"That is why we present the application with a traffic signal. However, the further one travels from

the site, the less they will feel the traffic change. By the time they get to the next traffic lights, they are not going to feel the change in traffic conditions.

According to Mr. Ney, an examination of the projected traffic counts and volumes indicate that the applicant would only be adding one car per traffic light cycle at both South and Central avenues in Westfield, and South Avenue and Center Street, in Garwood. As for those two requests. Mr. Ney said that the "traffic will be fairly equally distributed by the time it reaches those intersections and the result will be insignificant.

"This is not to say that those traffic intersections do not have existing problems, but that our added volumes are so insignificant, there would be little or no additional impact," he said.

The other requested intersections included all secondary streets that connect with North Avenue in Westfield. As for those streets, Mr. Ney advised against additional studies of them because the traffic exiting the proposed site would be assigned to South Chestnut Street at the proposed light.

The Board of Adjustment will entertain a petition Monday from a Prospect Street resident looking to convert a family day care operation into a mini-day care operation.

Currently, family day care regulations limit the number of children to six; a mini-day care operation would permit 6-30 children. According to their application, George and Nancy Grant would serve 13 children.

Citing the real need for additional infant care throughout Westfield, the Grants, in a 22-page report to the board, requested a special conditional use variance to use their residence for business. They will continue to live on the sec-

The mini-day care operation will operate Monday-Friday, 6:30 a.m.-6 p.m. State regulations call for an employee-child ratio of 1 to 4 for children under 18 months of age, and 1 to 7 for children older than 18 months.

In their report, the Grants address specific concerns, such as additional noise caused by children playing in the yard and parking. As to noise, the Grants suggested the outdoor play area be located on the patio deck so that the building





Interest rates continue downward

Savers search for higher-paying investment alternatives

While traditional savings interests rates continue their downward spiral, consumers and financial advisers continue to hunt for alternatives.

Seven area banks surveyed May 27 by The Record offer savers an average interest rate of 2.61 percent. That's down more than half of a percentage point from a similar survey completed in November, when the average rate was 3.13 percent

"I'd like to think we've hit bottom," said Pierce Baugh, United National Bank executive vice president. In his 27 years of banking, he said he has never witnessed this savings rate phenomena. "We can't go a whole lot lower. But to predict that the rate will go back up, I'm not in a position to say

that...I don't think that will happen

Depositors at Harmonia, a division of Sovereign Bank, faced one of the steepest drops - from 3.0 in November to a current rate of 2.3. That was the lowest rate among banks surveyed.

But most banks dropped their rates between 0.25-0.5 percent during March and April. World Bank, United National Bank, and Midlantic Bank have all dropped 0.6 percent since the last survey.

"Inflation could drive up the [savings] interest rates, but that would be a negative," Mr. Baugh

The flip side to the low savings rates, bank officials said, are low mortgage rates, which are currently hovering around 7 percent.

But that doesn't help senior citizens who counted on interest earnings for living expenses.

are scrambling to keep depositors he said. "But a lot of people don't from stuffing their savings under the mattress in the bedroom.

United National is one of several banks now in the mutual fund business. United currently requires a \$30,000 minimum deposit for mutual fund investments, but the bank is looking to offer a new fund with a lower minimum investment.

"There is risk involved there, and that's something seniors don't want," Mr. Baugh said.

Rich Weingart, a financial planner from Cranford, said several investment portfolios based on U.S. government securities and obligations have little or no risk.

"There are high quality municipal bonds which more than double your income after tax." he said. He also offers a portfolio that "You can risk," he said. "My parents get a write a check against...Right now deposit into their bank account it's earning 7.25 percent interest. It every six months."

So banks and financial planners takes only \$500 or \$1,000 to start," know about these alternatives, go home at night and say, 'We've got to do something with our savings,' but they never do."

Angelo Coppolino, a principal at Mortenson and Associates, said he bought five-year treasury bills for his parents, which are earning about 6.7 percent,

College in Cranford. "When I ran for congress, I said the most important issue facing the 7th Congressional District was putting people back to work," Mr. Franks said of his constituency.

which includes portions of Union, Somerset and Middlesex counties. "The areal is still struggling and continues to suffer from intolerably high unemployment."

Recently, Union County's unem-

ployment rate has hovered around 9 percent, with more than 20,000 people out of work. So far, 80 businesses have committed to the fair. bringing more than 300 job openings for maintenance mechanics, security guards, accountants, engineers, bank tellers, salesmen, carpenters, printers, secretaries, lab technicians, nurses, chefs, computer programmers, business managers, package handlers and graphic artists to the event.

"I meet owners of businesses,

both large and small, who despite tough economic times are still hiring workers," Mr. Franks said. "They're looking for talented, dedicated workers to help make their business grow and I decided to sponsor a jobs fair to connect people in need of jobs with employers in search of workers."

Mr. Franks said the Jobs Fair will also include instructional seminars on resume writing, preparing for interviews, conducting a job search and careers in healthcare, banking and finance and sales and marketing. Jobs Fair participants will be provided with state employment service job listings, services to assist workers over the age of 55 in finding jobs, services to assist the disabled secure employment, information on job retraining programs and information on careeroriented college programs, he said.

"It would be unrealistic to expect that everyone who stops by the jobs fair will find a job," Mr. Franks said. "But we do believe we can provide them with a new sense of hope and optimism about their prospects of securing employment. If nothing else, we hope they will walk out the door knowing that

Father's Day evokes observations about Dad's 'turf' in the modern family

Sunday is Father's Day.

But will it endure for much longer? Consider the likelihood of this paragraph appearing in a prestigious sociology text of the late 21st cen-

Father's Day was, in retrospect, the national day of observance most likely to have lost its franchise. (Even Labor Day without unions survived, because it now celebrates the intense pride and independence of cottage industry consultants, home-based bookkeepers, and health care brokers who dominate today's home-based employment.) As the once-unique role of Dad slowly sputtered out of the family picture, the prominence of his day, too, lapsed. In fact, the lapse of the unique role occurred more rapidly than the demise of the observance of Father's day, due largely to the high percentage of elderly, more romantic people in the population. The recent success of elderly activists centered in Florida fueling a national effort to revive Father's Day under a new, but warm concept and name can be taken as indication of the final transmutation of this family role and its corollary day of observance. A new spin-off industry has been born of this effort and lends further momentum to the change. Electronic greetings for "Pale Day" are

sweeping the fancy of nuclear families and are an economic phenomenon.

All such idle fancy aside, however, Father's Day allows for loving recognition of dads and their expanding responsibilities in the family: Yesterday's bread winner today shares that obligation with mom, and may very well help literally to make bread in the kitchen, too. Yesterday's family sage today shares that role with mom, and may well sit in on household policy conferences as a peer, rather than chair-

☑ Yesterday's household money manager today shares that role with mom, and may well have coded the chore to her. (This is one of dad's favorite concessions, by the way.)

Yesterday's household mechanic, carpenter, electrician and sod farmer today shares those roles with mom, and may well have learned to

Come to think of it, if Father's Day ever fades away it might be better to combine it with Mother's Day and come up with one, big Parents' Day. After all, it takes at least two flexible adults to run a family these days.

Happy flexible Father's Day, Dada.

Congressman Franks organizes panel to hike NJ news on television

Rep. Bob Franks has announced the formation of the Coalition for New Jersey News to promote greater coverage of New Jersey news by commercial television stations based in New York City and Philadelphia.

At a recent prese conference, Rep. Franks was joined by representatives of some of the state's leading businesses, civic and community organizations, who all share the same concern that New Jersey name and issues are being shortchanged by Philadelphia and New York City television. Rep. Rob Andrews, Dist. 1, is co-chairmen of the coalition with Mr. Franks.

Rep. Franks said: "Despite the fact that 30 percent of their viewing audience lives in New Jersey, the New York City and Philadelphia television stations still treat our state like the poor step-child. A state with a population of 7.7 million people receives only token news coverage from the two dominant media markets. It's clear that when it comes to televi-

sion, there's a news vacuum in New Jersey." The congressmen said the goal of the coalition is to convince the New York City and Philadelphia based television stations to devote more of their air time to covering news and issues facing the people of New Jersey.

"New Jersey decerves better treatment and now is the ideal time to make our case to the television stations," Rep. Franks said. "Next summer. all the television stations in the Philadelphia and New York Olty markets come up for license renewal before the Federal Communications Commission. It's a golden opportunity - one that won't come along again for another five years - to fight for greater news coverage of our state," Mr. Franks said. "We're prepared to begin right away to negotiate on behalf of New Jersey viewers for more news coverage," he said.



Pepper: There are precedents for sharing premiums

This year, the Westfield Board of Education has negotiated or is negotiating with four of its five employee associations. New contracts were reached with the administrators' association and the custodian and maintenance workers' association earlier this spring. We are still negotiating with our largest group, the Westfield Education association, representing teachers, and our smallest group, the instructional aides' asyear of a two-year contract.

(Monday afternoon), the Westfield Education Association reviewed with its membership the status of negotiations and the current proposals of both parties. While it is unusual to discuss bargaining positions in this manner before final offers are made and accepted, the Board of Education welcomes WEA's decision to initiate that discussion this year.

Both parties, the board and the teachers' association are wrestling with difficult contract issues. The downturn of the economy, the imposition of a state budget cap and the out-ofcontrol increases in health insurance costs make it difficult for school districts to continue the level of salary increases given in the 1980s and to maintain the same level of health benefits at taxpayer expense.

The Board of Education entered negotiations with the following goals:

• continuing the positive relations which have characterized negotiations over the past six

 providing appropriate salary increases in line with the economic realities and the need for Westfield to be competitive with other suburban communities

> The major stumbling block in negotiations appears to revolve around health benefit costs. As has been the case with all other institutions, increases in the costs of health insurance have raised havoc with the school budget. The problem is particularly challenging at a time when the economy is weak and the school district must develop budgets within a state-imposed cap. For the 1993-94 school year, for example, we have budgeted a \$975,000 or 22 percent increase in the cost of our health insurance benefits. Our state-imposed budget cap is 5.6 per-

The cost of health insurance benefits in next year's's budget is \$5.510,000. This represents almost 13 percent of the total operating budget. The district's employee groups, including the WEA, have worked closely with the board to help control these costs in the past and are doing so this year.

Under contract settlements negotiated and ratified this year, all administrators, custodians and maintenance personnel have agreed to share with the board and taxpayers the cost of dependent health insurance coverage. This is consistent with agreements in endstence in many of the state's leading school districts, including Ridgewood, Chatham and Haddonfield.



CONCLUSION

The board pledges to teachers, parents and taxpayers that it will work tirelessly toward a satisfactory conclusion to negotiations. Our teaching faculty is the strength of the Westfield Schools. We value teachers and we value the positive relations which have been developed in recent years. We believe that a strong, collegial relationship between teachers, administrators and boards of education best serves students, parents and taxpayers.

Although we will work to preserve this relationship and to arrive at positive resolution of the current contract dispute, we cannot fail to recognize the current economic conditions New Jersey faces, the prospect of less state aid and increasingly restrictive caps, and the very real limits on local taxes and taxpayers. Crackdown " to be enforced on 3-families

The Town of Westfield will soon begin a concentrated effort to enforce the Westfield zoning ordinance prohibiting houses with and three or more dwelling units. The 01 b town's zoning ordinance has never permitted three-family houses. However, over a period of time there have been significant numbers of single-family and twoof & family homes converted into three-10 13 and four-family uses.

Most of these conversions have been done without the owner having ever obtained zoning approval for the three-family use or any construction permits for the physical changes which have been made in the structure including rearranging walls, changing plumbing and way heating systems, installing electrical work and the like.

The Town Council recently reevaluated its position on whether L in to change its zoning ordinance to 19(1) permit three-family houses. This blod evaluation was based on sug-adi gestions that the town should mi : change its zoning to permit threelains family uses in some areas.

The council decided it would be in the best interest of the town not to change its zoning ordinance, and the violations that currently exist should be corrected. As a result, 30 11 the town zoning official intends to begin a significant enforcement efwill fort against houses containing but three or more dwelling units which han were illegally converted from sinlate gle- or two-family uses into apartsome ment units containing three or dilw more dwelling units.

Nicholas Giuditta, 78, dies; local dentist and civic leader

Nicholas A. Giuditta, 78, a dentist Jersey, the Fauchard Dental Sociwith an office on Mountain Avenue ety, and the NYU Academy of Oral and a longtime civic leader in Rehabilitation. Westfield, died June 9, 1993 at Overlook Hospital.

He was born in Westfield, graduited from Westfield High School in 1932, and lived in the town all his ife.

Dr. Giuditta earned his doctorate in dental surgery in 1938 from the Baltimore College of Dental Surgery, now part of the University of Maryland dental school. He was an intern with the U.S. Public Health Service from 1938-40 and opened his dental practice in 1940; he operated the practice in Westfield since then except for a stint in the Coast Guard from 1942-48.

He limited his practice to prosthodontics (crown and bridge work) after he completed training in the field in 1960 at the New York University graduate dental school. Dr. Giuditta was an assistant clinical professor at the NYU dental school from 1960-67 and lectured frequently on prosthodontics in the Westfield area, the United States. and Canada.

Dr. Giuditta was the first dentist in Westfield to be named a fellow of the American College of Denthe Central Dental Society of New cue Squad.

He also was elected to the Pierre

Academy of Dentistry and chaired a number of committees for the Greater New York Academy of Prosthodontics.

A past president of the Westfield Civic Club and founder of its scholarship program, Dr. Giuditta served on the Westfield Adult School board of directors and was active in the Westfield Rotary Club. He was a former vice president of the University of Maryland dental school alumni association and past president of that dental school's New Jersey alumni group.

He is survived by his wife, Linda Guerriero Giuditta; two daughters, Camille Giuditta Sorensen of Scotch Plains and Rosalinda Giuditta of Westfield; a son, Nicholas Giuditta III of Cranford; a brother, Harry Giuditta of Westfield and Boca Raton, Fia.; and a sister, Mae Balka of Westfield and Delray Beach, Fla.

MAKING UP FOR THE PAST

Guilt is a powerful feeling. People regret it when

they realize they have harmed one another; hopefully they will learn from the experiences. For many, though, an apology never seems to be enough; they punish themselves with guilt-inducing thought, as if they need to feel as much or more pain than they caused.

Self-abuse and masochistic thoughts or behaviors do nothing to "make up for others" pain." Sometimes people operate on the misguided belief that if other people can

sense their guilt, it will engerider sympathy. This process also creates a false illusion: one cannot undo the past, and punishing oneself only fools the individual into thinkingg something positive is accomplished. Nothing is actually acheived.

Breaking this self-destructive cycle means accepting that some mistakes can't be undone and the natural consequences must be accepted. Learning to stop controlling situations and accepting reality will go a long way toward reducing excessive guilt and self-abusive ideation. Professional counseling can help.





Calling all Westfielders: you'll soon be able to carry on three-party phone conversations without paying monthly service fees

Bell Atlantic three-way calling will be available on a pay-per-use basis in

Westleid beginning this summer, in August, Westleid and five other New Jersey areas will test the service, which will cost a proposed 75 cents per use. Three-way calling has been available statewide by subscription at \$2.28 per month, with unlimited

usage. Both residents and businesses can benefit from the new service, according to James Carrigan, a spokeemen for N.J. Bell. By enabling three people to talk at once, he said, the individual calls necessary to arrange social functions or connect with business clients can be eliminated.

To use three way calling on a pay-per-use basis, a customer would dial a three-digit code on a touch-tone equipped phone line, or four digits with a rotary dial phone line, before making a call.

New Jersey Bell decided to offer three-way calling on a per-use basis because it had introduced per-use calling in other areas and wanted to expand the number of per-use services, said Mr. Carrigan, noting the popularity of repeat call and return



Since transferring from Cranford High School last year, Shi-Kia Carter has become known in Westfield as someone who could bowl over opponents on the basketball court and put smiles on the faces of teammates and coaches with various jokes and gags.

But, when it was her turn to throw the shot put or discus this spring, Carter was all business. The sophomore gave instant credibility to a Lady Devils' weight team which never seemed to attain much success.

Carter established a Westfield High School record in the shot put on two occasions this season. Her current mark of 35-51/4 is a foot and a half better than the old record, set by Noreen Morris in 1983.

For more than 40 years the terms Volkswagen and van have been synonymous. In fact, in recent history two of the most recognizable shapes in the entire world can be attributed to VW, the ubiquitous Beetle and its cousin the Van, aka the Microbus, the Vanagon and now, the Eurovan. The Eurovan is the fourth generation of a model that got its start in Europe in the late 1940s, and arrived here in 1950 as the Microbus. Satisfied buyers plus clever advertising soon brought this "people and things" hauler into prominence. In fact, a cult following soon developed, and VW was well on its way to the big time in America. The 21-windowed Microbus eventually gave way to the Vanagon, which in turn was replaced this model year by the

Up until now VW vans, by whatever name, have been rear engined, rear drive vehicles, that were long on room and short on power. In the mid-80s the four-cylinder "Waterboxer" water-cooled engine replaced the aging air-cooled equivalent. For the 90s the opposed four-banger has been replaced by an inline five-cylinder engine that previously has powered some Audis. The new larger Eurovan has moved its powertrain 180 degrees, and now has a front engine/front wheel drive layout, plus a completely redesigned passenger/cargo

APPEARANCE

The front-end treatment of the 1993 Eurovan distinguishes it from earlier models. There is now a definite slope from the top of the wide horizontal grille to the top of the sweeping curved windshield. It retains its boxy styling, but is slightly rounded. Front door access is easier as they are no longer above the front wheels. The sliding side door operates easily as does the wellbalanced rear hatch.

COMFORT

The upright front seats and large steering wheel still give one the bus-driver feeling while driving. However, the spacious MV has a most innovative interior arrangement that can seat up to seven, sleep two or more, plus have a table with an overhead light for work, eating or play. Front and rear area air conditioning is standard and effective particularly in Florida. The AM/FM/cassette sound system nicely fills the cabin with music and news. Power assists are at a minimum, but I did not really miss them. Space and versatility more than compensate for some inconven-

ROADABILITY

For a van-type vehicle the new Eurovan MV displays very good road manners. Its improved suspension system plus power rack and pinion steering insures that it tracks quite well in most driving situations. It still has some body lean on turns and requires careful attention in cross winds. Three point seat belts abound, but air bags and rear disc brakes are not yet available. All-around vision is superb, and is enhanced by the large side mirrors.

PERFORMANCE

Horsepower has never been a strong point with VW vans. Even though the latest Eurovan MV is propelled by an Audi developed 2.5 liter, five-cylinder, single overhead cam, fuel injected engine, 109 horsepower is not quite enough to propel over two tons of vehicle with cheerful readiness. VW vans, as always, still go downhill much faster than uphill. The new four-speed automatic transmission is a smooth shifter. Its lower performance potential does not mean that much to those folks who prefer space and convenience over faster pickup.

SUGGESTIONS

For easier access add assist handles.

ECONOMY

EPA ratings are 17 city/19 highway. I averaged 19.1 mpg.

CONCLUSIONS

The Eurovan continues Volkswagens tradition of building vans that are utilitarian and also people carriers. Through four generations and almost forty years it has successfully marketed the advantages of space and convenience over power and performance. The newest MV model very aptly demonstrates these characteristics.



THE GENERATION GAP

A father and son's perspective on Nissan's 300 ZX Twin Turbo

The Generation Gap is nowhere more apparent than in the way two men of different age groups view the same car.

Bob Hagin (grandfather of eight and age 60) and his son Tom (single and age 30) both drove the Nissan 300 ZX Twin Turbo for an equal number of days and under similar conditions. These were their comments over coffee at the kitchen table:

BOB - This car is as quick as anything I've ever driven. It's acceleration is reported to be 0 to 60 in a bit over six seconds and I can believe it. What impressed me was the acceleration during passing and on freeway on-ramps. It literally leaps ahead without the turbo lag that was the curse of the early turbo-rockets. When the turbo kicked in on the older cars, it was like releasing the hand brake.

TOM - You're right that there's no turbo lag during passing situations, but from a dead stop, there's a considerable amount of time from foot-stomping to head-snapping. The power is very smooth, however, and its speed can be deceiving. I was doing — well — something over the speed limit — without realizing it, while everyone else on the freeway was very aware of it. Fortunately, the Highway Patrol wasn't around, so I didn't get into any trouble.

BOB - Good thing, too. I haven't had to bail you out since your teen-age days. The interior seemed a bit tight and claustrophobic but maybe I'm more used to sedans. The pedal placement was a bit odd,

especially the clutch. I had to stretch for it when I had the seat in a comfortable position. Getting into the car takes some getting used to.

TOM - I loved the interior. The leather uphoistery is soft and supportive. I'm average sized, so entry wasn't too difficult, but fastening

the seat belt was tough; I had to contort my body in ways that waterskiing has never required. My buddy Paul Grosser is 6 foot 8 inches and even he didn't hit his head on the inside roof. The dash knobs were easy to reach, but I kept turning on the rear wiper when I started it up because its switch is too close to the steering wheel. Maybe after a week or so you get used to it. The selectable Sport and Touring suspension modes made driving the 300ZX the 150 miles to and from the state capital a joy, especially when I took the River Route back to

avoid commuter traffic. Those fat, sticky 16-inch tires bite excellent, and the five-speed shifts so smooth, a flick of the wrist is all it takes.

BOB - Frankly, the Sport position beat me up pretty bad around town so I left it in the Touring setting. Even then, it handled lots better than any of the sedans I've tested. This car has four-wheel steering and it's a gas to handle. Even an old guy like me likes to zip around the backroads and toss out the tail once in a while. I really liked the

looks and especially the fact that in this age of so many swoopy designs, it didn't attract a lot of attention. I didn't feel like a rock star trying to pick up on the girls.

TOM - My dad, the rock star? Right! I thought the same thing about the looks. They're relatively mild. Usually cars with this kind of performance look as fast as they go but I could cruise the highway without having every Corvette in the area spoiling for a race. The three liter, twin carn V-6 puts out 300 horses and was so quiet, it was eerie. The car has an airbag and ABS, neither of which I needed to rely on.

BOB - Neither did I, but it's because I don't go that fast. I didn't check my own miles per gallon but the EPA says it should get 18 and

TOM - I did check it and I got almost 22 but most of that was on the freeway using the cruise control. The car was a real pleasure to cruise all week with the stereo system cranked and the T-Tops off. I hope we get another sportster that's as much fun as this one real soon.

BOB - You're right, it was a kick even though I couldn't get your mother to even sit in the thing. But Tom, you've got to promise me that next week's Generation Gap test car will be something more sedate — something that I don't have to strain to get in and out of.

TOM - Sorry Dad. They don't put wheels and motors on rocking chairs.



Summer means softball for grownup athletes

Thousands sprint from the office to the ballfield as recreation leagues in Central Jersey grow every season

By JOHN GRANELLI and WILLIAM WESTHOVEN WeekendPlus Staff hey take to the ballpark, casting workclothes and responsibilities aside, all for the game. Tomorrow, they'll be back at the job, but when the workaday world is through with them, they'll be back between the lines again, seeking to lead their team to victory.

To the men and women of adult recreational softball, the game can almost be a religion. Forget about golf widows - you want to feel sorry for someone, it's the softball widows — and widowers — who are perhaps the loneliest folks in town.

Almost every town in Central New Jersey has established a very effective and well-run adult softball program for the 18-and-over crowd, and these programs represent thousands of participants. But even though they are normally under the jurisdiction of local recreation departments, and softball (slow-pitch softball, to be more specific) is supposed to be a 'recreational' sport, nine times out of 10,

you will not find too many players merely "recreating." While fun and recreation are indeed the backbone and main criteria for the establishment of adult recreation softball, there is another motivation running through every league, on every team, and every player — competition. Exercise and good times are often little more than the byproducts of the intense desire to be the best team in the league and win the championship. And in many cases, the leagues support this desire by tailoring their divisions to promote even matchups and prevent "dynastys."

"The way our league is structured is so we keep the competitiveness in each division with A. B. and C leagues." said Robert Dudash, sports coordinator for Edison township Department of Recreation. "For example, if a team plays in the B division and they win the championship, they have to move to the A division," he added. "On the other hand, if the team comes in last, they drop back to the C division."

According to Dudash, Edison runs six mens leagues (three residential and three industrial) and two womens leagues - 116 teams in all, featuring approximately more than 1,700 softball players. All 116 teams are scheduled to play at least two games per week, usually in the evening after work hours.

Most players relish the opportunity to meet with their friends or neighbors, break a sweat and share in the thrill of the battle. Sometimes, though, the frustrations of a hard

day can carry over to the field. Although the leagues try to foster a friendly atmosphere, tempers sometimes run a little high between opponents - even teammates - and, of course, with the umpires.

"Most adult softball players are former high school and college athletes, who may have lost some foot speed, but

enjoy baseball and softball," said Paul Fessock, an umpire for the South Plainfield Recreation Department. "We understand where these players come from. When a player becomes a upset, I know they are letting off steam or pressures from the work week."

But most players will say fun, competition and recreation all combine into the unique opportunity adult softball presents — comradery.

"I'm playing because I enjoy softball," said Ed Robinson, who plays for the Creative Caterer's Longshots, in the South Plainfield Sunday Recreational league. "Playing in the game is great because it gives me a chance to hang out with my friends, which is difficult during the work week."

As with Robinson's team sponsor, Creative Caterers, sponsorship in every league is essential to the existence of the programs. Without it, most teams could not get the money together for the \$250 -\$475 entrance fees. Sponsors vary from bars and restaurants to local businesses, hospitals and even government agencies.

In most cases, industry's management officials stress the participation of their employees on the company team because of the atmosphere it promotes by having the players work together out of the office.

Although the central theme of recreation is present in every league, there are a few leagues which take their play very seriously.

Christine Jensen, program supervisor for the Bridgewater township Recreation Department which controls seven leagues and 60 teams, said their Bay Window league is exceptionally competitive.

"People know about the Bay Window league, because it is extremely tough and very competitive," Jensen said. "Most people, unless they are ready for the kind of teams they will face in Bay Window, say no thanks and play in one of the other six leagues we offer."

Other specialty leagues include one for older folks -men over-50, to be exact — and their numbers are rising rapidly throughout the country.

Throughout these softball programs, the sheer numbers of participants is convincing evidence of how widelyaccepted this form of "recreation" is, both for men leagues and womens leagues, which, unlike mens leagues, include players who played the sport competitively in high school or college (men play baseball in school, remember?).

Just in case some of you are still under the impression that baseball and softball aren't "for girls." Any guy who says that should be forced to take batting practice against one of the high school pitchers from the area.

"It is wonderful to play in these leagues," said Kim Dullman, who played for 14 years with Crowley's Tavern in Edison, where she works as a bartender. "The comradery and the team atmosphere is excellent."

Great adventure

'Jurassic Park' is a thrilling themepark nightmare

By JEFFREY COHEN WeekendPlus Film Critic n 1975, Steven Spielberg put himself on the directing map with Jaws. You may remember. Not too many years before that, Michael Crichton wrote and directed a very silly but imaginative sci-fi movie called Westworld. in which a theme park filled with robots like Abe Lincoln in Disney World went awry and gunslinger robot Yul Brenner ran around killing people for real.

Perhaps it was inevitable that they would merge, but what's disturbing is Crichton's cardboard characters and pat situations won out over Spielberg's talent for drama and pacing. In Jurasole Park, which Crichton co-wrote from his novel. Jaws meets Westworld with a little of The Land Time Forgot thrown in. What emerges is a very effective, very scary, extremely convincing film that is somehow not very involving.

The idea, for those of you who have been living in solitary confinement for the past six months, is this: a very strange billionaire (Richard Attenborough) decides to build himself a very unique theme park on an island off the coast of Central America. Here, with DNA taken from prehistoric mosquitos preserved in amber, dinosaurs are being cloned to come back to life as incredible zoo attractions.

When a park worker is killed by one of the less cooperative beasts, an investigation is demanded, and the bil-

lionaire seeks out two scientists (Sam Neill and Laura Dern) and a mathematician (Jeff Goldblum) to endorse the safety of the project. He picks the wrong weekend.

A greedy computer hacker (Bob Peck, Seinfeld's Newman) decides to steal some dinosaur embryos for a competing scientific nutcase, and to do so, ends up turning off pretty much all the security equipment in the park. Naturally, T. Rex and his pals are soon loose, chomping and stomping anything (and anyone) foolish enough to cross their paths. And just to top it off, our brave scientists and the billionaire's grandchildren are all stuck out there in the middle of a monsoon.

All of which Spielberg delivers in his typically perfect fashion. He is one of the few directors to have learned the art of milking suspense from Alfred Hitchcock, and actually keeps the on-screen gore to a minimum, instead relying on

our imaginations to scare us. What's missing, and what we have to assume this from Crichton's contribution, is any strong identification with the characters.

Where Jaws involves us in the shark hunt by giving us the landlubber sherriff, the salty old shark hunter and the scene-chewing fishologist, Jurassic Park gives us generic characters: Dern's scientist is just there to battle sexism and Goldblum's mathematician (is he there to add things?) merely give us all the one-liners we expect and create artificial romantic tension by moving in on Dem. And Attenborough's Daddy Warbucks. who apparently was something of a cold-blooded villain in the book. has become a Scottish Colonel Sanders, hobbling around in a white suit and being cuddly.

But the real stars, as everyone knows, are the dinosaurs, and they come through magnificently. Take my advice and don't read all the stories about how this illusion was

accomplished; see the movie and you'll just believe they brought in a bunch of dinosaurs and trained them to work with actors. The special effects are as good as it gets anywhere, and that's what makes Jurassic Park work. Mr. Rex and his friends are truly a sight to behold.

A word of warning: it is exactly for movies like this that the PG-13 rating was invented. Do not, under any circumstances, bring small children to this movie: it's Spielberg in his "Boo!" mode, and nobody can be more downright terrifying when he puts his mind to it. The fact that Jurassic Park doesn't quite live up to its hype is less a function of Spielberg's movie than of the truly mountainous scale of the hype.

Face it: you're going to see Jurassic Parl. Just be prepared and don't expect cuddly dinosaurs. These monsters are monsters.



Superficial 'Shrew'

Shakespeare Fest is

off to a rough start

with puzzling 'Shrew'

When the play was staged a few seasons ago by the New York Shakespeare Festival, the text was updated from Renaissance Italy to the American west of the 1800s. That production, taking the kind of liberties in which contemporary directors often indulge, played up the more physical elements of the battle of the sexes between Kate, the willful, mean-spirited heart of the play, and Petruchio, her equal-

ly forceful suitor who finally "tames" her spirit and forces her into submission.

Now, Madison's New Jersey Shakespeare Festival, opening its current summer season at the Bowne Theatre on the campus of Drew University, undertakes Shrew, but with a different agenda. Dedicated to keeping alive Shakespeare's work as well as the work of other theater masters, the festival can always assure audiences of provocative work, such as last season's reworking of Much Ado About Nothing effectively set in the Antebellum south.

For this production, director Dylan Baker sets the action in late 17th-century France, but otherwise undertakes a historically accurate *Shrew*. one which includes Shakespeare's rarely-included introduction to the play. In this version, the battle of the sexes is presented by a troupe of travelling actors who perform in a courtyard for the drunken Christopher Sly, a pathetic commoner who has been into believing he is a nobleman.

Though the "play within a play" framing immediately introduces Shakespeare's "one acts as one is treated" theme, once Sly is carted off, snoring by the middle of the first act, some audience members may wish to follow. The establishment of the "performance within a performance"

novelty has already set the clumsy tone for this Shrew.

Baker, an award-winning actor who has appeared in Broadway's La Bete and Eastern Standard, is to be commended for framing this production around the original induction. Though it provides an interesting literary lesson, the most intriguing effect of this production is that it may challenge some viewers to consider the possibility that even the "Immortal Bard" is capable of making a mistake.

Certainly one is not required to interpret the text with a contemporary, critical eye which takes into account the ideological awkwardness of the plot for contemporary audiences, but the straightforward depiction of Kate's "taming" as it exists within this often merely silly presentation lacks interest. Rather than struggle with the troubling ideological heart of Shrew, Baker seems intent to play, for full effect, the text's more superficially comedic elements. When Kate, powerfully portrayed by Susan Knight, is on stage, the production takes on a weight which the rest of the evening cannot bear.

In this production, Shakespeare's secondary plot, involving the courtship of Kate's sister, Bianca (Amanda Ronconi) and the youthfully romantic Lucentio (Robert Devaney), seems more the concern of Baker, who has previ-

ously directed A Midsummer Night's Dream and The Importance of Being Earnest at the Shakespeare Festival. This focus, however, often sacrifices the relationship which is at the heart of Shrew.

While the characters within the play, (Petruchio included,) often act farcically, toying with the idea that they are second-rate actors performing for Sly, Knight's Kate comes off as a more staid, human presence. This awkward juxtaposition of styles ultimately detracts from the overall effect of this production.

As Petruchio, Thomas Schall is an appropriately blustery, vivid presence, but his performance requires him to act in an awkward space between Knight, whose expressive face and commanding voice bring a genuine life to Kate, and the play's supporting cast, a mixed bag of actors who often forfeit the powers of Shakespeare's language in order to amusingly ham it up as if they were playing sketch comedy.

By the time the production draws to a close, Baker highlights Knight's Katherine, placing her

front and center, spotlight and all, as she delivers Kate's final monoloque on the importance of a wife's subservience to her husband. Historical accuracy has its place, but a Kate without subtext is merely a dramatic artifact rather than an emotionally or intellectually engaging device. Knight is a compelling actor, but the focus on her characterization comes too late.

One of the play's themes, revolving around the importance of dress and it's effect on identity, is amusingly literalized by Baker and Susan Branch, the production's costume designer whose consistently colorful and amusing creations sometimes themselves get laughs.

For Shakespeare scholars and other assorted English majors, this neat production provides food for thought. For other audiences less interested in the power of Shakespeare's language and the challenges of reinterpretive processes, the show may prove a frothy if lengthy source of amusement.

42nd Street, of course, is only the beginning of the summer fun at Plays-in-the-Park, which expands its season this year to include three musicals, a comedy, and the reurn of Dance-in-the-Park.

Next up will be Nunsense (July 14-24), followed by Man of La Mancha (Aug. 4-14) and Neil Simon's California Suite (Aug. 24-31). Dance-in-the-Park performances will conclude the season Sept. 9-11.

Wednesday, July 30, Plays-in-the-Park will present a performance of 42nd Street with sign-language interperetation for the deaf and hard-of-hearing. The rain date for this performance is July 1. The theater is also accessible to the handicapped.

Admission to all Plays-in-the-Park productions is only \$2. Tickets are sold on the

day of the performance from 1:30 p.m. till curtain at the theater box office. Ticketholders may place their low-back lawn chairs (no chaise lounges or blankets allowed) on the grassy knoll beyond the stage beginning at 6 p.m.



Ray Charles, Sandra ReAves team up at the State

By WILLIAM WESTHOVEN WeekendPlus Editor eah, he still does concerts. After making all that money doing all those Pepsi commercials, not to mention a good 40 years in the music business, you would think that 63year-old Ray Charles would be ripe for retirement.

Fortunately, there's soul, not soda, running through his veins, and when you got soul inside, you got to let it out, and that's just what he'll do Tuesday, June 22, when he performs with his 17piece band (yes, including the lovely Raeletts) at the State Theatre in New Brunswick.

And as if Charles wasn't enough, the State announced Monday that Sandra ReAves, the bold, brassy singer who recently wowed the State Theatre crowd with five performances of her Late Great Ladies of Blues and Jazz, has been. added to the bill along with the Tin Top Alley Blues Band.

Hailed as the "legendary genius of soul," Charles is one of the first modern musicians to bridge the gap not only between black and white music, but soul, jazz, country and even rock 'n' roll. Proof of his influence can be found in several halls of fame. He's in Playboy magazine's Hall of Fame essentially as a jazz performer, while the Rock 'n' Roll Hall of Fame recognizes the hard-rocking rhythm and blues of songs like "Hit the Road Jack." Naturally, he's also in the Rhythm and Blues Hall of Fame, the Jazz Hall of Fame. He's also represented with a star on the famed Hollywood Boulevard Walk of Fame, while his 11 Grammy awards prompted the National Academy of Recording arts and Sciences to honor him with their Lifetime Achievement award.

He's even won a Clio award for his Pepsi commercials, which have made a cliche out of the phrase "You Got the Right One, Baby." You get the feeling that the Baseball Hall of Fame will get around to enshrining him before too long.

Despite his busy schedule, Charles still finds time to record, and while his critically-praised 1993 release My World sold fairly well, it seems to have been overlooked due to the continuing popularity of his old hits. Hopefully, though, he'll include some of the new songs, which demonstrate his ability to blend with the modern

sounds of the '90s, when he performs at the State.

Born Ray Charles Robinson in Albany, Georgia, in 1930, Charles is one of those uniquely American stories of triumph over tragedy. Living in poverty as a child, Charles lost his eyesight at the age of 7.

He struggled just to eat during the early years of his career, but by the early '60s, he was well on his way to stardom, as hits like "I Got a Woman," "Georgia," and "Born to Lose" thrust him into the national spotlight.





Big man on campus

Former Pixie Frank Black tops college charts in solo debut

By BILL HOWARD WeekendPlus Writer ot that he didn't have control when he led the Pixies as Black Francis, but, under his new nom-derock, Frank Black, Charles Thompson holds all of the reins.

"I love it. It's liberating doing what I do — playing music." Black said from his native Los Angeles. "Making a living out of it is very liberating, considering my last job - I tended bar. There's nothing wrong with tending bar, but I'd rather not."

Perhaps his new start explains the rising, beaming sun illustration on the cover of his eponymous Elektra Records debut. His inaugural tour for the album will take him to the Stone Pony in Asbury Park Sunday.

After nearly six years recording with alternative grunge pioneers the Pixies, Black has resurfaced after a year hiatus. He didn't start with a clean slate, however, as he first conceived the album while the Pixies' put the finishing touches on its finale. Trompe Le Monde.

The concept, according to Black, was "an album of mostly covers, songs I had come to know and love over the years, of course. An unoriginal concept poorly executed by numerous artists, (but) I still felt compelled by this flimsy excuse to get into a studio."

Out of the group of covers, only "Hang on to Your Ego," a Brian Wilson-penned Beach Boys tune that Black once recorded for the famed John Peel radio program in England, survived the final cut.

With a new group of musicians, including Eric Drew Feldman (Captain Beefheart, Snakefinger, Pere Ubu), he put together a strikingly fresh batch of songs that kept the raw edge he had with the Pixies, but with a slightly lighter feel than the sometimes macabre, raucous tone of the Pixies' five major releases. Pixies' fans will be pleased to know that Black's ties with his old mates were not completely severed. His ex-lead guitarist, Joey Santiago, worked on his album and will tour with him.

His biggest obstacle remains his change in persona to Frank Black. He still has his sense of humor and sings occasionally of UFOs, but anyone expecting another Pixies-like release will need a period of ad-

justment. Black knew the new direction would mean some confusion and frustration from his fans, but he hardly saw the move as dangerous.

"Langerous, like I might poke my eye out?" Black said. "People already misinterpret me, no matter what name I use."

Like any influential artist, he lets his music speak for him. Frank Black, with it's impeccable, meticulous mixing, ranks up in technical perfection with alternative legends like Bob Mould, Sonic Youth and They Might Be Giants. the latter of which Black hails as "my favorite band." He and TMBG's John Flansburg are such good friends that Black will record a four-song EP of originals during his seven-week tour for TMBG's monthly recording club.

After a lengthy world tour with U2, coincidentally the Pixies' final public rounds, Black is back on a familiar circuit in the clubs. His experiences on the U2 tour were quite of the learning nature, and he even brushed shoulders with Asbury Park frequenter Jon Bon Jovi, who is not likely to hop on with Black at the Stone Pony.

"I know the guys from Bon Jovi. They were hanging out backstage at the end of the U2 tour. They didn't look at us," Black cracked. "It's like 'I'm waiting to say, "Hey, it's been a nice tour" to Bono and the boys just like you buddy. I know them better than you."

Such tales from his tour with U2 taught the modest Black valuable lessons, but none of which involve

avoiding the throes of superstardom by sticking to the club circuit.


"My ambitions are to sell out whatever venue I'm booked in," he said. "And if they want to move it to a bigger one, go for it."

Black just may get that wish. His CD has topped the college charts since May, and his obscure videos remain on MTV rotation despite his lack of opinion for the channel.

"I won't tell you what I think about (MTV), but I'll tell you this — I don't watch it," Black said. "I'll watch plenty of TV, I'll watch plenty of bad TV, but I won't watch that. It falls between the cracks. It doesn't hold up to what I do watch, like Dragnet and The Mary Tyler Moore Show."

"Well, I've been watching Mary Tyler Moore because it's on after Dragnet," Black clarified with a chuckle. "I'm pushing with Mary Tyler Moore, but Dragnet? Yes."

Smell. Sometimes I think smell is the reason for living. Aromas can turn you off or on in a single moment. The smell of cut green grass, of chocolate chip cookies baking. The smell of perfume on someone you love desperately or the cologne of the guy that shafted you in college. I know so many people that cannot bear the smell of Moorice because they had a bad experience with sambuca.

Smell can tell you almost everything you need to know about wine, too. Since we can only perceive four tastes (salt, sweet, bitter, and sour) smell fills in all the blanks. It requires concentration, and this may seem contradictory to just enjoying wine but in the long run, learning how to smell wine can only enhance your enjoyment. It becomes less of a mystery, more user friendly.

My teacher, Alan Young, had some very definite ideas about sniffing "Don't wave the glass" somewhere around your face and hope to catch a whit!! Stick your beaks down into the class and take a good snort!" I've found that this is the only way to unlock the power of your olfactory. Smell is so linked to our emotional memory that unless you do "take a good anort," you end up missing half the input.

It smalls like wine, that's all," is people trying to do an evaluation for the first time. This is not because they lack the ability to smell. H's because they never learned the big secret to smelling: only look for one thing at a time. You can't expect that in one sniff your brain is going to be able to decipher the 100+ components going on in the glass. Try to concentrate on one berry, the wood, or herbal smells. Find one thing and then go on to another. Also keep in mind that just because I smell cherries doesn't mean that you will, or even should! We are all different. Thank

Here are some descriptors for a few grape varieties. Next time you open a bottle,, try smelling one, and only one of these smells.

Cabernet Sauvignon and Merlot -Berry fruit, Green pepper, black olives, mint, vanilla, cedar, spice herbs.

Chardonnay - Butter, green apple, grapefruit, melon, lemon, apricot oak, butterscotch.

Pinot Noir - Raspberry, strawberry, cherry, cinnamon, mint, barn yard.
