Daughters of America Who Followed the Flag.

Very few people have the slightest conception of how many women entered the army in the war of the rebellion and carried muskers, tramped through marshes and over mountains, blyouacked on the plains and doiged rebel shot and shell in the forest during the years from 1861, to 1865. Mrs. Livermore says in "My Recollections of the War?"

"Some one has stated the number of women soldiers known to the service a little less than 400. It cannot wouch for the correctness of this estimate, but I am convinced that a larger number of women disguised themselves and collisted in the service for one cause or an other than was dreamed of. Intrenched in secreey and regarded as men, they were sometimes revenled as women by necident or ensually. Some startling histories of these millitary women were current in the gossip of army life, and extravagant and unreal as were many of the narrations one always felt that they and a foundation in fact."

One of the most successful instances of
woman's work in the war is a matter of
record in history and dyed deep with the
blood of the brave men who fell during
the Tennessee empalan. It was a woman who planned that campaign, Miss
Anna Ella Carroll of Maryland, a lineal
descendant of Charles Carroll of Carrollton. Miss Carroll was a woman of
splendid intellect, great culture and intensely loyal to the cause of the Union.
Sie wrote many articles about the causes
leading up to the rebellion and published
several pamphlets in which she discussed
the problem of war and its solution.
President Lincoln was so much impressed by her strong personality and sthorough knowledge of the situation that she
became one of his trusted advisers and
was admitted to his presence at all times.
Her letters to him, now among documents of state, had a special pigeonhole
on his dosk. A strategate of the rebellion as a woman was Mrs. Kady
Brownwell. She was the daughter of a
Scotchman, an officer in the British army,
and was born in the barracks at Caffarri,
Africa, where her father was stationed,
in 1842. While visiting in this country
she married a young man in Providence
named Robert S. Brownwell, Mr. Brown
well enlisted in the First Rhode Island

The First Rhode Island speedily made of 100 men each and had so many over that a "supplement" was formed of the "left overs" and called the "Carbineers" or "Sharpshooters," and Kady Brownwell, regularly cullsted, was made its colorbearee. Although well versed in the arts of English warfare, she set herself to learn all the "accomplishments" of an American soldier. She became a skillful shot with the earbine, and no one in the regiment was her equal at a slashing sabor stroke. She marched beside her husbers stroke. She marched beside her husbend, asking no favors because of her sex, carrying her flag and always wearing the acconterments o' a soldier.

The Nineteenth Illinois had a "daughter of the regiment" in the person of the wife of its colonel. Mine. Turchin, as she was always called, was the daughter of a Russian officer, and, like Kady Brownwell, was born in a foreign camp and grew up in the midst of war's alarms. She had been a great favorite with her father's command and was fond of army life, so, when her instand entered the army she was not displeased, but followed his fortunes and became as great a favorite in the American as in the Russian command. She was a woman of splendid physique and shandsome. She was most intensely loyal to the Union and would so to even greater length than her husband in her devotion to her adopted country.

Bridget Devins, better known to the boys perhaps, as "Fighting Biddy" or "Michigan Bridget," was with the First Michigan caralry, in which hade her a most acceptable companion at all times.
