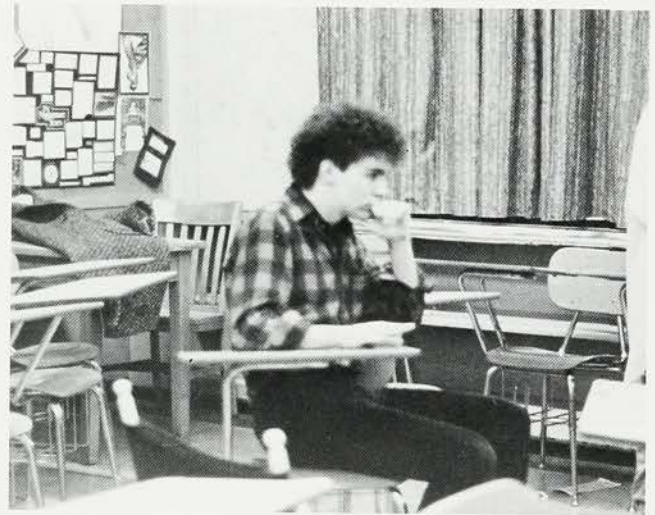
YOUNG REPUBLICANS

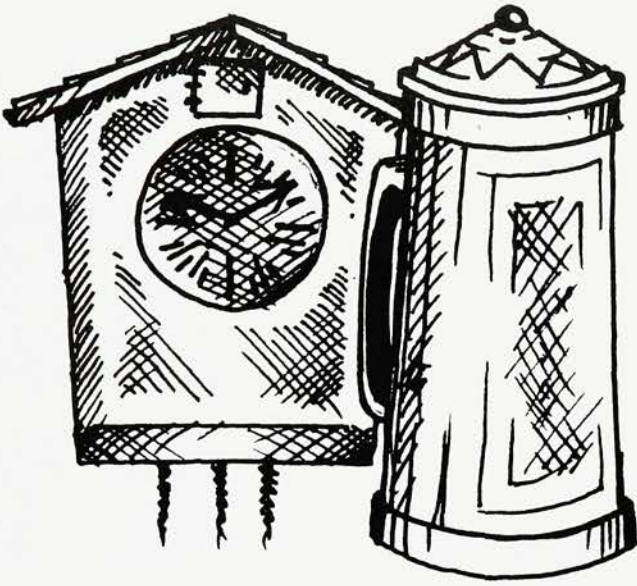
The French Club this year consists of approximately 70 members. The officers are:

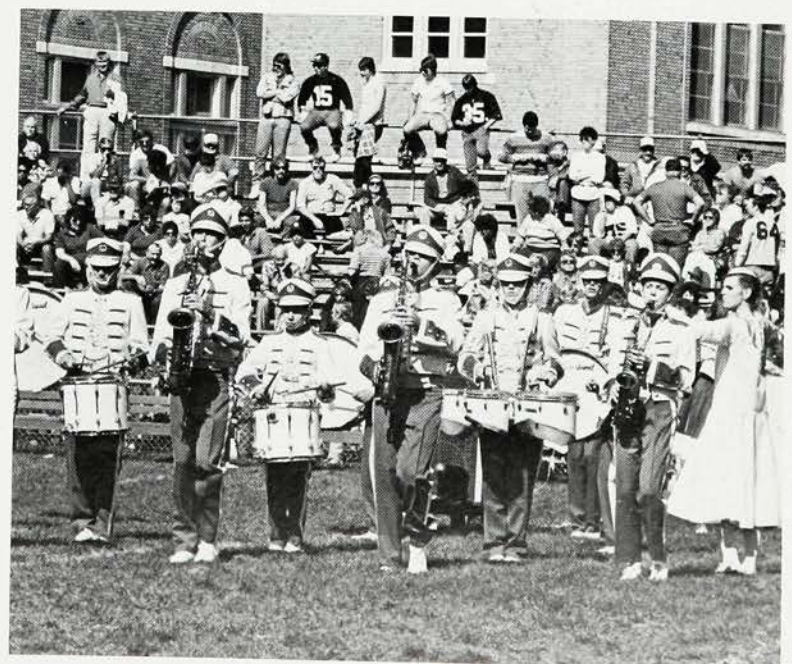
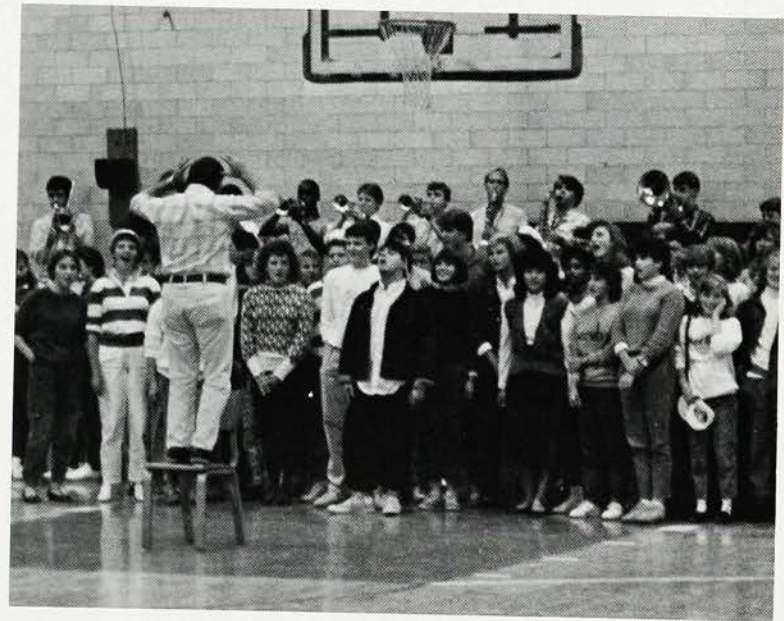


MARCHING BAND

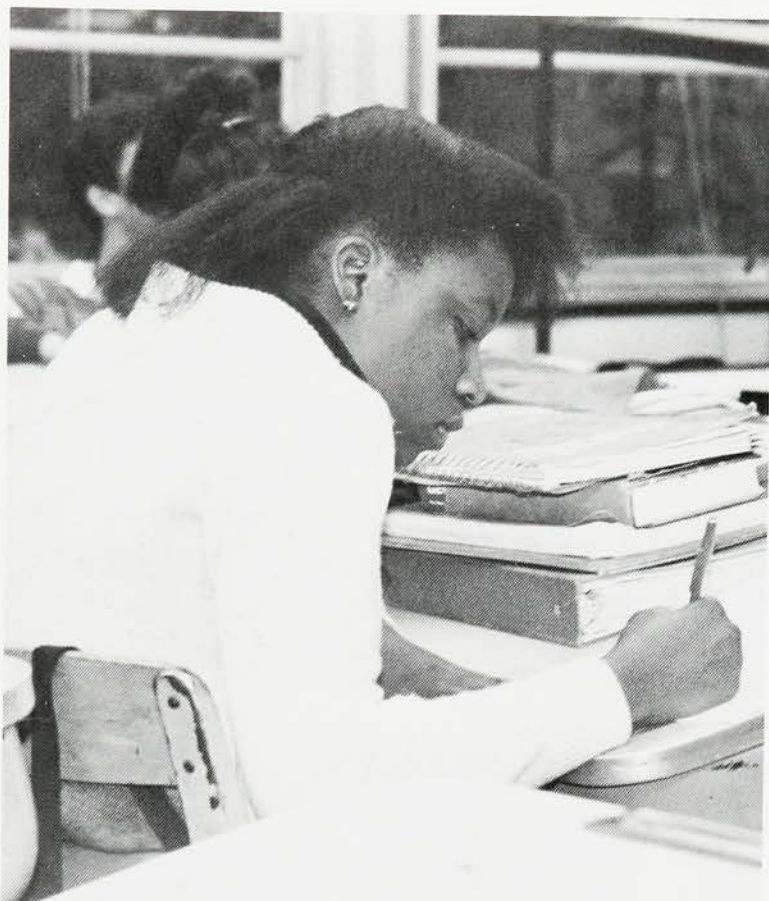

AWARENESS CLUB

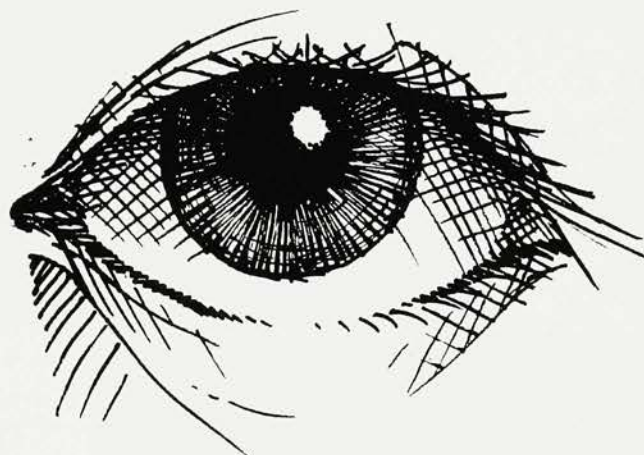

6. Contribute to the Neighborhood Council for needy people.

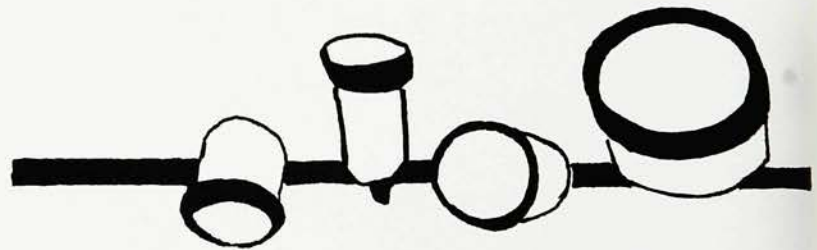




LIGHTING CREW



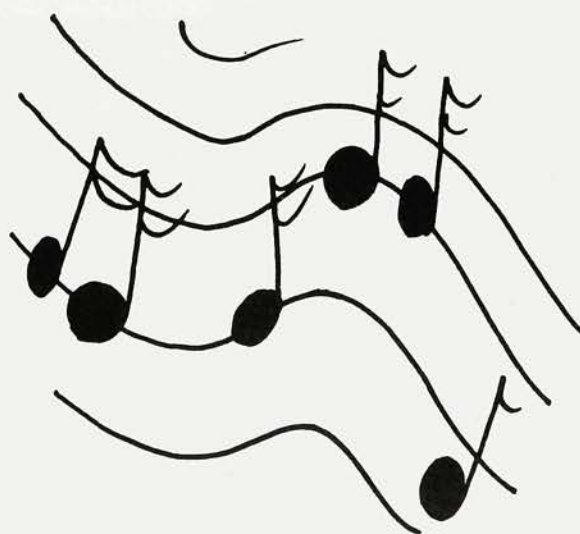

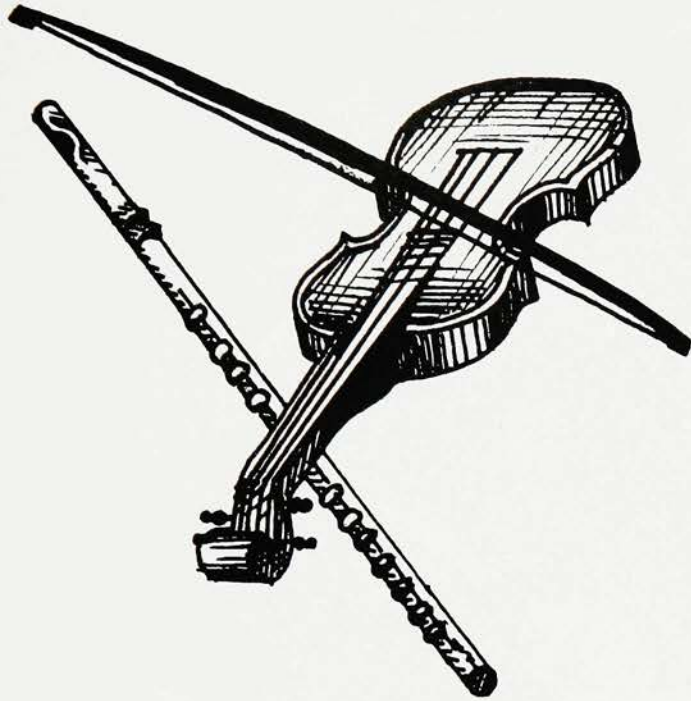

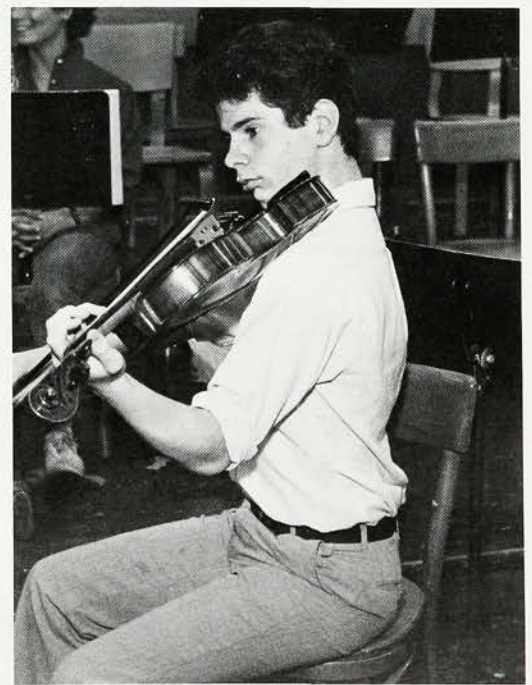

FILM CLUB

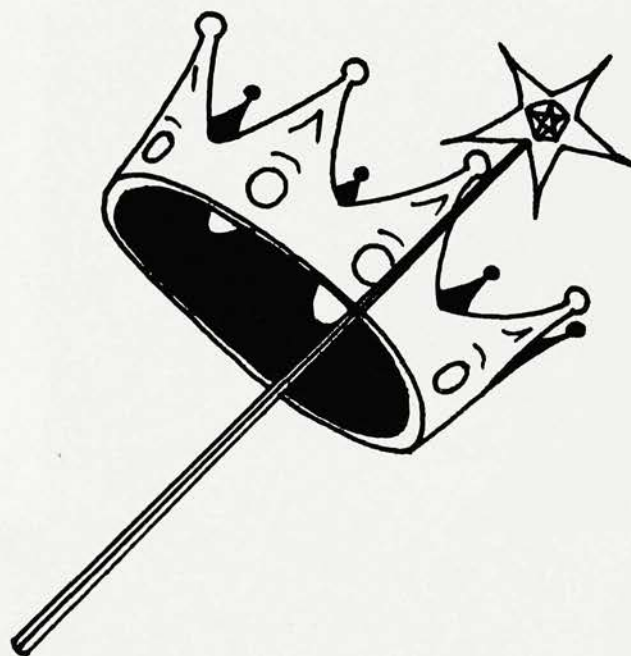
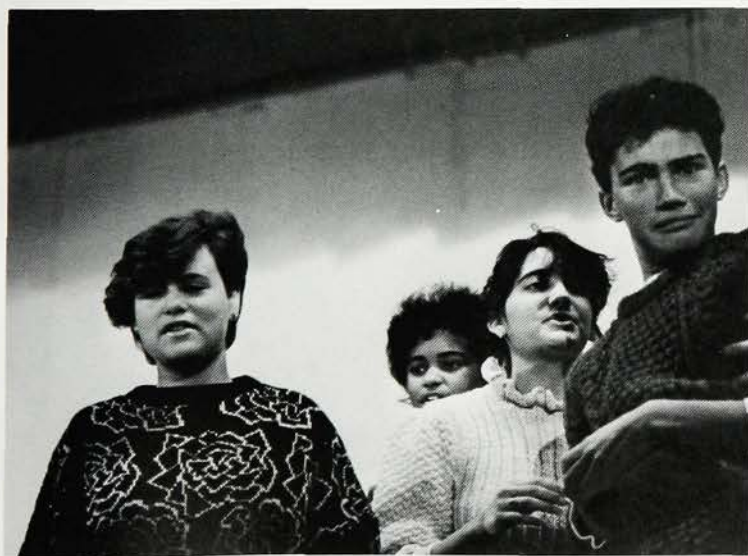

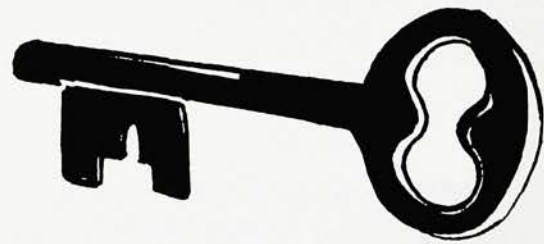
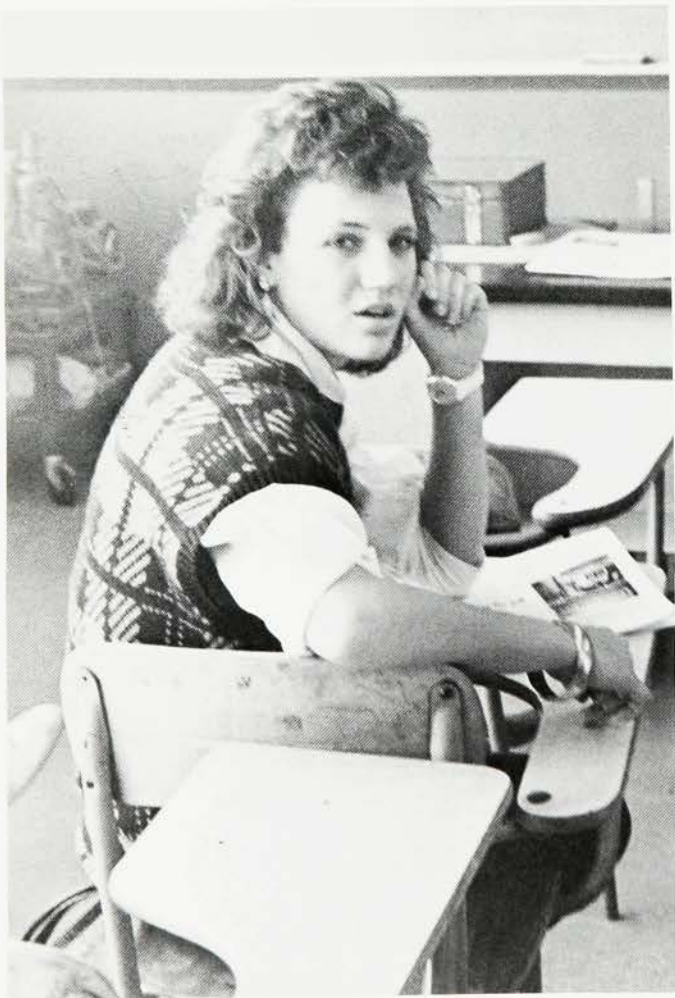
CHILDREN'S THEATRE

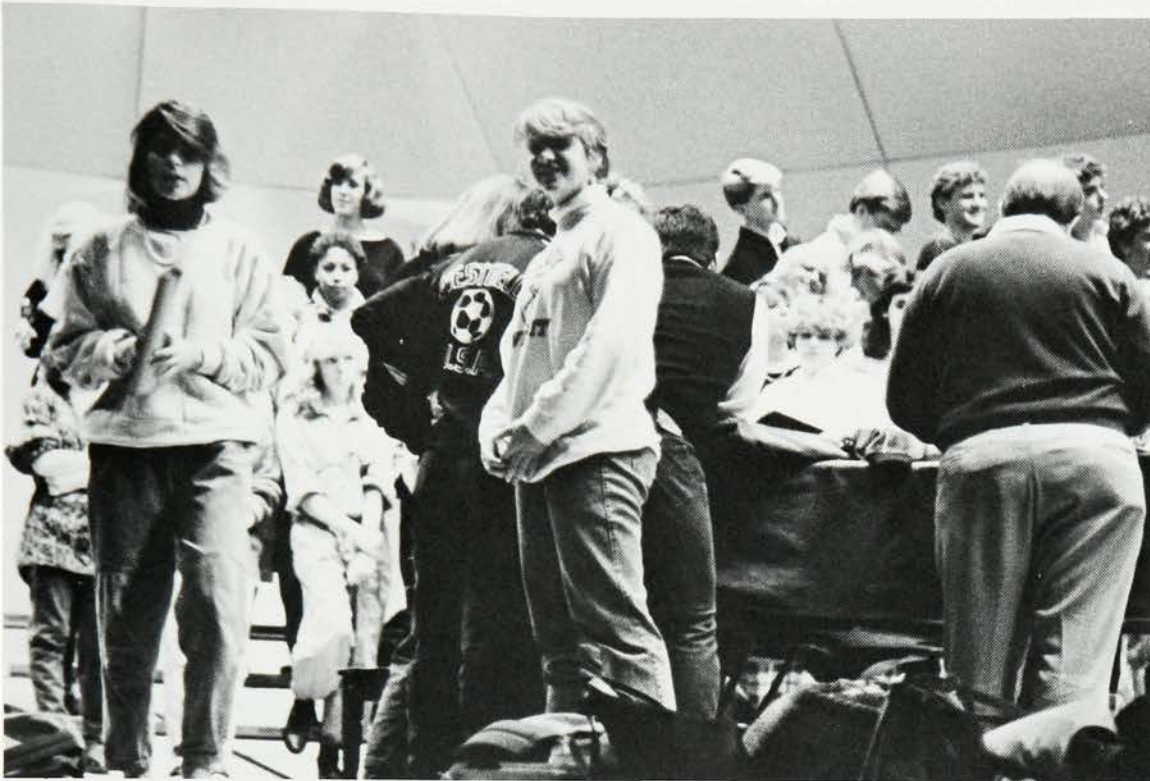

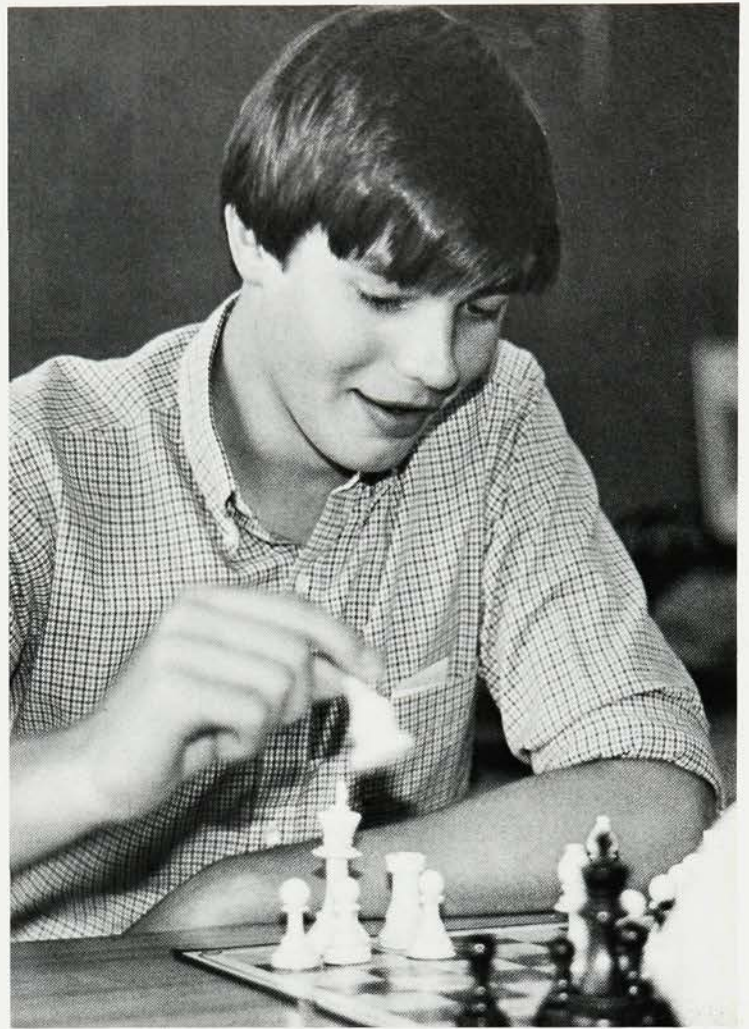
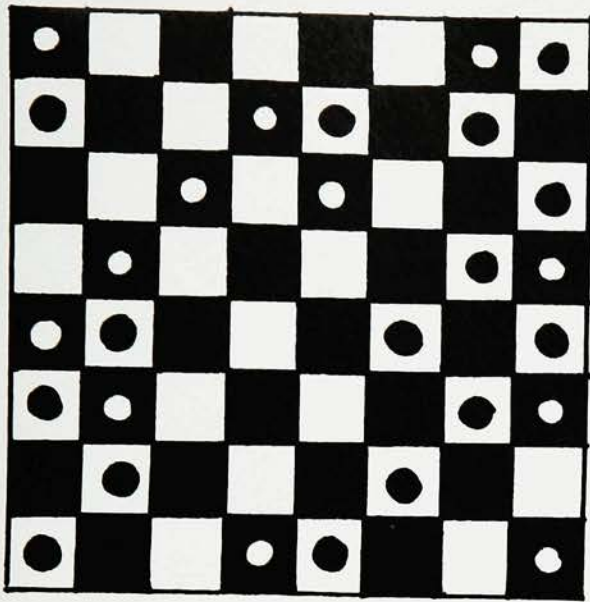


BILLIARDS CLUB

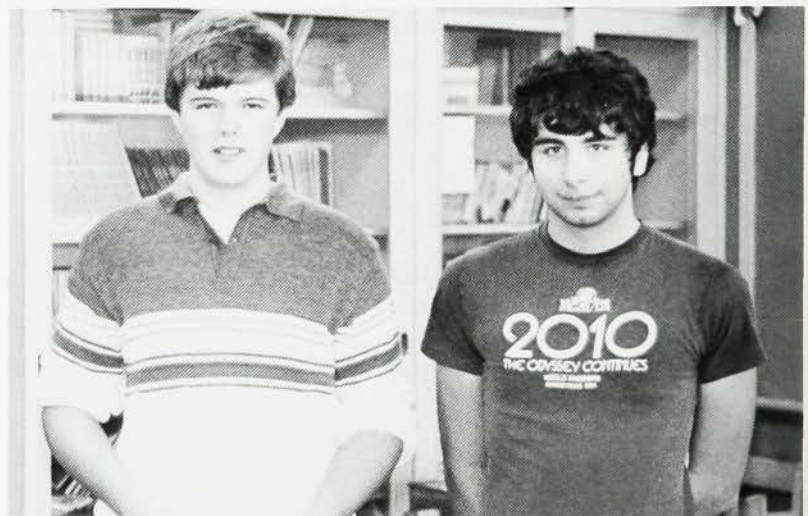
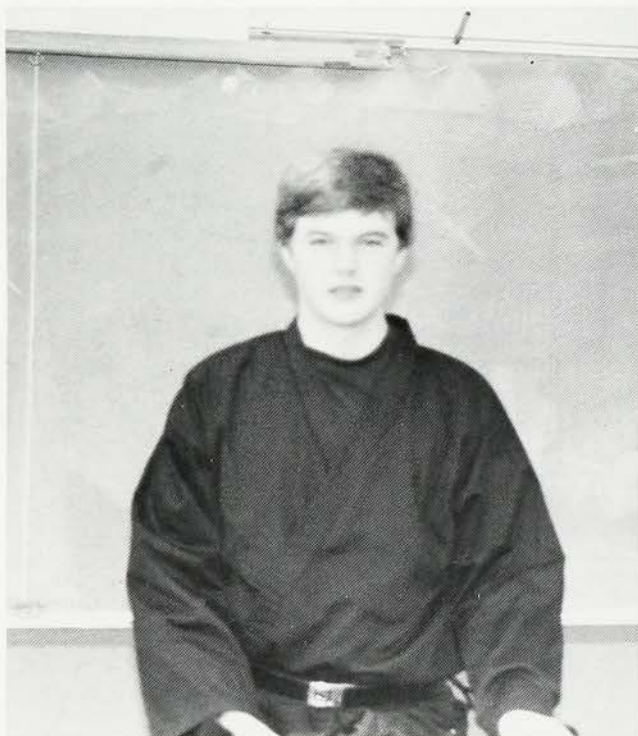
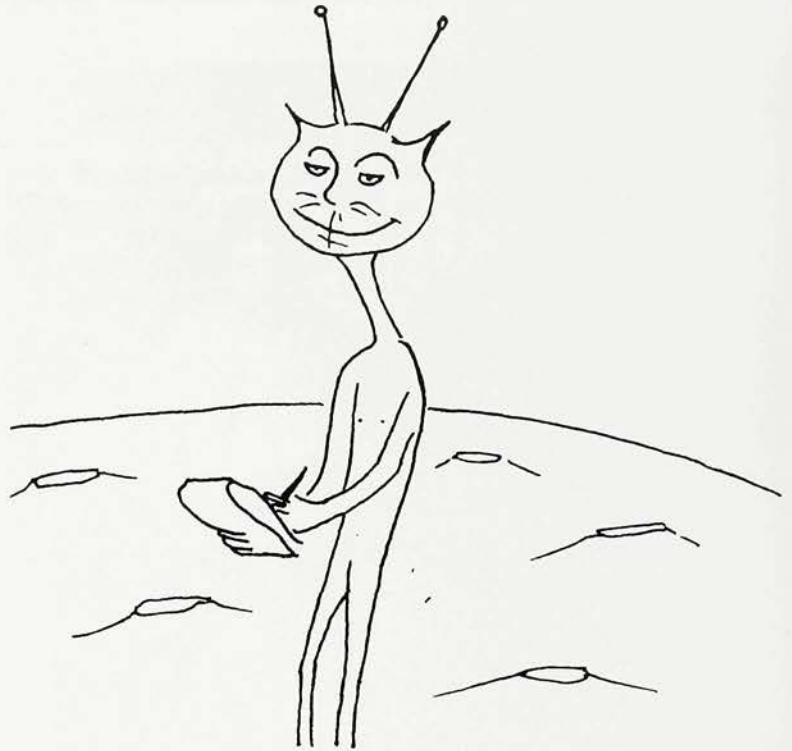
SATURDAY SCIENCE

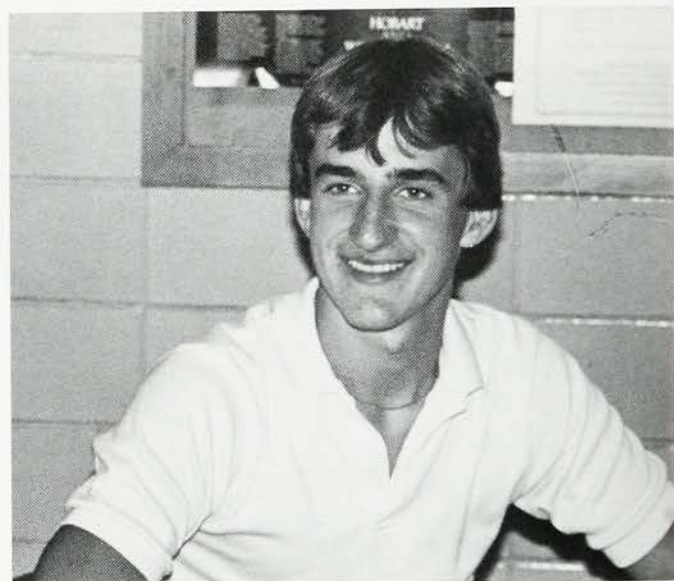
NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

INTERNATIONAL NEWS

Terrorism . . . During the past year an ugly rash of terrorist attacks struck fear in the hearts of the American people. The Achille Lauro; TWA Flight 847, an Egyptian airliner; the airports in Rome and Vienna—these P.L.O. raids took the lives of many innocent people. Americans now had to think twice before leaving home and the paranoia of being trapped in America spread.

The most devastating tragedy was the explosion of the space shuttle Challenger one minute after takeoff, resulting in the death of all seven aboard, including teacher Christa McAuliffe. It plunged the nation into mourning and reminded everyone of the danger involved in exploring the last frontier.
