




The world is large; life can sometimes be too great for us to grasp its meaning. But through it all we shall remember one peaceful spot where first we learned to live—our school.



And there are our officers. Don't you agree that they are superior?




Second in the heart of his fellow classmen is Vice-President Peter Robinson. Like Tom, he too saw action this year on the football squad.

Soon after this meeting, the football season begins; and the girls sell candy to hungry spectators during the games.



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
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
