WHHS Science

The Science Department offers students a glimpse into the wonders of nature by teaching the makeup of the atom, the structure of the earth, and even the laws that govern the universe as seen through the formal study of biology, chemistry, environmental science, earth science and physics. In the high school's new science wing, instruction incorporates many technologies such as the Smart Boards and laptops...as students are guided to the new and old truths. Data acquisition in science laboratory experiments includes the time-honored "wet lab techniques" but now sometimes the power of the computer and digital probes is added to the collection of lab data. Temperatures can be measured accurately even during rapid reactions—measuring temperature accurately many times per second! Data analysis software permits students to display data immediately in graphical form. Analysis tools allow students to measure slopes and areas and then to repeat experiments to try out new ideas or test hypotheses.

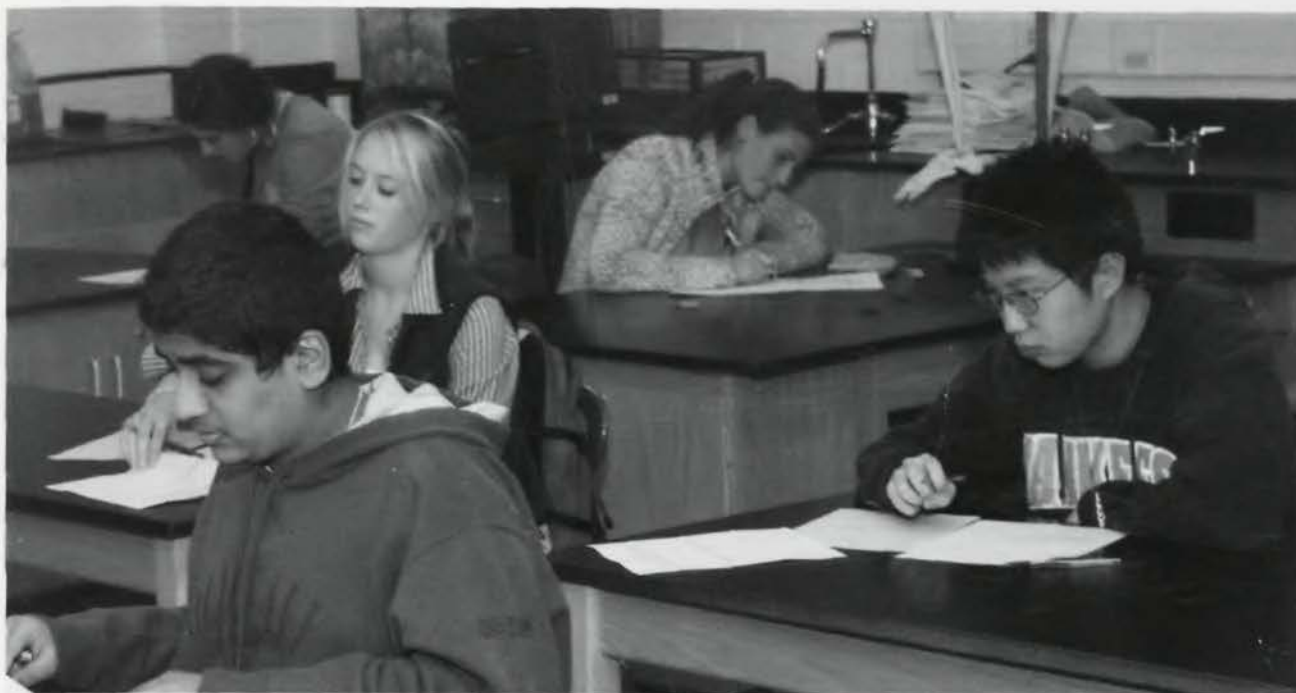

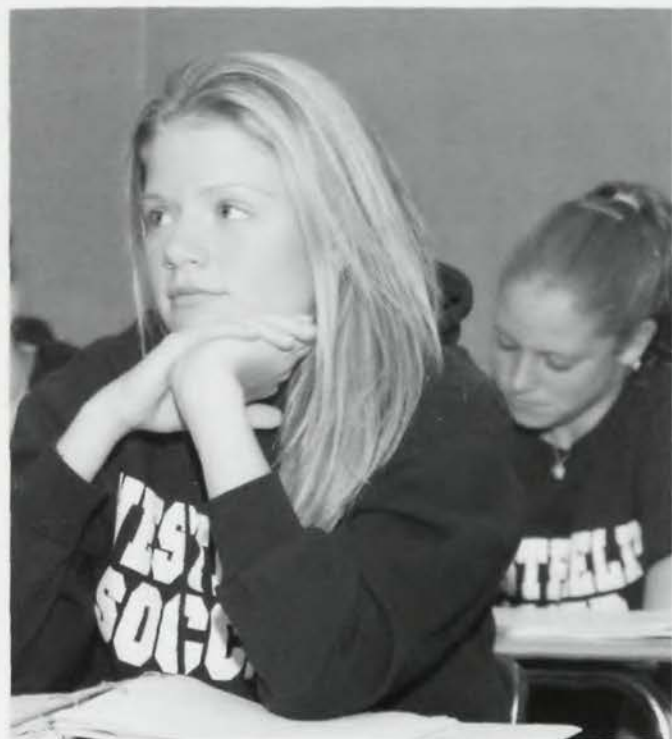

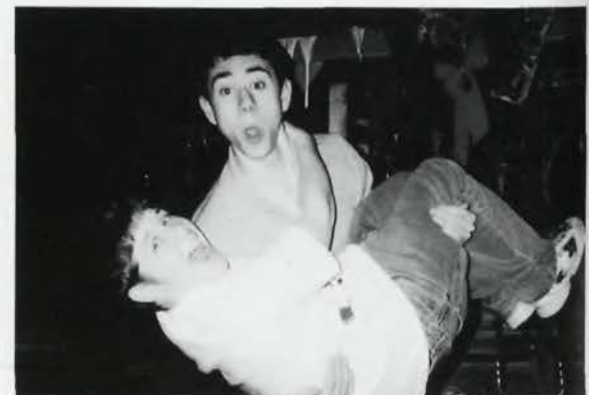

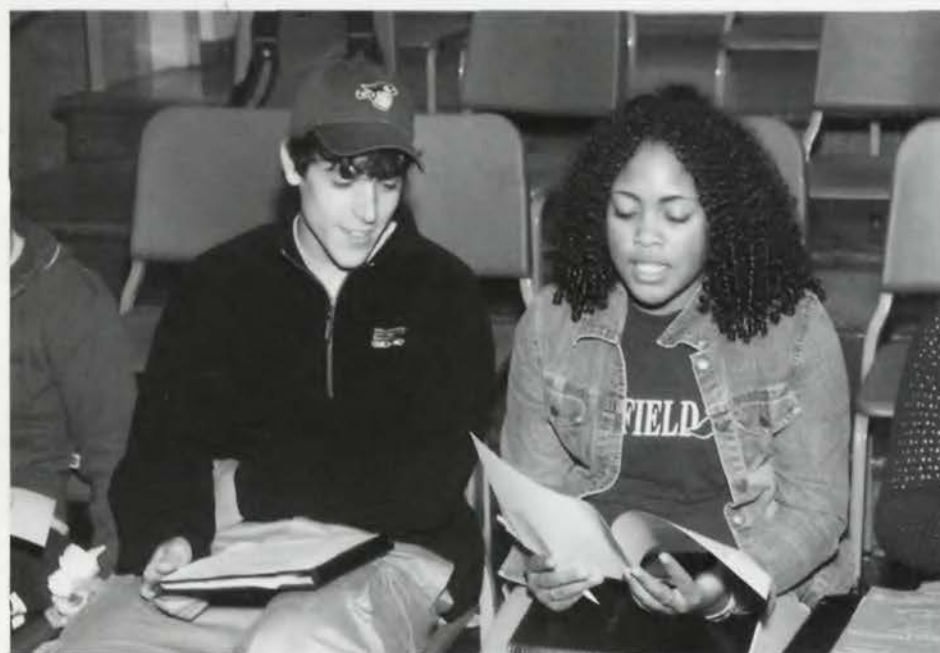

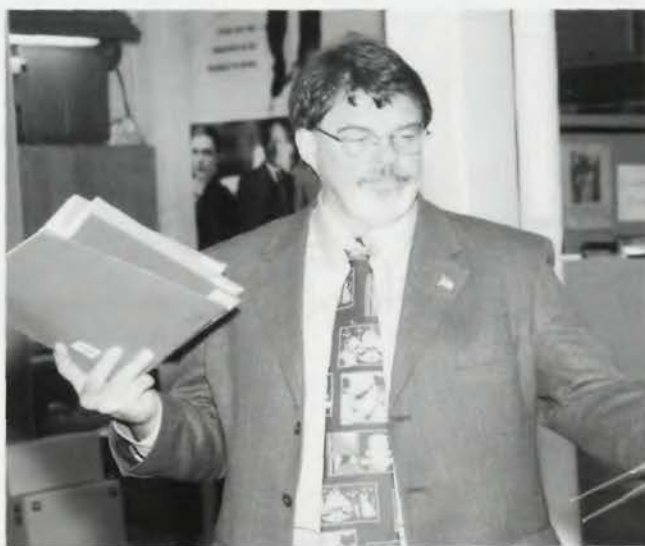

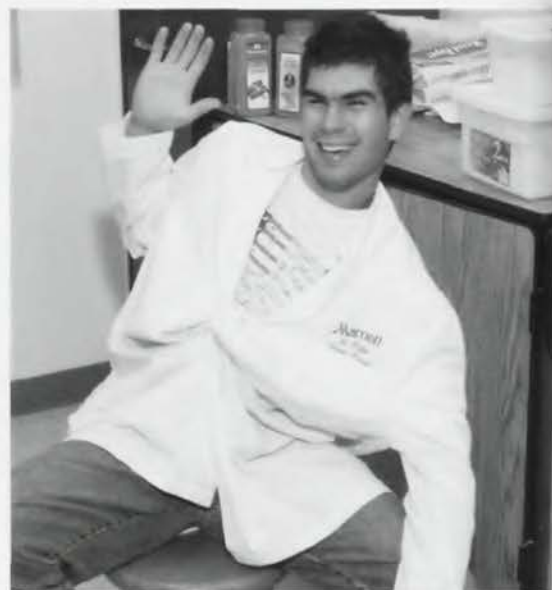

Political graffiti in WHS bathroom

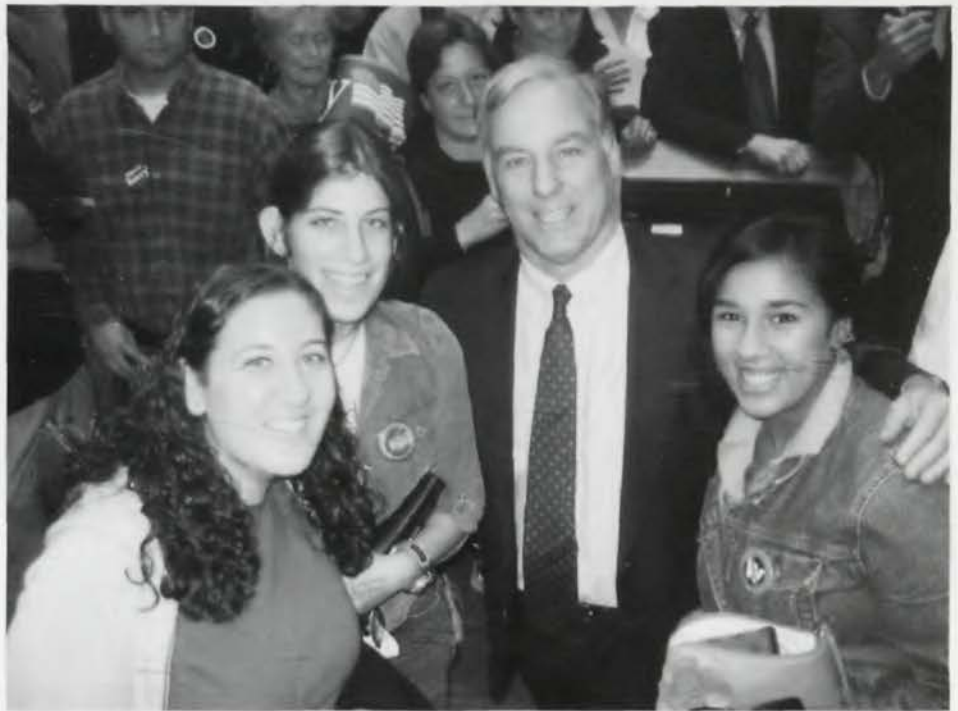

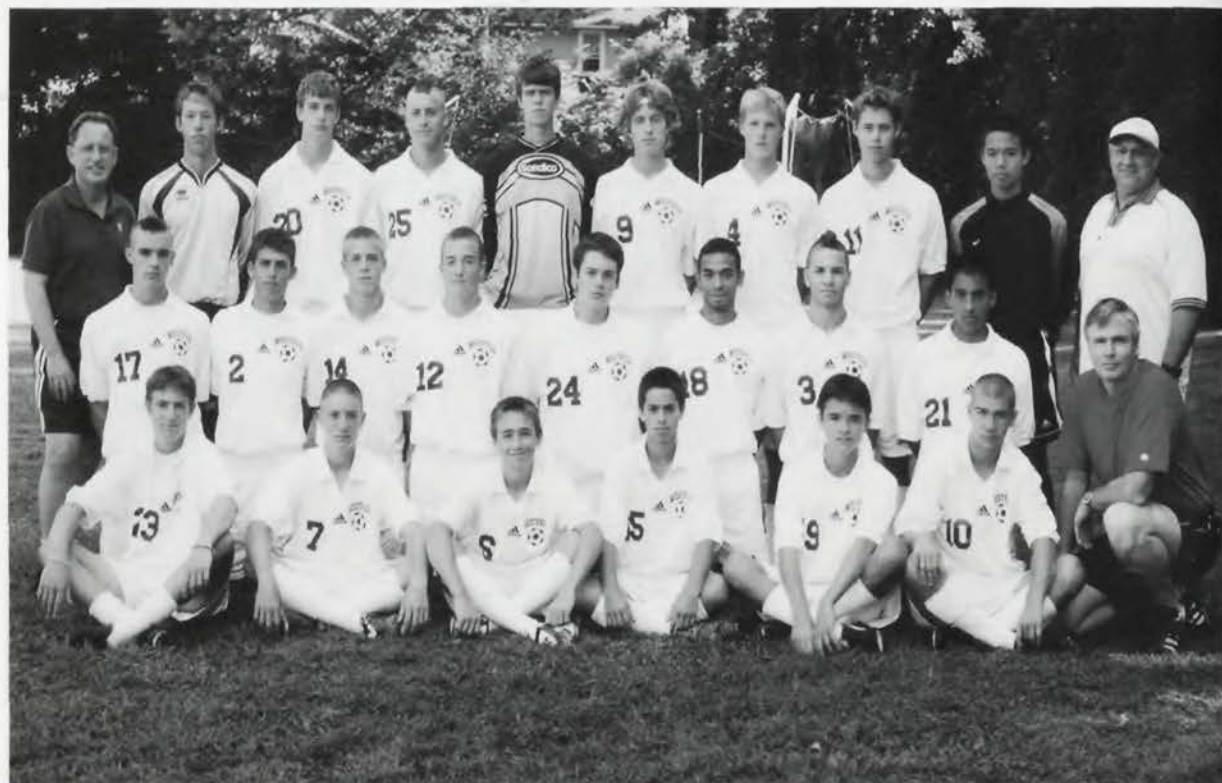

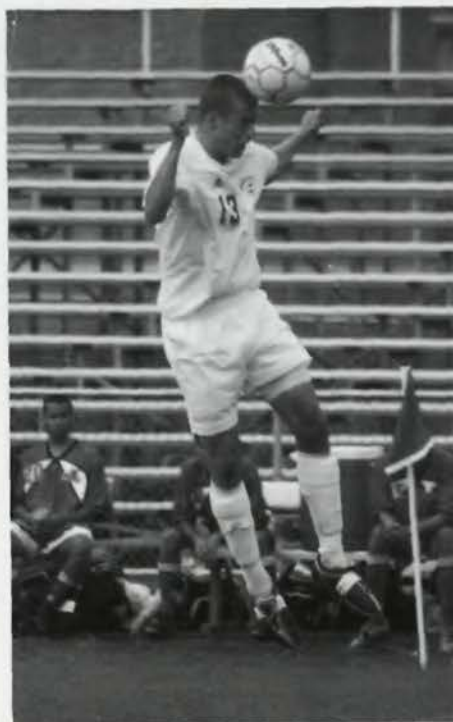

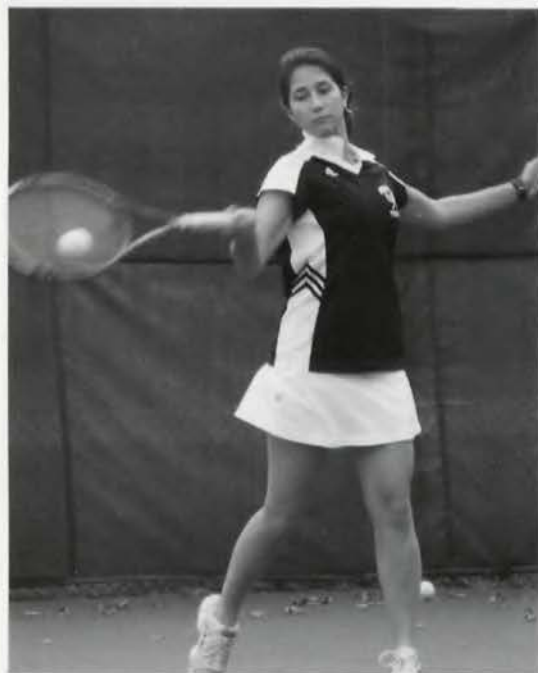
Girls Tennis

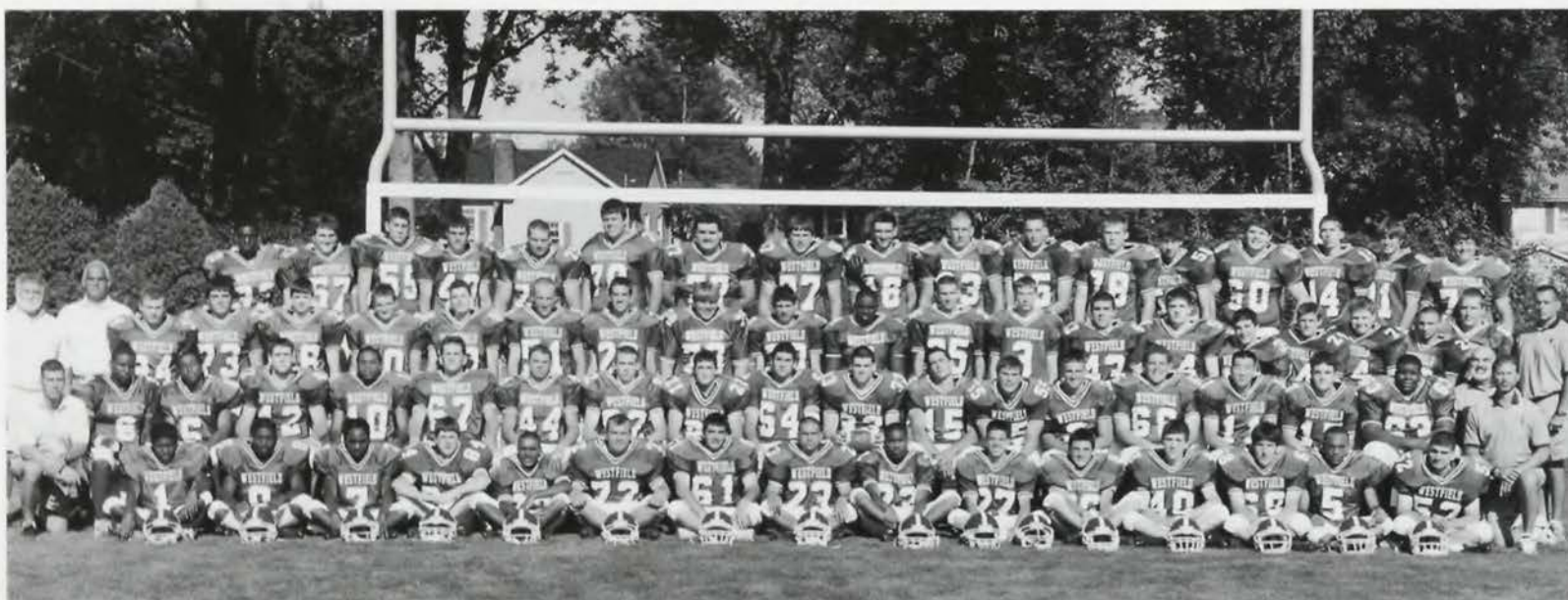

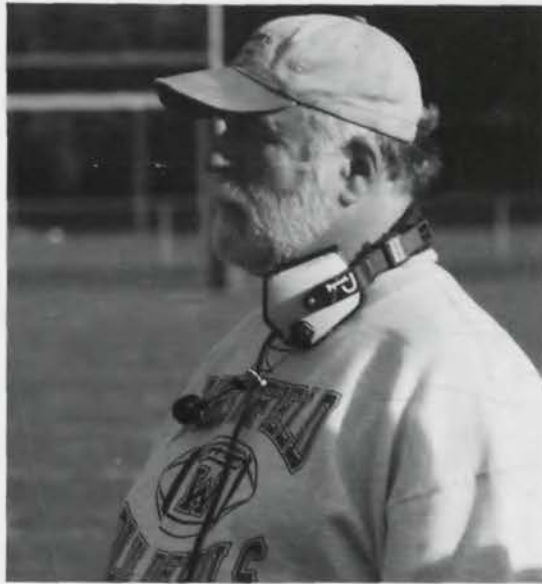

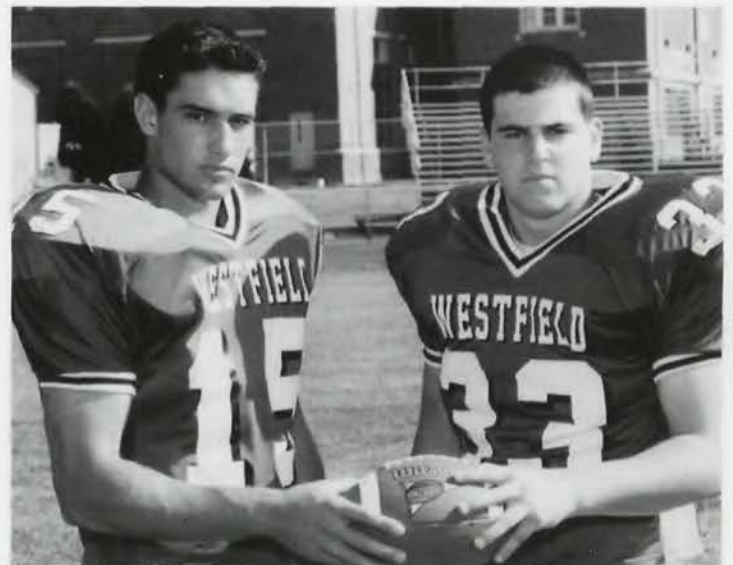

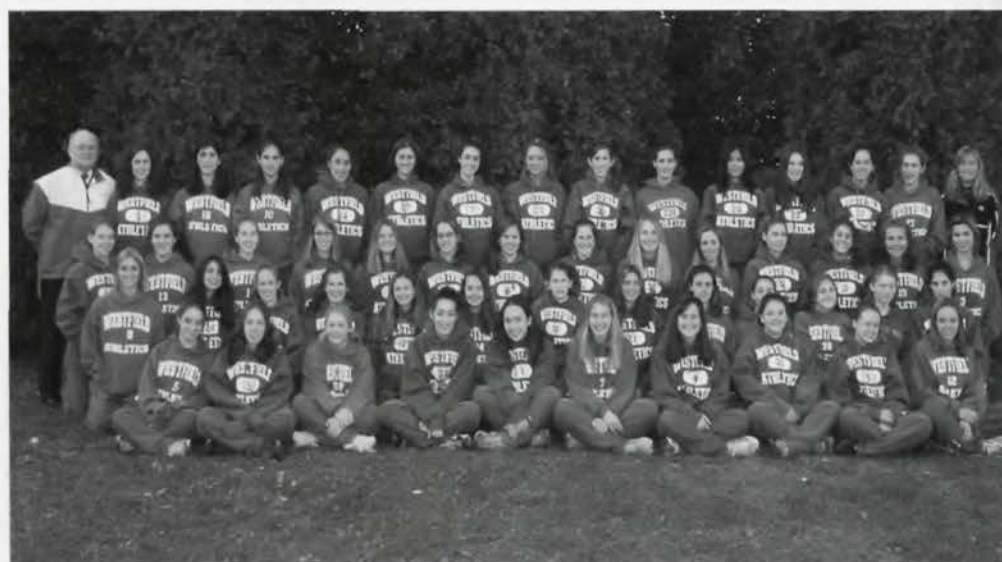

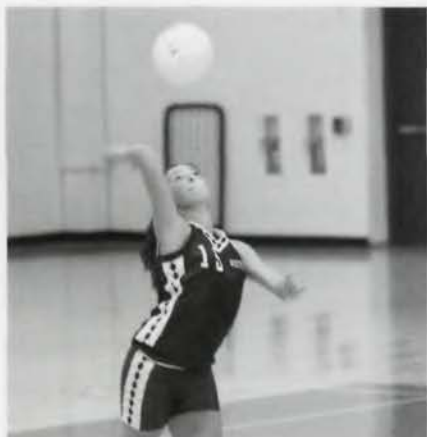

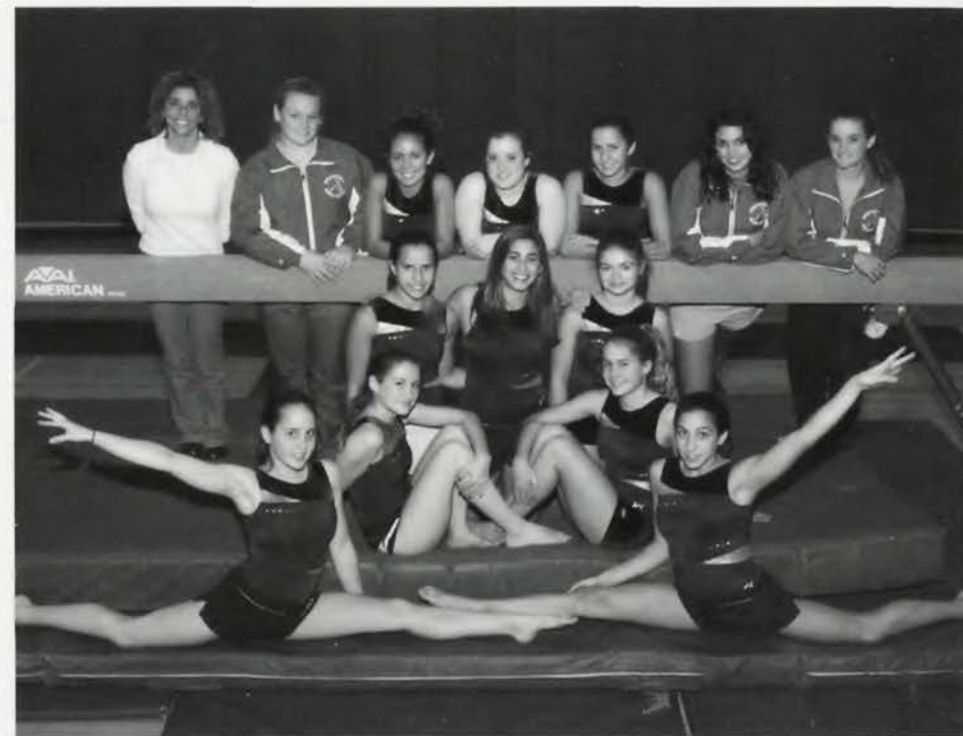

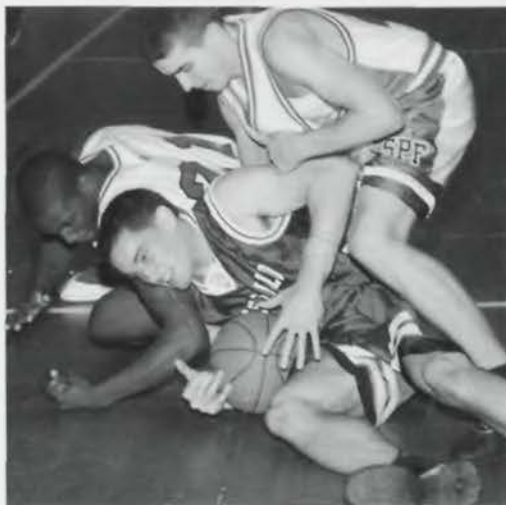

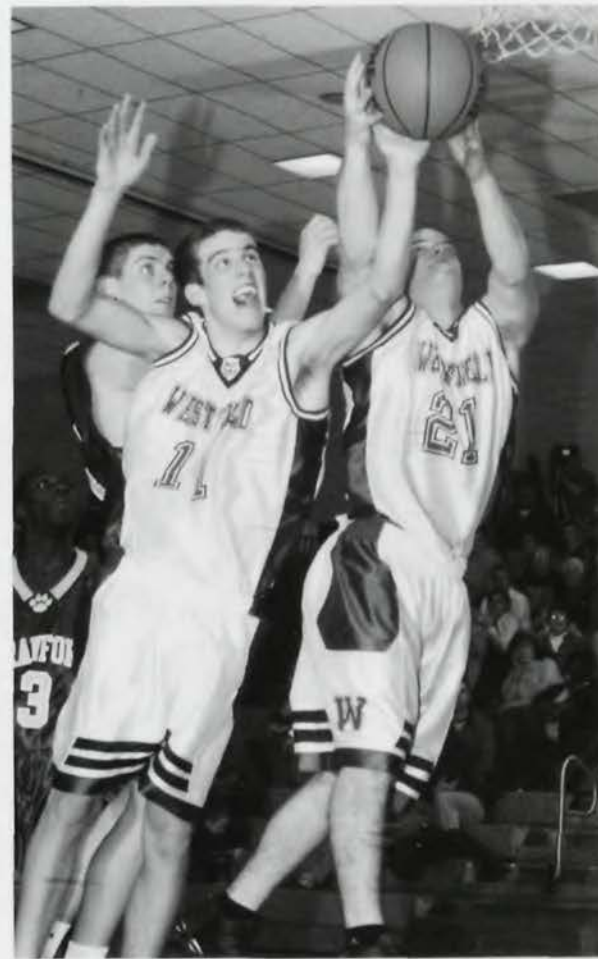

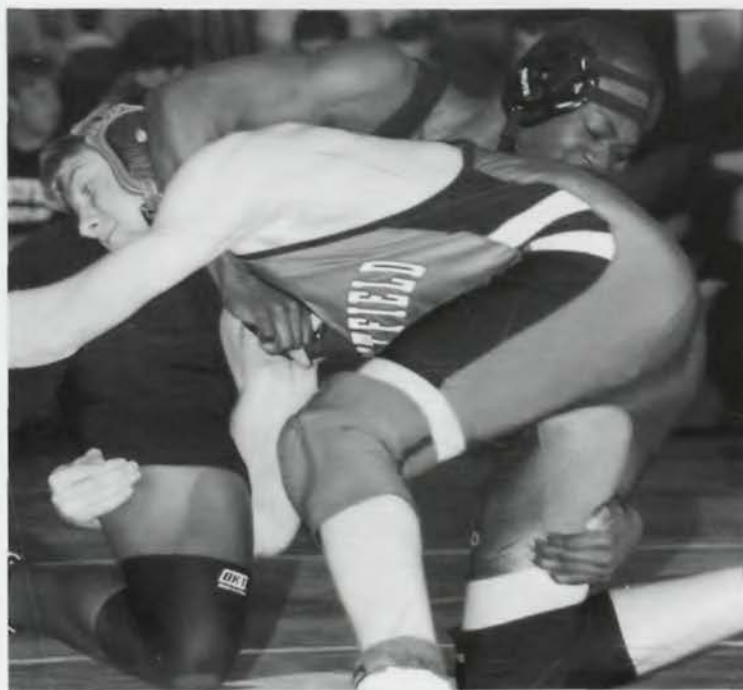

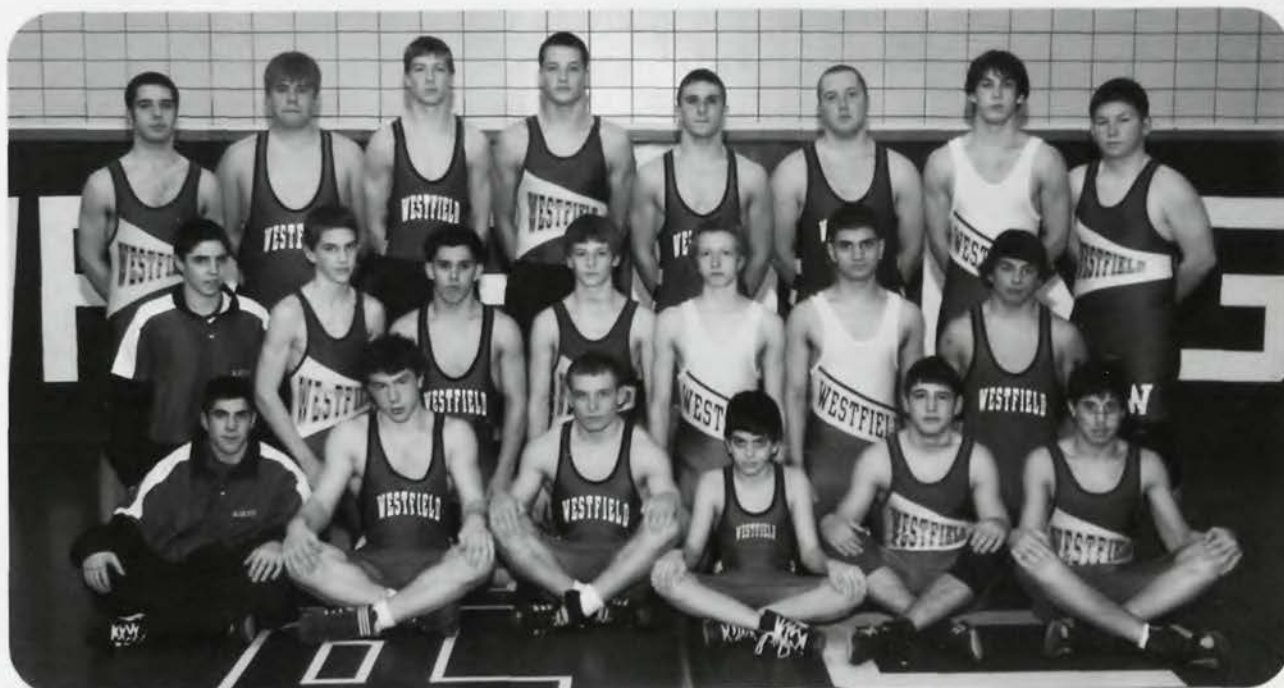

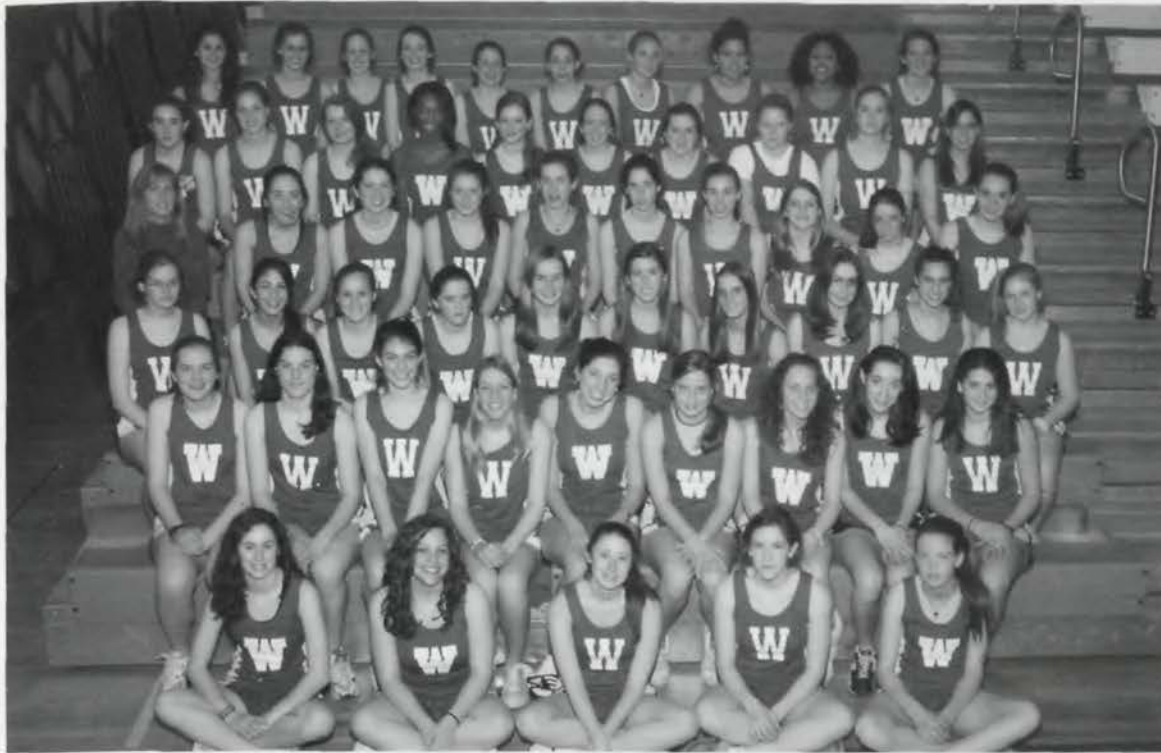

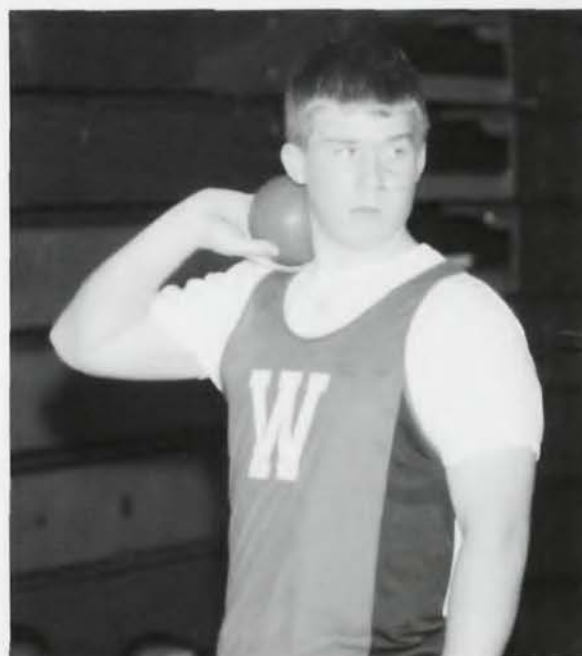

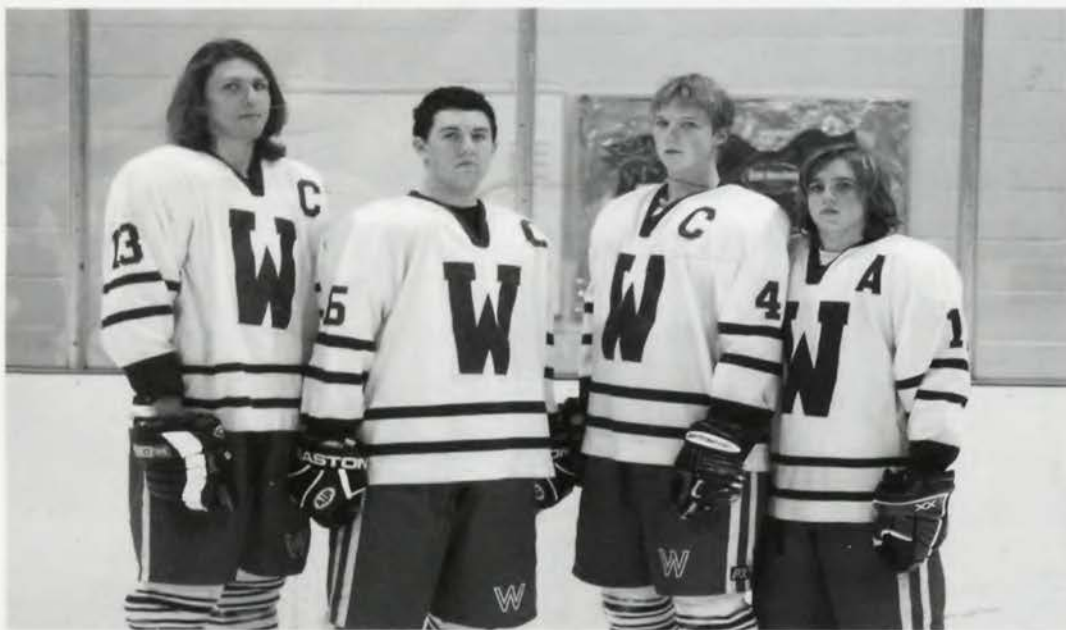

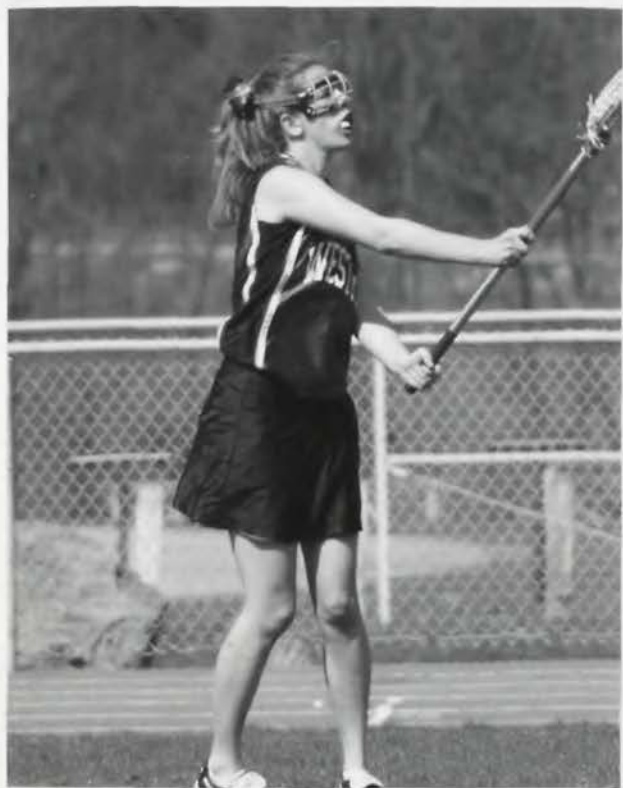

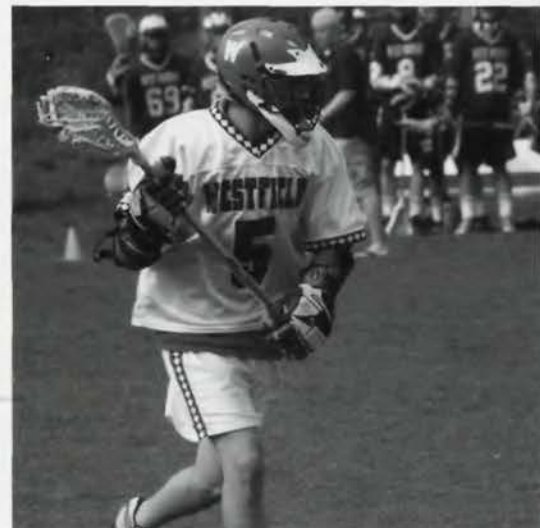

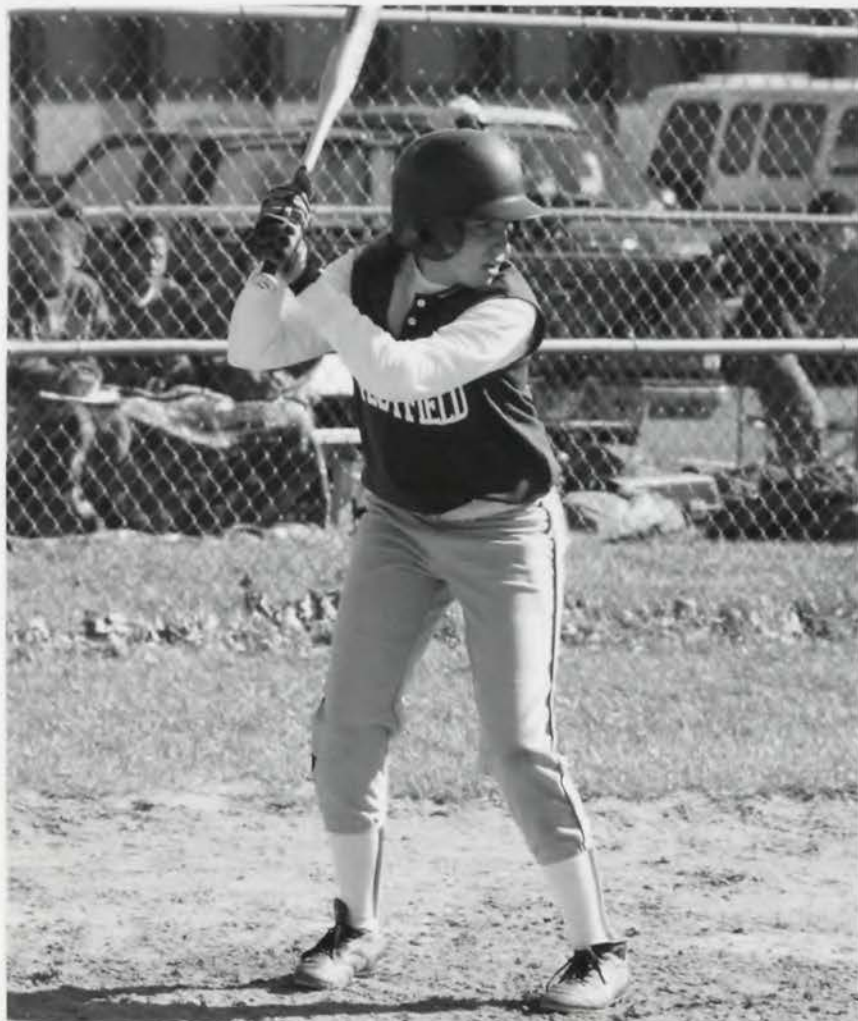

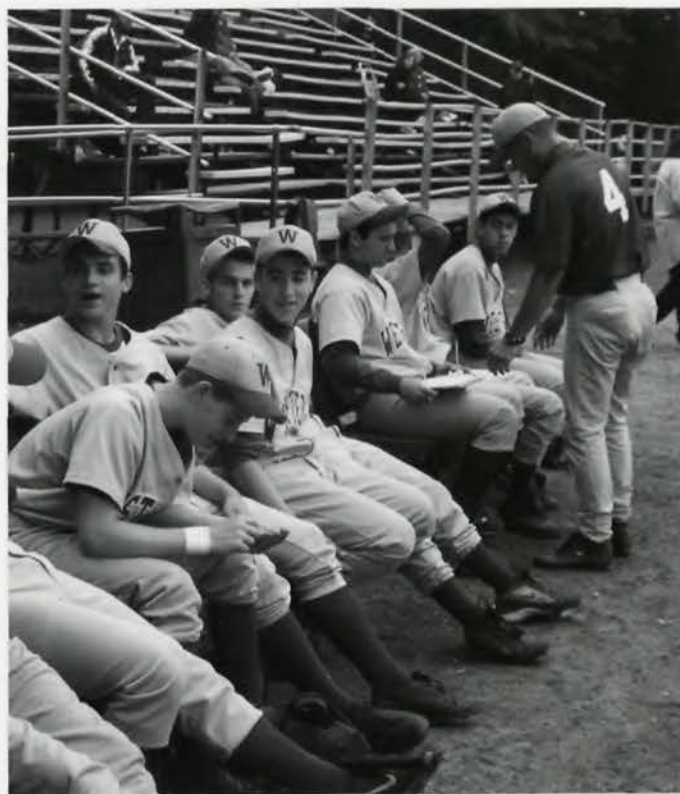

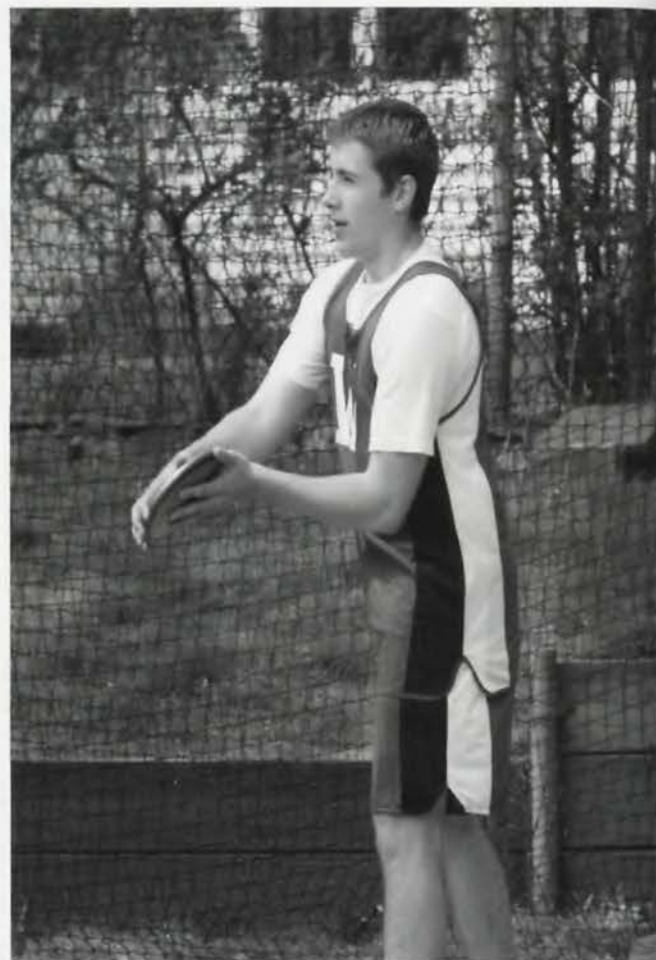

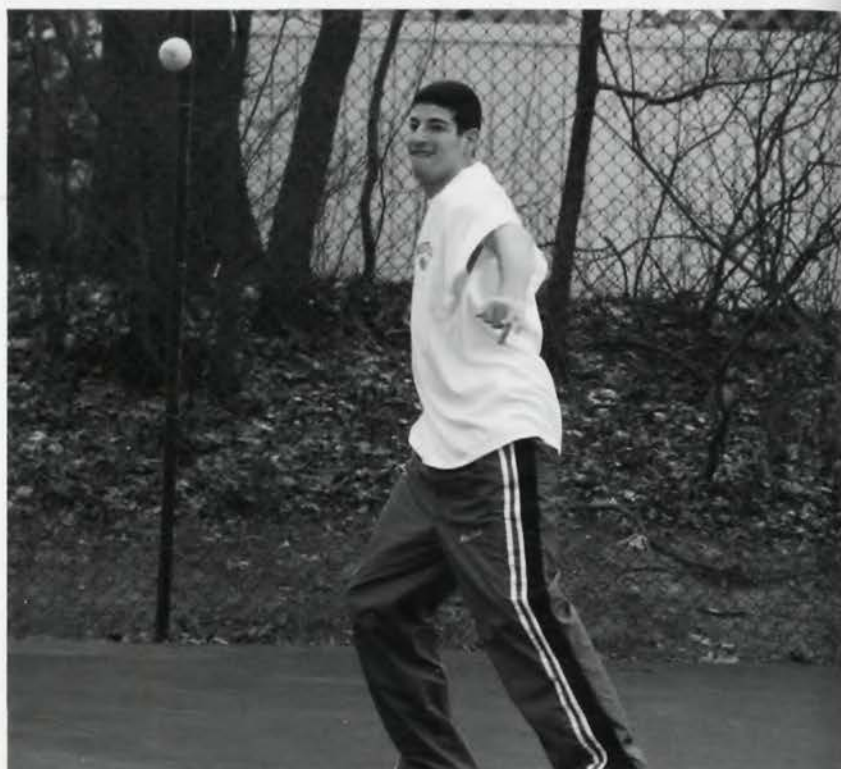

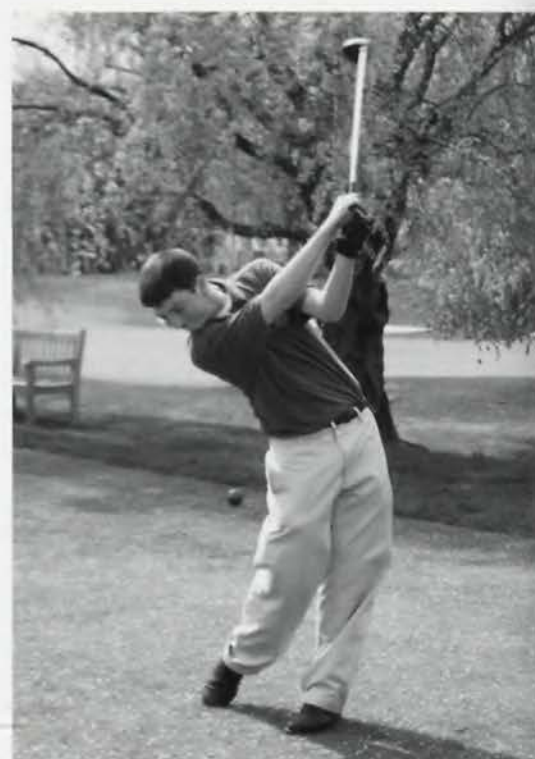

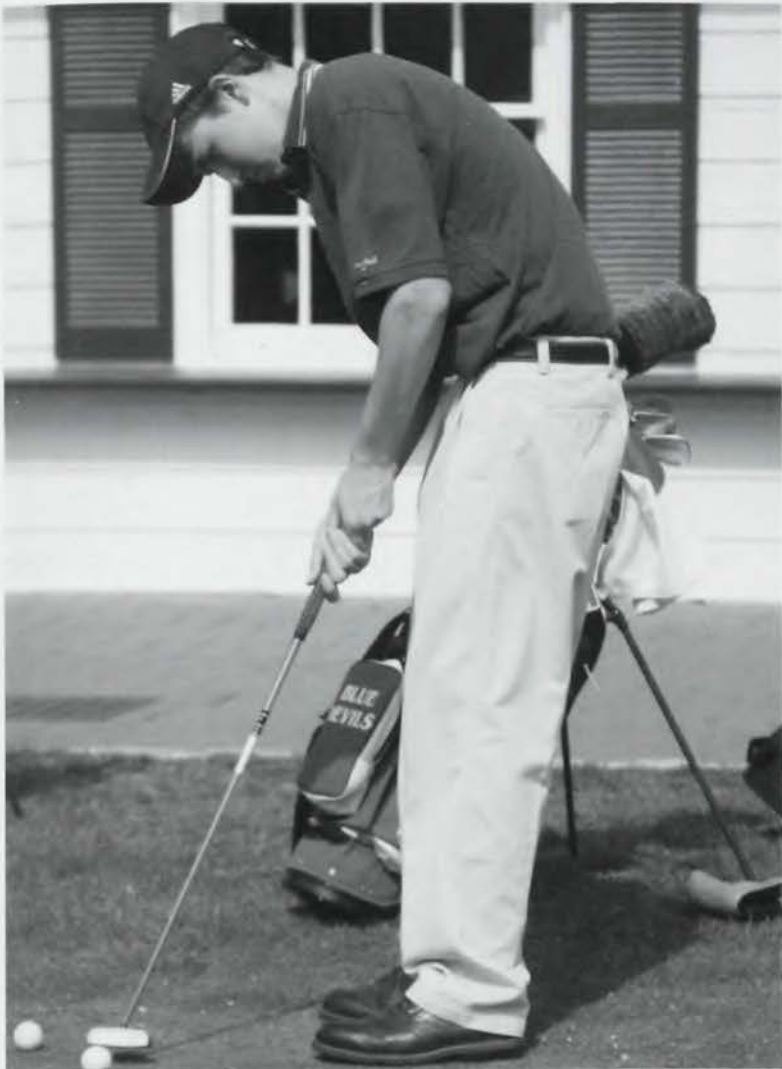

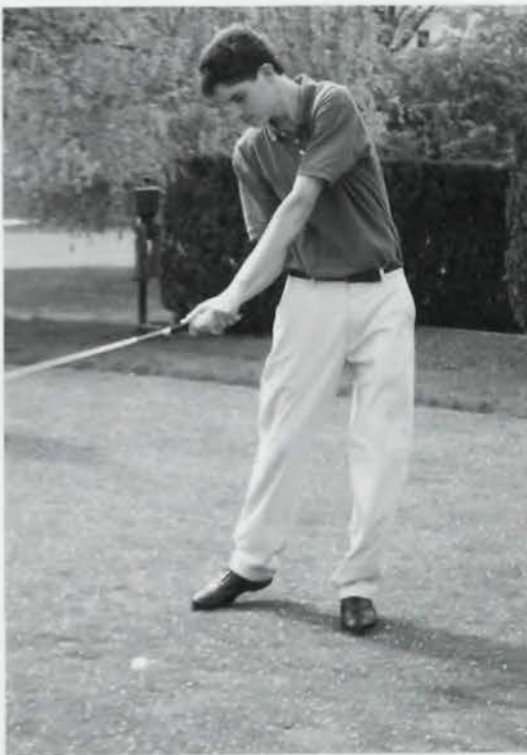

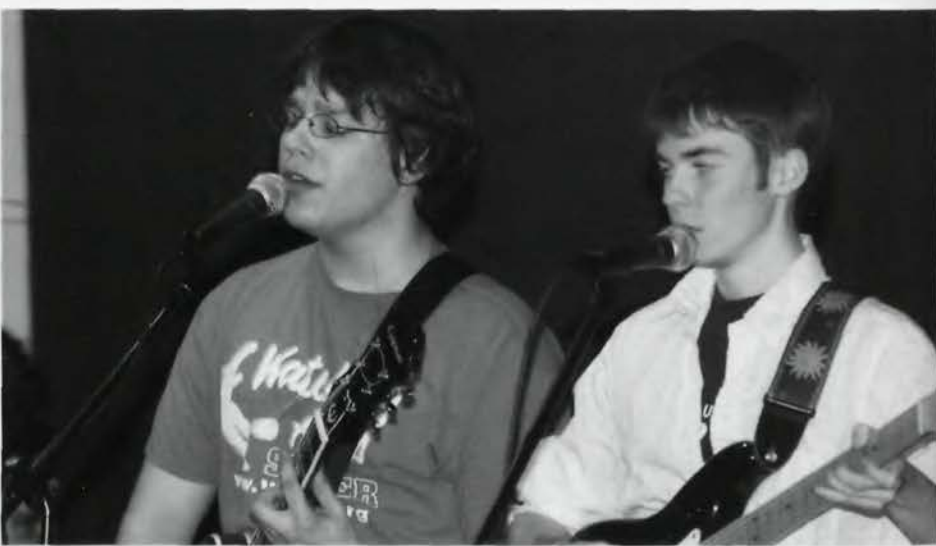

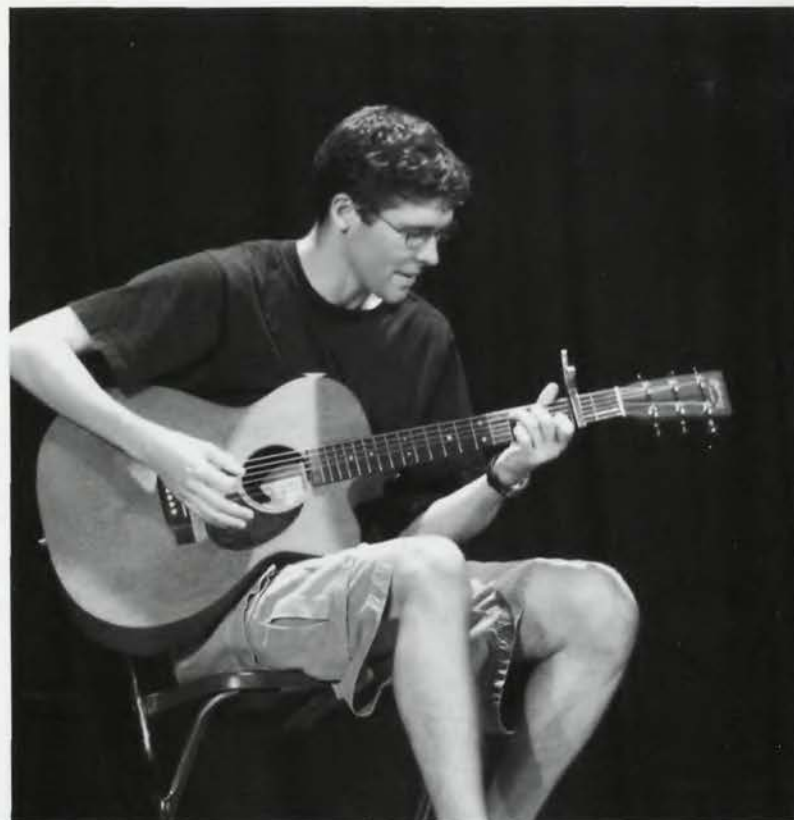

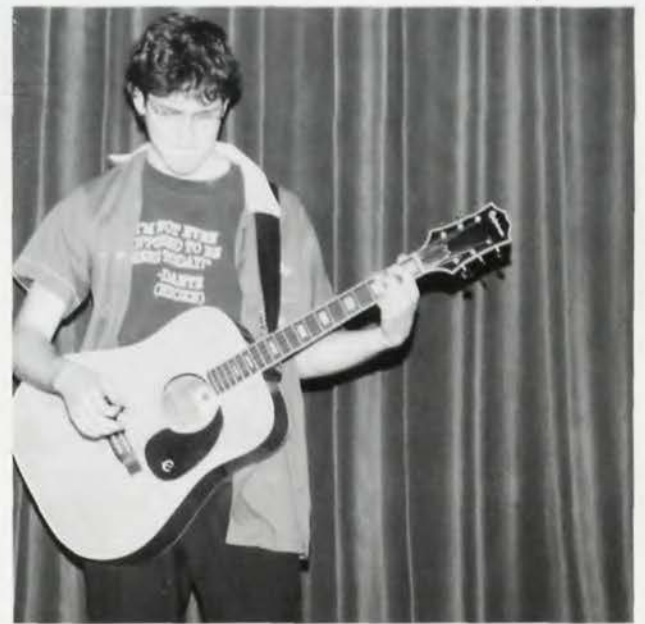

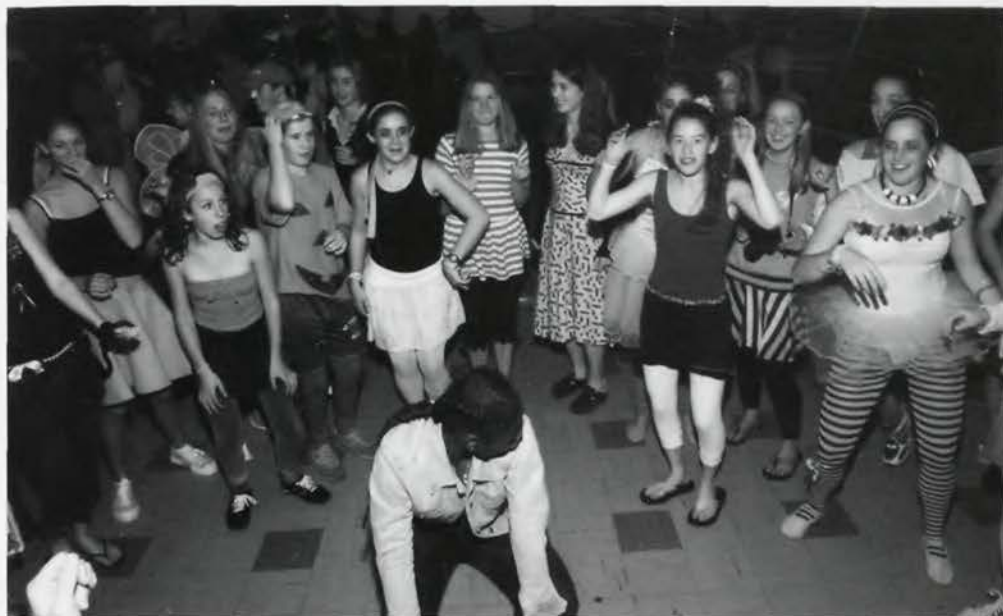

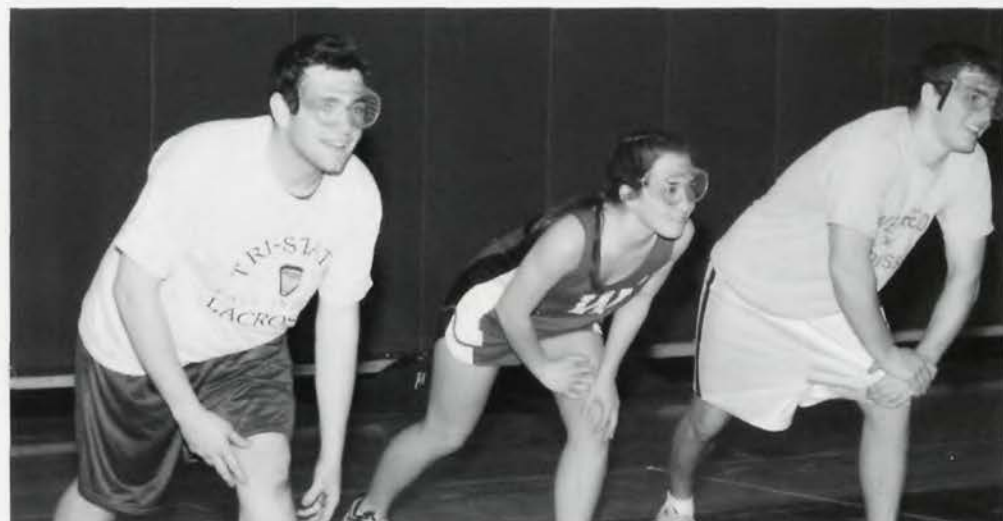

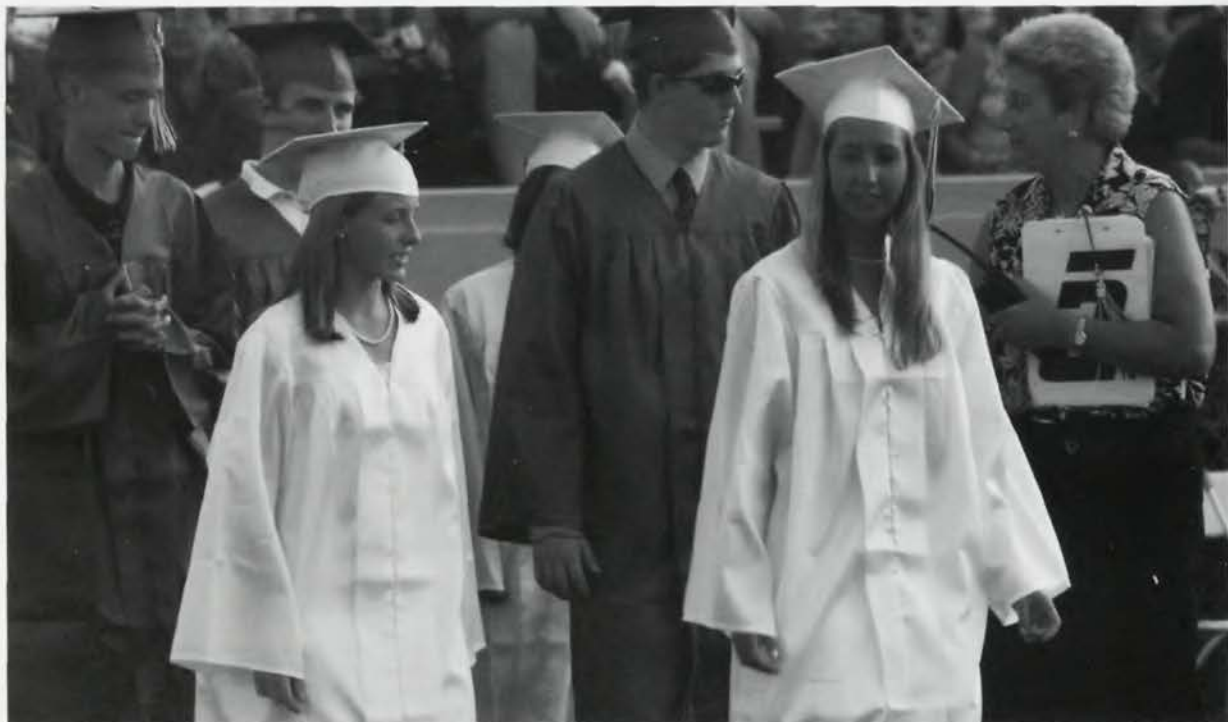
