a) Board of Health - Shall mean the Board of Health of Waldwick.

(b) Health Officer - Shall mean the Administrative Officer of the Waldwick Board of Health, and/or his or her authorized representatives.

(c) Person - Shall mean an individual, partnership, cooperative, association, corporation, personal representative, receiver, trustee, assignee, or any other legal entity.

(d) Tobacco - Shall mean any product made from the tobacco plant for the purpose of smoking, chewing, inhaling and other personal use including cigars, chewing tobacco, pipe tobacco, snuff and cigarettes in any form.

(e) Tobacco Retailer - Shall mean any person or entity that operates a store, stand, booth, concession, or place at which sales of tobacco are made to purchasers for consumption or use. Shall also mean a person or entity that owns, operates or uses a vending machine and/or vending machine location.

(f) Vending Machines - Shall mean any automated, self-service device which, upon insertion of money, tokens or any form of payment, dispenses cigarettes or other tobacco products in any form.

(g) Free Standing or Attached Tobacco/Cigarette Display - Shall mean any display promotion of tobacco/cigarette products in any area of a store or food establishment not specifically behind a sales counter and within the grasp of the public so as to be self service.

Section 6. Enforcement

(a) Whenever the Health Officer, or his/her designee, reasonably believes there exists a violation of this Ordinance, he/she may issue a summons and complaint not later than ninety (90) days after discovery of the alleged violation. The complaint shall be written and shall state with reasonable particularity the nature of the violation, including reference to the article and section of this Ordinance alleged to have been violated. The complaint shall be delivered by the police or sent by Certified Mail to the alleged violator.

(b) The Health Officer, or his designee, or any other person charged with enforcement of this Ordinance after giving proper identification, may inspect any matter, thing, premise, place, person, record vehicle, incident, or event as necessary.

(c) It shall be unlawful for any person to molest, willfully oppose, verbally abuse or otherwise obstruct the Health Officer, or his designee, who may request the assistance of the Waldwick Police Department, or other police agency or peace officer when necessary to execute his or her official duty in a manner prescribed by law.

(d) Citizens may bring complaints against violators of this Ordinance through the Health Department or Police Department.

Section 7. Severability

(a) If any chapter, section, subsection or paragraph of this Ordinance is declared to be unconstitutional, invalid or inoperative, in whole or in part by a court of competent jurisdiction, such chapter, section, subsection or paragraph shall, to the extent that it is not unconstitutional, invalid or inoperative, remain in full force and effect, and no such determination shall be deemed to invalidate the remaining chapters, sections, subsections or paragraphs of this ordinance.

(b) This Ordinance shall be liberally construed for the protection of the health, safety, and welfare of the people of the Borough of Waldwick.

Section 8. Fines

(a) Unless otherwise provided by law, statute or ordinance, any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, pay a fine of one thousand (1000) dollars for each offense. Complaint shall be made in Municipal Court of the Borough of Waldwick or before such other judicial officer having authority under the laws of the State of New Jersey.

(b) Defendants may, after reading and understanding the penalties, plead guilty to the charges, and after signing an affidavit, may pay the appropriate fine to the Clerk of the Court, in lieu of a court appearance.

(c) Each sale of tobacco/cigarettes to a minor shall constitute a separate violation.

(d) The Board of Health may suspend the Retail Food Establishment License of any person convicted of violation of this Ordinance, for a period of not more than three (3) days in addition to a fine pursuant to the authority of the Board of Health to license and regulate food establishments as provided by N.J.S.A. 26:3-31(c).

This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after final passage.

Machine locks out minors

Proposed law won't let youths buy cigarettes from machines

By TODD NOVACK

WALDWICK — The Board of Health proposed an ordinance to help prevent minors from buying packs of cigarettes. Cigarette vending machines may be required to have lock-out devices on them.

The electronic lock-out device prevents anybody from buying a pack of cigarettes without first being seen by the salesperson. Any person wishing to

buy cigarettes must first ask the salesperson to activate the machine. The salesperson is the only person able to activate the vending machine. A determination has to be made if he is selling to a minor or an adult.

A minor is a person under 18 which is the legal age requirement to purchase cigarettes.

The lock-out device creates a situation where there is no difference buying cigarettes from a vending machine or

from a clerk over the counter, sales, Board of Health President Dr. Robert Simonoff said. Nobody can get cigarettes out of the machine unless the machine is activated by a counterperson.

A store has no control over an ordinary vending machine, he added.

The lock-out device is operated by a counterperson in the store, Councilman Ed Sherman said. The lock-out device on the vending machines prevent minors from having easy access to cigarettes.

The ordinance provides up to \$1000 in fines for any store that

sells cigarettes to minors. The high fine hopes to be a deterrent against misusing the vending machines.

A remote control similar to a TV remote is used to activate the machine from the counter or wherever the counter person is standing. The lock-out vending machine only gives one pack of cigarettes at a time as well.

The lock-out devices will be distributed by the vending machine companies. The companies will provide the vending machines and the lock-out devices to each store.

Dr. Simonoff said the only current cigarette law restricts the selling of tobacco products to minors.

The Board of Health plans to hold a second reading of the ordinance on Oct. 19.

Warriors break out on ground

Fullback Falco leads the 295-yard assault

WALDWICK — After three seasons, especially the last one, of having the reputation as a passing team, Waldwick got its "new-look" offense in gear Saturday by grinding out 295 yards on the ground for its first win of the 1995 football campaign, a 26-7 pounding of winless Saddle Brook.

However, it wasn't until the fourth quarter before the Warriors asserted themselves, as they trailed, 7-6, entering the final period.

After a scoreless first half, Waldwick (1-1) handed Saddle Brook (0-3) an easy touchdown in the third quarter. The Falcons recovered a fumble at the Warrior 13-yard line; then, consecutive off-sides penalties on Waldwick put the ball at the four. From there, Saddle Brook ran it in for the touchdown.

Waldwick fullback Marlon Falco, whose 135 yards rushing (on just eight carries) was the most for a Waldwick back since the 1993 season, responded with a 55-yard touchdown gallop. A conversion run failed.

"Marlon kept his legs driving hard to break three tackles on that touchdown run," said Waldwick head coach Neil Johnson. "He also had a 30-yard run where he broke two or three tackles before he could bust out of there."

Marlon has played in two years," noted Johnson.

In all, the Warriors rushed 38 times while throwing the ball

on just 10 occasions, completing three passes for 45 yards.

"We just ran them (the Falcons) into the ground," Johnson said. "But in the first half, we couldn't do anything right."

Also tearing up the turf were tailback Matt Servilio (10 rushes for 57 yards) and power back Kevin Luccarelli (9-for-51), who scored on a four-yard run. On a reverse, Jim Patunas picked up 18 yards, while sophomore Frank Desimini (3-for-12) scored his first varsity touchdown on a four-yard run.

Johnson took note of Luccarelli's unique running style.

"Kevin hurts people, punishes them, when they tackle him. He explodes through the defender when he knows he's going to be tackled."

On the defensive side, senior Chris Heid has emerged as a threat to opponents' attacks through the air. The crafty safety intercepted three passes to give him four picks on the season. The Warriors' other safety, senior Matt Sugrue, also stole a pass — his second of the year — to thwart the Falcons. Actually, Waldwick intercepted a fifth pass, but it was negated on a pass-interference call.

"We expected Chris Heid to be good this year," said Johnson. "He's so intelligent, and that's why he's able to pick up on the other team's offensive alignments. And Matt Sugrue is such a pleasant surprise, considering it is his first season of high school football. Like Chris, he has great ball sense, too. They're both very intelligent kids and are always in the right place."

And it was Sugrue who put Waldwick in the lead early in the final quarter. The wide receiver snared a 33-yard touchdown reception from the Warriors' quarterback of the future, freshman Tom "The Bomber" Guy, who completed 3-of-7 passes for 45 yards. Heid then kicked the extra point to make it 13-7.

Johnson has decided to split game time between his two quarterbacks, Tom Willoughby, who started the game, and Guy. Willoughby, a senior, has not played football since his freshman year. Guy, for the past six seasons, has been a quarterback in junior football for coaches Tim "Wheels" O'Keefe, Gene "Dozer" Durnigan, Ozzie O'Keefe and Ray Jimenez.

"Both kids are decent quarterbacks, and they're learning," Johnson said. "If one of them goes down with an injury, I need the other one to step in and perform, so I'm going to play both of them as much as I can so they mature at the same speed. We didn't think we could throw the ball this year, but they're both doing a real good job."

Guy entered the game at the end of the first quarter and started the second half; Willoughby re-entered midway through the final period.

"The only way you can ensure yourself of having a quarterback all year is to keep both of them in shape and for them to know how to run the offense correctly," Johnson added.

The Warriors' ground assault was fueled, especially, by the play of guard Eric Anderson. "Bull owned them on the offensive line," Johnson said. "And our freshman center, Vinnie Rizzo, did a heckuva job blocking."

Defensively, cornerback Yamil Aranda was second in tackles with seven, while Sean "Willie" Wilson, at 5-foot-7, 150 pounds, played his outside linebacker's slot solidly, registering five tackles. "Almost Big Willie came up with a couple of big hits seven or eight yards behind the line of scrimmage and had one sack," Johnson noted.

Another "big-time player" was freshman Rob Christie, playing end, who used his 5-foot-7, 145-pound frame to sack the quarterback twice. He also recovered a fumble.

"Jim Patunas made five tremendous plays on defense," Johnson noted. "And Kevin Luccarelli at tackle was all over the field. He just hustles all over the place."

Curb cuts coming soon

Officials say it will take 2 weeks to be handicapped accessible

By TODD NOVACK

WALDWICK — Many residents can expect easier access around town when handicapped accessible curb cuts are completed in two weeks. Most of the curb cuts have been finished already and the Council is pleased with the results.

The purpose of the curb cuts are to allow easy access of wheelchairs, canes, and other walking devices onto the sidewalk in busy areas of town. The

Council approved curb cuts since the state may mandate handicap accessible curbs in certain sidewalks next year.

The curb cuts were completely financed with a \$73,000 grant from the Community Development Fund of Bergen County. Seventy-five curb cuts were added around town at an average cost of \$760 for each cut. The cuts were made in the business district, near schools, and at sidewalks where there is

heavy pedestrian traffic.

The Community Development Grant was originally earmarked for a Recreation Center. When the town said they did not want the Recreation Center in a packed public hearing the grant was instead approved for making handicap accessible curbs.

American Disability requirements may make the curb cuts mandatory in the next few years anyway, when the funds may have to come out of the town's taxes, Councilman Art Barthold said. "This is an example of the Mayor and Council pursuing a project and keeping

taxes down in the process."

One resident recently voiced a complaint on how one curb cut looked near his house. The individual argued that the contractor had not properly finished the job.

However, according to Administrator Gary Kratz, the contractor should have fixed the curb already, and if not the resident's sidewalk will soon be fixed.

"Everyone involved with the project did an excellent job," Barthold added. "Now the council has caught up and can move

ALLENDALE — Members of the Allendale-Waldwick Police Benevolent Association (PBA) placed a sign in town in front of a realty office to advertise the second weekend of the PBA's Annual Turkey Shoot.

Councilman Richard Furfaro instructed the DPW to take the sign down because the PBA had not applied for a permit to erect the sign.

"We never needed a permit before," said Kevin Smith, president of the Allendale-Waldwick PBA. "I agreed to get a permit but was not issued one because of the conflict between the borough of Waldwick and Allendale over the range."

Klein also said the PBA donates money from the Turkey Shoot to programs such as DARE, and holiday events such as the Easter Egg Hunt and Christmas Tree Sales.

The objections to the sign for the Turkey Shoot is not because of the event itself, but because the event is

held at the Waldwick Shooting Range which has many Allendale residents complaining about the noise.

"The signs were not appropriate without a permit, but I felt the police should remove them and not the DPW, who threw them in the back of a truck," Klomburg said. "I do agree in light of the present situation the signs should have been discussed before being put up."

Romero, Azze spark Bears to 20-0 win over Waldwick

HAWTHORNE — Waldwick rushed for 192 yards and was only out-gained by Hawthorne in total net yards by a mere 39, but could not dent the end zone, as the Bears continued on their unbeaten path with a 20-0 victory last week, setting the stage for this Saturday's football clash at Glen Rock, which is also 4-0.

It marked the first time Waldwick has been shut out since the 1992 season, when Midland Park blanked the Warriors, 19-0, in the seventh week — a span of 22 games between shutouts.

Hawthorne, meanwhile, beat Waldwick for the first time

since the 1992 campaign, having lost 7-6 last year and 28-8 in 1993 to the Warriors.

"Waldwick moved the ball against us; we bent some, but we didn't break," said Hawthorne head coach Neal Hancock, whose team out-gained the Warriors in total net yards, 239-to-200.

Waldwick (1-2) racked up impressive results on the ground for the second straight week after rushing for 295 yards against Saddle Brook, as tailback Matt Servilio accounted for 134 yards on 17 carries versus Hawthorne.

"Matt would have had well over 200 yards if it were not for five holding penalties," noted

Waldwick head coach Neal Johnson.

"Servilio had a big game," Hancock said. "He broke one on the second play of the game for about 60 yards to our 25."

But Waldwick's deepest penetration into Bear turf was to the 18-yard line.

Hancock pointed to two factors that kept Waldwick off the scoreboard.

"We started to win the battle of field position through the punting game, plus our defense came up big," he said. "We were getting good returns on punts — that was the difference — and then we cashed in on them."

"In the first and third quarters, we owned them," Johnson said. "You take three plays out of this game, and it's an all together different ballgame. It was really an even game until they scored. We had to punt, and they had to punt, but we were losing field position."

Waldwick got the opening kickoff and was driving, until a 25-yard pass was intercepted by free safety Joe Azze at the Hawthorne four-yard line, where he was tackled immediately.

On the Warriors' three ensuing punts, the Bears started operations on their 25-yard line, 35-yard stripe (after a 20-yard return by Ari Romero) and 45-yard line. Azze and Romero each averaged about 30 yards on punt returns.

First round action in the Bergen county coaches Association boys soccer tournament gets underway this weekend at Ramsey and Ramapo high schools, and nine of the 16 teams are from the local area.

Heading up the locals is Waldwick, which comes into this weekend with an undefeated 10-0 record. Health board considers anti-smoking measure

The Waldwick Board of Health is now considering for final passage an ordinance which would prohibit the sale of tobacco and cigarettes to minors. The measure would also limit the use of tobacco/cigarette vending machines and free standing or attached displays of such products within the borough's borders.

A hearing on the matter will be held on Oct. 19 at 8:15 p.m. at 22 West Prospect Street, Waldwick. The Board of Health will consider the ordinance for final passage at that time.

The terms of the proposed ordinance would require identification proving that a purchaser of tobacco or cigarettes is at least 18 years of age.

The measure further states that it will be illegal for a tobacco retailer to offer for sale or sell tobacco products through a vending machine "unless the machine to vend tobacco products can operate only by the activation of an electronic switch or other device, which is controlled by the proprietor or an employee over the age of eighteen, and only after the proprietor or employee has been presented with identification and has determined that the person wishing to use the tobacco vending machine is eighteen years of age or older."

In addition, all free-standing or attached tobacco displays would have to be located within two feet of a sales

counter, in view of and under control of the proprietor, or employee who is at least 18.

The ordinance provides for fines of \$1,000 for each offense.

A similar ordinance considered earlier this year would

have gone one step further - banning cigarette displays. However, some retailers complained that a total ban would seriously affect their business, since cigarette companies pay them several thousand dollars each year to carry such displays.

Waldwick Council makes appointments

At last week's Waldwick Council meeting, Joseph Agugliaro was unanimously voted in as the new Superintendent of Public Works. The appointment takes effect immediately. The new superintendent will serve at his current salary for the remainder of 1995.

A long-time employee of the borough DPW, Agugliaro has served the fire department and various other organizations. Prior to the vote, Mayor Vander Wende and each council member praised Agugliaro for the outstanding job he has done during his tenure with the department.

Also appointed last week was Laura Georgia, who will serve as a clerk in the finance office. Her position will become effective on Oct. 23, at a salary of \$14,000. Catherine Boufford has been appointed as cashier in the tax of-

fice.

Two communications operator trainees were appointed to the Waldwick Police Department to fill two vacancies. They are Nicholas E. Hanke and Claudia Rudolf. Their appointments will become effective on Oct. 23, at a yearly salary of \$17,500 plus E.M.T. stipends.

In other action, the council reduced the performance bond for Greenway at Waldwick. The borough engineer recommended the reduction of the bond to the amount of \$34,200 as work has progressed satisfactorily on the project. The council authorized Borough Administrator Gary Kratz to begin seeking bids for the rehabilitation of the Whites Pond Dam.

Servilio fuels Waldwick victory

WALDWICK — Just consider it a transfer from the Air Force Academy to the U.S. Military Academy at West Point for the football Warriors of Waldwick High School. And the necessary adjustment in the method of attack has now kicked in solidly for them.

After throwing the ball a good 90 percent of the time last season with the rocket arm of the graduated Mike Branagh, Waldwick General Neil Johnson is doing the exact opposite this year by unleashing his ground forces that, for the second game in three weeks, mobilized for over 200 yards in racking up 265 on 42 carries.

The result was a 20-16 win over Paterson Catholic, as the Warriors, in evening their record at 2-2, avenged last year's 32-16 loss to the Cougars.

For the season, Waldwick has rushed 145 times for 853 yards and has attempted just 39 passes, completing 12 for 90 yards.

For the second consecutive week, tailback Matt Servilio was the main catalyst of the Warriors' ground attack, as the 5-foot-9, 150-pound junior racked up 151 yards on 19 carries and scored his first three touchdowns of the season on runs of 30, 10 and 65 yards. The previous week in a 20-0 loss to Hawthorne, Servilio ran for 134 yards in 17 attempts.

Junior Tony Stanziano relieved Servilio from time-to-time, and picked up 42 of his

own yards on eight carries.

Meanwhile, fullback Marlon Falco (5 carries for 14 yards) and power back Kevin Luccarelli (4-for-25) didn't carry the ball that much, because, as Johnson pointed out, "They were busy opening the holes for Servilio and Stanziano and doing a tremendous job of it."

Waldwick took a 6-0 first-quarter lead on Servilio's 30-yard dash and then went up, 12-0, before halftime on his 10-yard scoring run.

By the end of the third period, Paterson Catholic had closed to within 12-8.

Servilio upped his team's lead to 18-8 with some nifty running on his 65-yard gallop. He first broke two tackles at the line, then went six yards before a defender gave him a shot that jolted him two yards to his left near the Cougar sideline. The intent was to knock Servilio out-of-bounds; however, he kept his balance and raced down the sideline for his rousing score.

Quarterback Tom Willoughby then tossed a conversion pass to tight end Steve Haupt for a 20-8 advantage.

Paterson Catholic, though, benefitted from blocking a punt, as the Cougars recovered the ball at the Waldwick eight-yard line. From the five, quarterback Kippy Smith scored and then passed to Shaheed Jackson for the conversion and a 20-16 deficit.

Late in the game, the Warrior

defense rose to the occasion and staged a goal-line stand, ending the Cougar threat at the two-yard line.

Johnson is very much pleased with how his team has made the big adjustment from being a pass-blocking team to that of a run-blocking unit.

"We've gone from throwing the ball 30-to-35 times a game to running the ball 35-to-40 times a game, and for the offensive line to switch from pass blocking to drive blocking and area blocking is a big conversion to make," he said. "But we have improved with each game, and our linemen are

picking up the blocking assignments very well. The kids are responding well to the power I offense and picking it up rather easily. As a result, we can now make adjustments during the game."

Johnson also noted that his players have embraced the most important reason, really, for being on the football field.

"They are enjoying the game," he said. "It's fun for them, and as long as it's fun for them, and they enjoy it, there's always a chance of us going out and upsetting some teams and beating them."

Heid's fifth interception a timely one for Warriors

Chris Heid made his fifth interception of the season a very timely one Saturday in Waldwick's 20-16 victory over Paterson Catholic.

The Cougars were driving into Warrior territory late in the second quarter, when the senior stepped up to pick a long pass at the two-yard line that maintained Waldwick's 12-0 halftime lead.

"Chris just jumped up in front of the receiver and caught it," Waldwick coach Neil Johnson said. "It's a tremendous job this kid is doing in the secondary. All of our defensive backs are

playing great."

"It was good we didn't let them score in the first half," said Heid, who had no interceptions last season, but two his sophomore year, when he started the last five games at the varsity level.

Heid is joined in the secondary by either Dave Bernal or Yamil Aranda at left cornerback and Matt Sugrue and either Bernal or Aranda at safety.

Middle linebacker Marlon Falco and outside linebacker Sean Wilson led the Warriors in total tackles with 10 each, followed by outside linebacker Frank Desimini and Kevin Luccarelli with five apiece.

"Wilson made two tremendous tackles, one-on-one, on their quarterback on rollouts on our goal-line stand in the fourth quarter," Johnson noted. "Luccarelli made two beautiful tackles in the backfield, and Desimini also played a tremendous game."

Waldwick tackle Ryan Candrilli recovered a fumble, while defensive ends Frank Occhipinti and Jim Patunas had one quarterback sack apiece at crucial times in the game.—FARRELL

"I think it's going to be interesting," he said. "The fact that I have been in the system for so many years has its advantages and some detrements. Being vice principal will be a culmination of all those positions I held before."

Klie is a graduate of the University of Nebraska, where he spent a semester teaching in the Lincoln, Neb. schools system. Prior to teaching in Waldwick in 1974, Klie worked in the Hawthorn school system.

Waldwick teen fined \$100 in fatal accident

RIVER VALE — A Waldwick High School honors graduate was issued a \$100 fine in connection with a 1994 accident in which he drove through a rain-slicked intersection and struck an elderly crossing guard and a seventh-grader. The crossing guard died of his injuries 22 days later.

David Kanavogel, 18, a popular student and athlete at the school, was issued the fine Tuesday by Judge Richard B. Greenhalgh in Municipal Court in River Vale, where the case was heard because of a conflict with the Waldwick court.

Kanavogel had pleaded not guilty to charges of careless driving and driving with defective windshield wipers in his 1973 Nova after the Nov. 21 accident in which he struck Herbert LaBar, 72, and a 12-year-old girl at Crescent Avenue and West Prospect Street in Waldwick.

Kanavogel was a popular student and athlete in high school.

A ruling on the matter had been postponed since mid-August; an investigation by the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office found no criminal wrongdoing on Kanavogel's part.

Raymond Flood, Kanavogel's attorney, said Thursday that he was satisfied with the outcome, despite the tragic circumstances surrounding the case.

"This was just a very unfortunate accident," Flood said. Nancy Branagh, LaBar's daughter, said she was saddened but not surprised by the ruling. "This is what our attorney told us to expect," Branagh said. "It just seems like an awfully small price to pay."

Kanavogel faces a hearing before the state Division of Motor Vehicles' Office of Administrative Law on Thursday, when his license could be suspended. Flood declined to comment on the hearing.

Kanavogel, who had been president of the Waldwick High School Student Council and an avid soccer player at the time of the accident, is a freshman at Johns Hopkins University.

Greenhalgh held off ruling on the accident on Aug. 16 because he wanted to review memorandums on state laws for maintaining windshield wipers, which the prosecution indicated were a major cause of the accident.

Police Officer Kevin Smith, the prosecution's only witness and the officer who issued the summonses, based his testimony on Kanavogel's written statement after the accident. In his statement, Kanavogel told Smith his "wipers had been failing," and that his windows were beginning to fog.

In the statement, Kanavogel told Smith he had been getting ready to pull over and clean the glass when he struck LaBar and the girl, a student at Waldwick Junior High School.

Smith acknowledged under cross-examination by Flood that he had failed to test the wipers after the accident.

Kanavogel also had been driving under the speed limit on a winding stretch of road that has no streetlights or signs to guide drivers, factors which contributed to the accident, Flood said.

LaBar suffered massive injuries to his head, legs, and arm, and never regained consciousness. The girl's family members have asked that she remain anonymous, but said she has recovered and returned to school.

Big police raises burden taxpayers

After 18 years, the taxpayers of New Jersey are still burdened with antiquated compulsory binding arbitration laws for police and firemen. New Jersey has the distinction of having the nation's highest property taxes, highest per-pupil cost, highest trash disposal cost, highest car insurance cost, and the largest number of foreclosures of homes.

On Nov. 7, all of the state Assembly seats are up for election. Vote the incumbent Assembly legislators out of office and begin the process to end the corruption of the political system in New Jersey.

There's too much noise

Allendale residents still complain of noise coming from pistol range

WALDWICK — Many Allendale residents who live near the pistol range in Waldwick are wondering when, if ever, something will be done about the nearby noise.

While the residents have asked for and have been promised renovations to the pistol range, they have received no set answer as to when these renovations will take place.

Residents say there is no communication between of-

ficials at the pistol range and the dozens of people who live within 500 feet of the range. The residents do not understand what improvements are being made to the range and when the noise level will decrease from the current level.

The police department has not yet decided upon a time frame for the completion of the pistol range noise barriers. Minor renovations have been completed although there are still some improvements to be

done on the range before the noise is adequately muffled.

"We can't sit down to dinner with the windows open and enjoy the peace and quite," Mark Weber of Allendale said. "Our family cannot have a cookout on a Saturday afternoon due to the noise coming from the range."

The only changes that are evident is that the building is being enlarged, Fred Litt of Allendale said.

"We want quiet restored to Allendale," said Litt, adding it is a noise issue.

The improvements are not yet 100 percent done, officials said.

The upcoming improvements will help decrease noise from the pistol range, Police Chief Daniel Lupo said. We recently poured the floor at the pistol range, although finishing the building will be a while yet.

The police department is responsible for doing most of the improvements, he added.

The quality of life of the people who have houses in the area is affected by the sound of gunfire from the range, Litt said. The gunfire violates the peacefulness of Allendale and Waldwick.

According to the police de-

partment, a whole row of balsalm shrubbery will be planted along a nearby brook to help muffle the sound of firing guns. The borough council has approved these improvements. The clubs who use the range have been working to mitigate the noise level as well.

Range shouldn't be a shot in the dark

To the editor:

For the past year the residents of the Oakwood/Cambridge/Princeton roads section of Allendale have been attempting to work through the Allendale town council to negotiate a reasonable schedule for the Captain George H. Bunning Police Training Facility. However, during such time the Waldwick officials (Mayor, Town Administrator, and Police Chief) have provided nothing but stonewalling and lies. They wrote me and told me that they will not begin shooting before 9 a.m., yet shooting continually begins at 8:30 a.m. The Waldwick police chief announced in June that they would be implementing measures to "muffle" the sound of the range. This is not true. They have actually expanded the size of the range.

When questioned about the schedule for the range, the Waldwick officials refuse to provide answers. Basically, their reply is that the range is open Monday through Saturday from 9 a.m. until sundown. They have publicly stated that they have no intention of altering the range's hours. The only other outdoor pistol range in Bergen County - the county training facility in Mahwah has restricted hours of Monday through Friday 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

How would these officials like to come home from work and sit down to dinner with their family over the sound of gunfire. These officials have no concern whatsoever for our quality of life. They have been quoted as saying that we are a bunch of newcomers who are "stirring up trouble." Is asking for a neighborhood free from the sound of gunfire too much to ask for? Why should our children grow up being able to distinguish between different caliber of weapons. Isn't this why we move to towns like Allendale and Waldwick? So that our children can grow up safely, with good schools, and in a nice peaceful neighborhood. They could hear less gunfire growing up in the worst sections of the South Bronx.

The range is within 100 feet of residential neighborhoods. It is also situated in the middle of a park, where baseball games are played on a regular basis. There are also swings and beautiful play areas for young children. I have had people tell me that they visited "that park" with their children unaware of the pistol range; until shooting began. One woman told me that she grabbed her kids and "hit the dirt." Her friend then ran over and comforted her and informed her of the range. She refuses to go back to that park.

It's time the officials of Waldwick forget about them-

selves and remember who they're here to serve; the people. Give the parks back to the children and the ball fields back to the ballplayers. Make our neighborhoods quiet and peaceful again. Shut the range down or enclose it, but make the sound of gunfire go away.

Patunas' defensive effort spurs Warriors' 12-0 win

WALDWICK — The Warriors proved Saturday that they are good "mudders". Sloshing through the rain and on the sloppy turf, Waldwick won its second straight football game via a shutout of winless Elmwood Park, 12-0.

Had it been a dry surface, Warrior head coach Neil Johnson admitted his troops could have scored a few more touchdowns. Regardless, the Warriors

(3-2) struck for their fourth consecutive game rushing for more than 100 yards — 115 on 40 carries — giving them 968 for the season in 185 attempts. Passing-wise, they were 2-for-8 for 12 yards.

For the third straight contest, tailback Matt Servilio was the primary rusher, picking up 54 yards on 18 carries. But it was the opening play of the game — the kickoff — where the junior dazzled, going 80 yards on the kickoff. The extra-point kick

failed. "Matt caught the ball at the left hash mark, pranced a little bit, saw the hole and broke to the left and went straight down the Elmwood Park sideline," Johnson said.

It remained 6-0 until the start of the fourth quarter, when Kevin Luccarelli blocked a punt that was recovered at the Crusader 20. That set up full-back Marlon Falco's dive through the line and into the end zone from three yards out behind freshman center Vince Rizzo and right guard Joe Calafiore. A pass conversion failed.

Elmwood Park (0-6) had its best scoring drive halted in the third quarter, when sophomore outside linebacker Frank Desimini intercepted a pass at the Waldwick 20-yard line.

Defensive end Jim Patunas had a field day on the slick surface, pouncing on three fumbles, knocking down two screen passes and registering five tackles, including one quarterback sack.

"Jim is improving with every game," Johnson noted. "He goes 100 percent all the time, and when he does mess up it's because he's hustling; they are hustling mistakes. He did a great job Saturday."

Elmwood Park came in looking to pass the ball, but was thwarted by defensive coordinator Jim Drechsel's coverage schemes.

"They tried to throw the ball quite a bit, but completed only two passes over the middle," said Johnson. "Their other passes were covered, and we knocked down five others."

Both cornerback Chris Heid and safety Matt Sugrue knocked down a few passes.

"Each of them caught a pass with a diving attempt, but they were out-of-bounds," Johnson noted. "They had tremendous position. Our other cornerback, Dave Bernal, also had a great game, too. The secondary is getting better and better at pass coverage."

When the Crusaders went to the ground, they didn't advance much, either.

"They had no yardage rushing inside," Johnson noted. "Our three linebackers stopped them. The only yardage they got was on the outside."

Those linebackers stuffing the run were Falco in the middle and, on the outside, Desimini and Willie Wilson, who also had an interception. Falco also recovered a fumble.

Credited tackles were spread out evenly, as Luccarelli, the nose tackle, Falco, Wilson, Heid and tackle Eric "The Bull" Anderson each had five.

Outside linebacker Yamil Aranda and Sugrue each had four takedowns, while Bernal had three. Tackle Ryan Candrilli had the Warriors' other sack.

"The team is improving with each game and with each aspect of it," Johnson said. "I really believe that if we don't panic and make the mental mistakes, we have a chance to beat everyone remaining on our schedule. I really believe it!"

The first big test comes Saturday, when the Warriors return to the scene of one of their greatest conquests — a 14-12 upset of Pompton Lakes in the 1993 season opener.

New Jersey has the distinction of being number one in the nation in the highest property taxes, the highest per pupil cost, the highest trash disposal cost, the highest car insurance cost and the largest number of foreclosures on home.

Warriors lose tough contest

WALDWICK — "We beat them up; we really did," said Waldwick head football coach Neil Johnson, "but we couldn't get in."

Johnson refers to the end zone, where his Warriors only dented it twice despite racking up 373 total yards of offense Saturday in a 28-14 loss at Pompton Lakes.

"We stopped their rush, and their whole offense was three passes of 66, 44, and 29 yards, noted Johnson, referring to three of the Cardinals' touchdowns. "It was a tough loss. We beat them in every category, but our pass defense broke down, and that facet of our game was our highlight the previous two weeks."

With a minute left in the first half, Pompton took a 7-6 lead on the 66-yard pass. "I mean, they weren't doing anything up to that point," Johnson said.

Pompton's other score came on an 80-yard interception return of a screen pass. Otherwise, the Warriors contained the Cardinals' big back, Sam Mora, who could muster just 21 yards rushing after busting loose for 244 the previous week against Midland Park.

For the first time this season, Waldwick (3-3) had a balanced attack, as Johnson was forced to pass more. The Warriors clicked on 7-of-9 passes for 144 yards, as Tom Willoughby was 5-of-9 for 70 yards and Tom Guy 2-of-2 for 77 yards.

Waldwick rushed 44 times for 229 yards, as fullback Marlon Falco (11-for-105) tailback Matt Servilio (19-for-70) paced the attack. The Warriors have run for 1,175 yards on 229 carries.

Waldwick scored first in the second quarter on Falco's 65-yard burst off a dive. "Marlon broke two tackles, busted out and out-ran everyone," Johnson said. "It was like snap, crackle and pop, and he was gone!"

Down 28-6 late in the game, Guy hooked up with wide receiver Matt Sugrue on a 45-yard scoring strike, and Sugrue ran for the conversion.

"Matt didn't have to break stride," said Johnson of Guy's perfect toss. "Matt has very good hands and speed. I'm going to use him more on offense."

Linebackers Willie Wilson (10 solos, 2 assists) and Falco (8 solos, 5 assists) again led Waldwick in tackles. Sugrue, at safety, and cornerback Chris Heid each had five takedowns. Falco recovered a fumble.

"The kids wanted this game so badly," Johnson lamented. "I've never seen them more ready for a game than this one."

Shut down the pistol range

For the past year the residents of the Oakwood/Cambridge/Princeton roads section of Allendale have been attempting to work through the Allendale town council to negotiate a reasonable schedule for the Captain George H. Bunning Police Training Facility. However, during such time the Waldwick officials (mayor, town administrator and police chief) have provided nothing but stonewalling and lies. They wrote me and told me that they will not begin shooting before 9 a.m., yet shooting continually begins at 8:30 a.m. The Waldwick police chief announced in June that the department would be implementing measures to "muffle" the sound of the range. This is not true. They have actually expanded the size of the range.

When questioned about the schedule of the range, Waldwick officials refuse to provide answers. Basically, their reply is that the range is open Monday through Saturday from 9 a.m. until sundown. They have publicly stated they have no intention of altering the range's hours. The only other outdoor pistol range in Bergen County — the county training facility in Mahwah — has restricted hours to Monday through Friday, 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

How would these officials like to come home from work and sit down to dinner with their family over the sound of gunfire. These officials have no concern whatsoever for our quality of life. They have been quoted as saying that we are a bunch of newcomers who are "stirring up trouble." Is asking for a neighborhood free from the sound of gunfire too much to ask for? Why should our children grow

up being able to distinguish between different calibers of weapons? Isn't this why we move to towns like Allendale and Waldwick? So that our children can grow up safely, with good schools and in a nice, peaceful neighborhood. They could hear less gunfire growing up in the worst sections of the South Bronx.

The range is within 100 feet of residential neighborhoods. It is also situated in the middle of a park, where baseball games are played on a regular basis. There are also swings and beautiful play areas for young children. I have had people tell me that they visited "that park" with their children unaware of the pistol range until shooting began. One woman told me that she grabbed her kids and "hit the dirt." Her friend then ran over and comforted her and informed her of the range. She refuses to go back to that park.

It's time the officials of Waldwick forget about themselves and remember whom they're here to serve: the people. Give the parks back to the children and the ball fields back to the ball players. Make our neighborhoods quiet and peaceful again. Shut the range down or enclose it, but make the sound of gunfire go away.

Cross Country Champions

Riders face special challenges, find special friends

BERGEN COUNTY — When Mahwah resident Joan Schneider goes looking for a horse, she knows what she's really looking for is a friend.

That's because whatever animal she chooses will be entrusted with carrying one of the 20 physically and mentally challenged equestrians who participate in a program called S.T.E.E.D. (Special Therapeutic Education in Equestrian Development).

"Throughout the years, we

have trained people with every conceivable disability," said Schneider. "Many of our riders go to physical therapy courses, but after a while these tend to get routine and monotonous ... Riding is a great boost to their self esteem."

The program's beginnings can be traced to the mid-1970s and a group of horse owners who belonged to the Amateur Horseman's Association who would gather every month to hear lectures from representatives of breed groups and vet-

eranarians. One of these lecturers told the Association about riding programs for the disabled. Her speech motivated a number of members to begin donating money to therapeutic riding programs around the state.

"Then we realized there was a need in this area for a similar program," said Schneider.

S.T.E.E.D. was established in 1978 and quickly grew, but because of the special challenges involved with the program, those in charge limited participation to no more than 20 riders.

That's not to say that more people aren't involved. The program boasts a network of several caring coaches, volunteers and a number of horses.

"I loved the program," said Waldwick resident and former S.T.E.E.D. equestrienne Mary Kate Savage-Barrow. "There was lots of good scenery and fresh air." Barrow rode with the program for many years.

Each member rides 12 times per year — six times in the spring, six times in the fall. "That's because the kids can't take the hot or the cold," explained program Administrator and Waldwick resident Joan Savage. "Parents sign their children up because it's such a great program. It does so much for the riders physically and emotionally." Joan is Mary Kate's mother.

Every Sunday during "riding season," the riders and their families pile into vans and drive to a stable in Pomona, N.Y. that was once owned by actor Burgess Meredith.

Though they are alone on the horse, each rider has two "sidewalkers" assigned to them to prevent any mishaps.

Savage and Schneider recounted happily many of the unexpected breakthroughs they have witnessed since be-

coming involved with the program. "We once had a 35-year-old non-verbal man who was brought to us for muscle exercise. We get everyone to give their horses riding commands," said Schneider.

"When other riders verbally told their horses to go, his horse stayed. After a while, he said 'Walk on!' — Those were his first words in many years.

According to Schneider, horses seem to know that they have a disabled person on their backs. "They act altogether different," she said.

Sometimes the benefits riders get from the program are neither seen nor heard. Like with any pet, the riders form a bond with their horses and that enables both rider and horse relate better to other people.

S.T.E.E.D.'s equestrians don't always take to the saddle for therapeutic purposes. In addition to the six lessons given in the spring and fall, those who are able to compete do so as well.

"We were the only program in New Jersey to send a woman rider to the Special Olympics" for several years, said Schneider. In 1987, Waldwick resident Jackie Altieri brought home two gold medals. To do so,

she had to negotiate an obstacle course and demonstrate her equitation (the basic skills needed in handling a horse).

In 1991, Mary Kate took home the gold and bronze medals in equitation and showmanship. "I won't forget it," said Joan. "They count down the rider's places from last to

first. I kept getting more excited as my daughter's name wasn't called."

As this season's riding comes to a close, the members of S.T.E.E.D.'s happy herd will take with them the feeling of accomplishment and memories of how good it feels to saddle up and ride into the sunset.

Waldwick takes charge in the second half

FRANKLIN LAKES — For the first time in a long while, Waldwick was getting roughed up. And the Warriors didn't like it.

They didn't know how to handle Ramsey's tough-guy tactics throughout the first half of Sunday's Bergen County boys soccer tournament quarterfinal. Third-seeded Waldwick, though, pressed the attack in the second, responded in kind with aggressive play of its own, and posted a 2-0 victory.

Ron Russo added a goal at the 38-minute mark of the second half off a scramble in front of the net. It was Russo's 21st goal of the season. Paul Del Valle assisted on both scores.

"We knew coming in Ramsey was physical and that they would go hard to the ball," Russo said. "They play a lot like we have played. They are very aggressive. I wasn't really worried at the half, though. We've played in a lot of big games before and we know how to

State won't interfere in shooting range situation

A letter from State Assemblywoman Charlotte Vandervalk to the mayor of Waldwick is being quietly interpreted by Allendale officials as a hands-off attitude to the demands of some Allendale residents that the police pistol range just across the Waldwick border reduce its activities.

"I am certain that you agree with me that such a situation should not create animosities between the towns, but can be settled equitably without the need for State legislation," Vandervalk wrote to Waldwick Mayor Rick Vander Wende, with a copy to Allendale Mayor Albert Klomburg.

Vandervalk said in her letter that she had been contacted by a number of Allendale residents about the firing range in Waldwick, where Allendale residents charge that the noise has become almost unbearable, particularly in the past year

or so.

"Many such ranges exist in or near residential areas throughout the state with little or no controversy," Vandervalk said. "I am concerned, however, that the complaints against this particular pistol range have escalated. Normally, the operations of such facilities and any matters pertaining thereto are left to the local governmental agencies involved for settlement. However, outdoor firing ranges do enjoy an exemption under state law, and members of the community have, therefore, contacted my office for a legislative remedy."

Vandervalk told Waldwick officials that she hoped they and Allendale officials would cooperate to work out their problems.

"I understand that the borough (of Waldwick) is planning to mitigate the noise problem by constructing concrete

walls and planting an alley of trees," she said. "I assume that the range is operated in a manner similar to that employed by the Bergen County Police and Fire Academy, that specific hours of operation are posted, that all necessary insurance policies are in force, and that qualified supervision is onsite during all hours of operation. There is concern that firing ranges which have been maintained continuously since January 24, 1972 and, therefore, are covered under P.L. (Public Law) 1991, Chapter 391, should be upgraded to accommodate safely the weapons used today."

Several of the concerns mentioned in Vandervalk's letter were expressed at a meeting two weeks ago in which a number of residents who live near the site charged that the range is open until sundown and on weekends, while the Bergen County Police and Fire Academy Range operates from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., with no nights or weekends. Residents, supported by several Allendale Council members, said that the noise and use of the range have increased tremendously in the past year or so.

The council told the residents that the range was "grandfathered." In other words, it has been around so long that it antedates the zoning ordinances that might have otherwise forbidden it. Some council members said that they would pursue attempts to reduce the friction between the neighbors and the range after further study. Others pointed out that the range had been operating when most of the residents bought their houses and that this factor should have

been considered when the homes were purchased. Some of those who spoke against the range have lived in Allendale less than a year.

Some long-term residents who joined the newcomers in objecting said, however, that the range had not been as noisy in the past as it is now - possibly due to the introduction of more powerful police handguns. They urged that the council show disapproval of the excessive noise and excessive hours they say take place at the range.

Bands get their chance to be heard

Producer books time at Paramus studio

Everyone wants to discover the new Pearl Jam. Every new Pearl Jam wants to be discovered.

But one plus one doesn't always equal two in today's corporate music world, and that's where Glen Ridge producer John D. Rollo comes in.

Over the next week, the two-time Grammy-winning producer will be taping more than 100 unsigned local bands at the Apres midi studio in Paramus, looking for the lightning to strike.

Which isn't easy if you're the lightning.

"I was so nervous today, I got sick," said guitarist-singer Paul Tummolo, 29, of Rockland County, N.Y., whose "melodic hard rock" band The Alliance is based in Bergen County.

It was just one of a dozen bands that took their places Monday behind the glass partitions of the 48-track studio that normally charges \$100 an hour.

"Great — that was cooking," said chief studio engineer Roy McDonald into the intercom, after the alternative-rock band Nothing Yet did the

second of three takes of their song "Crawl in You."

"We've never recorded live like this — we didn't even have time to be nervous," said Alex Guider, 27, of Suffern, N.Y., lead singer of the Waldwick-based band.

Producer Rollo has bought more than a week's worth of 12- to 15-hour days in the studio. He's bringing in bands whose sounds range from alternative rock to folk to blues to hard rock to jazz fusion. Each band gets a free hour in a top-notch studio, a cassette of their work, and a critique. Rollo gets — with luck — some artists he can groom, manage, and market to a major label.

"If I went to clubs, it could take months to see this many bands," said Rollo, who has worked with stars like The Kinks, Jimmy Cliff, Joe Cocker, and Eric Clapton, and won Grammys for his work on Cliff's "Cliff Hanger" and "Bodyguard" albums.

"They really are under a microscope in a recording studio," said Rollo, a London native. "The people who are really gifted and talented will shine."

The producer and the artists see this mass audition as a kinder, gentler alternative to the brutal star-making process of most record labels.

"There are lots of good bands that no one gives a chance," said Nothing Yet's Guider.

"This is a chance for people to hear us, who wouldn't know we were alive," said the band's bass player, Bryan Sabella, 24 of Mahwah.

Gone are the days when a fledgling Elvis or Fats Domino could cut a 45 in a local studio, slip it to a radio DJ (perhaps with a few dollars under the table), and get a public hearing.

With MTV, tight radio formats, and corporate-dictated musical trends, local talent is finding it harder than ever to get a break. Unsigned bands have to get at least 500 people to come to prime time club dates (9 p.m. to 11 p.m. Monday through Thursday) before a scout for a record label would even begin to take them seriously. Even then, prospects are grim.

"You have a one in 10 chance, even if you're signed, of the album rolling off the shelf," said producer Blais Ruelle, of Class Act Inc. of Waldwick, who brought several of his acts to the recording marathon.

Election Results

Republicans retained control of the council as Democrat challenger JoAnn Mitchell lost to incumbent Republicans Edwin Sherman and Arthur Barthold.

Republican Mayor Rick Vander Wende ran unopposed.

Sherman and Barthold received 1,243 and 1,134 votes, respectively. Mitchell received 692 votes.

Vander Wende garnered the highest total, with 1,367 votes.

Voter turnout was unavailable after the polls closed.

During the campaign, Republican candidates insisted on maintaining a stable tax rate and controlling government spending.

Vander Wende, Sherman, and Barthold said donations from local businesses and corporations would take a burden away from taxpayers and allow the borough to make necessary improvements.

Mitchell said she fears that a recent ordinance allowing tax abatements for home improvements will only delay another big tax increase for a few years.

Vander Wende, Sherman, and Barthold said borough zoning must maintain high standards to prevent further overdevelopment, homes need to be cared for to keep the town looking fresh and vital, and playgrounds and roads need to be repaired and improved.

Mitchell said she is uncertain how the council proposes to keep Waldwick looking good without raising taxes, and would prefer that some of the improvements be done piecemeal, to cause the least financial stress on the municipality.

Vander Wende, 38, of Rustic Drive is vice president of sales and marketing for Royal China and Porcelain Co. in Moorestown, and a Planning Board member.

Sherman, 36, of Grove Street is an architect for Mader, Smyth, Buynounouski & Associates and chairman of the borough recreation department.

Barthold, 60, of Lincoln Place is a co-owner of Barthold Home Improvements and is a Planning Board member.

Mitchell, 40, of Donald Place is sales administrator for Sandvik & Coromant Co. and president of the library board.

Road repair hits roadblock

Contractors' bids for Dora Ave. repairs were some \$50K too high

WALDWICK — The Borough Council will readvertise for bidding on the Dora Avenue construction because recent bidding on the work came in higher than the council wanted to spend on the project.

Council officials have put the price tag on the project at \$270,000. The project will be partially funded by a \$100,000 New Jersey Transportation Trust Fund grant. The other \$170,000 will be borrowed

through a municipal bond to pay the contractor as well. The bond will be repaid over a 12 year period.

However, bids received from the council within the last month came in a lot higher than officials expected, about \$50,000 to 100,000 more. Now, the council will readvertise the bidding for January. Since independent contractors have less contracts in the winter months, bids tend to be lower, leaving officials to believe

they'll have better luck then.

Should a contractor be hired, Dora Avenue reconstruction is expected to begin in the spring and last about three months.

Dora Avenue is a residential street needing to be repaved, officials said. Other parts of the street need repaving of the sidewalk and curbs.

Areas of the street have no curbing, Administrator Gary Kratz said. The outer edge of the street is cracked and getting worse.

The roads will be rebuilt in the spring when the price will be less expensive, sources said.

The grant from the New Jersey Transportation Trust Fund

is funded by the gas tax.

"Each year the council tries to pick up another street and we (the council) went right down the line," Councilman Scott W. Stahlman said. Dora Avenue has not had any repairs done in about 20 years.

Wanamaker Avenue will probably be the next one that goes in for repair, Stahlman added.

Kratz said there will be times when the street will have to be closed during reconstruction.

Dora Avenue runs parallel to East Prospect Street right behind Borough Hall and goes all

the way down to Route 17.

Maple Avenue was recently repaved and Dora Avenue is expected to be a similar project.

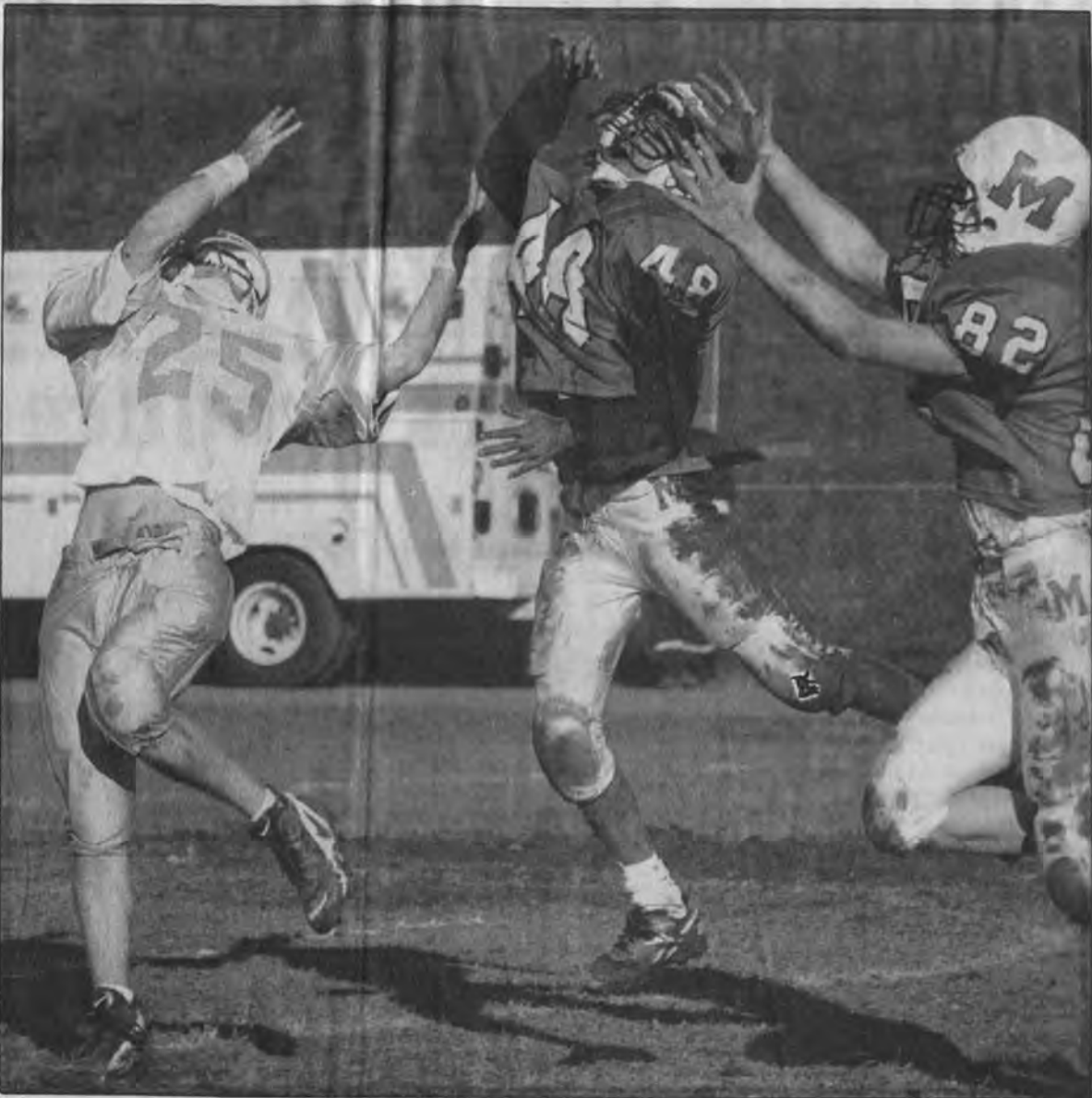

Waldwick loses, 14-6, in mudbath

WALDWICK — Manchester scored both of its touchdowns Saturday with no time left on the clock. Waldwick head coach Neil Johnson had a problem with the Falcons' last score that made the final of 14-6.

"I was very upset with the decision of the Manchester coach (Mike Columbo) to go for another touchdown with four seconds left in the game," said Johnson of the four-yard running play. "The game was over, and we had no timeouts left. I guess it was a big deal to make it 14-6 instead of 8-6!"

A more gracious host would have had his quarterback kneel on the turf.

And it was a muddy turf that both teams had to slosh through, as the Manchester field, which used to be a lake and has a valley-like setting at the bottom of a hill, had not recovered from Wednesday's sustained rains.

"The field conditions were horrible," Johnson said. "I couldn't even walk on our sideline (which still had puddles of water). Our field on Saturday was in great condition."

And it was an ugly game with turnovers setting the tone early. Waldwick (3-4) fumbled on the third play of the opening quarter, but quickly got the ball back when tackle Ryan Candrilli recovered a fumble at the Warrior 18-yard line to defuse a 45-yard Falcon drive. Prior to the 6-foot-1, 180-pound sophomore's key pounce, end Jim Patunas recorded a quarterback sack.

Manchester's next series ended with a bad snap on a punt, with the loose ball recovered by Yamil Aranda, who also batted down two passes.

It appeared that it would be a scoreless first half, until Manchester completed a 36-yard pass to the Waldwick two-yard line with five seconds remaining. Without a timeout being called, the clock mysteriously stopped, as the Falcons lined up for the next play. Their quarterback spiked the ball, and now there were two seconds left, time enough for halfback Jante Tsay to rush unrestricted into the end zone. Tsay also ran the ball in for the conversion.

Midway through the final quarter, Waldwick received excellent field position on a bad snap to the Manchester punter, who slipped while trying to run with the ball, only to be downed at the seven-yard line. From there, Kevin Luccarelli scored on a dive, but the conversion pass failed.

Tsay, who went over the 1,000-yard rushing mark with a 147-yard performance to give him 1,101 on the season, scored all 14 points for Manchester (4-4).

The Warriors rushed for 111 yards on 30 carries, led by tailback Matt Servilio (15-for-66), fullback Marlon Falco (8-for-22) and Luccarelli (6-for-25). For the season, Waldwick has rushed for 1,308 yards in 260 attempts.

Waldwick played without its second-leading tackler — outside linebacker Sean "Willie" Wilson — and defensive end Rob Christie, both of whom were ill.

"Jim Patunas played the best game of his life at right end," Johnson said. "I don't think they gained one yard around his side, and they tried about eight times. They got absolutely nothing." Patunas registered five solo tackles and one assist.

Falco, at middle linebacker, paced the defense with six solo tackles and five assists, followed by tackle Joe Calafiore and safety Matt Sugrue, who each had nine tackles, outside linebacker Aranda (8), cornerback Tony Stanziano (6), cornerback Chris Heid (5), nose tackle Eric Anderson (4) and end Frank Occhipinti (4).

"Falco did a tremendous job," Johnson praised. "This kid never comes off the field. And Aranda made great plays on defense. Stanziano was taking on guards in the secondary and played a great game, too."

Boys county soccer tourney hits semis

With the weatherman finally cooperating, the quarterfinal round of the Bergen County boys soccer tournament was completed the past weekend, and when the dust (or was it mud?) settled, four local teams remained alive in the quest for the championship.

This Sunday, at a site undetermined at presstime, the semifinal doubleheader will pit unseeded Bergen Catholic against fourth-seeded Ridgewood at 11:30 a.m., followed by third-seeded Waldwick and second-seeded Don Bosco at approximately 1:30.

If regular season contests are any indication, then the BC-Ridgewood game will be one in which the first goal is likely to be the deciding goal. The two teams played to a 0-0 tie in midseason, and a second encounter has been postponed due to inclement weather to date.

The Crusaders come into the game with only the county title to play for, as they dropped a 1-0 decision to Seton Hall Prep on Tuesday in the Parochial A North semifinals.

The loss dropped Bergen to 11-4-4 and took some of the momentum out of first-year head coach Jim McGirr's team that was gained in a 3-2 shootout win over top-seeded Englewood in the quarterfinals.

Matt Morales had his team-leading 13th goal in the win over Englewood, and Felix Alegria netted his sixth of the year to forge the 2-2 tie, and after a 4-4 draw in the first round of penalty kicks, sophomore Anthony Pagano and senior Ryan Coyne each connected for a second time in the penalty phase to give BC the victory.

Ridgewood, which went into their match with Kennedy in a Group 4 sectional semifinal

Waldwick, Ridgewood head to final

FRANKLIN LAKES — A transplanted goalie and a defender who hadn't scored a goal all season were the major reasons that Waldwick and Ridgewood advanced Sunday into the Bergen County boys soccer tournament championship game.

Two years ago, Emeka Ofodile was brilliant in goal as he led Waldwick into the Bergen and State finals. This time around he's playing in the field and his goal gave the Warriors a 1-0 win over Don Bosco Prep.

In the opening game, fullback Andy Coppolecchia scored early in the second half to give Ridgewood

a 2-1 win over Bergen Catholic.

Since the season officially ends Friday, the championship game must be played by then. The time and site are up in the air, pending on how Waldwick makes out in this afternoon's Group 1 State semifinal game against Mountain Lakes.

opening game, it appeared Ridgewood and BC would repeat their scoreless regular season meeting. But with two minutes to go in the half, the Maroons' Craig Myatt broke a trap with a feed to an open Chris Hudson, who scored.

"Earlier they caught me twice in the trap," said Hudson. "This time I laid back and he gave me a great pass."

The Crusaders (11-5-4) tied it early in the second half on a Matt Morales goal. But 10 minutes later Coppolecchia converted the winner.

"The ball bounced off a player back to me," said the fullback, "and I one-touched it in for my first goal."

"We were able to control the game," said coach Dick Bennett. "And we had their trap scouted. We had a real good game from our sweeper Gerard Larkin. And Hudson, who hasn't played much in the last few games, came through big time."

When words
cross the line of
sexual harassment

Passaic High School juniors Diviya Tailor and Ramona Tranculov know the difference between a playful gibe and a sexually harassing comment or gesture.

Their awareness comes from involvement in school clubs like ERASE (End Racism and Sexism Everywhere) and TIGS-TREND (the Teen Institute of the Garden State, Turning Recreation and Excitement in a New Direction).

The 16-year-old students say they're fortunate to meet regularly with other teens and school advisers to talk openly about what constitutes sexual harassment and what to do about it. But they have concerns about their peers.

"It's a big problem, because it's seen in high school every day," Ramona says. "A lot of students don't real-

ize it's disrespectful; the first thing we need to do is teach respect."

"Guy teenagers I know don't consider it harassment, they think it's a joke," Diviya says. "There are probably cases where girls sexually harass guys, but not that I know of, because there aren't many guys who would come out to say they were sexually harassed."

Diviya and Ramona believe the best way to deal with the problem is through awareness-raising discussions among teens and adults.

"We have to talk about sexual harassment, because many of the things someone wouldn't think are harassment — like 'Oh, she has a nice body' — may hurt somebody," Diviya says.

Passaic High TIGS-TREND adviser Minnie Hiller agrees.

"Many times, students have not quite understood that an obscene gesture or comment is harassment. Our organization tries to identify this and have people say 'Stop,'" she says. "It's the same thing for a person who is gay, they shouldn't have to be humiliated or laughed at. Everyone has the right to feel safe, not the right to disrespect someone else."

Any student who is harassed should talk to a friend and a guidance counselor, club adviser, trusted adult, or school faculty member, Hiller says.

"All faculty members have had adult and student sexual-harassment workshops," she says. TIGS and ERASE are joining forces to present skits schoolwide to help people identify sexual harassment.

"What might be offensive to you may not be to others," Hiller says. "When it's offensive to you, it becomes harassment."

Last summer, for example, I was working for a vendor's booth at a community fair in New York City. My job was to walk around the park handing out fliers that advertised the booth and invited people to stop by.

A supposedly interested customer, an older man, called me over and made a big point of asking for a flier. When I handed him one, he ignored it entirely and, staring at my chest, asked if my telephone number came with the flier. He implied that he'd be happy to stop by the booth if I gave him my number.

When I politely said no, he began pressuring me about it in a loud voice. Trying to avoid a scene, I calmly told him that I didn't live in the area and that I had a boyfriend.

Reasoning with him turned out to be the worst thing I could have done. He began to ask in a very loud voice, "Well, baby, what can he do for you?" Now totally disgusted, I said, "Look, I'm only 16." "So? I like 'em young," was his reply. Shocked, I quickly turned and walked away, burning with embarrassment at the sound of his voice yelling after me, telling me to come back. Even though I had been enjoying the work up until that point, I decided to return to the booth and ask for a different duty.

Another occasion marred by harassment was when my girlfriend and I drove to Wildwood to window shop and check out boardwalk activities. When we returned to my friend's car to eat lunch, we were bombarded by a group of men.

To create privacy from their stares, we put a map up over the window, but this only gave them an opening to ask us if we were

lost and needed help. When my friend said no very forcefully, they refused to take the hint and continued to harass us by asking for our telephone numbers and making rude gestures.

Annoyed and a little frightened, we decided to leave the car and walk down the boardwalk to get away from them, but unfortunately our brisk pace wasn't brisk enough. When we saw, to our dismay, that they were gaining on us, we ducked into a store for refuge.

After pretending to be interested in every T-shirt on the racks for about half an hour, we finally mustered up the courage to look out and see if the coast was clear. The guys had gone, so we made a mad dash to my friend's car and left for home.

Due to childish behavior in the form of sexual harassment, men and, to a smaller degree, women can and sometimes do spoil leisure and work environments for the opposite sex. These are just my stories, but, unfortunately, every woman has her own.

Recorded Waldwick gunfire

Dear Editor:

Over 40 of my neighbors appeared before the Allendale Town Council several weeks ago with the intent of emphatically communicating to our elected officials the sense of the terror continually created by the noise generated from the use of the Waldwick pistol range.

Having been before the council several times before and having read too many incomplete articles written by the local press, it was obvious that my neighbors in both Allendale and Waldwick, the Town Council, and those that had strong opinions about the range were not sharing the same facts. In addition, it was important that, together, we HEAR what we are talking about.

Starting on Sunday, May 21, 1995 (I could not believe that they were shooting on Sunday) and several other times during the summer, I set up my camcorder on my lawn to record the sounds generated by the range - located about two football fields away. In addition, I videotaped the recent WABC news story that detailed the misfiring that occurred at an outdoor pistol range in Bernardsville, NJ. This misfiring hit a home 4,000 feet away. My family only lives a few hundred feet away.

With excerpts from these several recordings, I put together a nine-minute video that I played at the recent Town Council meeting. This allowed all of us, together, to share the gut-wrenching feeling created by the sound of gunfire capable of drowning out the sound of children playing only a few yards away. Several of my neighbors saw on videotape, for the first time, their own children playing under the cloud of gunfire.

Within only a few dozen yards of the range in Waldwick is a beautiful playground and a baseball field. Can you imagine gunfire during a baseball game? How do par-

ents bring their children to this playground with 357 Magnums being fired? On a clear day, I can hear the gunfire from the corner of Hillside and West Crescent in Allendale. I cannot understand why not a single Waldwick resident, even one of those living closer to the range than I do, has not complained? Not one. My wife has seen shotguns being used. You have to hold your ears when you stand a hundred feet away. How can my neighbors in Waldwick stand it?

If any of my neighbors in Allendale or Waldwick have questions about the range, please ask questions. Get the facts. Ask the Waldwick Police when the range will be used, visit the cul-de-sac at the bottom of Oakwood Road. Listen.

I would be happy to play my videotape for anyone who is interested.

GROUP 1 BOYS SOCCER FINAL

Waldwick captures first State championship

EWING — The rest of the state is now forced to take note of the best boys soccer team that no one outside Bergen or Passaic County has heard of.

Tiny Waldwick captured its first State title — and extended its season-long winning streak to 23 — by dominating Schalick of Pittsgrove, 2-1, Thursday night in the Group 1 title match at Trenton State.

Senior Gino Miraglia and junior Aaron Kanarvogel scored within a four-minute span early in the second half and senior goalie Ken Tripaldi needed to make just four saves to register what would have been an easy shutout if not

for a referee's whistle and subsequent penalty kick with 8:42 left.

"I think we are, if not the best, then one of the top teams in the state," said Waldwick coach George Farago.

Waldwick (23-0) is the only state team that is unbeaten and untied, and yet the Warriors are nowhere to be found in the top 20 rankings. Waldwick has been overlooked because it is a Group 1 school.

"We're 23-0 and no one has looked at us," said Kanarvogel. "Maybe after winning the State title, people will look at us."

The Warriors said losing in the 1993 State final and losing in last year's semifinals left them determined to return to the championship.

"Two years ago we lost to Haddonfield, a great disappointment," said Farago. "We thought we could get back to the final last year and we lost to Madison. Since that day the kids have made a total effort to get back here. And they played a marvelous game."

The game was scoreless until Miraglia converted a 25-yard direct kick at 43:40. Miraglia fired a straight liner that appeared to be headed right at junior goalie Dan Lorentz, but the shot began slicing right and went into the upper right-hand corner.

Kanarvogel's goal came at 47:20 and also had a wicked slice. Kanarvogel bumped two Cougars off the ball and fired a 17-yard liner that sliced over

Lorentz's head and down into the goal.

Led by senior stopper Mike Jones, senior sweeper Don Smialowicz, and senior midfielder Paul DelValle, the Warriors did a masterful job of holding senior standout Kevin Jackson to one shot.

Yet Jackson was able to earn his 44th goal of the season and 100th of his career thanks to a questionable penalty call in the box when a Cougar was ridden off the ball and either fell down or took a dive. Waldwick maintained its poise, however, and controlled the final minutes.

Waldwick's season is not yet complete. The Warriors face Ridgewood 11 a.m. Saturday in the Bergen County fi-

nal at Bergen Community College. A win there and Waldwick would become the first Bergen school in at least 20 years to go unbeaten and untied.

"I think we can get up for Ridgewood," said Jones, whose Maroons lost the 1993 County final to Ridgewood. "It's payback time. I think we can do it."

Noise meetings begin

Residents near pistol range meet with council regarding range noise

ALLENDALE — Following months of debate, members of the Allendale community who live near the George Bunning Memorial Pistol Range, have begun to meet with members of council.

While details of the meetings have been kept under wraps, Allendale resident Fred Litt was pleased by the initial actions taken by councilman Richard Furfaro and Stephen

Howe, who are in the early stages of gathering facts and information about the site. Both are in the process of setting up regular meetings with a group of concerned residents, including Litt, in the hopes of reaching a possible resolution to the gun range noise pollution dispute, which has angered members of the Allendale community for several months.

Litt, who raised eyebrows at the Oct. 25 Borough Council

meeting by playing a nine-minute home video of neighborhood children playing outdoors, being drowned out by the sound of gun fire from the nearby pistol range, has witnessed an increase in the range's use, as well as the caliber of weapons used there; over the past two years, which has not been explained.

Upon moving to Allendale in the early 1980s, Litt was told that the pistol range was used primarily by security guards for former President Richard Nixon. For close to a decade, the range did not cause many problems in the community,

and was never used on weekends, according to Litt.

In addition to the noise pollution and safety issues, other factors have developed as a result of the pistol range. A couple living in the area who are hoping to adopt a child, claim that the adoption agency has had reservations about allowing a child into a community that includes a nearby pistol range. Another family has reportedly experienced difficulties in their efforts to sell their home, as a result of its close proximity to the range.

With technical advances in the area of guns, Litt and his neighbors realize an increase in sound volume was a possibility, but it was recently pointed out to him, that for the types of weapons being used, the noise is still louder than it should be.

Assemblywoman wants towns to settle dispute

Many Allendale residents have written Assemblywoman Charlotte Vandervalk regarding the noise from the shooting range in Waldwick.

Vandervalk wrote a letter to Waldick Mayor Rick Vander Wende and Allendale Mayor Albert H. Klomberg stating she does not want to get the state involved in the discussion between the two boroughs over the noise of the range.

"Rather than involve the entire State (Assembly) in forcing standards on all outdoor shooting ranges, I would hope that Allendale and Waldwick could reach a mutually agreeable solution," Vandervalk wrote.

She said that as long as the Borough of Waldwick has its insurance in place and operates at hours similar to the range used by the Bergen County Police and Fire Academy, the range is not in violation of codes.

"There is concern that firing ranges which have been maintained continuously since Janu-

ary 24, 1972, and therefore covered under P.L. 1991, Chapter 39, should be upgraded to accommodate safely the weapons used today," Vandervalk said. "I am assuming that the Waldwick shooting range has been in operation prior to 1972 and therefore is exempt from this section of law."

The shooting range has been in place since the late 1950s and is now being upgraded to keep the noise at a minimum.

Many local police departments, including Allendale's, use the range for training and recertification. The range is also used by the Waldwick Pistol and Rifle Club on Saturday mornings.

No group uses magnum or high-caliber ammunition, except when the police departments have combat training on occasional weekday afternoons.

Vandervalk, in her letter, said she would be interested in helping the two boroughs come together on the subject.

Waldwick shoots for it all

PARAMUS — Waldwick has a chance to establish a boys soccer record no other team can ever surpass when it takes on Ridgewood this morning for the Bergen County championship at Bergen Community College.

The Warriors (23-0) have won the State Group 1 and the Bergen-Passaic Scholastic League Carpenter championships. And a win today (kickoff is set for 11 a.m.) would give them three crowns and a perfect record.

But in order to do that, they'll have to get past Ridgewood coach Dick Bennett, who will be looking for his eighth championship in the 24-year history of the event.

The Warriors discarded the underdog role, which usually comes when a Group 1 school faces a Group 4 team, when they turned back Don Bosco Prep, 1-0, in the semifinal round. After that game, the Dons went on to win the State Parochial A championship.

And two years ago, Waldwick shocked everyone by reaching the County championship game, where it lost to Ridgewood, 2-1.

Emeka Ofodile, who was in goal for that contest, is now playing up front, where he's produced 14 goals, including the winner against Don Bosco. But half of the Warriors' defense in the Ridgewood game — sweeper Don Smialowicz and stopper Mike Jones — are back seeking revenge against the Maroons.

The defense, led by goalie Ken Tripaldi (11 shutouts), has yielded only 11 goals this season. In contrast, the Warriors have scored 94.

"The difference between that team is that this club can score goals in bunches," says coach George Farago.

Ron Russo leads Waldwick with 23 goals, Paul Del Valle has 16, and junior surprise Aaron Kanarvogel has 15.

This has been a tough week for Ridgewood, as it bowed to Clifton and Bergen Catholic in Northern New Jersey Interscholastic League Atlantic contests.

"I was very disappointed the way we played against Clifton [3-0]," says Bennett. "Considering that was for the league title, we just didn't play hard enough. And against Bergen Catholic we rested our regulars and used young players. That was a fun game [5-3] as they played their hearts out in their first varsity game."

As for today's game, Bennett says, "I don't know what to expect, but I feel this time we'll come out playing hard. Since

Waldwick does a lot of things well, such as moving the ball, we'll have to play the game of our lives to win."

Attempting to throw a halter on the explosive Waldwick attack will be stopper Kevin Carr — a Waldwick resident. And behind him is ace sweeper Gerard Larkin, who links with full-backs Andy Coppolecchia, whose only goal of the season gave the Maroons a 2-1 win over Bergen Catholic in the semifinals, and Spencer Wolfson.

The key to victory will probably be which team scores first.

Allendale basin suit settled out of court

ALLENDALE/WALDWICK — The Borough of Waldwick settled a legal dispute with Allendale out of court over the property at 1 Shulyer Road, Allendale.

The settlement will cost the Borough of Waldwick \$25,000 but would free them of any future legal responsibility regarding the Allendale property.

The litigation was initiated in 1994 by Beverly Mellick, who wants the basin removed and the property restored to its condition prior to 1977. The basin was installed then to pre-

vent flooding on the properties of Waldwick residents on the other side of the brook.

"It was a joint venture with Allendale," said Waldwick Councilman Scott Stahlmann. "Apparently there was litigation that went back and forth and it will cost the borough \$25,000, but it is worth it because the borough will no longer be held responsible."

Mellick sought to have the basin removed because she felt that it was dangerous for children and was a

health hazard.

"Garbage and dead animals would come down stream and stop at the basin," she said. "It is also very deep and the material is unstable, like quick sand."

She described the basin as being eight-feet deep and being dangerous for the 50 children in the who live in the neighborhood. She noted that the basin was fenced off but the health hazards were as potentially dangerous as someone climbing over the fence. She said the basin is also a breeding place for mosquitoes.

Mellick first went to the Allendale Mayor and Council to have the basin removed. She began legal proceedings against Allendale after the complaints were not getting her anywhere. Allendale then began legal proceedings against Waldwick.

"I'm glad it is being resolved and fixed," Mellick said. "I'm sorry Waldwick has to pay, but it was totally funded with public money when it was built."

Dream finale for Waldwick

PARAMUS — The Waldwick dream season ended the way it started Saturday with the Warriors capturing their 24th victory in as many starts and their first Bergen County boys soccer championship.

In order to complete the trifecta — Bergen-Passaic Scholastic League, State Group 1, and Bergen crowns — the Warriors had to come from behind in the second half to defeat tough Ridgewood, 2-1, at Bergen Community College.

"I don't know what to say," said an almost speechless George Farago. "To have a team so committed to achieving goals, and really doing it, is absolutely fantastic."

Right from the start of the season the Warriors made known their goals with T-shirts that read, "County finals, State finals, unfinished business." And for the first time in the school's history they accomplished their mission.

However, Ridgewood (14-4-4) wasn't about to hand Waldwick a perfect season without a battle. And when the Maroons struck for an early goal, the Warriors were stunned.

Ridgewood dominated the first half, winning most of the 50-50 balls and disrupting the Warriors' passing game. It forced Waldwick to put the ball in the air where taller Ridgewood plays its best.

"I know I was taken aback by how they came out," said Aaron Kanarvogel, who seven minutes into the second half headed in Gino Miraglia's pretty corner kick for his 16th goal. That proved to be the needed wake-up call because from that point on Wald-

wick lifted its game to where it has been all season.

And with 16 minutes left, Emeka Ofodile volleyed in a header pass from Paul Del Valle for his 15th goal. A Mike Jones throw-in initiated the winning play.

"I'm pleased because our kids played very, very well," said Ridgewood coach Dick Bennett, who was seeking his eighth County championship. "And if we had converted another one of our first-half chances, I feel we could have won. It was a game where we reached our potential against a very good team."

The two teams met for the title two years ago with Ridgewood winning by the identical score. And in that one, Ofodile was in goal while Miraglia and Kanarvogel rode the bench.

"It was kind of a personal vendetta," said a smiling Ofodile, who also put in the winning goal against Don Bosco Prep in the semifinal round. "This takes away the sting."

Ofodile turned in a strong performance against a Ridgewood man-to-man defense. "We didn't play well in the first half," said Ofodile, "but once we scored, we got into our game."

Both coaches agreed that the tying goal was the turning point. "We decided at halftime that I would go to the far post on corner kicks," said Kanarvogel. "And I saw the ball come in and just headed it."

Waldwick boys win state soccer title

It is often said that the first time is the best time, so you have to excuse the Waldwick boys soccer players if they seem as though they are about three feet off the ground this weekend.

The Warriors completed their main quest and took home their first-ever Group 1 state championship with a 2-1 win over Schalick (17-4) of Pittsgrove Thursday night.

The win gave them a 23-0 record, the only soccer team in the state to remain unbeaten and untied, but they don't have the luxury of being able to take that game into the winter.

With the rainy weather that has plagued the fall sports season, the county tournament final has been pushed back two weeks, leaving the Warriors to face Ridgewood on Saturday at Bergen Community College.

Should they also take the county title, Waldwick will become the first team out of Bergen county to go undefeated and untied in more than 20 seasons.

How much emotion the Warriors still have left for the county title match is questionable, as they used a pair of second half goals to overcome a late penalty kick and gain the win over Schalick.

Gino Miraglia got the scoring started early in the second half with a direct kick for his second goal of the year. His 25-yard blast curled into the upper right hand corner.

Aaron Kanarvogel continued his goal-scoring run in the late season with what proved to be the game-winner four minutes later, hitting a 17-yarder that

bent over the goaltender and into the net.

It was the junior's 15th goal of the year, with eight coming in the last seven games and seven in the five state tournament games.

A penalty kick allowed Schalick on the board with 8:42 left, but the Warrior defense shut down the Cougars otherwise, as Ken Tripaldi needed only 4 saves in goal. The senior combination of stopper Mike Jones, sweeper Don Smialowicz and midfielder Paul DelValle contained Schalick's Kevin Jackson, who got his 44th goal on the penalty shot but was not a major factor otherwise.

The Warriors will now look to follow a pattern that the state championship started when they face Ridgewood in the county final. Two years ago, they lost to the Maroons in the county final and were beaten in the state final by Haddonfield.

Ridgewood comes in 14-3-4, with two losses in regular season play on Wednesday and Thursday.

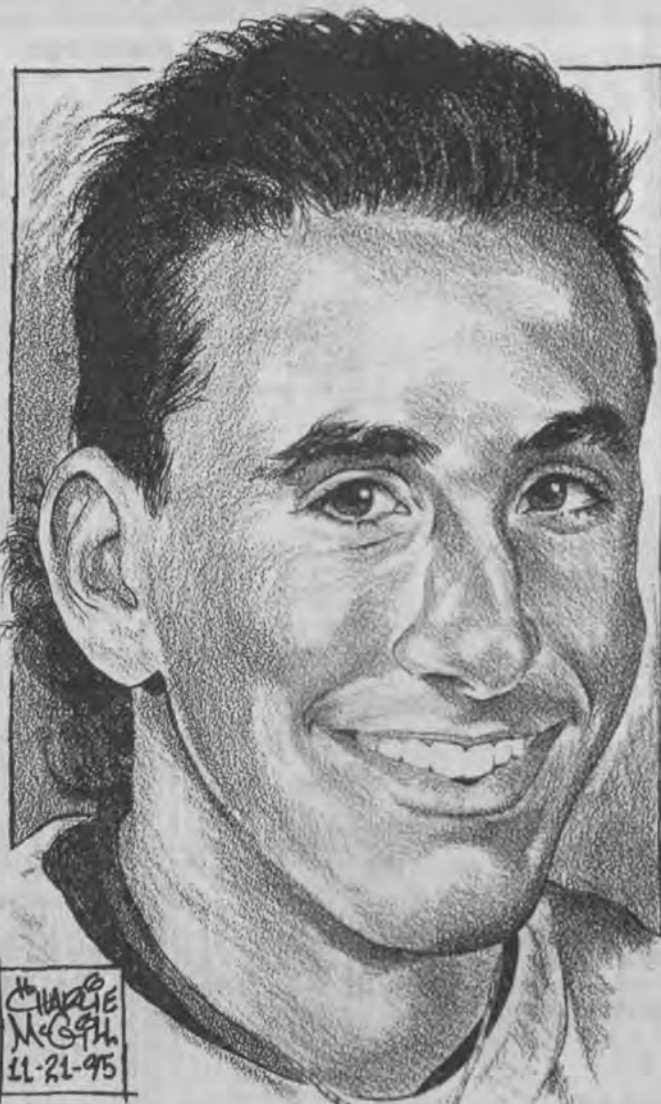
Kanarvogel is starting to think about college. "I certainly want to go to a school where I can play," he says. "I'm not sure what I'll study, maybe advertising or business management."

Waldwick works to address Allendale's range woes

Waldwick Police Chief Daniel Lupo said that the borough expects to be working to soothe at least some of Allendale residents' concerns about noises coming from the police pistol range, but he warned that Waldwick would only go so far in correcting problems, which he implied may have been exaggerated. The range, which is located within Waldwick, is close to the Allendale border.

"There's only so much we can do about this," said Chief Lupo, adding that the range has been in Waldwick since 1959. The chief said that he believes the range is legally exempt from some of the standards which residents have cited in attempts to shut it down or reduce the hours of use.

One thing that Waldwick would almost certainly not do, Chief Lupo said, was to completely enclose the range - a move that would cost an estimated \$500,000, according to a statement at a recent Allendale Council meeting.

"You have to remember that if you enclose it, you have to ventilate it, and that gets into some big money and big

problems too," Chief Lupo said.

He said, however, that plans call for an expansion of the range building, though not of the firing range itself. He added that building a classroom area over the top of the firing zone should act as a natural sound buffer and significantly reduce the noise that residents have complained about.

In Allendale, the range issue has been the subject of at least three heated council meetings in which residents, some recent and some long-term Allendale property owners, have complained that the noise from the range makes outdoor living insufferable.

Residents have charged that the noise worsened significantly in the past year or 18 months, and urged that, if the range can't be closed entirely, it should be restricted to regular 9 to 5 hours and limited to police officers only.

The issue, in fact, led to a short-notice contested election in Allendale, with write-in candidates Dave Duffy and John Keramedjian garnering 453 votes and 412 votes (respectively) on a two-week write-in campaign where more dras-

tic action against the range was the main issue. The winners of the election were Republican incumbents Robert E. Patterson, with 611 votes, and Lawrence R. Pinck with 565 votes. The relatively close election with such a short campaign was seen as one indication of just how intense feeling about the range is in the section of Allendale within earshot.

Lupo acknowledged that some measures should be taken to reduce noise and the impact on Allendale residents, but he said some of the rhetoric was counter-productive and dubious.

"I'd like to know the name of the adoption agency that denied a couple a child because they were located near a firing range," Chief Lupo said dryly. "And some other guy finds it significant that we're using 'German-made weapons' - come on, really."

Allendale Council members have promised to keep studying and negotiating the problem, but since the range is within Waldwick's jurisdiction, Allendale officials say, interregional cooperation is essential to resolve the problem.

Falco, Luccarelli find Land of Oz for Waldwick in Kansas Shootout

MIDLAND PARK — In a land where dreams come true, Waldwick survived a tie-breaking shootout with arch-rival Midland Park to punctuate the 29th football meeting between the two neighboring towns, as it took a third, and final, overtime to decide the winner of a scoreless struggle on Thanksgiving Day.

The Kansas Shootout, used elsewhere in the country for years but only introduced to New Jersey high school football this season, saw the Warriors carve out an exhausting 6-0 victory.

In the tie breaker format, limited to three overtime periods, each team receives the ball at the opponents' 25-yard line and has four downs in which to score via a touchdown or a field goal; no time is kept on the clock.

Waldwick, which now leads the series with the Parkers at 18-10-1, finished with a 4-5 record for the second straight year. Midland Park sustained its third consecutive 1-8 season.

In the fictitious Land of Oz based in Kansas, it was the wizardry of Waldwick nose tackle Kevin Luccarelli that repelled the Parkers twice and finally preserved the coveted win for his team. The senior ended his career in stunning style by blocking a field goal and recording a huge quarterback sack in the shootout.

Luccarelli's final spin ended the game, when, on a 4th-and-3 from the 18-yard line, he stormed in, like a Kansas tornado, and brought Rick Hornby to the turf at the 29. It was strictly a one-on-one confrontation, as Luccarelli used his speed to down the dangerous junior quarterback, who entered the game with 1,520 passing yards for the season.

Waldwick had the ball first in the third overtime and scored from the 14, when fullback Marlon Falco sprinted around the left side to end the scoring famine.

In the first overtime, Midland Park had the last possession, but started operations at the seven-yard line. That was due to what happened on the previous play. Waldwick, facing a 4th-and-9 from the 24, had tailback Matt Servilio pass to slotback Chris Heid, who appeared to catch the ball at the five. The sideline ref thought otherwise, calling it a catch off the ground, and that fueled the calling of two penalties on the irate Warriors.

Waldwick's defense stiffened, though, pushing the Panthers back to the 10 on fourth down. That's when Luccarelli bolted through to block a 28-yard field-goal try. Just prior to that

attempt, the Warriors caught a break, when a Midland Park receiver, open in the front, right corner of the end zone, dropped a pass near the ground.

In the second overtime, the Parkers, with the ball first, reached the 17 before a fourth-down incompletion. The Warriors, spurred by a Servilio nine-yard run, then drove the ball to the five from where quarterback Tom Willoughby, on a 4th-and-1, dove forward, but could not get the first down.

So on to the third overtime the two teams went, probably not the feeling the bitter cold that was fueled by a biting wind that made the toes of the faithful tingle.

Servilio took the Warriors to the 18 on the first play; Luccarelli added a yard, and then freshman quarterback Tom Guy ran three yards to the 14

from where Falco became one of the game's heroes.

Midland Park started its final drive by losing two yards, courtesy of a Jim Patunas tackle. Bill Saunders then picked up five yards before Hornby passed four yards to Mike Seltenrich, who was stopped on a fine tackle by Frank Occhipinti. Then, on 4th-and-3, Luccarelli stepped into the final frame of the season for both teams.

Regulation time had ended with a Hornby interception at the Midland Park 33, where he was tackled by Servilio.

Waldwick actually scored in the second quarter, but Luccarelli's 14-yard run off a reverse was called back by a holding infraction. Luccarelli himself had set up the Warriors in good position to score by recovering a fumble at the Midland Park 26-yard line.

The game, marred by numerous penalties, mostly on Waldwick and some notably arguable, was accented by several huge plays on defense in the quarterback sacking department.

Waldwick recorded six sacks totalling 63 yards in losses. Occhipinti, at defensive end, was the prime sacker, getting to Hornby twice for minus 19 yards. Patunas, the other end, had one solo sack for minus 11 yards and combined with outside linebacker Sean Wilson for a four-yard takedown. Tackle Eric Anderson had the big one of the game — a 19-yarder.

Midland Park had two sacks, as lineman Patrick Reilly registered an eight-yard loss while combining with linebacker Mark Berninger and end Ken Junta — all sophomores — for a minus nine-yard takedown. Junta, at 6-foot-6, 200 pounds, batted down two passes at the line with his long reach.

District Welcomes New Administrators

Two new administrators joined the staff of the Junior Senior High School this fall to replace retirees Dolores Torralbas and John Surak.

Dr. Alan W. Naimoli Appointed Principal

The new principal came to Waldwick from Lakeland Regional High School in Wanaque where he had been principal since 1992. His previous positions include assistant principal at Morris Knolls High School in Denville and Science Supervisor in the Hillside Public Schools.

Dr. Naimoli earned his B.A. degree at Marquette University and his M.A. at Montclair State College. He also completed graduate work in psychology at the New School for Social Research in New York City and earned his doctorate in education at Rutgers University.

Robert E. Klie Named Vice Principal

Robert E. Klie, Jr. became the Vice Principal of the Junior Senior School on November 1. His primary responsibilities involve the Junior School.

An English teacher in Waldwick since 1974, Klie has also held several administrative positions in the Junior Senior School, including Dean of Students, Lead English

Teacher, and Junior School Athletic Director. In addition, he coached girls' varsity basketball for fifteen years during which his team won two state regional championships, six state sectional championships, and eleven league championships.

The new Vice Principal graduated from the University of Nebraska with a B.A. in

English. He also holds an M.A. in educational administration and supervision from Jersey City State College. He received the Governor's Teacher Recognition Award in 1990 and was selected All-Suburban Coach of the Year eight times. He was also named to the Select Circle of Coaches by *Scholastic Coach* magazine.

Waldwick Among Top 15 Schools in New Jersey

New Jersey magazine named Waldwick Junior Senior High School as one of the 15 most impressive public high schools in the state. An additional 30 schools were identified as runners-up.

Three prominent New Jersey educators looked at how well New Jersey schools cope with their special circumstances to "determine which public high schools are meeting or exceeding the challenge of educating our children."

The judges cited Waldwick's award-winning Academic Decathlon and Quiz Bowl teams and several curriculum areas. They said, "The quality and quantity of offerings earns Waldwick High a place as one of the best overall high schools in the state." The judges concluded, "Waldwick Junior Senior High School offers a variety of courses and experiences to meet the needs of all of the students."



Junior School Teachers Organized Into Teams

"I think of it as quadrupling your resources," explained Christine Perkins, an eighth grade social studies teacher.

Since September, Junior School teachers have been organized into separate teams to teach seventh and eighth grade students. Each team includes a math, a science, an English, and a social studies teacher who meet daily to coordinate interdisciplinary learning activities and discuss curriculum and classroom management. At least once a week the meetings include administrators.

"Grade-level teams provide a more family oriented atmosphere for the students," said Robert Klie, the new Vice Principal of the Junior Senior School. "During their common planning periods, teachers talk about the specific needs of individual students and design appropriate strategies," he added.

The team approach provides an easier transition from the elementary to the junior school, according to social studies teacher Perkins. Teachers work to build team identity through common themes, banners, mottoes, and special activities, such as the academic and field competitions held at the end of Spirit Week in October.

In addition, each team has a common homework policy. A Homework Club meets every day after school. Students who skip homework assignments are required to attend; others can come for extra help.

"Since the Homework Club began in September, there has been a significant decrease in mandatory appearances and a noticeable improvement in students' academic performance," said Perkins.

According to the eighth grade teacher, teams can deal with academic

problems much easier. All team members are present during parent conferences to provide a more complete picture of the student. Within the first month of school, the teams conducted three very positive parental conferences, she said.

Klie expects the team approach to lead to a more project-oriented curriculum as teachers develop interdisciplinary activities. A recent project, for example, required students to use both math and social studies skills to study the diversity of the American people.

A Sampling of Recent Achievements

Waldwick seniors Keith Bersch and Jeffrey Chang were named Commended Students in the 1996 National Merit Scholarship Program, placing them among the top five percent of more than one million students who entered the program.

The 1994-95 seventh grade team from Waldwick Junior School received the highest score among the 53 New Jersey schools participating in the National Science Olympiad, a life science contest for junior high school students. The Waldwick team also scored within the top 4% nationally.

Traphagen and Crescent Schools received recognition from the New Jersey Department of Education for the early intervention program known as Fast Families. Through the state's Best Practices/Star School Program, the project was named a 1994-95 Best Practice in Counseling and Support. In recognition of the designation, the district received a \$500 grant from the state.



The 1995 Waldwick High School Academic Decathlon team won the regional title for the first time in school history and the Group I state title for the second consecutive year. The team also placed second overall in the state.

Last spring the Waldwick High School varsity Quiz Bowl team reached the semi-finals of the televised High School Bowl. Their performance resulted in an invitation to compete again in the American Academic Challenge National Invitational

Tournament in Nashville.

As part of the new Student Pride and Achievement Program initiated last year, 35 Junior School students received special service awards during an assembly last June. Each student had contributed at least 15 hours of community service to qualify.

Junior School students James Geronimo and Lauren DePhillips received recognition for high performance as part of the national Johns Hopkins Center for Talented Youth 1995 Talent Search.

During the Foreign Language Elementary Program last spring, 35 high school students volunteered to teach Spanish or French after school to fourth through sixth graders. Approximately 192 elementary school students participated in this club activity.

Last May Waldwick High School foreign language students Robert Bancroft, Kathy Brown, Kathy Hubany, and Frank Wildermann placed first in the original skit category of the Rider University Forensic Tournament. Robert Bancroft, the skit's writer, sent a copy to the Spanish Repertory Theater in New York. The professional actors then dramatized it after one of their own productions.

The eighth grade Brainbusters team of Ryan Hanlon, Jeff Pinyan, Robert Baisa,

and Adam Corbett finished second in the county tournament held in June.

During the 1994-95 school year the district initiated a very successful gifted and enrichment program for elementary school children. Teacher Arlene Platt provides enrichment activities for all students in grades three through six and specialized

instruction for students in grades four through six who are identified for inclusion in the Extended Studies Program.

During the 1994-95 school year, the Junior School athletic program completed one of its most successful years with 81 students participating in at least one team activity.

Teachers Go To Computer Camp

In late June, twenty elementary school teachers spent three days at a regional education center in Tarrytown participating in Mac Camp to improve their skills on the Macintosh computer. This is the second year the district sent teachers to the program. This year it included both introductory and advanced classes.

Since school began in September, many Mac Camp teachers have shared their knowledge with their colleagues. As a follow-up to the summer program, Mac Camp representatives spent an October afternoon at Crescent School to conduct demonstration lessons with students. All Mac Camp participants then participated in an after school program. A similar session will be conducted later in the year with Traphagen students.

During the past two years, the district has provided many opportunities for teachers to attend technology training programs. In October, for example, twelve teachers attended a one-day introductory program on the Macintosh computer. In addition, many teachers have attended workshops, seminars, and courses on their own, including master's degree programs in technology education.

Two teachers in each elementary school serve as technology resource people to help other staff members. According to Traphagen Principal Peter Muir, "The staff is comfortable with technology. Teachers are using it whenever possible and looking forward to enhancing their use of technology in the future."

Waldwick Seeks Partners in Education

The Waldwick School District is expanding the Partners in Education program initiated several years ago at the Junior Senior High School. Now Crescent and Traphagen Elementary Schools will also participate in the program.

Partners in Education involves a core of residents who share their skills and talents with students at all levels of instruction.

Volunteer participants help teachers with special technical projects, serve as guest speakers, tutor students, or share examples of their work or hobby.

Board Sets District Goals

After careful consideration during a special workshop, the Board of Education established 1995-96 district goals and agreed to investigate the possibility of shared services. The goals are the basis for job targets for each administrator.

TECHNOLOGY

The district will develop and implement a comprehensive technology focus and plan. The plan will cover current capabilities and utilization, needs and expectations, funding, and staff training.

PERFORMANCE

The district will ensure continued, measurable, and improved student performance by increasing students' ability to communicate effectively. Emphasis will be on the importance of reading, effective listening, and oral and written communication. Evaluation will take place through standardized tests, district-developed assessments, and alternative assessments including portfolios.

EXPECTATIONS

The district will continually work to raise the expectations of school and community members for student and staff performance. This will include a review and adjustment of the evaluation process; opportunities for continual staff development; increased community involvement in the schools; clarification of the role of guidance in the school system; an assessment of current programs, roles, and staffing; and an investigation of the structure of the school day and of school scheduling.

COMMUNICATIONS

The district will improve communication among board members, administrators, staff members, students, parents, and the community.

Schools Outline Objectives

Each of the district schools identified goals for the 1995-96 school year.

Julia A. Traphagen School Leisure time reading

This year 75% of the students in grades 3-6 will increase their leisure time reading by at least 25%. A survey conducted during the first week of school determined the students' current reading habits. Teachers will encourage additional reading through such activities as the Great Books program and several incentive programs.

New Jersey heritage

Activities such as speakers, classroom projects, and field trips will be used to increase students' understanding and appreciation of New Jersey's role in history, culture, economics, science, and technology.

Crescent School Multicultural understanding

As an extension of last year's American heritage goal, Crescent School is planning activities to enhance students' understanding and appreciation of the contributions of many cultures to the United States.

Personal responsibility

The school is continuing to emphasize student courtesy and respect for others with additional focus this year on personal responsibility. Again this year, teachers from each class will select two Citizens of the Month who will be honored at a bagel breakfast with the principal. The P.S.O. donated assignment books to students in grades four through six to support the personal responsibility goal.

Junior Senior School Multicultural awareness

Students in grades 7 through 12 will learn more about other cultures through the social studies curriculum and through field trips, such as the 7th grade and Project Idea trips to Ellis Island.

Technology

The science department will integrate the use of video laser discs into the curriculum. During the September Parents' Night, the science department staff demonstrated all the technologies currently available for student instruction and use.

More than 90% of the students in the Waldwick High School Class of 1995 are furthering their education, 73% at four year colleges and universities. Waldwick students received acceptances from over 100 institutions of higher learning, including such prestigious colleges as Boston College, Bryn Mawr, Cornell, Johns Hopkins, Lehigh, MIT, NYU, Princeton, Rutgers, Notre Dame, and Villanova.

OTHER INDICATORS OF QUALITY

Advanced Placement Tests

Sixteen Waldwick students took a total of 22 Advanced Placement Tests last May. As a result of their high scores, they qualified for college credit in calculus AB, US history, English language, computer science, biology, and Spanish language.

Middle College Program

All students in the 1994-95 advanced physics honors, advanced chemistry honors, and humanities classes completed the Middle College Program in conjunction with Fairleigh Dickinson University. They received three credits from FDU for each course.

Scholastic Assessment Test (SAT I)

SAT mean scores for Waldwick High School are consistently higher than those for the state and for the country. Waldwick's Class of 1995 averaged 979, an increase of 34 points over 1994. This compares with a mean of 898 for the state and 910 for the country.

California Achievement Tests (CAT/5)

Last spring every student in grades K-7, 9 and 10 took California Achievement Tests in reading, math, and language. Waldwick students at all grade levels scored well above averages in these 1995 tests.

Grade 11 H. S. Proficiency Test (HSPT)

Waldwick students exceeded the state passing rates in math, reading, and writing. One hundred percent of the class of 1996 passed the math HSPT and 98.9% passed the reading and writing sections of the test.

National Honor Society Holds Induction

In a recent candlelight ceremony, 16 Waldwick High School students were inducted into the National Honor Society.

They join 14 students who were inducted last year. NHS membership is based on high standards of scholarship, leadership, character and service to the school and the community.

Project Soar Underway

Shortly after his arrival in Waldwick, Dr. Alan Naimoli introduced Project Soar (Student Opportunities for Academic Recognition) to the Junior Senior School. This comprehensive program recognizes students who make outstanding contributions to the school community. The components of Project Soar include Students of the Month, discounts at local businesses for honor roll students, an Academic Hall of Fame, a Corridor of Athletic Champions, and an attendance competition among classes.

Technology at the Junior Senior School

Several important technology upgrades are in progress at the Junior Senior High School. By the end of November, faculty and students will have Internet access at computers in the library and in two classrooms. In December, the computers in the Guidance Department will be networked. This will provide quicker access to student records and grade reports.

In the future, Principal Dr. Alan Naimoli hopes to develop the industrial arts curriculum into a technology curriculum, complete the automation of the library, connect the library to a network accessible after hours to students and parents, and install a 16-station multi-media lab in the library.

New Writing Curriculum Approved

In June, the Board of Education approved a new K-12 writing curriculum developed by a committee of faculty members and administrators.

The curriculum established specific learning objectives and skills for each elementary grade level and revised the sequence of writing skills taught in grades 7 through 12. Individual folders with representative writing samples are now used at all grade levels to assess student development.

In grades K-6, working writing folders include at least two pieces of writing per marking period. Parents will receive these working folders at the end of the school year. Folders for Junior Senior School students include all language arts work. These students also participate in more individual writing conferences with teachers.

Cumulative writing folders will be maintained from year to year for every district student. They will contain one writing sample per year with a teacher assessment. Cumulative folders for grades 7 to 12 will also include a self-assessment of a student's writing development over the year. These folders will be returned to the students upon high school graduation.

"Cumulative folders will help teachers address individual and group needs and target specific areas for further development and refinement," said Crescent School Principal Susan Hase, the administrative chairperson of the district Writing Committee.

Beginning in grade 4, student

essays will be graded by a holistic scoring guide when appropriate. Used on state and other standardized tests, holistic assessment is a method of rating the overall effect of an essay against established criteria. Content and organization comprise the largest portion of the six-point holistic score.

According to Ms. Hase, Waldwick teachers are well versed in the four-step process method of teaching writing. However, the district will continue to provide professional development opportunities for staff members on such topics as writing across the curriculum and holistic scoring.

New Writing Center at High School

Students in grades nine through twelve now have a special place to go for help with various writing projects, including college essays and class assignments.

This year Waldwick High School established a new Writing Center to provide instruction and practice for the improvement of writing in all subject areas. The Center includes a word processor for student use. It is open two periods a day for students who are referred by a teacher or who choose to use the facility during a study hall, lunch time or independent study period.

Barbara Juliano, lead English teacher, explained that every high school senior will participate in a Writing Center conference before the end of the first semester to discuss college essays and writing problems.

"The Writing Center provides students with an opportunity to perfect their writing in conference with a trained English teacher who focuses on skill building," said Principal Dr. Alan Naimoli.

Center teachers help students with all aspects of the writing process including generating ideas, organizing an essay, developing appropriate details, and revising and editing the final copy.

Council reviewing report on municipal building

Members of the Waldwick Council are currently reviewing a professional's report on the borough's municipal building. The document, prepared by Molinari Stubaus and Holdefehr Architects of Fair Lawn, was distributed to the members of the governing body last week.

According to Mayor Rick Vander Wende, the report will be discussed in relation to Waldwick's 1996 overall capital budget. Preparations for the budget will be in full

force early next year, and will reportedly be required by the State of New Jersey in February.

The council commissioned the architect's report after having requested proposals for the study in August.

Borough Administrator Gary Kratz commented that the council wanted to examine the current borough hall in terms of issues including structural soundness, compliance with the Americans With Disabilities Act, and space restric-

tions. The administrator pointed out that ADA regulations would require handicapped access to the borough hall's second floor and widening of several interior and exterior doorways.

The report also contains cost estimates, but Kratz stated that it is premature to discuss dollar values.

The existing borough hall was built in 1927, "and added

onto three, four, maybe five times," Kratz reported. Asked if asbestos was a problem due to the age of the building, he reported that the noxious substance has not been an issue.

"We are pretty well maxxed out," the administrator said of the building's capacity.

"All options are being reviewed," Kratz noted, adding that the choices include retaining the status quo, renovating the existing building, or building an alternative site. "There are a number of options right now," he added, "but at this particular juncture, no one is definitive, and no one has been ruled out."

Volunteers are sorely needed

To the editor:

Several months ago, two pedestrians, one of which a school crossing guard, were struck by a car in the borough of Waldwick. Both people were badly injured and needed medical assistance. The request went out for an ambulance to respond but due to the lack of volunteers, Waldwick's ambulance could not respond. Two ambulances from other towns assisted and responded immediately. After the incident was over the residents of Waldwick were furious because an ambulance from their town didn't respond and the only

question that was asked was, "why didn't someone do something?"

Since then, the shortage of volunteers has not improved and yet the ambulances are still responding to emergency calls so that on one will be refused emergency care. Crews are short-handed but the same E.M.T.'s are responding to as many emergency calls as they can handle. New programs have been started to help reduce the pressure on the over-worked personnel but in the end the old problem still exists; not enough E.M.T.'s.

The bright yellow signs and posters all around the town have not been responded to. The bright yellow flyers handed out at town functions and at local stores have not raised much

attention either. We've asked for help from the residents that couldn't understand why the ambulance didn't respond and have gotten no response. If help doesn't come soon, either the residents of Waldwick may have to pay for an ambulance to respond or the municipal taxes for the borough will rise to fund a paid ambulance service with paid E.M.T.'s. Worse of all, the volunteer ambulance squad that has served the borough of Waldwick since 1952 will be dead.

In the end, the question I'm left to ask the residents of Waldwick is, "why doesn't someone do something?"

Kansas Shootout brings out the best in Luccarelli

WALDWICK — Like a Kansas settler from the Old West, Waldwick nose tackle Kevin Luccarelli settled into the Midland Park backfield on Thanksgiving Day to bring the curtain down on the 29th football meeting between the two neighboring schools.

And Luccarelli wasn't firing blanks in his attempt to protect what turned out to be a 6-0 victory for his team in triple overtime. The senior charged into uncharted territory to sack Midland Park quarterback Rick Hornby for an 11-yard loss on fourth down to end the marathon game and only the second overtime contest this season in Bergen County.

The first such Kansas Shootout, as it is nicknamed, occurred Oct. 21 at Manchester Regional High School, where the Falcons upset Hawthorne, 6-0, in one overtime session.

The Kansas Tiebreaker, which has been used elsewhere in the country for years, was only introduced to New Jersey high school football this season. No time is kept on the clock, and three overtime periods are the limit. Each team gets a turn to try to score from the same 25-yard line via a field goal or a touchdown, but it cannot return an interception, a fumble recovery or a blocked field goal for a touchdown.

"I like it (the tiebreaker); it keeps the kids from ending the game in a tie," said Waldwick head coach Neil Johnson. "It really brings out the best in the kids, knowing they can reach down inside and go not only on their ability, but on a lot of guts as well to not give up. But you

put the kids under a lot of pressure with this (tiebreaker)."

But Luccarelli, who also blocked a 28-yard field goal in the first overtime, wasn't feeling any particular pressure on his jolt to glory.

"One lineman was there, but he couldn't hold me," said the 5-foot-9, 175-pound Luccarelli. "I just totally went crazy and went by him. I know I'm the fastest player on our defense, and I knew I had to be there. He (Hornby) was dropping real deep, and I flew in there as fast as I could. I was just hoping I would get to him; that was all that was going through my head."

Luccarelli knew that with the football in Hornby's hands,

nothing was over, especially on the 4th-and-3 play from the 18-yard line in the last half of the third overtime period. After all, Hornby entered the game with 1,520 yards passing for the season. But as Hornby was about to release the ball, Luccarelli stepped into the final frame of the shootout.

"I grabbed his jersey with my right hand, spun him halfway around and grabbed him with my other hand to make sure he was down. I used a lot of technique that C.J. (Coach Johnson) taught me to get through to him."

"It's not every game you get a sack like that," added Luccarelli, who was also battling the flu that week. "I'll remember this for the rest of my life."

"Luke is the best lineman we have; he's the quickest," Johnson said. "You can depend on him whether he's sick or not. He hadn't practiced all week, but gave 150 percent. He came through for us every game."

And Luccarelli was rewarded by being named First Team All-League at nose tackle for the second straight year in the B-PSL Carpenter Division.

"The kids never quit and played their hearts out," Johnson said. "This game brought out the character these kids have, even with a 4-5 season. We could have had a 7-2 season very easily if we scored a few more times. But they deserved to win this game, because they worked very hard. So many disappointing things happened to us this year, but this time was our time. I told the kids to never forget this game."

Luccarelli, for one, won't.

Falco found his footing at right time

WALDWICK — Marlon Falco finally got his footing, and when he did, the Waldwick fullback broke the ice in the top half of the third and final overtime session against Midland Park with a 14-yard touchdown run for a 6-0 Thanksgiving Day victory.

"The field got slippery," said Waldwick head coach Neil Johnson. "I was out there cleaning their shoes off when there was a timeout. Marlon had complained to me about the field, saying he couldn't cut or get any footing to take off."

But in that final overtime, Falco's number was called on a run to the left, and the senior finally found a part of the field that had grass to secure his travelling.

"I first bounced off two linemen, and then plowed through the defensive end, who wound up on his back, and out-ran the secondary," said the

6-foot-2, 197-pound Falco. "I had pretty decent footing, especially when I got around the end; that's where I picked up speed. That was the best touchdown of my career."

"Once Marlon hit the outside, there was grass, and once I saw him stand up straight, I knew he was in, and he high-stepped it into the end zone," said Johnson. "It was like dropping a 50-pound weight off your head."

"Marlon matured this year as a football player," Johnson noted. "His attitude changed this season, mentally as well as physically. He always had the ability, but this year, he used that ability. Marlon turned into a football player this year."

And a breaker of a game going nowhere fast.—FARRELL

Ambulance volunteers get training

The Waldwick volunteer ambulance corps has finished its training on their semi-automatic external defibrillators which they purchased and have just received. The training was provided by the Northern New Jersey Mobile Intensive Care Unit training committee and the Valley Hospital of Ridgewood. These defibrillators will be used on sudden cardiac arrest victims. The machine administers jolts of electricity at precise intervals to stop irregular contractions of the heart, or fibrillation, associated with cardiac failure. The electric jolt will often "reset" the heart's rhythmic beating pattern. A SAED signals the operator when to deliver the shock and will automatically deliver the proper voltage. Before the advent of SAED units, the lifesaving defibrillation procedure could only be performed in a hospital. Today, many more cardiac victims can be saved before reaching the hospital. The defibrillators were purchased with donations from town residents at a cost \$13,000. The prudential started a program called "Helping Hearts" which also funds for the purchase.

Borough at loss to explain low water pressure

WALDWICK — Many residents west of Crescent Avenue may soon be getting a boost to their water pressure, which has been a problem in this area of the borough.

Officials report that about 500 to 750 borough households are affected by low water pressure. The water pressure

for about one-third of the town has been a long standing problem and is being addressed for the first time ever.

The borough would like to increase the pressure for the houses in the borough's higher elevations, said Jim Porier of Killam Associates, a Milburn firm hired by the borough to study the water pressure problem. The houses closer to

the tank have lower pressure.

"The study is to determine why these residents are not getting enough water," Councilman William Branagh said. "The low water pressure is an inconvenience for these people."

The households on the west side of town are closer to the water tanks and for reasons as yet unknown are receiving about 20 pounds per square

inch less water pressure than the rest of the borough. The council is funding a study to it hopes will result in the increase of water pressure by 30 percent for some households.

Water passes out of the tap slowly when the pressure falls under a certain level, said Rich Henning of United Water Resources in Harrington Park.

When people do laundry and water the lawn simultaneously, there is a little less forcefulness for these persons.

"Faucets and lawn sprinklers are affected by low water pressure," Porier said. "If a sprinkler and faucet from the household are run at the same time there may be a problem."

The borough expects the report to take 30 to 60 days. The timeframe for repairs will be determined after the study has been completed.

Waldwick officials consider 'wish list'

WALDWICK — Last Saturday, the Mayor and Council met to determine where the money slated for the 1996 budget would be spent.

Included in discussions were Borough Administrator Gary Kratz, Fire Chief Gerald Rutkowski, and Department of Public Works (DPW) Superintendent Joseph Agugliaro. They all submitted what they had put on their "Christmas wish lists."

The first area the council looked at was Borough Hall. The building was built in 1927 and houses the administrative offices, and the fire and police departments.

Kratz said that there is a need for more space and updated equipment including modern computers and phone systems. There is only one fax machine that is shared among the administrators, police and fire departments.

"In today's economy and today's offices this is far outdated," Kratz said. "However this is not the environment to bring in updated equipment."

Kratz noted that in the administrative offices every outlet and all the available space has been used. The wires are very visible in the basement and along the walls of the work areas. In addition, the entrance to the borough clerk's office and the tax assessor's office is not up to code.

According to Kratz, the power coming into the building is at the maximum level.

"Every time we add something it requires more electricity," he said. "This is especially important when we talk about computers."

Vander Wende said that the emergency generators are also inadequate.

Kratz went on to say that structural problems also exist. Water collects on the roof due to a pitch and it cannot reach drains and downspouts. The chimneys are not functional and are the cause of outside air going into some of the offices and the chimneys are also the prime source for leaks.

A complaint that Mayor Vander Wende and Kratz registered is that there is no place to have a private meeting.

"There is no real place to meet in small groups," Kratz said.

Vander Wende said conversations in his office can be heard throughout the building via heating ducts.

"We have outgrown this place," said Councilman William Patterson.

The Police Department has no locker room facility for the borough's new female officer, said Kratz.

And like the administrative offices every electrical outlet is being used. The police department is also out of space and needs a modern recording system for incoming phone calls.

Kratz pointed out that because of the work that many officers have done themselves the department is in relatively good shape.

"This department has come a long way," Kratz said. "Many members have brought the police department into the 20th century."

Police officers built the photo lab themselves, but it is in the same room as the bathroom and the officers' locker room.

The fire department needs space in the garage area. They are unable to fit two firetrucks side by side, which can be a problem if the first truck does not start for some reason.

Rutkowski asked that the budget include a new vehicle for the fire chief, in addition to an aerial truck, which will be purchased used, but refit with new equipment.

"As far as the fire department is concerned it will be like a new truck," Rutkowski said.

Also Rutkowski asked for new portable multi-channel radios. He said that the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has added new channels and when firefighters are at a scene of a fire they can hear other towns over the same frequency and it gets confusing.

"All of the officers' radios need replacing," he said.

He also wants work done on the rescue vehicle and 20 breathing apparatus, which will cost \$400 each.

At the DPW building Agugliaro said that most of the equipment was in good condition but some apparatus was too old for everyday use.

"Truck 665 (a mason dump truck) is a 1986 model that will be reassigned to the recreation department and we will then get rid of their truck," Rutkowski said.

Kratz said that the some vehicles are being used more than others.

"The smaller trucks are be-

coming the workhorses of the fleet," he said.

In the DPW garage area many records and files from Borough Hall are being stored on a tier in a corner. Many of these records are being held there because of lack of space in Borough Hall.

"The state requires us to keep all sorts of records," Kratz said.

The water budget was also discussed. This includes water mains and fire hydrants. The estimated amount for renovations in this area is \$20,000 out of a budget estimated at \$82,690.

"We are trying our best to to preserve the integrity of the pipes," Rutkowski said. "But we really need updated equipment."

The library is another department that is factored into the budget. The board has asked for maintenance-free siding, computers, and book stacks.

"The number of acquisitions, whether it be compact discs, old videos or books, comes to about \$3,000," said Councilman Scott Stahlman. "It is not clear to me, yet, where they will put them."

The entire "wish list" comes to about \$2 million. However, the council anticipates having to spend less than \$1 million in the 1996 budget.

There are three projects that have to get completed. These are the repaving of Dora and Wannamaker avenues and the renovations to White's Dam.

Jones, Russo represent State champ Waldwick

Englewood and unbeaten Waldwick are the only schools that placed two players on the 1995 All-Bergen soccer team, as selected by the Bergen County Coaches Association.

The Warriors perpetual motion defender Mike Jones made the team for the second straight year and is joined by speedy striker Ron Russo. Englewood is represented by two outstanding offensive threats, Mauricio Baena and John Lopez.

Midfielder Matt Hurley, who directed Don Bosco Prep to the Parochial A crown, was named along with Dumont scoring sensation Mike Aldemir.

Unlike some former all-star units, this one is explosive. Four forwards combined for 112 goals.

The coaches voted for four forwards, seven midfielders/defenders, and one goalie.

TIM CLARK, Mahwah, G — The four-year starter moved up from third team with an 0.79 goals-against mark and 10 shutouts, boosting his career total to 39. "He is a very skillful goalie," says coach Hank Saxon. "He's just a fine all-around athlete who could also play the field and be good."

Clark is very good in the air and isn't afraid to come off his line to take away crosses. In addition, he has a very strong leg and the Thunderbirds used his long punts to start their offense.

"He's the best keeper I've ever had," says Saxon. "And he was better this year than last when we had a stronger defense."

Among the schools showing interest are Penn and Boston College.

MAURICIO BAENA, Englewood, B — The attacking midfielder wound up with 17 goals and 25 assists. "He's the best all-around player on the team," says co-coach Javier Velazquez. "He is truly the heart of the team."

The always moving Baena demonstrated outstanding footwork as he dribbled the ball with both legs. Add in his outstanding speed and it's easy to see why he was the key to a 20-4 season.

RYAN CARR, Ramapo, B — "He did a tremendous job at fullback," says coach Evan Baumgarten. "He held together the most inexperienced team I've had in 10 years."

The defender won more than his share of 50-50 balls and was very strong in the air. "He also created our offense from the back, but what makes him so good is that he plays the simple game. He was very consistent."

RYAN COYNE, Bergen Catholic, B — "He played every minute," coach Jim McGirr says of the three-year starter. "I dropped him back from midfield to work with two juniors and a sophomore and he did a great job holding them together from his sweeper position."

The back is very strong, has good speed, and has a lot of confidence in his ability. He could wind up playing for an Ivy League school.

AUSTIN DENG, Tenafly, B — The junior sweeper gained a lot of recognition in games that he shut down high-scoring Jonce Rajcinoski of Garfield and Mike Aldemir of Dumont.

"He's a very gifted player," says coach Bill Jaeger. "He just doesn't get beat and does a great job of organizing the defense. In addition to being skillful he has great instincts."

MATT HURLEY, Don Bosco, B — "He's as good as we've ever had," veteran coach Rich Zawacki says of his midfielder. "He can put a pass anywhere, has fine ball skills, and a deadly shot." The three-year starter scored 12 goals, including the winner in a State game against St. Peter's Prep. He also handed out 13 assists.

"Matt has great field vision," says the coach, "and when he has the ball it's very hard to knock him off it."

MIKE JONES, Waldwick, B — When the coaches talk about Waldwick's Group 1 championship season, the first player mentioned is the stopper. The four-year starter always seemed to be in the right place to clear a ball or to get the offense in gear. He wound up with seven goals and five assists.

"Although he isn't big, he's very strong in the air," says coach George Farago. "He's also a very strong tackler and is very hard to beat. The best way to describe him is that he's a complete defender."

MIKE OLIVER, Northern Highlands, B — Many County coaches say the midfielder, who moved up from second team, was the best all-around player in the area. "He has a great soccer brain," says coach Roy Nygren, who needed the veteran to mesh with seven sophomores in the lineup.

"Mike is the kind of player who makes those around him play better," says Nygren. "He has tremendous speed, is a great distributor of the ball, and is a pretty good striker of the ball."

Oliver finished with 17 goals and five assists.

MIKE ALDEMIR, Dumont, F — As soon as coach Joe Molino saw the transfer from Scandinavia in the Huskies' opening practice, he knew he had a winner. "You could see right away that he was a gifted player," Molino says.

Only 5-foot-6, the junior played very big around the net by scoring headers off corner kicks. He led the County in scoring with 37 goals and registered the winner in seven of the team's 10 wins. He was the major reason the team made the playoffs.

Aldemir can score with either foot and did so despite being double-teamed most of the season.

JOHN LOPEZ, Englewood, F — The left-winger was a clutch player who scored the winning goal against Lyndhurst in a Bergen County tournament game. Co-coach Harry Bassett calls him very skillful.

Once in the box, he was almost unstoppable as he concluded the campaign with 23 goals. He also was an unselfish player who registered 20 assists.

JONCE RAJCINOSKI, Garfield, F — An outstanding all-around player who finished second in the County with 30 goals. He tacked on 18 assists.

"He's a highly-skilled player," says coach Doug Petrie. "He has great ball control, is very quick, can shoot with either foot, and is strong at heading the ball. And his direct kicks are outstanding because he can bend them around the wall or go over it."

The forward is hoping for a four-year scholarship, but if that doesn't come he'll probably go the junior college route.

RON RUSSO, Waldwick, F — "He's the best forward I've ever had," says Farago. "When he has the ball up front he's almost impossible to mark."

The striker delivered 22 goals and distributed 13 assists. Usually he was marked very closely, which opened up space for his teammates to shoot. "What makes him so good is that he's lightning quick," says Farago. "He's always moving, even without the ball."

Dam to be improved

WALDWICK — After several years, the Mayor and Council have decided to go forward with the project to bring White's Dam up to state and federal regulations.

The delay was caused by debates over how the project should be done. Borough Administrator Gary Kratz said the borough engineer had one way of doing the project that would have been very expensive. But the state suggested a method that was less expensive and easier to do.

"When you get into dams the federal and state are very careful when they deal with them," Kratz said.

According to Kratz, the wing-wall on the north side of the dam will be buttressed by a wall constructed of gabion stone (stone in metal baskets).

A regrade will also be done so water going over the top of the wing-wall will be brought back into the brook downstream of the dam. The regrade will consist of Reno mattresses to

ensure that the water does not leave the flood way.

The entire project will cost \$40,000 and will be done by F&F Occhipinti.

The last time the dam overflowed was 1977, but with new standards for dams and stricter flood regulations, all towns in the state have to improve their policies regarding flooding.

Waldwick High grad Fiore is a watched man on gridiron

WALDWICK — Not only is Dave Fiore taking on a heavy academic load with his major in biology and minor in chemistry at Hofstra University, but he has also taken on NFL scouts, one-on-one, when they come calling on him for an interview. "They've watched me practice and watched my game films," said the strapping offensive tackle. "When they interviewed me, they would ask what adjustments I would make for a play against a certain defensive front or how I would pick up blitzes and what my responsibilities would be. A lot of the scouts have liked me on film."

The NFL draft is in early April. In the meantime, the 6-foot-4, 285-pound Fiore will continue working out at Hofstra's state-of-the-art weight room, where he bench presses 435 pounds and squats between 675 and 700 pounds, numbers that are considerably above normal.

Besides his blocking skills in the Flying Dutchmen's run-and-shoot offense, pro scouts have also liked Fiore's ability to get downfield in a hurry to block for his receivers.

"Once a pass is released, I try to go downfield and make something happen," he said. "If I can knock one defender off, maybe my player will go in for a touchdown."

One big assist that Fiore got and that was replayed on Sports Channel several times came on an option play by quarterback Kharon Brown, who scored on the 56-yard run against Liberty.

"I was pretty much running with Kharon, and there was a defender coming up on him, ready to make the tackle," Fiore said. "When we got to the two-yard line, I grabbed Kharon and pushed him and the defender into the end zone. It was a funny kind of thing."

Fiore's climb to the top of his position was not without its pitfalls.

"I developed a lot my freshman year, but then

I had reconstructive knee surgery in my sophomore season and missed the last two games," he noted.

The setback was reminiscent of his senior football season at Waldwick High School, when a pulled hamstring muscle in his left leg tore off his growth plate and, he says, "limited my playing ability and recruiting potential."

However, the then 6-foot-3, 220-pound Fiore played offensive right tackle that entire 1991 season for coach Terry Byrne, blocking for tailback Dennis McAvoy and fullback Tony Servideo.

In the 1990 campaign, Fiore played center for the Warriors, who, behind quarterbacks Ed Guy and Garret Branagh, fullback Alex Avagnano and McAvoy, reached the state playoffs, but lost to Cresskill, 22-20, in the opening round to finish with a 7-3 record.

After football season, Fiore mostly received interest from Yankee Conference schools, like Delaware and Rhode Island.

"I thought I could play somewhere, but I really wasn't getting the looks because of my injury during football season," he said.

But Hofstra recruited him, and Fiore figured he could get exposure playing for the metropolitan-area school.

And Fiore says he has enjoyed his tenure at Hofstra.

"It's a good school, academically," said Fiore, who would like to also have physical therapy as a profession. "In football, I've been through two offensive coordinators with different approaches, but I've learned a lot about the run-and-shoot offense. My offensive line coach, Frank Limanni, has been there all four years, and he has greatly assisted me in my progress as a lineman. And it's been a pleasure playing for a head coach like Mr. Gardi."

All-American Fiore looks for an NFL career

Hofstra's offensive right tackle an imposing force

WALDWICK — "He's the best kept secret in the East," says Joe Gardi, Hofstra University's head football coach.

Gardi, a former New York Jets assistant coach, talks of 1992 Waldwick High School graduate Dave Fiore, who, after starting for four years on the Flying Dutchmen's offensive line, has no less than 24 NFL teams showing an interest in him.

"We would like to thank all those coaches who passed David up in high school and allowed him to come to Hofstra," adds Gardi with a laugh. "We'd like to thank them, officially."

Fiore, a 6-foot-4, 285-pound right tackle, was just named to two All-America teams — the American Football Coaches Association's Division 1-AA squad and the Walter Camp Football Foundation's Division 1-AA team. In addition, he was named to the Eastern College Athletic Association's all-star first team.

"I'm happy to be recognized as one of the better players in 1AA," said Fiore. "I don't really talk about it a lot, but it gives other people something to talk about."

Hofstra finished with a 10-2 record, with its final game a 38-17 loss to the University of Delaware in the opening round of the playoffs. The Flying

Dutchmen were 10-0 before dropping their last regular season game — a 30-28 decision to Division 1-AA finalist Marshall University of Huntington, West Virginia, which knocked off number-one McNeese State University of Lake Charles, Louisiana, 25-13, last Saturday in the semifinals of the playoffs.

Fiore was a driving force behind the Hempstead, Long Island, team's offensive punch that averaged 261.7 yards rushing and 447.6 yards of total offense per game, both marks fifth best in the nation in Division 1-AA. The Flying Dutchmen scored 376 points (34.2 average) for a number-eight ranking, and yielded just 112 (10.2 average), second best in the country for regular-season games (11).

And Fiore & Company were effective in protecting quarterback Kharon Brown, allowing only 21 sacks.

Gardi remembers Fiore when he reported to him as a 6-foot-3, 235-pound freshman.

"David looked like he could tread water in a test tube," he said. "Talk about a gift from God! What we saw in him was great potential, and got much more."

Fiore, with no fat on his huge frame, is quite quick for his size, running the 40-yard dash in 4.8 seconds. Not only did he pave the way for his running backs,

but would sprint out on pass plays to throw blocks for his receivers as well.

Gardi believes Fiore can play in the NFL, but the lingering question, he says, is "Can he be 300 pounds or better? That's what NFL teams are looking for

in offensive linemen."

"I think he can with the way he eats," Gardi said. "Dave's the slowest eater on the team, but very persistent; he's the last one to leave the table on road trips. With the pros, they're able to afford weight supplements, like

the big college programs, but we haven't gotten there, yet."

Fiore also was Hofstra's long snapper for punts the past two seasons and for field goals his junior year.

"Dave truly has a chance to be

a pro," Gardi said. "He has great velocity and accuracy on his snaps, and that gives him a little edge to being drafted or signed as a free agent."

Hofstra only started giving football scholarships last January.

"We've proved we can beat scholarship teams because of people like David Fiore being on a mission to get to the next level," said Gardi, whose record is 28-12-2 during Fiore's four years. "I told him three years ago that he could make it, and he believed me. Our young men believe they can play pro football."

Garfield's Wayne Chrebet, a 1995 graduate of Hofstra, is solid proof of that, having made an impact at wide receiver for the Jets this season.

What Gardi especially likes about Fiore is his demeanor and leadership qualities.

"Dave represents what college football is all about, an outstanding student (3.0 GPA), a great, young man and a good football player," the coach said. "He set an example for the younger players in what you can do if you give 110 percent both during the season and the off-season. Dave has been an inspiration to everyone on our football team to work hard and improve your strength and lower your 40-yard time."

"David Fiore is really a credit to Hofstra, not only as a football player but as a gentleman," Gardi said. "We're proud of him and very happy to have him here. He's one of the nicest young men I have ever coached."

POLICY:
The Borough of New Milford, in order to insure the safety and welfare of its employees, supports the principles of a drug and alcohol free work place. To that end, the

IV. ALCOHOL TESTING METHODOLOGY.

Breath Alcohol Testing Technician (BATT) - Alcohol testing will only be performed by certified BATTs. The HNH BATTs are trained to proficiency in the use of the EBT used by the hospital as well as alcohol testing procedures. Certifications renewed bi-annually by a trainer approved by the manufacturer of the Evidential Breath Testing (EBT) device used. This course is equivalent to the Department of Transportation model course. BATTs perform tests as technicians only, performing no clinical role at the time of testing.

Evidential Breath Testing Device - Holy Name Hospital utilized the National Draeger Breathalyzer Model 7410 for all alcohol testing. The device is NHTSA approved and is subject to the Quality Assurance Plan (QAP) as established by National Draeger. The EBT Device has the capability of printing results and sequential numbering.

Quality Assurance Plan (QAP) - Wet bath calibrations are performed on the DBT every six months in accordance with the QAP Plan established by National Draeger and weekly external calibration checks are performed to specific tolerances as determined by the manufacturer or the OHS staff. DOT Evidential Breath Testing forms are used to document all testing. Records of calibrations are kept on file in OHS.

Alcohol Testing Site - All alcohol testing is conducted at a location that provides both visual and aural privacy to those being tested, sufficient to prevent unauthorized persons from seeing or hearing results. The BATT shall supervise only one employee's use of an EBT at a time.

Alcohol Testing Form - Tests are documented on the standard DOT Breath Alcohol Testing Form. In addition, a log book will be used for recording calibrations and sequential testing numbers as needed.

V. ALCOHOL TESTING PROCEDURES:

Preparation for Testing - When a Borough employee arrives for testing the BATT will require positive identification through the use of employee photo I.D. card. Should the employee request it, the BATT shall provide I.D. to the employee. The BATT shall explain the testing procedures.

Administration of the Initial Test -

1. The BATT completes Step 1 on the Breath Alcohol Testing Form.

2. Have the employee sign Step 2 on the form. NOTE: Refusal to sign Step 2 is considered a refusal. The contact person is notified of the employee's refusal and the test not performed.

3. Open a new, individually sealed mouthpiece in view of the employee and attach it to the EBT.

4. Instruct the employee to blow forcibly into the mouthpiece for at least 6 seconds or until the EBT indicates that an adequate amount of breath has been obtained.

5. Await the results on the EBT and show them to the employee.

6. If the result of the screening is an alcohol concentration of less than 0.020 - Date and sign certification and fill in the date in Step 3 of the DOT Form. Have the employee sign the certification and fill in the date of Step 4 of the DOT Form. If employee refuses, put entry in remarks section of form. (Failure to sign section 4 is not considered a refusal.) Give the employee Copy 2 of the form. If testing is completed or is unnecessary and no physical is involved thank the employee and release him.

Administration of the Confirmatory Test

Perform a confirmation test when results 0.020.

Borough council authorizes Clean Community Grant

The Waldwick Council recently voted to authorize a Clean Community Grant from the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection in the amount of no less than \$11,750. The funds will be devoted to maintaining Waldwick as a clean, litter-free environment.

The borough is eligible to receive the grant under the Clean Communities Act, with the understanding that the funds will be used to create or supplement the municipality's existing litter reduction program. Borough Administrator Gary Kratz has been charged with implementing the Clean Com-

munities program, and has been designated as the program's coordinator.

The council also voted to amend its grant agreement with the New Jersey Department of Transportation for the Wanamaker Avenue project. This change, made in accordance with a shift in state guidelines, will allow the municipality to accept grant funds from the DOT at the time the contract is executed. The council has yet to accept bids for the project, but expects to do so in 1996.

Borough Administrator Kratz noted that the work on Wanamaker will involve curbs

and sidewalks and the total reconstruction of the road between West Prospect and Wyckoff Avenue.

In other borough business, the council recently opted to proceed with the White's Dam project. The work on the dam, which

will cost approximately \$40,000, will be completed in order to comply with updated state and federal regulations. A wall constructed of stone in metal baskets and a re-grade will be completed in association with the project.

Waldwick needs EMTs

Editor, The Record:

Several months ago, two pedestrians, one of whom was a school crossing guard, were struck by a car in Waldwick. Both people were badly injured and needed medical assistance. The request went out for an ambulance to respond but due to the lack of volunteers, Waldwick's ambulance could not respond. Two ambulances from other towns assisted and responded immediately. After that incident, the residents of Waldwick were furious because an ambulance from their own town didn't respond. The only question that was asked was: "Why didn't someone do something?"

Since then, the shortage of volunteers has not improved. Yet the ambulances are still responding to emergency calls so that no one will be refused emergency care. These crews are short-handed but the same EMTs are responding to as many emergency calls as they can handle. New programs have been started to help reduce the pressure on the overworked personnel, but in the end, the old problem still exists — not enough EMTs.

Nobody has responded to the bright yellow signs and posters all around the town. The bright yellow flyers handed out at town functions and at local stores have not raised much attention, either. If help doesn't come soon, Waldwick municipal taxes will rise to fund an

ambulance service with paid EMTs. Worst of all, what is to become of the volunteer ambulance squad that has served the borough of Waldwick since 1952?

The question remains: "Why doesn't someone do something?"

Waldwick and Don Bosco, both state champions, lead the way with three representatives each on the first team, with Mahwah and Ramapo netting two spots and Ramsey, Northern Highlands and Midland Park each placing one player on the elite unit.

Scott McKim of Northern Highlands is the Sophomore of the Year, and George Farago of Waldwick picked up his second consecutive Coach of the Year honor.

The player profiles:
TIM CLARK, Mahwah — A leader from the back, this senior completed his fourth year as the Thunderbird starting goalie with a career record of 54-16-10 and 39 shutouts.

Said head coach Hank Saxon, "Tim is a very skillful player and the best goalie I've ever had. He came off the line very well on crosses and was truly a team leader."

Clark's goals-against average dipped to 0.79 this season and netted 10 shutouts and a mid-season stretch of nine games in which he allowed only three goals. Penn and Boston College are possible places he will continue his career next fall.

RYAN CARR, Ramapo — On a team that featured a lot of youth, this senior was a stabilizing force. As head coach Evan Baumgarten said, "Ryan held us together for most of the season while the rest of the team gained valuable experience, and he was our most consistent player." While he managed only one assist during the year, his precise passes helped get the offense going in transition, and he was a very creative player.

JIM FEENEY, Don Bosco — The success of the Parochial A

champions began with their defense, as the Ironmen recorded 16 shutouts and allowed only seven goals in 22 games. This three-year starter from Ramsey was the leader of the defense, and he also showed some offensive prowess, coming forward to score three goals and hand out two assists. Head coach Rich Zawacki acknowledged his contributions, saying, "We would not have had the success we did without him in the lineup."

MIKE JONES, Waldwick — A four-year starter for the Warriors, this stopper was the heart of the backline that allowed only 11 goals to be scored against it and never allowed more than one goal by any team all year. "He is a complete defender with all the tools," Farago said. "He's good in the air, a strong tackler, fast enough that most don't get by him and a good clearance passer. Jones also showed his offensive capabilities with seven goals and seven assists, giving him 23 goals and 22 assists for his varsity career."

COLBY MUSCARELLE, Mahwah — This senior was voted the Most Valuable Player by his teammates, a high compliment to his defensive abilities. Play-

ing on a unit that was otherwise young, he stood out in the central defense, helping the Thunderbirds allow only 17 goals in 20 games. He was needed on the backline most of the time, so his forward rushes were limited, but he still managed two goals and two assists during the year, including a game-winning goal against Old Tappan.

PAUL DEL VALLE, Waldwick — For much of the season, this midfielder was the central focus of the offense, the player that made the attack work. A two-year starter and three-year player, he notched 16 goals and 12 assists, giving him career totals of 24 goals and 18 assists. He opened the year with 10 goals in the first six games, including a hat trick against Eastern Christian, then settled into the playmaker role as other team members picked up the scoring pace.

MATT HURLEY, Don Bosco — A three-year starter, this senior from Waldwick got high marks from Zawacki, who said, "Matt is one of the best players I've had here. He can do a lot of things with the ball and has a great knowledge of the game. He is also very strong and hard to knock off the ball." With 10

goals and nine assists this year, he ends up with 16 goals and 11 assists for his varsity career, and late this season, he scored four game-winning goals, including the Parochial A North state semifinal and final matches.

MIKE OLIVER, Northern Highlands — Another complete player who took on the task of leading a team that included seven sophomore starters, he got rave reviews from many area coaches for his play. "Mike uses his speed well with the ball and makes great passes; plus, he has a dangerous shot," says coach Roy Nygren. A three-year starter, he knocked home 17 goals and added five assists, giving him career totals of 30 goals and 17 assists. He scored in seven straight games during a late-season stretch and also had a four-game scoring string in the early going.

BRIAN PETERSON, Ramapo — Part of the reason for the Raiders' late-season surge and run to the Group 3, Section 1 state-title game was the play of this midfielder. He had some big games in the second half of the season after taking charge of the offense, and among his six

goals and three assists were game-winners against Pascack Hills and Old Tappan and the assist on the lone score in the 2-1 overtime loss to Sparta in the sectional final.

BRAD GOETSCHUIS, Ramsey — A three-year player and two-year starter for the Rams, he was called "our best player, the go-to guy for the team on offense and a player who showed his determination every game" by head coach Don Munro. They won the B-PSL Carpenter Division, Bergen County and Group 1 state championships, a first for the latter two, and played a very disciplined and confident game.

Library to modernize offices

WALDWICK — As the Waldwick Public Library enters its 40th anniversary year, the board is starting to modernize its offices and card catalog.

The modernization process involves converting the clerical files, such as budget reports, to computerized files.

"We intend to computerize the office for records," said David Kamykoski, library director. "We will need extra

bookcases to store records."

Kamykoski said the library has had an increase in circulation this past year.

"Last year the volume of circulation was 83,586, but through the first week in December it was 100,000," Kamykoski said.

Kamykoski said the increase is attributed to new programs the library is offering for children and adults. One of these activities is the Parents and

Tots program, which provides play time for children while the parents talk to each or browse for books and other items.

Another factor that Kamykoski attributes to the increase in circulation is the quality of service the library provides.

"We try to treat everyone that comes in here like they were the mayor," he said.

The total cost of the new items for circulation, maintenance of the building, and storage cabinets for the files will be \$50,000. The Mayor and Council will consider this figure as they prepare for the 1996 budget next month.

Kamykoski said storage cabinets and book shelves will be necessary in the upcoming year as the circulation continues to increase.

"We have simply run out of space," he said.

Councilman Scott Stahlman said that of the \$50,000, \$3,000 is expected to be used for shelves, while another \$3,000 will be spent on new items for circulation.

All-Suburban attack features four T-Birds

NORTHWEST BERGEN — They were not selected for the post-season, missing the Group 2 playoffs by an eyelash, but the Mahwah football team is definitely a part of this year's All-Suburban offensive first team.

The Thunderbirds claim four spots on the 14-member first team, which was expanded to accommodate a tie for the quarterback position. Fair Lawn and Glen Rock have three players each on the squad, while Indian Hills, Ramsey, Ramapo and Waldwick each have one representative on the 11-senior, 3-junior unit.

Three players are back from last year — Marcus Giles of Mahwah, Mike Guazzo of Indian Hills and Mike Rickett of Fair Lawn — and Glen Rock's Chris Leonard slides over from the sophomore of the year spot. Three others move up from the second team of a year ago.

This year a "Freshman of the Year" was selected, Ramapo's Chris Simms, and Al Deaett is was chosen as the "Coach of the Year".

The player profiles:

ADAM ARSLANIAN, Fair Lawn — Watching his junior play, it was hard to believe he was a first-year varsity quarterback. "He is a very athletic kid and a hard worker, which is why he was so successful for us," said Fair Lawn head coach Mike Alberque. He completed 98 of 149 passes, a 65 percent completion rate, and had a school-record 19 straight completions at one point. He threw for 1,676 yards and 15 touchdowns, and he ran for three touchdowns and a two-point conversion. He was 21 of 22 on quarterback sneaks for first downs, and he overcame a shoulder injury that caused him to miss one game and play hurt in two others.

CHRIS LEONARD, Glen Rock — A wide receiver as the "Sophomore of the Year" last season, he moved to quarterback this year and ably filled the shoes left by graduated All-Suburban QB Justin Schwartz. He completed 93 of 161 passes, a 58 percent completion rate, for 1,671 yards and 17 touchdowns in leading the run-and-shoot offense. He ran for 776 yards and 13 touchdowns, and even ran at wide receiver on some plays, catching six passes for 123 yards and a touchdown. His all-purpose yardage including 416 yards on

kick returns, giving him 2,986 on the year. He also picked off eight passes, returning two for touchdowns. He had 11 picks and 3 TDs on defense in his two years. The junior also took over the placekicking chores in the second half of the year, making 12 of 20 extra points to finish with 112 points on the year.

JON CARROLL, Ramapo — Another in the long line of strong tailbacks for the Raiders, this three-year player broke the 1,000-yard barrier in his final game, finishing the year with 1,090 yards rushing — sixth on the all-time single season list. With 14 touchdowns this year, he ends up with 20 in his career, putting him fifth on the all-time list. Head coach Mike Miello says, "He is a tough kid who makes up for what he lacks in size with his heart. He plays big and, with his speed and ability to read the field, he turns small gains into big plays." A corner on defense for three seasons as a starter, he had three interceptions and 40 tackles.

MARCUS GILES, Mahwah — It has been a super three years for this senior, who makes a second straight appearance on the first team. He ran for 874 yards on 103 carries this year, an 8.5 average. He added 16 catches for 441 yards, a 27.6 average, scoring 16 touchdowns and 96 points. He ran back two punts

for touchdowns, giving him a school-record seven for his career. His three-year numbers read 359 carries for 2,506 yards (7.0 per carry) and 41 total touchdowns. He also was a force on defense, coming up with 30 solos among his 61 tackles, of which 10 were for losses. He had a sack and two interceptions, and a number of Division 1 and Division 1-AA schools are looking at him for next fall.

MIKE GUAZZO, Indian Hills — A three-year starter and the heart and soul of the Braves the past two years, this all-around athlete once again dominated the field when he played. His second first-team selection comes on the heels of a year in which he ran for 769 yards and 13 touchdowns on 143 carries (5.3 per run) and caught 11 passes for 173 yards (15.7 per) and two touchdowns. He also ran back 15 punts for 319 yards (21.2 per) and two touchdowns and 14 kickoffs for 375 yards (26.7 per) and another score, giving him 1,636 total yards. He scored 124 points, with a pair of two-point conversions and 12 extra-point kicks, and averaged 34.3 yards on 30 punts. On defense, he made 57 tackles and an interception. He leaves with career totals of 2,121 yards rushing, 51 catches for 714 yards and 49 touchdowns, including a record five in one game.

MIKKEL BROWN, Glen Rock — The speedy wideout was the leading receiver for the Panthers, catching 30 balls good for over 600 yards and six touchdowns. He also was used as a wingback running inside reverses, and he found the endzone once via the run among his 200-plus rushing yards. "He is one of the best receivers in the area," Deaett noted. "He runs a 4.7 40 but also makes precise patterns and when he gets his hands on the ball he makes things happen." He also is a deft punt returner, running back a school-record four for touchdowns and averaging close to 20 yards a return this year. Only a junior, he also played as a defensive back.

MIKE RICKETT, Fair Lawn — This two-time first-teamer is far and away the season and career record-holder for catches and yards at the school, finishing with record totals of 67 catches and 1,173 yards this season. He now has 158 career receptions for 2,265 yards and 24 touchdowns, all school standards, and 25 career scores. He also has single game records of 14 catches (this year) and 232 yards (1994), and Alberque said, "He is a complete offensive weapon, a player with good speed and soft hands who can also make defenders miss

tackles that allow him yards after the catch." He was also in the defensive secondary and had four interceptions on the year.

BOB KONDRAT, Mahwah — A 220-pound tight end is a luxury at most schools, and this senior played like he was a tackle on runs yet displayed good hands and quickness when running pass routes. He caught 22 passes for 386 yards, a 17.6 average per catch, and he scored four touchdowns and a two-point conversion this year. It was his blocking on sweeps that Caporale found to be his best asset. "His hook blocks sprung the backs for many a big gain this year," the coach said. As a defensive player, he had 61 tackles, including 30 solos, with 10 tackles for losses and 5 sacks. Looking to major in hotel management, he is eyeing Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Villanova among his college choices.

BILL LAFORET, Mahwah — Not only did this second-generation Thunderbird (his father played for Caporale in 1965) do the regular snaps, but he also handled the long snaps for the past three seasons as well. He had only one bad snap in three seasons on punts, extra points and field goals. He won the team's award as the top lineman this year and graded out at 83 percent. "Colleges love his long-snap ability," Caporale noted, "and he is a great pass blocker and a solid drive blocker." Also a defensive tackle, the 240-pounder is getting looks from Fordham, Monmouth and Towson State — among others.

ERIC ANDERSON, Waldwick — This senior guard made most of the key blocks that helped the Warrior running game register 1,500 yards this year. He made the adjustment from pass blocking the majority of the time in 1994 to the run blocking this year, and he was very strong on straight-ahead blocks, creating a good inside running game for the team. On defense, he was on the front line and registered 47 tackles and one sack, with an 11-tackle effort against Hawthorne his best outing.

JON HARTZ, Mahwah — This senior was voted the most improved player for the Thunderbirds this year, and in his first year as a starter he was a key member of a line that allowed only four sacks of its quarterback all season. He graded out at 80 percent and Caporale said, "He was strong as the pulling guard on our sweeps, but his forte was straight-ahead drive blocking on power runs, as well as his pass blocking." He scored 1,360 on his SATs and Albany is

among the Division 2 and 3 schools looking at him.

CHRIS DeLUNA, Fair Lawn — At the outset of the season this senior was projected to be a possible candidate for any of the guard or tackle spots by Alberque, who said, "He is a very capable lineman who can play any side of the ball at either position with solid results. We knew we could count on him no matter where he played." He moved in at tackle and was the line leader for the 7-2 Cutters, grading out as the top lineman while not giving up a sack by his man all season long.

KEVIN VAN LENTEN, Glen Rock — This big tackle was a strong pass blocker as well as a good drive blocker this year. After playing mostly defense last year, he trimmed down a bit to 235 pounds, built up his endurance and was able to go both ways full time. "He has very quick feet for his size," Deaett said, "and we ran over his side most of the time. He also is a good trap blocker for our wingback reverses." On defense he picked up 40 solo tackles, a high number for his position, and had 60 total tackles.

AARON SCHRAGER, Ramsey — A do-all performer for the Rams this year, he was their leading scorer with 78 points — including four rushing touchdowns and one TD catch. As a kicker, he hit on 27 of 31 extra point attempts and made up for three of them by picking up two-point conversion runs. He also set the school record with five field goals made, on seven tries, and he has a three-year total of 63

extra points in 76 attempts (83 percent) and 12 of 18 field goals (67 percent), all school records, for 134 points. As a running back, he added over 200 yards rushing this year.

CHRIS SIMMS, Ramapo — It is rare when a freshman steps up to the varsity in any position, but this quarterback (son of former Giants signal-caller Phil Simms) made the jump to the starting lineup despite having not played the previous season in junior ball. Miello said, "He has the poise and leadership qualities that few players possess, and while he took his lumps at times, he kept coming back and learning from the negatives." He completed about 50 percent of his passes for over 1,200 yards and seven touchdowns, including a school-record 96-yarder. His yardage total was the third-highest single season aggregate at the school, and he already ranks sixth in all-time passing yardage and sixth in TD passes.

AL DEAETT, Glen Rock — After two decades away from the head coaching wars, this veteran coach stepped back into the driver's seat this year and directed the Panthers to a 10-1 mark and a semifinal spot in the Group 2 playoffs and a B-PSL Carpenter Division title for the second year in a row. A defensive coordinator the past two years, that unit remained a strongpoint — allowing only 7.6 points a game while the offense put up 33.9 a contest. With a large junior contingent coming back, the Rockers should again be in the running for the post-season in 1996.

Ramsey places four on star defensive unit

NORTHWEST BERGEN — In making a somewhat unexpected return to the state playoffs this year, Ramsey found that it was defense that was the name of its game, and it is no surprise that the Rams are the headliners of this year's All-Suburban first team defensive unit.

The squad, comprised of 12 seniors and one junior, has four players from Ramsey, including one of the two repeat selections, Brian Mistretta. Glen Rock has three players on the squad, while Waldwick, Mahwah, Ramapo, Midland Park, Hawthorne and Northern Highlands each placed one representative on the first unit.

The other repeat selection from 1994 is Ed Coblentz of Northern Highlands, while four players make the jump from last season's second team. Don Bosco's Chris Spanellis picked up the Most Versatile honor.

The player profiles:
DAVID FERRARA, Ramsey — A starter for three seasons, this defensive end was a mainstay for the Group 3 playoff semi-finalists, and it merited his jump from the second team last year. "He is probably the best player I have ever coached," said Rams' head coach Steve Hyman. "He combines speed (4.6 seconds in the 40-yard dash) and strength and plays sideline to sideline."

Ferrara's stat line reads 81 tackles, including 56 solos, with 15 quarterback sacks and 28 pressures. He also had five caused fumbles, two fumble recoveries and two pass deflections while adding two blocked punts and a blocked extra point. On offense, he made the move from tight end to tackle and shored up the offensive line, a key factor in the Rams' march to the post-season. Stanford and Ohio State are among the colleges interested in him for next fall.

CHARLY NEUHAUS, Ramsey — A late-season ankle injury slowed this senior down for the last three games, but he still played nearly every down on defense during that stretch, taking some time off from the offensive line instead. Playing opposite Ferrara most of the time, he racked up 79 tackles, including 48 solos, and notched 10 sacks and 15 quarterback pressures along with a fumble recovery. "He is a solid lineman who can play both the run and the pass equally well," Hyman noted. His offensive line blocking was another strong point in getting the Rams into the playoffs this year.

KEVIN LUCCARELLI, Waldwick — A strong, two-way player for

the Warriors, this senior nose guard spent nearly every minute of each game on the field. He finished the year with 48 tackles, including 34 solos, and added four sacks despite constant double-team blocks inside. He finished strong, and his block of a 28-yard field-goal attempt and game-ending 11-yard sack against Midland Park helped preserve a 6-0 triple-overtime win. He was also a fullback on offense, where he had 46 carries for 212 yards (4.6 yards per rush) and scored three touchdowns.

CHRIS REINARTZ, Glen Rock — An imposing defensive end at 6-foot-4 and 200 pounds, this junior was called by head coach Al Deaett as "the only Division 1 prospect on the team, and the player along with Helwig most responsible for our defensive success." Added Deaett, "And he hits like a train."

With 52 solo tackles among his 75 total stops, Reinartz also had six sacks, three caused fumbles and one fumble recovery. On offense, he was a slot receiver and caught two touchdown passes and a two-point conversion among his 15 receptions for 202 yards (13.5 per catch).

DAN BRODIE, Glen Rock — The inside linebacker had a stellar season, recording 115 tackles, including 70 solos. He teamed with Helwig to shut down every opponents' rushing game and showed good instincts coming up to make the hit at the line of scrimmage. He added two sacks, one interception and one fumble recovery. "Dan really came on this year, and with his frame, he could end up around 240 pounds by the end of his college career," Deaett said. Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Rhode Island are among the schools looking at him.

FRANK CHAMBERLIN, Mahwah — The jump from last year's second team to the first team this year was based on this senior's relentless pressure against opposing offenses. Few blockers were able to control him for even a series of plays let alone a whole game, and he came up with 114 tackles, including 75 solos, from his middle linebacker slot. He added nine tackles for losses, four sacks, six caused fumbles, three fumble recoveries, five tipped passes and an interception. "Frank is a strong and powerful tackler who reads plays exceptionally well," said head coach Ed Caporale.

Chamberlin also was a force on offense, running for 867 yards on 104 carries (8.3 yards per rush) and catching six passes for 30 yards while scor-

ing 15 touchdowns and three conversions for 96 points. He is likely headed to Boston College to continue his career in the fall.

CHRIS HELWIG, Glen Rock — The Panther defense is designed to funnel the action to its linebackers, and this senior made the most of his opportunities in the scheme, making 150 tackles, including 91 solos. He added six sacks, two caused fumbles, one fumble recovery and three interceptions. "Chris was a rock out there," said Deaett. "He has a tremendous sense for the ball. It seemed like he was in on every tackle on every play at times."

Helwig, who called all of the defensive signals, had double-figure tackle totals in all 11 games and double-figure solo tackle totals in three games, including 15 against Hawthorne. Susquehanna is one school in the running for his services for the fall.

TIM WRIGHT, Ramapo — A three-year starter at linebacker for the Raiders, this senior was the defensive leader of the team and finished with 87 solo tackles this season, breaking the school record for solo takedowns set in 1983. He also holds the career mark of 212 solo tackles, and he added 39 assists to total 126 stops on the year. He had three interceptions, four caused fumbles, three fumble recoveries and four sacks.

"Tim is one of the best defensive players to come through this school ever," said head coach Mike Miello. "He was durable, strong and quick enough to make the plays on faster backs and smart enough to make the proper reads."

A fullback on offense, he added a pair of rushing touchdowns to his ledger.

JOE AZZE, Hawthorne — A second-team selection last year, he moves up this year after completing an all-around season. "He hits like a linebacker, and he came off the field only on our kickoffs," noted head coach Neal Hancock of the defensive back, who did miss the last two games after breaking a thumb in the seventh contest. Despite playing only seven games, he had 73 tackles, including 31 solos, and six interceptions with a caused fumble and a fumble recovery.

A starter midway through his sophomore year, he also added 289 yards and two touchdowns rushing and 99 yards on nine receptions. He was the punter with a 32-yard average and also returned punts and kickoffs.

ED COBLENTZ, Northern Highlands — "He plays like a linebacker the way he hits," head coach Steve Simonetti said of the free safety, "and he also has the ability to take another team's best receiver right out of a game by covering him like a blanket."

Coblentz had only one inter-

ception this year, giving him 10 for his career, but he defended eight passes and was second on the team in tackles with 60. He also quarterbacked the offense, throwing for over 1,000 yards and 10 touchdowns while running for three more.

RICH FAVATA, Ramsey — A move from wide receiver to quarterback after starter David Meyer broke his right collarbone took some of the edge off his defensive play, but this junior was still a valuable player in the secondary, as teams tried to shy away from Mistretta's side of the field. He came up with 48 tackles, including 29 solos, and added three interceptions and two fumble recoveries. On offense, he scored six touchdowns, three as a wide receiver and three as a quarterback, and threw for four other scores.

BRIAN MISTRETTA, Ramsey — A second straight first-team choice, Hyman calls this senior "our best cover back and an outstanding defensive player as well as a multi-purpose offensive player."

He totalled 23 tackles, including 19 solos, but he defended 16 passes and intercepted five others, giving him 15 interceptions for his three-year varsity career. On offense, he led the team with 10 touchdowns, five rushing and five receiving, and was the team's leading receiver with 27 catches. He also played quarterback in the Rams' final playoff game and threw a touchdown pass after Favata went out with an injury.

BILL SAUNDERS, Midland Park — This senior was a deceptively strong punter despite his 32-yard gross average. "We asked him to give us hang time, so we could get under kicks, and he delivered that," said head coach Dennis Conti. "He also was very consistent in the 30-to-35-yard range and did not shank a punt all year." His net average of 31 yards is a solid number, and he also handled the extra points and was the leading rusher with 550 yards. As an outside linebacker, he had 76 tackles, including 41 solos, 4.5 sacks and two caused fumbles.

CHRIS SPANELLIS, Don Bosco — The resurgence of the Ironmen program began this year, and this junior tailback was a big part on both sides of the ball. Spanellis also paced the Ironmen with seven punt returns for 73 yards and had 16 kickoff returns for 321 yards. "Chris is the best athlete on the team," said head coach Jackie Moore.

Woman is kidnapped, escapes in Indianapolis

By SEAN SEXTON

MAHWAH—On Dec. 4, a 24-year-old Waldwick woman was allegedly abducted by David James Ward, 38, of Duluth, Minn.

The victim, whose name has not been released by FBI officials, was leaving the Courtyard by Marriott where she works, shortly after the bar closed, according to reports.

According to Agent Richard Manning, the suspect was a customer in the bar and left shortly before closing.

The woman was allegedly assaulted by Ward at 11:55 p.m., as she walked to her car. According to Special Agent Barry W. Mawn, Ward grabbed her and dragged her to his truck and forced her into the cab of the vehicle.

"Over the course of the next several days, the young woman was bound and restrained as Ward allegedly drove through several states making a series of deliveries," Mawn said.

Manning said the victim was sexually assaulted while she was being held captive in the sleeping compartment of the tractor trailer.

"During the course of this trip, David James Ward sexually assaulted the victim by using force and by the threat of serious bodily injury," Manning said.

According to published reports by the FBI, the victim was able to escape from her kidnapper in Indianapolis when he went inside a truck stop on Dec. 7.

"The victim was able to free herself from the truck while he was outside," said FBI Special Agent Monica Baldwin.

When law enforcement officials found her she was still wearing the "restraints placed upon her by the defendant," said Manning.

Ward was arrested later on Dec. 7 on Interstate 72 in Illinois.

"A tracking device used by Ward's employer, Anderson Trucking Systems, places Ward's truck in Mahwah at the time of the abduction and in Indianapolis at the time of the victim's escape," Manning said.

In a "photo spread" style of line up that included pictures of five caucasian males, including the defendant, the victim identified Ward as her kidnapper.

The suspect is currently being held without bail in Sangamon County Jail in

Springfield, Ill., before being taken into FBI custody. If convicted, he could be sentenced to life imprisonment.

FBI agents did not reveal if whether or not Ward had a previous criminal record.

"The charges are a result of a joint investigation by the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office, the Bergen County Sheriff's Department, and the Mahwah Police Department," Mawn said.

Library adds cyberspace

Director ushers in new computers for the library's 40th anniversary

WALDWICK — As the Waldwick Public Library enters its 40th year, the board is waving goodbye to the past and welcoming in the future.

The library will be converting the clerical files, such as budget reports, to computerized files.

The library has had computerized card catalogs available to the public for six years but still has the standard Dewey Decimal card catalog for people who are shy about using

computers.

"We haven't updated the card catalog in five years," said David Kamykoski, library director for the last 20 years.

"People still like to use it for subject headings and some people who don't like computers still use the catalog but we are always willing to help people with the computers."

Kamykoski said the library has had an increase in circulation this past year.

"Last year the volume of

circulation was 83,586, but through the first week in December it was 100,000," he said.

When the director first came to Waldwick, in 1976, he worked with a staffer who used to get flustered whenever there was more than one person at the desk.

"She would come up to me and ask me to watch the desk while she got a drink of water (so she wouldn't have to deal with that many people)," Kamykoski said. "I don't know how she would have done today now that we always have to have to people at the desk."

Kamykoski said the increase is attributed to new programs

the library is offering for children and adults. These activities include the Parents and Tots program, which provides play time for children while the parents talk to each other and browse for books and other items.

During the last 40 years the library has also added space to the building with three "small room sized additions," Kamykoski said.

There is also a reception room for different programs that might be sponsored by the library. Unfortunately, some residents have confused the

hours of the reception room with that of the library.

"One New Year's Day while we were holding a reception for the new mayor, we got a call from a very harried mother asking what time we closed," Kamykoski recalled. "Apparently one of her children left a homework assignment to the last minute. She called at 8:05 in the morning and I was just there setting up (for the party). I don't know of a single library in the country open on New Year's Day."

Another factor that Kamykoski attributes to the increased circulation is the quality of service the library provides.

"We try to treat everyone that comes in here like they were the mayor," he said. "We try to help with any request for assistance no matter how strange the topic; we also try not to roll our eyes because people pick up on body language."

Kamykoski said storage cabinets and book shelves will be necessary in the upcoming year as the circulation continues to increase.

The total cost of the new items for circulation, maintenance of the building, and storage cabinets for the files will be \$50,000. The Mayor and Council will consider this figure as they prepare for the 1996 budget next month.

"We have simply run out of space," he said.

Councilman Scott Stahlman said that of the \$50,000, \$3,000 is expected to be used for shelves, while another \$3,000 will be spent on new items for circulation.

Many disabled in limbo

Marianne Stillman and Elaine Sabato shrieked with excitement after getting notice in September that their disabled relatives soon would be moving out of their Bergen County homes and into community residential programs after years of languishing on a statewide waiting list.

But four months later, they are still waiting. Stillman, a widow, is the sole caregiver for her 23-year-old, severely disabled son, Mark, who weighs 76 pounds, must be lifted, carried, diapered, bathed, and fed. He has been on the waiting list eight years and considered "in urgent need" of services for more than two years.

"I want to know where he [my son] is," said Stillman of Waldwick. "I want to see him established before something happens to me. I want to know he's OK and familiar with his environment."

In November 1994, voters approved a \$160 million bond issue to expand community-based residential programs for more than 4,000 disabled adults awaiting such care. Many of the families campaigned for the bond issue, saying they could no longer meet the demands of their disabled adult relatives.

In September, Governor Whitman signed into law the first \$52 million

installment of the bond issue, which also will finance other social service programs. And legislators appropriated an additional \$5 million, enough to finance community programs for about 160 of those who had been waiting the longest, including 45 in Bergen County and 10 in Passaic County.

But action has been slow. And the future remains uncertain.

So far, about 16 of those 163 disabled residents have been moved into new community-based programs, said John McKeegan, a spokesman for the state Department of Human Services. A total of 45 have decided where they want to move, but the majority are either in the planning stage or have decided to stay where they are, he said.

"Nothing is happening," said Elaine Sabato of Rutherford.

Sabato has been caring for her 34-year-old sister, who suffers from Down's syndrome, for more than five years. Her sister, Judy, can feed herself, but needs help cutting her food, bathing, and washing her hair. The family has been considered "in urgent need" of help since 1992.

After a meeting in October with her sister's caseworker to discuss

various options, Sabato said she has heard little about Judy Sabato's future. "I know it's going to take a long time," she said.

Although some families are frustrated with the pace of placements, others fret that a tight state budget will prevent their relatives from moving off the waiting list. The bond issue can finance only construction and building rehabilitation, so staffing for new programs depends on state funds, which could be in short supply in the upcoming budget.

Jane Chen of Park Ridge said her 25-year-old disabled son has been on the waiting list seven years. Sonny Chen missed the cutoff for first-round placement by two months, she said.

"This year, we don't have any hope," Chen said. "We really want it next year."

At a State House press conference on Wednesday, Paul Polito, executive director of the ARC of New Jersey, an agency that provides services to the disabled, asked state officials to approve another \$12 million to move about 400 people off the waiting list and into appropriate community programs. He told state officials "not to abandon our most vulnerable citizens at a time when they most need it."

Reducing the waiting list remains a priority for the Human Services Department, McKeegan said. "But it all has to be done in context of all the budget numbers," he added.

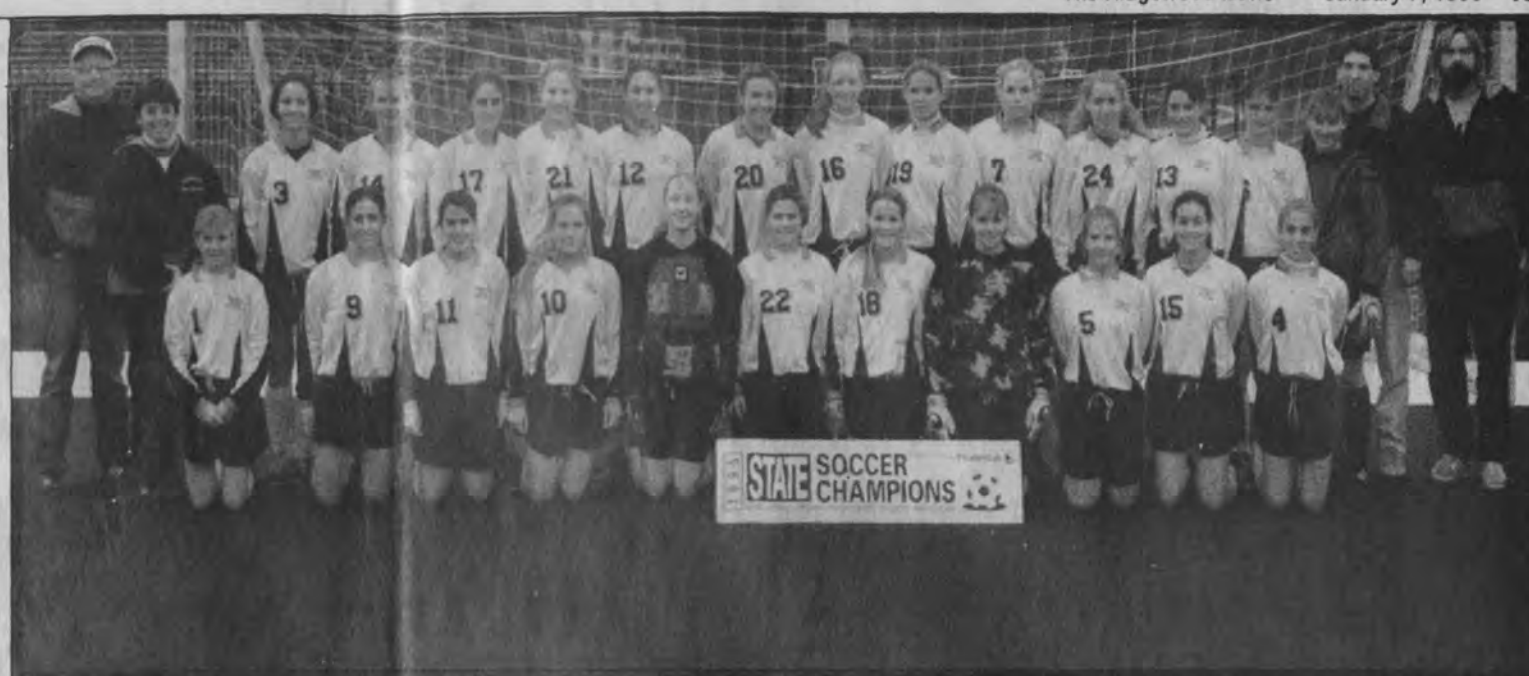

Borough schools receive excellent audit report

The Waldwick Board of Education received an excellent audit report for the 1994-95 school year, according to school officials. The audit included three minor recommendations, two of which have already been addressed.

The board trustees recently accepted the report prepared by the accounting firm of Lerch, Vinci and Higgins of Fair Lawn.

In presenting detailed financial information to the trustees,

auditing partner Paul Lerch said, "Our firm is issuing an unqualified opinion regarding the excellent condition of the school district's financial records. In comparison to other districts, Waldwick has done exceedingly well. I commend the board and its staff for a job well done."

The 1994-95 school year was the second in which all New Jersey public school districts were required to estab-

lish and maintain a double-entry system of accounting and record keeping. Previously, New Jersey was one of only two states that permitted school districts to maintain a single-entry system. According to the auditor, some school districts are still having difficulties meeting the new requirements. However, he noted that the Waldwick school district has competently and efficiently completed its transition to the double-entry system as required.

Waldwick and Allendale to meet to resolve pistol range issues

The Allendale Council is planning to meet with Waldwick officials in an attempt to move toward resolution of the objections from some Allendale residents regarding what they say is excessive and increased use of the police pistol range in Waldwick near the Allendale border. The meeting is tentatively scheduled for February, but no date had been set at press time.

A number of Allendale residents have appeared at several council meetings over the past several months to express their discontent with the pistol range for a number of reasons, including what they call excessive and disruptive

noise and the possibility of stray bullets.

Allendale officials, in many cases, have been sympathetic to the complaints of residents, but have no authority to order or demand that Waldwick curtail range activity. Waldwick officials have suggested that putting a ceiling over the actual shooting area and constructing improved baffles would diminish the noise, but have resisted suggestions that the range be closed. According to Waldwick's officials, the actual risk is negligible.

State officials declined to interfere in the situation, and urged local communities to work out a compromise on their own.

Pay surpasses most professions

Staff writers David Glovin and John Mooney gave superb coverage of teacher salaries. Within a few years, top salaries will reach \$100,000. What a lucrative pay for a 6½-hour day and a 180- to 184-day year. This, plus the \$8,000 to \$10,000 worth of benefits, and paid accumulated unused sick leave upon retirement, surpasses most professions.

The time that teachers spend at home on class assignments varies. As a retired teacher, I know that many teachers did not assign written work that they would have had to evaluate after school. They even chose not to give mid-term or final exams that they would have to grade.

High salaries have become a burden for most taxpayers who have to struggle to support the system. Many businessmen, managers, seasonal workers, factory employees, and even most professionals are not guaranteed by legislation the lucrative benefits and tenured status that teachers enjoy.

Not just 9 to 3

I can't help but wonder how the mayor of a small community like Waldwick could possibly make such a foolish and ignorant statement. First of all, where in Bergen County do public high schools begin the day at 9 o'clock? Most high school teachers I know arrive at school at about 7:30 a.m. and begin teaching by 8.

Does he know how many hours teachers spend after 3 grading tests, reports, essays, and research papers? Does he know how much time it takes to prepare lesson plans and materials for classes?

Too many talented and bright teachers have left the profession to enter business and industry because the pay is better there. It is only now that quality people are attracted to teaching because the salary is decent.

Finally catching up

Having worked as both a journalist and a teacher, I believe I am in a position to comment on your articles about teachers' salaries. I fail to see how such information qualifies as news, nor how it benefits the democratic society that our teachers are mandated to pass on to students.

One wonders if your reporting is partially motivated by a gap between the salaries of reporters and teachers. You report that the salaries have little to do with merit, yet you provide a detailed chart showing that more than three-quarters of all the teachers have pursued higher education. Most teachers keep learning in order to keep up. Is this not a form of merit?

Teachers have a hard enough time dealing with the large percentage of parents who do not cooperate with the school or take time to do their part to see that their children learn. Articles such as these tend to reinforce negative parental attitudes.

If you want to pursue salaries, be fair and look at all the professions. Have you received a bill from a lawyer lately? It seems to me that \$150 per hour, the going rate in civil law, whether the lawyer writes a letter or files divorce papers, is well above a teacher's hourly rate, which breaks down to approximately \$24 per hour. Tradespeople who come to my home to make repairs charge \$50 per hour. If teachers' salaries have improved over the past decade, it simply makes up for the decades when teachers were grossly underpaid.

Waldwick schools get an 'A' in their audit

WALDWICK — The Waldwick Board of Education has received another excellent Audit Report for the 1994-95 school year with only minor recommendations made, some of which have already been addressed.

In addition to adjustments made to the Board's Treasurer's report, the town's high school

will now directly make cash deposits to the bank. This process is extremely beneficial in situations where the high school collects money for their various fund-raisers. As Business Administrator, Lames Mallen explained, "This eliminates the time lag of a day or two." In the past, the school had held on to the money until the it would be picked up for

deposit. Now that proces is eliminated, and the money is "deposited in a timely manner."

Mallen attributes their success to the small size of the school district which allow them the ability to "monitor our expenditures very carefully."

At its November work session, the Board accepted the report prepared by the accounting firm of Lerch, Vinci, and Higgins of Fair Lawn.

In presenting detailed financial information to the trustees on Nov. 13, auditing partner Paul Lerch said, "Our firm is issuing an unqualified opinion regarding the excellent condition of the school district's financial records. In comparison to other districts, Waldwick has done exceedingly well. I commend the Board and its staff for a job well done."

The 1994-95 school year was the second year in which all New Jersey public school districts were required to establish and maintain a double-entry system of accounting and record keeping. Previously, New Jersey was one of only two states that permitted school districts to maintain a single-entry system. According to the auditor, some school districts are still having problems meeting the new requirements. However, he noted that the Waldwick school district has competently and efficiently completed its transition to the double-entry system as required.

According to Mallen, up until the law was recently changed, "you couldn't spend more than you took in. Corporations required more profit than loss,"

however "our profit is the education we provide for the children." Mallen also believes that this is "the most accurate form of government because it is voted on by the people."

As the audit report indicated, many towns have been unable to keep up with the new double-entry system as well as Waldwick has. Out of the 48 school districts listed in the report, Waldwick was rated "among the most efficient."

"This is something the taxpayers should know," Mallen said.

Roof they lived under for 30 years falls

Under the weight of a 4-foot drift of snow, the house where a Waldwick couple lived for more than 30 years collapsed like an accordion Wednesday while the two were out buying groceries.

Harry and Anna Tossoonian returned to their home on a quiet street in the northwest corner of the borough to find fire crews wrapping yellow tape across their front walkway, their house's wooden frame exposed where the snow-draped roof had buckled.

"It's a nightmare," Harry Tossoonian said as he looked out at the tangle of metal and wood that rested just above his living-room ceiling. "I just don't believe this."

For the Tossoonians, the disaster brought a sudden — albeit temporary — brush with homelessness after three decades under one roof. For their neighbors, it was a warning of the danger overhead, as record-breaking piles of snow weighed down on North Jersey roofs for a second straight day.

In Teterboro, that force was packed into a mammoth 18-foot drift that settled so heavily on the roof of an airport building that it snapped a set of gas lines, officials said. The lines leaked fumes into three adjacent offices at Jet Aviation, which had to be evacuated.

Also Wednesday, building inspectors in the city of Passaic condemned a 15,000-square-foot, single-story building with a caved-in room. None of the two dozen employees of the mail-order distribution company housed in the Central Avenue structure were inside when it came down late Monday.

Across North Jersey, panicked residents and businesses owners flooded contractors with calls, searching for help to remove the pounds of snow and slush that had collected above their heads.

"Our phones have been ringing off the wall," said John Dulisse, of Simpson Roofing in Paterson. "Everybody is concerned that this

much snow will wreak havoc with their roof."

The concern hit home with neighbors of the Tossoonians, many of whom own similar styled split-leveled houses, which are especially prone to snowdrifts collecting in the wedge between the roof's two levels.

"I'm jumping out of my shoes every time I hear a noise," said Frances Lohmann, who watched as building inspectors assessed the damage to the Tossoonians' house.

"I have as much snow on my roof right now as they did this morning," Lohmann said. "As soon as I saw what happened, I picked up the phone and called a contractor. It'll be the best money I ever spend."

Roofing contractors typically charge between \$300 and \$400 to clear away the snow with either a shovel or snow blower. Henry Lemba of Saddle Brook Roofing said the work can be extremely dangerous and should be left to a professional.

"Under all that snow you have to watch out for skylights or pipes," Lemba said. "And of course it's very slippery. Even setting up a ladder on the snow and ice is dangerous."

With more snow predicted for later this week, contractors said they are hurrying to get as many roofs shoveled off as they can. Anything more than 2 to 3 feet of snow, especially on older homes, can pose a serious threat.

That is all too clear to Harry and Anna Tossoonian, who said they would stay with relatives while they wait for contractors to stabilize their house enough to allow them to collect their belongings.

"You can't imagine something so horrible would happen," Anna Tossoonian said. "There's a lot of snow on everyone's house. We just didn't think it was that big a problem."

ROOF TIPS

- Listen for creaking, and check the ceiling beneath the roof for cracks.
- If there are signs of failure, contact a town building inspector immediately.
- If you are concerned about snow piled in a drift of more than 2 or 3 feet, have a roofing contractor remove it.
- Don't go on a slippery roof yourself.

WALDWICK — After more than 40 years Boswell Engineering will no longer be the consulting engineer for the borough.

After a 4-2 vote, with Councilmen Bill Patterson and Ed Sherman voting against, Boswell Engineering was replaced by Vollmer Engineering.

The change was proposed by Mayor Rick Vander Wende because "it was time to change."

Vander Wende said Boswell had three different representatives assigned to the borough in three years, which "created an awkward situation."

However, the mayor said there was nothing in particular that Boswell had done to fall out of grace. "It is not unusual for mayors to fine tune their administration," Vander Wende said.

Councilman William Branagh agreed with the change and its timing. "I thought it was a good move for the

town," Branagh said. "The mayor decided it was time for a change and I agreed with him."

Patterson's opposition to the appointment of Vollmer is based on the fact that many employees, including Steve Boswell, are Waldwick residents.

"I can't see why we have to have such a reputable company pushed out," he said. "I have a lot of respect for Steve Boswell and his company."

Vollmer has done work for the borough in the past including the Waldwick Avenue reconstruction.

Sherman said he voted against the change because he did not see the need to change engineers. "It wasn't a vote against Vollemer, I am sure they will do a good job, the vote was simply against replacing Boswell," he said.

Steve Boswell found out about the proposal in the middle of December.

Waldwick's roads in good shape

WALDWICK — The blizzard that left Bergen County with more than two feet of snow had many towns baffled as far as snow removal.

For example as of Tuesday many businesses in Ridgewood were closed, and in Englewood, a portion of Palisade Avenue was closed.

But in spite of the record amount of snowfall most streets were clear in Waldwick.

"It was remarkable," said Councilman William Patterson. "As I was driving out of town to Wayne it was fine, but once I left Waldwick the streets were

snow covered."

Borough Administrator Gary Kratz said the town streets received "a lot of calcium chloride and tender loving care."

Joseph Agugliaro, assistant superintendent of the Department of Public Works (DPW), said the plowing process begins with salt (calcium chloride) mixed with calcium so the salt can work in colder conditions. Then once the snow accumulates into slush on the salted streets, the roads are plowed.

"Our mains were clear pretty quickly," Agugliaro said. "We also have a good staff of people."

That "good staff" worked from 10 a.m. on Sunday to 2:30 a.m. Tuesday, then put in a regular working day later after "getting a minimal amount of sleep."

In spite of more than 36 hours of working, the streets are not as wide as Agugliaro would like.

"One special problem we are encountering is the fact that there are still leaves on the street," he said. "They are not that wide."

Until the next snowfall (which may be as early as this Friday), the DPW will concentrate on hauling snow from town.

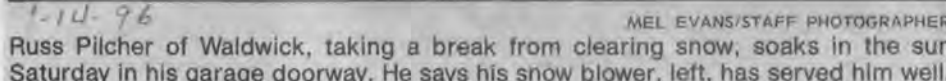

Snow collapses armory roof

Home, office also damaged by 2nd storm

Additional snow and freezing rain Friday night proved too much for some structures, causing several rooftops to collapse — at the end of a week that brought a blizzard, a state of emergency, and 34 storm-related deaths to the Garden State.

Rooftops on more than a dozen buildings have collapsed since the blizzard hit Sunday. On Saturday, casualties included a Waldwick home, a Clifton business, and the National Guard Armory in Teaneck. No serious injuries were reported.

Saturday's damage came on a day when the temperature at Teterboro reached 35 degrees and Governor Whitman lifted the state of emergency she had declared Sunday afternoon.

In Waldwick, the added weight of Friday's snow and rain brought down the roof of the Romano family's Sycamore Drive home. About 5 a.m. Saturday, the roof fell in, bringing the ceiling crashing into the living room where Ralph Romano and his wife were standing.

"We were in danger," he said. "It just missed us."

Romano and his wife were awakened by the sound of a cracking noise coming from the living room in their three-bedroom, split-level house, Waldwick police said. As they went to investigate, the couple saw the ceiling crash to the floor.

The couple and their son were able to escape without injury through a rear door of the house, which is now uninhabitable.

Just three days earlier, a split-level house of similar design on the same street also collapsed, causing other neighbors to worry.

"I've got my poor son up there trying to get the snow off the roof," Connie Gatson said. "I'm worried. I'm not taking any chances."

Waldwick appoints Vollmer as borough engineer

The Borough of Waldwick has begun the new year with a new borough engineer. Vollmer Associates of Rochelle Park was appointed to the post during the recent reorganization meeting, replacing Boswell/McClave Engineering of South Hackensack, which had served the municipality for more than 40 years.

Vollmer was the consulting engineer for the recent Waldwick Avenue reconstruction project.

The change was made on the recommendation of Mayor Rick Vander Wende. Councilmen William Patterson and Ed Sherman cast dissenting votes, citing their opinion that no change was warranted.

"I voted against it (the new appointment) because I felt there was no need to change engineers," Patterson told Villadom TIMES in a recent interview. He noted that the Boswell brothers are very familiar with Waldwick, having grown up there. One brother is still a resident, the councilman added. Patterson also pointed to the firm's employment of a former mayor of Waldwick and a former bor-

ough councilman.

Indicating Boswell/McClave's long-standing relationship with the borough, Patterson cited his personal esteem for the firm and for its staff. While neither he nor Councilman Sherman expressed negative comments about the new engineer, both questioned why the change had been made.

Asked to comment on the situation, a borough official stated succinctly that the council majority had decided it was time for a change. Mayor Vander Wende was on a business trip and could not be reached for comment.

During the reorganization the council also reappointed Lerch, Vinci and Higgins as the borough's auditors; Menelaos Toskos as borough attorney, and Ray Celentano as risk manager. As risk manager, Celentano is responsible for securing insurance quotes and working with the borough to eliminate potential insurance risks - preventing claims before they happen.

The reorganization session also featured the swearing-in of Mayor Rick Vander Wende and council members Art

Barthold and Ed Sherman. Joseph Musumeci will serve as council president.

Society has asked teachers to take on the task of being parent, counselor, educator, medical consultant, social worker, psychiatrist, and healer of social ills. Society has abdicated all of its responsibilities to its youth and handed them off to the schools. Our job doesn't end at 3 p.m.

Crash kills Waldwick man, injures two

A Waldwick man was killed when he apparently lost control of his car on a curve in Ringwood and it swerved into an oncoming car. The accident injured a mother and her infant in the second car, police said.

Richard McGowan, 63, was driving his 1974 Ford south on Route 511 at 6:30 p.m. Saturday when the car crossed into the

northbound lane and collided head-on with a 1994 Isuzu driven by Anna Thomas, 30, of the Hewitt section of West Milford.

McGowan died about five hours later while undergoing surgery at University Hospital in Newark. He had been flown there by helicopter with leg, head, and internal injuries, said Ringwood Police Officer Joseph Sullivan.

Thomas was treated for a cut on her knee and minor head injuries

and released from The Valley Hospital in Ridgewood. Her 5-month-old infant, Justine, who was riding in the passenger seat, was treated for a minor head injury and released.

The exact cause of the accident won't be determined until officers interview the victims' families and a witness to the crash, police said.

Sullivan said two bystanders pulled McGowan from the wreck as flames erupted near gas leaking

from his car's tank. Sullivan said McGowan was conscious but not speaking.

"We don't think he was exceeding the speed limit," Sullivan said. "Preliminarily, it looks like he didn't negotiate the curb correctly."

Officers moved Thomas and her baby and bystanders from the scene until firefighters extinguished the flames.

Sullivan said the roadway, located

in the Paterson Hills section, was dry and showed no signs of ice or snow. He said McGowan wasn't wearing a seat belt.

Sullivan said the fact that Thomas was wearing a seat belt and that her baby was strapped into a seat helped save their lives.

Homes, church suffer damage

Two Waldwick residences and one of the borough's churches recently suffered structural damage. The homes, both of which are located on Sycamore Avenue, sustained blizzard-related roof collapses. The Methodist Church on Franklin Turnpike, which also houses the non-profit Rain-bow Corners Nursery School, was subjected to leakage and some damage to the exterior walls.

"Both homes had extensive damage," Construction Code Official Robert Connell reported. "They're in the throes of repair right now."

Connell commented that, while the roofs were pitched (rather than flat) four foot deep drifts of snow on the tops of the two houses produced "extensive snow load." He added that the collapses are still under investigation by two architects.

Connell did note that the type of split level home in the Sycamore neighborhood features a low pitch on the lower level roof area. "This internal framing layout needs to be addressed by the homeowner," he added.

Waldwick fifth graders attend academic seminar on foods

Waldwick fifth grade students in the Extended Studies Program recently participated in an academic seminar about foods. Held at Memorial School in West Paterson, the program also included students from Wayne, Hawthorne, and Bloomingdale.

The following Waldwick fifth graders, accompanied by teacher Arlene Platt, participated in the program: Thomas Desiderio, Cheryl Stigel, Robert Pease, Kathleen Walsh, Carolyn Banta, Seth Pyenson, Tracy Corbett, Meghan Marino, Jennifer Magee, Melissa Shaw, and Robyn Stern. School psychologist Eleanor Rotman opened the pro-

gram with a discussion of eating disorders. Students learned the factors that contribute to obesity, anorexia nervosa, and bulimia. After receiving relevant materials, they worked in groups to research information on nutrition, dietary trends in the United States, and food production and processing. Using the Creative Problem Solving Model, the fifth graders solved a problem specifically designed for their group. This required them to brainstorm and develop solutions. Each group then created a plan for its solutions and creatively presented the results to all the seminar's participants.

The two homes, which suffered collapses only days apart, were constructed approximately 30-32 years ago, Connell said. While he could not confirm whether the two houses in question had been built by the same developer, Connell did note that the Sycamore area had been built in the early 1960s.

According to Danielle Abate, publicity chairwoman for Rainbow Corners, some area residents have been circulating misinformation regarding the damage at the church building. As of press time, Abate anticipated that a Monday night meeting would be held at borough hall regarding the damage.

He added, "There was a great amount of roof leakage, but the (church) roof did not collapse. There was extensive roof load from the snow." The church roof, which is flat, has since been cleared.

"Everything is being corrected to ensure the safety of the children," Connell said of the church. "An engineer is working on it right now."

BOND ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTIONS 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 AND 11 OF THE BOND ORDINANCE (ORD. NO. 4-95) ENTITLED, "BOND ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE IMPROVEMENT OF PORTIONS OF DORA AVENUE IN, BY AND FOR THE BOROUGH OF WALDWICK, IN THE COUNTY OF BERGEN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, A LOCAL IMPROVEMENT, TO APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$270,000 TO PAY THE COST THEREOF, TO MAKE A DOWN PAYMENT TO FINANCE SUCH APPROPRIATION AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN ANTICIPATION OF SUCH BONDS", ADOPTED APRIL 11, 1995.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOROUGH COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF WALDWICK, IN THE COUNTY OF BERGEN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 2 of an ordinance (Ord. No. 4-95) entitled: "BOND ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE IMPROVEMENT OF PORTIONS OF DORA AVENUE IN, BY AND FOR THE BOROUGH OF WALDWICK, IN THE COUNTY OF BERGEN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, A LOCAL IMPROVEMENT, TO APPROPRIATE THE SUM OF \$270,000 TO PAY THE COST THEREOF, TO MAKE A DOWN PAYMENT TO FINANCE SUCH APPROPRIATION AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BOND ANTICIPATION NOTES IN ANTICIPATION OF SUCH BONDS" shall be amended to read as follows:

Section 2. The sum of \$270,000 is hereby appropriated to the payment of the improvement described in Section 1 of this ordinance. Said sum so appropriated shall be met from the proceeds of the sale of the bonds authorized and the down payment made by this ordinance. It is anticipated that a grant in the amount of \$100,000 from the State of New Jersey Department of Transportation Trust Fund shall be received by the Borough to finance the cost of the improvement described in Section 1 hereof. Said grant funds shall be applied as set forth in Section 12 hereof.

Section 3. Section 4 of the Prior Ordinance is hereby amended to (A) increase the estimated cost of the purpose from \$270,000 to \$370,000, (B) increase the estimated maximum amount of the special assessments from \$90,000 to \$120,000, and shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. It is hereby determined and stated that (1) the Borough will contribute \$250,000 of the cost of said improvement, and (2) the estimated maximum amount of the special assessments for said improvement is \$120,000, and (3) no special assessments for such improvement have been levied or confirmed, and (4) such special assessments may be paid in five annual installments."

Section 5. Section 5 of the Prior Ordinance is hereby amended to (A) increase the estimated cost of the purpose from \$270,000 to \$370,000, (B) increase the down payment from \$120,000 to \$170,000, (C) increase the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes from \$257,100 to \$352,100, and (D) increase the aggregate amount of Section 2 expenses from \$355,000 to \$455,000, and shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. It is hereby determined and stated that (1) the purpose of such improvement (hereinafter referred to as "purpose") is not a current expense of said Borough, and (2) it is necessary to finance said purpose by the issuance of obligations of said Borough pursuant to the Local Bond Law, and (3) the estimated cost of said purpose is \$370,000, and (4) \$17,900 of said sum is to be provided by the down payment hereinafter appropriated to finance said purpose, and (5) the estimated maximum amount of bonds or notes necessary to be issued for said purpose is \$352,100, and (6) the cost of such purpose, as which is estimated to be necessary to finance the cost of such purpose, including architect's fees, accounting, engineering, legal, inspection costs, legal expenses and other expenses, including interest on such obligations to the extent permitted by Section 20 of the Local Bond Law, shall be determined by the Board of Finance of the Borough of Waldwick."

Section 6. Section 6 of the Prior Ordinance is hereby amended to increase the down payment appropriated from \$120,000 to \$170,000, and shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 6. It is hereby determined and stated that the down payment of \$170,000 appropriated for down payment of capital expenditures of the Local Bond Law shall be determined by the Board of Finance of the Borough of Waldwick. The sum of \$17,900 is hereby appropriated from such moneys to the payment of the cost of said purpose."

Section 7. Section 7 of the Prior Ordinance is hereby amended to increase the amount of bonds authorized from \$257,100 to \$352,100, and shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 7. To finance said purpose, bonds of the Borough of Waldwick in the amount of \$352,100, not exceeding \$352,100, are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Bond Law. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate per annum as may be hereafter determined within the limitations prescribed by law. All matters with respect to said bonds not determined by this ordinance shall be determined by resolution of the Board of Finance of the Borough of Waldwick."

Section 8. Section 8 of the Prior Ordinance is hereby amended to increase the amount of bond anticipation notes authorized from \$257,100 to \$352,100, and shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 8. To finance said purpose, bond anticipation notes of the Borough of Waldwick in the amount of \$352,100, not exceeding \$352,100, are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Bond Law in anticipation of the issuance of said bonds. In the event that bonds are issued pursuant to this ordinance, the aggregate amount of notes hereby authorized to be issued shall be reduced by an amount equal to the principal amount of the bonds so issued. If the aggregate amount of outstanding bonds and notes issued pursuant to this ordinance shall at any time exceed the sum first mentioned in this section, the moneys raised by the issuance of said bonds shall, to not less than the amount of such excess, be applied to the payment of such notes then outstanding."

Section 9. Section 11 of the Prior Ordinance is hereby amended to increase the amount of gross debt of the Borough of Waldwick from \$257,100 to \$352,100, and shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 11. It is hereby determined and stated that the Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly made and filed in the office of the Borough Clerk of said Borough, and that such statement so filed shows that the gross debt of said Borough, as defined in Section 43 of the Local Bond Law, is increased by this ordinance by \$352,100. It is further determined that the issuance of the bonds and notes authorized by this ordinance will be within all debt limitations prescribed by said Local Bond Law."

Section 12. This ordinance shall take effect twenty days after the first publication hereof after final passage.

Council approves bonding for Dora Avenue

The Waldwick Council last week amended a previous bond ordinance to provide an additional \$100,000 for improvements to Dora Avenue.

"We hadn't budgeted enough," Borough Administrator Gary Kratz commented. He explained that the original appropriation of \$270,000 was based on a grant proposal written a year and a half ago. "The estimates were dated," Kratz summarized.

The prior ordinance, which had been adopted by the borough in April, 1995, was updated to provide \$370,000 for the Dora Avenue project. As amended, the ordinance notes that the borough's contribution to the project will be increased from \$180,000 to \$250,000. In addition, the estimated maximum amount of special assessments has been increased from \$90,000 to \$120,000. The down payment has also been boosted to

\$17,900 from \$12,900. The amount of bonds authorized has likewise been increased to \$352,100 from \$257,100.

The cost of the project includes funds for architect's fees, accounting, engineering and inspection costs, and legal and other expenses.

The administrator noted that the council plans to accept bids in early February. An early summer completion date is targeted.

Sewer costs decrease

In other business before the council, Environmental Committee Chairman, Bill Paterson reported a drop of \$24,000 in the borough's payment to the local sewer authority.

This year's payment, which will total \$1,434,755, reflects a downturn in the previous trend of increased fees paid by the borough.

Church, nursery school recovering from damage

The United Methodist Church on Franklin Turnpike in Waldwick is recovering from flood damage resulting from a roof leak caused by the severe winter weather a few weeks ago. During the construction process, Rainbow Corners Nursery School, which is based in the church, will temporarily relocate to the Christ Community Church, 162 Wyckoff Avenue, Waldwick.

Danielle Abate, publicity chairwoman for Rainbow Cor-

ners, noted that the school's board hopes the move will not exceed 60 days. She explained that the state has approved the temporary relocation of the nursery school, but a stay of more than 60 days would affect the school's license.

Abate noted that registration has been postponed until Feb. 14-16. Parents will be asked to register their children on those days between 9 and 11:30 a.m. at the Christ

Church location.

Construction Code Official Robert Connell previously reported that the church roof suffered an extensive snow load, but did not collapse, as some residents had originally believed.

An engineer was called in to assess the situation. The report revealed leakage and some damage to the church's exterior walls.

Waldwick Police Department Report

In the past month, officers of the Waldwick Police Department have made 10 arrests for Underage Possession of Alcohol. The majority of the arrests were the result of surveillances by plain clothes and uniformed officers of local liquor retailers.

In many of the cases the officers observed the individuals enter the establishment, purchase the alcohol through the use of false or altered identification, and leave the store for a waiting vehicle. Of those arrested, there were four 19-year-olds from Ridgewood, two 18-year-olds from Midland Park, one 18-year-old from Ramsey, and three juveniles from Waldwick.

In each case the defendants were arrested for violation of the statute that prohibits the possession of alcoholic bev-

erages by those under 21 in any public place. In addition, if the possession was in a motor vehicle there is a mandatory six-month suspension of the person's NJ driving privilege.

After viewing the false/altered identification used, the officers declined to prosecute the establishments that sold the alcohol.

In a separate incident on Jan. 28, at approximately 12:28 a.m., Police Officer Woessner arrested a 37-year-old woman from Glenwood on a charge of Driving While Intoxicated after observing her vehicle being driven erratically on Wyckoff Avenue. She was transported to headquarters and administered a breathalyzer test. The resultant readings were .20 and .21 BAC. The woman was then processed and released pending a Feb. 8 court appearance.

Allendale residents push for action on Waldwick pistol range

Members of the Allendale Council turned a sympathetic ear to two residents who urged the governing body to take a more active stance in its dealings with Waldwick in terms of reducing the noise level at the police pistol range Waldwick operates within earshot of the Allendale border.

"They're aware we have a problem. We're aware that they're not interested in our problem," said Mark Webber, an Allendale resident whose home is near the pistol range. "How are we going to do this?"

Allendale Council members had scheduled a meeting with Waldwick Council members for a tentative date late in February to try to reach some consensus on range hours and access that would lead to a quieter neighborhood for Allendale neighbors of the Waldwick site. Mutual scheduling problems, however, had prevented that meeting.

"I wish we could do it quickly, but you don't always get it done that way," said Councilman Richard Furfaro.

Webber, however, urged faster action. "The first nice day of the spring they just come out and blaze away, and it gets worse and worse," Webber said. "Then in the summer I guess it gets too hot to shoot, and in the fall it starts again. I'd like to be able to enjoy my yard this year."

"We're going to press them hard to meet us in February. We don't want to let it go into March," said Councilman Stephen Howe.

Fred Litt, another activist, suggested that the burden of

proof that the noise level is legal should be pushed onto Waldwick. Litt also wanted to know why Bergen County had not notified Waldwick that the noise level from range use was excessive.

Borough Attorney David Bole said that the burden of proof that Waldwick is exempt from restrictions on range noise levels is on Waldwick, and could be explored further. "This is certainly not a normal situation," Bole said.

The Allendale Council, however, rejected Litt's suggestion to conduct an investigation through the borough attorney as to whether Allendale residents selling their houses have a legal obligation to tell prospective buyers about range noise levels.

The issue of the range became a local cause celebre about two years ago. Residents say that range use and the volume of noise increased dramatically in 1993-94.

Waldwick officials have previously argued that the range, as a pre-existing use, is exempt from restrictions that would apply if it were to be built today. Measures to make the range quieter, including better baffles and a roof over the shooting area, are reportedly being considered.

Litt and Webber urged the Allendale Council to take a proactive stance in getting Waldwick to lower the noise level at the range through tougher negotiations.

"As soon as we get a revised date, will let you know," Mayor Albert Klomberg told the residents.

Aid figures omit plunge in utility tax

TRENTON — It would appear from the municipal aid figures released Tuesday by the Whitman administration that Paterson and Waldwick emerged relatively unscathed from the governor's proposed budget cuts. Paterson's aid would go down only \$15,000, and Waldwick's by \$3,700.

But the bottom line is that both towns are getting walloped. Paterson stands to lose nearly \$450,000, and Waldwick more than \$200,000.

In a departure from past practice, the administration's aid figures failed to include how much towns and cities will receive in supplemental revenues from a tax imposed on utilities. The tax revenues are expected to be down by nearly \$70 million, and by ignoring that the administration is hiding the true impact of the governor's budget, several North Jersey mayors said.

The size of the aid reduction infuriated Paterson Mayor William J. Pascrell Jr., one of several local officials to warn of service cuts or property tax increases.

"We have to make up [the dif-

As written, Neumann's analysis is very misleading because Social Security benefits have been a "life savor" for many hard working senior citizen and disabled ex-working people.

During the 1929 to 1936 depression, many hard working people and senior citizens lost everything they had including their jobs. Nothing was left from their savings due to bank and savings and loan company failures. To solve this problem, the Social Security Act was passed by Congress. It forced working people to save a portion of their income for retirement and loss of a job due to permanent disability. The references to S.S. payments as a tax is misleading because you are supposed to get back as income after retirement or in the case you are forced to retire due to permanent disability.

At the present time, there are few companies that are able to offer us a real retirement security. Only Federal, State, County and City governments can

ference] or cut," said Pascrell, who also is a Democratic assemblyman. "If the police and firefighters are the greatest portion of the budget, where in God's name are we going to cut?"

In Montvale — which stands to lose \$547,504 in state aid, including \$110,000 in supplemental aid — Mayor David Metlitz said: "People in Trenton are just saying that the towns have to work harder to reduce property taxes. How can [towns] reduce taxes when the supplemental numbers that they used to give us are being taken away?"

The cause for much of the consternation is the Gross Receipts and Franchise Taxes, a levy on utilities that don't pay property tax. The towns received \$94 million in supplemental aid from the utility tax revenues last year. This year, with revenues from that tax dropping sharply, municipalities can count on only \$25 million — and that money was not included in the town-by-town aid figures released Tuesday.

"The administration can't have it both ways," said Assembly Minority Leader Joseph V. Doria Jr., D-Bayonne. "If it was property tax relief last year, it's a cut in property tax relief this year."

Clifton Mayor James Anzaldi, a Republican, agreed.

"There is a direct effect on local property taxes," he said. "No matter how many cuts we make in city government, there is still a loss. No matter how much you try to save, the state government, through these cuts, has directly affected the tax rate. If we cut a half-million dollars and they take away a half-million, that's a wash."

By even the administration's figures, the city stands to lose \$447,000 — largely because of an \$8 million cut in Aid to Densely Populated Municipalities, a program that largely benefits Bergen County towns and Clifton in Passaic County. In addition, The Record's analysis of the gross receipts revenue show that the city would lose at least an additional \$450,000, for a total drop in aid of about \$900,000.

GOP buying radio spots hailing Whitman's budget

TRENTON — Governor Whitman is hitting the airwaves to promote her proposed \$16 billion "taxpayer's" budget.

The New Jersey Republican State Committee will spend more than \$100,000 to run the 60-second ad on radio stations in New Jersey, New York, and Philadelphia. The ad began airing Tuesday.

State GOP Executive Director Tom Wilson said the ads are running two or three times a day. The ads, produced by The Murphy Pintaske Agency of Washington, will run for the next 10 days, he said.

In the ad, Whitman says her fiscal year 1997 budget plan holds down spending but includes more money to fight crime and improve schools. She

also touts her new welfare reform plan and her income tax cuts.

"Together, we've made real progress," she says. "We've cut wasteful government spending and delivered tax cuts ahead of schedule, but the special interests are fighting us at every turn."

Whitman does not name the special interest groups, nor does she attack anyone by name.

She also avoids mentioning some controversial parts of her budget. She has proposed raising a \$250 million disability insurance fund, eliminating 1,200 state jobs, reducing funding for some localities and suburban schools, and denying prescription drug subsidies to some 30,000 senior citizens and disabled people.

The cause of the crunch is the sharp drop in revenues from the gross receipts tax. By law, the first \$685 million of the tax goes to municipalities. The state then takes its share of the tax revenue, an amount usually more than \$200 million. Any additional tax revenue goes to the municipalities later in the year as a supplemental appropriation.

But as more corporations, small businesses, and school districts turn to alternative energy sources, such as co-generation or untaxed out-of-state natural gas, revenues from the Gross Receipts and Franchise Taxes have dropped precipitously. A state Treasury Department task force is studying the problem, but no changes in energy taxes were proposed.

Community Affairs Commissioner Harriet Derman acknowledged that supplemental gross receipts were down, but added: "The law does not guarantee extra money" for the towns.

It is unclear whether the GOP-controlled Legislature will move to

restore the aid. Senate President Donald T. DiFrancesco, R-Union, said it is too early in the budget process to determine whether there is a need to increase aid to municipalities.

At a State House news conference, top Whitman administration officials released town-by-town figures that show a host of winners and losers.

In Bergen County, Whitman's municipal aid figures range from a \$1.6 million increase for Mahwah to \$940,000 in losses for Cliffside Park and Fort Lee. In Passaic County, the figures ranged from a gain of \$20,318 for Wayne to the \$447,000 loss for Clifton, the administration's figures show.

But when the lost supplemental revenue is figured in, Mahwah actually would \$1.4 million, for example, and Wayne stands to lose \$247,000 compared with last year's bottom line.

contribute to part of the trust fund.

I have paid the so-called S.S. tax from 1937 to 1986. Since my retirement at age 68, it pays part of our food bill. It isn't adequate for the remainder of our expenses and taxes.

The present S.S. taxes are too high. The major cause has been all the amendments that were attached to the Act by previous administrations and Congress. These amendments have caused the S.S. Act's demise. Numerous recipients of S.S. benefits have not contributed to Social Security. Medicare payments are paid by the S.S. recipients. Medicare regulations are established by our Government. Medicaid is a "health welfare service." Social

Security was never intended to be a "welfare service." Many working people die without receiving one cent of S.S. benefits. The politicians can not keep their hands out of a public "savings trust fund." It must be borrowed and spent.

An effective analysis should be made of the so-called S.S. tax and its use for the aid of all working people that are paying for and have paid for it. This act should not be used for any purpose other than its original intent. The S.S. "deposits" taken out of your wages should be set to a fixed percentage of your pay or profit.

Many states have employers and employees who pay state taxes for disability insurance for working accidents. The payments from this insurance will not support a family.

Randy Neumann can call any of the above a tax, but he should not call S.S. payments a tax because it is returned to the worker.

Schools set to stretch dollars

TRENTON — North Jersey school officials generally greeted Governor Whitman's state-aid allocations with tired resignation Tuesday, saying they would weather the proposed cuts by trimming spending, asking local taxpayers to pick up the balance, or both.

Under the state aid package announced by education officials Tuesday, funding to Bergen County districts stands to drop by nearly \$3 million to \$104 million in the coming school year. State funding for Passaic County schools would rise by \$5.2 million to more than \$301 million, although most of that is earmarked for the City of Passaic.

Two-thirds of North Jersey districts stand to lose aid in the 1996-97 school year, because of cuts tied to a court-ordered phaseout of funding for wealthier districts, declining enrollment, and penalties for high administrative costs.

For most North Jersey districts,

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it would be the third consecutive year that their state aid fell or remained flat.

"It's the same potato, just mashed this time, not fried," said Paul Gerber, business administrator for Passaic County Regional High School.

Gerber was one of nearly 100 Bergen and Passaic administrators who received the aid figures at an afternoon meeting with state officials at Passaic County Technical Institute.

"There are no surprises," said Michael Kistner, business administrator in Englewood Cliffs, which stands to lose about 2 percent of its state aid. "I guess we'll just have to do more with what we have."

Unless granted a waiver by the state, districts would be only allowed to raise their overall spending next year by 3.63 percent to 4.76 percent, depending upon how much their budgets climbed this year, officials said.

Among the big losers in the \$4.8 billion education budget Whitman proposed Monday are the Bergen County Technical School District, which stands to lose more than 14 percent of its state aid, the Bergen County Special Services District, slated to lose 12 percent, and Midland Park schools, in line for a 11 percent cut.

Although state officials said the lost aid represents only a small fraction of districts' overall budget, local officials said they would suffer under the budget knife.

In Wyckoff, which faces a proposed 4 percent cut, enrollment has increased by 500 students in five years. But although the state cut aid to districts with falling enrollments, it is not adding aid for rising enrollments.

"It's difficult to hire the staffing you need, the new textbooks you need with the increased enrollment," said Richard Davis, Wyckoff's business administrator. "When aid decreases or even stays level, there is only one place to go: the taxpayers."

Under the budget, which must be ratified by the Legislature by July 1, 319 districts would gain money and 293 would lose aid in the fiscal year that begins in July. State officials said districts losing money or facing a higher cost of living should look to save in such areas as transportation and spare their educational programs.

Peter Verniero, Whitman's chief of staff, said the nearly \$58 million aid increase earmarked for 25 of New Jersey's 30 poorest districts, including Garfield, Passaic, and Paterson, amounts to the "substantial progress" toward leveling spending in New Jersey's neediest and most affluent districts. He said the other "special needs" districts would not receive higher aid next year, because they are already spending very close to what the wealthier ones spend.

Almost half of all state education aid, excluding the state's teacher pension and debt service payments, is earmarked for the 30 special needs districts.

In Passaic, state aid is slated to rise by \$4.4 million to \$75.9 million, the biggest increase in North Jersey. Superintendent Robert Holster called the extra money "a gift sent to the children" in his impoverished city.

"Now, my job is to ensure that the money goes directly into the classroom," Holster said. "We're happy, but we have a lot of work ahead of us."

The state Supreme Court has given New Jersey until September 1997 to equalize spending in its poorest and wealthiest districts. As the state prepares to enact a new funding plan to comply with the court order, administration officials said they want to hold aid steady at last year's level. Besides enrollment declines, much of the adjustments to last year's aid stemmed from the phaseout of so-called transition aid, which goes to all but a few Bergen County districts.

In addition, the state awarded districts an additional \$8.50 per student under its new \$10 million technology grant program. "We consider it a very important initiative as we move to higher standards," said Education Commissioner Leo Klagholz.

For the second year, the state also levied \$6.6 million in penalties against districts it says are top-heavy in administrative costs, which it designates as 129 percent above the state average.

Sixty-three districts statewide, including both county-run districts in Bergen County but no districts in Passaic County, lost from \$2,000 to \$3 million in penalties, while 175 districts received from \$25,000 to \$50,000 in rewards for spending less than 115 percent of the state median for administrative costs.

The entire \$600,000 drop in the Bergen County technical schools' aid is due to the administrative penalty, officials said.
