
Ruth Goodyear is indeed an asset to our faculty. Many students, after passing through her capable hands, express gratitude for the thorough English course they have received from her.

















SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Spring of every year finds the cheerleaders teaching those girls who aspire to be chosen for the following year's squad.
















Many of the former members of the club are now engaged in some type of theatrical work. No doubt, their careers have been helped along by the experience which they gained at W.O.H.S.

This undertaking, sponsored by various local businesses, gives students training in setting up model companies on a stock basis and in making and selling their products. The faithful service of the many students who participated has helped to broaden the practical side of education in our school. The congress provided the annual introductory party for the sophomores and supported the Red Cross Drive. They also bought new mirrors for the girls' rooms and began a program to provide music during lunch periods. SCIENCE CLUBS




The science club was formed primarily for those students who have a special interest in biology and are willing to contribute to the club. It gives the members a chance to express their own ideas in both individual and group projects.

AUTO MECHANICS CLUB


The members not only arrived at a point where they found a new appreciation

Two of the more recent functions, the U.N. Birthday dance and the Television Star Program, topped off a year that will be long remembered by all who attended the canteen.


