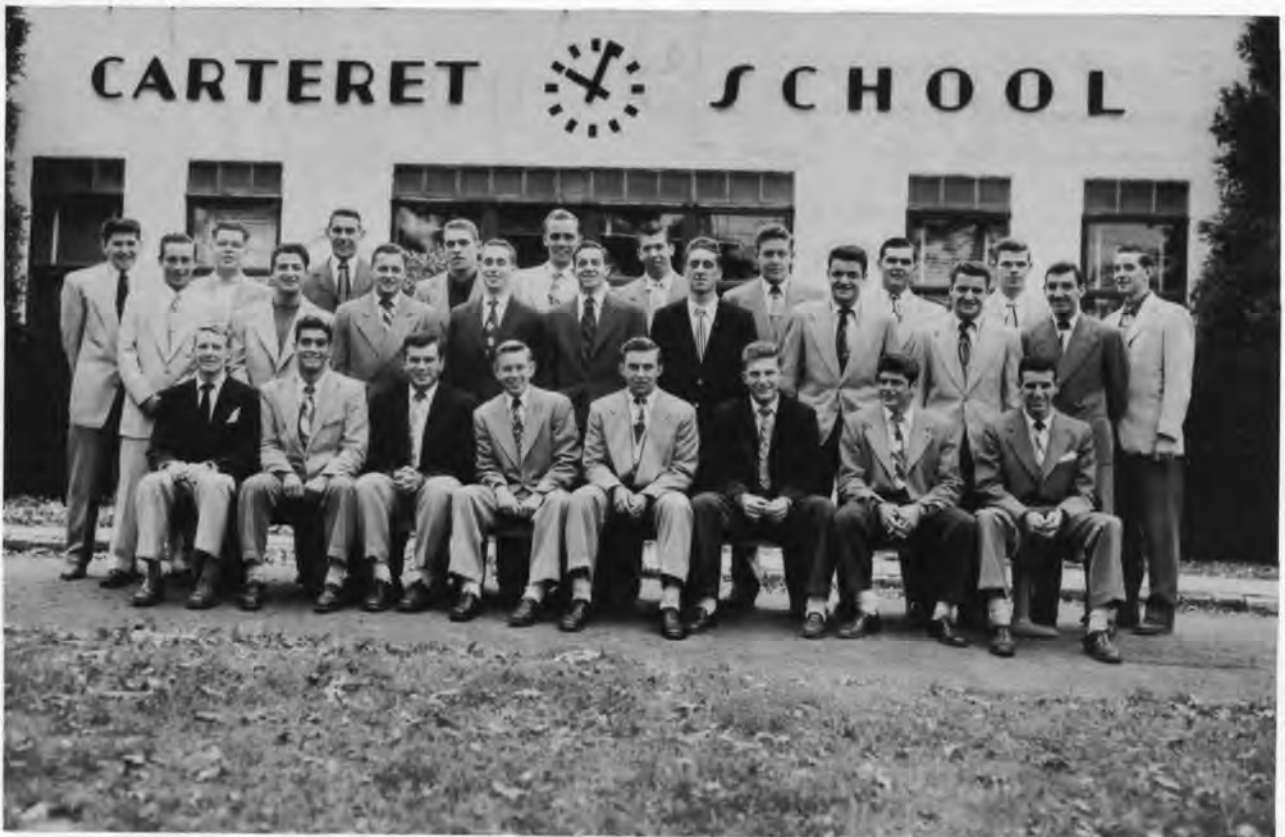

- XVII. Fred Diefenbacher's physique to whoever wants it.

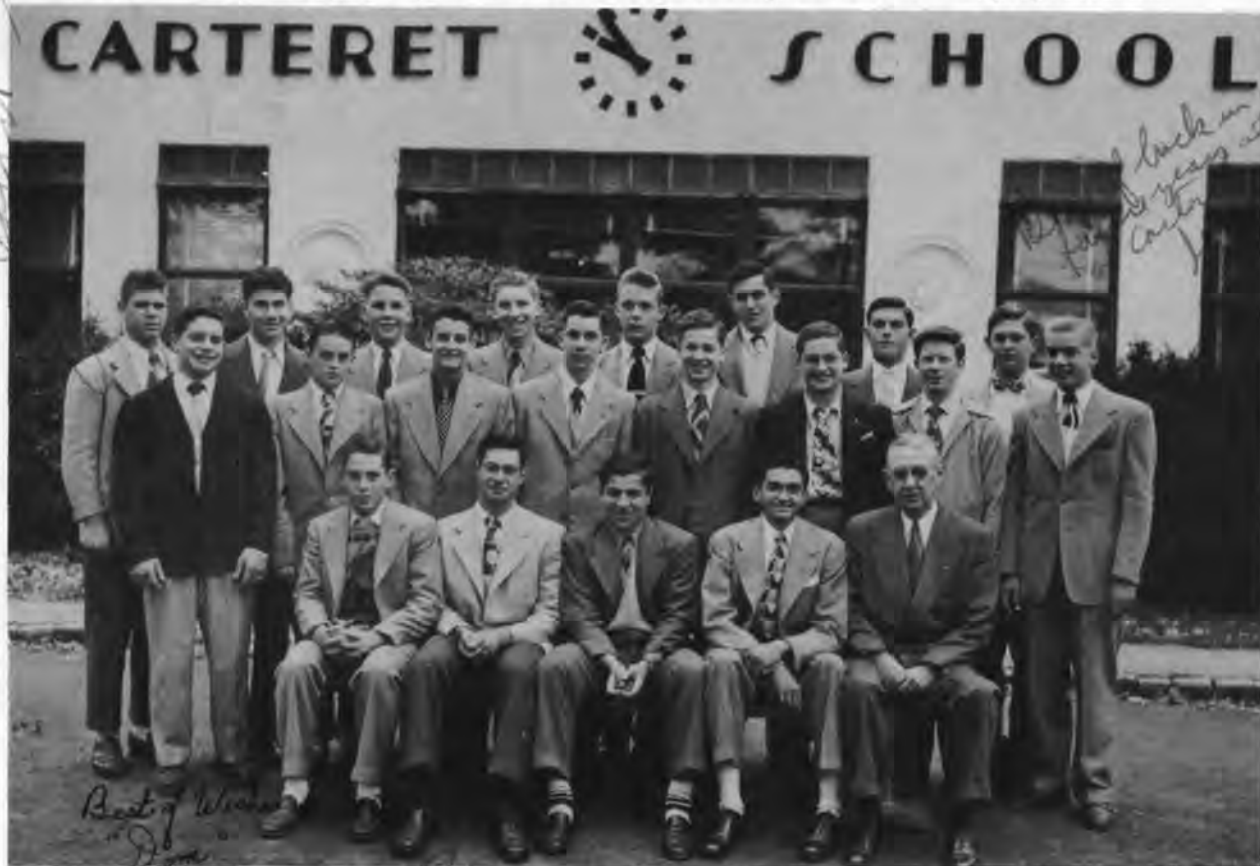

The year 1949-50 has surely been a profitable one to the students at Carteret Junior and Primary Schools.

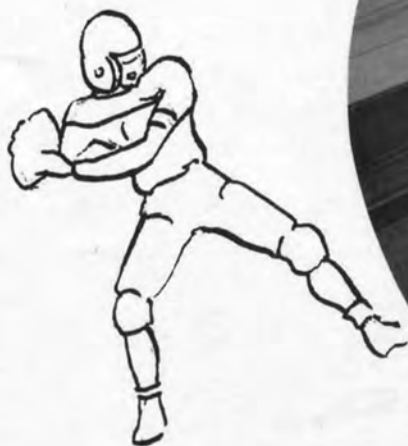
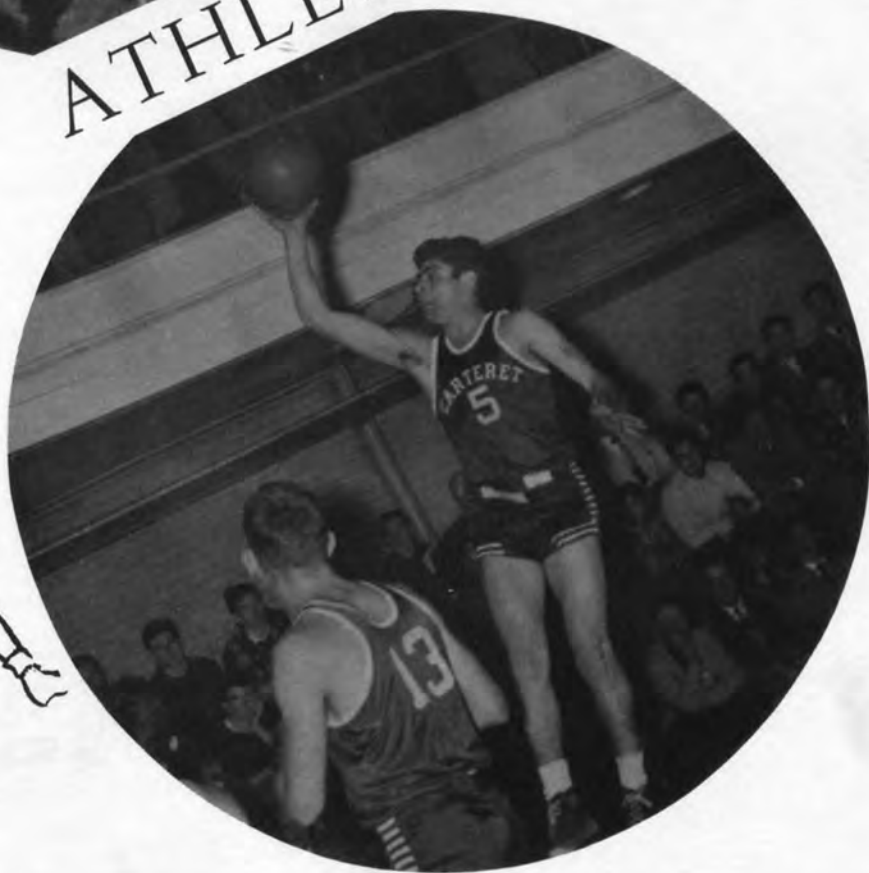
