TOWN COUNCIL'S SESSION.

APPLICATIONS FOR LICENSES ARE PRESENTED AND ACTION POSTPONED.

Samuel Godshalk Does Not Apply—Tax Budget Amended—To Print Town Ordinances—Changes in Committee Appointments Made.

The Town Council held a regular session Monday evening, and received the applications for licenses to keep hundred taverns, and to sell at wholesale, in this town. Those who applied merely for hotel licenses are Frank J. Selmer, Charles W. C. Beck and Joseph Sorpion. The latter is an Italian from Elizabeth who proposes, if his license is granted, to open a place on Central avenue in the Colliery neighborhood. Charles W. C. Beck's application is for the North Avenue Hotel, formerly run by P. J. Flanagan. Charles E. Bartis applies this year for both a retail and wholesale license, and Lawrence Powers for both retail and wholesale as heretofore granted him. Samuel Godshalk did not put in any application, but may possibly do so Monday night next. The applications were all referred to the excise committee of which A. J. Wilson is chairman, but were not reported back to the council during the evening. The hearings will probably be ordered advertised by the council at the next meeting.

Ordinances for sewers in Downer street and Osborne avenue were passed on final reading, and resolutions confirming certain improvement assessments were also passed.

The fire chief asked permission to remove a long table in the rear of the council room to the fire department house for the use of the firemen in their reading room there. The council gave the permission to do so.

The annual report of the recorder, W. B. Toney, was read, showing that \$255 had been collected during the year 1906 in fines. Chief of Police Thomas O'Neill reported two hundred and four arrests during the year for about twenty different classes of offenses which he enumerated in detail.

The council referred to the police committee the application of Constable A. D. Laurent for appointment on the police force. A number of Euclid avenue residents petitioned for four new lights in that section, and Addison H. Clark and others petitioned that Euclid avenue, between Broad street and Mountain avenue, be macadamized.

The free public library trustees presented their first annual report to the town council. It was read and it is printed in full in to-day's Standard.

The council decided to print five hundred copies of the town ordinances, but left it with the law committee to report as to whether they should first be re-passed in the form of a Revision before printing.

The town attorney and the assessor were given power to effect a settlement with the Central Railroad in the matter of a disputed assessment. The council authorized the property committee to purchase tools and supplies needed in road work, and to enter into a lease of the sower farm with Joseph Woodbury, of Rahway, upon the same terms as those upon which it is now leased.

Collector Clark submitted a number of certificates of tax sales which were referred to the attorney.

Mayor Alpers made a few changes in the list of committees previously appointed. Councilman Wilcox becomes chairman of the property committee in place of Councilman Floyd who takes Mr. Wilcox's place as chairman of the police committee. Councilman Scholme withdraws from the property committee and becomes a member of the police committee.

The council adjourned to next Monday night.

A NEW BANK FOR WESTFIELD.

Application to Organize Approved by the Comptroller at Washington—To Open for Business Soon.

Westfield learned this week that it is to have another banking institution here. The application to organize the People's National Bank of Westfield was approved last Friday by the Comptroller of the Currency at Washington. The new concern will have a capital of \$50,000, and a surplus of \$10,000, and expects to begin business in a few weeks. It is rumored that the Elston French building, corner of Broad and Elm Streets, where the Town Rooms are now located, has been purchased for the bank, but inquiry of those close to the new enterprise failed to-day to obtain any confirmation of the rumor. The incorporators are Charles W. McCutcheon, Orville P. Waring, Samuel Townsend, Charles A. Reed, and J. Herbert Cass, of Plainfield, and Dr. R. E. Sheclair, Edward T. Perino and H. L. Abrams, of Westfield.
