Walsh appointed to Town Council

WESTFIELD - By a unanimous vote, Darielle Walsh was appointed to the Town Council as a representative from the Third Ward at a public meeting Tuesday night.

Walsh, a Republican, will assume a post vacated by Andy Skibitsky two weeks ago when he was appointed the town's 33rd mayor following Greg McDermott's resignation. She will serve as councilwoman for the remainder of Skibitsky's term, which expires at the end of the year.

Walsh is a candidate for a four-year term of her own in this November's election, where she will be challenged by former councilman and Democrat Dave Haas.

At Tuesday's meeting, Walsh took the oath

of office from Superior Court Judge Doug Fasciale. She was one of three candidates presented to the council by the municipal Republican committee, which met to choose potential council members on June 30. The other names submitted were Frank Dougert and Dan Clifford, though Walsh's appointment was been widely expected.

Walsh, a 26-year Westfield resident, served on the Board of Education from 1992 to 2001, assuming the role of president for three of those years. She has been recognized for her efforts as a volunteer for a variety of organizations, and was named a "Woman of Excellence" by the Union County Commission on the Status of Women earlier

The newly-anointed councilwoman has also performed extensive service for the

Way, and the Westfield Rotary. She was one of the architects of the Optimist Club's Project Graduation "Bash" in 1989, and continues to volunteer her time for the all-night post-graduation celebration.

"I believe that my experiences both in my service to our community and in my profession will help me effectively serve on our Town Council," Walsh said in her brief remarks after she was appointed to the governing body.

"As the Third Ward's representative on Town Council, I look forward to this opportunity to continue working to improve and enhance the quality of life for our residents and to ensure that Westfield remains a great town to live, work and raise a family," Walsh added.

Residents push for further parking changes

WESTFIELD - A group that lobbied vigorously against the town's proposed redevelopment project last year presented its latest recommendations for improving downtown parking at the Town Council's regular meeting Tuesday.

Members of Westfielders Concerned About Responsible Development (WECARE) lauded the council's recent efforts to improve parking capacity downtown and offered an 11-point plan they said will reduce fees while simultaneously adding about \$145,000 in revenue. Implementing the recommendations would cost just \$5,360, they

The suggestions range from signage improvements to redistributing users throughout varying downtown lots to rolling back commuter and resident parking fees. Many of the recommendations are similar to but more aggressive than steps recently

announced by town officials. Though WECARE also has long-term recommendations to ease Westfield's downtown parking crunch, member Sharon Stockwell said the group's presentation was geared toward improvements that can be imple-

mented right away. 'We wanted to focus on making an immediate increase in the number of parking spaces," Stockwell said.

Last week, the council appeared amenable to reducing parking permits for commuters from \$702 annually down to \$576, and overnight resident parking permits from \$360 to \$120. WECARE suggested reducing the commuter permits down to \$360 and the overnight permits to just \$20 annually, or a "sum that would cover the administrative fees to manage

this program." In 2000, the commuter fees were increased with the expectation that the additional revenue would be carmarked for a downtown parking structure. With that project soundly defeated in last year's referendum, some residents believe the fees should be returned to their original rate. and officials have acknowledged

Foul balls create a stir in Westfield

Board seeks a way to keep baseballs away from neighbors

WESTFIELD - School officials discussed the safety issue of baseballs being hit out of Edison Intermediate School's varsity field at the Board of Education's June 29 meeting.

Residents who live near the field have complained that foul balls are being hit out of the field and onto Westbrook Road and into nearby yards. The issue was raised last year, and the board hopes to come up with a solution

"We're trying to figure out a way to deal with it," said Superintendent William Foley. Board members explained that this isn't just an issue of one or two balls, but about a dozen that are causing families to worry.

"They're going about 200 feet past the base," resident John Githen told board members at the meeting.

The most likely solution, officials said, is to put up 30-foot high netting that can be taken down when the field is not in use in the fall and winter. The nets would be similar to those used at a driving range.

"We can't guarantee there won't be any balls, but it can reduce the problem," said Foley.

Until now the only thing preventing balls from leaving the field has been a backstop, which only protects the area around home plate. Foley explained that the balls causing the problem are coming from other areas of the field. "The houses doing most of the complaining are behind first base and behind the dugout," he

The foul balls have become such a safety issue to surrounding residents that play is now prohibited at the varsity field. Players are using either the junior varsity field or the Roosevelt

But board member Richard Solomon questioned the state of the junior varsity field, noting the infield was overgrown the last time he visited it.

"It's not comparable to the varsity field," agree Foley. Solomon also said the proposal

Quilting allows local resident to create art, continue tradition

SCOTCH PLAINS — When Ruby L. Simmons' mother, Lottie Brown, died in 2001, Ruby chose a unique way to honor her: she took up Lottie's hobby of quilting.

"My mother quilted just about every week," Ruby says. "That was her legacy."

On June 29, she shared that legacy with local residents, speaking and exhibiting her quilts before an audience of about 40 people at the Scotch Plains Public Library.

After Lottie died, Ruby felt inspired to complete her mother's final, unfinished quilt. Ruby saw an ad for a quilting class at the Newark Museum and decided to enroll.

But the class taught machine quilting, and Lottie had always quilted by hand. Ruby decided to work on her own quilts and leave her mother's unfinished.

Wearing a free-flowing white dress, she led the program with a wise, gentle demeanor, speaking slowly but confidently about the stories behind her quilts. Audience members at the library program were amazed by the quality of Ruby's quilts, especially since she only learned the art three years ago.

"I like the color design, and I like her little touch of indi-

"It's amazing that she's done this kind of work."

Ruby is quick to point out that machine quilting is easier than hand quilting. She says it takes her only about 20 hours to put a quilt togeth-

But what makes her quilts unique, she says, is that every one tells a story. In fact, Ruby is writing a children's book with the stories from all her

She points to one quilt, which she calls "my African women." The quilt depicts four young African girls who travel around South Africa. She says the story of the African girls parallels her real-life experience in South

viduality," said Barbara Diem. Africa. She traveled there in July 2004 after receiving a Fulbright Scholarship to study Martin Luther King and Nelson Mandela.

Every quilt contains an object of sentimental value to Ruby. One has a piece of cloth sewn into it that was taken from one of her mother's dresses. Another quilt contains a cutout from one of her husband's shirts.

"In this day and age, when many people do not quilt, it's nice to see that people are keeping the heritage, passing it down from generation to generation," said Gloria Young Brody, a trustee of the

"It's not something I do lightly," Porter said. "I loved working with the Board of Education, and I loved working with the children.

The veteran board member served as president during the implementation phase of the district-wide construction voters approved in a 2000 bond referendum. The project, which affected all eight schools, proceeded on time and with an excellent safety record, Porter proudly

working enjoyed (Superintendent Carol) Chove and her staff, and I feel that we were able to advance the district's mission, which is to nurture confident and caring lifelong learners," Porter said.

Porter had been traveling between Scotch Plains and Detroit over the last few months, and said he decided to relinquish his post to someone with more free time to contribute.

"I've been on the road through the month of June," Porter said, "and I decided

with that to let the board do its work more efficiently I felt I needed (to resign).

President Linda Nelson said the board will have 65 days to fill Porter's seat when it is vacated at the beginning of next month. The board will soon be accepting applications from Scotch Plains residents interested in filling the post.

FANWOOD - The Borough Council discussed several upcoming renovation projects at Tuesday evening's meeting.

The biggest project being planned is a renovation of LaGrande Park. Expected to take place this summer, the park improvements include a reconfiguration of the baseball field so that home runs do not fly into the adjoining playground. The park's tennis courts will be completely recon-

structed as well. The contractors may add electric outlets so that pitching machines can be plugged in, borough officials said. They may also resurface the walkway along the park's edge.

Borough clerk Eleanor McGovern said that seven companies have placed bids for the project. The bids will be read on Friday.

Mayor Colleen M. Mahr said she was very pleased with the amount of grant money Fanwood received for renovating the park. The largest grant totals \$70,000, and the borough received two other grants as well.

Other upcoming projects include adding a sidewalk and curbing to Pleasant Avenue. The borough engineer, Joseph Pryor, is ready to accept bids on the project, but the council must approve the work first.

Another project expected in the future is the reconstruction of Russell and Watson Roads.

Department of Transportation grants will cover some of the cost of the reconstruction, McGovern said.

The council also discussed the building on Terrill Road that formerly contained Rocco's Tayern, Council members said that the state inspected the building and found several violations. Besides the building's commercial space, which is now vacant, three apartments are still

"The building is in dire need of some work," McGovern said. It will be sold

at a sheriff's sale this month, she said.

In a later discussion, the council decided not to allow Clinton Dicksen, the new director of public works, to drive a borough-owned vehicle to and from work. But if a snowstorm or hurricane is predicted and Dicksen needs to use the vehicle's four-wheel-drive capability, council members decided that he may drive the car home

at his discretion.

"He has to establish the need (to use the vehicle)," Mahr said, "but I don't want to micromanage here."

The former public works director, Ray Manfra, lived nearby and drove a borough vehicle to work. But Dicksen lives in Changewater, which is nearly 40 miles away in Warren County. With gas prices rising and the possibility of high maintenance costs, council members decided to save money by asking Dicksen to drive his own vehicle to work.

Ruling doesn't break new ground

It's been obscured a bit by the haze of holiday fireworks, but the Supreme Court's recent ruling in Kelo v. New London, Conn. provoked quite a firestorm. The court's ruling, which found that a municipal government could use its powers of eminent domain to acquire non-blighted residential properties for an "urban renewal" project constructed by a private developer, has been roundly criticized in the court of public opinion. Headlines testified to the "frustration and anger" felt by homeowners at the news. Editorial cartoons lampooned local officials as either imperious elitists or moneygrubbing crooks in the pockets of powerful developers. And the consensus around the water cooler was that the court's decision was an

The response was not surprising. Property rights have a nearsacred status in both American law and popular opinion. And the merits of the New London project, which will replace an existing neighborhood with a new shopping center, hotel and more expensive homes, can certainly be questioned. But the outrage overlooks two important points about the court's decision: first, that rather than granting government broad new powers it reaffirms the legal status quo; and second, that while the dissenters on the court made powerful arguments, the majority's position represented the lesser of two

Regarding the first point, even Justice Clarence Thomas, in his dissent, acknowledged that the Kelo ruling follows in the tradition of more than a century of jurisprudence that allows the use of eminent domain for a project that serves a "public purpose." The latest ruling did not strike down any laws or break substantial new ground. As Justice John Paul Stevens noted in the majority opinion, the Supreme Court had concluded in an earlier case that, "We cannot say that public ownership is the sole method of promoting the public purposes of community redevelopment projects.

Thomas argues that the court's tradition is wrong and should be reversed. But that brings us to the second point: a rule that only allowed condemnations for projects in which government would have a long-term ownership stake would prohibit undertakings that had clear public benefits. Should 19th-century governments not have been able to condemn land so that a mill, needed to foster a community's economic development, could be built? And should the city of Newark, for example, not be allowed to force a slumlord to sell his dilapidated tenements, or forcibly acquire abandoned industrial buildings from a recalcitrant property owner, if another builder is prepared to construct new homes or retail space? And if it should, how could the courts design a rule that permitted Newark's actions but prohibited New London's, without requiring that every redevelopment project go through a full review in the courts?

The actions of the New London government strike us instinctively as wrong. One of the plaintiffs, a woman in her 80s, was born in her house and has lived there her whole life. The lead plaintiff, Susette Kelo, bought a home in a struggling community when others were leaving and has since invested in her property. As Thomas wrote, in a statement that's hard to rebut, though the "just compensation" is required by the Constitution, "No compensation is possible for the subjective value of these lands to the individuals displaced and the indignity inflicted by uprooting them from their homes." The fact that most or all of the displaced homeowners will not be able to afford homes in the new development is even harder to swallow.

But just because something is bad public policy doesn't make it unconstitutional — bad public policies are enacted all the time. The way to defeat them is in the political sphere, by putting pressure on elected officials and, if necessary, electing new legislators. Major redevelopment projects in Fanwood and Westfield were recently modified and defeated, respectively, in this way (though the use of condemnation was not imminent in either case).

While the court was right to uphold the authority of local governments, it's true that more should be done to protect the interests of the displaced property owners, whether or not the government has to wield the big stick of eminent domain. Redevelopment projects on residential sites should include affordable housing units, with the existing homeowners given the right of first refusal. Alternately, property owners should be allowed to take their compensation as a share of the investment in the redevelopment project. And it goes without saying that "just compensation" should include full relocation assistance, which will mean something different in every case. We hope that Cranford, for one, keeps this in mind as the township and its partner the S. Hekemian Group proceed with the Riverfront redevelopment project.

The framework created by Kelo and the court's prior decisions will allow for worthwhile redevelopment projects while also giving rise to some bad public policies and instances of abuse and corruption. The solution is not to restrict the use of eminent domain, but for the media and citizens to ensure that our legislators' actions truly represent the will of the people.

Highlands Council doing good work

To The Record-Press:

Last summer, environmentalists, elected officials, concerned citizens and even some farmers successfully fought for passage and enactment of the New Jersey Highlands Water Protection and Planning Act. This accomplishment is not without controversy.

Some critics claim that landowners will not be properly compensated for changes in land value due to this new law. These critics will be relieved to know that the New Jersey Senate just earmarked \$15 million to pay landowners to preserve farms throughout the Highlands region.

The newly formed Highlands Council, a body of elected officials and public members, is now drafting the Highlands Master Plan. The Council is stepping up to the challenge of educating the public about this

Regional planning on this scale is not new to New Jersey. We have a comprehensive plan for the New Jersey Pinelands, a plan for the Meadowlands, and the Delaware and Raritan Canal region. This regional approach is critical to preserving our state's natural resources, which do not obey municipal and county boundaries. The Highlands Council should draw on the experience of those who came before to develop its Highlands Plan.

The Council is now holding regular public meetings and subcommittee meetings in each of the seven Highlands counties and is to be applauded for bringing Highlands residents, local governments and members of the public into the planning process.

Their job is not easy, as the Highlands Act is a complex law, requiring much expertise and effort. To address this complexity, technical and policy experts are working with the Council in 18 different issue

In an open and interactive process, the Council's Natural Resources Committee and staff thoroughly analyzed the NJ Department of Environmental Protection's (DEP) new Highlands Rules. The DEP rules must support and complement the master plan, and the Council is working to make that happen.

The Council has released several fact sheets that can be accessed at www.highlands.state.nj.us. "Highlands Act Exemptions to Single Family Dwellings" addresses one of the most frequently asked questions. Highlands Council Chairman John Weingart observed, "Homeowners should be aware that, in most cases, they can improve and expand their residences without any kind of special Highlands approval.

'Farming and the Highlands Act" details agricultural use and development exclusions from regulation. Agricultural structures that would increase impervious cover by three percent or more of the farm's total land area must be reviewed and approved.

As with any new law, misinformation has abounded. One claim is that the Highlands Act will cause unwanted growth in the Planning Area. Weingart noted, "The Highlands Act is not a mandate for growth in the Planning Area; rather, it is a valuable tool to better manage future growth." (See "Scoping the Highlands Regional Master Plan" on the Council's website.)
