SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS


Although we seniors have been attending school for ten, eleven, twelve, or even more years, few of us have ever been aware of all the many little things which others have been doing for us in order to make our school days pleasurable and worth-while. Dr. Milton W. Brown, since his arrival to our system, has been one of these people who have been working for the good of West Orange boys and girls.

Neither do many of us realize that our high school is but one of the pieces of the complicated machinery of the West Orange school system, which has been working smoothly because of the able guidance of Dr. Brown, our superintendent of schools.

Dr. Brown was born in Wisconsin; however, a great many of his boyhood years were spent in Illinois. After completing four years of study at Knox College in Illinois, he received his B.S. degree, a distinction which was closely followed by the obtaining of his M.A. degree after a year of graduate study at the University of Chicago. Then followed, fifteen years of teaching, the career which he had always wished to pursue. It was during these years that Dr. Brown was awarded his Ph. D. degree.

Subsequent to this, Dr. Brown moved eastward to become the superintendent of schools in Glen Ridge, New Jersey. At the resignation of Mr. Strong in 1946, Dr. Brown then came to the West Orange school system where he has made himself well known to all the citizens as a gentleman who has the qualities of perseverance, conscientiousness, and understanding.

We, the seniors of West Orange High School, feel that, because of his sympathetic interest in West Orange boys and girls and for his successful work in bettering our schools, Dr. Brown deserves our deepest gratitude.





MR. RAYMOND E. HEARN


THE SENIORS

Self-control and poise are two fine human qualities that are typical of the benefits derived by athletes from their respective games. The experiences that come from the stress and strain of athletic contests develop this self-control, this poise, and, perhaps more important, sportsmanship; for the hectic moments of games bring out the true character and mettle which compose the participant. In sports, as in life itself, one must know how to bear reversals as well as how to accept good fortune or victories. This is yet another of the lessons taught by football to those young men who play the game. They know that we must be able to take final decisions as such, whether these be favorable or adverse, no matter how determined, whether by actual competition, by chance, or by circumstance; furthermore, these decisions, even though they may be bitter pills to swallow, must be accepted graciously without display of anger or contempt for the victor. All people, then, can learn by and profit from these plain lessons in character improvement taught by football.

The 1950 football season was not so satisfactory as might be wished; however, in spite of the many injuries that weakened the team, the Cowboys played with fine spirit. The season opened with the Irvington game, the only one in which West Orange was at full strength. The Cowboys, blocking and tackling viciously, scored twice in the first half; but the Camptowners hit pay dirt four times in the second half to forge ahead. In the next game the West Orange gridders crushed a state-champion Clifford Scott eleven. The following Saturday, Duffy, making two touchdowns and a conversion, led the Johnson-men to the hard-fought upset of the powerful East Orange machine. In their next game, played with Kearny, the Cowboys wasted Duffy's hundred yard run in a defeat by the determined Kardinals. In the fifth contest West Orange fell at the hands of Orange. Duffy's brilliant hundred yard runback of a kick and an aerial from Doyle to DeVincentis were their only scores. A strong Barringer aggregation then whipped the Cowboys and gained revenge for our 41-6 victory of the previous year. In the seventh game an inspired West Orange football team battled the group four state champs, Montclair. Halftime showed the Mounties behind, 7-0; but two touchdowns by the Blues and a penalty nullifying a Cowboy score brought a final defeat of 14-7 to West Orange. The season finally closed with two losses, one to Westfield and the other to Columbia on Thanksgiving Day.



BASEBALL



A cloud of dust and a hearty shout—what is it all about, you ask. Why, just a girls' gym class; and despite all the hard work and commotion, the girls do enjoy their gym classes.

The classes are divided into two parts, Mrs. Terry and Miss Addario each taking a section. While one group plays, the other dresses, checks books, and looks over the

day's plans.

At the beginning of each semester, all classes choose their own teams, captains, and sub-captains. There are four captains and four sub-captains chosen in each class. Captains and sub-captains receive ten points towards their blocks and numerals. This point system encourages competition and after-school sports. Under the point system, awards go to the girls with the highest number of points for the year. When a girl has earned 400 points, she receives her numeral of the year in which she is graduated; when she has earned 800 points, she receives her "W. O." block. Another favorite of the girls is speedball, the fast game which requires quick thinking. It is a difficult game to play; therefore, it is restricted to senior girls. Despite their lack of skill, the participants enjoy speedball tremendously.

Hockey and soccer are played with just as much vigor as baseball and speedball. Many bruised shins and scraped knees are the results of good soccer and hockey tilts.

Each spring, bows and arrows are removed from their cases for our female "William Tells."

When the snow falls, classes are held indoors. Then everyone prepares for keen competition; for the volleyball tournament is held in winter. The games are fast and exciting, many of the contests being won by either two or three points. Everyone tries very hard to win the volleyball championship of the school.

A ping-pong tournament, which is becoming more popular each year, also takes place. Basketball, games of the basket type, tumbling, and folk and athletic dancing are

other activities in which the girls engage during the winter term.

Bowling tournaments and swimming classes, held at the YMCA, Orange, have stirred up a great deal of interest among the girls. Bowling is restricted to junior and senior girls only.



STUDENT CONGRESS



Although the United Nations convene in a modern set of buildings on the East Side of New York, and the West Orange High School Student Council holds its meeting in the cold, dingy visual aids room, the two organizations have much in common, each being a representative body which makes rules and regulations to promote the general welfare

of the people.

Still in its infancy, the U. N. has not yet been able to accomplish all its goals for world peace. It has, however, started things rolling by solving the Palestine problem, setting up organizations to help the starving and frozen children of the world, and attempting to arbitrate the difficulties arising between the French and the people of Indo-China. In like manner the governing body of West Orange High School students began this year with the successful party given to acquaint the sophomores with the high school and with one another. This year the Student Council has begun to take an active part in the meetings of the Inter-Oranges' Council and the New Jersey Organization for Student Congresses. Members of the Executive Committee attended the meetings and reported to the entire council. Invaluable suggestions were given by the representatives of other schools who told of the problems which they had faced and the ways in

which they had been solved.

The bulletin board, which was purchased by the council, is kept up to date by the Student Congress in order to give the students a preview of future events; such as, assembly programs, basketball games, the coming out of report cards, and, most important of all, vacations. The Budgeting Committee has under discussion the possibility of buying an inter-class communication system which would be paid for with money from the Curtis Campaign. This would eliminate the necessity for bulletins.


