Park 'Chapel' Built for Town By Residents

Placed on Lake Island, It Has Been Replaced Many Times Since 1946

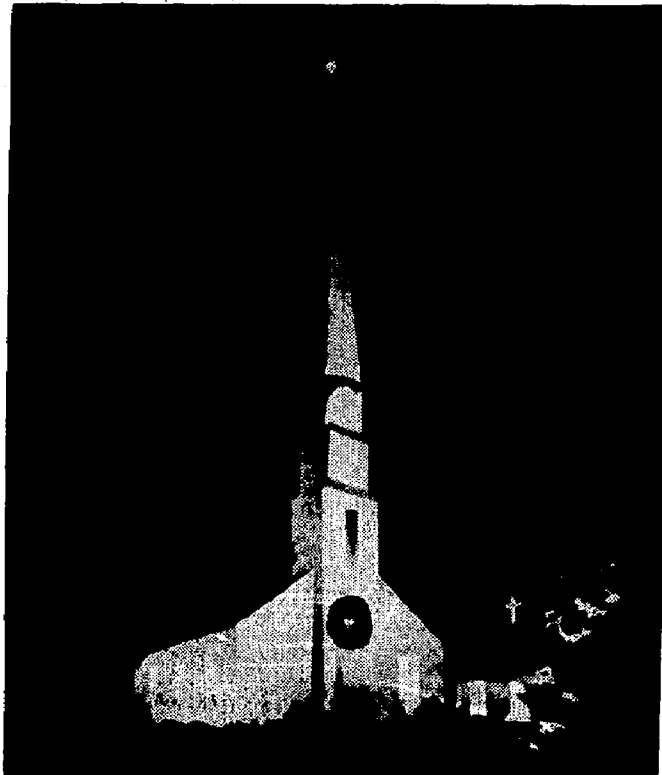
Many visitors to the central business district of Westfield during the Christmas holidays probably wonder about the origin of the model church which is placed on the island in the lake in Mindowaskin Park each year.

The idea for the church came from then-Town Engineer John Hopkins about a week before Christmas in 1946, according to Martin W. Vincentsen of Westfield, the builder of the project.

Electrical and audio work was done by George "Bus" Wragg of the Westfield Police Department, the painting by Harry Van Reckum and the architectural designing by Ray O. Peck with materials furnished by Mr. Vincentsen.

The town was not charged for the work, Mr. Vincentsen said.

The original model, which has been replaced every few years, did not have a chapel extension. That was added the second year the structure was placed on the island, Mr. Vincentsen noted.

Judge Overrules Board On the A&M Variance

Auto Body Repair and Spray Booth May Be Permitted

A Superior Court Judge on December 10 ruled the Westfield Board of Adjustment was "arbitrary, capricious and unreasonable" in denying permission to A&M Auto Center of 413 South Elmer Street to operate an auto body repair and paint shop.

Judge John Pisansky, sitting in Elizabeth, reversed the 4-3 vote, taken in the summer of last year, which turned down A&M's application for site-plan approval of a structure to house a spray-paint booth and for variances and conditional-use approval which would allow the firm to operate the automobile body repair establishment.

However, he did require A&M to plant a row of arbor vitae trees along a fence separating the parking lot from the shop from surrounding residences and the street in order to satisfy Westfield zoning requirements for screening.

Judge Pisansky agreed with attorneys from A&M, however, two Board of Adjustment members, Arthur C. Fried and Lawrence J. Mannino, incorrectly voted against the application because they said it could not be approved due to a state law which says once a Planning Board has heard an application a Board of Adjustment in the same community cannot hear and rule on a similar

application. A&M first obtained conditional-use approval from the town Planning Board to operate an engine-repair business. Soon thereafter they began conducting the auto body repair and painting business, according to the court papers.

Because the auto body repair was a conditional use requiring separate approval, the Planning Board found A&M had used the property illegally while both the auto body repair and painting and the engine repair were in operation.

When A&M in 1989 sought approval from the Planning Board to add a spray-painting booth, the application was denied.

In 1990, A&M sought approval to operate the auto body repair and engine-repair businesses and to build an addition which would house a spray-painting booth.

These applications also were denied.

DELEGATION FROM WESTFIELD WOULD GO THERE IN APRIL Board of Education Approves Continued Exchange Activities With Schools in Russian Town

Educators From Chelyabinsk Would Come Here for Two-to-Three-Week Stay; Testing for Kindergarten Admissions Cutoff Date of December 1 Abolished

The majority of the members of the Westfield Board of Education gave their support on Tuesday to a proposal by Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Mark C. Smith, to continue the relationship between the Westfield School District and that of Chelyabinsk, Russia.

For three years, said the Superintendent, the Westfield Schools have participated in a series of exchange activities with the schools in Chelyabinsk.

Teachers and administrators from Westfield have visited Chelyabinsk on three occasions; officials and teachers from Chelyabinsk visited Westfield twice.

Most significantly, he said, two Westfield teachers, Alan Lantis, a high school social studies teacher, and his wife, Mrs. Randee Lantis, an intermediate school foreign language teacher, spent a full semester teaching in School No. 93 in Chelyabinsk.

The proposal for continued contact between the two towns was presented by Mr. Lantis. The proposed program, he said, is divided into two parts.

The first part would require the philosophical, not the financial, support of the administration.

It would consist of a delegation of from four to seven Westfield staff members traveling to Chelyabinsk to

act as consultants. Mr. Lantis explained.

This trip would be financed entirely by the people involved, at least for the first few years.

Dr. Smith said some type of funding might be available after that.

The trip would take place over the April vacation, although an additional three days of released time would be requested "to make the trip manageable," Mr. Lantis said.

The staff members would be carefully chosen, he continued, based on the skills they could bring to the project, the field they represent and their willingness to finance their own expense.

Mr. Lantis spoke of the impact his previous trip had on him.

"It was a tremendous impact," he said, "both professionally and personally."

He noted what he saw as a serious lack in teacher training in Chelyabinsk, and that became his major focus while he was there.

"We had ongoing seminars in critical thinking, and exchanged views on education," he said.

"What's lacking in the teachers is any kind of creative thinking," he said, "and they realize this."

"I think Westfield could get something out of this," he added. "It's a tremendous opportunity for staff members. The effect it would have on morale is significant. We could

benefit from their mathematics and language teaching." Mr. Lantis pointed out by fifth grade students in Russia are fluent in English.

The second part of the program would involve bringing Russian educators to Westfield, he said.

There are key people who have been identified in Chelyabinsk who are in a position to have an impact on the possible reforms and the future of education in that city and region; these are educational leaders in government, administrative personnel, and teachers who are attempting to innovate and adopt new directions, Mr. Lantis said.

The proposal, he added, is to bring seven to 12 of these people to Westfield for a two-to-three-week stay. They would be responsible for their own transportation, and Westfield would be responsible for housing them during their stay. Mr. Lantis has already spoken to people who would be willing to do this.

"I'm enthusiastic about this program," the Superintendent said. "I think it's something we should be doing."

The Westfield School should continue their relationship with Chelyabinsk for several reasons, he said. The world will be a better place if citizens and educators in Russia and citizens and educators in America develop a better understanding of each

Town Council Members Give Praise To John F. Malloy at His Retirement

Both Political Parties Praise His Fairness and Diligence in Fiscal Matters

The Westfield Town Council held its last meeting of the year on Tuesday, and it used the occasion to praise outgoing Town Administrator John F. Malloy, Jr. on 23 years of distinguished service—Tuesday also was his last meeting as Administrator even though he will not leave office until Friday, December 31.

In a proclamation read at the session, Mayor Garland C. "Bud" Boothe, Jr. noted Mr. Malloy was appointed to the town post on January 1, 1970, following successful careers in municipal engineering and management in Clark and Maplewood.

Mayor Boothe added Mr. Malloy

received the Career Award from the New Jersey Municipal Managers Association for excellence in public administration in 1982 and the President's Award from the Westfield Area Chamber of Commerce last year.

He also praised the Administrator's service to the taxpayers through his "diligent attention to the town's finances, budgetary matters, personnel, property and other policy issues" and his ability to deal "efficiently, sympathetically and with dry humor" with the requests and mandates of town officials.

Third Ward Republican Councilman Kenneth L. MacRitchie noted Mr. Malloy never had engaged in political grandstanding and was a meticulous, diligent worker.

"We wish him the best as he drives off into the sunset," Councilman MacRitchie said, probably in reference to the opposition by First Ward Democratic Councilman Anthony M. LaPorta to the council's decision to transfer title of the 1987 Buick which the Administrator has been using on town business to Mr. Malloy.

Fourth Ward Democratic Councilman James Hely, agreeing Mr. Malloy never had shown an ounce of partisanship in carrying out his duties, added councilmen, in their short terms

of service, should be happy to do half the job which Mr. Malloy has done for the town.

Speaking in praise of Mr. Malloy and in support of the ordinance, adopted Tuesday, turning over the car to him, former Mayor Allen Chin said Mr. Malloy, with the amount of time put in at extra meetings, some of them on Saturdays, and other extra duties had given the town back many times the value of his salary.

During the vote on the ordinance Councilman LaPorta voted against the measure and Councilman MacRitchie, who has called for more study of the town's automobile-allocation for employees, abstained.

In other business, the council: Adopted an ordinance making Sycamore Street a through street so stop or yield signs can be placed at side streets intersecting with it.

Extended health-service contracts with Mountainside, Garwood and Fanwood for next year.

Authorized the awarding of a

Freeholders Change Code to Allow Deer Hunt

The Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders approved a resolution Monday that changes the county's administrative code, thus paving the way for an organized deer hunt in the Watchung Reservation next month.

The 6-2 approval of the resolution was met with strong opposition from

hunting opponents who have vowed to fight the Freeholders' decision in court.

Ben Crimaldo, the Union County Coordinator of the New Jersey Animal Rights Alliance, spoke for opponents of hunting.

He said most of those opposed to the reservation hunt are not animal-rights activists but rather county

residents and taxpayers who are "appalled" the Freeholders are allowing more guns to come into their communities.

"They are disappointed their elected officials choose violence to solve a problem. What does this teach our children? At a time when governmental agencies are trying to limit the use of firearms, you are advocating guns and killing as a solution," Mr. Crimaldo said.

"You have been bent on doing this despite your own admission it will not be a quick fix, while at the same time you have sought to create an atmosphere of crisis, mandating something be done immediately despite our own consultant's findings," he said.

He said the Freeholders have listened to alternatives to deep hunting "with deaf ears."

He called a report by Dr. Daniel J. Bernier, the Union County Chief of Bureau of Park Operations for the county's Division of Parks and Recreation, a "trashy, biased" report.

Mr. Crimaldo said a deer hunt not only would harm the deer but would drop real estate values of homes in and around the reservation and would damage the morale and peaceful neighborhood setting of those communities impacted by the hunt.

"Be advised when you vote tonight to accept the ordinance we will fight you in the courts and in every way we know," Mr. Crimaldo noted.

In other business, the board voted to table a resolution authorizing county officials to proceed with the rehabilitation of the trap-and-sneet shooting range in Cranford.

The board also approved Freeholder Elmer M. Ertl's resolution appointing James Anderson & Associates to complete an environmental impact study of the Lanape Park location.

The board was greeted, as they took their seats, with placards from members of Local No. 180 of the United Workers of America and their families. The union represents 360 workers at the county's Division of Social Services, formerly the welfare board.

Jeffrey Robinson, Local No. 1080 President, noted his union workers have continued to work without a contract since July 1. He said case loads have "skyrocketed" over the past three years, the length of the union's previous contract.

"In 1993 the county continues to be pretty stingy with its benefits. New Jersey is one of only five states that offers a state-run temporary disability plan, yet the county refuses to offer this to the workers in this county," Mr. Robinson said.

In responding to the "reinventing of government" statements by the

officials which relate to bringing down the cost of government, Mr. Robinson said the county has chosen to outspend by alicing employees' benefits and job protection.

"The county may have earned a triple A bond rating regarding its finances, but, as far as we are concerned, it rates an F in how it treats workers," Mr. Robinson concluded.

One of the signs read "Retro for County Officials, Retro for County Workers." Another read "\$\$ Save \$\$, Taxpayers' Dollars — for State Disability for All County Employees."

The first sign was a criticism of the board's decision earlier this month to approve merit raises to county officials retroactive to November 1.

County Manager, Mrs. Ann Baran, received a 3 per cent increase which raised her salary from \$111,049 to \$114,380.

Other increases included: County Counsel Jeremiah O'Dwyer, 3 per cent, \$014,031 to \$107,152; Freeholder Board Clerk Donald J. Ludwig, 3 per cent, \$50,598 to \$52,369; Director of Finance Lawrence M. Caroselli, 3.5 per cent, \$74,097 to \$76,690; Director of Administrative Services Joseph L. Saleme of Westfield, 3.5 per cent, \$68,316 to \$70,707; Director of Human Services Frank L. Guzzo, \$67,661 to \$70,029; Director of Operational Services Armand A. Fiorletti, 2.5 per cent, raising his base salary to \$90,433, and Joseph W. Sharp, Administration of Rumlens Specialized Hospital, 3 per cent merit raise, bumping his salary from \$79,401 to \$81,783.

The board agreed to review a report submitted by representatives of Policemen's Benevolent Association Locals No. 199 and 199A regarding early retirement as included in Assembly Bill No. A-126.

Joseph Billiams, representing Local No. 199A of the Superior Officers Association and Michael Sici of Local No. 199, representing the corrections officers, asked the board to review a plan submitted by the union's accountants which they said would mean a net savings to the county of \$1.6 million. This breaks down to \$160,000 per year over a 10-year span.

Mr. Billiams said the plan would have to be in place by Friday, December 31, or the early-retirement plan would become a "dead issue."

Mr. Sici said the main issue is the plan would save money for the county.

He said the Freeholders should keep this in mind if they do not approve the early retirement plan when his union comes up for a new contract in the spring.

Mr. Caroselli said he feared, if the plan is approved, the county would not be able to rescind it in the future.

"To participate, a school agrees to implement a variety of association educational activities," explained Dr. Harvey Waxman, the President of the New Jersey Affiliate.



Volunteer Needed For Forestry Club

The Newark resident, Jose Santiago, was charged by the county jury with attempted kidnaping, attempted sexual assault, aggravated criminal sexual contact, aggravated assault and robbery.

On the morning of the incident Westfield Police responded to a call from people in the area. They found the woman in the parking lot with severe head and neck injuries.

According to officials from the Union County Prosecutor's Office, the woman had gone for a walk about 11 a.m. She was walking on the park's asphalt track with a stereo headphone on when she was grabbed from behind and thrown to the ground.

The county officials added the victim's head and face were smashed against the asphalt by her assailant, who covered her mouth with his hand and attempted to sexually assault her.

They added she was dragged by her hair into a wooded area behind Diamond Communications, on North Avenue, Garwood, which is adjacent to the park, where she got away from the man.

A description of the man by the victim led to Santiago's arrest, according to the Westfield police report.

A search of the woods near the plant by town police investigators turned up a man's jacket, a broom and a pair of safety goggles belonging to the company.

Later, after speaking with several other Diamond employees, the investigators found Santiago standing outside the plant with his finger bleeding and they were able to connect him to the assault and make the arrest.

The Newark resident is being held in the Union County Jail in Elizabeth in lieu of \$60,000 bail.

His arraignment is expected in a few weeks, according to county officials.

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Sister Act 2: Back in the Habit For Whoopi Addicts Only

One Popcorn, Poor • Two Popcorns, Fair • Three Popcorns, Good • Four Popcorns, Excellent

Save for the amusing pun in its compound title *Sister Act 2: Back in the Habit* contains many a fresh thought throughout the 100 minutes of its sequel-beleaguered existence.

Sporting only a fraction of the verve she displayed in the original issue, Whoopi Goldberg reprises her role as Vegas singer/show girl/mobster's gal, Deloria Van Cartier.

On the lam in episode No. 1 as she attempted to elude the murdering ways of her former boyfriend, a gangster played by Harvey Keitel, Whoopi's character found refuge in a convent.

Via the witness-protection program she assumed the identity of Sister Mary Clarence.

There, through her punk, vigor and sheer magnetism, she organized a choir among the sisters, raised spirits and erased the grim face of her newly adopted home.

The new identity also allowed her to create all sorts of comic possibilities — the new sister innocently tripped from one heretical practice to the next.

In this episode, the novelty of it all is only a memory, and the premise for a return engagement is a trumped-up affair at best.

This go-round, Whoopi's phony nun reappears at the behest of Mother Superior, portrayed again by Maggie Smith.

It seems St. Francis High School, unhappily ensconced in the poor section of San Francisco, is suffering from a mostly deserved inferiority complex. Why, it's bad enough the students don't study — what's worse, their singing is terrible. Oh, they chant some rap here and there, and some rag-tag attempts at popular rock rhythms show potential, but for the most part there's hardly a world class

sound of music to be heard in these San Francisco hills.

And we all know no ghetto parochial school can escape foreclosure by the archdiocese if it can't sing itself to prominence.

Again along for the ride as co-nuns are jovial Kathy Najimy, optimistic Wendy Makkena, and the delightfully geezer-ish Mary Wickes. Sadly, someone forgot to write parts for them. They were cast, and apparently left to fend for themselves.

Expectedly, all the loose plot lines lead up to the big choir contest that comprises the typical finale.

Sub-plots offer no more than a smattering of lip service to the trials and tribulations of lower-income high school youths, replete with all the lamentations currently common to popular teen drama. Yet, like the main construction, these lesser ruminations are merely recycled film fodder.

Curiously, the waste of long-established as well as emerging talent seems to be *Sister Act 2's* most important product: Maggie Smith is merely tinsel with few lines; Bernard Hughes as the reluctant priest is inconsequential, and a jowl-possessing James Coburn as the mean-spirited lay administrator seems to beseech, "What ever happened to my career?"

Director Bill Duke is unable to navigate around the pitfalls, and fails to compensate for what amounts to a non-script. It's obvious the filmmakers care little to disguise the artistically-impooverished result of their ill-gained payday. Unadvised walk-ins doubtless will spell profitability for the well-advertised sequel. But the arrogance of the drab effort is astounding.

A viewing of *Sister Act 2* is sure to launch the query, "Brother, can you spare a plot?"

Stamp to Be Issued In Memory of Dr. Apgar

Recently, the Postal Service announced it would issue a 20-cent stamp next October honoring the late Dr. Virginia Apgar of Westfield, the physician who laid the foundation for perinatology and brought birth defects into mainstream medicine.

Dr. Apgar developed, scientifically validated and pushed into world-wide use the Apgar score, a test given to every infant one minute and five minutes after birth to provide an immediate assessment of the baby's condition and to alert doctors and nurses to any need for quick help.

The 50th doctor, and first woman, to be board certified as an anesthesiologist, Dr. Apgar devised the test as a way to force doctors and nurses to pay more critical and immediate attention to the vulnerable newborn.

She participated in the births of 17,000 infants.

She took a job as the Medical Director of the March of Dimes, funding medical research into the causes of birth defects, pushing the new science of perinatology and preaching with love, humor and enormous impact, what could be done to help more infants be born normal and healthy.

A rubella vaccine was developed; it prevented tens of thousands of infants from being born deaf or mentally retarded.

Infections such as Cocksackie virus, measles and toxoplasmosis were identified as causes of birth defects when unborn infants acquired them from their mothers.

Alcohol consumption by pregnant women was linked to serious mental and physical abnormalities and retar-

ation in their babies. Smoking was shown to lower birth weight, sometimes dangerously so in high-risk newborns.

New tests were found to identify men and women at risk of having a baby affected by a serious genetic disorder and counseling strategies for carriers were worked out.

The groundwork was laid for recent discoveries of specific genetic errors. New methods of prenatal diagnosis were discovered.

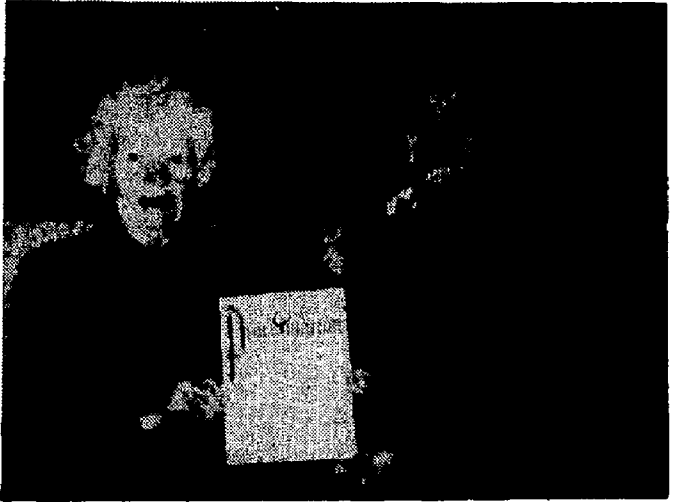

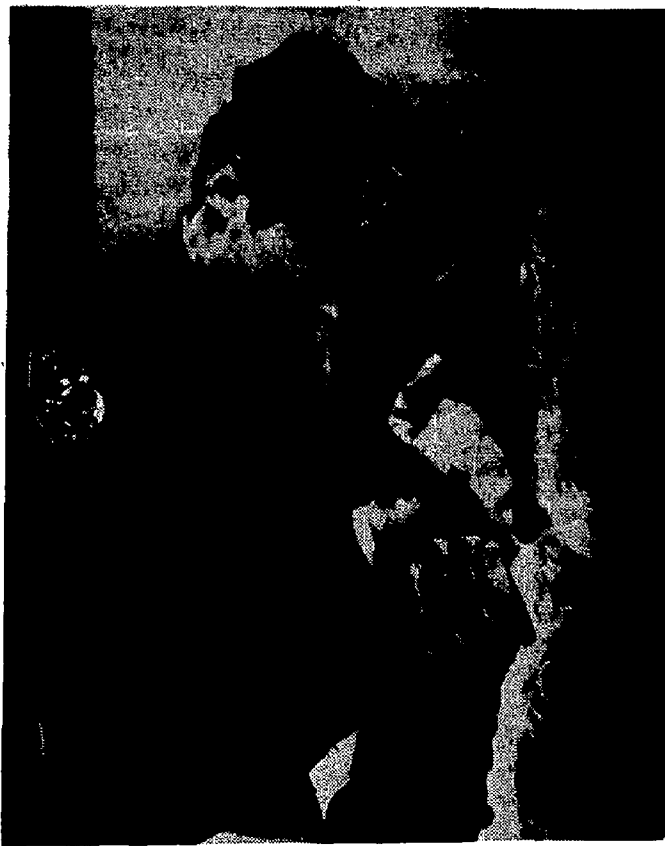

Judge Overrules Board On the A & M Variance

A&M, in the application before the Board of Adjustment, sought to run the auto body repair business and to erect a smaller addition to house a spray-painting booth.

Mr. Fried and Mr. Mannino, Judge Pisansky ruled, were incorrect in citing the similarity of the current and previous applications because the board had ruled the most recent application was substantially different than the previous applications.

The third Board of Adjustment member voting against A&M, A. Graydon Curtis, according to the Judge, based his decision on past on-site parking problems when the most recent application sought no on-site

parking variance, and the application provided more on-site parking than the zoning ordinance required.

In his letter opinion on A&M's appeal of the Westfield Board of Adjustment decision, Judge Pisansky also noted the only person to testify against A&M's plan was Westfield Fourth Ward Councilman James Hely.

In his testimony, according to the Judge, the Councilman raised A&M's prior conditional-use violations and other fire and safety violations in connection with the prior existing business use.

The Councilman also complained before the Zoning Board about A&M allegedly parking cars in an area not designated as a parking lot while it ran its previous business.

The Judge made note of the fact, however, the Councilman had written a letter to Board of Adjustment Attorney Robert Cochran before the A&M decision was finalized withdrawing his objections to the application.

Also included in the Judge's decision was reference to testimony from a town resident who lives near the site of the shop who said it has "made a great improvement on the street" and she heard no noise from A&M's previous business.

The Judge also noted Board Vice Chairman James J. Kefalonitis had visited the site and found the noise from trains on nearby railroad tracks was so great no noise could be heard from the body repair shop.

He criticized the board for giving more weight to Councilman Hely's testimony than to that of the resident or to the conclusions of Mr. Kefalonitis.

other and the two countries, he explained.

The Superintendent pointed to the relationship that "has evolved between key officials in Chelyabinsk and school officials in Westfield," and said this relationship presents a "unique opportunity to further understanding between people of two countries who were adversaries in a cold war for 45 years."

Beyond this understanding, he continued, Westfield teachers who participate will develop new knowledge of the people and educational practices of another country. Both teachers and students will benefit, he said.

Board Member William J. Sweeney questioned the cost of the proposal in terms of administrative time, and also why the district did not choose a domestic problem to address.

"Why not go to an Indian Reservation or an inner city school district?" he asked. "Why Siberia?"

Dr. Smith told him there would be some costs involved, "but the benefits more than outweigh the minimal costs to the district."

The Superintendent acknowledged there was criticism when he left the district to travel to Russia this past fall, and he would not be surprised to hear more.

Dr. Smith also told Mr. Sweeney, "We already are thinking about domestic-exchange programs. As you know, I've been advocating relationships with Plainfield," he said, speaking about the Saturday-morning fifth-grade Latin program run in conjunction with Plainfield and Westfield.

The Superintendent responded to the Siberia question by saying it was a matter of chance, when Mr. Lantis first participated in a Hands Across the Water program he met and became friendly with a man who would later become the Chairman of the Chelyabinsk City Council's Education Committee, Dr. Sergei Chekanov.

All other board members endorsed the proposal.

In other business the board recognized former board members, Dr. Benjamin Rulf and Michael W. Fox, for their contributions to the board.

The board also accepted with regret the retirement of Mrs. Claire Ford, the Business Office Purchasing Agent.

"In 22 years of service to the business office," said the Superintendent, "she has been outstanding."

In other personnel items, Mr. Sweeney alone voted no on a motion to approve funding to teachers involved in the Saturday Latin program. The funds come from the Desegregation/Transition Aid program funds and will be dependent upon its approval.

The board also unanimously approved for final reading a revised kindergarten and first-grade admission policy.

This policy abolishes the "window" of time between the cutoff date of October 1 and the old cutoff date of December 1 where a student could enter kindergarten after being tested by a Child Study Team.

"I spoke with several kindergarten teachers," Dr. Smith said, "and they would like to see the entrance date even earlier."

Also approved unanimously was a new annual school calendar policy.

"I think we've struck a policy that balances all needs," the Superintendent noted.

The board also approved a contract with Environmental Remediation Management, Inc. for a bloodborne pathogens compliance program as mandated by the state. This is another example of the state mandating without providing sufficient funds to carry out the order, Dr. Smith said.

The appropriation of \$30,000 from the free balance to comply with the mandate, which includes inoculations for the staff, purchased professional educational services, and supplies, "is the cost of a teacher," Board President, Mrs. Susan H. Pepper, pointed out.

The board President suggested board members and the public write letters of protest concerning the mandate.

The board also approved contracts in connection with the construction of an elevator at Roosevelt Intermediate School.

Hahr Construction of North Plainfield won a \$132,000 contract for the general construction, B & B Iron Works, Inc. of Hoboken a \$6,900 contract for structural steel work, Sander Mechanical of Greenbrook a \$9,711 contract for mechanical work and Tore Electric Co. of Belleville, a \$11,800 contract for electrical work, for a total of \$160,411.

Dr. Smith told the board, "There is progress in Trenton concerning funding. Preliminary reports from the Governor-Elect, Mrs. Christine Todd Whitman, indicate we would receive the same funds next year as we receive this year. We're in the midst of ongoing discussion," he said.

John Warner Olson of Harding Street brought to the board his concern about water runoff into his yard from Washington School.

"There are serious flooding problems," he said.

Dr. Smith told him the matter would be looked into.

At times, the Raiders have exhibited poor shot selection.

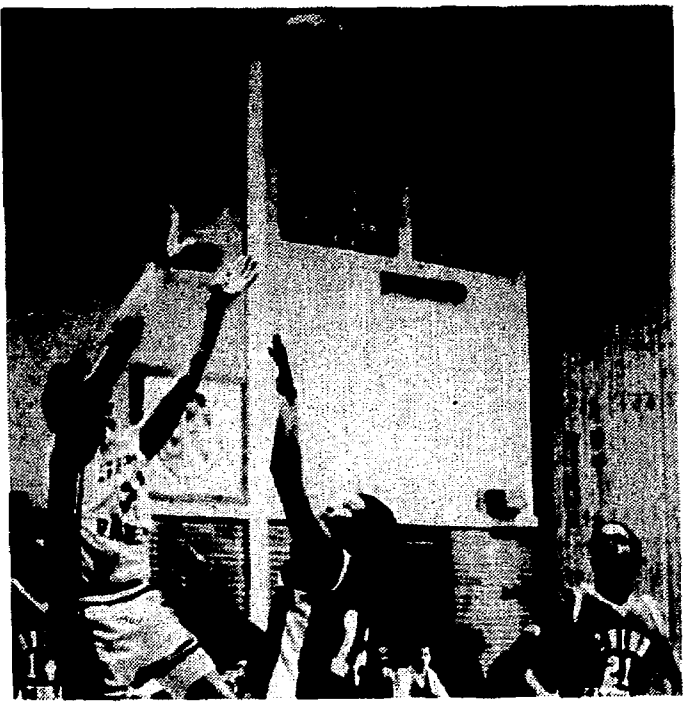
Coach Leonard responded to that with an old adage, "You can't hunt the shot; let the shot hunt you."



Reverend Geitz Ordained At St. Paul's Ceremony

The parish of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Westfield, ordained a new priest, the Reverend Elizabeth Rankin Geitz, who has served the last six months as Deacon and Associate Rector at St. Paul's, on December 11.

The Right Reverend Joseph Morris Doss, recently consecrated as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of New Jersey, officiated. The Reverend Geitz is the first priest he has ordained since assuming his new position.

In addition to Bishop Doss, 15 other Episcopal priests and two deacons were present and participated in the ordination service.

Music for the service was provided by the St. Paul's Choir, soloists, organ and orchestra under the direction of Charles M. Banks, Director of Music. Works of Mozart, Karg-Elert and Strauss, along with specially-commissioned works were performed.

The new priest began her study toward the priesthood six years ago when she served a year of preparation with Grace Episcopal Church in Plainfield.

She followed the steps of postulant, candidate and ordination to the diaconate, prior to her final ordination as a priest.

The Reverend Geitz attended Princeton Theological Seminary and completed studies toward the Master

of Divinity Degree at General Theological Seminary in New York City.

In reflecting on her journey to the priesthood, she remarked the call to the ministry began when she started a graduate equivalency diploma program for women on welfare in Trenton. At that time she felt she could best serve those in need by entering the ministry.

The cleric believes there should be a link between suburban and urban communities; one of her responsibilities at St. Paul's as Associate Rector will be to work with parishioners in developing an outreach ministry. In addition, she is responsible for Adult Christian Education and Hospitality Ministries at St. Paul's.

In regard to the role of women in the ministry, she feels the significance of women clergy, who were first ordained in the Episcopal church in 1976 and who today only number 1,162 to 13,717 for male clergy, is, "We bring our experiences as women to the theological task, for instance in bringing out the feminine imagery of God present in both Old and New Testaments."

She stated further, "In a parish setting, male and female clergy on a staff make a good team by complementing one another and by bringing different strengths to the parish responsibilities."

The Reverend Geitz acknowledged the support of her husband and two children to enabling her to pursue her calling to the ministry. At the ordination service, her husband, children and brothers participated.

Reverend Geitz is a published author. One of her books, *Entertaining Angels*, is used as a resource by churches across the United States in developing newcomer ministries.

Auxiliary Police Training Upgraded in the County

Union County's fall class of municipal auxiliary police volunteers is the first to be trained in a totally revamped training program, designed to keep pace with changes in the community as well as with the progress made in law-enforcement techniques and policies.

"The Union County Office of Emergency Management has conducted the basic auxiliary training program for the past 20 years," according to Freeholder Chairman, Miss Linda Lee Kelly. "Hundreds of auxiliary officers have been trained and they serve their communities well, but as times have changed, so must the training."

County Manager, Mrs. Ann Baran, said, "This kind of training would not be readily available on an individual, town-by-town basis, except at a prohibitive cost level. This revitalized program now means an even higher standard for auxiliary police officers in Union County which translates into pride and professionalism in serving the people of the county."

In March, Benedict Laganga, the Emergency Management Coordinator for the county and, thereby, coordinator of the training, developed a partnership with the Union County Prosecutor's Office and the Union County Police Chiefs Association.

Their mutual goal is to enrich the training of auxiliary officers throughout the county.

"Union County's John H. Stamler Police Academy now has become the home of the police auxiliary program," explained Mr. Laganga. "In the past, the academy has operated at various sites throughout Union County, teaching volunteers the basic skills required to perform as an

auxiliary officer." "This state-of-the-art facility has become the hub of law enforcement training in the county," explained Union County Prosecutor Andrew K. Ruotolo, Jr. of Westfield. "The academy training staff, provided by the volunteers' respective municipal Police Chiefs, is being utilized to provide instruction to the new auxiliary recruits."

Auxiliary officers are activated to help supplement regular police in emergency situations, according to David Hancock, the Chief of Detectives in the county Prosecutor's Office. Upon graduation, the officers will be under the auspices of their local emergency management offices and the direction of their local police chiefs.

The new, more rigorous, three-month-long curriculum follows the guidelines set forth by the New Jersey State Police Office of Emergency Management. Instructors from various county and municipal agencies volunteer their time to instruct these volunteers, who attend training on Saturdays, in order to ensure they meet the state's requirements to serve as an auxiliary officer.

Prosecutor Ruotolo and Mr. Laganga agree the advantage to this affiliation is the professionalization it brings to the training — training in a professional atmosphere by veteran police personnel.

This partnership has expanded the auxiliary curriculum to include the following: Patrol functions, criminal law, preservation of evidence, arrest, search and seizure; emergency-management plans, defensive driving and first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation. Also included are military-style drills and physical training.

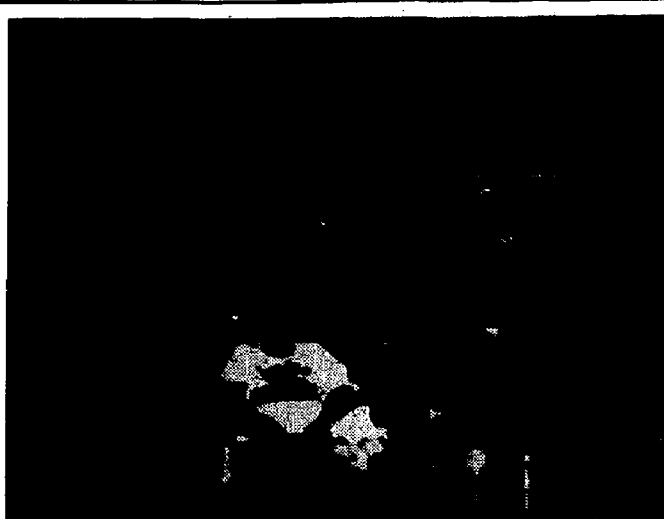
