### 6-year-old donor has a big heart

### Child gives \$1.34 to holiday fund

To most people, \$1.34 is not a lot of money. In fact, most people in Westfield could probably manufacture that amount just by digging in

their couch cushions. But for 6-year-old Sam Ross, \$1.34 is a lot of money and it is precisely how much he sent to the Record Holiday Fund last week, making him the fund's first donor of 1996.

Along with his contribution of quarters, dimes, nickels and pennies, the child sent a letter to The Record indicating his identity and his thoughts on charity.

"Dear Caring Neighbor," the letter began, "I like how much you are doing this money. I am paying \$1.34 for your charity. My name is Sam Ross. I am 6 years old and



live in Westfield. I am in first grade at Tamaques School.'

Sam's mother, Michelle Erik, said her son first heard of the fund when she pointed out an article about it to him.

A proponent of instilling children with a sense of charity, Ms. Erik discussed the fund with Sam and he decided it would be a good thing to do, she said.

'It's hard because kids are so self-centered, but I'm really trying to make them understand how im-

portant [charity] is."

Sam is no stranger to helping others. A faithful contributor to Szedaka, or Hebrew charity, Sam. donates 50 cents each week in Hebrew school. He also has participated in several food and clothing

"If people are poor, they may not survive," Sam said about why he helps those in need.

Like many 6-year-olds, Sam can barely conceptualize the difference between \$1 and \$100, but he does understand the idea of people being in need. Hence, he was able to explain how he would like to see his donation used.

He said jewelry is "rich stuff" and would not be a good thing for his contribution to go toward. However, toys and food are "not rich stuff," so those things would be all right, he said.





This is the season of excesses.

At Thanksgiving, most people usually eat too much. And for some of us, chances are that sometime during the holidays, we may drink too much. When that happens, it's important to remember not to drink and drive.

It has been said many times and many ways, but the message remains the same — too many €estive holidays and occasions of great joy have been turned into senseless tragedies by drunken drivers. That last glass of spiked egg nog for the road may also prove to be deadly on the road.

Despite all the public service messages and editorials you will hear and read this month, there will still be too many motorists weaving in and out of traffic after a holiday party, fully confident they can handle alcohol.

That can be a fatal mistake.

Any intake of alcohol — it doesn't matter if it's beer, wine or hard liquor - will have some effect of your motor - and **motoring** — skills. Besides risking your life, our local police officers will do their best to get you off the roads. No one wants a drunken driving arrest on their record.

The key to avoiding holiday excesses — whether it's at the dining room table, tavern or a party — is self-discipline. That's a character trait that is often lost during the hoopla of the holiday season with its holiday celebrations, friendly gatherings and office parties.

### Westfield schools, students continue to get high marks

WESTFIELD - Every one of the 1,278 students at Westfield High School recently brought home an excellent report card. The state-issued school report cards ranked Westfield's largest school as one of the leaders in New Jersey's public schools.

The school outscored both the state and its District Factor Group (DFG) of schools with similar socioeconomic makeups in its standardized testing.

WHS dwarfed its competitors in the 11th-grade High School Proficiency Test, surpassing the state average by 19.7 percent and the DFG by 3.8 percent. The school also outshined its own 1994-95 results by 4.6 percent.

WHS also blew away the state and the DFG in the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT). While the percentage of WHS students taking the test was down 3 percent from last year's tally to 95 percent, WHS still outranked the state test-taking average by 20 percent.

The school's combined-score average of 1122 bettered last year's local achievement by 17 points and came in 118 points above this year's state average. reserve at Westfield Memorial Library.

WHS also beat the DFG average by seven points in the mathematics portion and 13 points in the verbal.

The excellence of this year's report card can be attributed to WHS's excellent staff. According to the report 67 percent of the faculty has attained a postgraduate degree. Sixty-four percent have a master's degree and 3 percent have a doctoral degree.

Also, students at WHS spend 17 more minutes per day in class than the state average.

WHS also shows an overwhelming success rate in sending its graduates to four-year colleges. Last year, 81 percent of WHS graduates went on to attend a four-year college or university, while 12 percent enrolled in a two-year college.

One percent go on to attend another type of post secondary school, join the military or enter the work force and 1 percent is undecided of their plans upon

The school's gargantuan success does have its price. Westfield was reported as spending \$9,067 per pupil each year, \$1,308 more than the state average. Complete reports were mailed to the parents and guardians of students last week and are available at the high school, the superintendent's office and on

### Officers' salaries approved

THE RECORD

WESTFIELD - The Town Council recently approved the 1997 salaries for the 58 contracted members of the Westfield Police Department

These salaries are determined through a contract between the town and the Policemen's Benevolent Association, a union that acts as a bargaining unit for all police remployees except the chief, Chief Anthony Scutti said.

This year, the contract mandated the salaries for all employees, who rank at or above top-grade patrolman, increase by 4 percent.

Thus, the two captains on the force will receive the pay of \$69,103 for, 1997. The lieutenant detective will get \$66,109; the four lieutenants will be paid \$63,852; and the two sermeant detectives will receive \$61,250. The seven sergeants on the force will receive \$58,592 for the year, as will the six first-grade detectives.

The investigator for traffic safety will receive \$53,553.

And, the 31 top-grade patrol officers will be paid \$52,533 except for the one patrolman who has been appointed a plainclothes officer, who will be paid an additional \$500 for the year.

Those officers who have not yet been on the force for six years and have not reached the rank of top grade patrolman will receive a probationary rate that is contingent on how long they have been on the force.

Chief Scutti's salary will be negotiated early next year when the council determines the budget. He is not included in the PBA salaries because his position is regarded as

#### Firefighters' salaries OK'd

WESTFIELD -- The Town Council recently approved the 1997 salaries for the 36 employees of the Westfield Fire Department.

These salaries are determined through a contract between the town and the Fireman's Mutual Benevolent Association, an agent that bargains for all of the fire department employees' salaries except for the chief, Chief Walter Ridge said.

The contract mandates in 1997 fire employees will receive a 4.5 percent salary increase over what they earned in 1996.

Thus, the fire inspector on the force will receive a yearly salary of \$66,503 for 1997. The four captains will receive \$63,195; the eight lieutenants will be paid \$57,894; and the 17 top grade firefighters will rereive \$52,533 for the year.

The six employees who have not yet attained the status of top grade firefighter will receive salaries conditional to how long they have served on the force. These employ ees will move out of the probationary period to become topgrade firefighters after they have served on the force for six years.

Any new hires to the force will be paid an annual salary of \$25,000. The salaries for the chief and the deputy chiefs will be determined when the council establishes the 1997 budget early next year. Because these positions are administrative, they are not negotiated by

the FMBA.



### he streets are alive with sound of music

WESTFIELD - The sounds of Switzerland will resound throughout the downtown streets this season, giving shoppers a treat as they finish their holiday shop-

Dr. Ted Schlosberg, founder and director of the New Jersey Workshop for the Arts, added a Swiss Alps horn to his vast collection of musical instruments and will play the unusual instrument on the streets of downtown this month.

"I first saw this instruments two sum- far between in the United States. mers ago in Lake Louise, Canada. It was the most beautiful sound you could imagine," he said.

After hearing the horn, Dr. Schlosberg immediately began inquiring on how he could get one and eventually, heard of a South Carolina man, Jim Ghegy, who imports these horns. Dr. Schlosberg got one from Switzerland through the southerner.

The Alps horn was originally used by shepherds to bring sheep in from the fields, and although it is the National Instrument of Switzerland, they are few and

"I don't know of anyone or anywhere States with this horn," Dr. Schlosberg

The valveless horn is completely made of wood, including the mouthpiece, and has a range from high C to an octave below G. Dr. Schlosberg's particular horn plays in the key of F.

Because its range does not include all of the chromatic scale and because of the rarity of the instrument, there is no set repertoire for the Alps horn, Dr. Schlos-

berg said.

"It can introduce a melody, it can stand else (besides Mr. Ghegy) in the United on its own and it can be used in the middle of a piece to augment the piece,"

Also, several musicians, including Leopold Mozart and Johann Strauss, have written pieces specifically for the instrument. Dr. Schlosberg has been researching other selections that are not specifically made for the horn but will suit it. He will eventually compile a book of these selections.

Before, receiving the horn from Switzerland last week, Dr. Schlosberg, who

plays all of the brasses, had never before played the instrument.

"Any brass player can play this horn." Dr. Schlosberg said. "There's no different between the methods of performance. The only difference is it's a huge horn so you have to adjust from the time you make the sound to the time it comes out,"

Dr. Schlosberg will play his new instrument in front of his building at 152 E. Broad St. 1-1:30 p.m. every Saturday until Christmas. He will also open the First Night activities downtown 6 p.m. New





#### **Bed and breakfast** request will have to wait

WESTFIELD - Anyone interested in staying in a bed and breakfast will have to wait until the new year to see if they'll have the opportunity to do so.

Lawrence Mannino, chairman of the Board of Adjustment, advised attorney James Flynn to have his client, Maureen Garrels, hold any further testimony on her request to establish Westfield's first bed and breakfast to the board's next meeting in January.

Mr. Mannino made this advisement because only four of the six board members who had heard Ms. Garrels's original testimony in November were present at Monday's meeting. A minimum of five votes are required to grant an acquisition, so the board was not in a position to vote Monday.

Because Monday's meeting was the last of 1906, Ms. Garrels will have to buy a transcript of the November meeting to present to the newly-appointed 1997 board in January. The chairman's advice will save the homeowner the expense of having to purchase the December transcript as well.

Ms. Garrels came before the board in November with a request to convert her single-family home Westfield Avenue into a bed and breakfast. The town has no such establishment.

Ms. Garrels said she would continue to reside in the home, which was built in 1876, while operating the lodging. No more than six guests would be accommodated in the house at one time, and none of the visitors would have access to

the kitchen.

In order to convert the home into a guest house, which she would call "Holly Hedge," Ms. Garrels will do \$20,000 worth of renovations to her house.

Ms. Garrels's request will be on the agenda of the first Board of Adjustment meeting in January. Zoning officer Jeremiah O'Neil will use the interim to research municipalities similar to Westfield that have ordinances allowing for bed and breakfasts.

In other business, the board approved a request made by Norman Sevell, owner of Sevell's Auto Body on South and Windsor avenues, to erect an addition on his property.

The addition will fill in two areas along a building to make the building uniform. These areas will be used for storing equipment that is now being stored outdoors.

Mr. Sevill was granted his request under the condition he add three trees to his property to improve its aesthetic quality.

### Luxury added without sticker shock

These days high technology doesn't automatically mean expensive. And while the 1997 Infiniti Q45 is by no means inexpensive, it utilizes many upgrades, most geared toward luxury and convenience, without suffering from a skyrocketing window sticker.

This type of luxury car is meant to evoke passion in its owners, but it still must deliver genteel quality in the most subtle ways; a difficult formula to follow. There are two models of the Q45: Base and the more sporting Touring model, which is the focus of this week's test.

#### Outside

The new Q-caroutside dimensions are close to that of the previous version, but its appearance is dramatically different.

The new look starts in front, with an elegant chrome grille, larger headlamps, integrated fog lights and a new front bumper. Chrome trim surrounds the windows, the fenders have been reshaped, and its higher flanks and sweeping C-pillars give it a more elegant appearance.

To increase its stiffness, the new Q45 features a series of structural members in the under pan and tie bars across the front and rear shock towers. These additions have done little to its girth, as the new model is about 200 pounds lighter than before.

All of the switches and controls are placed at close proximity to the driver, and are all simple to operate.

Our Q45 Touring model came standard with features such as a 200-watt stereo with a trunkmounted six-disc CD changer, heated 10-way power front seats, automatic climate control. cruise control, plus power windows, antenna, door locks, sunroof and outside mirrors. Keyless entry is also standard, as is a power till! telescoping steering column, and an integrated HomeLink transmitter system, which can be programmed to open garage doors and turn on home lighting systems.

#### Behind the wheel

This year Infiniti has toned things down a bit under the Q45's hood. The all-aluminum, 32valve, twin-can V8 engine has been de-stroked from 4.5 liters to the current model's 4.1 liters. Producing 266 horsepower, this new engine gives up only 12 horsepower from the old engine, yet is lighter, has less internal friction, and gives slightly better fuel mileage. Its power delivery is smooth and responsive, and easily revs to its 5600 RPM maximum power output.

Mated to it is a computer-controlled fourspeed automatic transmission that has been upgraded internally to deliver smoother, quicker

stery is leather, tightly stitched and uniform, shift smoothly and imperceptibly during everyday driving, but to shift firmly when the throttle pedal is fully depressed. This rear-wheel drivetrain concludes at a viscous, limited-slip rear differential, which is also standard equip-

#### On the road

The Q45's suspension has been massaged. too, which gives a more compliant ride, without sacrificing much handling prowess. Nissan has decided to replace the old model's multi-link front suspension with MacPherson struts, which are simpler to build, lighter, and quieter.

The rear setup continues with a multi-link design, an arrangement carried over from the previous model. Both front and rear assemblies are mounted to subframes with rubber isolation mounts, and use fluid-filled bushings to absorb vibrations. Piloting the Q45 over pothole-filled roads and highways strewn with road work didn't phase the car at all — but we were well aware of the imperfections.

New this year is speed-sensitive rack-andpinion steering, in which the steering effort is light at slower speeds, yet becomes increasingly firm as speeds increase, giving more road feel. Its braking system is improved as well, with larger, four-wheel vented disc brakes and an anti-lock braking system (ABS). Q45 Touring models come with slightly stiffer suspension components, along with special alloy wheels.

### Use the book with hydraulic brakes

Q is it necessary to change the brake fluid every 30,000 miles for both the master cylinder and the anti-skid brake system as recautomatic transmission and it now has 30,000 miles on it.

A When I was a mechanic I got in the habit of pressure bleeding a  $\Lambda$  Till bit of brake fluid from each wheel cylinder every couple of years for my regular customers. It got rid of the contaminants that collected at the wheel cylinders. I would also pull out the fluid from the master cylinder and replace it with fresh stuff. I felt this was especially important with drum brakes.

Many brake master cylinder are sealed from atmospheric contamination by an expanding diaphragm so water contamination can't get in but not all. So, it's a good idea to service the brake hydraulic system according to the factory recommendations.

Unfortunately a total flushing of a brake system is pretty costly.

Honda has recommended a purge every 45,000 miles for the past couple of years and our local Nissan dealer does it at 60,000. In checking back through old maintenance schedules, I found that in '74, Volkswagen recommended changing brake fluid every two years. I'm still not convinced that flushing out all the old fluid is an absolute necessity as long as the brake fluid that's added is up to the specifications of the fluid that's pulled out.

Q Our 1989 Acura Integra now has 102,000 miles on it. It has an automatic transmission and a four cylinder, 1.6 liter engine. It has run very well for us (we bought it new) and we have kept it up very well. Lately it has had a slight problem in restarting once it has been left sitting for as short a time as a half an hour.

> A That is true in most cases but in the case of a fuel-injected vehicle, it's possible that the pump is simply leaking a bit of pressure when your engine is shut down. It has to deliver close to 40 pounds of pressure (compared to the three to five pounds needed for a carburated engine) and it is supposed to hold that pressure for around 10 minutes.

> If it has a slight internal leak, the engine will run fine but restarting is hard once the fuel pressure has bled off. Your mechanic is probably right although your problem could also be a faulty fuel pressure regulator. The tests for both problems is relatively simple and your mechanic should be able to pinpoint the problem pretty eas-

> QI have a '59 MGA that I've had for many years. I'm retired now and only drive it on the weekends and in good weather. I've been having a lot of trouble with the fuel pump on it and occasionally have to tap the area behind the passenger's seat with a hammer to get it clicking.

I've tried to find one through a local parts house but they don't even have it listed in their catalogs. There are no MG dealers left in the U.S. and I don't know who to write to in England to send me one. Are there still MG dealers in England? I want to keep it original.

#### retrospective look at BMW's 328

When I was fresh out of high school and felt I knew everything about cars, I was sure that the most successful pre-war sports cars were British, hard sprung, flexible and a chore to drive. My "classic" icons were the Jaguar SS-100, the MG-TB, the Morgan and the HRG. Rough riders all, and all pretty much under-

My opinion of what was "classic" and successful in those good-old/bad-old days of the '30s was modified in 1963 when I was drafted and sent to Louisville, Ky. During my weekend ramblings, I stumbled into a foreign car dealership in Nashville, Tenn. and sitting on the showroom floor were two BMW sports cars that were small, light and very modern. I was surprised to find that the roadster, a model 328, had been built in 1936 and its stablemate was a 1940 aerodynamic coupe that had been a factory entry in the last Mille Miglia race held in Italy before World War II.

I examined the cars very carefully and found that they sported tubular frames, a sophisticated suspension system and a strange straight-six 2.0 liter engine that had three Solex carburetors mounted directly on top of the valve cover. Although the wheels were held on by center-lock knock-off wing nuts, they were steel rather than the traditional wire construction. Needless to say, I was denied a test drive, but the bored salesman assured me that it rode as well as a Buick and handled better than an MG. This from an 17-year-old

Being something of a mechanical snob, I wasn't interested in the coupe (real enthusiasts drove open cars, of course) but inquired as to the cost of the roadster. Its price tag of \$2500 seems laughable now but at the time, it might as well have been 100 times

In later years, I became a mechanic and something of an automotive historian as well. BMW, I learned. stood for the Bayerische Motoren-Werke and the company had gone by that title since 1917. The "strange" engine was a modification of a traditional six-cylinder. overhead valve, 50 horsepower engine used by the '30s. It had been converted by an ingeniously designed cylinder head that allowed it to be an efficient as a twin cam without the expense of a totally new engine design. It raised the horsenower to 80.

money was scarce even in Nazi Germany.

BMW wanted to produce a sports car that would challenge the best that Italy and France had to offer and called upon designer Freiherr von Falkenhausen to lay out a light, but strong chassis using state-ofthe- art techniques. He created a timeless design that used independent front suspension, hydraulically operated brakes (a relatively new innovation in the '30s), torsion bars in the rear and a four-speed transmission.

The ingenious cylinder head was the work of Rudolph Schleicher, a long-time BMW engineer, and his design was an inspiration. It was difficult to work on due to the fact that all the ancillary parts had to be crammed in around the convoluted valve train but it

Put together early in 1936, the BMW factory eschewed the conventional method of introducing a new car at the various annual shows, electing instead to enter a prototype in the two-liter class of the annual Eifelrennen race at the Nurburgring track in June of that year. Driver Ernst Henne won at a walk and the reputation of the BMW 328 was made in a

BMW had built motorcycles from its earliest days, but its wartime activities included the building of aviation engines which made the factories prime targets for Allied bombers. Its two plants were pounded almost into extinction and it was a miracle of German tenacity that BMW survived the war. Its Eisenach plant fell into the Russian occupation section and was nationalized, but production of substandard BMW sedans began at once using pre-war parts that had been salvaged. Its Munich facility was stripped by the British and sold off to British companies as "war reparations." This lead to an unusual situation in which the British-built Bristol 400 of 1947 was a near-clone of the BMW 327 coupe of 1941, and the Frazer-Nash Le Mans Replica sports car of the same era was built on a chassis nearly identical to the BMW 328 roadster of 1936. Both cars, as well as the racing version of the '57 to '63 AC Ace and the Arnolt-Bristol of the late-'50s used updated versions of the 1936 BMW "strange" two liter engine.

This year and next, BMW is celebrating several anniversaries. It officially became the Bayerische Mocompany in more mundane passenger cars of the toren-Werke in 1917, its world famous 328 sports car is 60 years old, and the first run of post-war cars came out of the resurrected Eisenach East German plant 50 years ago.

#### Best-selling car is a pickup truck

The best-selling car in the U.S. isn't a "car" at all. It is, in fact, a pickup truck, and more specifically the Ford F-Series in all its many forms. Matt and Bob Hagin try one of the most common versions with a short cab, a long bed and two-wheel-drive. They have slightly differing opinions on this civilized roughneck. Manufacturer's suggested price is \$14,700; as tested

Bob - The F-Series has been around since my high school days, Matt. While I was still a senior. I worked at night as a pump-jockey in a gas station that used a '48 F-1 as a parts chaser. It's immediate successor, the F-100, has acquired the status of a collector's item and there are even special aftermarket shops devoted to their restoration.

Matt - The new F-Series Fords haven't gotten to that level of veneration yet, Dad, but it sure is popular. Over 450,000 of them were sold in '96, but that includes the bigger F-250 and the F-350, too. Ford was so hot to get this all-new '97 version in production that it started making them late in 1995 at a couple of its truck plants and in the beginning of this year, dealers could get both versions to sell simultaneously. The '97 F-Series has had considerable upgrading and it underwent a lot of major changes.

Blob - And the changes started with the suspension. The old Twin-I Beam swing axles are gone from the front and have been replaced by a more modern short-and-long "A" arm system. The two-wheel-drive version like the one we had uses coil springs up front, but the 4X4s use torsion bars for springs. I read in the Ford press kit that the Twin-I Beams had to go in order to fit Ford's hot overhead cam engines under the new, lower hood of the F-150, but for whatever reason, it gives this F-150 a ride that's more like a car. That's bound to be a plus for shoppers who are leaving a sedan for a more versatile pickup. And to al**leviate** that crowded feeling that tall drivers get in a standard cab pickup, Ford has given the new cabin a slight overhang over the bed so that the reclining seats can be tilted back.

Bob - The engines Ford has put under the hood are new, too. They

begin with a 205-horse 4.2 liter pushrod V6 as standard equipment, which comes with either a fiveseed manual gearbox or a four-speed automatic. Next up on the list is Ford's new overhead cam V8 that puts out an additional 20 ponies. That's the engine that was in our test truck and although its strong and is more powerful than the old 302-inch pushrod engine that the F-Series has used since '70, it's still a bit on the small side compared to that of the competition.

Matt - But Ford has an answer to that, too. There's a 5.2 liter overhead cam V8 available that puts out 235 horses. The horsepower isn't that much greater than the other engines but it puts out 75 more pound/feet of torque than the V6, which comes in very handy come summertime. This would be the obvious engine of choice if someone were going to do a lot of boat towing with a new F-150.

Bob - If a buyer was going to go into recreational towing of a boat or a camper trailer, I think that the extended cab version of any of the F-Series pickups would be a better choice than this short cab version. It has an optional third door on the driver's side that keeps passengers from having to crawl over the front seat and it makes stowing and locking gear back there lots easier. The interior is more car-like now and Ford has even put in a second air bag for the front passenger, and the driver can disable the second bag in the event that there's a baby being carried in a car seat. All the F-150s have anti-skid brakes on the rear, and four-wheel ABS is offered as an option.

Matt - The Ford designers have even gone so far as to put a lock on the tailgate to keep them from being ripped off. That's become a big problem now that pickups have become so popular with American

Bob -- Matt, nice as these new pickup are, I kind of miss the days when they weren't so popular. Back then, I didn't have to worry about having the taligate on my old Ford Courier stolen.

Matt - That's true, Dad, but maybe the reason yours wasn't stolen is that it was so rusty and beat-up nobody wanted it.

### Check your car before the bad weather season

Sometimes we take our personal cars or trucks for granted - until something goes wrong. If we don't put fuel in the tank, the thing just stops running. If we let it run out of oil, it stops running too, but with a big bang in this case.

But there are several other items on our vehicles that don't get our attention so drastically if they malfunction. Sometimes we don't get any warning until it's too late. These are some of those items that we should check out before the really bad weather comes along:

• Air in spare tire — We all know that we should check the air in our tires once a month, right? And we do it, of course, but most of us neglect to check the air in our spare tire. This leads to the possibility of getting a flat tire and finding that the spare is also flat. In many cases, the neglect is understandable. My own means of personal transportation is a 12 year old Toyota van of very high (230,000) mileage. Its spare tire is tucked away under the rear of the body and it requires considerable ingenuity and resolve to crank it down for inspection. I don't look forward to checking the spare but I do it because a dislike the specter of being immobilized by the side of the road even more. This sunny weekend would be a good time to check your own spare tire.

• Battery terminal cleanliness — The average car in this country is seven years old which means that on average, it has racked up around 75,000 miles and is probably on its second or third battery. Batteries are messy and tend to get neglected under the best of circumstances. Even when they're tight, battery cable clamps tend to develop corrosion between themselves and the terminals they are clamped or bolted to. This tendency is exacerbated by damp weather and winter is just over the next hill. Battery cables connections that haven't been removed for cleaning for a long time should be disconnected very gently and with great care (rough handling can loosen or break a terminal and then the battery is history) but it has to be done in order to get a clean, tight connection. When terminal corrosion reaches critical mass, it's like the battery is gone - no starter, no lights, no

• Heater hose brittleness — My granddaughter Shannon recently called me from college and told me that there was a small puddle of antifreeze under her car. Grandpa rode to the rescue, of course, and found that one of her heater hoses had a slight leak. Like all small diameter heater hoses, is that you won't be able to cash a check.

it had become brittle and the engine vibration caused it to crack. I shortened it a bit, pushed it back on, replaced the coolant and she was on her way. Later we found that all the heater hoses showed signs of cracking and replacing all the under hood hoses (including those attached to the radiator) became a Saturday morning project at Grandpa's garage. Maybe you'd better check your own heater hoses before too long.

• Worn or brittle windshield wiper blades -Did I say winter was over the next hill? I think it just came around the corner and necessitated the use of windshield wipers. If yours are average, they're about as old as your battery and possibly in need of replacement. It would be a good idea to check them now (the rubber part should be soft and pliable) and if they're in bad shape, they should be replaced before it starts to rain. Driving on a rainy night with wipers that don't quite do the job is almost as bad as having to replace them in the pouring rain.


Rear lights that are burned out - Driving in that downpour or in a snow storm approaches the risk factor of playing Russian roulette when your car has no tail lights. If the driver is lucky, a policeman will stop him and make him aware of the problem before some big-rig acquires his Chevy for a hood ornament. Chances are that one taillight bulb burned out and then the second packed it up sometime later. Are you sure that your own tail lights are both working?

 Alternator belt that has become loose — Your alternator is the device that keeps your battery charged up and the belt that drives it can become worn and get loose. When this happens, it can drive the alternator fast enough to keep things working in the daylight hours but not enough if you have to do much nighttime driving. The belt is there under the hood (the black thing behind the fan) and it should have about an inch of play. If you don't know what I'm talking about, better have it checked out by someone who does before you find yourself driving at night with the lights growing dimmer and dimmer as the car goes slower and

I can think of only one other insidious automotive problem that can creep up on us, and it doesn't have anything to do with mechanical things. Some years ago, my sister was pulled over for some minor traffic infraction and when the policeman inspected her license, he suggested that she should have it renewed immediately. It had expired almost three years before and she hadn't even been aware of it.

#### Here's to balconies



he more things change, the more they stay the same.
Yes, it's an overused cliche, but nothing more appropriately describes the continued fuscination with sports cards and memorabilia.

Over the decades, the sports card industry has transformed from a small time hobby to a big time business. Despite the rapid changes, one thing remains constant: a loyal following of devoted fans.

The most significant development in recent years is the sky recketing increase of card production. The problemation of new companies, each of which prints a countless array of high priced premium sets, as a far cry from past decades when Topps infed the roost.

"Buck then it was great," says Lou Sabosky, owner of Sideline Sports in South Bound Brook "You collected Topps and that's it You collected your team or the Whole set or whatever."

Other than sponadic exceptions of rival componies between the late 1940s and early 1960s, Topps monopolized the field until 1981, when Fleer and Donauss won legal approval to print earls. By the late 1980s, Score and Upper Deck Johnet the already competitive held, followed by additional manufacturers in the 1990s. With superior photography and innovative designs, the new companies gave thems a run for its money.

Mot to be outdone, the venerable attributy begin its contribute in the contribute of the state o

fronts and glossy photography caught the eyes of investors and collectors alike. With the creation of even fancier premium sets and special inserts, many card afficient dos believe the company has regained its number one status.

"Topps is still the leader," says Tony Grimando, owner of Bound Brook's World of Stuff store.

Among the major sports, baseball is still the leader despite the

shots and stationary poses are mostly memories. Action photos, superior card quality and imaginative design mark the modern era.

Also a faint memory are the 35 cent wax packs. (Most of us still have childhood memories of invading convenience stores and buying as many packages as our paper-route and snow shoveling earnings allowed us.) Today, \$5-\$10 packs are commonplace.

"The technology changed, therefore the price changed," Sabosky says.

Special inserts are probably the most sweeping current fad. Last year Topps randomly inserted replicas of original Mickey Mantle cards in its regular packs, igniting a craze that occurred shortly after the Hall of Famer's untimely death,

"A lot of people don't look for sets anymore," says Joe Potyak, owner of B&G Sports Card in Middlesex, "Most people are after inserts. It's like insert-mania."

The notion that memorabilia collecting is for kids only, ignoring the reality of its big business status, is a discredited myth. Topps alone reported sales of more than \$250 million in 1994, according to Sports Cord Trader.

The most valuable card is the scarce 1910 Honus Wagner, recently sold at an auction for \$640,500. Many card experts say only 10 or so such card exists today.

The best modern investments are rookie cards for current and future Hall of Famers. At one extreme is the 1952 Topps Mickey Mantle, going for \$25,000, while the rookle edition of soon-to-be inducted strikeout king Notan Ryan hovers near \$1,000.

The reliability of proven recordsetters makes the Mantles, Ryans, Mayses, Schmidts, Aarons, and Reggie Jacksons sure bets. They definitely cost more, but unlike modern speciality cards, which can be in one day and obsolete the next, their value is unwavering.

"Pick a player who started young and hits for power," says Brian Lebocuf of Sports Minded Unlimited in Warren. "Home runs selt."

Getting a leg up on future Hallof-Famers is more difficult, given the volatility of active careers. The rise and fall of Don Mattingly and Darryl Strawberry, whose roaring starts in the mid-'80s generated widespread interest before they fizzled in the early '90s, testify to this.

"It's just like the stock market, where the player's performance dictates the value of the cards," Demarest collector John Pic says, "and it's like the lottery with these inserts."

There is undoubtedly a downside to all of this hysteria. The production boom has alienated some collectors, who don't have the resources and energy to keep up with all the latest trends.

(Continued from page 4) nowadays and you'll find more than several dozen sets and subsets from each manufacturer. Put simply, most feel there are too many companies producing too many carda.

"That's one of the biggest complaints out there," Potyak says.

"I think it confuses the consumers," Lebosuf says. "It sometimes turns the consumer off."

Pic, an avid collector for 10 years, agrees that "too much prod-

uct makes choosing really hard." "And the prices are absurd," he adds, referring to the 1983 Refruc-

tors edition of Topps Finest. The ultra-UV 200 card premium glossy set is valued at as much as \$40,000. Individual cards in the set can fetch more than \$1,000.

"\$1,200 for a 1903 Greg Maddux?" Pic asks, "How absurd is that?"

Souring prices have hurt the industry's profitability, which has tapered off since the early 'Als. The number of professional dealers is decreasing and, according to U.S. News and World Report, the trading card industry is worth about \$600 million, down from more thun \$900 million in 1992.

As a result, few stores can rely solely on card sales, or they risk burning themselves out. Most stores carry a wide selection of memorabilia, ranging from plaques, balls, bats, jerseys, helmets and caps, to classic magazines and vearbooks.

The greatest demand in memorabilla is for autographed items. (Most price guides now include a special section.) An authentic Babe Ruth signed baseball is rumored to sell for as much as \$10,000.

"I've combined collectibles with licensed sports apparel," adds Lebocuf, "If they're going to collect sports they're also going to wear sports. It's been a great marriage."

"If I had to sell cards alone I don't think I could cut it." Sabosky

Bargain hunters often turn to card shows for the best deals. One of the largest shows in the East Coast National held every suramer at the Westchester County Community Center in White Plains, N.Y. The four-day spectacle includes about 500 dealers, covers two floors and attracts memorabil ia enthusiants from throughout the tri state area.

The logic seems simple enough. A large gathering of dealers competing for sales is believed to drive prices down. Most shows only last a day or two and dealers are in a burry to make a profit, (renting fables alone generally costs between \$25 \$50), so sellers often cut doubs with buyers.

Hul store owners are hallling that perception, arguing a friendly relationship with customers out shines the impersonal atmosphere ate ovided shows.

"The biggest misconception is that people feel they have to go to a show to get a good deal," Silv

osky says. "We're trying to educate—ship. Pic, for example, bought his people that you can get a deal here. None of the prices are etched in stone."

"You're better off with someone you trust," Leboouf adds.

Many store-owners are lifelong collectors, some of whom began selling at card shows, while others made the leap directly from collecfor to entrepreneur.

"Most people start out with col-

"Make sure you're boying fun," Nemeckay adds, "If you're not having fun then you're doing k for all the wrong reasons."

How long will the cruze last? Given the fanalical following of professional sports, most are confident the hobby will cruise into the 21st Century.

"As long as there are television stations devoted to sports and 24hour sports indlo - I thi**nk sports** enhedibles are here to stay." Lab ocul suys.

### 6 Antiques

# True sports antiques differ from collectibles

Weekend Plus antiques wher

fren people ask, "What is
the difference between
antiques and collectibles?" The answer is
that collectibles only arose as a
category after the start of the current antique boom sometime in
the late 1960s.

Collectibles are different from "real antiques," those items collected in the classic antique periods prior to the 1960s, in that most were manufactured during our lifetimes. One characteristic of many collectibles is that they are connected with the youth of the collector: toys, dolls, cars we admired but couldn't own, movie and TV memorabilia. Sports collecting is a prime example of this phenomenon. As we approach the holidays, many a man (because this is an almost all-male hobby) will receive aports-related collectibles. some genuinely old, some reproduced and some new but promised to be valuable in the future. To sort all this out. I consulted Joshua Leland Evans of Leland's, a leading sports memorabilia dealer and auction house in New York City.

Most collectors start off as card collectors, as witnessed by the proliferation of sports card shops throughout Central New Jersey. The average customer is an adolescent boy. This is actually an excellent way for the young collector to start; the products are not expensive; it's a good social situation and a paradigm for future collecting.

One of the major collecting mistakes in all areas from furniture and paintings to Depression glass and Barbie dolls is the belief that collecting is the same as investing. It's not, especially when you are buying mass-produced items whose values are temporary and driven by fad and whim.

The reason to collect is love of collecting and enjoyment of the objects themselves. Card collecting is a good teacher of this rule, since the chances of current cards increasing greatly in value is unlikely but the process is fun. The sports collecting business for many years has been card-driven, Evans says, but recently the higher end has begun to shift to other sports-related objects as collectors get older, more sophisticated and

financially more secure. Uniforms, autographs, architectural items (such as stadium seats), paper goods (programs, yearbooks, sports magazines), World Series rings and other non-card items have pushed their way to the forefront.

For the collector wishing to move to this next level, the twin questions of authenticity and provenance become important. All it takes to become a sports dealer (or antiques dealer in general) is the desire and a location — no tests, no licenses. Thus, it is really important to know your dealer, be aware of the level of his knowledge and be sure he is willing to guarantee your purchases. If these conditions are not met, stay away from items whose authenticity is hard to prove - uniforms, autographs, unmarked architectural pieces. (Remember all those genuine pieces of the Berlin Wall?) Stick with printed matter (programs, yearbooks, magazines, etc.) or other clearly marked items.

In sports collecting, baseball is still king and the East Coast is its kingdom. Memorabilia of the Yankees, the Mets, the old Brooklyn Dodgers and other Eastern teams is still the most desirable. Right now, 1996 Yankees World Series items are hot, but as time passes only the most unusual items will retain their value. According to Leland's, the Atlanta Braves are becoming desirable because of their wide TV exposure. They still feel like newcomers to me.

The "golden age" teams of the 1940s and '50s have long had a special aura for collectors, but as the sophisticated collector is increasingly a child of the '60s, '70s and '80s, items from these decades become more sought after. In the Leland's catalogs, there is a full range of these items: Mickey Mantle's childhood home in Commerce, Okla. (\$60,500), Carl Yastrzemski's 1971 Boston road jersey (presale \$2,000-\$3,000), a 1950 Negro leagues broadside featuring Satchel Paige (\$600-\$600), a Willie Mays game bat (\$1,000-\$1,500), a Lou Gehrig Memorial Day ticket from July 4, 1941 with his picture

(\$1,000-\$1,500). Baseball is not the only sport of interest to collectors, although it is the most important. Other sports don't have the same long history as a professional sport or the same wide public interest. Boxing is an exception. Boxing has had a long bistory of collecting going back to the early days of the century. There has always been a connection with art (think Herningway, think Hellows) and a consequent perverse intellectual interest in puglistic items. Hoxing collectors are still not that widespread but they are intense and passionate.

Baskathall collecting is on the

upswing, not coincidentally mirroring the intense rise in interest in the NBA. Yet very little exists from the early days. For every early NBA uniform shirt sold at Leland's, there have been a hundred baseball shirts. Most basketball collectors started in baseball memorabilia and moved over.

Will Michael Jordan be the Babe Ruth of basketball collecting? Check with me in 2046. Leland's is selling some items now; some examples are Wilt Chamberlain's original NBA jersey (\$12,000-\$15,000) and a seat from Boston Garden signed by Larry Bird (\$400-\$600). Leland's is dipping its toe in the waters of incipient hockey collecting, having just conducted an auction in Canada with mixed results.

In September, the auction house sold much of the contents of Boston Garden: a partly smoked cigar from Red Auerbach (presale \$100-\$200), the arena's Zamboni machine (\$3,000-\$5,000) and tons of Boston Bruins paraphernalis.

If you are a sports collector wanting to branch out from a strictly card collection, there are neveral ways to do this. Pirst you have to decide what sort of collector you want to be: one sport, one team, one player, one era, equipment, paper, uniforms, autographs. Or do you just want to pick and choose from what is presented to you on the great conveyor belt of goods? Once you have chosen your direction, you need to do some research and find sources. Research can start at your public library, which should have books on antiques and collectibles. You can attend sports memorabilia shows and visit your local dealers. Leland's has a number of auctions

every year; it is possible to view the items and obtain catalogs before sales. Incidentally, their catalogs are beautifully produced and fit to be included in any sports collection. Leland's address is 245 Fifth Ave., Suite 902, New York, N.Y. 10016; call (212) 545-0600.

Once you have directions and information, it's time to step up to the plate. Just get out and look—flea markets, garage sales, dealers (remember my admonitions above), auctions, any way that works for you. Remember, much of the joy is in the hunt and we all collect in a way that is right for us.

A reader sent a photograph of a vase 1214 inches high and marked "Made in Japan." The vace is very colorful and decorated with raised Japanese flaures. This piece is a type of ware often called Satauma, after a prefecture in Japan where the original pottery was produced. The original Satruma was very delicate and much different than this cheaper product designed for export in the 1920s-50s. These pieces do not bring great prices but are prized for their decorative values. This particular piece would retail for \$75-\$85. Wholesale would tre about 50 percent.

# Mars Attacks! isn't like other Hollywood movies

et's face it: Tim Burton is just never going to make a conventional movie.

Now, that's just fine on the surface of it: nobody's pushing

the surface of it: nobody's pushing Burton against a wall and forcing him to make Gone With the Wind. But when a director — even one this quirky — is working within the mainstream, it's sometimes hard to remember that he's not going to do anything that resembles anything else.

Take Mars Attaches, for example. Here, Burton takes what is virtually the exact same plot as that of Independence Day, (and it's hard to know how many B-movies from the past 40 years) and concocts something that's familiar, but at the same time remarkably off-kilter. Sometimes it's hard to tell if you're watching a bad space invasion movies.

The first half of Mars Attacks! deals almost seriously with the threat of an invasion by little green men (well, little green people, anyway; a scientist reports they have no reproductive organs), with major characters played by big-name actors getting blown away casually. Not that the characters are ever real human beings, but it takes a little getting used to.

In fact, that first half is very slow to get going, even if it does keep moving from location to location in an effort to simulate story momentum. Whole subplots rise and fall for no particular reason other than to kill time. Guest stars like Danny DeVito and Annette Bening find themselves with remarkably little to do.

Midway through the film, though, Burton finds his rhythm, and the movie gets much funnier. Still not focusing on one story, the director decides instead to pile on the jokes, and that proves to be the movie's salvation. If you take something this arch seriously, it's bound to look like a John Waters movie without the wit.

Burton, who has never been especially interested in telling a strong story (witness Edward Scissorhands, Batman Returns or Ed Wood), isn't all that fascinated with it here, either. He is interested in making cheesy looking sets and erratic special effects whirl around his characters, none of whom is especially well formed, either.

The director's solution to thin characters in a very slim story is to provide star power. Jack Nicholson plays the president, who first sees the alien invasion as an opportunity to appear statesmanlike; Glenn Close his Nancy Reagantype first lady; DeVito is a casino slob; Michael J. Fox and Barah Jessica Parker are rival newscast-

ers living together; Pierce Brosnan the stuffier-than-thou scientist; Rod Steiger and Paul Winfield dueling generals; Bening the wife of an aspiring casino developer, also played by Nicholson, who was trying for a Dr. Strangelove kind of experience.

Burton also mines the second tier of show business in interesting ways. Jim Brown and Pam Grier, veterans of blaxploitation movies, show up quite heroically here, and Tom Jones, playing himself, helps save the earth. So does Sylvia Sidney. Don't ask.

In the end, one's enjoyment of Mars Attacks! is going to hinge on one's tolerance for "wink-wink-nudge-nudge" type satire, the kind

of movie that would have gone right over the head of old Ed Wood, the filmmaker Burton must have most often been thinking of as he prepared this movie. If you find the idea of Slim Whitman records hilarious, this is the movie for you.



# Actors play several parts in lively holiday musical

Ing A Christmas Song,
which premiered Friday at
the George Street Playhouse, is a campy, upbeat
modern day musical adaptation of
A Christmas Carol.

Set in Harlem with a cast that includes Scrooge as a Donald Trump wannabe, Cratchit as his computer literate clerk, Marley and the Marlettes, and the three ghosts of Christmas as familiar rock and rollers, the play is as fun as its characterizations suggest

From the opening number's declaration the Dickens' classic is going to be told in an "inner city passion way" to the closing in which Scrooge slaps five with Trny Tim, the audience is treated to a string of catchy, stylistically diverse Top 40 type songs through which the timeless tale is told.

Only a scant amount of lines are not sung, almost all are delivered in rhyme.

A delightfully greedy Scrooge (played by Rutgers University graduate Rudy Roberson) is introduced as "a real estate pig by trade" who plans to bulldoze his former church and an orphanage. Rejecting a plea from the preacher (Erich McMillian McCall) and second guessing from Cratchit (Clent Bowers), Scrooge, with derby and cane, gleefully croons he's happy to be the heavy and as long as profits are up he'll drop a coin in the orphanage's cup. He also defers Cratchit's promised mise.

Scrooge falls asleep caressing and kissing his piggy bank, only to face his deceased business partner. Marley (also played by Clent Bowers), in a dream. Accompanied by three mini skirted, hip swinging Marlettes (Kim Hawthorne, Shaton Wilkins and Jessaca Dillan) be decked in police regala, Marley calls for Scrooge to "give it up" so Marley can be released from Purgatory. Scrooge arrogantly rejects the advice and returns to sleep, with each snore exhaling "money, money, money, money, money.

The ghost of Christmas Past (Philip Anthony) next takes Scrooge through some bittersweet memories. With braided and head ed hair, purple pants, red felt plat forms and a glittery, paisley pat terred shut unzipped to near his belly button, Christmas Past recalls Scrooge's first love, Mary (also Kim Hawthorne), who was redected as a "blooding heart" by a 23 year old Scrooge The pair sing a love ballad and just as they are about to kess, Christmas Past polls Scrooge away and takes him to his chutch as a 12 year old. There, Servinge sees his gospel singing mother (Sharon Wilkins) and recalls she died the next year. He gets swept up in the Hand clapping

and singing of the choir and, as the first act closes, Scrooge's cockiness is replaced by a concern that he may have been too quick in rejecting Mary and church.

Scrooge soundly rejects his expenence with Christmas Past and declares, "I don't need love or the holy spirit" as he drifts back to sleep in the beginning of the sec ond act. It's dreamtime again, and in striks the saucy ghost of Christ mas Present (also Kan Haw thorne) With a Tina Turner hando. and outfit, she sings "what goes atound comes around" in Turner's R&B style and takes Scrooge to Cratchit's house on Christmas Eve-There, Scrooge sees Tiny Tim (Jes. stea Dillan) cannot get the medical care he needs because Cratchit was defied a taise. Scrooge wants: to help, but is yanked away by Christmas Present, who tells him, "I just show what's going down It's up to you to turn it around "

Scrooge once again returns to sleep before being awakened by a ghost of Christmas Future resembling James Brown (Erich McMilhan McCall again) Large Monopoly style signs indicating his properties have been foreclosed are around his bed. His empire up for auction, Scrooge observes the funeral of Tiny Tim who is "dead for lack of brend" and is escorted to a cometery in Potter's Field

## Stickney shines in Crossroads' production of *The Amen Corner*

In the play, Sister Margaret (played by Phyllis Yvonne Sticknev) offers inspirational words to her congregation each week, filling them with the faith and hope they need to survive in Harlem. We later learn that Sister Margaret turned to the church for strength and guidance when her husband walked out on her and her young son, David (Corey Parker Robinson), 16 years ago. Given the strength by God "to be both pyther and father" to her son, she re-

lies on her experiences to lead her church members — though sometimes to a fault. When a young woman approaches her pulpit unaccompanied by her husband and asks Sister Margaret to pray for her sick baby, she instantly encourages the woman to leave the man because of his lack of faith.

Margaret's world is shaken—as is David's—however, by the sudden appearance of her rambling jazz musician husband, Luke (Mansoor Najee Ullah). His presence has a powerful effect on both mother and son, as it recalls Margaret's buried past and rekindles. David's desire to play piano in places other than Mangaret's church

After a long separation, father and son share their dreams about playing together, the hold music has on their fives and finally. David's fear that leading the music can's life will land him in the same position his father is in now

sick and lonely. Najer Illah and Robinson, through their fine acting, bring to the audience the frustration and deep love shared by those kept apart by onless but connected through a common interest

Many standing evalions are due Phyllis Yvonne Stickney, who as Sister Margaret brings a broad range of emotions to this production. As paster, mother and wife, Stickney conveys the strength given to her by God, the frustration she legts as her son plans a life that may lead him out of her

parish, and the confusion one feels when dealing with a past that was thought to be buried -- all with equal force and emotion.

Stickney is no stranger to stage and screen. Her stage work includes the New York production of Tartuffe; her films include Anna Douglas, New Jack City, Jungle Fener, What's Love Got To Do With It?, and even Die Hard With a Vengeance. She co-started in the television mini-series The Women of Brewster Place and has had roles on The Coshy Show and A Different World

Daniel Proett's set design is exceptionally well done. While Sister Margaret's church is the local point of the set—and the place where the characters go for strength and guidance—it is surrounded by the templations of everyday life, such as advertisements for heer and eightettes, as well as the local liquor store.

Crossroads presents honest por towals of Almean American life and culture. As Erme Johnston, the theater's public relations director says, "The company provides a home where African-American cruftspeople can develop and explore their geners in a nur turing and supportive environment."





## Local diners welcome FINE NORTHERN ITALIAN CUISINE a family restaurant

Raritan's Acqua captures corporate lunchers and others

By PHYLLIS RECKEL

Weekend Plus culinary correspondent orporate America, or at least Corporate Raritan and Somerville, has welcomed Acqua, the Italian restaurant that took over the space once known as Sam's Grille. It's a great place for lunch or for dinner, for business or for dining with friends.

An upscale restaurant, its wait staff are professionals with experience. They know how to be everpresent without being obvious and they chat easily about the menu or anything else - if you are so inclined

The dinner menu begins with an antipasti list (\$6.95-\$12.95) that includes hot or cold antipasto trays or various forms of mussels, calamari, and clams.

Salads include a \$4.95 house. salad, which is a crispy mix of tomato, cucumber olives and red onions mixed with fresh greens. Three other salads are offered for \$6.95 caesar, lemon garlic vinaigrette and tricolor.

It wouldn't be an Italian restaurant if it didn't have pasta and it does, \$11.95 for rigatoni with plum tomatoes to \$17.95 for shrimp, lobster, scallops, clams and mussels over linguine. The latter is a sea lover's delight. One of my dining companions had the special, linguine with artichoke hearts, which proved to be a tangy temptation.

Three sauteed yeal dishes (\$15,95-\$16,95) come with a cherry lemon butter sauce, a ham, cheese and herb mix in marsala demiglaze, or a marsala wine sauce with asparagus and pistachio nuts. Veal marsala is one of my favorites and Acqua's version is quite wonderful.

Five chicken dishes - offered roasted, grilled and sauteed - are \$14,95. Fresh and and marinated trout are \$17.05 and crabcakes and marinated salmon are \$19.95. Meat lovers will find roasted pork chops (\$16.95) and a 10 ounce Black Angus grilled steak, topped with Hoquefort cheese and walnut compound butter, for \$23.95.

All entrees are served with a vegetable and a potato or rice. The evening we were there, the vegetables were teeny liny asparagus and julienne carrots, as delicious a combination as it was attractive.

and the potatoes were even tinier threads creating a deep fried web, again a different and great taste because of the cut.

Acqua's lunch menu is a delight. We began ours with the soup of the day (\$3.95), a wonderful combi nation of white beans, sausage and arugula, a country table kind of dish that was delicious

Although there's ordinary antipasti fare (\$6.95), the salada, in addition to the caesar (\$6.95) and house (\$3.95) for \$7.95 include grilled marinated chicken on greens, sauteed salmon on spinach and portabellos with romaine, mozzarella and artichoke hearts.

Four sandwiches on homemade breads are offered. For \$7.95, there's mozzarella, roasted pepper, tomato and arugula or, our choice, a satisfying combination of portabello, eggplant and onion. The sandwich was accompanied by a most scrumptious tomato relish that ought to be featured rather than just served as an accompaniment. And for \$6.95, there's an open face BLT or, a surprise to me, an A-ounce hamburger.

Two filttatas (omelets) are offered for \$6.95, one with polators and fresh artichokes, and our choice, mushroom, asparagus and bacon, a great combination. Also on the lunch meau are personal. size pizza, pasta, veal and chicken

The two specials of the day were goat cheese ravioli in a diced chicken, pistachio and peas sauce for \$7.95, another country flavor delight, and a fettucini with shrimp and garlie for \$8.95. If you 

like scampi, you will love this dish!

In house pastry ends the meal (\$5,95) day or night and the choices are a delicious mix of tort and mousse and Italian delights, plus ice cream or sorbet.

There's a bar at Acqua, and patrons may eat there. It serves beer and wine by the glass or bottle. Bottles of wine are mostly in the **\$20** range.

The restaurant offers a most pleasant ambiance whether you're seated in front of the huge window wall or on the upper level between two Picasso type murals. White linen tablecloths and napkins, and a bread basket of crisp Italian bread and focacela, tells you immediately you are in a fine dining pince, but the relaxed service allows you to sit back and enjoy your meal.

Refore opening Acqua, Franco Ingraro sold his small Italian restaurant in Freehold and opened this larger endeavor with sons Matteo, Luciano and Joseph. It looks like he made the right declston at the right time with just the ambience this area needed.

- When shipping items, make sure you choose appropriate cushioning such as newspaper, Styrofoam "peanuts" or bubble wrap. Enclose gifts in a sturdy cardboard carton and use strong plastic tape to seal your package.
- For fragile gifts, surround the items with at least two inches of cushioning and try to individually wrap each item
- For those holiday fruitcakes everyone looks forward to make sure you freeze the cake first, to keep it solid. Wrap the cake in plastic wrap and then aluminum foil to keep it cool. If possible, use a gel pack.
  - Make sure your package is addressed properly.

## Don't forget milk, cookies for Santa Claus

The American Dairy Association and Dairy Council Inc. (ADADC) is on a grand mission this holiday — to remind children to leave milk and cookies for Santa. Why? Because rumor has it the better the snack. the better the gifts!

All humor aside, the local promotion organization. ADADC, is spending a quarter of a million dollars during December to air a commercial that shows Santa eating the cookies left for him and then taking back all the gifts because of the great disappointment of finding an empty milk carton in the refrigerator. The last frame, of course, asks consumers, "Got milk?"

At the national level, the advertising team felt that airing the commercial before 9 p.m. would frighten children because they would not understand the humor, but Michele Martens, ADADC's director of advertising. disagrees.

"ADADC has chosen to begin airing the spot during adult programming, starting at 8 p.m., with the rationale that this is a great ad with a timely message. We just want to humorously remind adults what could happen if they run out of milk for the big guy on his special night."

Other efforts to highlight milk and cookies for Santa include featuring the Norman Rockwell scene of an affable, puffy-cheeked Santa enjoying a milk and cookie break.

In 1968, Norman Rockwell created this painting as the cover feature for Family Circle magazine's holiday issue. The original painting was later presented by Family Circle to the national office of The American Dairy Association as a tribute to the dairy farmers of America.

Family management team wanted to recognize American Dairy's outstanding motion of milk and dairy products. The name "Jane" was used in the note to Santa in recognition of Jane Holmes, American Dairy's advertising director in 1968.

For many years, the painting was stored at American Dairy's national office in Rosemont. Ill. During remodeling of the Rosemont facility in the mid-'80s, the painting resurfaced and was dusted off for holipromotions. The painting is now displayed in the board room of the Dairy Management
