
Several professional articles which Miss McSweeney has written have been published; and various ideas and observations which particularly interest her find themselves expressed in verse, solely for her own amusement.

Dr. Brown was born in Wisconsin but spent most of his youth in Illinois, where he was graduated from high school in 1919. Then, after four years of work at Knox College, at Galesburg, Illinois, plus a year of graduate study at the University of Chicago, he was ready to follow his great ambition, teaching. Not satisfied with his M.A., he attended courses at the University of Chicago for many summers and was finally awarded his Ph.D. After twenty-two years of school work in Illinois, Wisconsin, and New Jersey, he came to West Orange in 1946 upon the registration of Mr. Strong. "To improve the services to West Orange students" has been his earnest desire for three years, and will continue to be as long as he remains with us.

Dr. Brown resides in West Orange and has a son, "Jim," attending seventh grade at Roosevelt Jr. High. Although his duties leave him little leisure time, the Doctor's interests are many and varied. Hunting, fishing, and amateur gardening are hobbies; all sports find an enthusiastic supporter in him.

For the conscientious execution of the duties of his office and for the understanding cooperation he has for the Seniors of West Orange High School, Dr. Brown deserves our heartiest thanks and praise.

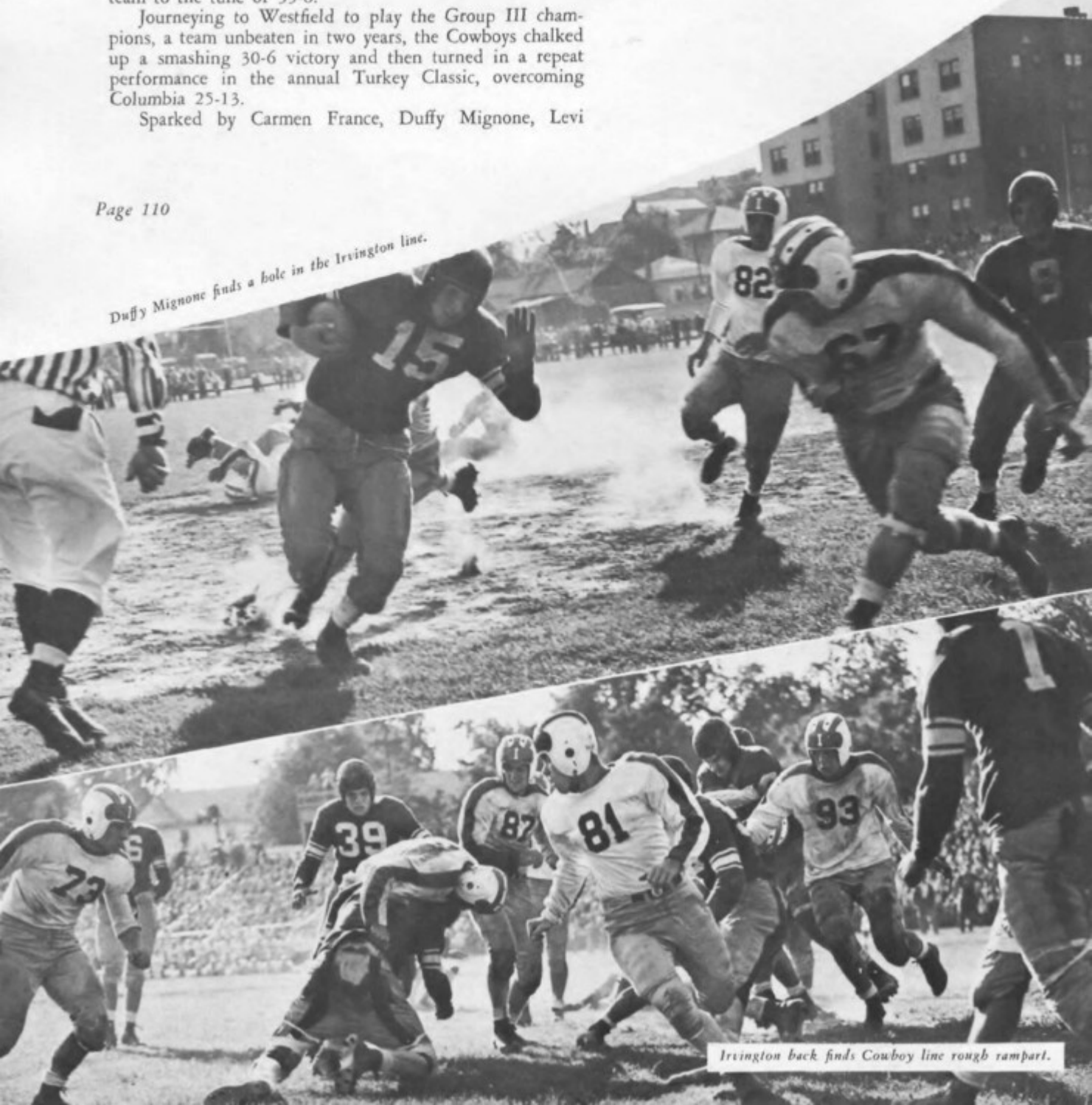
Sparked by Carmen France, Duffy Mignone, Levi

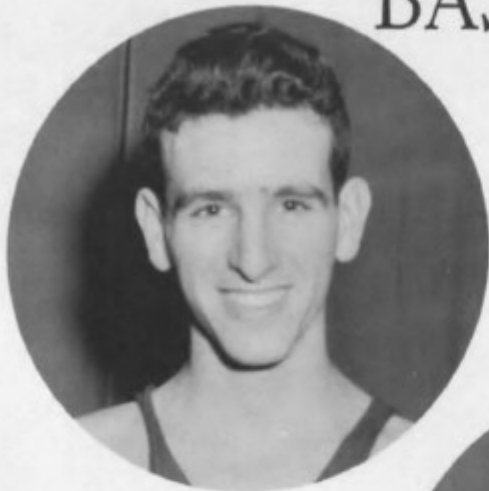

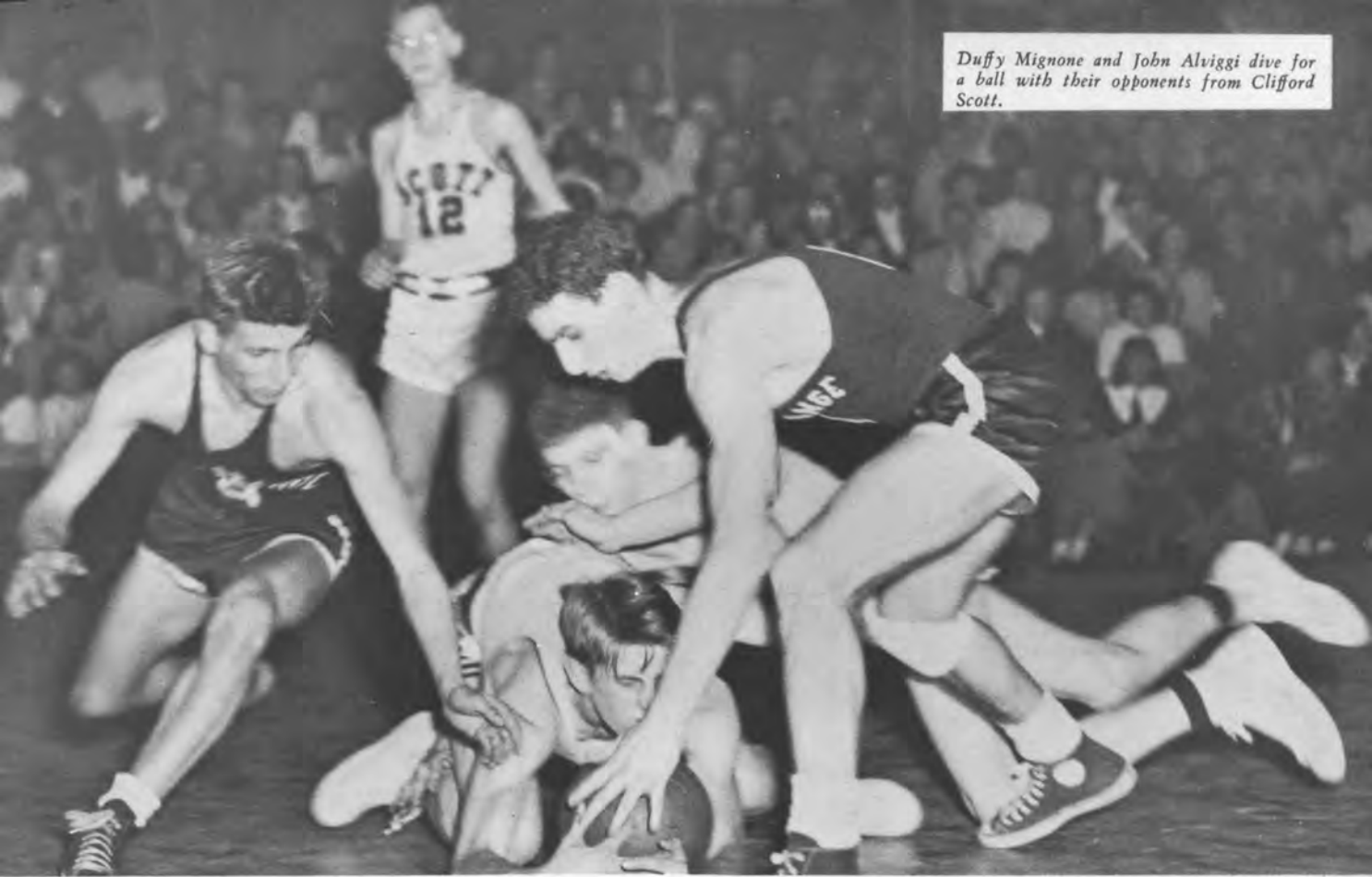

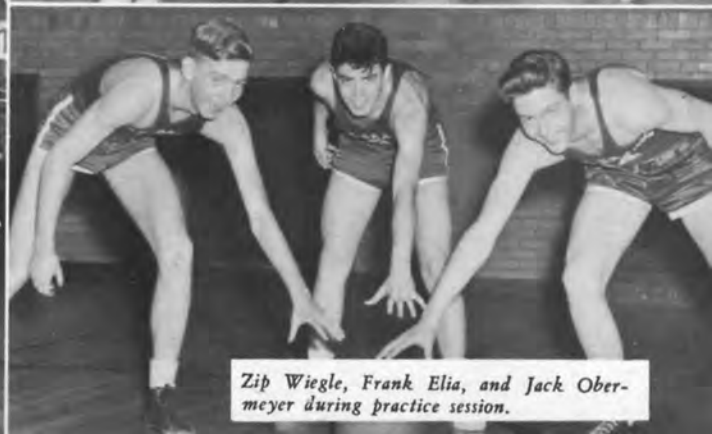

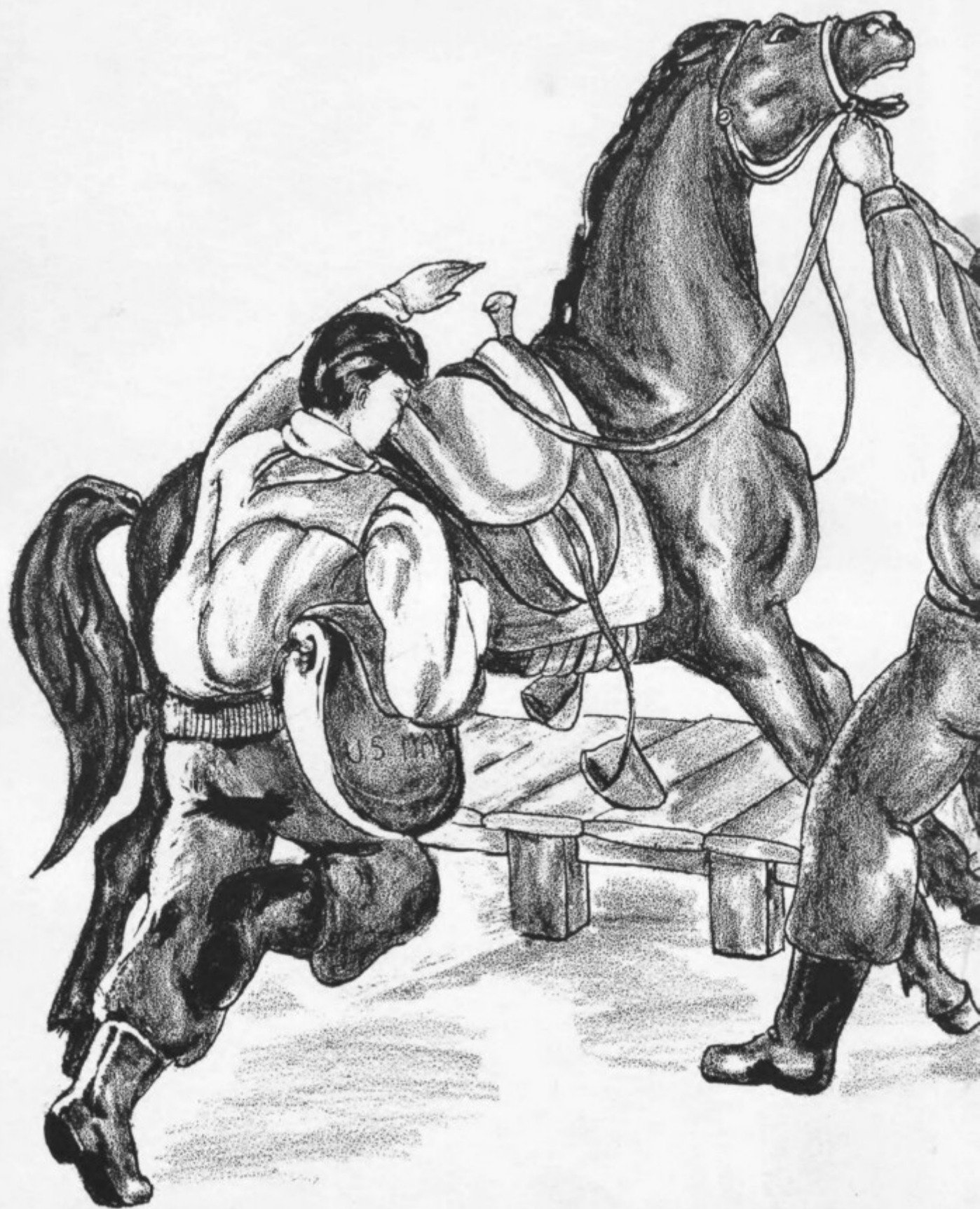

BASEBALL

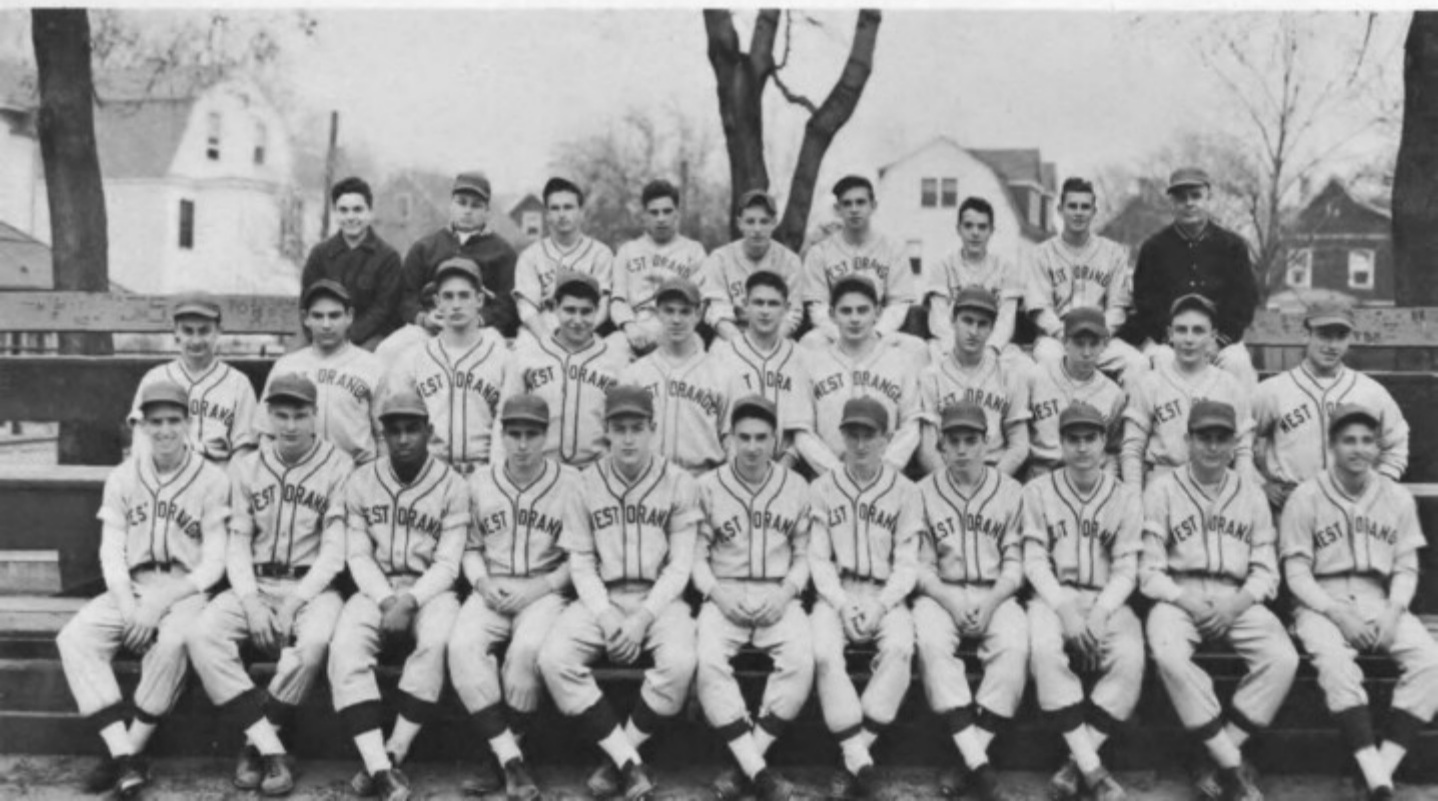

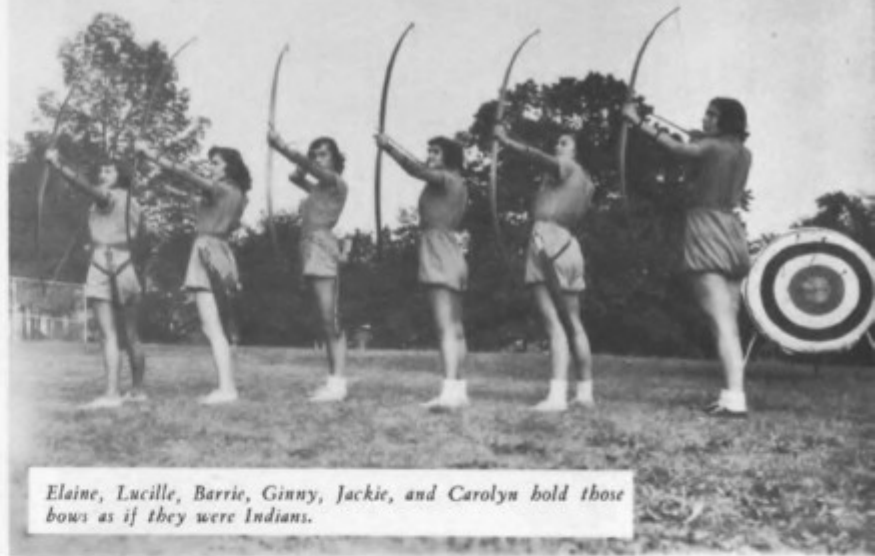

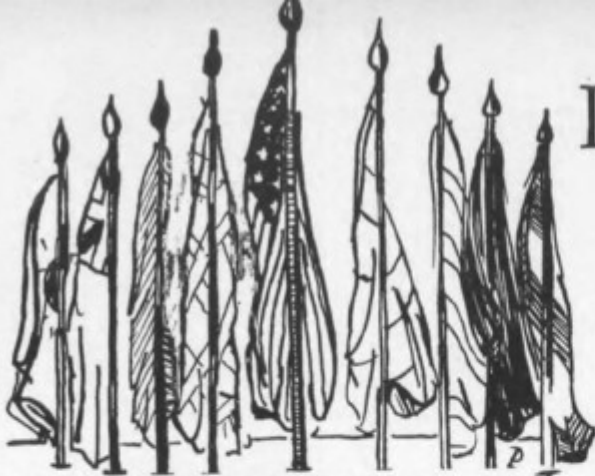

The person with these abilities will find himself capable of turning out masterpieces on the typewriter. Besides pictures, the club learned to do fancy lettering which came in handy on special reports and other assignments. Colored carbon paper provided color for the lovely drawings, which adorned Miss Karnes' room as proof of the varied tastes and abilities of her club members.

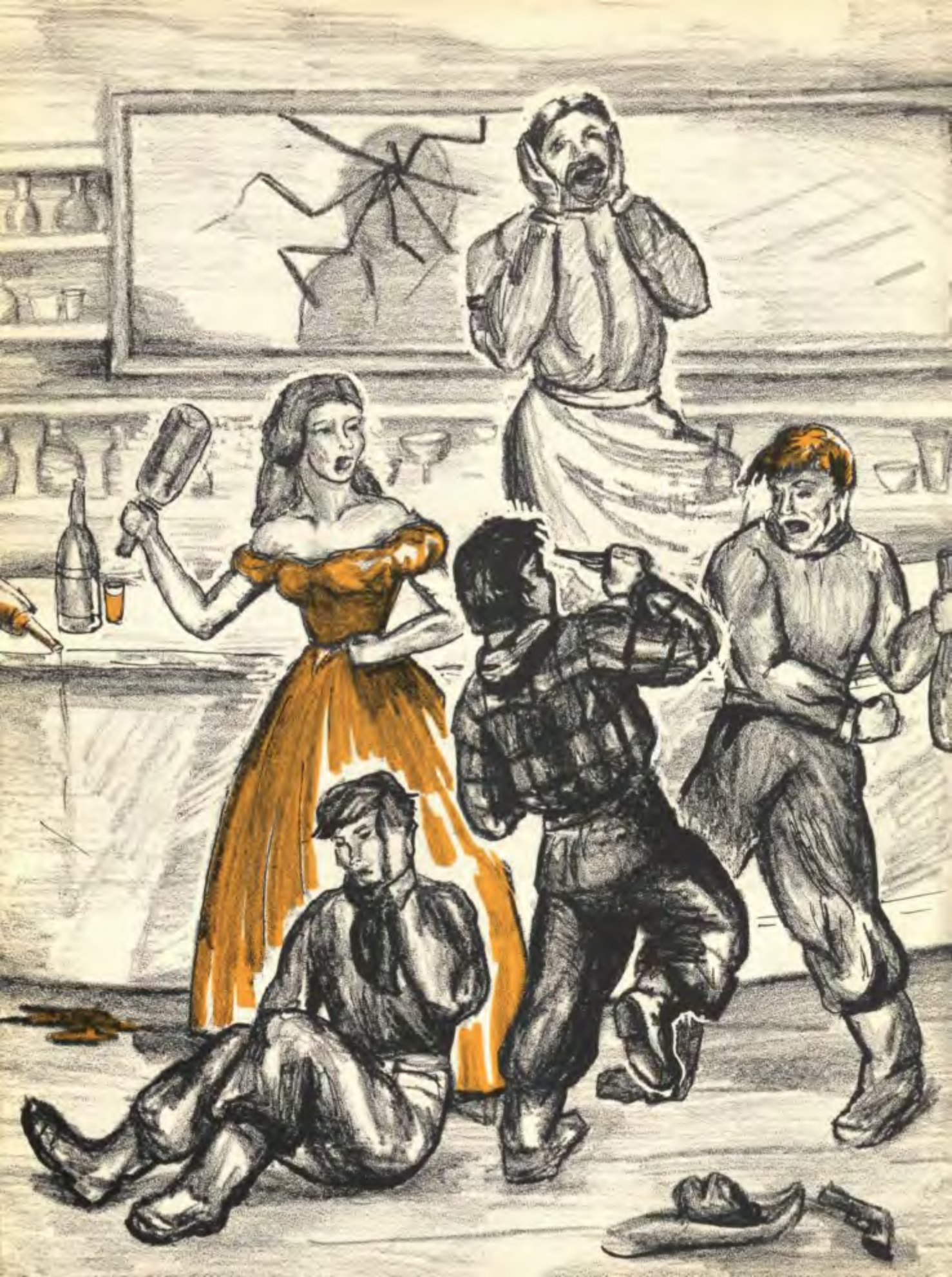

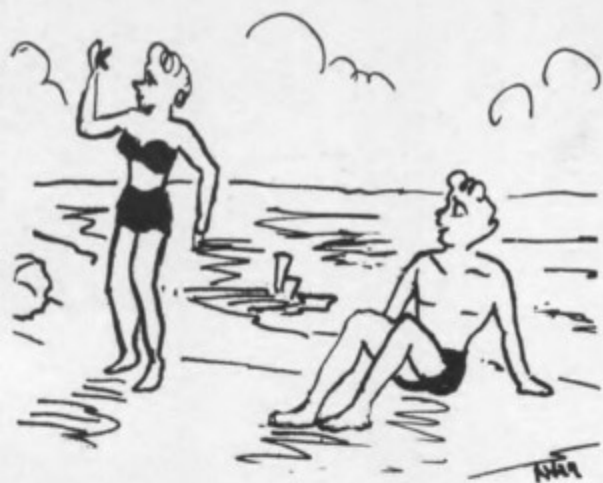
