ALFRED LAWRENCE





When Tony Selitto was injured in the Irvington game, the first game of the season (a 7-7 tie), Harold Behar, Phil Cataldo, and the rest of the team had the full support of our fans. They showed it, too, by their sparkling play in the second half.

Another thing that can be considered a success is the favorable records of all of the underclassmen teams. The "B" team, new to West Orange, but not to neighboring schools, is a good example. Under the able direction of Mr. Thomas Guest, this team won five while losing only two. Mr. Robert Krimmel and Mr. James O'Keefe must be commended for their work with the J.V.'s. These boys compiled a 1-0-3 record, while gaining valuable experience for next year. Under a new system, instituted last year, the freshmen from Roosevelt Junior High School and Edison Junior High School combined, under Mr. Howard Mathesius and Mr. Harry Hopkins, to train with the varsity and win three games, lose one, and tie once. This system, although comparatively new, has already begun to pay dividends. Thirteen sophomores were fighting for starting positions at the beginning of the year, and some of them achieved their goals, while others won positions on the squad. Immediately after this game, we were deprived of one more victory—the Bloomfield game was not played because of poor playing conditions.

At the end of the season, the annual Thanksgiving Day game was played on a muddy, slippery Columbia field. The underdog Cougars surprised us and everyone else when they scored in the first and fourth periods to sandwich our last stanza tally. It was a well-earned triumph for Columbia (14-7) and a tough loss for the Cowboys, but both teams exhibited the fine sportsmanship that is synonymous with this classic.





Basketball this year at West Orange received a "shot in the arm." At tournament time, our record of eleven wins and five losses placed us well up in the standings of the Inter-Oranges League. It also earned us a berth in the top ten of Essex County, and labeled us a threat to take the Tourney title. Our junior varsity team showed great promise this year, too. Under the able guidance of novice coach Whitman, the sophs compiled a neat overall 12-6 record, a sign of the good future basketball at our school.

From the very beginning of the season, the Cowboys showed their prowess by handing out decisive defeats to Columbia and Bloomfield. Our next few games were with three highly-touted teams, Montclair, Belleville, and Orange. Although the boys gave their all in each of these games, their effort was just not strong enough. We were still a green team, as the later, better performances proved.

Rebounding from the season's first and only losing streak, the Cowboys came to; looked at; and conquered the Morristowners in a 91-48 lopsided romp. From there we met undefeated West Side, eventual Essex County Tournament winner. In a rather unflattering manner, the Newarkers ran wild, scoring 83 points to our 60. Not dismayed by this loss, we bounced back to start a streak of four wins. Beginning with East Orange, the boys waded through and defeated Columbia, Kearny, and Irvington. Then our charges encountered those of Orange. 
