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One Day in September

It is still a place of vitality and culture unlike any other in the world.

For the first time, Weather Vane has asked the three editors of the award-winning Hi's Eye to prepare a spread that reports on the year's events. Presenting news from our school, the nation and the world, they will cover all that is current through March 2002, when the last section of this volume goes to press. It is our hope that by then they will be able to write about the end of the war and a world that is learning the things that make for peace.

Westfield High School, 550 Dorian Road, 2001-2002

In the aftermath of Sept. 11 attacks

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After a tragedy, pyschiatrists identify five clear stages of the grieving process. In the wake of the catastrophic events of Sept. 11, in which the two World Trade Center towers collapsed, a piece of the Pentagon was destroyed, innocent lives were lost forever and the safety of all Americans was paralyzed, Westfield is still experiencing these stages of grieving.

It is not only because Westfield is 25 miles away from Ground Zero, or because it lost eight residents in the attacks–Andrew Alameno, 37, Michael Davidson, 27, Stephen Fogel, 40, Russell Keene, 33, Richard Madden, 35, John Salerno, 21, See-Wong Shum, 44, and Anthony Starita, 35–for almost 3,000 people from across the nation and the world lost their lives as well. It is because Westfield is filled with typical American citizens–with hopes,

dreams and the desire for freedom, all of which the terrorists who committed these acts aimed to destroy.

Stage 1 — Denial

Throngs of students massed around television sets, shifting eagerly to witness the events unfold. Then they stood, silent, dumbfounded, eyes hot with tears fixed upon the horror, like children staring at something for the first time. This is the way we will remember it–Sept.. 11, 2001–the day our generation witnessed war for the first time.

At WHS classes went on as scheduled but not as planned. In many classes teachers postponed scheduled lessons to listen to the radio or to

watch the news and to discuss the unfolding tragedy. Dr. Daniel Weitz told his Ancient Traditions class, "From now on there will be two Americas, the one before Sept. 11 and the one after."

Stage 2 — Anger

A major issue in the school community was a possible backlash against students of Arab descent. Sources reported students making numerous anti-Arab comments in the hallways in the first days after the attack.

One student said, "My last name is Abdelmessieh, and as of 9 a.m. eastern time on the day of Sept. 11, 2001 I have felt like an outsider in a nation that I call home. Because of my last name and because of the way I look, I feel ashamed. I feel ashamed not because I am an Arab, but because I am seen as one. I, as were many others, am seen as someone who would celebrate the loss of a countless number of lives. I am seen as someone who is



a threat to democracy and the ideology of a free world."

Stage 3 — Bargaining

In an effort to aid others, the Westfield community raised a total of \$131,447,48 to benefit the Red Cross. Senior Ashleigh Nemec also organized a ribbon sale to benefit the 25th Ladder Company of NYC, for which her boyfriend's father works. The entire company was lost in the attacks.

In addition, the United Fund established a Westfield Sept. 11th Fund to aid families of Westfield residents who lost their lives on Sept. 11.

Stage 4 — Depression

Many steps were taken throughout the WHS community to cope with the inevitable feelings of depression in the subsequent weeks. Students were

excused from class to meet with clergy, faculty and counselors. Petix continued to inform students of the most recent news during the daily announcements. Said Petix: "It is important to continually prepare students emotionally and intellectually for what will happen next."

The Westfield religious community was also quick to organize support. St. Paul's Episcopal Church set up a shelter for children with parents who worked in Manhattan and were stranded or missing. Other religious institutions held interfaith services, blood drives and collected needed materials for the rescue effort. The Lutheran Church had its doors open 24 hours a day.

Stage 5 — Acceptance

Only time can tell when true acceptance will come to Westfield, or the nation. On Sept. 23, the Westfield township held a community candlelight vigil, filling East Broad and Elm streets. Hundreds of town citizens lit candles to commemorate their losses.

Said senior Christy Abdelmessiah, "As of now, we are a nation in mourning, and the most important thing is to unite, not as Muslims, Christians and Jews, but as human beings."

Stage 6-Patriotism

The denial, the sadness and even the anger were inevitable. What no one could have ever predicted was the surge of patriotism that followed the attacks. From clothing to flags, signs to ribbons, donations to a newfound interest in the local Red Cross and Rescue Squad, Westfield has come together to show its American spirit; and it's all red, white and blue.

Governmental policies threaten liberty, safety

In a time when American flags can be seen everywhere, faith in government and elected officials has taken an enormous leap, to the extent that it is becoming "unpatriotic" not to fall in line without questioning any government actions being taken in recent times.

Editorial

Many people are unaware of the impact that recent congressional and presidential actions will have on America. The Patriot Act passed by Congress does not apply exclusively to those suspected of terrorism, but broadens law enforcement powers entirely. It provides the power to obtain a warrant to search a house and confiscate anything that may be considered evidence without even informing the owner. When the terrorism threat is quelled, it would be naive to expect this to go away; it will almost certainly expand to include investigations on drugs, computer crimes and anything else for which a warrant can be obtained.

Meanwhile, as the president is encouraging the country to beware of prejudice and not blame all Muslims for the attacks on Sept. 11, hundreds of Arab-Americans have been imprisoned in the name of national security. Perhaps some of these detainees are in contact with Al-Qaeda, but hundreds are law-abiding American citizens being subjected to discrimination by their government.

The matter of the U.S. attacks in Afghanistan

is also subject to question. While action against terrorism is appropriate, the bombings, particularly in cities, are responsible for killing hundreds of innocent Afghans. The United States has found an ally in the Northern Alliance, a group which has a history of violence and torture of prisoners, and is in many ways fundamentally evil but has become our ally thanks to mutual hatred of the Taliban.

Much of the public opinion surrounding these issues may be best summarized by a statement attributable to Ben Franklin, which rings truer today than ever before: "Those who would give up essential liberty to purchase a little temporary safety deserve neither liberty nor safety."

WHS receives bomb threats

A bomb threat was called into the State Police from a cell phone on Dec. 10 around 8 p.m. The caller claimed that a bomb had been placed in WHS. The Sheriff's Department searched the building with bomb-sniffing dogs. The police did not find any suspicious devices. The following day everyone who came into the school had his or her backpack and coat searched by bomb-sniffing dogs. Teachers were instructed to monitor all exits throughout the day.

A second threat was made to 911 on Dec.14 indicating a bomb would detonate on Saturday or Monday.

Police arrested 2001 WHS graduate Anthony Brown on Dec. 18 after a third bomb threat stalled the annual WHS Instrumental Concert that evening. The charge is a thirddegree crime, meaning possible penalties range from a jail sentence to a fine.

Construction disrupts classes

WHS officially began using four classrooms in the Armory across the street from the high school on Jan. 7. The switchover does not come without a price for WHS as its lease with the Armory, which runs through the end of this school year, totals \$19,350. The construction will be paid for through the school renovation plan that was voted for by Westfield citizens last year.

As of January, construction was slated to begin in March. The portables will sit idle until that time.

Music in hallways strikes chord with WHS

In times of military conflict, there is a natural propensity toward focusing on the somberness of the situation. While playing music over the loudspeaker might seem like a circuitous and ineffective resolution, it seemed to have worked on Nov. 14.

Editorial

Recently, the morale of the student body has understandably been dampened, and by giving the students something positive on which to focus, the negativity that has been building since Sept. 11 was momentarily pushed aside.

This new musical stimulation has been provided by junior Raj Bhandari, head of the WHS chapter of the national fund-raising organization Operation Smile. The Student Council, which recently started to play music every Wednesday during homeroom, also has received very positive feedback.

B+, C+ grading policy

The Board of Education (BOE) voted 5-3 in favor of implementing a new grading system for WHS. The system, which will be implemented starting with the incoming Class of 2006, adds grades of C+ and B+ to the current range of WHS grades and does not include an A+ grade or any minus grades.

Editorial

The BOE's addition of a B+ and a C+ to the existing grading system trivializes students' transcripts, bypasses teachers' opinions and, in compromise, destroys the intent of a sound system.

It is clear that a change needed to be made to the antiquated system in which a solid letter grade represented a 10-point span. A distinction between an 80 and 89 is necessary to reflect a student's true performance. The BOE commendably recognized the faults of the situation and altered the system.

However, it is highly insulting and hypocritical to assume that teachers are incapable of making the distinction between a B and a B-.

The new system, though honorable in theory, is useless in practice. The purpose of a plus/minus system is to reflect a students' performance more ac-

curately. A compromise should not be necessary.

Mayor reverses decision; menorah, tree to be displayed

Mayor Gregory McDermott reversed his decision to prohibit the placement of religiously affiliated symbols throughout town on Dec. 4. The Mayor said the most recent decision was in an effort to better reflect the opinions of the people of Westfield.

McDermott made this decision after receiving requests

to erect a menorah and a creche on public property to celebrate the coming holiday season. Due to complaints received by clergy and residents, the Mayor has decided to "go back to the status quo of last year" and display the tree and menorah. McDermott proposed to form a committee to discuss what religious symbols to display next year.
