
Foreword

IN MEMORIAM

Miss J. Isabella Dodds was a well-known, well-loved teacher and friend whom no one will or can ever forget. Although mere printed words can never express the depths of our sympathy and sorrow, it is our sincere hope that this memorial to Miss Dodds will continue to honor and preserve her memory among us as the years pass.

The students and staff of Westfield Senior High will cherish through the years the memory of one who can never be replaced in the hearts of the


many who knew and loved her.




An interest in debate and a free evening are the two most important requirements for membership in the Forum Club, which meets in private homes once a month.







FOOTBALL


