Teens who broke youth's jaw in high school fight get hospital sentences

Two 16-year-old Westfield High School students have been ordered to perform services in a children's hospital due to an assault which hospitalized one of their peers. The juveniles were arrested by Westfield police Oct. 12 for aggravated assault after they broke another student's jaw in a fight.

Stewart Carey, assistant principal of Westfield High School, said one of the two arrested juveniles was standing in the hallway near the cafeteria. He believes that the juvenile made a remark with sexual connotations to a female who was walking by him.

Mr. Carey explained that a verbal dispute then ensued between the juvenile and the victim and then it appeared as if it was over with. It was only a few minutes later when the victim was walking down the hall that the victim was assaulted. The 16-year-old victim was struck in the face by the two juveniles around 11:30 a.m. in the hallway near the high school's guidance office.

Assistant Prosecutor Robert P. O'Leary said the student's jaw was severely injured, fractured in three places, requiring subsequent surgery and leaving him to eat his meals through a straw. "This was a terrible, senseless attack," he said.

Charged with aggravated assault, the two juveniles pleaded guilty to the attack before Superior Court Judge Rudolph N. Hawkins Jr. last week. Judge Hawkins said that the juveniles must spend 40 hours of community service in a hospital where children are recovering from serious injuries.

In addition, they have each been placed on 18 months probation and have been suspended from school. The youths have spent time at the Union County Juvenile quarters in Elizabeth and have been receiving state-mandated instruction at home since the incident.

Union County Prosecutor Andrew K. Ruotolo Jr. felt that the sentence was appropriate, saying that "youngsters who have exhibited violent behavior must be shown the pain and suffering that violence causes."

Library eyes goals for services in 2000 in 3 major realms

The Westfield Memorial Li- where people of all ages acquire brary has made its plans and set knowledge on a chosen subject its goals for the year 2000. The independent of formal school library is a success, drawing a steadily growing patronage from Westfield citizens. However, its public can learn of upcoming board of trustees believes that even if the library was experiencing no technological changes, there would be room for improvement in the quality and range of services, and a need to set challenging goals.

During the past year, a long-range plan for the library's future was developed by a committee from the board of trustees. The committee's purpose was to reexamine and define the library's role in meeting the community's future needs. The library should fill three primary roles to meet these needs.

First, according to the committee, it should be a popular materials library, where people come for items in high demand such as bestsellers, travel guides, etc. The book collection is the library's most important asset and should be continuously updated. As a preschoolers' door to learning, where young children's interest in reading and learning is aroused, the library should continue to use storyhours as a way to stretch minds and create lifelong readers. As a reference library, it should provide timely information useful to a wide spectrum of residents. In the foreseeable future, reference materials will be available in one or more of three forms: traditional books and periodicals, CD-ROM and databases.

Superior court brushes aside town zoning board rejection of body shop

After more than five years of conflict with the Town of Westfield, A & M Auto Center has finally won permission to run its auto body repair business.

In an appeal to the Union County Superior Court, Judge John Pisansky reversed a Westfield Board of Adjustment decision and granted A & M Auto approval to build a paint shop and conduct auto body repairs.

A & M Auto Center has been subject to various applications before both the Board of Adjustment and the Planning Board since they opened over 10 years ago. They have approval and have been conducting engine repair the entire time. However, they were denied permission to conduct body work and painting at least three times. Concurrent with these denials, the conducting auto body repairs.

At the last hearing this past June, the Board of Adjustment denied A & M's application to run auto body repair and to erect a small addition to house a spray painting booth. The last hearing differed from the others in that A & M proposed a smaller painting addition in a different location and more parking.

The legal precept known as res judicata states the board can refuse the application if the exact same application has already been heard by the board. Before the hearing, the board agreed the application was different than previous ones and agreed hear the case.

However, the application was denied by a vote of four to three. Arthur Fried, Larry Mannino, and Graydon Curtis voted against the application.

Since then, A & M appealed the decision, contending the board's decision was not justitown contended that A & M Auto was illegally fied. Specifically, A & M argued that two of the start.

negative votes improperly considered the issue of res judicata, voting against the application because they said they had already heard the case. A & M also argued that the reasons for the third negative vote dealt with an on-site parking problem which was not at issue because A & M provided proper parking in their new application.

Judge Pisansky ruled in favor of A & M Auto saying, "for the board members, Mr. Fried. Mr. Mannino and Mr. Curtis to decide this case on issues that were not properly before the board was arbitrary, capricious and unreasonable and was a clear abuse of their discretion."

The judge reversed the board's decision and A & M is now waiting for an order so they can receive the permits necessary to begin construction. After facing lost business, employees and opportunities, A & M is able to get down to business, as they had hoped to do from the

'What odor?' Scotch Plains asks town

Although Westfield residents have been lodging complaints about an offensive odor coming from Scotch Plains' leaf disposal center, Scotch Plains officials and residents don't see a problem.

The disposal site, which sits on Westfield Avenue near the Brightwood section of Westfield, is permitted as a compost site. Scotch Plains Public Works Superintendent Walter Dinizo said they are only permitted to compost a certain amount. In fact, most of the leaves picked up in the fall season are dropped off at the site and then transported out by contractors within 48 hours.

> Council members discussed what steps the town should take to resolve the problem with Scotch Plains. Mr. LaPorta reminded the council that Scotch Plains sued Westfield years ago due to problems with Westfield's site on Lamberts Mill Road, the result of which now causes Westfield to transport all their leaves out of town.

"I'm not a big fan of municipalities going out suing each other," said Mayor Garland 'Bud' Boothe. "I am confident that the people in Scotch Plains will handle this situation effectively and amicably."

However, Westfield Town Administrator John Malloy reminded the council that the Union County Regional Environmental Health Commission (UCREHC) is the enforcement agency for these matters. He said that they should report complaints to UCREHC and let them handle the situation.

"I would suggest as many contacts as necessary when the problem exists," Mr. Malloy said. "Repetition is the name of the game." Kevin Schuerman of UCREHC

Mr. Schuerman explained that to issue a notice of violation the odor must be present at the time of investigation, and there must be current evidence of a direct effect onsurrounding areas. Mr. Schuerman said that despite a limited staff of air inspectors, they make efforts to respond to citizen complaints immediately.

"We try to give guidance to the: municipalities concerning composting, to follow the state's encouragement of recycling," Mr. Schuerman said. "We just want to make sure they do it properly."

Mr. Dinizo said that Scotch Plains is doing their best to control the odor problem and will work with both the UCREHC and Westfield to avoid any conflict or detriment to their neighbors.

Dr. Harvey S. Moskowitz presented final testimony on behalf of Village Supermarkets last Monday night. Westfield and Garwood Planning Boards met to hear the case of a proposed ShopRite Supermarket to sit on the North Avenue border between the two towns.

Replacing attorney Jeff Lehrer for the night, attorney Donald DiFrancesco presented Dr. Moskowitz to testify on planning issues after the boards and private attorneys finished cross-examination of Frank Sauro, general counsel for Village Supermarkets.

Dr. Moskowitz testified on the bulk variances that Village Supermarkets is seeking, a number of variances from the C-commercial zone in Westfield and the IC-industrial commercial zone in Garwood.

He explained that the 4.7-acre site is bisected by the municipal boundaries with 3.1 acres in Garwood and 1.6 acres in Westfield.

Dr. Moskowitz testified that Village supermarkets is seeking a number of variances from both towns as follows:

In Garwood —

[7] A minimum front yard setback from the required 25 ft. to 10 ft.

Fown nixes early retirement plan

Last week, the Westfield Town Council rejected a proposal for an Early Retirement Incentive Program for uniformed town employees. This decision came only a few months after the town offered the program to its administrative employees.

The Early Retirement Incentive Program is being offered by the state in an effort to allow towns to eliminate positions or lower salary costs without laying off any employees. If offered, employees who qualify have the option to retire early with an improved pension plan. The plan was proposed to all of Westfield's town and school employees, and they were given a Dec. 31 deadline to decide if they want to take advantage of it.

The plan would be beneficial only in certain cases, depending on more in one employee's pension and less in a new hire's salary acfually pans out.

Administrators of Westfield's schools decided against the plan quickly. "It was discussed administratively," said Assistant Superintendent in Charge of Business Robert Rader. The town also rejected the plan for police and fire employees, despite the fact that the two groups wanted it. Additionally, the uniformed employees still have a longevity program, wherein employees get a salary raise after so many years of service regardless of performance or natural promotion. The administrators used to have this program also but eliminated it two years ago for new hires. In effect, this means that over time, the town saves more on an administrative new hire than a uniformed new hire.

Mr. Hely said that with the administrators, the town should break even in three years and then feel a savings. However, in regards to the uniformed employees, Mr. Hely said that "no matter how you look at it, it would not be beneficial to the town."

Letters to Santa reveal youngsters' concerns, wishes

No doubt about it, children writing letters to Santa in this suburban Union County area not only are deeply concerned about the welfare of the man who will be delivering their fondest wishes, but they also have a bevy of questions they want answered.

Many letters sent to Santa reveal that most children are as honest as can be when evaluating their behavior over the last year. But all letters reflected a deep concern for making things easier on Santa overall, including some enterprising kids who gave precise directions to where presents should be left and exactly where snacks could be found.

Others tried to make Santa's shopping efforts easier by providing their lists complete with prices and a grand total.

While some of the requests were very long, others were quite simple and touching, such as the letter from one youngster who was not worried about himself as much as he was other children who would not have anything this Christmas. Among the probing questions were the perennials asking just how Santa is able to deliver all those presents "to every boy and girl," exactly what Mrs. Claus does, and how does Rudolf's nose glow. Many inquired about Santa's general health, and remarked on his girth. Some even wanted to know how old Santa was. And although some letters got right to the point by listing the items being requested this year, others made sure to politely inquire about everyone from Mrs. Claus to the elves' general well being. Meanwhile, back at local post offices in suburban Union County, post masters are reporting a typically heavy mail load for this holiday season. Mail bound for the North Pole, however, is down from previous years, postmasters said. Nevertheless, most postal offices in the local vicinity have special North Pole drop boxes for children to deposit their letters, and those that don't are more than willing to make sure letters addressed to Santa arrive safely at their destination. If you are worried about cards, letters and packages reaching their destination prior to Christmas, the perennial advice from local post offices is "mail early" and "don't wait until the last minute." But if by some chance you are a last-minute Nellie, all local postal offices offer Express Mail service and next day mail deliveries anywhere in the United States. They will even make deliveries Christmas Day. Residents can help ease the burden on post office personnel this year, said Scotch Plains Postmaster Elvoid Christmas, by dropping their mail at the post office earlier in the day. According to Mr. Christmas, a new program called "Take a Letter to Lunch," provides an earlier pickup time for mail heading out of town. This way, said the postmaster, the volume in the Newark clearing house will be reduced during evening hours. It also will speed cards and letters along their way at a much faster rate.







Jones on top of world in women's billiards

The admirers and well-wishers have become accustomed to seeing the same positive, dynamic image. Even after a tough loss in a major tournament, Lorce Jon Jones greets them with a ready smile and gracious charm. She's always in an upbeat mood. Sure she is.

"When you're in the public eye, you have to bite your tongue and sign all the autographs," said the recently-crowned world champion of women's pocket billiards, "I lose well, as far as what people can see, but I really hate to lose. It's killing me inside. But you know you just have to go back and work harder."

That's something that's never deterred the Union County native. A professional billiards player since she was 11 years old, Jones has combined natural talent with an insatiable desire to be the best in her ascent to the elite level of the sport.

However, that hunger can sometimes only take you through the hors d'œuvres. Jones, 28, has grossed over \$100,000 in winnings and endorsements this year largely because a pool cue feels as comfortable in her grasp as a baseball bat did to Ted Williams. "If you show me some kids play-

ing today, I can tell you in a very short time who'll make it and who won't," said Jones, who grew up in Garwood and now resides in Hillsborough. "I know girls on the tour who have that hunger and desire but who have no chance to become a big winner, no matter how much they want it.

"And I actually have the most respect for them," she continued, "because they've spent so much time and effort in this. But they just don't have that natural ability. Some people have it and some don't. But you definitely have to have that ability to just kind of wing it. You really need that,"

It's long been evident that Jones, who won the first of her eight overall world championships at age 15, has all the necessary ingredients.

Two-time world champ Robin Bell, who was runnerup to Jones in the Women's Pocket Billiards Association standings this year, has had numerous opportunities during the past decade to see what makes Jones so special.

"Some players have their strong points," said Bell via telephone from her California home, "and Loree has developed a lot of them, like knowing when to play it safe if vou don't have a shot, or breaking balls. She's a very seasoned player (Please turn to page A-9)

ost newspaper editors, especially those covering the aits and entertainment beat, dread the holiday season because there's generally not a lot going on other than movie matinees and after-Christmas

sales.

But contrary to rumor, there are still plenty of activities on the Christmas week cultural calendar, especially for families looking for something to do together. Here's just a few of them.

Plays-in-the-Park to present 'Godspell'

For the fourth time in five years, Plays-in-the-Park, with funding from the Middlesex County Board of Chosen Freeholders and the Middlesex County Department of Parks and Recreation, will stage a festive Christmas week musical at the State Theatre in New Brunswick.

Godspoll, which follows A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum, The Fantastics and You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown, is another good choice for the series, given its relevance to the season. Performances are scheduled for one performance at 8 p.m. Monday and two (2 p.m. and 8 p.m.) Tuesday.

When it premiered off-Broadway in the early '70s, Godspell created something of a controversy. Like Jesus Christ Superstar, it offered a glimpse at the human side of Jesus

circles) didn't help matters.

But over the years, Godspell managed to outlast its critics, moved to Broadway and became one of the most popular (and most-produced) musicals of the '70s and '80s, mainly due to the show's uplifting spirit and the hit-record status of the song "Day by Day."

According to director Gary Cohen, the Plays-in-the-Park production of Godspell won't stray far from the original, which is based on the Gospel according to St. Matthew, and will feature the same colorful garb and chain-link fence backdrop, which gives the musical a kind of modern, urban street ambience.

The modest set might make it seem like Godspell is an easy play to stage, but according to Cohen, it's a very demanding production for the Edison-based troupe. "It's very difficult to rehearse because everyone is onstage virtually all the time," said Cohen. "Another problem is that we only get into the State Theatre two days before the show. And, of course, the story is older than God, so to speak, but the show dates back to 1972, so one of the biggest problems is to make the show viable in the '90s." To that end, Cohen and choreographer Michelle Massa have made a few changes, including the addition of some modern dance steps.

'Ernest,' but by the numbers

Duvall, Harris brighten otherwise dull 'Wrestling Ernest Hemingway' By JEFFREY COHEN WeekendPlus Film Critic

distant future, we will own something called virtual reality, which will make the audience an active participant in the creation of entertainment. In short, you'll be able to experience the story and make decisions that affect its outcome.

Until such things are possible, practical and affordable, there is **Wrestling Ernest Hemingway**, a movie so by-the-numbers the audience can feel it is part of the process: it can see every plot turn, and in some cases lines of dialogue, coming from light years away.

The setup is simple: crusty old sailor Frank (Richard Harris) is a cranky old man set adrift by his ingrate son in Sweetwater, Florida. He lives a meager existence, riding the front half of a bicycle built for

two (what he's doing with such a thing while living alone is never explained) around town, attending what must be the last revival movie theater in America, propositioning a spooky older woman (Piper Laurie) and complaining to his landlady (Shirley MacLaine, for no reason) about the lack of air conditioning.

Eventually, he meets Walter (Robert Duvall) a Cuban refugee (again, for no reason, other than to show off Duvall's accent, which is very good) ex-barber. Walter has his own problems, chiefly that he's fastidious to a fault, does the same thing every day, and has a crush on a local waitress (Sandra Bullock) who's so much younger than him it's truly embarrassing. Frank amount of dancing around each other, become friends.

That's it. That's the plot. Wrestling Ernest Hemingway isn't going anywhere, and it takes it's sweet time not getting there.

This is moviemaking so generic it should come in a plain white wrapper with black lettering. It's an old-guy buddy movie — The Odd Couple Goes Geriatric. There's even a skinny-dipping scene (the movie seems to believe we really want to see Richard Harris naked, since he is much of the time), which includes one gag Oscar and Felix would have discarded in favor of a one-liner about Murray's nose.

It's not even bad enough to be declared a total disaster — Duvall

easy charm, and Harris manages to show he really is a good actor, even if he always plays a variation on the same role. Duvall, on the other hand, is a good actor who proves it by burying himself under layers of character.

Anyone else who appears in this movie is merely window dressing. MacLaine is in maybe 20 minutes worth, and she has the next largest role. Bullock exists to give Duvall someone to moon after, and to smile and shake her head at the crazy hijinks these two nutty old boys can cook up. Laurie is there...well, that's still a mystery. The movie gets its title, by the way, from a tall story Frank likes to tell about his salad days at sea, a night when he met the he-man author of authors and had a glorious step outside with the man. Whether or not the story is true is entirely immaterial, but director Randa Haines (Children of a Lesser God; The Doctor) thinks we're interested, so we might as well humor her.

From the time the two main characters stand on a rock, overlook the ocean and relieve themselves together, we know exactly what this film is and where it will end. There is no use fighting it. But in the company of Schindler's List and Philadelphia, among others, Wrestling Ernest Hemingway will probably not garner the Oscar nominations it so clearly aims for. Too bad; these guys deserve it. Of course, they also deserve to be in a







Beating the odds


Good food, comfort and value have made Ferraro's a success By MICKI PUL SINELLI Culinary Correspondent have watched this restaurant grow from its humble beginnings. When it first opened, there was a pizza oven and counter in the back of the during room. It was half pizzeria, half dining room. The atmosphere was casual, but the food was creative and economical.

Now in its third year of operation, this family-run restaurant defies what others consider fine dining. You know — tablecloths, tuxedo-clad waiters and expensive prices! **Ferraro's** has none of these, but the dining room and

these, but the dining room and kitchen are managed with the utmost professional care.

Owner Joe Bonfantino manages the front while his partner-chef John Hrindo is in charge of the kitchen. Joe's sister, Maria, is one of the servers and John's wife, Ellen, is the hostess on weekends. On any given night you can expect to see Joe's parents helping, wherever necessary, when they are busy. As I said, family run, but in the most professional way.

Lattended a wedding reception there one weekday night. There were 45 of us. Joe managed the crowd like a virtuoso would his violin. He explained what our appetizers would be and how they were prepared. Next came our choices of entrees: no one ordered ahead of time as in most weddings. The whole evening went smoothly. Everyone there was impressed. At Ferraro's, servers are dressed in white shirt and bow tie. Ask a question about items on the menu and they will explain how it is prepared. You place your order with them, but it is served by busboys. After each course, silverware is replaced automatically. At the entrance to the restaurant is a small foyer, and to the right is a small service bar. A low divider separates the bar from the dining room. The front section of the dining rooms is composed of booths, seating four. There is a another divider separating the other half of the room. Tables of four are in the back, while seating for two are on the west wall. Surprisingly, the restaurant seats 60 comfortably. The color scheme is a pleasant mauve and rose. Hanging from the plain walls are a few large unframed modern paintings and several mirrors. The tables are formica, with no table cloths, and covered with paper place mats and napkins. Silk flower arrangements complete the table setting. Ferraro's menu is large with a wide assortment of appetizers, salads, soups and pasta as starters. Entrees include pasta (home made) seafood, chicken and yeal. Cost of appetizers range from \$2.50 for garlie bread with cheese to \$8.95 for a hot antipasto. There are 10 different pasta selections with 16 different sauces to choose from You can order them as appetizers (\$3.95 to \$5.95) or as entrees (\$6.95 to \$9.95). There are also eight baked pasta dishes at \$6.95. cach Scafood selections include flounder, salmon, shrimp, calamari and scallops. They will serve it plain broiled or with any of the six seafood sauces. Prices vary from \$10.95 for calamari to \$14.95 for a combination of shramp, scallops, clams and flounder. Sauces include fra diavolo, francese, oreganata and piccata. Chicken and yeal can also be order broiled or with a choice of 18 different sauces. Some of the selections are Dijonnaise, Davanay (with shrimp, mushrooms, cognae and a touch of cream), giambotta, Melenzano (eggplant, mozzarella and marinara), and nocciole (butter, hazelnuts, white wine, fresh ground pepper and balsamic vinegar). They are priced from \$9.95 for plain broiled to \$12.95 for saltimbocca. All seafood, chicken or yeal entrees come with your choice of salad, or a side order



The first order of the day is a complimentary bread basket of garlic twist and panella (round, crusty Italian bread). Both were delicious. My husband ordered the mozzarella en carozza (\$5.95). This was three pieces, lightly breaded and fried. It was served with a light marinara sauce.

I had one of the nightly specials, portobello mushrooms dipped in egg and sauteed with wine, butter and shallots and served in a light, brown sauce (\$6.95). I love mushrooms, and I love them served this way.

My husband's entree was veal arabbiata (\$10.95). This consisted of three tender pieces of veal, covered with capers, and served in a spicy brown sauce. I ordered a nightly special of swordfish steak (\$16.95). This quality swordfish was fresh, thick and served with capers, white wine sauce and shiitake mushrooms. It was pleasantly moist. Our waitress Maria brought over a dessert tray. When she said the ricotta cheese cake was made by her mother, I knew what my husband would be ordering. He's tasted her cheese cake before, so he knew before hand that it would be delicious. Ferraro's offers fine dining yet in a casual and comfortable surroundings. And all of this is at half the prices of the upscale restaurants. I guess that explains why they are always busy.
