

Although Allen F. Brewer, Jr., was born in the small town of Newton Center, Mass., when he was but a few weeks old, he was taken by his family to the Lone Star State where he grew up among horses—wild mustangs, fine thoroughbreds, bucking broncos, and rope-swinging cowboys. Here he learned to love, to sketch, and to ride the subjects that have led to his fame and fortune.

When he moved back East to West Orange, N. J., our own Miss Freda Hergt, his art teacher, by chance stumbled upon Allen's interest and talent when he turned in some very unusual lettering work. Probing a bit, she discovered his love for horses and his talent in sketching them in various poses. She, therefore, inspired him to gain a good background through doing good work in all of his subjects and at the same time she helped him to develop this talent. Before he had been graduated from high school, he was the star art pupil and had won every art competition that he had entered regardless of the subject treated—air planes or ships or what not.

When Allen went to college, he entered the School of Fine Arts at Yale, where he always managed to work into his assignments a bit of the equine atmosphere. He worked his way through college by scholarships and by selling his unusual paintings to his fellow students, canvases for the most part, two faced double valves, indeed; for on the one side was a luscious nude to smile out at the laboring student and on the other side a peaceful, cool landscape to greet the parents when they came to visit Junior.

Upon graduation from Yale in 1942 Allen first landed in the Army as a Camouflage Technician where he smeared and painted almost everything along the East Coast and later in the Air Force where he kept in practice by painting the military scenes and personnel about him. Shortly after the war Allen found himself in the famous Blue Grass Country with his beloved horses. Here he now makes his home on a small farm with his wife and three children.

WEST-O-RANGER



THE 1952 WEST-0-




Nestled on the slope of the Orange Mountain, West Orange provides a picture of natural scenic beauty to all those who have occasion to visit its mountainous terrain. This town is divided into three rectangular sections by the two ridges of the Orange Mountain and the Second Watchung Mountain. Because of the mountainous territory included between the boundaries of West Orange, transportation has always been a problem. In 1878 William Ward established the first means of transportation through the town when he began the operation of a horse-drawn stage line between Livingston and Orange. This line was purchased in 1881 by Benjamin Decamp, by whose family it has been operated ever since. Because of the need of transportation up the side of the mountain, the Orange Mountain Cable Company was organized by the land promoters to build a cable from the valley to the top of the mountain. The right of way for this cable extended from Valley Road to the top of the ridge north of the present Rock Spring Country Club. An indirect means of transportation to the eastern terminus of the Cable Road from the South Orange Lackawanna Station is no longer used. This line, officially known as the Montrose Line, was popularly referred to as the "Swamp Line." As a result of much pioneering, West Orange is now well provided with transportation facilities.

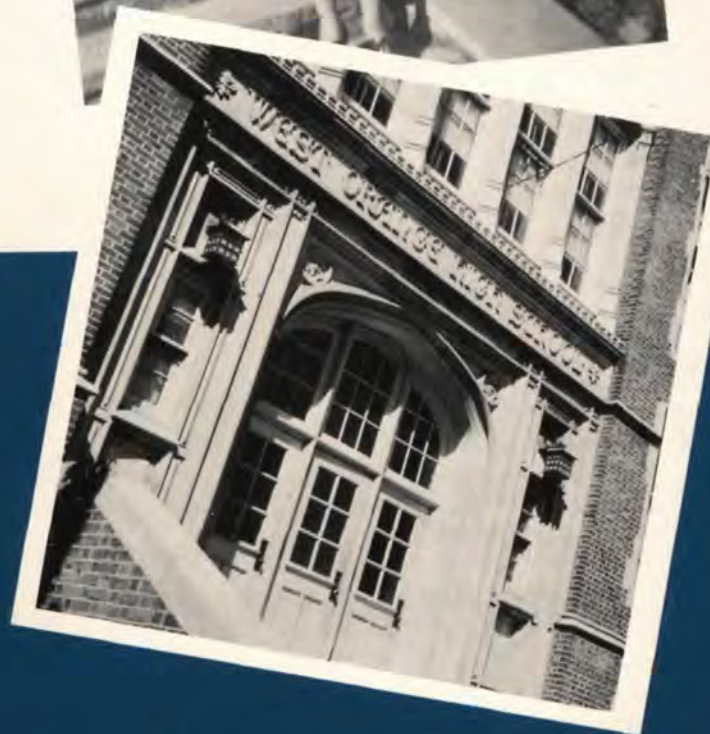

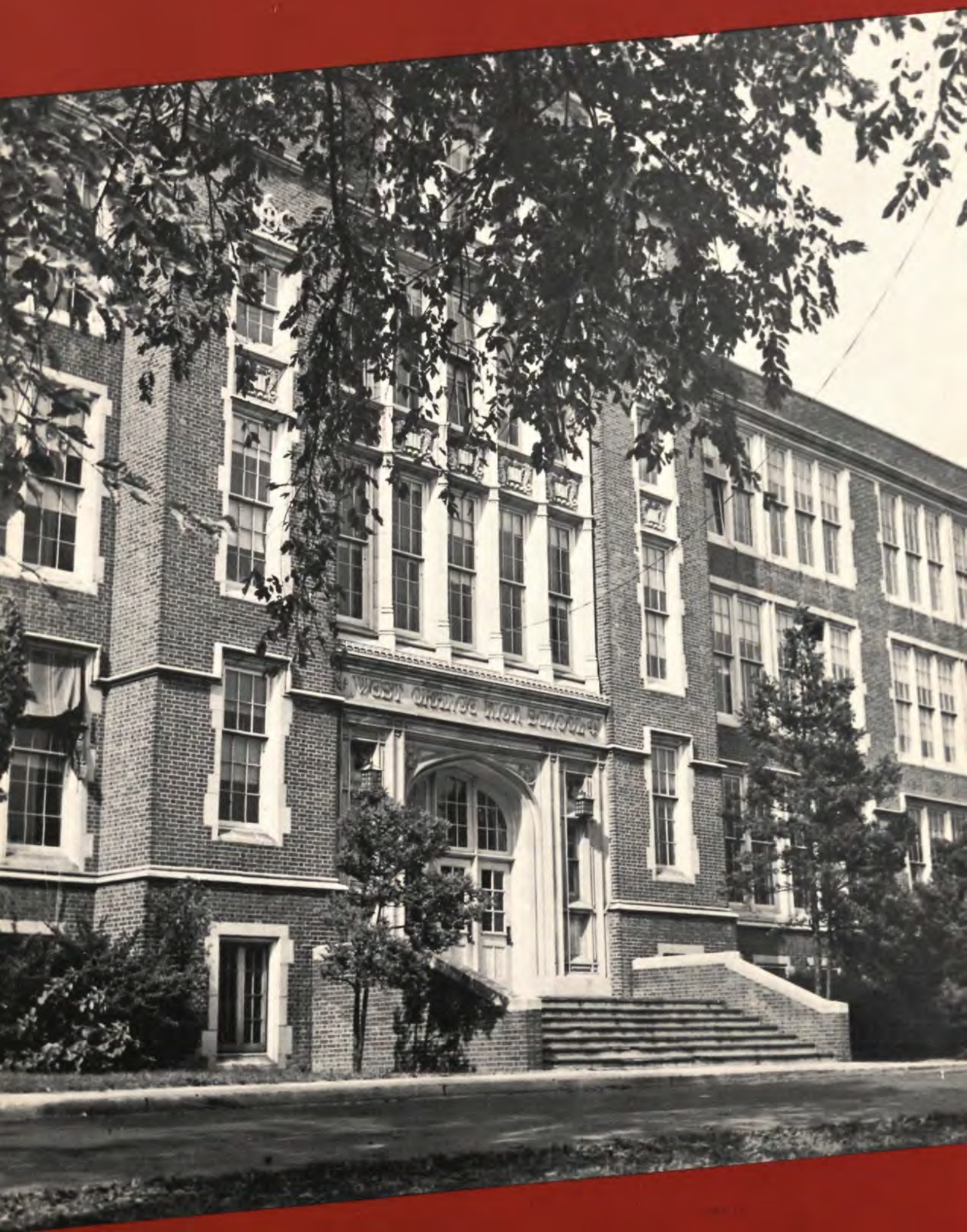

As a rule, every town has, at one time or another, had at least one "famous son"—a man who has done much to promote the growth and development of his town. West Orange is no exception to this rule. No doubt, the man who has given the most to his town of West Orange is Thomas Alva Edison, the world-famous inventor, who is best known for his development of the incandescent light, the phonograph, and the movies. The death of this great man was mourned not only by West Orange but also by the world.

Daniel Brennan, another Famous West Orange man, was the pioneer of road building in this section. It was due to his initiative and vision that many miles of macadam road were built not only in West Orange but also throughout Essex County.

The first settler in this town was Anthony Oliff (Olive), whose home was built in what is now Llewellyn Park. Llewellyn Haskell, however, was the founder of our well-known Llewellyn Park, the narrow, winding roads of which remain today as they were laid out by Haskell in order to keep its natural scenic beauty. George B. McClellan of Civil War fame erected a fine home on "The Ridge."

Allen Brewer, who in 1938 was Art Editor of the 1938 West-O-Ranger, is now considered one of the world's ranking equestrian artists. The art appearing in this volume is reproduced from his paintings and drawings.

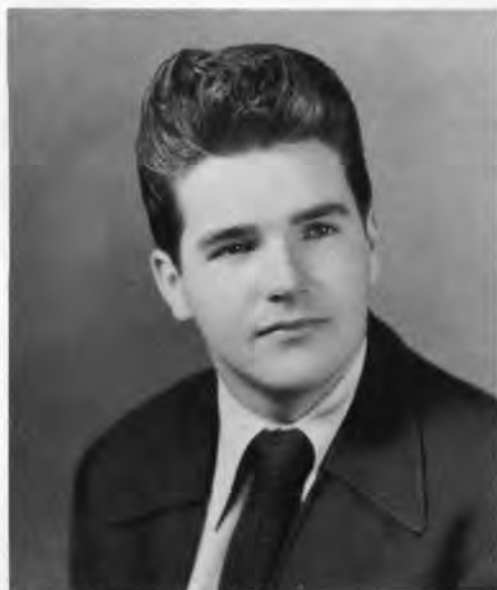

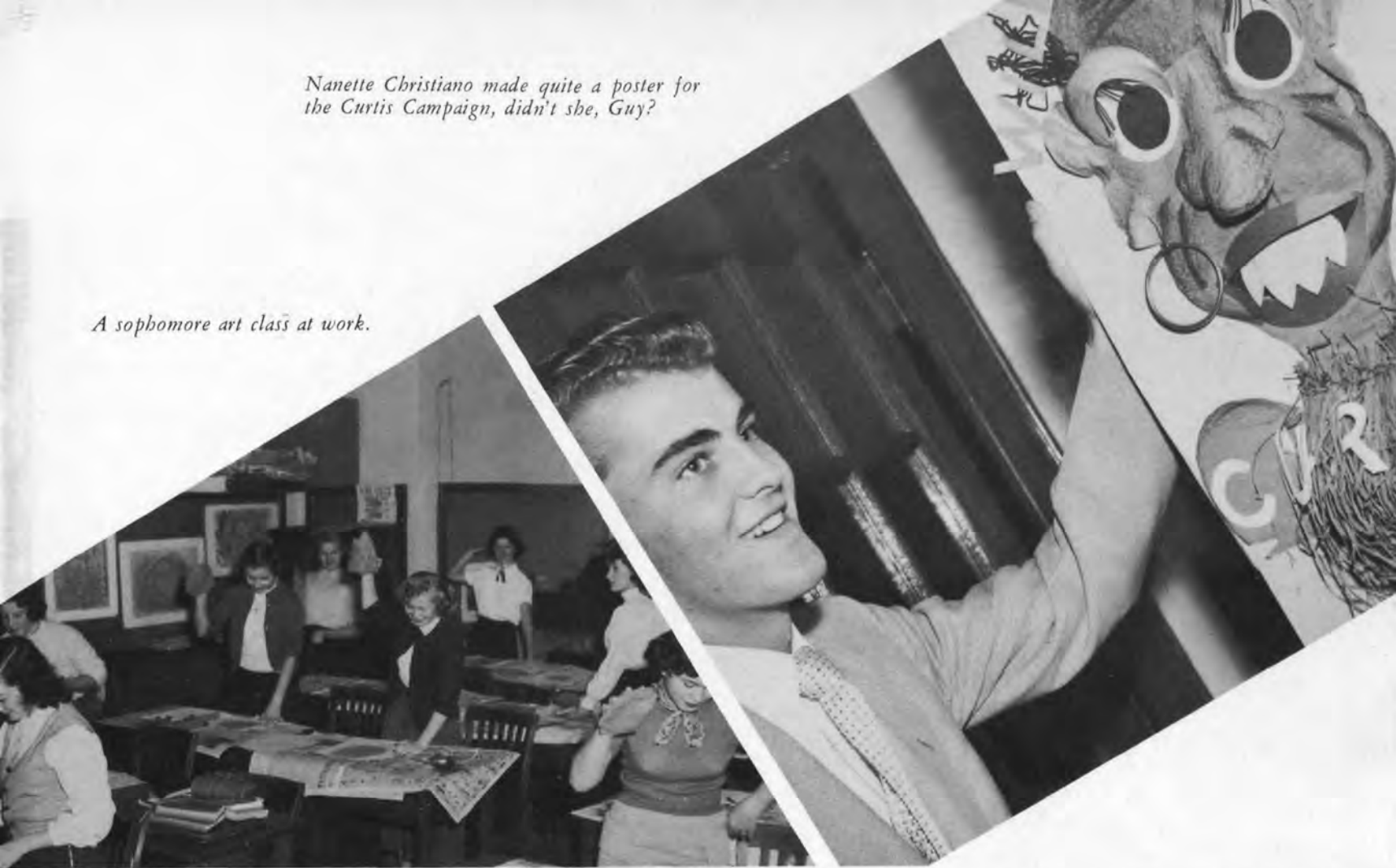

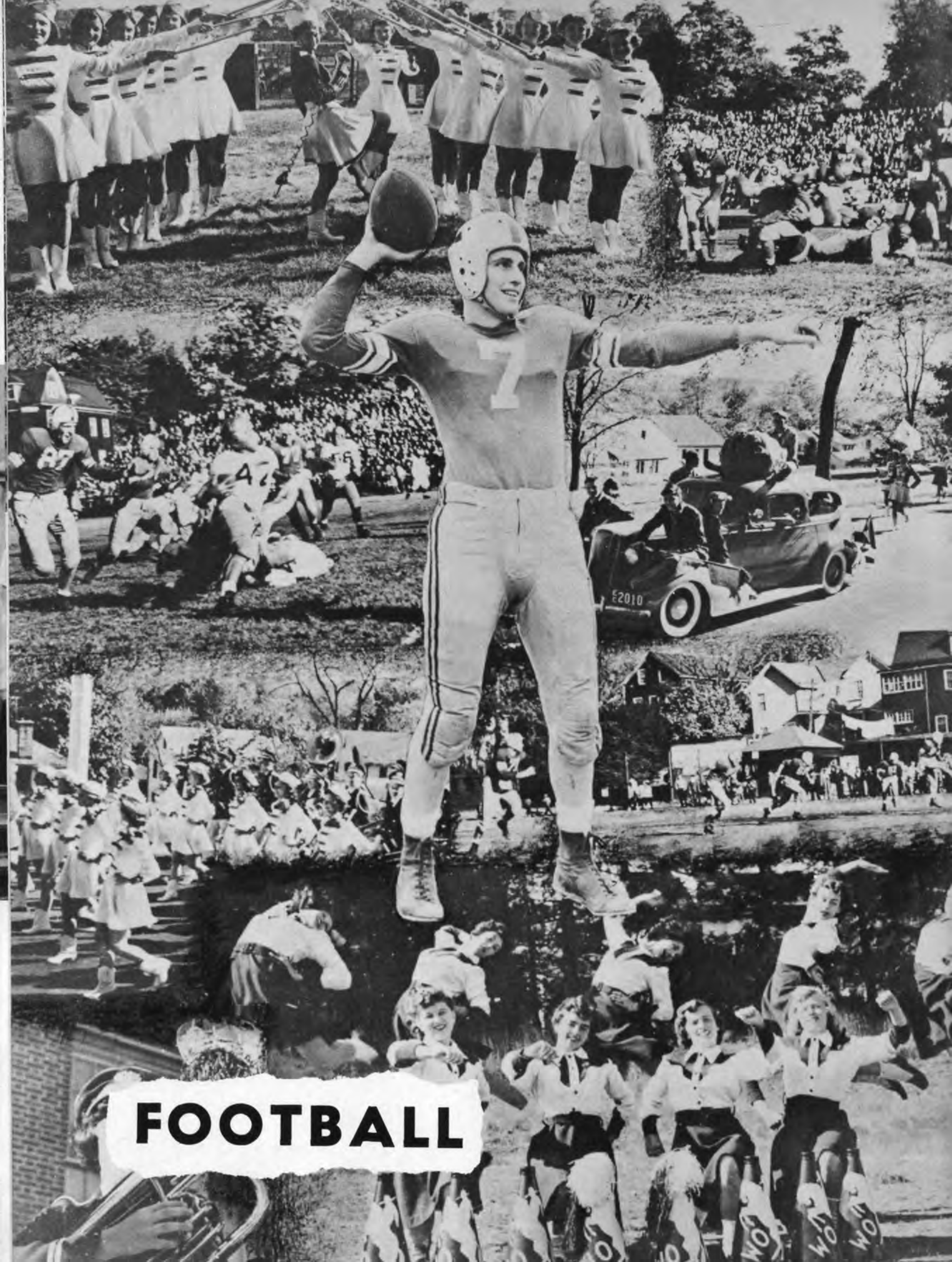
As the town of West Orange grew in population, athletics became an important part of the community. The first step toward the production of athletic facilities was taken in 1820 when the construction of the Essex County Country Club's eighteen-hole golf course was begun. In the year 1886 one of the first toboggan slides to be constructed south of the Canadian Border was located on what is now Hazel Avenue. The first steps toward providing athletic facilities for the youth of the community were taken in 1910 and 1911 when the Jenkins Playground and Colgate Field were constructed. From that time through the year 1937, many important recreation centers were established. It was during this period that Lafayette Playground, Woodhull Playground, the Rock Spring Country Club, the West Orange Public Golf Course, the Orange Mountain Golf Club, the Crestmont Golf Club, and the Essex Fells Country Club were established.

With the growth of athletic facilities, West Orange High School became the center of competitive sports. In the years 1927, 1933, and 1934 the West Orange football team, under Coach Haydn Evans, captured the Group III high school championship. Under the guidance of Coach Marc Rankin, the cowboys rolled to a Group III basketball championship in 1936 and a Group IV championship in 1949. These championships are symbolic of the fine history of athletics at West Orange High School.

The 1951 West Orange football team had a somewhat successful season finishing the campaign with a 4 won and 5 lost record. In its opening game a green Cowboy eleven tackled an equally green Irvington ball club. Lacking scoring punch and having the breaks go against them, West Orange lost its opener 24-0. The second game found the Cowboys still lacking needed scoring punch, but they managed to come out of the game victorious 6-0 over Clifford Scott. East Orange completely outclassed the Cowboys and romped to a 35-0 victory at Ashland Stadium. Returning home, the Cowboys found the going more pleasant as they played excellent football to top Kearny 13-0. A strong Orange team then pushed West Orange around Orange Stadium winning 26-0. Playing good, all-round football, the Cowboys "ran and passed" a big and rough Barringer team into submission, the final score be-

ing 27-19. With memories of last year's game in their minds the Cowboys journeyed to Woodman Field in Montclair in high hopes of reversing last year's score. The Cowboys, in the second half, played the Mounties on even terms; but the damage had been done in the first half. Montclair won 37-13. In a well played game West Orange reversed last year's West-field score winning a 7-6 squeaker at West Orange. The season ended on a bright note for the Cowboys and their followers. The vaunted All-State Cougar eleven found the going rough against West Orange on Thanksgiving morn, much to the surprise of many onlookers. With the exception of one play the Cowboys pushed the Columbia strong boys all over Underhill Field and had many scoring opportunities in the latter stages of the game but just couldn't get the ball across the last white chalk mark. The final score was 6-0 in Columbia's favor.

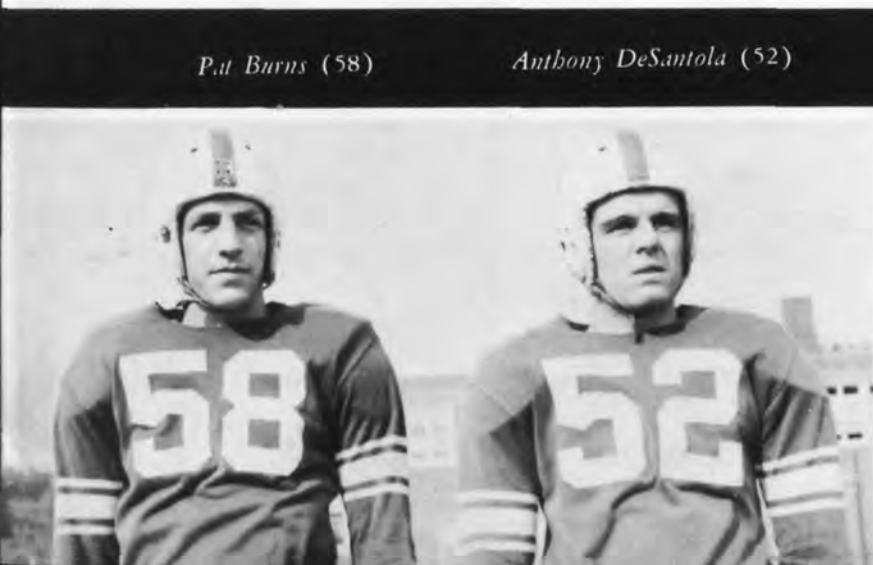

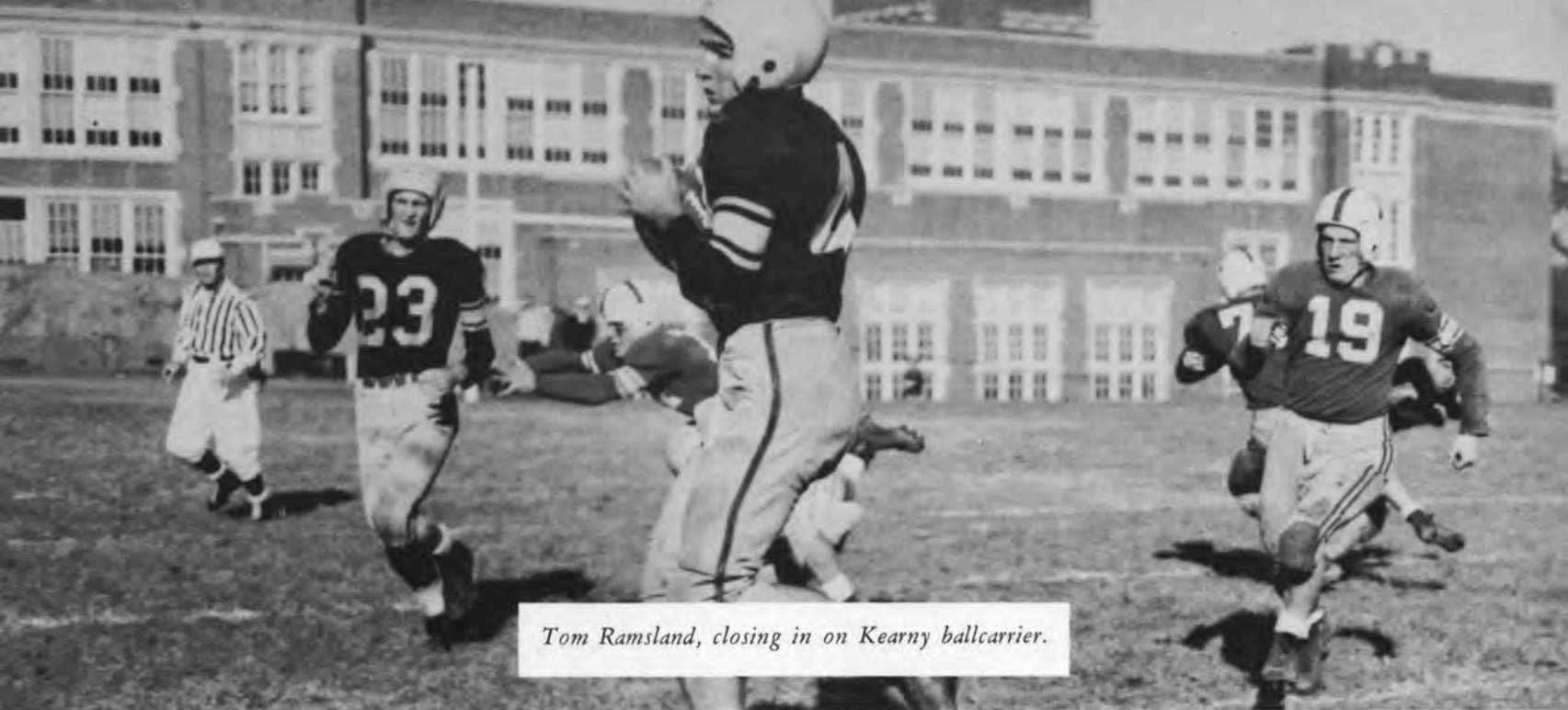

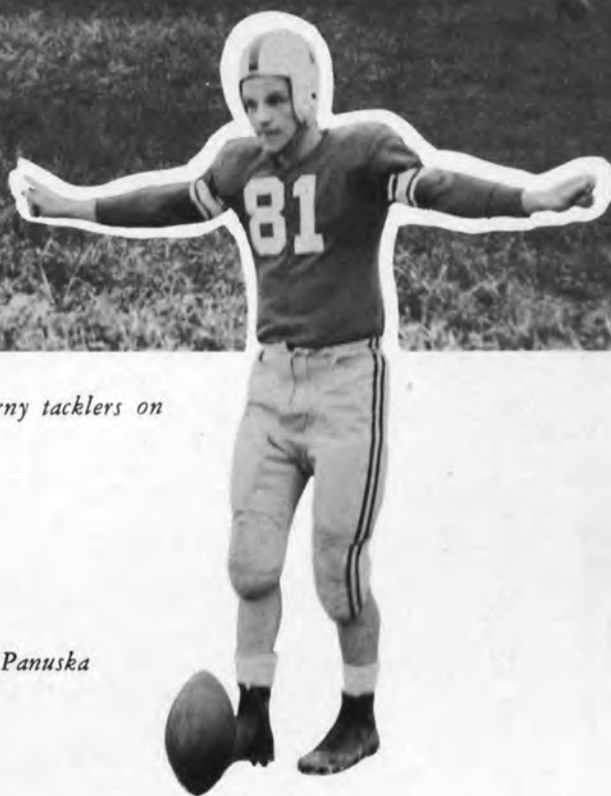

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BASKETBALL

The 1951-52 basketball team of West Orange High was one to be proud of. In the absence of Marc Rankin, coach of previous years, Al Lawrence took over the coaching job. With three of last year's starting five returning Mr. Lawrence had a good nucleus around which to mold his ball club. After starting slowly, losing the first two games, the Cowboys "caught fire" and won eight out of the next nine games, the only defeat being a one point loss at the hands of Newark Academy. These wins included overwhelming defeats of Orange, Morristown, Panzer Frosh, talented West Orange Alumni, East Orange, Columbia, and Kearny. Lacking school support, the rapidly improving Cowboys lost two heart breakers, one to Irvington 40-39, the other to West Side 53-51. Orange then defeated a physically injured, but still spirited, West Orange team. Still playing before pitifully small crowds, West Orange lost to Nutley by a close four points. The Cowboys rose again to great heights by defeating East Orange to win the cherished Inter-Oranges' title and then finished the

season in whirlwind fashion by winning the remaining three games.

West Orange entered the Essex County Tournament in a non-seeded position. Not much was expected from the Cowboys because of their hot and cold seasonal play, but the experts had another think coming. With the school finally beginning to support their team, which was not the case during the regular season, the spirited West Orange five played a fine game both offensively and defensively in defeating seventh seeded West Side, 54-47, and third seeded Belleville, 44-33. First seeded Montclair was the next victim of the high flying Cowboys with a 39-35 win. This game put West Orange in the finals against Seton Hall. The Hall handed the nervous and tense Cowboys a 67-44 defeat. Along with the physical development of a town there is also a social development. Thus it is only natural that West Orange has been and still is the scene of many social activities.

In 1820 a mineral spring having medicinal properties was discovered near Northfield Road on the farm of Joseph Condit. Under the ownership of the Orange Spring Company, the place became one of the chief summer resorts of the country. The Essex County Country Club obtained this land; however, the demand for land in this section forced the club to relinquish its lease in 1928 and acquire its present site.

Before the turn of the century, Eagle Rock, because of its high elevation and magnificent view, became a mecca for picknickers. The owners of a nearby small pond rented rowboats to these picknickers during the summer and provided skating facilities in the winter. The place became so popular that a restaurant, a dance hall, and a merry-go-round were constructed. This undertaking was named Crystal Lake Amusement Park. The popularity of Eagle Rock caused a group of individuals to construct a second amusement park north of Walker Road. Although carnivals and wild-west shows were used to popularize this park, the lack of direct transportation caused the venture to fail. The park site, which includes Cable Lake, was bought in 1929 by the Rock Spring Country Club. These are only a few of the many organizations that have contributed to the social growth of West Orange.

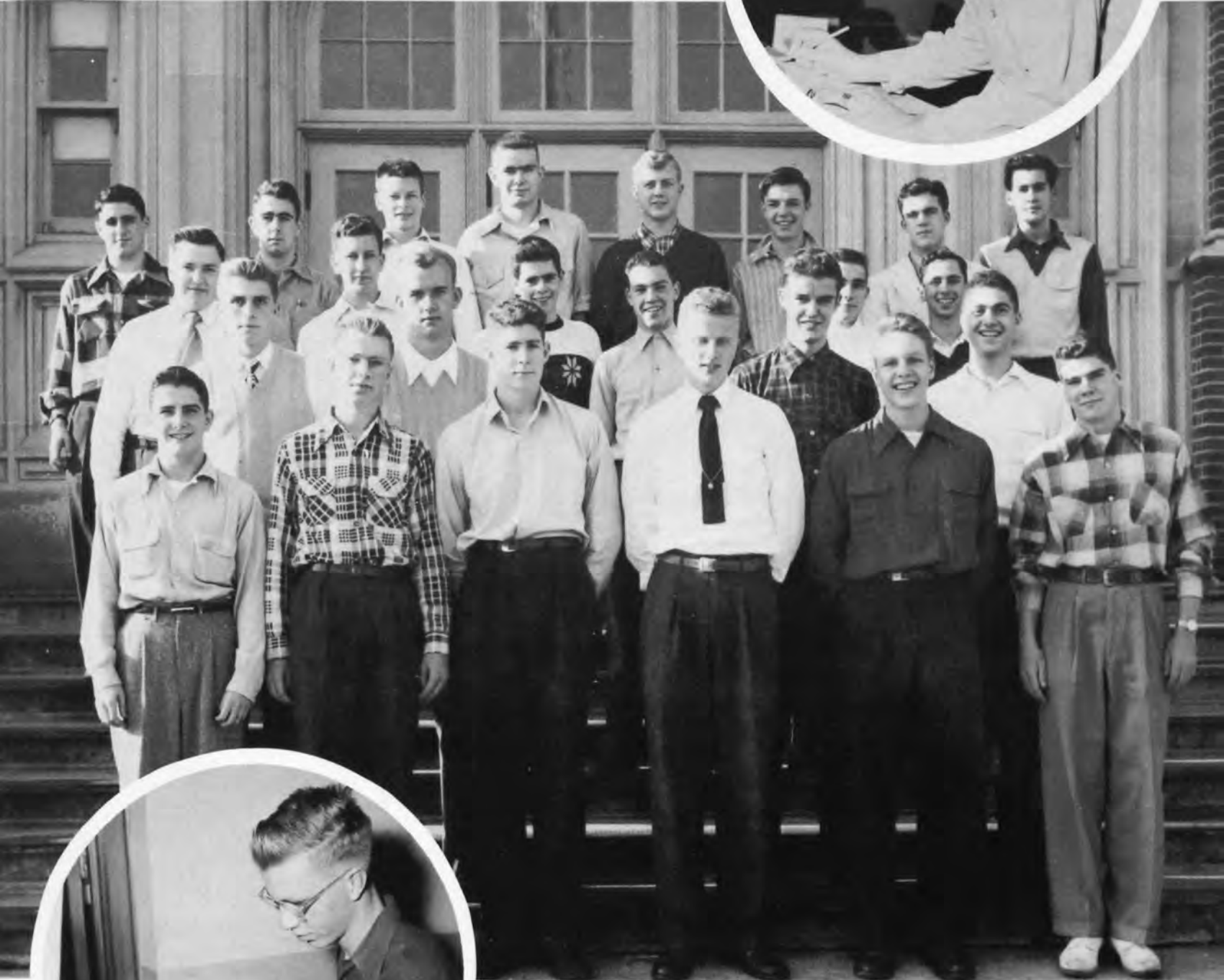

STUDENT CONGRESS

The way in which the student government of West Orange High School operates is very similar to that of the government of the town. These projects serve as an illustration of the co-operation and school spirit that is necessary for the success of any program undertaken by the Student Congress.

The Council takes an active part in the meetings of the Inter-Oranges' Council and the New Jersey Organization for Student Congresses. These meetings are attended by members of the Executive Committee who later report the discussion results and the latest news. 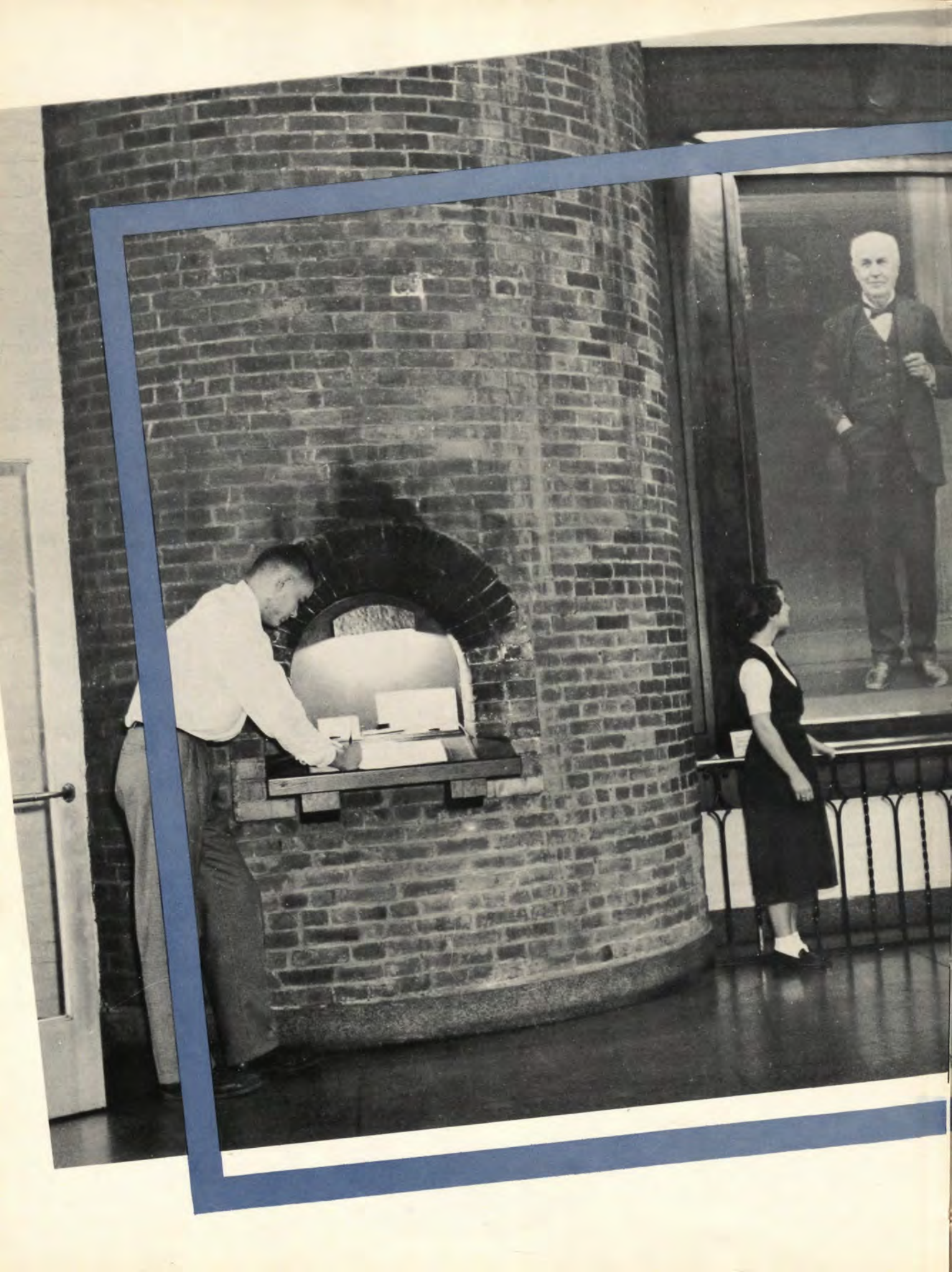
The beginners' club became familiar with the

From the time it was first settled, West Orange has been the scene of many industries. Although some of these industries have failed and have been forgotten, each one has had its part in building our town.

There were at one time or another several quarries in West Orange, the most prominent of these being Schrupp's Quarry, which was the source of the stone used in the building of St. Mark's Church. During the 1850's the Lighthips established a hat shop near Mt. Pleasant Avenue and thus used in the manufacturing of hats other natural resources; such as, water power and tanbark from hemlock trees. Another of our businesses, the White St. Gas Works, was the original source of the gas used for lighting the roads in Llewellyn Park. The most famous industry, however, is that of Thomas A. Edison, which at one time was one of the world's largest producers of phonographs and phonograph records. This factory, which today manufactures such items as batteries, radio sets, and special electrical appliances, along with its famous research library, has brought many visitors and resident-workers to our town. In this way Mr. Edison did much to aid the growth of West Orange.

In the same manner that industries have developed our town, our schools through their curriculums and activities have developed the minds and bodies of the boys and girls of West Orange.

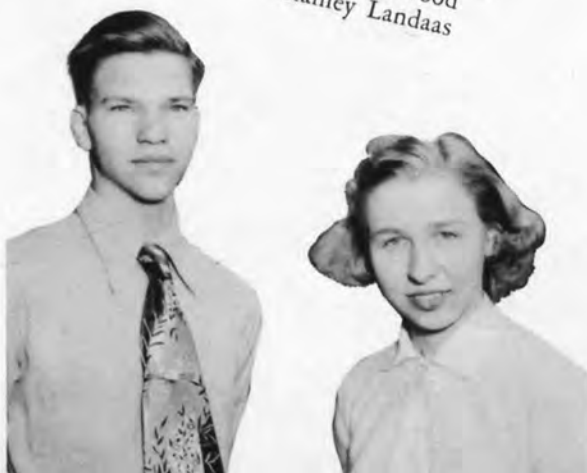

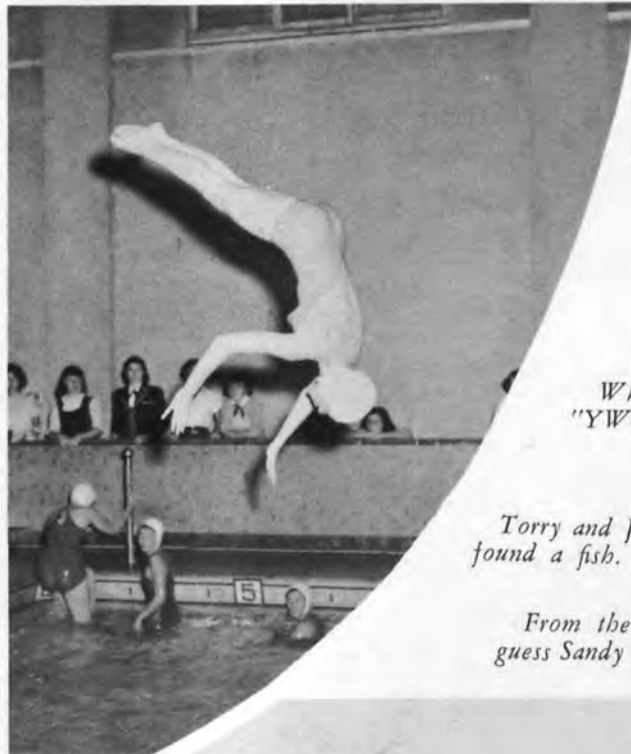

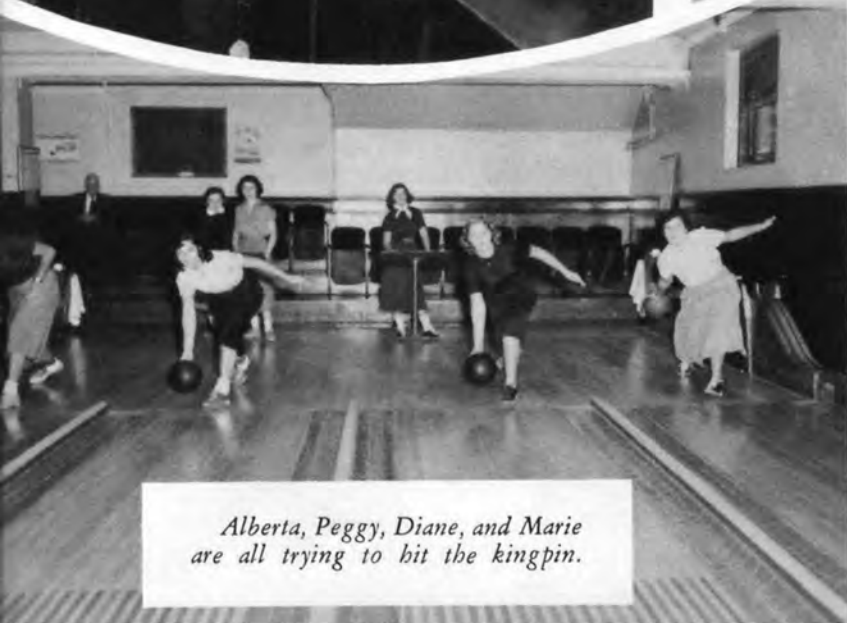

The community of West Orange with its various historical localities serves as a focal point of the world over. The scenic Llewellyn Park, founded by Llewellyn S. Haskell, is one of the sites which adds to the fame of West Orange. As the first purchase of the land in 1853, Llewellyn Park lies along the ridge in the vicinity of the "steep precipice called Turk Eagle Rock." In 1855 Mr. Haskell purchased two hundred fifty acres of land, which later became the homes of such people as John Burke, the Colgates, and the Edisons. The narrow winding roads remain today as they were laid out by the founders, and every attempt has been made to maintain the natural beauty which existed at the time of its early development. Historical Eagle Rock, once a battlefield during the Revolutionary War, is now a section of West Orange from which one can look down upon a panorama of the world's most famous sky-line, New York. The annual Easter Sunrise Service at Eagle Rock is the largest event of its kind in the East. Hutton, today an exclusive residential section with its ponds, streams, and waterfalls, started when a discovered medicinal spring was thought to have metamorphosed into one of the chief summer resorts of the county. Because of its natural beauty and its historical landmarks, it is apparent that West Orange is advertised widely and recognized the world over.

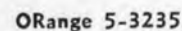

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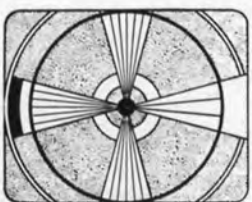

He is a realistic painter and insists that his portraits be exact likenesses of what they represent. He has a remarkable memory for equine individuals and characteristics. With but a quick glance he can remember for a long time, every detail, even the pattern and structure of the veins of the horse. He uses a moving picture and shoots hundreds of feet of colored film of each horse he paints to have on hand for constant reference while he is working on the canvas. Even these colored movies are the work of an artist and would arouse the envy of a professional cameraman. Much of his astounding success can be traced to the thoroughness of his method as well as to his education and his early training in the West. We of West Orange rightfully feel a great pride in this, undoubtedly, our most famous graduate, the young artist who as a boy used to watch the ranch hands ride past his home in the horse and cattle country of Texas, the boy who grew to love these scenes which were his first models, scenes which worked themselves into a talent which has carried him far.
