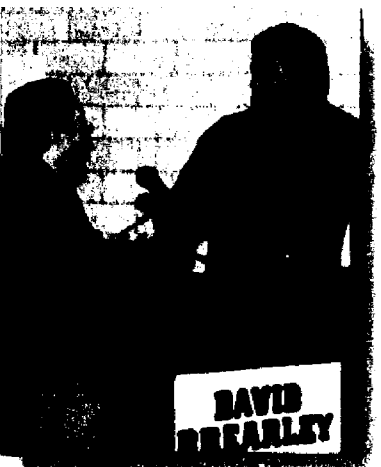

Adult room dropped from cyber lounge plan

FANWOOD — After a Planning Board debate on what one defines as "adult viewing," Alex Kovalyov agreed Monday to provide Internet filtering and eliminate the adult-only viewing lounge from his proposed cyber lounge.

Members of the Planning

Board expressed its concern and the public's disapproval of the proposed Internet café with a room set aside for adult content. However, Kovalyov said that his idea had been misinterpreted and many people developed prejudices based on a newspaper account that portrayed the lounge in a negative light.

"The word 'adult' has taken a negative connotation lately," said

Kovalyov, a Fanwood resident since 1996. "My concern was for a child playing a video game sitting next to an adult shopping for lingerie."

According to Kovalyov, he put in the viewing room in the proposed cyber lounge at South and Martine avenues to protect children and not to infringe on people's constitutional rights to view whatever they choose. After a pri-

vate discussion with his attorney, Kovalyov decided to eliminate the viewing room.

"I think it is totally objectionable," said Planning Board Chairman Gregory Cummings. "The connotation I got sends the wrong message of what this lounge could be about and what this community is about."

After Kovalyov conceded the viewing room, the board ques-

tioned how web activity would be monitored, particularly since most cyber café customers are adolescents. Kovalyov said that unlike computers at the library, the cyber lounge units would be linked to one central computer manned by a monitor. He says that it would be capable of filtering adult sites.

Lawmakers take on FAA over air noise

Rep. Mike Ferguson, R-District 7, demanded a federal investigation into changes in airline routes of flights arriving into Newark and LaGuardia airports that have increased air noise over residential areas in Central Jersey.

Ferguson, along with Sen. Robert Torricelli, sent a letter to Kenneth Mead, inspector general of the Department of Transportation, requesting an investigation into allegations by the New Jersey Coalition Against Air Noise that the Federal Aviation Administration falsified documents and failed to follow proper procedures in changing air routes.

In the letter, Ferguson and Torricelli charged that the FAA was required to notify elected officials and residents about air pattern changes. However, they said that the FAA failed to do so and falsely stated that they had on an official document. The FAA declined to comment.

"If the allegations are found to be true, it would be most disturbing," Torricelli said. "If we don't have trust in our federal govern-

ment, then we cannot have a successful democracy. Air noise affects the daily lives of thousands of New Jersey residents and we must ensure that decisions being made on this issue are done legally and follow the FAA's own procedures."

The FAA announced and implemented the new air routes, called the Yardley-Robbinsville Flip-Flop, in December 2001. The announcement came as a surprise to state delegates and residents, who were supposed to be consulted on changes to East Coast airspace, according to a report by Ferguson and Torricelli.

Under the National Environmental Policy Act, the FAA is required to conduct environmental assessments before altering airspace. The report further stated that the FAA did not conduct an environmental assessment because they said that the changes had 'no significant noise or other environmental impacts' and 'no communities experienced a significant increase in noise.'

However, Ferguson asserted that many residents are dealing with significant increases in air

Westfield board voting Tuesday on open lunch

WESTFIELD — In response to parents' request for a stricter enforcement of Westfield High School's Open Lunch Policy, a committee of parents, teachers, students and administrators set a new enforcement policy that was presented to the Board of Education and will be voted on at Tuesday's meeting.

Westfield High's open lunch policy permits juniors and

seniors to leave school during their lunch periods to eat off-campus. The privilege was granted to seniors in 1988 and juniors in 1991. Aside from isolated incidents and violations such as cutting class and lateness, there have been no major problems with student conduct, according to high school Principal Robert Petix.

However, a group of parents complained that the policy was not being enforced and freshmen and sophomores were taking part

in the open lunch. Further, parents argued that some students loiter and engage in illicit activities during the lunch period. To help enforcement, many parents suggested limiting the open lunch to seniors. Westfield is one of the only local communities that allows juniors to leave campus during lunch.

"The parents felt that because (enforcement) was out of control and because there are so many empty homes and they were aware of drug use and sexual

activity happening during lunch time, to restrict it to seniors would help community members and police monitor the kids they saw downtown and on the streets during the day," said Ellen Anderson, who has a child attending high school in the fall.

After three meetings, the committee drafted new enforcement measures. They decided to continue to allow juniors to participate in the open lunch. Students and parents are required to sign a contract indicating their will-

ingness to comply with the rules of the Open Lunch Policy.

In addition, students must wear color-coded photo identification cards to distinguish them from underclassmen. There will be designated entry and exits doors to monitor those leaving campus. The board is also considering hiring a staff member to patrol the area verifying that those leaving campus are upperclassmen.

Scotch Plains backs property tax reform

The League of Municipalities and local government officials are pushing a bill that calls for a state Constitutional Convention on property tax reform. However, the bill has stalled in the Senate Judiciary Committee and is unlikely to reach the Senate before the summer recess.

If the bill is passed and signed by Aug. 27, a question could be placed on the November ballot for voters to decide whether or not they want a Constitutional Convention addressing property tax reform. The state's last Constitutional Convention was in 1966.

"The Legislature had three decades to do something and they haven't," said William Dressel, executive director of the League of Municipalities. "A Constitutional Convention with

delegates voted by the people is the best way to deal with the issue ... We get sick and tired of the Legislature giving lip service to the number one issue confronting every taxpayer in the state."

Property tax is the main source of revenue for municipalities, as it funds the local government and public schools. According to the League of Municipalities, there is an over-reliance on property tax in the state, which causes a burden to residents and businesses alike.

"The number one item for my constituents and the number one complaint is property taxes. That's consistent from my town to the next," said Scotch Plains Mayor Martin Marks. "The only revenue to fund local government and public schools is the property tax. It's the most unfair tax, it's a regressive tax. We've run out of

notches on our belt to tighten and we need (the state Legislature) to do something about it."

The idea of a Constitutional Convention was first proposed last legislative session by former Sen. Bill Schluter.

If the Legislature approves it, the convention would be on the ballot in November. Delegates for the convention would be elected and the convention could be held next spring.

The bill's sponsors set criteria stating that the reform must be revenue neutral, eliminate inequalities in the current system, reduce the property tax portion of the overall revenue mix, provide alternatives that lessen government dependence on property taxes and provide alternative means for funding local services, such as increases in other taxes.

Dressel admits that the proposed bills are not perfect and there are still issues to work out concerning property tax reform. He sees the Constitutional Convention as a means of pushing an issue that has been ignored.

"The problem is that the Legislature has failed in any way, shape or form to address this issue. It's irrelevant to me whether it's a Constitutional Convention or a legislative proposal. We don't care what the vehicle for property tax reform is, we just want it to occur," Dressel said.

Marks added: "The whole purpose of the Constitutional Convention is to get to the table and discuss it. Everyone is worried about the final outcome and we're never going to get to the table to address the issue."

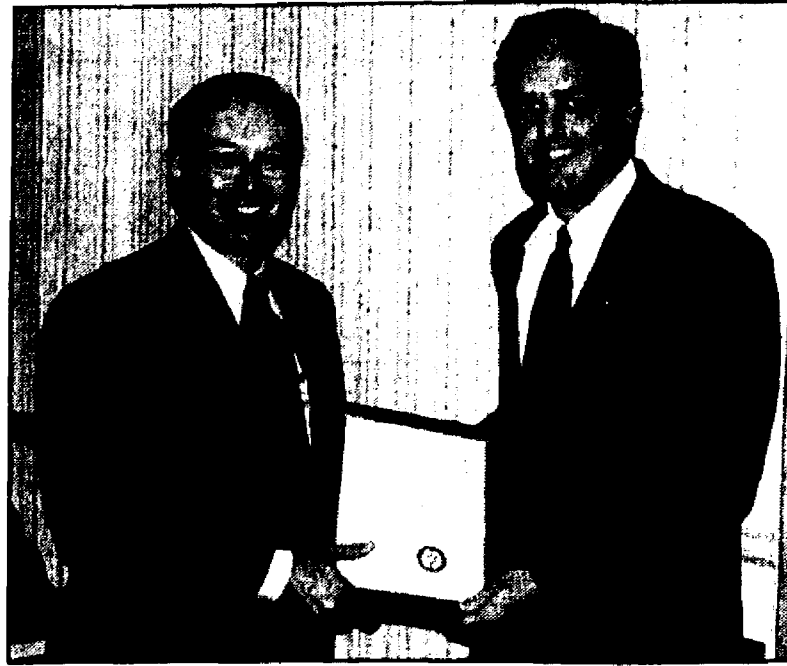

developing the appropriate culture at the high school," said Ginny Leiz, a board member who sat on the committee. "It's important students recognize that it's a revocable privilege."

The fact that the principal can revoke open lunch due to excessive violations is emphasized throughout the enforcement policy. Students violating the policy will face a graduated consequence system that includes loss of free periods for initial violations, and suspension and loss of open lunch privilege for multiple violations.

Each year, sophomore and junior class officers must submit written requests to the principal for open lunch privileges in the following year, according to the policy. The principal may revoke the privilege of the entire class based on a pattern of violation.

"There aren't standards set on how the board is going to judge how students have to request it each year," said Board Member Lisa Alter in disapproval of the yearly request policy. "If I were a student, I would find it demeaning. That bothers me."

Petix asserted that there are general standards by which he can judge the requests, and unless there are significant violations, he wouldn't have reason to deny a request. Furthermore, the Code of Conduct will be stressed in separate class meetings each school year and parents of incoming freshmen will be informed of the policy as well.

"This is a reaffirmation of a very successful, long-term policy," said resident Peter Coriasco. "My son graduated last year and I know he did come to our house (during lunch) with some of his friends. If he was going to do something wrong during those 40 minutes it's no different than when he came home at 2:45 and my wife and I weren't there. This is something that parents need to understand ... I learned that when you argue with success, usually you create failures. And this is a successful story."

However, the majority of parents who spoke at the Board of Education meeting were still against permitting juniors the privilege.

Students work at honing their job skills

CRANFORD — "No Child Left Behind" may be the new federal credo, but it's been the driving belief behind Carolyn LaCorte's "Crafty Caterers" project for years.

Every day, LaCorte works with

students of varying learning abilities to develop work and life skills, and to ease the transition from the classroom to the workplace. "We really try to focus them on getting a job and keeping a job, on perseverance," she said. "I try for a pretty high success rate."

The "Crafty Caterers" project,

part of Cranford High School's "Career Pathways" program, began 20 years ago with a student-prepared weekly faculty luncheon, still one of the most popular parts of the project. It has grown since then to include a crafts boutique, an after-school catering program and the preparation of take-out meals for the faculty, and earlier this year the project was awarded a state "Best Practices" honor in the workplace-readiness category.

Students in the program, many of whom are developmentally disabled, do take core academic classes such as English, history and science, LaCorte said. But that curriculum is fully integrated with the life-skill activities, such as shopping for food every Monday at the Garwood Shop-Rite, cooperating with others to complete a project, or operating a cash register at the faculty luncheon.

Making projects for the craft boutique, meanwhile, teaches hands-on construction techniques as well as analytical skills such as setting costs, promoting products and tracking customer trends.

"The purpose is to provide students with as close to a real-life

work situation as possible," LaCorte said of her approach. "Every single thing that we do centers around making money."

And the students get to enjoy the rewards of their efforts. Proceeds from the crafts fairs, for example, have been used to fund train trips to Westfield for holiday shopping and other field trips.

Those benefits make it easier for LaCorte to instill what she calls an "old-fashioned" work ethic of responsibility, consistency and cooperation.

But the real rewards for students and teachers come when students move from the "Crafty Caterers" project to the Union County Vo-Tech School, community college, or the workplace.

With assistance from the Cranford and Union County Chambers of Commerce, LaCorte said, the school is able to help many students move into solid jobs, where they can draw on the lessons they learned in high school. "I try to make a connection," she said. "In order to succeed in life, you have to work."

"I think it comes down to the integrity of who's monitoring and their values," said Fanwood resident Tom Bradow. "I don't think (the borough) should have to spend its energy and money monitoring the monitors. I think you have to be very, very careful with this."

Board member John Deitch questioned how records would be kept on users in case an adult should use a lounge computer to meet a child through an Internet chat room. Kovalyov suggested keeping records of customers' driver's licenses, however, board members still had concerns.

The proposed lounge would have

approximately 37 computers and operate from 4 p.m. to midnight on weekdays, and noon to midnight on weekends. The lounge would also provide printing, copying and scanning services, along with computer-based training and an electronic library.

Kovalyov said the center would provide residents access to software and games they may be unable to afford on their personal computers.

"There's a lot of different issues to it," said Pete Froden, a Fanwood resident. "That's the first I heard of it. I think that any good business that's going to bring revenue to town is good."

The work includes upgraded fencing around the property's swimming pool, repaving of the parking lot, new masonry for steps and sidewalks, roof replacements. New windows are currently being installed.

Mayflies no hazard

CRANFORD — The mayflies that have infested the pond at the Hyatt Hills Golf Course do not pose a public health hazard, said Health Officer Warren Hehl, and the township should probably take no major action at this time.

In a June 14 memo to the Township Committee, Hehl said the species of mayfly found in the pond does not attack people or property, carry disease or cause allergic reactions. Thus, he said, "the success of legal action (against the golf commission) is highly questionable and may be fruitless."

The best solution, Hehl indicated, may be to allow the 2,750 fish that have been introduced to the pond to get the insect population under control, a process that could take several months.

The township will explore several less intensive mitigation efforts, including erecting a decoy light source to draw the swarms away from private property and asking the golf commission whether the pond's aerators operate around the clock.

Committee unveils plans for Cranford's Sept. 11 memorial

CRANFORD — The Sept. 11 Memorial Committee Tuesday offered a preliminary sketch of the proposed monument and a number of ways for local residents to get involved with the effort.

The preliminary design for the memorial, to be located in Crane Park across North Union Avenue from the Municipal Building, includes a six-column structure (one for each of the local residents killed in the attack on the World Trade Center), a new flagpole, and three life-size statues of children.

The proposed memorial also will include a full renovation of the existing park, including clearing the overgrown shrubbery surrounding the property and installing wrought-iron fencing, decorative pavers and Victorian street lamps.

The sketch presented by the committee was prepared by local architect Joe Nigro with the blessing of the local families who lost loved ones in the attack. The

family members were present during Tuesday's presentation to the Township Committee, but did not speak.

The committee also released a timeline for the project. Final design work is scheduled to be completed by Sept. 4, with groundbreaking March 5 and a dedication ceremony May 1.

To complete the project as proposed, the committee will likely have to meet or approach its stated fund-raising goal of \$150,000, including in-kind contributions of services.

Committee treasurer Joan Varanelli declined to say how much has been raised, but said early returns have been positive. "I'm very encouraged by the responses" from local businesses, she said. "Our fund-raising efforts have just begun, and the money is coming in ... but it's going to take a real effort from the community."

In addition to the business solicitation, the committee is planning a mailing to residents and several fund-raising events, including a golf outing, wine tasting and family fun run.

But the biggest fund-raiser

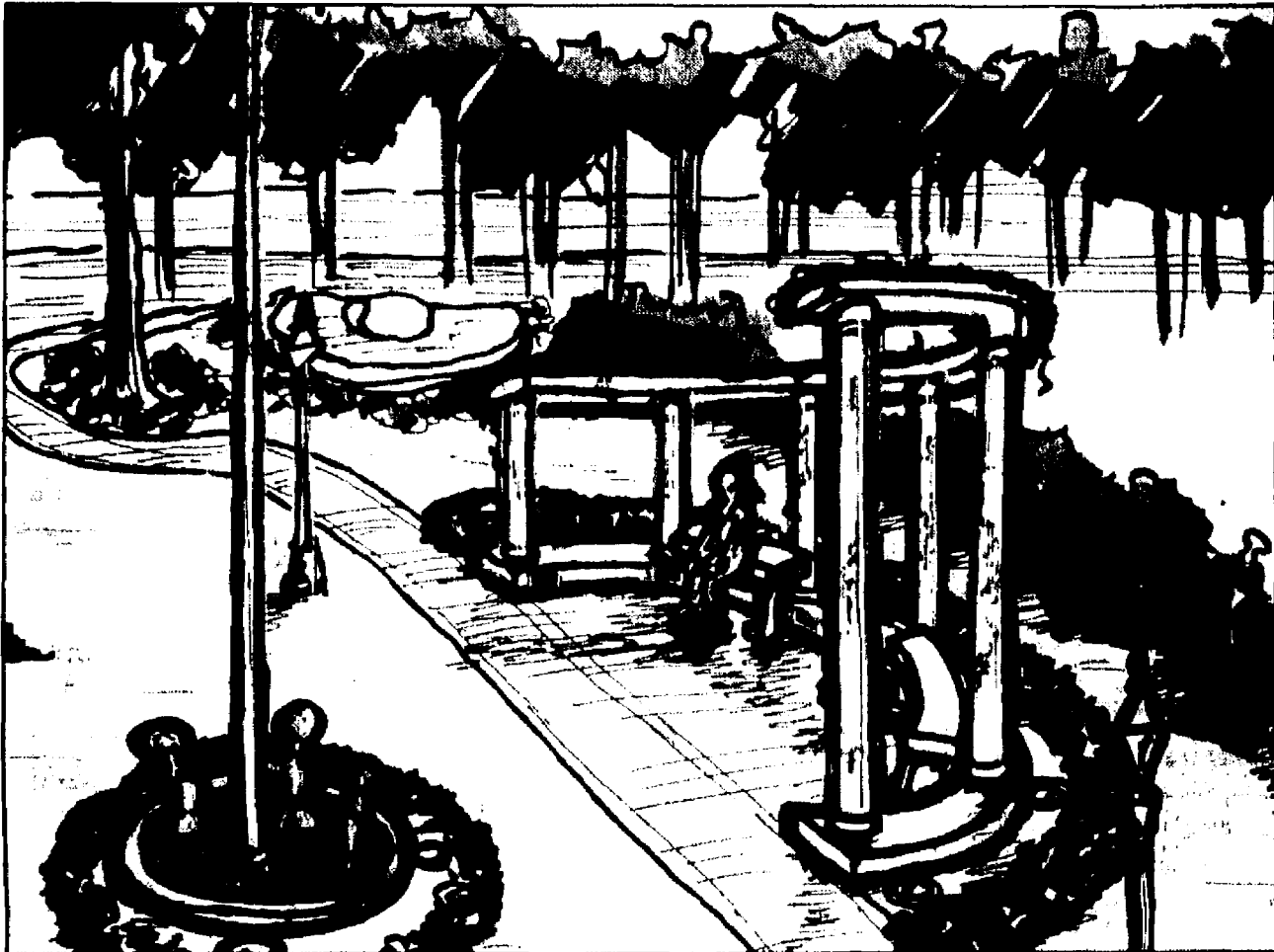
will be a luminary sale coinciding with the anniversary of the attack. Committee members hope residents will purchase the luminaries for their homes and also participate in a Sept. 11 parade and ceremony to consecrate the site of the memorial.

"On 9/11, we want to light up the whole town," said committee chairman Jerry Dobbins.

Commerce Bank customers can also make a donation to the committee free of charge by inquiring about the bank's affinity account program (see box).

During the presentation, the committee put its best face on recent reports of dissension among members. Dobbins and co-chairman Bob Milkosky resigned the committee several weeks ago, though Dobbins has since returned. But at the meeting Dobbins several times praised Milkosky's contributions to the effort.

Appeal jeopardizes preservation of the historic Nitschke House

KENILWORTH — The effort to preserve the Nitschke House at 513 Boulevard hit a snag earlier this month, when a local attorney filed an appeal of a Planning Board decision that would help make the preservation possible.

On March 28, the board approved a plan by local dentist Jerome Forman to buy the property where the house now is. Forman plans to construct a new building for his practice on the site, and has offered to donate the historic house to the Kenilworth Historical Society, which in turn would relocate the Nitschke House to a South 21st Street site donated by the Kenilworth Veterans Center.

The Historical Society hopes to have the farmhouse, one of oldest structures in the borough, recognized as a historic site, and to renovate it as a local museum and cultural center.

But local attorney Howard Burger June 3 filed a lawsuit against Forman, the Planning Board and the Board of

Adjustment. The appeal was filed on behalf of Arekan, Inc. and Mark Buynak, owners of adjacent properties on the Boulevard and South 21st Street, and claims the board's decision to grant Forman a parking variance was "arbitrary and capricious."

Should the board contest the appeal, it will be heard in Superior Court. Burger was unavailable for comment at press time.

News of the appeal is "a big

disappointment," said Shirley Maxwell of the Historical Society, as her organization has worked for two years to get funding in place for the project.

But Maxwell said she remains hopeful about the effort. "We remain very optimistic that because of all the good the project has to offer the community, we will be successful in seeing it through," she said. "We're not about to let the community down."

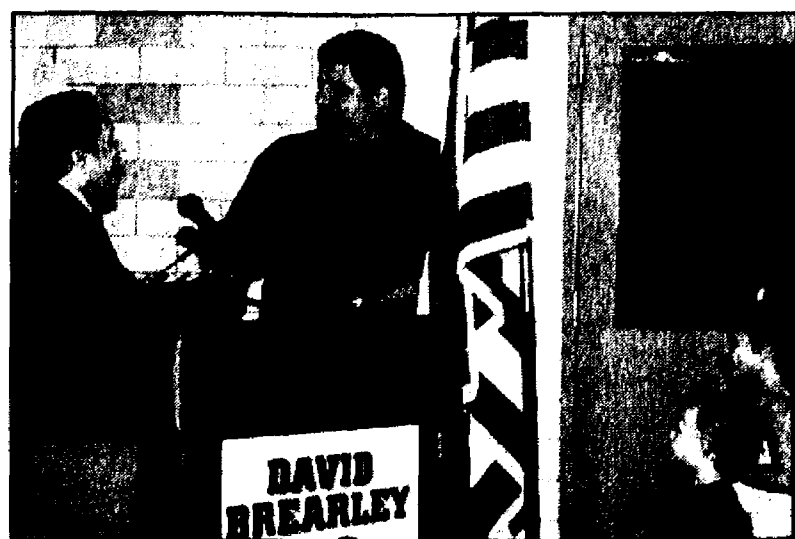

Westfield schools planning upgrades in technology

WESTFIELD — Westfield public schools will receive technological enhancements to their classrooms this summer. Many middle school classes will go wireless and new computers will be added to the fifth grade and high school.

Carol Swann-Daniels, supervisor of instructional technology, presented the school district's progress in technology in a report to the school board Tuesday.

The past school year, middle schools participated in a "try and buy" program with several laptop computers. Teachers were trained and participated in a pilot teaching program, using wireless computers and software curriculum to instruct classes.

Edison and Roosevelt middle schools participated in the program. According to Swann-Daniels, 50 percent of the students had at least one experience with the wireless labs. The labs were utilized in math, social studies and world languages departments.

As a result, laptops and classroom printers will be provided for 65 teachers in the math, social studies and language departments. In addition, two eMac computers and printers will be installed in middle school special education classrooms.

Other enhancements include four student eMacs and a teacher eMac in each fifth-grade classroom and 40 replacement personal computers for the Mathematics Lab, Open Lab and Social Studies Lab at Westfield High School. A grant obtained by the Board of Education will provide digital video and still cameras to Roosevelt and Tamaques middle schools and new computers for the journalism classroom at Edison.

"For years we've been buying computers and buying software. Now we're finally shifting from buying to using computers," said Arlene Gardner, president of the Board of Education.

Bill would restore state aid for Cranford flood project

CRANFORD — In what could be a boon for the township, local legislators have introduced a bill to restore \$3.25 million in state aid for the Northeast Quadrant Flood Control Project.

The bill, introduced June 6 in the State Senate by Richard Bagger and in the Assembly by Tom Kean Jr. and Eric Munoz, would reappropriate funds frozen by Gov. James E. McGreevey as part of an attempt to close the state's record-setting budget deficit. The bill would make the funds available July 1 for fiscal year 2003.

On May 13, the legislators and Cranford Commissioner Phil Morin met the state Department of

Environmental Protection officials to discuss restoring the funding. To date, that meeting has not yielded any results, prompting the proposed legislation.

"If we can't do it through conversation and dialogue, maybe we can do through legislation," said a spokesman for the District 21 Republicans.

But it is far from certain the bills will be approved. They currently remain in subcommittee in both houses, and the spokesman said there was no timeline for how quickly they will progress.

In another possible good omen, Bound Brook and Manville, two other communities that were hit hard by Hurricane Floyd, had the bulk of their flood-related state aid restored earlier this year. That money had also been frozen by

McGreevey to close the budget gap.

But unlike the Cranford money, which is intended for a capital project to prevent future damages, that money was direct budget relief to compensate the towns for the loss of tax ratables during Floyd.

While the township waits to hear about its state aid, work on the flood project is progressing. Commissioner Dan Aschenbach said representatives of Killam Associates have recently been in the woods near Oak Lane and Ridge Street to survey the site of the proposed swale.

The Township Committee will likely approve a swale design and move forward with the permitting process at its July 16 meeting, Aschenbach said. Prior to the vote, the township will hold another meeting with residents of the affected area to present a detailed design for the swale.

One of those residents, Frank Capece, had sent a letter to Killam stating its representatives would not be granted access to the woods through private properties. But Aschenbach said he was not aware of any problems; Killam representatives likely did not require access to private properties to conduct the survey, he said.

Capece could not be reached for comment at press time.

Zoning chairman scolds committee

CRANFORD — Board of Adjustment Chairman Marc Brown chastised the Township Committee Tuesday for what he called a tacit undermining of the board's integrity.

In a controversial ruling, the board recently granted approval to a Citgo gas station and Blimpie sandwich shop at North Avenue and Orchard Street. Though the Township Committee has no regulatory authority over the application, opponents of the development have repeatedly made their case during the public comment section of township meetings. Those comments have at times included criticisms of the board's decision-making process.

The committee's failure to publicly respond to those claims, Brown said, is "essentially telling them that they're right and what we did was wrong ... We were just hung out to dry." As a result, he said, board members may worry about being second-guessed when hearing future applications.

Brown and board attorney David Weeks also stressed the board could not prevent the gas station at the site, because it is a pre-existing non-conforming use.

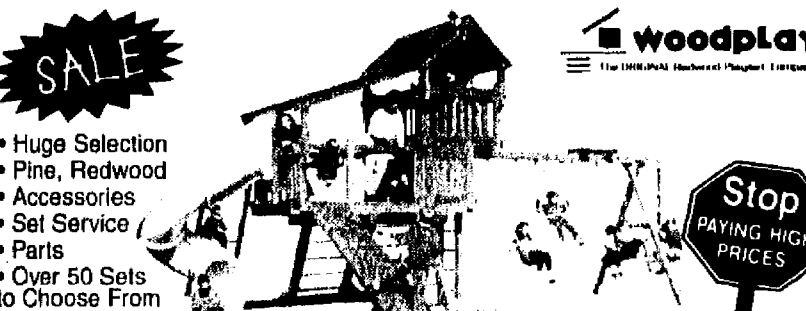
"Because we have a Constitution, this body (the Township Committee) can't get rid of a gas station on that corner," Weeks said. The granting of other variances, he and Brown said, were part of an effort to bring the site into greater compliance with township codes.

Committee members seemed to take some of the complaints to heart. When resident Frank Krause later speculated the board may have violated federal rules on hearing evidence and testimony, Commissioner Tom Denny cautioned him on making such charges loosely. And other committee members said the board did its best in an effort to apply the law.

Though the township will not appeal the ruling, several committee members said the township must keep looking for a way to stop the development. Commissioner Dan Aschenbach asked Brown if the board would reconsider its decision, and offered to supply additional testimony from residents in the area.

Brown said it was unlikely that additional testimony would offer anything new.

Board to review policy for disciplining athletes

CRANFORD — The Board of Education will review disciplinary procedures for athletes who abuse drugs and alcohol before adopting a new policy for the general student body, Board President Mary Venditti said.

Venditti said the board will convene a committee of board members and school and district administrators to review the policy for athletes, which amounts to zero tolerance. Athletes are suspended from a team for the remainder of the season after a first offense.

The announcement comes just one week after the board heard a recommendation for revisions to the high school's co-curricular handbook, which covers most non-athletic after-school activities. An ad hoc committee including students and community members recommended the co-curricular policy emphasize counseling, rather than punishment, for students who use drugs or alcohol.

Under the recommendation, students who commit violations

would undergo assessments and participate in an education program but would not be suspended from an activity for a first offense.

Several board members pointed out last week that change would create a double standard for athletes, and said the two policies should be harmonized.

"Our goal is to come to an understanding between the two so we can make some changes," Venditti said Monday.

Superintendent Lawrence Feinsod said with the recent discussion about the co-curricular handbook, "it's clearly the right time to take a look at the zero-tolerance policy as well." But Feinsod said he did not believe the two policies had to be identical.

The committee to review the athletics policy, which is not open to the public, will hold its first meeting in July. The board hopes to have both the athletics policy and a revised handbook in place for the start of school in September, which would require a vote at the Aug. 26 meeting.

But never again in their hometown.

Neither the borough nor the Board of Education is planning a reception for the 2002 graduates or has any plans to congratulate their own and wish them well as they begin their adventure in adulthood.

And that's a shame.

The borough and board must find a public way to show their pride and their love for their high school graduates. Garwood teen-agers — and their parents — need to bask in the glow of their community's pride.

Take more time on corporate tax

The last thing you want to do in a recovering economy is to raise taxes on those economic engines that are driving the state back on the road to prosperity.

Yet, Gov. James McGreevey has proposed an increase in corporate taxes that not only will affect the multi-national pharmaceutical and telecommunications that call New Jersey home but also the small businesses run by your friends and neighbors in your own hometown.

The McGreevey package has predictably run into a roadblock in the State Senate which is split 20-20 along party lines. Economists, testifying before legislative committees, disagree about the impact of the package, which was designed to help close the state's budget gap. Some say it will finally force many large corporations to finally pay their fair share and set a new nationwide precedent that other states can follow to close their own budget gaps. Other economists said the tax package will permanently hurt the state and make it less attractive to new businesses.

The lobbying drive against the McGreevey proposal has shifted into high gear as the legislature works feverishly on next year's state budget before the July 1 deadline. The New Jersey Chamber of Commerce, the New Jersey Retail Merchants Association, the New Jersey Food Council and the New Jersey Small Business Federation have launched a campaign to push an alternative tax plan that they say will not hurt businesses and stall the economic recovery.

"I've heard from some of my small business members and they are telling me their taxes are going to rise as much as 300 percent," said Joan Verplanck, president of the State Chamber of Commerce. "That's going to force them to delay expansion, reduce benefits and in some cases lay off employees. That's not what New Jersey needs when it's trying to escape a recession."

The groups are calling upon the governor to establish a tax study commission to review New Jersey's business tax in its entirety and make recommendations that can be implemented as soon as possible after their two-year alternative plan expires.

The business groups are on the right track. The legislature is already moving forward with increasing the cigarette tax from 80 cents per pack to \$1.40, the diversion of up to \$516 million from unemployment taxes to the general fund, and the sale of bonds that will be repaid with up to \$1 billion in revenue from the national tobacco settlement. With these programs likely to receive legislative approval, the state can afford to take a little more time before introducing a radical tax plan.

Don't waste time on the trivial

I think Scooby Doo should eat Adam Sandler.

And then I think Scooby Doo should be put to sleep for being a vicious dog.

Of course it's not going to happen. Scooby Doo is going to be with us for a long time and so, unfortunately, will be Adam Sandler. I am hoping the recent media blitz surrounding their movies — how many hungry children in America could be fed with the millions and millions spent on making and promoting these movies that would have received the accurate "B-movie" label decades ago? — will expire as soon as their latest attempts to dumb down our culture fail at the box office.

I wish we could legislate against obscene amounts of money being spent on mindless drivel. After all, legislators in New Jersey and other states are busy introducing legislation that regulate what seems to be everything.

For example, Assemblyman Peter Barnes's proposal to limit the weight on school textbooks has received international attention. And while the state legislature is finally getting to work on ways to close the biggest budget gap in the state's history by raising taxes here and diverting funds there, legislators continue their work on relatively trivial matters.

The State Senate Education Committee has released a bill sponsored by State Senator Joseph Suliga (D-Union; Middlesex, Union) that would give students the option of participating in alternative educational projects instead of conducting animal dissections.

"It's just plain wrong for schools to force students to dissect animals," said Suliga in a press release. "School should be about developing a love of learning, not about forcing students to do things that make them uncomfortable."

The bill would require schools to provide "alternate educational programming" for students who do not wish to wield a scalpel on a well-preserved frog. Schools — as if they don't have enough mandates foisted upon them from legislators with pet causes — would be required to notify students and their parents or guardians that the students are not obligated to perform the dissection.

If the moral reasons were not enough for this legislation to pass, Suliga said it will also save money. He says the "specimens" used for the dissections are a "recurring cost," especially if the students are not required to put back the organs and sew up the corpse.

While I can sympathize with Suliga's bill and the Elizabeth teenager who wrote to him and initiated the process, I'm worried we're in danger of over-legislating ourselves. With such big issues facing our state legislators, why are they spending time on these matters? Wouldn't you rather see lower auto insurance premiums and a reform of the property tax system?

But, let's face it, it's easier for politicians to first embrace, then tackle, an issue such as dissections. Decades ago, when I was being traumatized without my permission by the New Jersey public school system, everybody performed dissections without a second thought. Yes, dissections were icky and tossed a few peanut butter sandwiches in stomachs, but they have played a critical part in understanding anatomy throughout the ages. We seemed to accept that scientific progress — which led to saving countless more lives of both animals and humans — depended on the knowledge gained by dissections. The price of being uncomfortable paid for a greater good.

Maybe it's time voters in New Jersey forced their legislators to do something uncomfortable, like tackling auto insurance and property taxes.

Conviction won't scar teenagers

To The Record-Press:

I would like to address some misconceptions I noticed at the last Scotch Plains Township Council meeting during which citizens discussed the issue of the proposed ordinance to apply penalties to underage drinking on private property.

Many are concerned that the ordinance would shadow a young person throughout their life by giving them a criminal record. This is untrue. The conviction of a municipal ordinance violation does not constitute a criminal conviction or arrest. Any juvenile record generated from such a violation is strictly safeguarded from public inspection and is kept confidential (N.J.S.A. 2A:4A-60a).

The ordinance won't eliminate underage drinking. This is true. It is one more component in the many efforts that are undertaken to keep our community safe. People have urged more education instead of passage of the ordinance. The school district includes substance prevention education in its curriculum along with supplemental programs and activities. The Municipal Alliance Committee provides more than half a dozen substance abuse prevention programs to youth. The high school PTA developed the Challenge Question program and high school students from DECA formulated and

delivered DECA's Day of Decision to middle school students. The Scotch Plains-Fanwood PTA Council provides Think Purple Week, a week of substance awareness education in early March. The Scotch Plains Police Department presents the DARE program which reinforces self-esteem and refusal skills in fifth-grade students.

We are very fortunate in Scotch Plains to have so many fine programs to educate our youth provided by so many concerned community groups. However, with all this education, underage drinking remains the dominant substance abuse program in our community.

People have said that current laws adequately protect us from underage drinking. Under current law, if the police are called to a home where underage drinking is occurring, only the homeowner could receive any penalty. This ordinance will close this loophole by providing a meaningful consequence to those engaged in a behavior that can have devastating consequences to themselves and to the community as a whole.

Proposed antennas are a concern

At its June 26 meeting, the Fanwood Planning Board is scheduled to discuss a proposal by Verizon Wireless to add a number of cell phone antennas to a PSE&G tower located near North Avenue in Fanwood, between Elm Street and Oak Court.

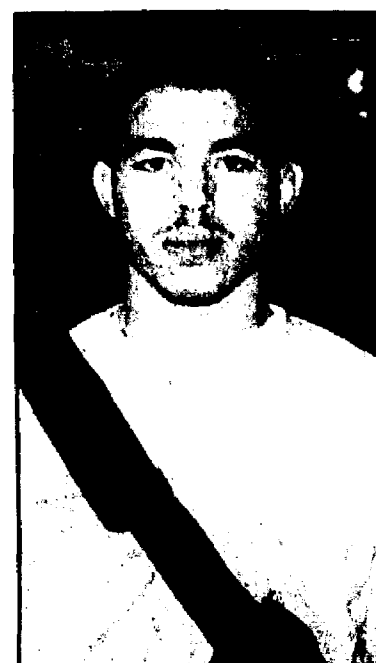

United Fund meets its goal

WESTFIELD — Once again, the Westfield United Fund has met its goal.

"What a town we have ... and that response to our Westfield United Fund is a clear reflection of how much we all care," said Campaign Chair Carolyn Fleder in her annual report.

In its 45-year history, the United Fund of Westfield has distributed more than \$18 million to agencies. This year's goal of \$661,200 — the highest objective in the fund's history — enabled the fund to distribute monies to 21 member agencies that provide help for Westfield residents.

A 12-member Fund Distribution Committee, headed by Stan Ciemnicki, reviewed the records of the agencies before determining the individual allocation. These allocations include:

American Red Cross, \$35,000; ARC of Union County, \$11,250; Boy Scouts, \$15,500; Center for Women and Families, \$3,000; Cerebral Palsy League, \$5,700; Community Access Unlimited,

\$5,000; Contact We Care, \$11,750; Girl Scouts, \$19,500; Jewish Community Center, \$19,500; Jewish Family Service Agency, \$8,250 and the Mental Health Association, \$3,800.

Also, Mobile Meals of Westfield, \$7,250; Union County Legal Services, \$3,000; UCPH Behavioral Healthcare, \$10,000; United Service Organization, (USO), \$500; Visiting Health Service, \$5,600; Visiting Nurse & Health Services, \$15,500; Westfield Community Center, \$102,000; Westfield

Neighborhood Council, \$53,000; Westfield Y, \$164,000; and Youth & Family Counseling, \$54,500.

To make the goal, the United Fund had the support of more than 300 volunteers who assisted in soliciting donations from residents and business owners.

While the drive was under way, the United Fund also was overseeing donations to a special Sept. 11 campaign. Many Westfielders contributed to both campaigns, said Linda Maggio, United Fund executive director.

Next year, the number of agencies supported by the fund will increase to 22 with the recent acceptance of Prevention Links. The organization works to prevent substance abuse through educational programs.

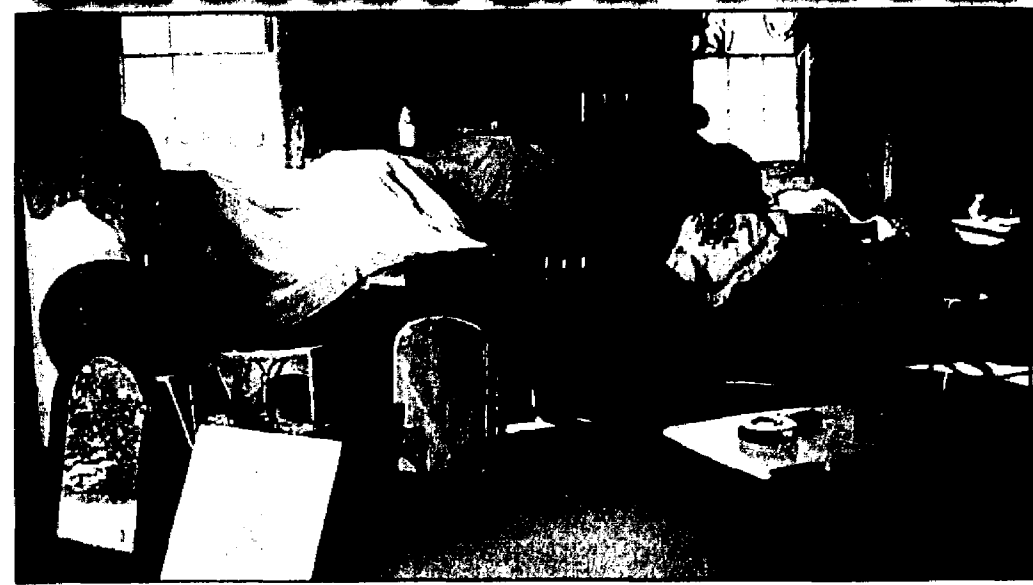

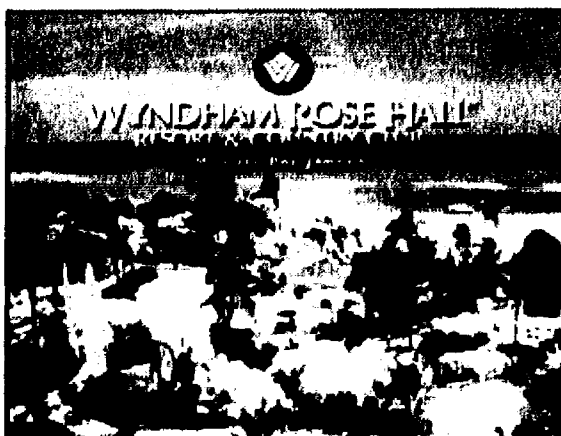

SCOTCH PLAINS — Holocaust survivor Clara Kramer discussed her experiences during World War II in Allan Wright's religion class at Union Catholic.

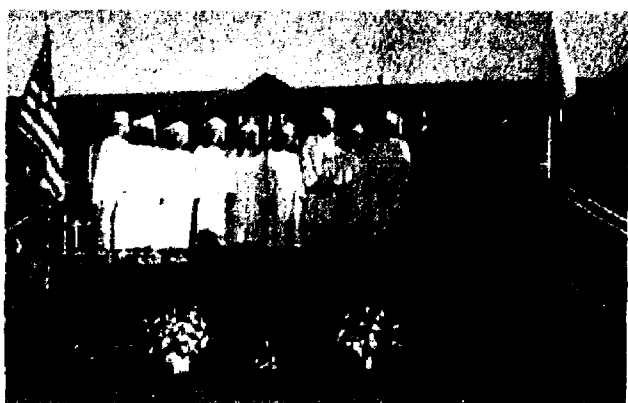
Kramer described how it was for a young child to come face-to-face with religious persecution. Her teen years were spent in hiding and her account of the war was recounted in full detail. She explained what it felt like to live first in a ghetto and then in an underground bunker in hiding with her family. They remained safe with the help of a Gentile family, the Becks.

After the war, Kramer and what was left of her family lived in Germany and then in Israel. After she met her husband, they came to the United States.

Her message to the students was simple: Respect each other.

Kramer said she feels strongly that everyone should know what happened during the Holocaust and to learn from it, so that it will never happen again.

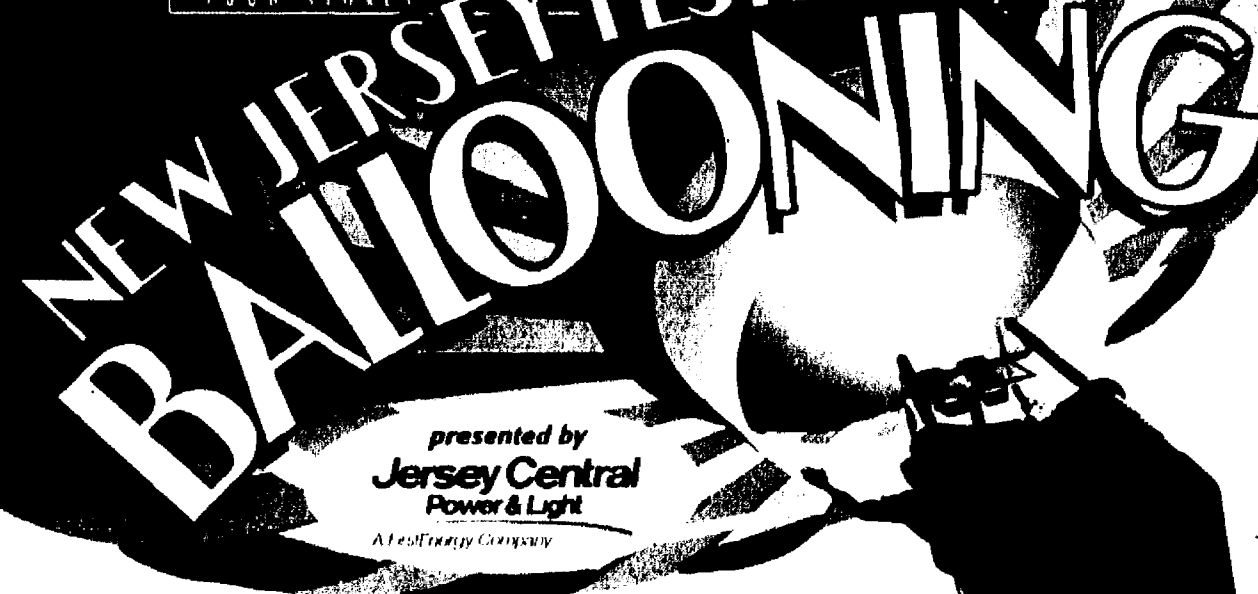

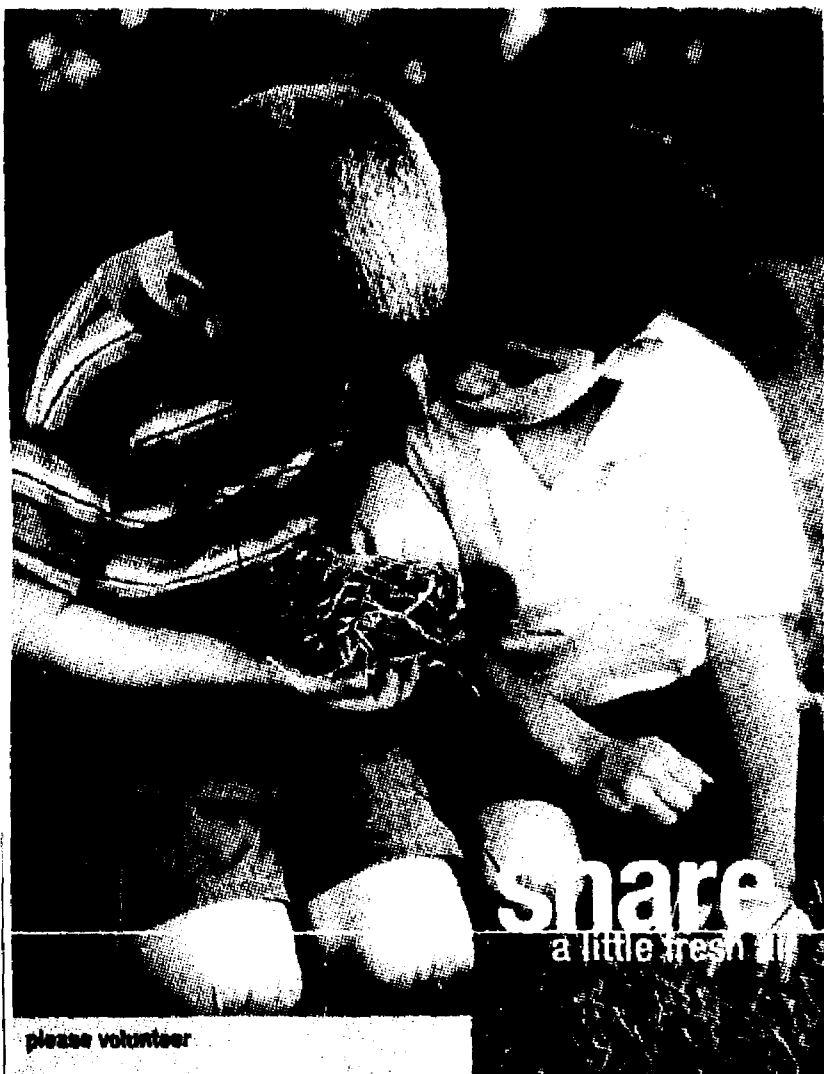

Swimming safety tips

As the summer approaches, children will be spending their days enjoying the warm weather by swimming. Whether swimming in the ocean or at a pool, children require close supervision from parents because drowning and near-drowning are major causes of childhood death and injury.

"It is vital that parents and caregivers be aware of the dangers associated with swimming," says Jeanne Weintraub, R.N., M.S.N., coordinator for the Ambulatory Health Center at Saint Barnabas Medical Center, Livingston. "Attention to the available safety tips can avoid tragedy in most instances."

According to studies done by the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) Committee on Injury and Poison Prevention, drowning is the third most common cause of unintentional death for children younger than 5 each year in the United States.

Studies have found that children less than 1 years of age most frequently drown in bathtubs and buckets; children age 1 to 4 years most often drown in home or apartment swimming pools; and children and adolescents age 5 to 19 years most frequently drown in lakes, ponds, rivers, and pools.

A study conducted by the US Consumer Product Safety Commission (USCPC) showed that most children less than 5 years of age drowned or nearly drowned by entering the pool from their home through the unprotected side of the pool (the side that directly faces the house, with no intervening fence). Most children were last seen in the home, but were out of eye contact for only a moment, and caregivers reported that they heard no screams or splashing. According to the USCPC, installation of four-sided fencing that isolates the pool from the house and the yard has been shown to decrease the number of pool immersion injuries by more than 50 percent.

For greater safety when swimming, the Pediatric Ambulatory Health Center provides the following guidelines for parents:

Parents should never leave children alone in bathtubs, spas, or wading pools, near irrigation ditches, post holes or other open standing water. They should remove all

water from containers, such as pails and 5-gallon buckets, immediately after use. To prevent drowning in toilets, young children should not be left alone in the bathroom.

Swimming lessons for children less than 4 years of age will not provide "drown proofing" and may lead to a false sense of security. Don't forget "swimmies" or water wings are not approved safety devices.

Rigid, motorized pool covers are not a substitute for four-sided fencing, because pool covers are not likely to be used appropriately and consistently.

Parents should learn CPR, and they should keep a telephone and equipment approved by the US Coast Guard (e.g. life preservers, life jackets, shepherd's crook) at poolside.

Children need to be taught to swim. In addition to rules for safe swimming in pools, children need to know the requirements for swimming in lakes, rivers and oceans. Increased drowning risk arises from changing environmental conditions (e.g. depth and currents) and hazards concealed in murky water.

Children need to be taught never to swim alone or without adult supervision.

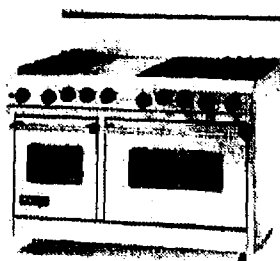

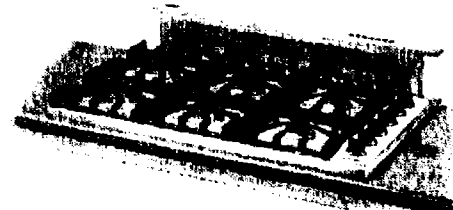

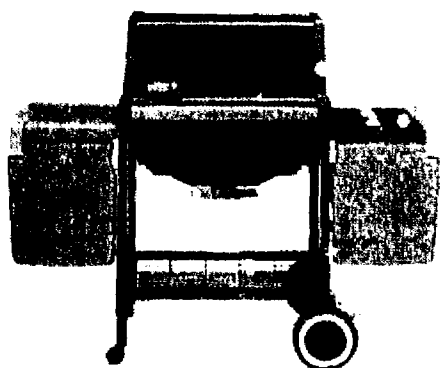

Williams misses state mark, second in nation

RALEIGH, N.C. — In search of the state record, Ray Williams took second place in the 400 meter dash at the National Scholastic Track and Field Championships at North Carolina State University in Raleigh Saturday.

Williams fell short of his goal breaking Olympian Dennis Mitchell's state record of 46.02, but still finished in a remarkable 46.34, the third fastest time in state history. He was second in the national race for the second straight year, finishing behind Ashton Collings of Louisiana who ran a 45.95.

"I wasn't real disappointed," said Williams. "But I know I could have done better. I went out too slow and came in too strong. I had

a lot more that I could have run out earlier.

"The level of competition was real high. I guess I didn't adjust to it. It's going to take time to get used to that level. I'm not used to that."

While Williams feels he could have done better, it was still an incredible feat and the culmination of an amazing high school career. He also ran his best relay split of the season of 45.4 in the distance medley.

"It was a really good year for me," he said. "I started in the winter with a knee injury, then in the spring I had the hamstring. I'm just happy and blessed that I was able to finish the season healthy — that I didn't have to pull out and end my season early."

Williams will now prepare for his football career at Purdue

University. He won't run anymore races this summer, instead he'll hit the weight room and begin a strength and conditioning program provided by Purdue. He'll also represent New Jersey along

with teammate Rob Mataar in the Governor's Bowl All-Star game July 13 against New York all-stars before heading to West Lafayette, Ind. He's scheduled to leave for Purdue Aug. 3.

"Football is starting real soon. I have to get back into a football mindset," said Williams. "I can relax for a couple of days then I have to start lifting, getting my body and my legs stronger."

"I'm very anxious (to leave for Purdue). I wish it was tomorrow, that's how excited I am."

Scotch Plains also placed 20th out of 39 teams in the boy distance medley relay in 10:29.8.

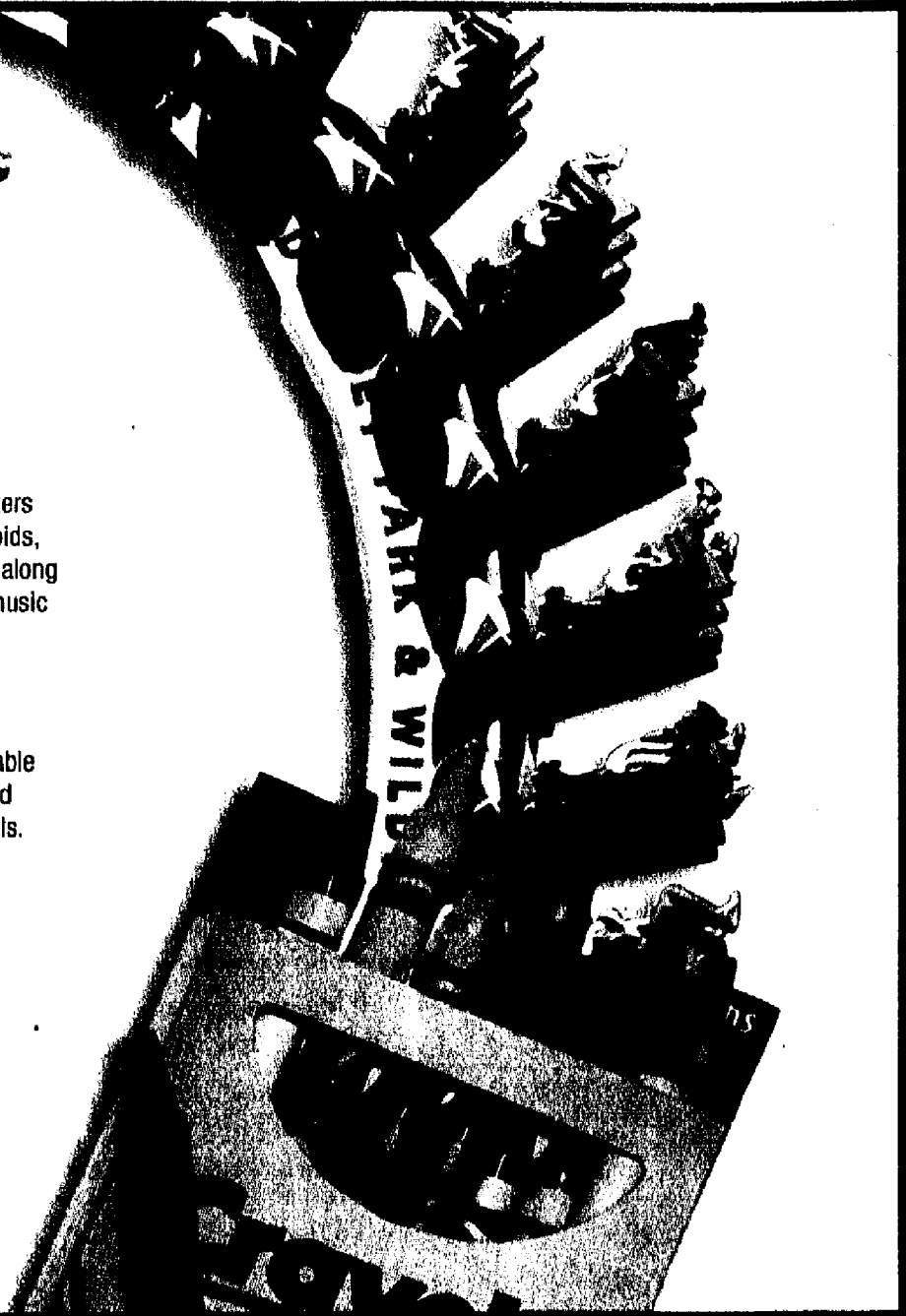

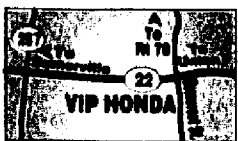

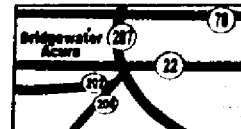

How to avoid a \$300 rip-off on home closing costs

A major rip-off for today's home buyers are some of the \$300 to \$350 charges on closing statements identified simply as "appraisal."

Increasingly, the actual method used to determine the market value of the property is accomplished by an automated system, using computerized databases. This can be done very quickly, and at a small fraction of the cost of a conventional appraisal.

This and other forms of short-cut appraisals are in common use today. The appraisal cost to the lender is much lower, but the various methods often produce contrasting levels of value estimates.

The temptation for lenders to increase their profits by collecting the higher fee (for full appraisal) from the buyer is very strong. For this reason, the directors of the National Association of Realtors recently passed the following motion:

"NAR adopts a policy that lenders be required to inform a borrower of the

methods used to value a property to determine the amount of the mortgage loan, and that borrowers should have the right to be provided with a copy of each value estimate or value opinion obtained."

This is the first appraisal-related policy ever adopted by the NAR board of directors. It was initiated by the association's Appraisal Committee. Some mortgage lenders use the services of a professional appraiser, but many do not. Therefore, the value as well as the fee can vary considerably with the different systems.

"Borrowers should be fully aware of the multiple estimates of value obtained by lenders," an NAR report stated. "Hopefully, this access to information will assist borrowers in their decision-making and may prompt them to seek the most credible opinion of value possible."

In the case of newly constructed homes, individual property appraisals are not required by lenders who subsequently sell their mortgages to Fannie Mae, the nation's largest buyer of existing mortgages. Fannie Mae has

set up a new master residential appraisal process that streamlines the property valuation and review processes for new single-family homes.

Individual property appraisals are no longer required for each home in a project and subdivision to make a mortgage salable to Fannie Mae. An appraiser is allowed to perform an examination of the entire project site and provide an estimate of value for each model.

"Our goal is to simplify the mortgage process for both the lender and consumer," said Mark Simpson, with Fannie Mae. "Our new process accomplishes this by creating innovative ways to expedite the property valuation process."

The varying values determined by the shortcut appraisal systems make some lenders nervous. Therefore, they continue to use professionals who perform full appraisals on subject properties — real people, not computerized programs and models.

"Our members believe in using high-tech methods," said Donald Kelly, vice

president of the Appraisal Institute. "But our appraisers use this as a tool for producing better and more accurate appraisals. We're increasingly using electronic databases."

Those databases need to be carefully researched for accuracy, Kelly noted.

"In some cases, major inaccuracies have been discovered. The old story still holds true — garbage in, garbage out."

Q. What proportion of families pay more for housing than they really should?

A. Nearly one in four households today spends more on housing than the federal government considers affordable and appropriate, according to a report from the National Association of Home Builders. These families spend more than 30 percent of their total income on housing.

"In order to increase the availability of affordable housing and expand rental housing and homeownership opportunities, we are making several recommendations," said NAHB presi-

dent Gary Garczynski. "We think it advisable to revitalize and restructure the Federal Housing Administration, enact a new homeownership tax credit, and establishing a new, mixed-income rental production program. And we believe these actions can be addressed by Congress in current or pending legislation."

Q. Generally, is the housing market in good shape or is it weakening?

A. Overall, the housing market continues to perform well and prices keep rising in areas where employment growth remains in positive territory, according to the Meyers Group, a noted consulting and publishing firm.

The widespread perception at this point is that home-buying activity will remain brisk for the entry-level and move-up market, with very slow improvements occurring in the high-end (luxury home) market.

As for mortgage interest rates, the Meyers Group expects them to remain at their current very low rates through the peak home-buying months of summer.

Sometimes, it really is better not to do everything yourself

Q. We are considering remodeling an older home in an upscale neighborhood. Most of the homes in this area have been remodeled or completely rebuilt over the years as the property values increased due to tremendous seacoast views. We feel that even if we decide to sell later, we will be able to get our money back. However, our dilemma is how to go about a major remodel. We are planning expansion of the current house, plus major overhauls of bathrooms and the kitchen area.

Since this is a major investment, we are considering drawing up the plans ourselves and subcontracting with construction people to do the work on a

pay-as-we-go basis. I have drawn up a couple of different floor plans, but need to know how to proceed from here. I read your column regularly and have used many of your suggestions for home maintenance and repair.

How we can get recommendations on the newest, most suitable materials rather than relying on sales people. Do you have any tips concerning remodeling projects and the hiring of subcontractors?

A. Hire a professional. Starting such a project with a good, workable plan is essential. I suggest that you hire a local architect who can assist you in preparing a set of drawings that converts your thoughts and ideas into construction plans. A good architect can also suggest design options and materials that are ideal for your purposes, but that your might otherwise never consider. An architect can assist you in making ballpark cost

estimates as you put the plan together, as well as formulate a plan that you can construct in stages, as you are financially able to pay for improvements.

The selection of a suitable architect is an important first step. Interview several architects and inspect some of their work to see if their ideas and design concepts coincide with yours. Get a list of recent clients and talk with them concerning satisfaction with services provided. Discuss the total fee up front. Some architects base their fee on the cost of construction, while other may quote an hourly rate and give you some idea as to how many hours will be required to prepare details construction plans.

Keep in mind that a qualified architect, with a thorough understanding of local zoning and construction ordinances as well as required construction permits, can help you avoid major pitfalls. Once you have a plan, you can obtain competitive bids from several contractors. Your architect can proba-

bly recommend several.

For such a major undertaking, I suggest that you go with a general contractor rather than subcontracting the work yourself with various trades. A general contractor oversees all facets of the project, including construction licenses and building code inspections, and can be held responsible for the finished product. The contractor should provide you with a firm price in a written proposal that you can review with your architect to ensure the bid coin-

Bureau to assure that complaints have not been filed against the contractor you are considering.

Get at least three written estimates, each of which should be based on the same building materials and specifications. Get a written, detailed contract. Do not allow a contractor to rush you into signing a contract. Be sure that you understand the terms thoroughly. Any subsequent changes in the contract should be in writing and signed. Never pay more than 10 percent of the

There are simple ways to keep your gas mileage high

(ARA) - They're up, they're down, they're back up. Gas prices got you down?

If telecommuting and public transportation are not viable options for you, here's some down-to-earth advice from the pros at the non-profit National Institute for Automotive Service Excellence (ASE).

It is important to keep your vehicle properly maintained and change your driving habits so as to maximize your mileage, according to ASE officials.

Here's a plan of action from the group that tests and certifies automotive technicians:

Monitor your tires. Under-inflated tires or poorly aligned wheels waste fuel by forcing the engine to work harder. Let the tires cool down before checking the air pressure. Out-of-line wheels, as evidenced by uneven tread wear, should be aligned by a professional.

Consolidate your daily trips and errands. Some trips may be unnecessary. Also, try to travel when traffic is light so you can avoid stop-and-go conditions.

Avoid excessive engine idling. Shut off your vehicle while waiting for friends and family.

Observe speed limits. Speeding decreases your miles per gallon.

Drive gently. Sudden accelerations guzzle gas. Anticipate traffic patterns and adjust your

speed gradually. Use cruise control. (You'll help your brakes and suspension system last longer, too.)

Get rid of excess weight by removing unnecessary items from the vehicle. Store only essentials in the trunk. Less weight means better mileage. After family vacations, make

sure you remove all unnecessary items, including that roof-top cargo carrier.

Use windows and air conditioning wisely. Your mileage should improve if you keep the windows closed

at highway speeds, since air drag is reduced. This is true even with the air conditioning on — assuming that the system is in good working order. If possible, try to avoid using your air conditioner in heavy, stop-and-go traffic such as traffic jams or holiday week-end back-ups.

Be a sensible patriot. Everyone loves the flag. But show your patriotism by affixing a decal rather than hoisting a large flapping U.S. flag, which increases air resistance.

Keep your engine operating at its "peak efficiency." A well-maintained engine will help you maximize the gas mileage for your specific make and model. A misfiring spark plug can greatly reduce gas mileage. Follow the service schedules listed in your owner's manual. Replace filters and fluids as recommended; have engine performance problems

(rough idling, poor acceleration, etc.) corrected at a repair facility. Given today's high-tech engines, it's wise to have this type of work done by auto technicians who are ASE certified in engine performance.

These conservation tips will not only save gasoline, they'll help extend the life of your vehicle and help you conserve precious natural resources. Patriotism, indeed.
