# Picketers, legal battle follow M.D. to Warren

Former Westfielder Dr. Elrick Murray may have moved out of town last June, but he didn't leave his troubles behind. The anti-abortion protesters who picketed his Westfield home have followed the doctor to Warren.

Dr. Murray, who performs abortions in Howell and other New Jersey sites, has been a target for antiabortion protesters for nearly five years. After a series of legal battles, neighborhood protests in Westfield were limited to one hour every two weeks, with a maximum of 10 demonstrators. Picketers were recuired to stay 100 feet from the doctor's home and give police 24-hour notice of protests.

But while the protesters followed Dr. Murray to Warren, the restrictions upon them did not. When the doctor sued for the same protection, Superior Court Judge Wilfred Diana prescribed a slightly more relaxed buffer. Up to 15 protesters may now picket Dr. Murray's Warren home for an hour every two weeks. They can demonstrate anywhere, except directly in front of the doctor's home.

"We're very pleased the court recognized Dr. Murmay and his family are entitled to some privacy," said Pamela Mandel, the physician's attorney. "Though we are somewhat surprised the court enlarged the number of picketers."

new picket-free zone does not impact heavily upon his home, said Ms. Mandel.

The counsel for the protesters, while less enthusiastic, also claimed victory. "This decision is a step in the right direction because it recognizes that Dr. Murray's right to privacy does not extend beyond the borders of his own property," said attorney Richard Collier, a Art club volunteer with the Morristown-based Legal Center for the Defense of Life Inc. "However, we are very disappointed that the New Jersey courts continue to impose clearly unconstitutional injunctions."

Protester Michael Lawson is unhappy with the court's stipulations — especially the 15-protester limit which he said hurts the protest's message.

"We've got restrictions. We shouldn't get any restrictions. We didn't do anything wrong," he said. "It's

a violation of my right to assemble. The Record was unable to reach Dr. Murray.

Mr. Lawson said protesters usually picket medical offices, but also demonstrate in residential neighborhoods to "reach" Dr. Murray and his neighbors as well as "preach the gospel of Jesus Christ."

"We pray for Dr. Murray to repent, to turn to Jesus Christ," said Mr. Lawson. "Dr. Murray comes into my neighborhood and kills children. So we can come into his neighborhood and tell him it is wrong."

Mr. Lawson said protesters are planning to picket Mr. Murray's home Christmas day.





# Cop death mystery continues

The Westfield Police Department concluded its investigation into the our crash that killed Garwood patrelman Thomas Haughton, 27, without finding the cause of the accident. Investigators from the Garwood Police Department, Union County Prosecutor's Office and Ford Motor Company will continue the inquiry.

"We've gone as far as we can with this," said Traffic Investigator William Murphy. "It may have been a matter of speed, it was a residential neighborhood, the street curved ...

Though the town's accident report does not attempt to explain the crash, the investigation did unearth some new information.

Officer Haughton was talking on his police radio and steering with one hand at the time of the accident, said Investigator Murphy. And the Garwood officer was not wearing his seat belt — though he would have been crushed by his car's dashboard if he had been, Investigator Murphy said.

Garwood Police Chief Robert Ryan told The Record a representative from Ford Motor Company would examine the 1994 Eord Crown Victoria Officer Haughton was driving to determine if mechanical failure played a part in the crash.

A recall of 57,000 Crown Victorias equipped with the police package option was announced Dec. 4 by the National Highway Safety Administration. Transportation The cars were found to have a problem with the bolts and brackets securing the vehicle's front upper control arms.

But given the mangled state of Officer Haughton's cruiser, investigators will have a hard time determining if the control arm defect had anything to do with the crash.





# Going nuts

#### The state's 'report cards' on each school are interesting, but lethal to some theories

In the midst of Christmas and Hanukkah greeting cards, bills, last-minute advertising flyers and free calendars, parents of public school students will soon receive a "report card" on their youngsters' individual schools.

The report offers a mountain of interesting facts and figures which often confound popular presumptions about which school district is better, more economical, or has the better faculty.

The truth probably goes like this: a parenttaxpayer will bear a "reasonable" school property tax bill if his or her youngster is doing well in terms of the student's and the family's individual expectations and goals.

At bottom, it's personal.

Per-pupil expenditures, faculty advanced degrees, class sizes, classroom time per day - few of these even interrelate among school districts, much less assure the success of any one student.

It's personal, not statistical.

How does one score the efficiency of a high school, for instance?

SAT scores? Let's look at the report cards of Cranford, Westfield and Scotch Plains-Fanwood High Schools:

Combined SAT scores for last year's seniors

show Westfield "winning" at 1,012. Cranford scored 947; Scotch Plains-Fanwood reached 934.

• Some believe the smaller the class size, the more learning occurs. But the report card data confounds this theory. "Winning" Westfield has the largest average class size of the three high schools at 25.4 students. Scotch Plains-Fanwood has 20.3; Cranford 19.9. Go figure.

• Does more money per pupil affect SAT performance? Report card data reveals that "winning" Westfield spends \$9,543 per pupil, well shy of Scotch Plains-Fanwood at \$9,818 per pupil. Cranford spent least of the three at \$8,607. Go

• One more "incongruity." Westfield is in the middle in daily class time at five hours, 44 minutes. Scotch Plains is at 5:51; Cranford's at 5:30.

Perhaps a valid theory can be hatched from the report card stats where Westfield's "winning" SAT numbers match other facts. Westfield leads the other two high schools in Class of '95 seniors going to 2- and 4-year colleges (90%) and percentage of teachers with master's degrees (63).

Go figure.

Come to see the Belsnickel, a figure from German folklore, who comes to visit homes around Christmas Eve. He is a scary visitor dressed in a cape of ratty old pelts and worn-out clothes. He is nervously awaited by the children, especially those children who have been naughty. He comes when the children are awake and asks the children if they have been behaving. 



The Blue Devils got together over the summer at Rider University in Lawrenceville for a summer league and Carey liked what





# Diners seduce the Jersey soul Roadside restaurants serve up full slice of daily life

ou can seduce anyone after a \$150 champagne-soaked candlelight dinner at a French restaurant where the pretentious menu is superimposed over a map of Provence and all the chiseled waiters are just an audition away from a part on a soap opera.

But if your partner stays with you after a breaded veal cutlet dinner — with lots of gravy to dunk the fries — in the cheery Sunset Diner where all the waitresses call you "hon" just a roll's toss from the madding traffic on Route 22, then you know it's true love, not just lust stimulated by grilled quail in gooseberry sauce.

It's a snowy Saturday morning as I write this homage to the Jersey diner. There's no place I would rather be at this moment than at the counter of the Somerset Diner on Easton Avenue in Franklin enjoying a bottomless cup of coffee and a cherry danish as big as a baseball glove.

People in New Jersey gather instinctively in diners during snow-

storms. What other place offers the moments after the evening's enwarmth, comfort and instant feeling of community when you take a break from battling the hazards of the roads?

Diners represent the unique character of Jersey's democratic culture. I know at least one multimillionaire from the Somerset Hills who delights in having business meetings at the It's the Time to Eat Diner just off the Somerville Circle.

He eats alongside PSE&G crews stopping for a cup of coffee and a fried egg sandwich. The diner is the

one place where Jerseyeans of all races, nationalities, religions, generations, sexual orientation, physical ability, intelligence and economic class can share their common and proud heritage.

Go into any diner around 2 a.m. on a Sunday just after bars have closed and parties have swizzled to an end. In the booths are couples of all ages in those either extremely tense or extremely relaxed

tertainment.

Elegant ladies wrapped in furs and strata of bleeding make-up order hot fudge sundaes while their husbands with problem prostates debate the pros and cons or ordering that powerful second cup of coffee.

But for most of us, whose lives have been drained of drama, diners are simply a good place to eat. The portions are large and the

prices are relatively inexpensive.

Chicken is chicken no matter where you eat, but at a diner you get lots and lots of chicken served in a dozen different ways for less than half you would pay at a restaurant with a silly name.

Diners are also the original fast food establishments in America. Dinner at a diner — that includes soup (Yankee bean), salad, warm rolls, entree and dessert — never takes more than 45 minutes. That's because diners were designed for busy people or travelers who wanted a place to eat they could trust with a nervous stom-

Let's start with breakfast, the supreme meal at a diner (The best diners serve the breakfast menu 24 hours a day). A cup of coffee is on the counter before your butt settles on the stool.

Trying to decide among the scores of breakfast selections is the sort of mental calisthenics you need before you get to the important thinking of the day.

sider having a Farmer's Omelette three eggs with potatoes, ham, sausage, peppers and onions with two pieces of toast and a side of hash browns.

Or, if you want something light, just have a huge muffin — choose your flavor — baked behind the kitchen doors in the pre-dawn hours. Or you can order a "short stack" of pancakes soaked in maple syrup with a few links of sausage on the side.

Damn the diet - this is true health food, high octane fuel to keep our engines running at peak performance through another stressful day on the job or a peaceful day fishing for trout in the North Branch of the Raritan River. If you have breakfast before going

to church on Sunday, you'll find yourself more thankful for God's wonders.

Lunch is whatever you make it at a diner. For example, at Sherban's in South Plainfield, lunch can be a fairly big deal. Sherban's starts you off with their magical cucumber salad, then comes back with open-faced sandwiches that could feed a fraternity. Dessert is usually included in the lunch special so once you finished at Sherban's, there's no need to eat until 8 p.m.

But lunch at a diner doesn't need to be a bellybuster. At some diners you can have a peanut butter sandwich (if you're adventurous, try a peanut butter and bacon sandwich).

Hamburgers — with the "de-

luxe" addition of french fries are what hamburgers should be fresh, thick and juicy, not the defrosted patties we mindlessly gobble at fast food places (Children should be taken to diners at the carliest possible age so they know what good food is).

In this part of New Jersey, you can have a "Happy Waitress" special, a grilled cheese sandwich with whatever works — you choose.

The waitresses are happy no matter what you order - in an age when alienation and programmed politeness have become the norm. the eternal and genuine cheerfulness of diner waitresses harkens back to a time when service was valued and people really were kinder and gentler. A 20 percent tip is not out of the question at a diner.

The rice pudding you have for dessert is not, as rumored, brought to the diner in a tanker truck and stored in an underground tank.

Rather, like the rest of the sweet and sinful pleasures, it is a product of the chef's more delicate side.

The afternoon is the slowest part of the day at a diner. Everybody gets a break before the dinner crowd arrives. This is the time when the floors are mopped and the counters are shined.

Work begins on preparing that night's dinner specials. With the advent of the modern dinner, much of the cooking is now done behind swinging doors.

In the original diners, all the cooking was done on a grill behind the counter and watching a short order cook conduct a symphony of breakfast was one of the free pleasures of a diner.

This is where the success of a diner is determined. If the grill-

men has the organizational ability to keep track of the dozens of orders flying at him and the culinary grace to crack eggs and flip pancakes at the crucial moment, then you know it's a true diner.

When I was growing up, it was a magical night when we decided to go out to eat at either the Bridgewater Diner or Johnny's Diner (where Boston Market is now on Route 22.) My favorite dinner dish then — and now — was the breaded veal cutlet with lots of gravy and french fries.

It is at dinner time diners prove they are no longer greasy spoons. Once many diners closed their doors in the afternoon, content to make their living with whatever came off the grill behind the counter for breakfast and lunch.

With the emergence of diners that were more than just recycled railroad cars, diners took advantage of growing suburbia in the 1960s and became family restaurants. Denny's — and other franchise family restaurants - never stood a chance to gain a foothold in New Jersey.

The diner's dinner menu became long and complicated, a Christmas catalog for the stomach. Besides all the breakfast and lunch items available, there are scores of main dinner choices - the mysterious chicken oregano, London broil, Yankee pot roast, Italian dishes, Greek specialities, fish. steaks, veal, lamb chops, turkey, roast beef and the sacred meat loaf.


If you can't find your favorite dish on a diner menu at supper time, you need to get your tongue calibrated.

Then, around 9 p.m. to past midnight, once the dinner crowd has gone home with full and contented tummies, the golden hours begin at a diner.

Women stop by for a coffee and a piece of cheesecake after a meeting of the American Legion Auxiliary. Also stopping by are members of Alcoholics Anonymous and other support groups who want to continue their dialogue of everyday salvation.

Truck drivers, particularly along Route 22 in Union and Route 1 in Edison, stop to eat before the final lunge into the belly of the New York City area.

Cops have a cup of coffee so they won't fall asleep from boredom before their shift ends. And then teenagers, still infatuated with the possibilities of the night, come in because they're still too young for bars and their nervous metabolism demands more fuel, especially if they're on a first date and cannot decide whether they will be the seducer or the seduced.



Tith more than 4,500 jumps to his credit, Doug Angel handles the orientation for first-time skydivers with the professionalism of a news anchorman and the wit of a late-night talk show host. He provides a quick overview of a first jump to the small class assembled.

"It'll be about three minutes from the plane to the ground provided the chute opens," he quips. When his joking is met with nervous laughter, Angel reassures them of his organization's thorough training.

"No one has ever had a total malfunction of the static-line (at Skydive East, and that encompasses more than 100,000 jumps," says Angel, co-owner of the organization since its inception 17 years ago.

"Sometimes it's tough for firsttime divers to overcome the sense of panic at making that plunge," he admits, telling his class, "The brain wants to kind of kick and scream rather than arch and spread, but you should just try to enjoy those three seconds" before the parachute takes over.

Beginners must make two successful static-line jumps before becoming eligible for the accelerated free-fall program, says Tammy Hitchcock, co-owner of Skydive East and an eight-year skydiving

goggles in hand, awaiting his turn to leave the training facility and venture into the unknown. He sums up his feeling the best he can, saying, "It's pretty exciting."

Scan Prosser has considerably more experience than his older brother. A veteran of more than 50 jumps, Sean anticipates his own jump for the day, an advanced accelerated free-fall he would make with his father Don Prosser.

"I used to watch skydivers down in Lakewood," Sean recalls of his early fascination with the sport. "Watching a person skydive gives you some sense of the sport, but it doesn't really compare with actually doing it.

"It's kind of like watching a horse race, then actually getting on a horse and riding," he concludes.

Back in Angel's orientation class, he moves on to a brief description of static-line jumping. The static line, he tells his students, is hooked from inside the plane to the rip cord of the jumper's harness. A properly attached line will automatically open the parachute so the beginning diver can more easily overcome the shock of leaving the aircraft.

The first step, once the diver is out of the plane and the chute opens, is to "check and make sure your canopy is a circle," Angel continues, using visual aids.

"The next step is to grab the toggles on each strap," Angel says, his hands in the air as though he were being held at gun point. "These enable you to steer the chute." Pulling the right toggle turns the diver to the right, left toggle to the

The following step, according to the lesson, is to locate the drop zone target by pulling the toggles.

On the way down, beginners practice running and holding alternately. Running occurs when the jumper moves with the wind, at about 12 mph. Holding occurs when the jumper faces the wind, moving 6 mph into the 6 mph wind. Ideally the jumper should approach the target at a 45-degree angle.

"Look around, but don't get too hung up on sightseeing or you'll pass the target," Angel warns. "If you do pass the target don't run any more, just hold your position. If you begin to panic, just turn to face in the direction you want to

"And always carry a little bus fare in your suit if you're not too good at steering," he adds.

Once the orientation is over, the beginners are given a chance to digest what they learned, as well as some lunch, before progressing to more physical training.


Two of Angel's first-time jumpers, Sandra Kubacki and Lori Pohero, took a day trip to Pittstown after hearing about Skydive East through a friend.

"Everyone thinks we're crazy," Kubacki says. "They asked us why we would jump out of a perfectly good airplane."

Pohero agrees that based upon Angel's orientation, the hardest part would be leaving behind the safety of the small airplane without a firm runway beneath her feet. "The class wasn't too reassuring, especially the pictures of partial failure [of the main chute]."

# It's a grand night's singing for grandma and grandpa

Grand Night for Singing is a revue comprised entirely of the music of Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein II, the people behind Oklahoma!, The King and I. The Sound of Music and a coterie of other American musical classics. When the show played briefly on Broadway a couple of seasons ago it was nominated for a Tony Award for best musical.

A Grand Night for Singing - a kind of whitebread Ain't Misbehavin' - reshapes the Rodgers & Hammerstein canon. The music, which examines the many sides of romance and courtship, is presented simply but often charmingly by the Forum Theatre's five-member cast. Though director Peter Lowey keeps the revue running at a healthy pace, the fact remains that A Grand Night for Singing is the proverbial icing without the cake; when songs like "The Surrey with the Fringe on Top" (from Oklahoma!) are removed from their narrative context, they seem included only to provide older audience members with the opportunity to reminisce. A Grand Night for Singing is a theatrical museum piece, a singing, dancing display of the past glory of the American musical theater.

The success or failure of a show like A Grand performers. Jim Gricar (a frequent performer at the (906) 548-6582.

Paper Mill Playhouse) exercises his fine, full voice on numbers ranging from "Oh, What a Beautiful Morning" (from Oklahoma!) to the romantic "We Kiss in a Shadow" (from The King and I). Rose Pedone is particularly memorable performing "The Gentleman is a Dope," a lesser-known but surprisingly moving novelty number in which she laments the stupid choices men often make in the name of love. Barbara McCulloh and Bill Perlach have some fun kicking up their heels during "Shall We Dance." The perky Susie Paplow, a frequent Forum Theatre performer, has a bit of trouble during a weak rendition of "If I Loved You" (from Carousel), but she charms during her kicker numbers. Frank Knox's scenic design. which includes columns, draped fabric and vines, looks a bit like a wedding reception but allows the cast free rein to work the Forum's spacious stage.

For older audiences and diehard afficionados of the American musical, A Grand Night for Singing is a cute, simply-served Rodgers & Hammerstein catalog. For others, watching A Grand Night for Singing provides a somewhat less enchanted evening, one which effectively recalls the golden age of song and dance but remains, in a contemporary theatrical context, about as theatrically energetic as glancing through a

dusty shelf of sheet music.

Humphrey Bogart romance, is its pedigree. With Sydney Pollack directing and Harrison Ford in front of the camera, there is at least hope the result will have more integrity than, say, the remake of Suspicion starring Jane Curtin that surfaced a few years ago.

Once in Paris, Sabrina blossoms into Ormond, looking at least 30, and comes back to the North Shore of Long Island to see if her

obsession has worn off. Alas, it hasn't. But now David, newlyengaged to a competing mogul's daughter, is finding things to be interested in about Sabrina.

Linus protecting his business interests, gets David out of the picture and sets about wooing Sabrina himself. Guess what happens when they start to spend time together.

Perhaps the biggest problem in the film is Ford himself. Never less than engaging, he is here supposed to be "the only living heart donor," and he is a sourpuss of

biblical proportions. Ford cracked more smiles when snakes were chasing him than he does in this whole movie.

Because he's Harrison Ford, you root for him anyway, but he's not as successful showing us the soul under Linus's facade as Bogart was. Ormond isn't Hepburn but makes Sabrina her own woman. Ford isn't Bogart, but doesn't exactly make Linus a Harrison Ford creation. It's a fine distinction, but it may leave you walking out of Sabrina without an extra spring in your step.



New Jersey auteur John Sayles goes far out of his way in The Secret of Roan Inish, a tale of an Irish family tom asunder and the human-souled seals who help. It plays much more delicately than it sounds and Sayles, out of his usual element, is enjoying himself. It does drag a bit in the middle but it's never less than charming.





## Unusual area memorabilia sparks community interest

Weelend Plus antiques correspondent orristown residents were out in great force to pur chase a hand-held piece of their own local history recently when we auctioned an important collection of area history books and memorabilia.

A certificate of indenture of a yesteryear Morristown woman, estimated to sell for \$100-\$200, sold for \$1,200. (Great-grandma would have been proud.) Handwritten ledgers on local issues sold for \$650; a group of maps of Morristown in 1695-1900, estimated at \$150-\$200, went for \$1,900; a group of never-to-be-found-again old photographs sold for \$750. A rare 1897 Atlas of Morristown, which showed actual sites of houses, sold for \$750. It appears Morristown residents are more than a little proud of their heritage.

Several pieces of personal family history found their way back to their present-day descendants. One man was thrilled to find an old book containing a chapter about his family and purchased an entire table of books to get it. The present-day fireman poured over old photos of long-ago firemen who raced to the blaze in a horsedrawn fire truck.

One has to believe Carl B. Scherzer, a Morristown resident and town historian who compiled this amazing collection, would have been well pleased. Scherzer delighted in owning his private collection of local relics. It would seem he wanted every one of the town folks to have the same unique opportunity.

Scherzer was the founder and past president of the Speedwell Village historical site. He was a member of many other historical societies and published a book on the history of George Washington's encampment in Morristown. Scherzer, who died in the early 1980s, is considered to have been a primary authority on local history; his private collection of local history was one of the most vast and important on record.

An item of great historical im-

portance was a Thomas Nast mural. This large mural was part of the Grand Caricatures Show and is one of a series of eight murals. Of those, five went on a national tour and are permanently ensconced in the National Archives in Washington, D.C. Two are at Macculloch Hall in Morristown. When the hammer went down on the eighth and last of the series to the successful bidder. Macculloch Hall, one was left with a feeling that all was as it should be. All in all, the bidders at the auction walked away really happy campers. The general sentiment from successful bidders was they had been given an unusual opportunity to own a relic of their own heritage and this was worth its weight in gold.

If you're lucky enough to still have old documents sitting in boxes, you might want to think before discarding them. Even if your great-granny wasn't Betsy Ross, her 1869 marriage license may have great value. Or an 1887 quilled-pen handwritten receipt for a \$10 horse may be of interest to a horse buyer of today.

There is a reverence about the past. All that it was went into the gift that is our present day. Deep within us we all feel this. Maybe that is why a current-event book written in 1770 is enough to cause a frenzy among auction bidders at a local history sale.

# Cathedral Cafe deals out some downhome cooking

It's hard to believe you could be helping anyone other than yourself while sitting in a lovely restaurant enjoying a tasty dinner. But that's exactly what you're doing when you enjoy the southern cuisine of The Cathedral Cafe in Perth Amboy.

The former Madison Pines was purchased by The Cathedral Church (a 2,500-member Baptist Church across the street), whose Community Development Corporation decided to re-establish a restaurant and put its profits to another business or to the outreach programs of the corporation.

"It's better to build a business than to be grant-dependent," says Joanne Cooper, executive director of the corporation.

The concept was to specialize in high quality traditional Southern Regional cuisine at reasonable prices. They brought in Carl Stanford as executive chef/general manager, who has 26 years in the food service/hospitality industry.

It can be risky to visit a restaurant only a few weeks old (it opened its doors Nov. 18), but my friend and I found the food, service and atmosphere a delight.

We began our meal with a sampler of appetizers. Buffalo wings were made special by the accompanying bleu cheese sauce (\$3.25); the succulent okra encased in a fried batter shell and served with dill sauce was a favorite, yet only \$2.95. The coconut jumbo shrimp with sweet and sour pine-

apple sauce was luscious (5.95).

Seafood dishes include fried shrimp, fish, Maryland-style crabs or crab cakes (\$6.95-\$10.95). For those seeking a light dish there is the grilled salmon steak. We tried two catfish recipes: grilled Caribbean catfish fillet, coated with jerk seasoning, served with a fruit relish and steamed zucchi and carrot slices (\$7.95); and the pan-fried Carolina catfish, lightly floured and simmered in an sauce of okra, tomato bits and pecans, served

with scalloped potatoes and collards (\$7.95). My companion said he could choose either and say it was the best catfish he'd ever had.

Of the six chicken dishes (\$5.95 for "plain ol' fried chicken" to \$7.95 for others that sounded scrumptious) we sampled the most expensive: \$8.95 for delectable Carolina-style country chicken talledega, a cutlet smothered in potatoes, onions, peppers and a light pink sauce; and the \$10.25 chicken and shrimp Louisiane, chunks of chicken breast and shrimp sauteed, smothered in brown sauce and served over rice. This is a dish the word "downhome" was meant for: a simple, savory dinner you'd

expect to eat at a favorite kitchen table, not a restaurant.


Of course, there's the requisite chicken-fried steak with gravy (\$6.95), also several pork chop dinners and a Texas T-bone, a one-pounder for \$14.95. Corn bread, rather than rolls, accompanies the meals, rich and moist as cake.

Desserts are difficult to choose: There's apple fritter sundae, batter-fried Granny Smith apple rings with ice cream and caramel sauce (\$2.50); Florida dump cake, peaches, pineapple and cake mix dumped together and baked (\$2); ice cream (\$1.50); and the banana raisin cobbler with ice cream "large enough to share," which we did. It was a sweet tooth delight for \$3.95.

Chef Stanford says he's about to offer nightly specials. "I've got more than 300 recipes I'm anxious to try."

The room is spacious and bright, smoke-free and liquor-free. The goal is to have The Cathedral Cafe become known far and wide as the place to go for classic Southern cuisine, offering the best-tasting yet reasonably priced meals. I think they'll make it.

### What to expect when the holiday is over

hinking about buying or adoptchildren this Christmas? You to avoid making a rash decision.

"Many parents, caught up in the holiday spirit, buy a pet without considering whether or not their family is ready for one," says Dr. Dan Carey, a veterinarian with The lams Company. "Truth is, a new puppy or kitten is like a baby; it requires a tremendous amount of attention, time and money. but the rewards are immeasurable."

Here are some things worth considering:

• Do you have time, time and more time? All new pets command a lot of attention, but this is especially true of puppies. Until a puppy is housebroken and comfortable with its surroundings, it will need constant supervision. A comfortable crate is effective while everyone is at work or school, providing that someone is on hand to walk and feed the dog at certain times during the day. Remember, pupples thrive on human companionship and will not hesitate to let you know this. It will be your job, not your children's, to properly housebreak your pet. This takes time and patience.

 Veterinarian visits are vital to your pet's good health. Pets need yearly veterinary checkups, even if nothing is wrong. Preventative medicine is easier — and often less expensive — than curing an illness or correcting a problem. Make sure your pet receives its proper vaccinations. Also, unless you plan to breed your dog or cat professionally, spaying/neutering is essential.

Many people purchase puppies based on pressure from their kids or on the puppy's appearance. It is best to research the breed before you purchase the puppy to save yourself the heartache of owning an animal that's not a good match for your family's lifestyle.

• Some (pet) food for thought. You spend plenty of time picking out the best foods for your family, and chances are that you'll do the same for your pet. Growing and active pets need a high-protein, high-fat diet: what's good for you is not necessarily good for your pet. Read pet-food labels carefully to be sure the food is high in animal-based protein (chicken by-products, lamb, egg) it should appear at the top of the list. To prevent stomach upsets, find a wellbalanced, dry pet food, and stick with it, using a nutritious canned food for variety.

# Yule lights harken to days of yore

s you gather around a brilliantly lit Christmas tree, see homes and stores aglow with beautiful lights and decorations or see pictures of the magnificent National Christmas Tree in Washington, D.C., all lit up, you might like to take a moment to think about where this bright Christmas custom comes from.

The lights on the Christmas tree, legend says, were the result of a bright idea by Martin Luther. Walking in the woods one winter evening he saw starlight glimmering through the branches of an evergreen, brought the tree home and trimmed it with candles so the whole family could enjoy the spectacle. Ever since, evergreens, lights and Christmas have gone together.

As for the National Christmas Tree, its light comes from what to many is a surprising source: a coal mine. Coal is the nation's most abundant and reliable energy source.

When President Clinton turns the switch that lights the National Christmas Tree and the 57 smaller trees that represent the 50 states, the U.S. territories and the District of Columbia, the electricity will be supplied by coal.


What's more, for the sixth year in a row, the 57 live trees that form the "Pathway of Peace" were grown on reclaimed coal mine lands. After the holidays, the donated trees will be replanted in Washington-area parks.


Before being reclaimed by the Marietta Coal Company, the surface mine where the trees grew produced 200,000 tons of coal in the early "70s to provide electricity for residents in the Ohio Valley.

oday, this former mine is a commercial tree farm with more than 25,000 trees growing on the reclaimed coal mine near St. Clairsville, Ohio. The National Mining Association donated the trees, and Marietta provided the transportation.

The Christmas trees are an excellent example of how reclaimed coal mine land is returned to productive use across America. More than two million acres of mined land have been reclaimed by the U.S. coal industry since 1974.

Now that's something else to celebrate this holiday season.











## Angelic decorations bring tidings of great joy

hroughout history, angels have been symbols of peace, protecting people and bearing good news. Perhaps that is the reason they have often been a favorite decoration in homes.

Today, items with an angel, cherub and celestial motif are more popular than ever. You see them on ornaments, gift wrap, stationery, jewelry, hatboxes and more.

"Crafting is playing an increasingly important role in holiday activities," says Susan Brandt, assistant executive director/ director of communications for HIA (Hobby Industry Association). "According to a recent consumer survey, 49 percent of crafters use their crafts for holiday decorating."

One simple craft project that is sure to lift your spirits during the holidays is an angel ornament, instructions courtesy of Design Originals.

Start with one 1-inch clear round Christmas tree ball ornament, 6 inches of 1/4-inch wide gold ribbon, a 6-inch-by-5-inch piece of white tulle with gold stars, 3 inches of gold chenille stem, craft glue or a glue gun and glue sticks, and a stapler.

To create the angel's dress, cut a 3-inchby-6-inch piece of tulle, and fold it into 1/2inch pleats. Gather the material at one end, forming a cone shape, and glue the end together to form the top of the dress.

Then, cut a 2-inch-by-6-inch piece of tulle for the angel's wings. Fold the ends of the piece to the center, gather, making a bow, and staple so it's secure. Glue the wings to the top back of the angel's dress. Glue the clear bulb, which will serve as the angel's head, to the very top of the dress.

o finish, tie the gold ribbon into a bow, and glue onto the top of the dress. Bend the gold chenille stem into a circle, creating a halo, with 1/2-inch ends. Twist the ends together, and use as the stem of the halo. Glue the stem to the back of the head.

Now, attach a small hook or looped ribbon to the back of your angel, and hang as an ornament on your Christmas tree. You can attach your angel to the top of the Christmas Nativity scene or make several and stand them up as decorations on top of the mantel. Angels also add a homemade touch to the tops of gift packages. Next time, you may want to try proportioning the materials to create a larger-scale angel that can go on the top of the Christmas tree.







## Computers as gifts add up to holiday fun

and peripherals are again expected to crest during the holiday shopping season. For many computer purchasers, the various system packages ofconfusing.

William Kennedy, executive director of the Center for Information Age Technology at New Jersey Institute of Technology, suggests consumers do their homework.

"Consumers looking to purchase a computer this holiday season need to do their homework. There is a tremendous amount of information available today about computer manufacturers and the quality of their products. In addition, many of the computer user magazines have published buying guides in anticipation of the holiday shop- most users on a 486SX25. ping season," Mr. Kennedy said.

He recommends the following to shoppers intending to purchase a computer for the home or office this holiday season:

- Minimum system requirements should include 8 megabyte of Random Access Memory (RAM) to use Microsoft Windows version 3.1 or DOS. To use Microsoft Windows 95, 12-16 megabytes of RAM are suggested.
- A hard disk drive of 850 megabytes should be ample for all except heavy graphhard drive should be matched by a backup medium that will allow full backup in one ROM.

- Windows 95 is recommended only for users who are just starting to explore Winfered by manufacturers and retailers can be dows for the first time. Those who are already productive with Windows 3.1 should wait for the Windows 95 bug-fixes and enhancements that are expected in early 1996.
  - Users who upgrade to the latest Windows applications will find that the software developers have clearly focused on features rather than performance, and that Pentium processors or high-speed 486 processors (66 MHz or faster) is assumed as a minimum.   - If you're not doing it already, get a fax board and send faxes directly from your Windows application. Boards can be purchased for less than \$100 including software. For instance, the eGG on America Online offers printable menus and no-fail recipes, shopping and preparation lists, along with party plans, decorating tips, best wine buys and advice from leading cooking experts. You can even purchase the smoked turkey or ham you were planning to serve via your computer and have it delivered to your door the very next day!

• Get organised. Plan it all in advance. Make lists; you can save the lists on your computer in a holiday party file for use next year. You'll want lists for shopping but also for kitchen and decorating tasks. And checking them off gives an added sense of accomplishment, especially when you can see the light at the end of the tunnel.

e Make use of time-savers. If you only have one day for preparation, don't overextend yourself. Do one-stop shopping; serve foods that don't require lots of cooking or party or family meal can be enough to chopping; rely on convenience items that can be made to taste and look homemade... · Don't forget the decorations and garnishes, but don't fixate on them either. Use long-lasting squash or autumn fruits in a bowl to replace a fresh flower centerpiece. Buy some potted herb plants and snip the leaves as natural garnishes the day of the party; even potted herb plants make great fall decorations.

e If you don't life formally, don't entertain that way either. You'll be more comfortable and so will your guests if your party reflects you. If you don't have full sets of matching plates or napkins, mix them up for a colorful table display, make it festive, not formal.
