Cops: Student was sexually assaulted at Westfield High School

Suspect, a man between ages 30 and 40, wielded a knife

WESTFIELD — A ninth grade student at Westfield High School was the victim of an alleged sexual assault that occurred at the school building some time in late September, police announced this week.

The incident took place in the men's bathroom next to the main parking lot at Westfield High School at approximately 11 a.m. during regular school hours, according to Chief John Parizeau.

The Westfield Police Department is seeking help finding the suspect, described as a man between the ages of 30 and 40 years old, who authorities said was armed with a switchblade when he reportedly had criminal sexual contact with the student.

Local police were only made aware of the incident this past weekend, when the victim told his parents what happened.

Police said the suspect is

described as having olive-toned skin, and is possibly Hispanic, with black, straight, short hair and a black goatee with some gray in it. He was also described as wearing dirty blue jeans and a dark green pocket tee-shirt and may have had a college or high school ring on his hand.

The suspect was described as skinny but physically fit, and he spoke clear English, authorities said in a released statement.

The Westfield Police Department said it has been in contact with school administrators about this report, though the school district's top official said he had little information about the case.

Reached by telephone Tuesday, Superintendent William Foley said, "This is a complete surprise to us. We don't know anything about it. This is a police matter."

Foley said he had just been informed of the incident and had been trying to contact interim Westfield High

School Principal Dennis Fyffe, who is away on vacation over the holiday recess.

At an Oct. 17 public meeting of the Board of Education, Foley had suggested adopting enhanced security measures at some schools in the district, even though the level of violence and vandalism had remained relatively low in the 2005-2006 school year. Among the measures discussed were electronic entry systems and school staff identification cards.

Ferguson's respite care bill signed into law

WASHINGTON — It's been a whirlwind month for legislation written by Rep. Mike Ferguson, R-Seventh District, to help family caregivers who provide daily care to loved ones with disabilities or chronic conditions. Two weeks after the proposal won congressional approval, President Bush on Dec. 21 signed the bill into law.

Ferguson's "Lifespan Respite Care Act," which won unanimous House and Senate approval earlier this month, authorizes \$289 million during the next five years for states to train volunteers and provide respite services to an estimated 50 million families, including 900,000 New Jersey residents, who are caring at home for adults and children with special needs.

Bush signed the bill into law during an Oval Office ceremony attended by Ferguson; Eric Joice, executive director of the Epilepsy Foundation of New Jersey and the head of the New Jersey Lifespan Respite Coalition; and Jill Kagen, executive director of the National Respite Coalition, which represents

Activists call for soldiers' safe return

State, federal officials join Scotch Plains rally

SCOTCH PLAINS — On Dec. 20, the sixth night of Hanukkah, local residents, elected officials, and leaders of Jewish organizations in the community and across the state held a press conference to shed light on the plight of Gilad Shalit, Ehud "Udi" Goldwasser, and Eldad Regev, Israeli soldiers who were abducted during last summer's war in northern Israel, and who are still being held by Hezbollah and Hamas forces.

Shalit, a 20-year old Galilee resident, was the first to be kidnapped during a Hamas ambush inside Israel in June. Two weeks later, during an attack in northern Israel, the radical Islamic group Hezbollah wounded and abducted Goldwasser, a 31-year-old environmental engineer, and Regev, a 26-year-old law student. Neither the International Red Cross nor any other official diplomatic body has been able to contact the three men, officials present at the rally said.

Those in attendance at the Jewish Federation of Central New Jersey's (JFCNJ) headquarters on Martine Avenue wanted to ensure that the international vigil for Shalit, Goldwasser, and Regev did not burn out during the Jewish "Festival of Lights." Speakers at the event, titled "They Shall Return," sought to ignite political action among local residents, to seek news of the whereabouts of the missing Israelis, and to demand their swift return.

Each speaker personalized the individual stories of the soldiers. In a poignant moment during a live teleconference from Israel, Karnit Goldwasser, Ehud's wife, said it has been very difficult for her to spend the holiday without her husband. "You know you have the ability to do things for them," Goldwasser urged. "To raise your voice and bring them home — home under United Nations Security Council Resolution 1701"

Although the connection with Goldwasser was less than clear at times, Congressman Mike Ferguson (R-Seventh District), one of the guest speakers, said, (Continued on page A-2)

In local towns, year was marked by new arrivals, old debates

In Westfield, Scotch Plains and Fanwood, 2006 was a year filled with pitched debates and heated disputes over some familiar topics — taxes, development, union contracts and political appointments. It was a year in which many newcomers to local office were welcomed, and other said farewell. And it was a year that will be remembered for some unusual criminal activity, as well as an especially ugly election campaign. And it was a year that saw the beginning of some story lines whose conclusions haven't yet been written. What follows is a look back on the year that was.

January: The Westfield Town Council rang in the New Year with pomp, circumstance, and plenty of controversy, as many new faces were welcomed at the re-organization meeting. Incumbent Sal Caruana and newcomers Republican Vicki Kimmins and lone Democrats Dave Haas, and Tom Bigosinski were sworn in as the winners of the November elections. Mayor Andy Skibitsky also took the oath of the office after being elected to his first four-year term. The festivities continued with the new chief of police, John Parizeau, taking the oath of office to replace Bernard Tracy.

Bigosinski's narrow win became one

of the issues that got the council off to a rocky start. After more than a month of uncertainty, Bigosinski was able to claim victory and his seat on the council by one vote — 1,469 to 1,468 over Republican Eric Leuthold.

A dispute over political appointments divided the council along party lines; the issue, particularly regarding the pay of attorney Robert Cockren, would resurface periodically throughout the year.

Also in Westfield, the Town Council was poised to repeal the downtown redevelopment plan, despite (or perhaps, because of) the findings of the Code Review and Town Property Committee that such a move would only make it more difficult for future councils to revive the redevelopment proposal. And in a running feud that still hasn't been resolved, an investigation began into an altercation between former Chief Tracy and Police Officer Gregory Kasko at police headquarters.

In Scotch Plains, the mood was somber as Mayor Martin Marks looked back at a tragedy-filled year in hopes of a happier one in 2006. Atop the mayor's priorities were much-needed improvements to several municipal facilities including town hall, the Department of Public Works building, and the library.

Marks also said he hoped to make progress toward a senior citizen/community center, and added that work on local athletic fields would be a top priority.

Later in the month, parents and coaches urged the Scotch Plains-Fanwood Board of Education to follow the example of neighboring communities and opt for turf fields at Perry Tyson Field and the surrounding athletic complex. As the year came to an end, the board was considering a public referendum for such a project, but hadn't yet made a final decision.

Also in Scotch Plains, the Board of Adjustment approved Robert Wood Johnson's application for a "fitness and wellness center" at 2120 Lamberts Mill Road. Following a lengthy renovation of the building, the center is expected to open shortly.

In Fanwood, in what Mayor Colleen Mahr called a historic moment, the Borough Council came under complete Democratic control as council members Bruce Walsh, returning to elected office after a hiatus, and newcomer Joan Wheeler were sworn in at the re-organization meeting. Continued emphasis on downtown redevelopment, improving parks and streets, working to control McMansions and adding to the cultural and historic nature of the community were Mahr's top goals for the year.

Also, a federal grand jury indicted 21-year old Fanwood resident Raj Mukherji on charges of impersonating an agent of the U.S. Defense Intelligence Agency almost two months after a Middlesex (Continued on page A-10)

more than 70 national advocacy groups for the chronically ill, disabled and the aging.

Respite care gives primary caregivers the ability to find temporary relief from caregiving — time to prepare meals, run errands or simply to take a break.

Ferguson praised Joice and Kagen for their long-time support of his legislation.

"Without the strong backing of Eric, Jill and countless patient advocacy groups, this legislation would just be another good idea — but because of them, this legislation is now law of the land," Ferguson said after the White House ceremony. "This important law not only recognizes the selfless sacrifices made by millions of family caregivers, but also sends them an important message — help is on the way."

The law will help coordinate various respite care programs, and states can apply to the federal Department of Health and Human Services for grants to establish respite care programs that will directly benefit family caregivers. The law authorizes federal funding, and Congress must approve annual appropriations for the program.

Ferguson said he gained firsthand experience with respite care when his father, Tom, cared for his mother, Roberta, during her six-year battle with multiple myeloma. (Continued on page A-2)

"What is not lost is the tone of your (Goldwasser's) voice. There are so many here, many, many miles away that stand in solidarity with you."

"Our deepest thoughts and prayers go out to Gilad, Ehud, and Eldad," said Ferguson, who added that Israel is one of the United States' "strongest and dearest allies."

According to JFCNJ officials, while the war in northern Israel stopped months ago, the effects from the violence are still being felt.

"The festival of lights is a time of hope," said Congressman Rush Holt (D-12th District). "To be a realist in Israel, you must believe in miracles."

Some of the most passionate pleas for justice came from budding activists Adi Segal, a senior, and Shayna Schor, a freshman at the Solomon Schechter Day School in West Orange. They

were among four students who spoke to the audience about the need to raise awareness about Shalit, Goldwasser and Regev's captivity. "I am grateful to be a part of this community that cares about its connection to Israel," Segal said.

An action packet, including blue awareness bracelets, a post-card writing campaign to be sent to President George Bush, posters, and a downloadable PowerPoint presentation were distributed at the event. Organizers are hoping to generate one

million signatures for presentation in meetings with key government and U.N. officials.

Police ask for assistance with snow removal

(Continued from page A-1) Roberta Ferguson died in 2003.

Ferguson said he and his siblings and other relatives were able to give his father a respite from care-giving but that other families do not enjoy a similar family support structure to enable the primary family caregiver to take a break.

Joice's coalition represents a statewide group of New Jersey advocacy organizations that provide respite service for the disabled, chronically ill and the aging. Nearly 100 national, state and local advocacy groups endorsed the bill as it moved through Congress, including the AARP, Alzheimer's Association, Epilepsy

Foundation, National Multiple Sclerosis Society, Paralyzed Veterans of America, The Arc of the United States and United Cerebral Palsy.

"For years, family advocacy groups across the country have been pushing for this important law to deliver relief to millions of family caregivers," Joice said. "Congressman Ferguson's steadfast efforts and persistence is a huge win for family caregivers, and his own personal family experience helped him push this bill over

the finish line, and we cannot thank him enough for making this a reality."

Ferguson said the law may save taxpayers' money because studies have shown that respite care can delay or in some cases avoid more expensive long-term care solutions such as those provided by nursing homes.

The law enjoyed bipartisan support in Congress with Rep. Jim Langevin, D-R.I., supporting the House version and Sen. Hillary Clinton, D-N.Y., the chief sponsor in the Senate.

Speaker to discuss history of Carnegie libraries

WESTFIELD — "Andrew Carnegie and the Creation of Public Libraries" will be the topic of Barbara Burton at the First Wednesday Luncheon of the Westfield Historical Society, scheduled for noon Jan. 3 at B.G. Fields Restaurant, 560 Springfield Ave.

Burton will relate how more than 100 years ago, steel magnate and philanthropist Andrew Carnegie began granting funds for public libraries around the world. More than half of the 3,500 libraries ultimately built with Carnegie money were in the United States, and 35 were in New Jersey.

In her presentation, Burton will discuss the grant program and how communities worked with the Carnegie Corporation to secure these funds. She will also provide updated information and photographs of these historic buildings, which are in varying architectural styles.

Located in 11 of New Jersey's 21 counties, some have been demolished, some are in adaptive re-use and some are still much as they were in the early part of the 20th century. Special emphasis will be placed on the history of the Westfield Public Library, which began with a Carnegie grant in 1906.

A Westfield resident, Burton is a member of both the Westfield Historic Preservation Commission and the Museum and Archives Committee of the Westfield Historical Society. She is the program chairperson for the Society's evening programs, which are held once a month, usually on a Friday evening.

Burton is also the librarian for the Westfield Presbyterian Church and a member of the Special Libraries Association and the Church and Synagogue Library Association. She was also elected to Beta Phi Mu, the International Library and Information Studies Honor Society.

Burton authored "Connecting Users with their Information" for *Business Information Review* in December 2005. Her essay, "Westfield Votes for a Library," won honorable mention in the *Westfield*

A diet plan that's not even half-baked

The following column was written by Ellen Dooley, editor of the Suburban News, another member of the NJN Publishing family. It first appeared in the Dec. 20 edition of the Suburban News. Asked if she is still maintaining her "raw vegan lifestyle," the author said, "I don't know how to answer that."

I decided to embark on a raw vegan lifestyle the other day.

When I announced my intentions to my husband, he launched into a 20-minute routine that included terms such as "spelt" and "hemp," as well as slurs like "crackpot" and "cult." My husband is a funny, patient man. By the middle of the first day of my new, raw vegan lifestyle, he was clutching his head in his hands and muttering things like "confused" and "just need time to adjust."

My teenager showed up with his girlfriend on the morning of my first raw, vegan day while I was preparing my breakfast of green apple, nuts and seeds. I couldn't wait to share my new adventure with them. "I'm adopting a new, raw vegan lifestyle," I said, probably with more enthusiasm than is tolerable first thing in the morning.

My son stared at me for a few moments. "Mom," he said. "Stop. You're weird enough." His girlfriend just smiled sweetly. She is a very nice person.

When I got to work, I told the two members of my staff who were present about my new lifestyle. My assistant editor groaned. "Oh, for God's sake," she said, peering disdainfully at my bag of raw carrots. My other staff member said nothing. I think she grunted supportively. She was suffering from a flare-up of TMJ and a birthday. (Get to a certain age and birthdays can feel like flare-ups.)

When my husband told a friend, who is invited to Christmas dinner at our house, about my new, raw

vegan lifestyle, she cried, "Oh, my God! What am I going to eat?" as visions of sugarplums danced right out of her head. "Why is she doing this?"

I sent my 6-year-old to ask my mother if she had any Clorox. (I needed a 1/2 teaspoon to make the fruit and veggie bath that kills the cooties and draws

out the pesticides on the produce.) The conversation between the two of them was hilarious even before I heard my mother ask, "What does she need it for?" To which my son replied, "She's making something with apples, lettuce and a cucumber."

But my mother never samples anything I make ever again.

I told fellow parishioners at church on Sunday morning during an especially festive coffee hour. One woman squinted at me as though I had decided to embrace cannibalism. "The week before Christmas?" she asked. Another woman simply nodded and murmured, "That's nice," and went back to arranging the goodies.

I went to a cocktail party and declined the hors d'oeuvres, mentioning, quite casually, that I was eating only raw things. This, finally, elicited the *ooohs* and *aaahs* and discussions of detoxification and discipline I'd been waiting for.

"How does it make you feel?" someone asked.

I thought about that for a minute. "Hungry," I said. "I spend most of my time thinking about what I'm going to eat next."

I felt a little silly after that confession, but it was the truth and the truth shall set you free.

I thought about how much more dedicated to my raw vegan lifestyle I was when I was defending it. I thought about that as I ate the head off a chocolate reindeer that was neither raw nor vegan and, for the first time in a couple of days, I wasn't thinking about what I was going to eat next.

Kean slams Democrats' record on 'stealth taxes'

To The Record-Press:

The Senate on Dec. 14 approved a measure I sponsored that will repeal the tax on cosmetic surgery that was enacted in 2004. Democrat sponsors and supporters of the tax expected it to generate \$28 million in new annual revenue for the state; instead, its collections totaled \$7.7 million.

This botched tax epitomizes the Democrats' ugly record on taxes and spending. Democrats have raised taxes more than 90 times since 2002, while increasing state spending by 35 percent. Most of these increases were hidden taxes on important services — on phone and cable TV service, insurance premiums and home sales. These taxes did little to improve New Jersey's fiscal integrity; they simply drove up the cost of living and working in this state.

New Jersey is now the third highest taxed state in the nation. Repealing this punitive tax is a good start. We need to go further and roll back more of the stealth taxes that have been enacted over the past five years if we are going to restore New Jersey as an affordable and desirable place in which to live.

Since 2004, five states — Arkansas, Illinois, New York, Tennessee and Washington — have learned from New Jersey's mistake and rejected cosmetic surgery tax proposals. This legislation now heads to the Governor's desk to be signed into law.

Appezato honored for service to his adopted community

In Alameda, Calif., he was a 'mayor for everyone'

SCOTCH PLAINS — Ralph Appezato, a Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School graduate who was the mayor of Alameda, California from 1995 until his death in 2002, was recently honored as a dedicated and caring public servant by the island city on San Francisco Bay.

The avenue that is the entrance to Alameda Point was re-named the "Ralph Appezato Memorial Parkway." The former mayor was remembered for his leadership in the wake of the closing of the Alameda Naval Air Station. According to his supporters, Appezato laid the groundwork for the most successful community takeover and re-use of complex industrial, commercial, and residential property in California

and, possibly, in the nation.

At a time when the city was undergoing dramatic demographic and economic changes, he saw to it that at least 25 percent of new housing at the former air station was made affordable. In 1999, he formed the group "Alamedans Together Against Hate" to help Alameda respond to hate crimes against African Americans, Latinos, and gays.

He was esteemed as a mayor for everyone, and thousands of mourners attended a memorial service for him shortly after his death. His philosophy and motto in life was simple: "Just do the right thing."

After graduation from Scotch Plains High School,

Appezato received a bachelor's degree in business management at Seton Hall University. He was also a decorated Marine for 26 years, was a veteran of the Vietnam War, and retired as a full colonel with a master's degree in education earned while in charge of the Navy ROTC program at Villanova University.

Upon retiring in 1983, he and his wife Marilyn and their three sons, David, Jason, and Joshua, moved to Alameda. David and Joshua are currently serving as flight officers on active duty in the Navy. David, a commander, is currently with U.S. Pacific Command in Hawaii, while Joshua is an instructor at the Navy Fighter Weapons School in Fallon, Nev., also known as "Topgun."

Before becoming mayor, Appezato served for seven years as a vice president at Bank of America and then was chief operating officer of Volunteers of America, a non-profit organization serving inmates with children.

Appezato was praised by civic leaders as a public servant who had a knack for attracting new businesses, making Alameda a player in the high-tech revolution and for guiding Alameda through crucial economic and demographic changes. He is remembered as a quiet but powerful man of integrity who stood up for the underdog.

In Central Jersey and particularly Scotch Plains, where his roots are, Ralph Appezato's memory is cherished by his many relatives and friends.

Madrigal Singers offer a 'second chance at Christmas'

The Madrigal Singers, directed by Elaine Fiorino, will offer a "second chance at Christmas" in a concert to be presented at the First United Methodist Church, 1 East Broad Street in Westfield, at 4 p.m. Jan. 7. The date is the first Sunday of Epiphany, which honors the coming of the three Wise Men.

Guest flutists Jenny Cline and Susan Graham will join the singers on some of the choral pieces and perform "Four Duets on Christmas Carols" by New Jersey composer John Sichel, who sings bass with the group. Judy Sullivan will introduce the musical offerings with readings from the Bible and Shakespeare.

The program, "Sing We Nowell," celebrates the spirit and meaning of Christmas through seven centuries of choral music, from Gregorian chant and Renaissance polyphonic masterpieces to modern arrangements of traditional carols and texts.

A Gregorian chant on "Puer Natus" opens the concert and introduces a 15th-century setting of the joyful call, "Nowell: Owt of your slepe your slepe aryse and wake." Another early work, "Nova, nova: Ave fit ex Eva," rejoices in the coded message medieval Christians found by rearranging the letters of two words "Ave" and "Eva" in the Latin Bible, making "Ave" out of "Eva" and confirming with just three letters that salvation from the sin begun in the Garden of Eden with Eve's apple has come to mankind with Gabriel's "Hail (Ave), Mary" heralding the birth of the savior to a daughter of Eve (Eva).

Renaissance compositions by Palestrina ("Alma redemptoris") and Praetorius ("Ecce Maria") also focus on Mary, while Victoria's "O magnum mysteri-

um" meditates on the manger scene. In Sally De Ford's contemporary women's trio "When Mary sang her lullaby" and in Johann Walter's 16th-century "Joseph, lieber Joseph mein," Mary and Joseph sing a lullaby to the newborn babe. Jacob Handl's "Ab Oriente venerunt Magi" tells of the Wise Men's visit, and "Ehre sei Gott" from Heinrich Schütz's Weihnachtshistorie is a glorious setting for six voices and flutes of the angel chorus. The celebration will continue with Tullio Visioli's "Puer natus in Bethlehem" (A child is born in Bethlehem), Healey Willan's "Hodie, Christus natus est" (Christ is born today), and Hawley Ades's, "Gaudete" (Rejoice).

Modern carol arrangements look beyond the stable to the

wintery weather in the Catalan carol "Cold December's winds were stilled" and in Gustav Holst's setting of Christina Rossetti's poem, "In the bleak midwinter"; and to the needs of the world Jesus came to save in the Welsh carol "All poor men and humble" and the Appalachian carol "I wonder as I wander."

County grand jury indicted him on charges he stalked two women. Mukherji is a local businessman and was a partner in one of the borough's downtown redevelopment projects, though his role in that project has been reduced.

February: In Scotch Plains, cops collared Adewale Idowu, 61, of Plainfield after he crashed into two cars at Crossway Place during a high speed chase through Westfield, Scotch Plains, and Mountainside and on Route 22 — causing numerous rear-end accidents along the way. Idowu was charged with aggravated assault, eluding and resisting arrest among other charges.

Union County took a stop-gap measure to help Scotch Plains remedy longstanding deer overpopulation problems in Ash Brook Reservation. The county allowed a wildlife management company to begin culling deer from the county parkland.

In Westfield, an Asbury Park man was arrested by the FBI on charges he mailed about 200 fake anthrax letters in 2005, including one intercepted at the Westfield Post Office addressed to the infamous murderer John List.

In another high-profile crime, more than \$20,000 in collection money was stolen from St. Helen's Roman Catholic Church.

In Scotch Plains, a review of the proposed Green Meadows Farm at the former Ponderosa site on Cooper Road was halted when the fire chief shut down a Planning Board meeting, citing a safety hazard as more than 400 residents turned out to oppose the project. County officials later abandoned the plans after deciding the proposal was not the best fit for the community.

In Westfield, Detective Sandy Chambers returned to work on Feb. 21 after a 15-day suspension without pay, bringing to an end a disciplinary process that included several public hearings. Chambers faced termination for allegedly fixing her son's parking ticket in February 2005; she was found guilty on five to seven charges for the incident and for lying during an internal investigation.

In Scotch Plains, about 300 teachers from the district showed up for a "Unity Rally" at Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School picketing for a new contract.

March: In Scotch Plains, State Police determined that a Gatorade bottle containing cleaning fluid had been accidentally placed in a cafeteria cooler. The fluid caused minor burns to a Park Middle School sixth grader who had purchased it the bottle at the school.

On March 11, 21-year old Clark resident Mark Costa, was killed in a car crash on the Martine Avenue extension in Scotch Plains. The driver, Edward Hamilton, 20, also of Clark was arrested one month later after lab results indicated he was "under the influence of illegal narcotics" when the accident occurred.

In addition, the Scotch Plains Township Council introduced an ordinance for \$3.86 million in repairs and expansions at the municipal building.

After 26 years in the post, Robert Petix announced he would retire as Westfield High School principal at the end of the year. Petix has been replaced on an interim basis by Dennis Fyffe.

Also in Westfield, the Town Council settled its dispute with Newpointe Realty and endorsed a plan for the construction of 42 residential units at the intersection of New and South Elmer streets. At year's end, final details for the project had yet to be established.

In Fanwood, patrolman Brian Bartiromo was suspended without pay following separate claims by two women that he improperly touched them, according to law enforcement officials.

April: In the annual school board elections, voters approved the proposed budgets in both Scotch Plains-Fanwood and Westfield. The Scotch Plains-Fanwood budget, designed to accommodate growing enrollment, was approved by more than 400 votes, and incumbents Linda Nelson, Trip Whitehouse, and Betty Anne Woerner were re-elected to new three-year terms, while incumbent Thomas Russo was elected to a one-year term created by the resignation of Lance Porter. With state aid remaining flat, the tax impact for the average home in Scotch Plains increased 5.25 percent, or \$306. In Fanwood, the average increased 5.54 percent, or \$279.

In Westfield, in an election marked by the highest voter turnout in years, residents approved the \$68.2 million school budget by a large margin, raising the school portion by 3.85 percent. Incumbents Anne Riegel and Beth Cassie were voted in for three-year terms on the school board, along with newcomer Jane Clancy.

Also in Westfield, a rumor that a shooting would occur at Westfield High School swept through the student population over spring break, but was dispelled after an investigation by the police department.

In Fanwood, the Planning Board approved a new plan for the 1.1 acre Dean Oil Site, which calls for the construction of 24 townhouses with retail stores below.

May: In Westfield, the Town Council approved the \$33.9 million 2006 municipal budget, raising that portion of the property tax bill by about \$145 on the average home.

Councilman Tom Bigosinski voted against the budget, saying he believed a reduction in the legal services budget would save the town a significant amount of money.

Also this month, the Westfield Planning Board recommended that the town revisit its strategies for dealing with overdevelopment, after a draft proposal faced opposition from many local residents and builders.

June: Despite the objections of more than 100 angry residents, Board of Education members sided with Superintendent William Foley's decision to switch principals between Wilson and Washington elementary schools.

And in Scotch Plains, by a 4-1 vote, the

Also in Westfield, state Commissioner of Education Lucille Davey ordered the local school board to renew Union County Educational Service Commission's (UCESC) lease of the Lincoln School building for the 2006-07 school year. Following a series of incidents that required response by local police, residents had come out to voice concerns that the alternative program, Hillcrest Academy South, poses a threat to the neighborhood. The ruling also indicated that UCESC should make diligent efforts to relocate the program for the 2007-08 school year.

In a move to close a controversial and very public land use debate, the Scotch Plains

to build a 150-ft wireless communications tower at the south side firehouse.

And the Yankees' famous closer Mariano Rivera came to downtown for a double-header — he checked out the Rock'n Joe Coffeehouse and Bistro owned by his friends and helped to raise \$5,500 for autism research.

On Election Day, Scotch Plains voters split their ballots in the Township Council election, but the final outcome was a clear victory for Democrats, as Kevin Glover and Jeff Strauss nabbed two of the three three-year seats up for grabs. Republican incumbent Nancy Malool held on to the third spot as her running mates, incumbent Carolyn Sorge and newcomer Rich

Duthie, were defeated. Republicans still hold a 3-2 majority on the council. Democratic challenger Neal LeStrange, a former township police officer, came in last after a nasty campaign in which some critics portrayed him as a racist; LeStrange denied the allegations.

In Fanwood, Democrats maintained their grip on local government by defeating Republicans in a tightly-contested election for two three-year seats on the Borough Council. Democrat incumbent Donna Dolce was the top vote-getter and her running mate, newcomer David Valian, received just enough votes to squeak by Republican Andy MacDonald. Republican Rich Alber finished fourth. Incumbent Democratic Councilman Jack Molenaar did not run for re-election.

December: In all three communities, school officials breathed a sigh of relief after a pack of education reforms that moved through the state Assembly with alacrity slowed to a standstill in the Senate. The proposed legislation included one bill that would create a powerful "super" superintendent, a second bill that would establish a pilot program eliminating local districts in favor of county-wide districts, and a third that would have created various new accountability measures for local districts.

The Westfield Board of Education voted unanimously to extend the term of interim Westfield High School

Principal Dennis Fyffe through the 2007-08 school year, while the board continues its search for a permanent replacement.

Also in Westfield, members of the Town Council continued to quarrel over the pay of town attorney Bob Cockren and the implications of a survey detailing the legal salaries in Westfield and a number of neighboring communities.

In Scotch Plains, the fire department's top officials told members of the Township Council the two local fire stations are sorely in need of repairs that could cost nearly half a million dollars. "Thank God we have people in the department who know how to fix things. You can only apply Band-Aids for so long," said battalion chief Michael Cuccurullo.

And township officials responded with concern to news that DPW director Charles Cerami was under indictment in Hunterdon County, where he had held a similar position before coming to Scotch Plains.

Finally, officials in both Scotch Plains and Fanwood approved grant applications to fund a study exploring the feasibility of a merger of the municipal libraries.



At McKinley Elementary School in Westfield, teachers Kathy Cook, Joe Paradise and Alison Hooper joined the Halloween celebration by portraying the Lollipop Kids from "The Wizard of Oz."

Township Council approved a rezoning plan for the area known as the "hedge property" outside the municipal building on Park Avenue. The move put the township in a position to sell that land for development. Planning board members had previously voted by a 6-3 margin that rezoning the property was inconsistent with the township's master plan.

July: After 18 months of negotiations, picket lines, and frustration, the Scotch Plains-Fanwood school board and the local teacher's union agreed on a new three-year contract, bringing to an end a lengthy and public dispute.

In the conclusion to a remarkable story, township resident Michael Chemidlin, 57, who had been detained two months in Sierra Leone on conspiracy charges, was finally able to come home. News of Chemidlin's freedom came, fittingly, on the Fourth of July.

In a move to create additional park space in a region where available land is scarce, the Scotch Plains council purchased a piece of property on Richmond Street to be used to expand neighboring Jerseyland Park.

In Westfield, Mayor Andy Skibitsky announced the members of a new committee on overdevelopment, established in response to the Planning Board's recommendation in May. The 10-member committee was directed seek to "identify ways promote architecture that is sensitive to the character of our neighborhoods," according to Skibitsky.

August: A month of reaching agreement on a new teachers' contract, the Scotch Plains-Fanwood Board of Education made Assistant Superintendent Margaret Hayes its unanimous choice as head superintendent to fill the vacancy left by the retirement of Carol Choye. Hayes' contract extends to June 30, 2011, at an annual salary of \$175,000.

In Scotch Plains, members of an ad hoc committee made up of residents, township and county officials presented their unanimous recommendation for a mix of active and passive recreation facilities on the county-owned 23-acre Cooper Road property, moving in a new direction for the former Ponderosa site, which the county purchased for \$10 million in 2003.

In Fanwood, the Borough Council received \$350,000 in extraordinary state aid, the largest amount granted to any municipality in Union County. The aid was used to offset the increase in municipal property taxes to about 4.7 percent, or \$71 for the year for the average home.

September: An 82-year-old Westfield resident, Marie Schlieske, was killed while walking across North Avenue East between Central Avenue and Elmer Street when she was struck by a car traveling westbound on North Avenue.

After extensive debate at two earlier meetings, the Westfield Board of Education unanimously decided to submit plans to the Department of Education for a \$3.2 million renovation and expansion of Roosevelt Intermediate School, \$200,000 to replace windows at Edison Intermediate, and a \$6 million remodeling of Lincoln School to allow it to be used as a centralized kindergarten center. The \$9.4 million proposal will require approval by voters in a special referendum scheduled for Jan. 23.

Township Council agreed to purchase the privately-owned portion of the Cooper Road island for \$350,000, with money from the Open Space Trust Fund. The lot was placed in a conservation zone, making it off-limits to development.

October: Members of the Westfield Town Council responded with outrage to the news that some municipal fees would be subject to a 7 percent New Jersey state sales tax. The tax applies to commuter and some employee parking permits, pay stations at municipal parking lots and pool memberships.

Also in Westfield, the Mayor's Land Use Task Force held its first public meeting as the commission's leaders sought to outline for the public the group's approach to concerns about residential overdevelopment. In addition, the Recreation Commission's proposed Master Plan for renovations to Memorial Park came under sharp criticism from residents. The plans were sent back to the commission after receiving some pointed suggestions from the Town Council.

And members of the Westfield PBA came out in a coordinated show of force at a Town Council meeting to put pressure on the council to agree to a new contract. Police officers have been working

Also in October, the ex-wife of Funwood Memorial Library Director Daniel Weiss admitted in an Elizabeth courtroom that she has stabbed Weiss with an eight-inch steak knife in August 2005. The 55-year old Westfield realtor pleaded guilty to aggravated assault.

In brighter Fanwood news, the long-awaited revitalization of the borough's downtown was finally underway as two of the three sites slated for redevelopment held ground-breaking ceremonies. Business owners Renato Marcovecchio at the 222 South Ave. and Helen Ling at 234 South Ave. were joined by local officials, family and friends to celebrate the occasion. "The Cornerstone" and "The Station Mews," as the buildings will be named, are both mixed-used projects featuring condominiums on the top and commercial space on the ground floor.

November: After a lengthy negotiation process, the Westfield Town Council and the local Fireman's Mutual Benevolent Association (FMBA) finally agreed to a new five-year contract. The town was successful in adding several new steps to the salary guide so that it will now take firefighters an extra year to achieve maximum pay for the rank of lieutenant and captain.

Also in Westfield, local officials rejected Verizon's request

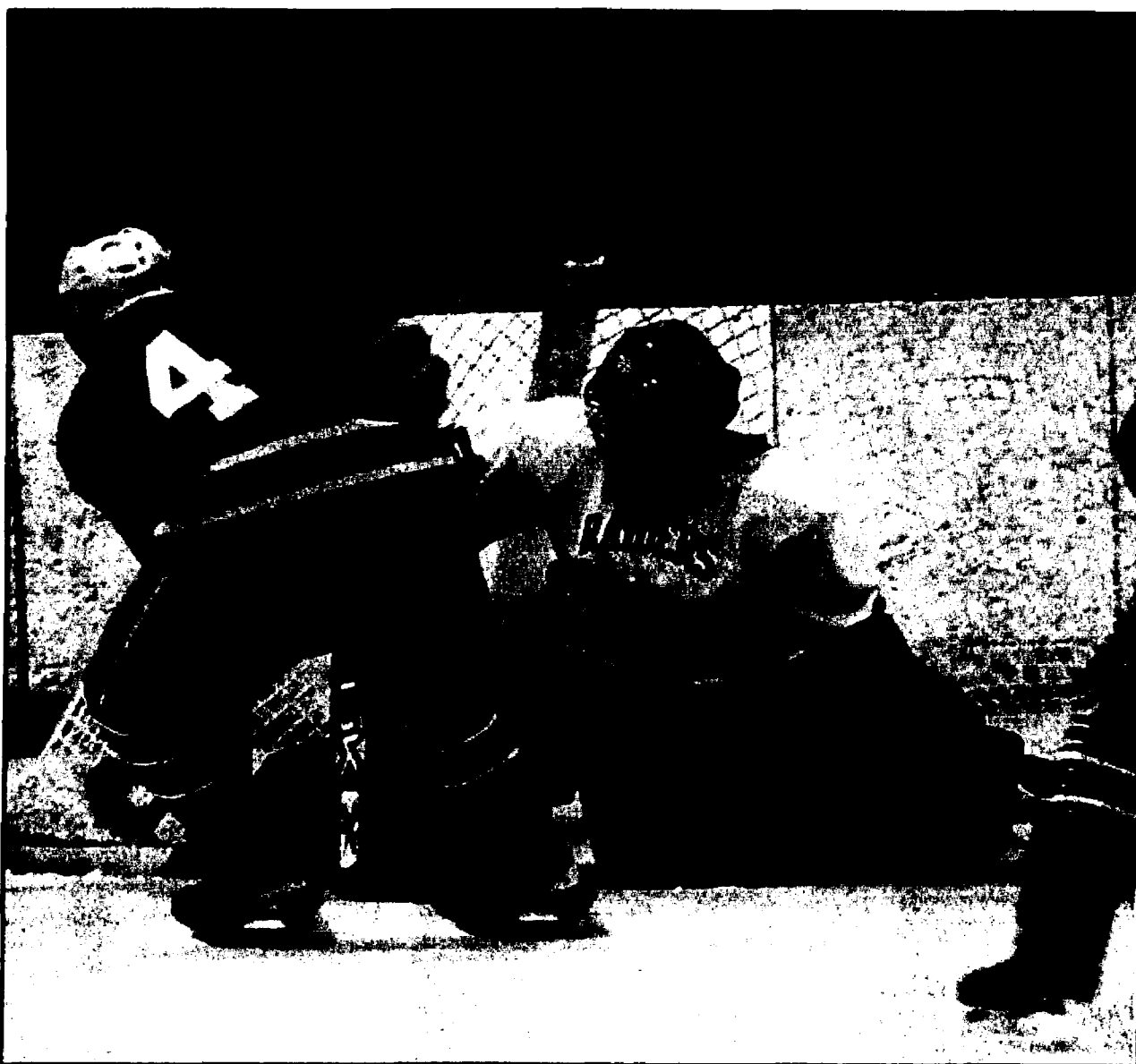

Union County Winter Golf Schedule

Golfers are known to take to the fairways whenever they can. Rain, heat and even snow do not deter the most dedicated "duffers." However, the change in season does bring

schedule adjustments to the three public golf courses operated by Union County.

"We seasonally alter our course hours according to the change in daylight hours," said Freeholder Chairman Alexander Mirabella. "But golfers should note that the Oak Ridge Golf Course in Clark and the nine-hole course at Galloping Hill in Kenilworth will be closed for the winter season. Each year we give some of our fairways a chance to rest. The closure will occur from Dec. 25 and continue until Mar. 3, weather permitting."

Eighteen regulation holes will continue to be available this winter at Ash Brook in Scotch Plains, and 18 of the 27 holes at Galloping Hill will be operational, weather permitting. Determination of playability will be made by the Supervising Greenskeeper of the course. Winter hours of operation at both courses (through Mar. 3) will be 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Golfers are reminded that even if they are not playing a round of golf during the winter, all of the County's clubhouses are open for identification card purchases and renewals.

"Beginning Jan. 1, golfers should renew their ID cards at one of our courses," explained Mirabella. "Early renewal will help avoid delays in the spring when everyone wants to take to the links."

All golf ID cards purchased in 2006 will be de-activated by the computerized photo ID system on Dec. 31. Golfers should keep these cards and bring them when renewing for 2007.

When purchasing a new card or renewing a 2006 card, golfers must show proof of Union County residency through two forms of identification: a driver's license and either a current lease, tax, utility or credit card bill, or a bank statement. Non-residents who own property in Union County may also purchase ID cards upon providing a current tax bill showing the address, lot and block number of the property. All ID card renewals or purchases must be done in person.
