Ferguson cites campaign financing, gun control

Mike Ferguson is not your father's Republican.

Underneath the tan pants and navy sports coat lies a politician who wants to bring reform to the halls of United States Congress.

Ferguson won the Republican primary election for the 7th Congressional District on June 6 and will face Democrat

Maryanne Connelly, the former Fanwood mayor making her second run for U.S. Congress, in the November election.

"The system is lacking people's confidence," said Ferguson this week, suggesting that special interests often have too much

influence on government. Campaign finance reform is in the spotlight this election year because of growing public cynicism toward fund-raising practices, and Ferguson said he believes the elimination of "soft money" would help to restore

some of the public's faith in its elected officials.

Ferguson had no estimate of how much his campaign would be spending on the current race, although he noted "we have had a lot of success in generating support."

Ferguson is not a career politician. A teacher, he currently teaches political science at Brookdale Community College in Lincroft. He also owns an educational consulting business. From his experience studying and participating in American government, he said, he understands the need for reform. There are fundamental and "common sense" reforms, Ferguson said. Clark man killed in accident

Motorcycle crash claims life on Springfield Ave.

WESTFIELD — A motorcycle accident Tuesday on Springfield Avenue claimed the life of a 30-year-old Clark resident.

Attila Kovacs of Richard Street in Clark was riding his motorcycle past the Echo Lake Country Club at approximately 4:12 p.m. Tuesday when he was struck by a vehicle making a left turn out of the club. The car was driven by 17-year-old Westfield resident Daniel Maus, who was not charged with any wrongdoing.

Westfield Police are still investigating the accident. As of press time, no criminal or motor vehicle charges had been made, and it did not appear any were pending.

Police said a third vehicle, driven by Miles Scott of Plainfield, was involved in the accident.

According to Lt. John Parizeau of the Westfield Police Department, witness reports and subsequent police investigations, the car driven by Maus was exiting Echo Lake Country Club and making a left onto Springfield Avenue. Kovacs was traveling towards E. Broad Street and was struck by the front right of the car.

Kovacs was thrown from his motorcycle into the oncoming traffic in the opposite lane, Parizeau said. He was then run over by the third vehicle, driven by Scott, according to police reports.

The Westfield First Aid & Rescue Squad responded to the scene and transported Kovacs to Grumpert Field, which was the closest possible space big enough to serve as a helicopter landing area. From Grumpert Field, Kovacs was airlifted by a Northstar helicopter to Morristown Memorial Hospital.

Welcome to America

The seventh-grade class at the Terrill Middle School in Scotch Plains held an "Ellis Island Arrival Day" simulation June 15, transforming the school gym into the Great Hall of Ellis Island, the first stop in America for millions of immigrants. The kids learned what the new arrivals had to go through — health examinations, literacy checks and a slew of questions designed to determine if the immigrants would make "good" Americans. Students — including 13-year-old Irish "immigrant" Adam O'Hara (left) — also heard from Vincent DiPietro, a U.S. Park Ranger assigned to Ellis Island, and several parents and grandparents who shared their immigration experiences. The event was part of a multi-discipline unit encompassing English, social studies, math and science classes.

... while SP eyes first mayoral vote

SCOTCH PLAINS — For the first time, Scotch Plains residents will be able to vote directly for their mayor this November. In an ironic twist, their choice comes down to the last two mayors appointed by the Township Council.

Incumbent Democratic Mayor Martin Marks is running for the township's top spot against last year's mayor, Republican Geri Samuel. Last November, residents voted in the new election structure, switching from the previous structure, in which five Township Council members were elected at large and during their January reorganization would choose a mayor from their own ranks.

Scotch Plains residents will also elect a new council member in November. Democrat Peter Trippett is running against Republican Paulette Coronato.

Marks was elected to the council in 1996 and is running to serve as mayor for a second term.

"I'm all in favor of the people voting for mayor," he said, noting that while he voted against the referendum question when the council was deciding whether to put it on the ballot, he voted for it as a private citizen on election day.

Marks said he wants to maintain an open and accessible government and was "upset by the way (the mayoral ballot question) was handled."

"It was rushed through with little public explanation," the mayor said, pointing out that Samuel appointed a committee to work on the open election ballot question — and appointed her husband to chair that committee. "It was handled inappropriately," he said.

That, however, is not the only big issue in town, the mayor added. "The issue that is number-one on residents' minds, and should be number-one in the minds of elected officials, is property taxes," said Marks, noting that for the first time in years, there was no property tax.



Westfield council, schools eye Elm Street auditorium upgrade

Space could be used for performing arts, town-wide archive

WESTFIELD — The town school board and the Town Council are both supporting a proposed renovation of the auditorium in the Elm Street Board of Education building.

The auditorium is currently being used for storage and under the plan would be renovated into a performing arts space that could double as a sort of town museum.

Neither the Town Council nor the school board will be contributing any funds toward the project, which "would only be able to succeed through grants, outside donations, or sponsorships," according to Board of Education President Darielle Walsh.

A group of volunteers will assemble over the summer to plan out a fund-raising strategy for the project. The group will include a citizens advisory committee as well as Town Council and Board of Education liaisons, and will examine a feasibility study that was done last year by architects while the Elm Street building was constructing a new elevator and planning new bathrooms.

The auditorium has the capability of seating up to 480 people, officials said.

Supporters of the project gathered at the Town Council's Tuesday night meeting.

Representatives of the Westfield Historical Society, the Westfield Symphony Orchestra, the town Chamber of Commerce, the Downtown Westfield Corp. and the Westfield Corporation were also in attendance.

"Westfield has a great downtown, but the one thing it is missing is a place for performing arts and a meeting place," said Michael LaPlace of the DWC, pointing out the Elm Street building is in the Special Improvement District — making the project eligible for grants.

"In town, we don't have a true business center, a true conference center," noted Councilman Gregory McDermott, who referred to the prospective project as "another jewel in Westfield's crown."

"This is almost a no-brainer," said Councilman Larry Goldman. "It is an unused asset to this town."

"I am challenging volunteers to be bold in their ideas and to think outside the box. Our community needs a community space."

The president of the Westfield Historical Society, Don Mokraver, told council members that plan had the society's support. "We do believe the auditorium could be used for a town museum and performing arts center," said Mokraver.

The society, according to its president, has amassed funds to renovate a property that was donated 50 years ago and was intended to house a town museum. During the public portion of Tuesday's meeting, Mokraver told the council the society was prepared to donate the funds to the Elm Street project if it included space to show exhibits and house town memorabilia and records.

The society also offered to help offset the costs of renovating the building's heating and air conditioning units, as well as the costs associated with stage and center floor remodeling.

Mokraver asked if the Board of Education planned to continue supplying maintenance and security. Officials said no plan for security or maintenance has yet been agreed upon.

Union brass expected to gather for County Alliance breakfast meeting

MOUNTAINSIDE — A gathering of more than 500 business, labor, government and professional leaders is scheduled to convene Tuesday at the Union County Alliance's Seventh Annual Breakfast Meeting.

The meeting is being held to honor state Senate President Donald T. DiFrancesco and Senator Raymond J. Lesniak.

It is scheduled to be held at L'Affaire Restaurant on Route 22 in Mountainside.

The Alliance is expected to unveil the special Millennium Report produced by Dr. James Hughes, the Dean of Planning and Public Policy at Rutgers University. Hughes, one of the state's foremost economic strategists, has hailed the "extraordinary economic turnaround" that had been achieved in record time and fully documented in his 60-page report, a copy of which will be presented to each of the breakfast meeting's attendees.

Also expected to address the event are honorees and keynote speakers DiFrancesco and Lesniak, who serve as co-chair-

men of the Alliance. Both will emphasize "Union County's tremendous progress."

DiFrancesco said in a June 20 press release that Union County's harbor resources are recognized across the nation and by global marketers as one of America's top three ports. "We, in Union County, are going to become known in markets throughout the world as the Portway to America," he declared in the press release.

Lesniak also applauded Union County in the press release, for providing the impetus for major expansions of maritime and trade-related investments. Lesniak discussed how the tremendous retail opportunities in county towns translates into further growth and prosperity for Union County and stated that Jersey Gardens Mall was truly "an American success story."

Daniel Sullivan, chairman of the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders, said in the press release that Union County is "brimming with exciting eco-

nomic development stories." Sullivan listed a wide range of projects related to economic development that are now nearing completion. "The Cross County Rail Link and the new Fort Master Plan send a clear signal that Union County will be ready for the new millennium," he said in the June 20 release.

Leading the breakfast meeting will be Union County Alliance Chairperson Dell Raudelunas, who will stress the program's theme, "A Celebration of Union County's Progress," and reiterate the visionary concepts and strategic directions identified in Hughes' Millennium Report.

According to Alliance President Henry Ross, Union County must continue to invest, innovate and develop new priorities to be prepared in the new century. Ross also noted in the press release the need to continue to rebuild and focus on the county's assets, primarily its industrial base, workforce and what he termed were its "incredible infrastructure and location."







Westfield mom has faith in schools

To The Editor:

I am the mother of nine children who have been educated in the Westfield school system for the past 18 years and will continue to be educated here for the next seven years. During those years we have experienced many changes to the curriculums in our school system. Despite these many changes and different philosophies throughout the years, my older children received an excellent education and I trust my younger children will also. The Westfield school system has more than adequately met the educational needs of my nine very similar yet very different children. My older children were afforded the opportunities to attend many fine universities and were more than adequately prepared for their higher educational experiences.

We are a very busy people, both adults and children alike. We look for absolutes yet there are no absolutes in anything that we do. Clearly the outcome of those things that we do is a product of our efforts. But effort takes time and we seem to have less time every day. It is far easier to critique someone or something than to take the time to more constructively work for a better end.

Several of my children were involved with the writing project when it was instituted a few years ago. We can easily critique it now as not having given our children adequate spelling, punctuation and grammar instruction. In the writing project our children were asked to put their ideas on paper without any mention to the above modalities. They needed to learn to express their thoughts on paper, to communicate their ideas and thoughts to others. They were then asked, however, to go back and correct spelling, punctuation and grammar to produce a finished product. When I critique my children on poor spelling and incorrect punctuation and grammar now I do not blame these mistakes on the language arts curriculum at that time. Why is it so much easier to blame it on others than to take ownership and admit that perhaps our children did not spend the needed time to proof their work and learn the proper punctuation, spelling and grammar? And perhaps that we, as parents, did not spend the necessary time with them to help them learn these skills.

Math has always been a hot topic in this town.

Our new math supervisor, Regina Kiczek, could assume her job and carry on the status quo. Or she could institute some worthy new programs into the curriculum for the betterment of our children. Please reread her letter to the editor (June 16). Did she say that she was abandoning skill development with the new math curriculum? I quote, "It is possible to emphasize conceptual development and student understanding without sacrificing skill proficiency."

My children were not in the pilot program for the new math curriculum last year but three of them, with three very different learning styles, will experience it next year. I have spoken with parents, staff and administrators in neighboring towns and in Westfield who applaud the new math curriculum. I value their expertise and have faith in their knowledge of the program. Clearly there are no absolutes in the new program. But my children will succeed with the new program because we have a dedicated and caring staff who will take the time to help them. And I as their parent will be there to support them when needed.

Change is often difficult and yet change is a necessary part of growth. It takes time and effort to change. In our society today time is a commodity that we do not have enough of and yet we need more of. What are our priorities? What do we need to make time for? Shouldn't time for our children be our top priority? Might they benefit from a new math curriculum that may take more time for us to understand? Many educators think so. I feel clearly that we need to place our faith in them, in our children and in ourselves. Are we concerned with a new curriculum because it's different or because it may take some time to understand it?

Clearly some discussion between parents, staff and administration is needed. In the fall as our children embark in the new program, I have great faith that our school system will provide that discussion and our children will succeed if we take the time to work constructively toward a productive goal. The outcome will indeed be determined by our efforts to constructively work together.

I'm not a cop, but I play one in real life

So there I was at this wedding reception in Scotch Plains, sidling up to the bar for another Dewars and trying to tune out the blaring "Electric Slide." These two guys off to the side were talking animatedly, and I leaned in for a better listening.

"He was out cold!" the first guy said. "His eyes were rolled all the way back in head!" said the second. "And there was so much blood!"

I figured they were discussing the De La Hoya/Mosley welter-weight bout — it was scheduled to take place at the same time as the wedding — and I asked who won. After a few confusing moments, I realized they were *not* talking about the boxing match; they suggested I take a peek at the hallway outside the banquet room.

The corridor was littered with tiny chunks of glass, chips of broken paneling and plenty of blood, puddled on the floor or smeared along the walls. A considerable brawl had erupted at another of the weddings in progress at the catering hall. At the first sign of blood, I quickly shed my identity as a mild-mannered party guest and became — *duuum!* — Media Man.

Media Man is sort of like Woody Allen's "Zelig" — he can be whoever he needs to, depending on the circumstances. He changes countenance like a chameleon changes hues. He blends in, becomes part of the scenery, a fly on the wall with big ears and a fast pen.

On this night, Media Man assumed my most-favorite of his myriad personae. Suddenly, I was Detective Z, hard-boiled cop.

I did not identify myself as a police officer (that's quite illegal), but as I milled around the shattered semblance of a wedding reception, wearing a nice suit and taking notes, surrounded by uniformed officers from Scotch Plains and Mountainside, I could see how somebody might have thought I was. When I approached wedding guests to ask questions, I mimicked a cop's mannerisms — serious expression, curt nod, a gruff, "What did you see, ma'am?"

I was Columbo without the raincoat, "NYPD Blue's" Bobby Simone before the heart transplant. Lisa, who was with me at the wedding and rarely gets to see me in action, said I looked "hot."

If anyone asked who I was — and whenever I talked to the real cops on the scene — I immediately identified myself as a newspaper editor. It's the rules; I have to. But if the guests of the ruined wedding didn't ask, I let them think whatever they wanted. And oh, yeah, I loved every minute of it.

When we were kids, my friends and I lapsed often into the world of make-believe. We would hop on our bikes and become the officers of "ChiPS," we argued constantly about who would play Luke Skywalker and who would be Han Solo. I never really got those flights of fancy out of my system.

Pretending is one thing, but the truth is I wouldn't make much of a police officer. I don't have the constitution to handle such a difficult job. Cops have to face the seeder side of humanity every day, the tragic and the evil and the bloody. It's not like TV, where a good guy with a pistol beats five bad guys with machine guns; it's not so easy to laugh off the horrors of true crime with a wisecrack and a smile. A cop's job is not about spectacular car chases, and mysteries are not always solved before the final credits.

My delusions are much more fun than actual police work. When the scenario is just right, I can mimic an officer and make myself giddy doing it, but deep down I know it's just a fantasy. They're a special breed, our men and women in blue, and even my fantastical figments give me insight into how difficult and complex their job really is.

In the end, this wedding-brawl turned into a better story than I'd thought — one of the more seriously injured brawlers was an off-duty cop from out of town. If I hadn't pulled on my Joe Friday mask, I might not have ascertained that.

Besides, I just *love* playing detective. Next week, I hope I can be a cowboy!





Westfield's 'Ghost Hunters' get into the supernatural spirit

High-speed cameras, gut feelings help spooky sleuths track orbs, vortexes and things that go bump in the night

WESTFIELD — While at a holiday party at the Cumberland Mansion in Maywood in late 1998, a party guest went to the bathroom and found he wasn't alone.

The ghost of a little girl appeared, walking through the bathroom door. The guest and the owner of the house investigated and found footprints opposite the bathroom door, trailing off in the heavy dust of a servant's staircase which had long been out of use.

The owners of the Victorian mansion, built in 1892 by the Heirs of the Cumberland Dairy Farm fortune, wanted to get to the bottom of this ghostly apparition, and other disturbances that had plagued the house. So they called Ghost Hunters Inc.

Not exactly in the same vein as the fictitious Bill Murray-Dan Akroyd firm featured in the 1984

film "Ghostbusters," the Westfield-based organization was founded six years ago by Jeff and Laura Muller. Its mission is to search out and obtain definitive evidence of the existence of life beyond the grave and other paranormal activity. The Mullers investigate cemeteries, private homes, businesses and college dormitories for evidence of preternatural activity.

Unlike the fictional "Ghostbusters," Ghost Hunters do not rely on spectacular laser guns or other fancy equipment to hunt their ghostly prey. In fact, while they do employ gadgets such as motion detectors and high-speed cameras, the Mullers' approach is far more intuitive. "Sometimes I know I'm in the presence of a spirit because my stomach starts to tingle," Jeff said.

The Ghost Hunters conducted an investigation of the Cumberland Mansion on Jan. 23, 1999. While following indications of an upstairs "aura," the investi-

gators heard a motion detector go off downstairs near the living room. The presence of a male spirit was located in a front parlor room, they said, and it was attracted to Jeff and seemed to follow him.

To confirm the presence of the spirit, Jeff stood in front of a wood-burning stove that emanated considerable heat. On one side of his body, he reported, he was very hot. On the right side, where the ghost purportedly was, he said he was completely cool. "The frigid space was like the sensation one gets from reaching into a freezer," he said.

The Mullers' findings concluded that two spirits inhabited the house: a girl approximately 6-8 years old and a man in his mid-30s. Research performed by Laura revealed that while holding a party at the house during the Prohibition Era, one of the owners fell down the staircase, broke his neck and died. That would match the older-man ghost, the Ghost Hunters noted, although Laura was unable to identify the little girl.

Jeff likes to tell how a ghost tour of the Spy House Museum in Port Monmouth seven years ago changed his life forever. The Spy House, though no longer open to the public, is considered one of the top five haunted locations in the United States, a veritable Mecca for East Coast ghost aficionados. The 300-year-old house operated as a tavern during the Revolutionary War, a pirate's residence and a brothel. It is presently owned and occupied by a pastor and his

family. The profuse smell of pipe smoke noted throughout the house is attributed to the ghost of Thomas Whitlock, the early innkeeper. "I couldn't believe how quickly the smell of the pipe smoke filled the rooms of this 300-year-old house," Jeff said. "There was also this little old lady who was the museum guide and a conduit for the ghost spirits in the house. The spirits would cause her stomach to protrude as if she were pregnant. Each spirit would cause her abdomen to protrude from a different spot."

Shortly after his visit to the Spy House Museum, Jeff realized there was no organization in New Jersey that investigated and quantified evidence of local spirit activity. The Mullers decided to fill the void and founded the New Jersey Ghost Hunters Society, an affiliate chapter of the International Ghost Hunters Society. Today, there are 100

members throughout the state and 300 members online.

The presence of a spirit, according to the Ghost Hunters, can be identified by tuning into energy disturbances in the immediate locale. A ghost hunter using any one of a number of ghost

hunting tools can detect these disturbances. Currently popular among ghost hunters are digital still video cameras, infrared night vision cameras, 35mm cameras with high-speed film, motion detectors and thermal scanners.

orbs, Laura said, they appear on film as energized balls of light. "When you point the camera to take a picture, you don't know if you've captured any orbs until the film is developed," she said.

Ouija boards

are notorious for drawing on the lesser, more negative spirits, she added, cautioning against the use of the boards. "We prefer to attract more benign, positive spirits while ghost-hunting," Laura said.

Such friendly spirits have been known to follow the Mullers home after a night of ghost-hunting in local

cemeteries, the couple said. Laura said ghosts are "locality-based," but will follow the light emanating from a strong aura.

One night, they said, a vortex appeared in their house, mistaking Laura's aura for the light of a heavenly destination.

"When objects in the house started to disappear or rearrange themselves," she said, "I proceeded to cleanse the house of the spirit by lighting a white candle and waving a smudge wand of white sage. The use of a smudge wand is a Native American practice that raises metaphysical vibrations in the house to a higher level unacceptable to spirits."

The spirit eventually left, Laura noted.

Mainstream organizations have also taken an interest in the Mullers' work.

The Ghost Hunters have presented their investigative findings to the Scotch Plains-Fanwood Historical Society, the Westfield Historical Society and Garden State Horror Writers Association.

New Jersey Ghost Hunters Society meetings are held regularly in the Community Room of the Westfield Municipal Building, located at 425 E. Broad St. Membership fee is \$10.



The good stuff

Carciofi imbottito

(Stuffed artichokes)

4 large artichokes
 1/2 cup Italian flat parsley, minced
 4 garlic cloves, peeled and minced
 3 tablespoons virgin olive oil
 1/4 cup water
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon pepper
 1/2 cup unflavored bread crumbs
 1/4 pound soppressato (sweet) salami, minced
 1/4 cup red pepper flakes (optional)

This week's recipe, *carciofi imbottito* (stuffed artichokes) can be served as an antipasto. To this special vegetable, as it is prepared, is quite popular in the Naples area of Italy. All of Italy uses the artichoke, but it is prepared so differently that it is amazing to see how many ways this vegetable can be prepared.

The preparation is really not too difficult — but you may find it to be a bit time consuming in the initial preparation. But in the end, it will be a delicious and surprising delight!

To enjoy an artichoke, take your time to savor every leaf and enjoy the stuffing as well. Don't rush yourself — it will be worth your time!

To prepare the artichokes, cut the stems off completely. With scissors, snip off the points of all the leaves, and cut level the artichoke tops.

Spread open the petals so you can get to the inner center of the choke, forming a cone. Scrape out the choke (it's light purple) using a serrated-tip spoon or a melon baller.

Soak the chokes and stems in lemon water while you prepare the stuffing — this will avoid choke discoloration.

Rinse well before stuffing.

Mince the stems and

combine them in a large bowl with the parsley, garlic, oil, water, salt, pepper, bread crumbs, soppressato and red pepper, which is optional but does give the dish a better flavor. Mix well.

Fill the cavity of each choke with one tablespoon of stuffing. Slowly separate the leaves and place the stuffing intermittently in the leaves.

The artichokes should be nice and full; give each choke a slight squeeze to compact the filling.

On the bottom of a baking pan, pour a combination of 1/4 cup oil and 1/4 cup water. Place the artichokes upright in the pan, placing them close together so they don't topple over.

Drizzle some of the water/oil mixture over the artichokes, then cover lightly with foil and pierce the foil with a fork, creating air vents.

Bake at 325 degrees for two hours. When you remove the foil, the chokes should be golden in color. Pour the liquid drippings over each choke to moisten them, and serve warm.

Battlefield Earth — It is the year 3000, the Psychlons have conquered Earth and enslaved most of its surviving humans, and their motive for coming billions of miles is gold. Tribal remnants of our kind hang out in woods and caves, fearing the Psychlons as monstrous gods. Despising humans, Terl (John Travolta) knows that torture is the best way to make a day shine. They beach on the mainland, also devastated. Most of the earth has become instantly

desert. They join up with a herd of stray dinos of all kinds and a brutal giant called Kron (voice: Samuel E. Wright) to lead the desperate journey. They are pursued by some snappish fiends who are like crocodiles on stilts, and then by giant "carnasaurs," the upgrade model of that old villain, T-rex. There is hardly a story, just the exhausting, fearful journey to a valley that might sustain them. In its lumbering, sometimes bloody way, it's some trip. Voices: D.B. Sweeney, Alfre Woodard, Ossie Davis, Julianne Margulies, Joan Plowright, Delta Reese. Running time: 1 hour, 21 minutes. Rated PG. 3 stars.

The Flintstones in Viva Rock Vegas — Fred (Mark Addy) and best buddy Barney (Stephen Baldwin) have graduated from Bronto Crane Academy and secured jobs at the Bedrock rock quarry. Enter Bronto King waitress Betty O'Shale (Jane Krakowski) and her mysterious girlfriend Wilma (Kristen Johnston), an heiress and daughter to Colonel (Harvey Korman) and Pearl Slaghoople (Joan Collins). Fred and Barney encounter The Great Gazoo (Alan Cumming), a little green man sent to observe the mating rituals of humans. After a disastrous visit to Wilma's parents, Fred and Wilma, along with Betty and Barney, take a trip to Rock Vegas. It's there that chaos ensues and the plot goes downhill. The film's shortcomings not only lie in the plot but with the actors. It's the Flintstones ... but not here. Cast: Mark Addy, Stephen Baldwin, Kristen Johnston, Jane Krakowski, Thomas Gibson, Alan Cumming, Harvey Korman, Joan Collins. Running time: 1 hour, 32 minutes. Rated PG. 2 stars.

Frequency — The story centers on a cop in present-day New York who makes contact with his long-dead father via ham radio transmissions from the past. In "Frequency," the time-warp arrives courtesy of solar flares, which trigger a psychedelic display of the aurora borealis over New York,

along with magnetic fields so strong they pry open a portal for dad's transmissions to beam in from 1969. It is that the son, John (Jim Caviezel) has just that day hauled his father's old radio set out and hooked it up. When the two first talk, it is on the eve of the '69 World Series. John is able to pass on Series details that have yet to happen in Frank's time. It develops that John, having saved fireman Frank from his death in a warehouse blaze, has also somehow set a serial killer on the loose - with his mom as an eventual victim. "Frequency" probably won't rewrite the history of time-bending movies, but the movie works in enough dimensions to make it a pleasant one-way trip. Cast: Dennis Quaid, Jim Caviezel, Andre Braugher, Elizabeth Mitchell, Noah Emmerich. Running Time: 2 hours, 1 minute. Rated PG-13. 2 1/2 stars.

Gladiator — It's 180 A.D., yet with no sign of Christianity. In Rome, the debased citizenry gets its kicks at the Coliseum. Far up north in Germania, the legions slaughter inept hordes of hairy Teutons, by order of Marcus Aurelius (Richard Harris). He seeks to leave the empire to a decent farmer turned ruthless general, Maximus (Russell Crowe). Marcus' son, Commodus (Joaquin Phoenix), is worthless, preening, rather foppish. He suffocates dad, weeping with both love and hate. By then, Maximus has escaped murder in Germania and, though badly wounded, rides on one horse all the way to Spain to find that his son has been trampled by imperial cavalry, then crucified (so has the boy's mother). Next, his wound still festering, he is in what looks like North Africa, as an enslaved gladiator. "Gladiator" is a cheese-ball colossus. Rome had to fall, of course, but this far? Cast: Russell Crowe, Joaquin Phoenix, Connie Nielsen, Oliver Reed, Derek Jacobi, Richard Harris, Djimon Hounsou. Running time: 2 hours, 12 minutes. (Elliott) Rated R.

High Fidelity — In the face of rather nasty odds, the people behind "High Fidelity" have managed to turn Nick Hornby's witty cult novel into a witty mainstream film. John Cusack stars as the thirlyish owner of both a failing record store and a recently broken heart, and his every-guy decency and scruffy movie-star charisma help turn this vinyl-

loving commitment-phobe into a charming, sympathetic hero. Thanks to invaluable support from Jack Black and Todd Louiso (as Cusack's fellow record-store geeks) and Iben Hjejle and Catherine Zeta-Jones (as the charismatic women in Cusack's life), and a near-fanatical loyalty to Hornby's hilarious prose, "High Fidelity" examines relationships with wiseacre delicacy. And of course, the soundtrack rocks. 120 minutes. Rated R. 3 1/2 stars.

Love and Basketball — Part sports drama, part romance, "Love & Basketball" does remarkable justice to both. First-time director Gina Prince-Blythewood, who also wrote the script, is a former college track star with a fine eye for filming muscles in motion. But she also weaves in a funny, tender tale of a boy and girl who start out as rivals in neighborhood pick-up games and grow up to be lovers, friends and feuding hoop stars. Omar Epps and Sanaa Lathan, the two leads, inhabit the roles with seeming ease, both on the court and in the courting. Once in a while, the movie stoops to Cinderella-story cliche (and it manages to place the NBA's Clippers in L.A. in 1981; the hapless team actually stayed in San Diego until 1984). But "Love & Basketball" radiates such intelligence and authenticity - and Lathan such star presence - that its foibles are easily forgivable. 118 minutes. Rated PG-13. 3 1/2 stars.

Road Trip — The low-key Breckin Meyer stars as Josh, your basic decent guy chafing at the demands of a long-distance romance. In a moment of weakness, he succumbs to the potent charms of Beth (Amy Smart). In a moment of stupidity, they videotape their tryst, which — in a moment of plot convenience — Josh's roommate accidentally mails to Josh's beloved Tiffany (Rachel Blanchard). In addition to our hero, there is E.L., the Cute Slick Guy (Seann William Scott); Rubin, the Ethnic Smart Guy (Paulo Costanzo); and Kyle (DJ Qualls), the Pathetic Loser With the Car. 

Here are some helpful tips for international travelers

(ARA) - What happens if you break a leg in China or are involved in an automobile accident in Mexico? Who do you call? Where do you go for help? How long will it take to get assistance?

Can you afford to pay, in case you have to be hospitalized? And what happens if you have to be evacuated?

According to International SOS, the world's largest medical,

security, personal and travel assistance company, situations like these happen virtually every day. And if you aren't prepared in advance, these types of situations can spin out of control, both emotionally and economically. The key is being prepared for the unexpected in advance of traveling overseas.

The following tips can save leisure travelers, and their families at home, time, money and aggravation prior to, and during their trips.

- Try to learn a few key words and phrases in the language of the country you're visiting and read up on its history and culture. Every country is different. Don't

assume everyone speaks or understands English.

- Review pre-trip information including booklets from the State Department's Bureau of Consular Affairs and check relevant sites on the Web. You can never know too much about where you're going.

- Do not accept packages from strangers regardless of the circumstances. Anyone who has seen "Midnight Express" knows why. Plus security at airports has increased due to the numbers of terrorist incidents worldwide.

- Take credit cards with you to assure that you get the most favorable exchange rates, and know your credit limits in advance of leaving the U.S.; cards recognized internationally include: Visa, AMEX, MasterCard and Diners Club.

- Update your immunizations against childhood and other diseases. The Centers for Disease Control's Web site is a good source of information about infectious diseases across the globe.

- Be sure to take enough medications with you for your trip, and keep all prescription drugs in the original containers with the generic names clearly marked on the labels. Also, bring other supplies that might not easily be available where you're going.

- Avoid tap water, ice cubes and local dairy products when overseas and eat only well-cooked foods that are still hot. Also avoid salads, uncooked vegetables, raw seafood and foods sold at roadside stands. No one wants to be laid up because of being too adventurous about local foods.

- Prepare an itinerary in advance with contact numbers.

- Make two copies of your air-

line ticket, passport and other documents in the event yours are lost. Keep one copy in a safe location other than your luggage. The second copy should be given to your family for safekeeping.

- Know the laws and penalties for alcohol and/or drug-related offenses, such as drunk driving, and act accordingly. Be aware of the laws pertaining to sexual relations and make certain to bring protection with you.

- Obtain an international driver's license if you plan on driving while abroad.

- Beware of pickpockets, "too good to be true" scams and other situations where diversionary tactics can take your mind off what you're doing.

- Contact International SOS or another assistance company immediately if arrested or in an accident. Laws may differ by country, so having someone who knows the laws and speaks the language becomes extremely important.

- Fasten your seat belts when riding in an automobile. According to recent statistics, automobile accidents now top the list as the number one reason for fatalities overseas.

- Don't be a "show off" and display expensive jewelry, watches or other signs of wealth, especially in countries where there have been anti-American demonstrations.

- Consider purchasing a medical, personal and travel assistance membership that will provide you with 24-hour emergency services including worldwide legal assistance, emergency message transmission to the member's family, emergency medical evacuation, and much more, for the duration of your trip.

Don't forget to eat healthy on vacation

(NAPS) You can take it with you. A healthy diet that is. Here are some healthy eating tips from the National Nutritional Foods Association:

Before you start your trip, think ahead:

• Are you flying? Most airlines offer a variety of vegetarian meals, which are typically lower in calories and fat content. Ask for your meal when you book your ticket and confirm your request one week and also 24

hours prior to flight departure.

• Request a hotel room with a mini refrigerator to store things like nonfat yogurt, fresh fruits and raw vegetables for snacking.

• Nuts, pretzels, rice cakes, plain popcorn or dried fruit, such as apricots and apples, are low fat, non-perishable snacks for a car trip or an afternoon away from home. Watch out for dried banana chips, as the calories and fat contents resemble potato chips.

• Prepare different vegetables to snack on: cucumbers, jicama and broccoli have great flavor. Try dipping veggies in nonfat dressing for added flavor.

• Applesauce, raisins and fruit cups are available in pre-packed individual servings handy to munch on while sight seeing.

• High fiber crackers that are

low in fat are a good choice—whole grain or whole rye. For the youngsters, bring along graham crackers or animal crackers.

• Instead of mayonnaise, which is high in fat, try low fat spreads such as jam or jelly, mustard or nonfat margarine.

After struggling with consistency throughout the regular season, the Westfield High boys lacrosse team finished the year 10-8 with a loss to Delbarton in the second round of the state tournament.

The Blue Devils felt they had the team to advance at least as far as the quarterfinals and possibly even the semifinal round, but up and down play during the regular season resulted in a difficult seed and the second round match-up with eventual state champion Delbarton.

"I thought it was a successful season," said Head Coach Gerry

In colonial America, lighthouses were built initially at busy harbors. The New World's first lighthouse was located at Boston and illuminated on 14th September 1716. More were to follow, some at busy ports and others placed on prominent headlands or dangerous stretches of the Atlantic coast.

The Highlands of Navesink was one such headland. Rising 200 feet above sea level, the heights were observed by all the early navigators. Henry Hudson sailed his ship Half-Moon into Sandy Hook Bay in 1609. Robert Juet, a ship's officer, kept a detailed log of the sailing. On 2nd September he wrote "far to the Northward of us we saw high hills. This is a very good land to fall with and a pleasant land to see." The next day Juet noted "The morning 'mystie' untilten of the clocke, then it cleared, and the wind came out of the Southwest so we weighed anchor and stood to the Northward. The land is very pleasant and high and bold to fall with all."

And for mariners approaching the Jersey coast it was indeed a very good land to fall with. The commanding heights

of the Highlands of Navesink made it a welcome daymark. That was not so at night, or in fog, and in the early 18th century a beacon and fog signal cannon was emplaced at the site.

In the mid-1700's, New York merchants erected there "commodius lighthouse for the security of navigation." Little is known of that light, but it probably was a tower lit by burning pots of oil raised at night. The Highlands light was mentioned in a 1765 history of New Jersey and is believed to have been constructed in 1756. A British document written in 1776 stated the Loyalists "found means to pass the guard at the Highlands near the Lighthouse."

Construction of the first Twin Lights was completed in 1828. The light station consisted of identical, but unconnected, octagonal towers and a keeper's dwelling. The towers were made of blue split stone and stood 320 feet apart. The focal plane of the north tower was 246 feet above sea level.

The beginning of a series of "firsts" associated with Twin Lights occurred in 1841. Some years earlier the French physicist Augustin Fresnel had revolutionized the lighting of lighthouses with his development of the lens bearing his name. They resembled huge bee hives of glass surrounding a lamp.

Prisms at the top and bottom refracted, or bent, the lamp's light so that its rays were focused at the center and intensified by a magnifying glass. The refraction and magnification of light produced a bright, narrow sheet of concentrated light.

Developed in 1822 and adopted by most European nations, America was slow in recognizing the Fresnel lens as the ultimate in lighting devices. In 1838, Congress sent US Navy Commodore Matthew C. Perry to the continent to study European lighthouses. He purchased a firstorder and secondorder lens

and in 1841 they were installed in the Navesink Light Station. It was America's first use of the Fresnel lenses.

In 1841, the Lighthouse Board reported the Twin Lights were the "best on the coast of the United States." But, it also found the dwellings and outbuildings in serious need of repair.

Rather than rehabilitate the 1828 station, the Board decided to construct new towers. Work began in 1861 and was completed on 1st May the following year.

Strangely enough, architect Joseph Lederle chose to make the south tower square and the north tower octagonal. The lighthouse was built of brownstone quarried at Belleville, New Jersey. Total cost of construction was \$74,000.

The fortresslike Twin Lights continued to add to its list of "firsts" for U.S. lighthouses. In 1883 it became the initial first order light station to use mineral oil (kerosene)Twin Lights was the first primary seacoast light to be electrically powered with the installation of an electric arc bivalve lens in the south tower. Its nine-foot diameter produced 25,000,000 candlepower. It may be seen on display in the lens exhibit building adjacent to the south tower.

The beam of the light was visible for 22 miles and its "glooming," or reflection in the night sky, could be seen from 70 miles at sea.

Local residents complained the powerful light kept their cows awake at night and the animals refused to give milk in the morning. A happy compromise was reached with the installation of blackout panels on the landward sides of both towers.

In 1960 the Navesink Attendant Light Station became a New Jersey State Historic Site. It is administered by the Department of Environmental Protection, Division of Parks and Forestry, State Park Service.

Garden State caters to the eco-tourist

Unique birds soaring in the sky. The beauty of a new blossom in spring. A breath of fresh air on a smoky-blue mountain ridge. That's the Garden State.

From the scenic mountains of the Skylands and the unique Pinelands to the habitats of the Atlantic Coast and Delaware Bay, New Jersey is brimming with ecological resources.

Indeed, the mixture of natural beauty with arboretums, environmental and nature centers, as well as planetariums and zoos, gives naturalists and ecologists many reasons to visit.

One of the most popular stops on many hikers' trails is the Great Swamp National Wildlife Refuge

which is found in the northern corner of the state, known as the Skylands Region. Located in Basking Ridge, the refuge is a sprawling 7,500-acre nesting ground for a beautiful array of birds. Nature lovers can take in the sights by strolling down the half-mile boardwalk or 10 miles of marked trails. Two observation blinds are also within the refuge.

As its name would indicate, the Skylands is home to the state's most elevated site. High Point State Park is 1,802 feet above sea level and offers a spectacular view, especially in the fall. A War Memorial, measuring 220 feet in height and commemorating the state's valiant lost soldiers, can also be seen at the park.

Something more down to earth can be found at the Space Farms Zoo and Museum in Beemerille. It offers 100 acres of plush countryside and is home to one of the largest collections of North American wildlife in the world.

For those more interested in botany, the New Jersey State Botanical Garden at Skylands offers 96 acres of gardens surrounding the 44-room Skylands Manor.

Another point of interest for botanists is the Willowood Arboretum in Chester that displays more than 3,500 varieties of native and exotic plants.

Traveling east to the Gateway Region, nature lovers will find an abundance of parks, forests, lakes and other ecological sites that offer spectacular views and interesting wildlife. In Englewood, the Flat Rock Brook Nature Center is a 150-acre nature preserve with 3-1/2 miles of walking trails. For a more challenging look at nature, ecotourists can trek to the Watchung Reservation in Mountainside. Here, they can choose from trails to hike or bike, and afterwards, plenty of open terrain is available to lay a blanket and enjoy a picnic.

Those interested in the pleasures of the sea can tour the National Park Service's Coastal Heritage Trail which has five themes - historic settlements, for information, call (800) JER-SEY-7 or connect to www.state.nj.us/travel, the Internet site of the New Jersey Commerce & Economic Growth Commission.

How to make bicycling in the Garden State a fun and safe experience

Bicycle riding is a popular outdoor recreational activity in New Jersey.

The following tips are designed to help get the most fun out of bicycle touring, whether it be a ride around the block or a multi-day tour:

1. Plan ahead

Think about where you want to go and what you want to see. If you are planning your own route, for an extended trip, start out by selecting a general route corridor, then refine the route using large scale county maps.

Plan "bail-out" points in case you have to quit early. Know if and how public transportation will carry your bike (many carriers require bikes to be boxed). Use these questions to guide tour planning: Do you want companions? Do you want to camp? Stay in hotels or motels?

Is your proposed tour practical or realistic for your level of experience, conditioning and available time?

2. Gain experience

Join bicycling club or organization. There are many active bicycling clubs in New Jersey and national organizations such as the League of American Wheelmen and Adventure Cycling. Talk to experienced riders. Read some of the many excellent publications on bicycling which are available.

3. Get in condition

Take short rides first, then gradually increase the length of your rides. For extended tours, practice riding with a loaded bike. Try an overnight trip to a nearby camping area or town. You might try borrowing or renting equipment before purchasing your own.

4. Make sure your bike and other equipment is well-maintained

The bike should be in proper working order for every ride. A poorly maintained bike is inefficient, and subject to breakdowns which could lead to an accident or injury. Keep tires

inflated to proper air pressure.

5. Carry basic maintenance tools to make emergency repairs

A spare tube, patch kit, pump, tire irons, and a few basic tools for emergency repairs. Know how to use them.

6. Make sure your bike is properly fitted

Position your saddle height so leg is slightly bent when pedal is in down position. Handlebars should be slightly lower than saddle.

7. Obey the rules of the road

In New Jersey, as in most states, bicycles have basically the same rights and responsibilities as motorized traffic. Ride with traffic, never facing it. Observe signals, stop and yield signs. Remember, sidewalks are for pedestrians.

8. Use common sense

Anticipate motorists' errors such as pulling out of driveways without looking, making turns in front of you, or opening car

doors into your travel path. Be alert for road hazards such as drainage grates, potholes, glass, or other debris.

9. Wear a helmet

This will minimize the possibility of disabling head injuries in the event of a spill or collision. Wear brightly colored clothing to make yourself visible. Try to avoid riding at sunrise, sunset, or into the sun. If you must ride at night, use lights, white in front, red in rear; it's the law in New Jersey. Use supplemental lights, arm lights or flasher and reflectors; don't rely on reflectors alone.

10. Drink before you're thirsty

Eat before you're hungry, rest when you're tired. Carry water with you. Cool water is the best drink. For longer rides carry some snack food. Know what to do for hypothermia, heat stroke, cuts and scrapes, and other minor medical problems you might encounter.

Ford will unveil the new Escape

California will get first crack at the 2001 Ford Escape when it goes on sale in late summer.

The first 500 sport-utility vehicles off the assembly line in Kansas City will be shipped west, where they will vie for public attention with the Honda CR-V, a redesigned Toyota RAV4, the all-new Hyundai Santa Fe, the Pontiac Aztek, the PT Cruiser and others.

The official on-sale date won't be until August or September, but vehicles could be arriving in late July.

The front-wheel-drive, five-passenger Escape will be a formidable competitor in this class and is likely to take a chunk out of Explorer sales, which have been running at about 30,000 a month for several years.

"If it's a better product, better we do it than the competition," says Paul Linden, Escape's project manager.

Escape has about the same passenger space as the Explorer but has less towing and cargo capacity. It's a combination that will make a better family-type station wagon than the Explorer because it will get a little better fuel mileage.

It also has a lower center of gravity for more on-road stability and easier passenger loading.

This newest and smallest sport-utility vehicle represents a new direction in truck making for Ford. It is the first front-wheel-drive truck and the first to have unibody design and four-wheel independent suspension.

It's also the first new vehicle since Ford's announcement at its shareholder meeting in May that its SUVs were harmful to the environment and overpowering in collisions with smaller vehicles.

Also, the Escape is the first joint-engineering exercise with Mazda, which did the larger part of the job.

Escape's size, smaller purchase price, better fuel economy and lower maintenance costs will be attractive to car people who have wanted a SUV but have resisted the temptation, Ford says.

"We think there are whole bunch of people out there who want to get into a SUV, but I don't think we know how big that market is yet," Linden says.

About 80 percent of the people who own small utilities use their vehicle as a commuter, so fuel economy and on-road stability are important considerations.

The package, with room for four adults, will appeal to couples and young families. About 70 percent of the sales will be first-time SUV buyers, Linden says.

Escape is the corporate cousin to the Mazda Tribute, which shares engine, suspension, transmission and other

internal elements, but is special in styling except for glass, roof and tail lamps.

The Tribute suspension is tuned for a more sport-sedan-like ride, while the Escape is a little truckier for more off-road use, says chief platform engineer Keith Takasawa.

The factory in Kansas City has capacity to build 260,000 vehicles a year. About 200,000 will go to various versions of Escape, the rest to Mazda.

Ford will sell Escape in more than 150 markets around the world, using the Maverick name outside of North America.

It will be offered in two models in two or four-wheel drive with two engine choices - both certified as low-emission vehicles.

The base XLS model with a 130-horsepower, 2-liter four-cylinder engine (also used in the Focus) and five-speed manual transmission has a starting price of \$18,160, including the \$515 destination charge. Add \$1,625 for the Control Trac II automatic four-wheel drive.

Karsian visits legislators in Washington to lobby for end of 'death' taxes

WASHINGTON — Andrea Karsian of Autoland of New Jersey, Inc. in Springfield was on Capitol Hill to urge Congress to support consumer choice in the automotive marketplace and eliminate death taxes, which can destroy family-owned businesses.

Karsian met with Congressman Bob Franks and a representative from Senator Lautenberg's office. Among the issues discussed, Karsian called for a freeze on corporate average fuel economy (CAFE) requirements for light trucks.

An increase in CAFE could deprive consumers of vehicles that have historically low gas mileage — pickups, minivans and sport-utility vehicles, potentially eliminating from the market some of the most popular vehicles on the road.


In addition, Karsian asked for support of H.R. 8, the Death Tax Elimination Act, which would phase-out estate or "death" taxes over

the next ten years. "Death taxes can be a death sentence for family-owned automobile dealerships," Karsian told her members of Congress.

The majority of automobile dealerships are family-owned businesses, some of which have been in the family for generations. Upon the death of the dealer principal, surviving heirs must pay death taxes of up to 55 percent of the estate's total value to the federal government. To pay these unreasonably high taxes, heirs often must sell the business, break it up or liquidate their assets.


