TROLLEY COMMITTEE MEET.

Pierson's Amendment Adopted. Names of the Committee.

James T. Pierson's modification of Frank Bergen's plan for a county trolley road from Elizabeth to Plainfield was adopted by the committee of eleven Wednesday night in Elizabeth at their first meeting.

The modified plan proposes a 14 foot bicycle path, a 20 foot roadway which will include the present Telford pavement, and a 19 foot speedway.

The committee, appointed by Chairman Wm. T. West since the meeting of September 30, are John B. Dumont and De Witt C. Ivins of Plainfield, Frank W. Westcott of Fanwood, James T. Pierson of Westfield, Jasper C. Hunt of Cranford, Geo. W. Doty of Union, Albert B. Carlton, Louis Quin, and Alexander Kerr of Elizabeth, B. A. Vail of Rahway, and W. H. Coffey of Summit.

This committee, according to Bergen's resolution, in pursuance of which they were appointed, are to "formulate a plan in detail for widening Westfield avenue to 100 feet, and for the construction of a street railroad thereon, to procure an estimate of the probable cost of the improvement and the terms for which the proposed street railway might be leased, to draft a bill to authorize the work, and to report all these things at a meeting to be held in the Elizabeth court house on Thursday evening October 21."

The proposed county trolley road was written up for the New York Journal of Wednesday, which published the drawing furnished by Mr. Bergen which appeared in the Union county papers.

The bicycle path, is a new feature which will add immensely to the popularity of the scheme with people living along the line of the proposed road, and secure in advance the support of every rider, which number includes nearly every man, all the boys and a majority of the women and girls living in the towns reached.

At the meeting last Thursday the committee elected B. A. Vail of Rahway chairman and Louis Quin secretary, and appointed Quin, Pierson and Kerr a sub-committee to look over the line and arrange for detailed estimates of cost.
