The officers to be voted for are as follows: One Town Clerk; One Member of Board of Assessors; One Collector of Taxes; and two Justices of the Peace.

CAMPAIGN TO BEGIN SOON.

Fort, Republican Nominee, Will Be in Plainfield Next Week—Time to Stop Factional Fights.

BIG MASS MEETING.

Party Leaders to Welcome Him—Mr. Katzenbach on Informal Visit to James Martine To-morrow Night.

The real opening gun of the gubernatorial campaign will be fired in Plainfield Wednesday night, October 10, when John Franklin Fort will attend the big Republican mass meeting at the New Plainfield Theatre. This will be the signal to cut out inter-party fights and to get down to the real business of converting New Jersey voters to the cause of the G. O. P. A number of party leaders will accompany Mr. Fort. Among them will be State Senator Everett Colby and Sheriff Frank Sommer.

Mr. Katzenbach, the Democratic nominee for Governor, will be in Plainfield to-morrow night. His visit, however, will be informal, and is merely to talk over the political situation with his defeated rival, James E. Martine, and other Democratic wisacrons of that vicinity.

A committee has been appointed for the reception of Judge Fort, composed of Senator Colby, Sheriff Sommer, Mayor Fisk, Judge Ramsey, County Chairman Smith and others. A brass band has been hired and Plainfield Republicans are prepared to have a regular old-fashioned "whoop-it-up" rally day.

James E. Martine, who asked if his defeat for the nomination of Governor was not the greatest disappointment he had ever had in his long career as a politician, replied: "Yes. Nothing in my whole life so disappointed me. I know that James Smith, Jr., and other good friends were loyal to the last, but the work of Peter Bognoli and others was a hard blow for me to bear."

"WANDERLUST" IN WESTFIELD.

There is a wave of "Wanderlust" in Westfield, three young boys, George Davis, John Herder, and Howard Thompson, left home last Sunday on a little pleasure jaunt of their own. They didn't get very far away, however, as they were caught in Trenton the next day and were put in the jug to cool off. The Thompson boys' father went to Trenton yesterday and brought them home. A precedent has been established in Westfield for young people to leave home without warning or clue. This is the second case within a week.

Arrested by Father-in-Law

Richard Rockford, of Westfield, made complaint against George Smith alias Tony Reizo for non-support of his wife. The case was heard before Judge Collins Wednesday morning, but was dismissed on account of the evidence of the young bride, who is Rockford's daughter. She testified that Smith had not deserted her.

Smith is regarded by the police as a hard customer. He has served two terms in the New Jersey Reformatory, one of twenty-two months and the other of fourteen. The bride is said to be under sixteen years of age. She has been married just two weeks.

Mike Morrow a Benedict

John Benton Morrow, known to his friends in this place as "Mike," is a benedict. He was recently married to Miss Marguerite Karney, of Yuma, Arizona.

"Mike" is a nephew of Colonel William S. Morrow, of Elmer Street, and was educated in the Westfield High School. He was at one time a member of the I. O. S.

G. W. TICE DIES SUDDENLY

Dropped Dead in a Room of His House on Highland Avenue This Morning.

CAUSE OF DEATH NOT KNOWN.

Some Attribute It to Paralysis of the Heart—He Was 67 Years Old, and Leaves a Wife and 9 Children.

George W. Tice dropped dead at his home on Highland avenue early this morning. The discovery was made by his wife when she went to his room and found him prostrate on the floor. Death is attributed to paralysis of the heart, or a stroke of apoplexy. County Physician Westcott has been summoned and is expected here this afternoon. The exact cause of death will not be known until after he makes an examination.

Mr. Tice was a life-long resident of Westfield, and up to a few years ago was one of the town's most prosperous citizens. He was at one time head of the manufacturing firm of Tice & Jacobs in New York. Within recent years Mr. Tice suffered serious business reverses, from the effects of which he never fully recovered. He has been in poor health for a number of years.

He is survived by a wife and nine children, for whom there is expressed deep sympathy in their hour of bereavement.

Miss Jane Morrow, of Westfield, is the superintendent of the Missionary Department. Several delegates from Westfield will attend the convention.

\$100 Verdict for Slander

A jury before Judge Addison Swift in the District Court at Elizabeth yesterday awarded \$100 verdict to Mrs. Mary Evelyn for her suit for \$300 damages against W. A. Wohlfert, a Broad Street hardware merchant. Mrs. Evelyn charged that on August 16th Wohlfert called her a thief and threw her out of his store, at the same time striking her in the face. Wohlfert denied the charge and his story was corroborated by his wife. The plaintiff had another witness to support her charge.

The case will be appealed.

NO. 23 IS A BIG HOODOO.

It Spelled Skidoo To the Telephone Company's 20 Year Franchise.

A MATTER OF RATE SCHEDULE.

Company Wouldn't Agree Not to 23 the Rates, So the Town Council Turned Down the Franchise.

It was No. 23 that did it. If it hadn't been for that section of the ordinance the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company would probably have been granted a twenty year franchise by the Town Council Monday night. Yet some people don't believe in hoodoos.

The circumstances giving place to this state of affairs are a matter of record. Any one can consult the town records and have his suspicions confirmed. Mayor Alpers and Representative MacHarg, of the telephone company, both agree that it was No. 23 that proved a stumbling block. Folks are wondering if it wasn't the number that caused the town sponsors to subject the section to a minute inspection.

Section 23 covered the question of rates. The council would not accept its provisions unless the telephone company stipulated that it would not 23 the rates. Representative MacHarg would not agree to do this as he claimed it would be establishing a precedent for other communities; that in 23ing the rates for improved service Westfield would be considered generally and not specifically. The rates might be 23d either way, higher or lower, and in 23ing the rates lower this town would be considered generally and not specifically.

That settled the matter then and there. The council refused to pass the ordinance on second reading by a vote of 4 to 3.

After council refused to advance the ordinance to second reading Mr. MacHarg suggested that the ordinance be changed so that the majority of council agreed that if the town and the corporation could not go together regarding the rates for service it would be a waste of time to read the ordinance.

The telephone corporation desires a twenty year franchise. It agrees to lay 8,000 feet of conduits in the business section of the town, remove the poles and install the interior block work to place cables where there are now so many uncovered wires and cross arms, and thereby improve the appearance of the overhead work. Telephones for municipal service are offered to the town, one for every fifty subscribers, and space will be reserved in the conduits and on the poles for fire and police alarm signals.

An ordinance to lay an 8-inch sewer in St. Mark's place, Lenox avenue and Clinton street, was passed upon first reading. Council refused permission to Mobus Bros. house movers, to remove a house from the Lawrence property over Lawrence, Dudley and North avenues to Graham's on account of damage that would be done to trees. W. W. Olmbergh was awarded contract to lay an 8-inch sewer in South Walnut street and South avenue. New bids were ordered requested for flagging those received at the meeting being incomplete and unsatisfactory to council. After a few other slight matters of business the council adjourned.

DR. A. H. LEWIS TO SPEAK.

Scholarly Seventh Day Baptist Divine to Address Congregational Men's Club Oct. 22.

Dr. A. H. Lewis, of Plainfield, the leading divine in the Seventh Day Baptist Church in this State, will address the members of the Men's Club of the Congregational Church at the annual fall dinner, to be held in the church lecture room, Tuesday evening, October 22.

Dr. Lewis is known throughout the country as an author of religious works, and a scholar of rare attainments. He has been in the ministry for nearly a half century and was for many years and up to a few months ago, the editor of the Sabbath Recorder, the official publication of the Seventh Day Baptist Church. He resigned the editorship because of the failing health of his wife. Although over seventy years of age, Dr. Lewis still possesses the vigor of youth and he is frequently heard in the pulpit and on the lecture platform. He is a man of striking personality and a convincing speaker.

The dinner will be the first of the social events of the club for the season. It is for members of the club and their friends only. The pastors of the several denominations will be invited to attend.

HONORS FOR J. J. SAVITZ.

Head of Westfield Public Schools Appointed to the County Superintendency.

WILL CONTINUE HIS WORK HERE.

His Rapid Rise in the Educational Field—Began His Career in Slatington, Pa.—One of Best Known Educators in the State.

Dr. John J. Savitz, superintendent of the Westfield public schools, was, on Tuesday, appointed superintendent of schools of Union county. The position carries with it a salary of \$2,000 a year. The appointment was made by the State Board of Education. Dr. Savitz will continue at the head of the Westfield schools; and has declared most emphatically that if he cannot conscientiously carry on the work of both offices he will resign the county superintendency.

Dr. Savitz succeeds Professor W. J. Shearer, who has had the place for the past seven years, and was a candidate for reappointment. Dr. Shearer, however, would not agree to give up his business interests and devote his entire time to educational work, and Dr. Savitz was the first choice of the board. W. F. Groves, W. L. Little, principal of the Baitin High School, of Elizabeth, and Sup. Becker, of the Railway schools, were also candidates for the position. Mr. Little withdrew his candidacy some weeks ago.

Dr. Savitz has made a rapid rise in the educational field. Just after leaving college in 1889 he became superintendent of the schools of Slatington, Pa., which position he held for seven years, resigning it to accept the superintendency of the schools of Dover, N. J. He remained at Dover five years, and his administration there was marked by an enlarging of the school facilities, and the establishment of an excellent preparatory curriculum. He came to Westfield in the fall of 1901, and it is in a large measure due to his splendid executive ability that the local public school now rank among the best equipped and best managed in the state.

Dr. Savitz has been a post-graduate student at New York University since 1890, from which institution he has received the degree of Bachelor of Science, Doctor of Pedagogy, and Master of Pedagogy. He has also received the degrees of Ph. B. from Illinois Wesleyan University, and M. A. from Ursinus College. He is a graduate of the Stroudsburg Normal School, and was for three years a student at Lafayette College. He is one of the best known educators in the state.

A BUDGET OF QUESTIONS.

Advice and Suggestions Contributed by Madame Merril.

Pass dainty chicken sandwiches, olives, nuts, peppermint and small cakes and wafers. This is a great sufficiency for an afternoon party.

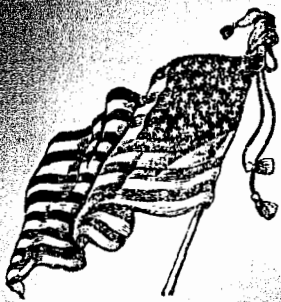

BROTHER THAT WAS SPOILED.

A few weeks ago the outlook for Democratic victory in this State was promising. The German vote was opposed to the Republican party because of the Bishop's Bill, and the reformers were making things warm for the administration by a grade against Boss Rule and "Inadequate" excise legislation. Democrats were quick to sense the spirit of the times, and did all in their power to encourage the warring factions. A rather ludicrous situation was thus presented. The Bosses flying the Bosses, and two widely diverse social elements, the Reformers and the Liquor Dealers, warring against the Republican party; the former for not having reformed enough, and the latter for having reformed at all. The Democratic Bosses, on the one hand, pointed to the "dissidence of dissent" within the enemies camp, and decried boss rule; and on the other hand, promised the liquor dealers certain and sudden death to the Bishop's Bill as soon as they came into power. The political pot thus boiled and scolded for a short time, and the Democratic Cooks sneaked their lips in anticipation of a delicious feast.

But circumstances must be reckoned with in the game of politics. The party that is on the pinnacle of prosperity to-day may find itself in the slough of defeat to-morrow. So it is in this instance. Fate and the element of fear have overmastered the good fortunes of the Democratic party, and now the conditions are reversed. The broth has been spoiled in the cooking thereof.

For the Democratic Bosses who promised so much to the liquor dealers in the way of friendly excise legislation have been balked by the people in carrying out their plans. The Democrats, in convention assembled, would have complied with the wishes of their German friends, and incorporated an excise plank in the platform that would have satisfied the most fastidious Hoboken Dutchman, but then they would have antagonized the large majority of people who firmly believe that restrictive excise legislation is absolutely essential. They, therefore, straddled the issue, and their excise plank promises nothing that is tangible either to the free-and-easy dutchman, or to the staunch advocate of a "closed" Sunday.

And, moreover, where there was factional difference in the Republican Party now all is harmony.

The Reformers have seen a light, and will hold to their own party and its candidates, for with all her faults they love her still. They realize that the evils they have decried are not peculiar to the Republican party; that these evils, manifested in one form or another, have been inherent in the human race since Adam and Eve bequeathed to their children a natural propensity to sin. And they accept the Republican party as the party best able to administer the affairs of state, and to the needs of the diverse elements in our complex social system.

A MERITED PROMOTION.

The appointment of Dr. John J. Savitz, superintendent of the Westfield Public Schools, to the position of Superintendent of the schools of Union County, is a recognition of faithful service in the interests of free education. Dr. Savitz is an earnest student, and conscientious worker, and his worth is attested by the fact that he is successful.

If by his new appointment, Westfield were to lose the services of Dr. Savitz, we could not but bespeak the regret of the people of this place, and most cordial good wishes. But inasmuch as Dr. Savitz will continue as the head of our public school system, we offer congratulations not only to him but to the people of this town—to Dr. Savitz for his merited promotion, and to the people of Westfield for having a man of such recognized ability in charge of the public schools. Hereafter this place will be the educational hub of Union County.
