The proposition of the minority in the Board of Education to erect two wings on the Washington school at a cost of 105,000, was carried by a majority of eight votes after the most strenuous election ever held in this town. More votes were cast than at any previous school election, the total ballot being 1355. Of this number 686 for the Washington site, 342 for the Mountain avenue site, and 322 against both propositions; necessary to a choice 678.

The result was a surprise to many, for it was generally conceded before the election that both propositions would be defeated by the voters. Neither was considered satisfactory, although the minority side had the call for the reason that there was such astrong feeling against the Peekham "dump" as a school site. The Washington proposition was advanced as an alternative which aimed to defeat the Mountain avenue proposition. It, was noted that even the champions of the Washington site were taken by surprise when they learned that their plan had carried,

As Hypothetical Father He Dissapproves of Certain Modern Methods.

Mine is that of the hypothetical father of a family of boys whom he can afford to send to college, though I, also, wish my boys to be well educated. The third is the case of the man, who from lack of interest, meither expect-nor wishes his boys to receive the higher education that the college represents. The third class is sometimes called "the poor," which term I am willing to accept it it means poor in ideal: if it means poor in pocket, the phrase is mis-leading, and often singularly inaccurate. The constituency in my class. I believe is about fifty per cent of the children of the town: the "poor" constituency is about forty per cent: ten per cent may be conceded to Mr. Clark's constituency. Mr. Clark, however, gets even with u-by assuming the championship of the "poor." The most generous debater could not refrain from the obvious com-ment that all Mr. Clark has to say in praise of the existing curriculum as a sufficient education for the "poor" is disconted by the fact that it does not satisfy the needs of the boys in his own class. What he says in effect, is that the sons of the "poor" do not need a higher grade of academic education than what they now receive in the grammar school, but that the boys of his own class. Us a sop to be "poor" by open-ing extra commercial corrses, whieb is not education hut a sort of a play as many know. But what about my boys of the secv know

Inst education but a sort of a play as many know. But what about my boys of the sec-ond class? They also, in their father's opinion, need the higher education, but they will not get it. Why? Because it is not to be had in the grammar school, and I cannot afford to keep them at home after the age of fifteen or sixteen. They must go to business at that age, therefore to be handlcapped in middle life by not heing able to meet college men on equal terms. Now, sir, when I reflect that their father went to business as an office boy at fifteen and a haf years of age, having studied French from the age of six, Latin, (Caesar, Livy, Cicero, Hor-ace) from the age of ten, German at twelve, algebra and geometry at twelve, chemestry and other sciences at thirteen, matural philosophy and trigonometry at fourteen, and that he still lives to tell the tale, I am concerned to ask why my hoys should be denied the educational advantages that their father had? It must be conceded, of course, that not all fathers of today were so advantag-eously circumstanced. And in this fact, perhaps, may be found the reason for eously circumstanced. And in this fact, perhaps, may be found the reason for the continuance of our present faulty characterial action

perhaps, may be found the reason for the continuance of our present faulty educational system. Fathers, who themselves received but a meager education, have but little disposition to demand higher education, us an end in itself, for their sons. The man, for instance, who never studied Latin does not appreciate the value of that particular study for his boy. This fact he does appreciate, that the pros-perous men of his acquaintance are not all equally well educated, and that many a man who has made a commer-cial success of life regrets the lack of an educated mind. Supposing now that the fathers in Westfield sympathising with my case as I have stated it, were favorable to a radical readjustment of public school affairs, the first change necessary would be the establishment of segarate boys and girls' schools for this reason (in ad-dition to the others mentioned in my first letter) that the advanced subjects enumerated alove can be tangth suc-cessfully to boys between the ages of the and fifteen whereas girls are not mentally ready for them, until they have reached the age of fifteen. Hence, cession to boys between the ages of ten and fifteen, whereas girls are not mentally ready for them, nntil they have reached the age of fifteen. Hence, my accusation against co-education is that the boys are kept back, waiting for girls: that our Westfield boys are wast-ing the most precions years of life, edu-cationally speaking; that they are at tending what is practically a girls' school, are being brought up in a femi-nine atmosphere detrimental to the best interests of the male sex. On behalf of the girls, if or 1 am also a hypothetical father of girls, i may say that their father does not want them to be their brothers' competitors, either in studies or athletics; nor does he wish them to mix promiscuonsly with all the boys in the town who are not their brothers.

I have not attempted to tonch the ques-tion of finance which he raises, because that is a matter in which, as a past member of the Board of Education, he can speak with the greater authority. But with regard to the distribution of pupils under various teachers. I would venture to predict hetter results from a staff of "all-round" teachers who are expected to teach everything. than from staff of "all-round" teachers who are expected to teach everything, than from a staff of speciality. If I had time, I think I could show that special subject teachers disturb the mental poise of children of school age, and that the older educational methods are the sounder. older educational methods are me sounder. My thanks to you, Mr. Editor, for the use of your columns; I must not write again of this subject, not for the pres-ent. Perhaps those who have read the correspondence will begin to wonder, at the forthorning commencement exer-cises, whether, after all, it is worth while to maintain an elaborate night school system which brings to gradua-tion fifteen or sixteen pupils, and denies to my children and the children of the "poor" equal opportunities with the children of the well-to-do.
