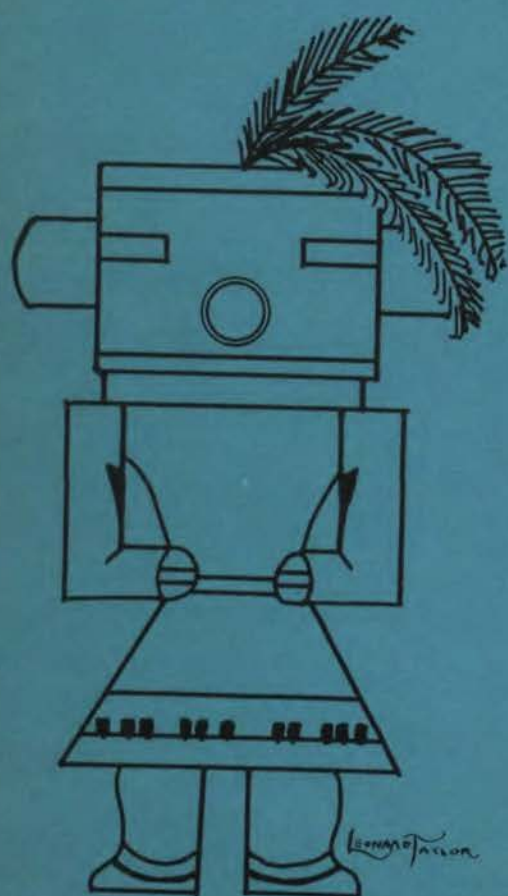

The 1953 football team had a rather extraordinary record of three wins, three losses, and three ties. These three losses came at the hands of the three best teams in the state, East Orange, Montclair, and Orange, this record is nothing to be scoffed at.

Taking the field against Irvington in their opening home game, the Cowboys tallied on a drive in the waning minutes to get a 7-7 tie. In their second home game, a favored Cowboy eleven ran into stubborn opposition in the form of Clifford Scott High. Seeing their first victory within their grasp, however, West Orange scored a touchdown in the first period and a safety in the third period for a 9-0 victory.

West Orange traveled to Martens Stadium to meet the Panthers of East Orange in their first away game. The Cowboys were handed their first loss, 28-7. Returning home again, a determined West Orange team took on a heavier Kearny High eleven. In a thrill packed encounter before 3,000 fans the two teams battled to a 7-7 tie.

Playing sub-par ball in their second Inter-Orange League game, the Cowboys were handed a 27-6 loss at the hands of a scrappy Orange eleven.

Smooth passing and a hard charging forward wall were the main instruments in West Orange's second and most impressive victory of the season, a 26 to 14 walloping of Bloomfield.

The Cowboys played their greatest defensive game against the mighty Mounties of Montclair. It took all the power the Mounties could summon to turn back a fighting Cowboy eleven 14-0 at Woodman Field, Montclair. In their last home game of the '53 season the Cowboys romped to their third victory by shutting out Westfield 18-0. In their final game of the '53 season the Cowboys had to settle for a 0-0 tie with a determined Columbia eleven before 11,000 fans at Underhill Field, South Orange.

With a combination of increased backboard strength, better shooting ability, and a stronger bench, the Cowboys went on to win eight in a row, including two tournament games. Their fine streak was ended in the semifinals of the Essex County Tournament by South Side. After a valiant try, West Orange was defeated in the closing seconds in what was the most exciting game of the tournament.

West Orange played its finale against Orange in the consolation game at the big Seton Hall arena. The Maroon and White was beaten in a thrilling and closely contested overtime battle. This final game was typical of the entire season's play.

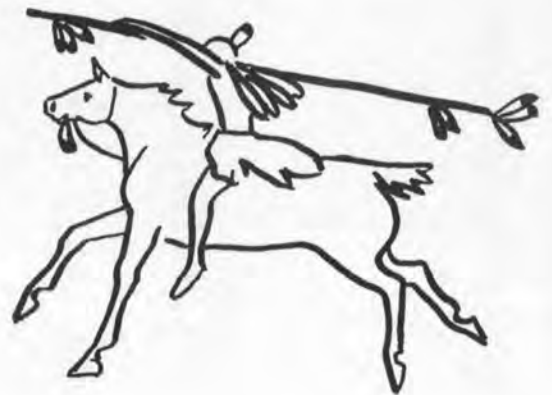

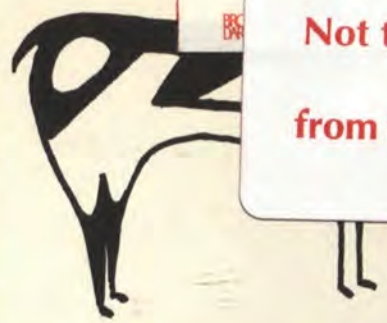
