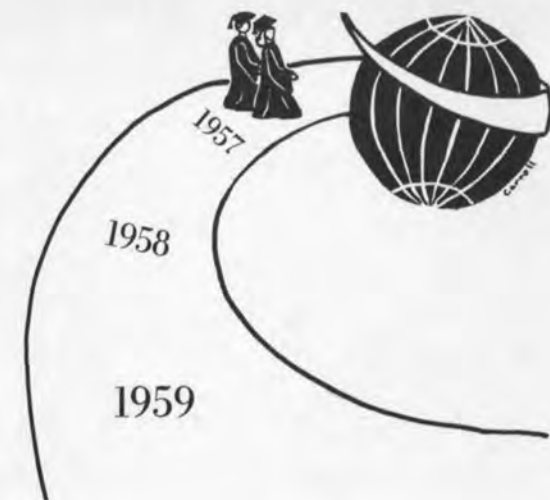

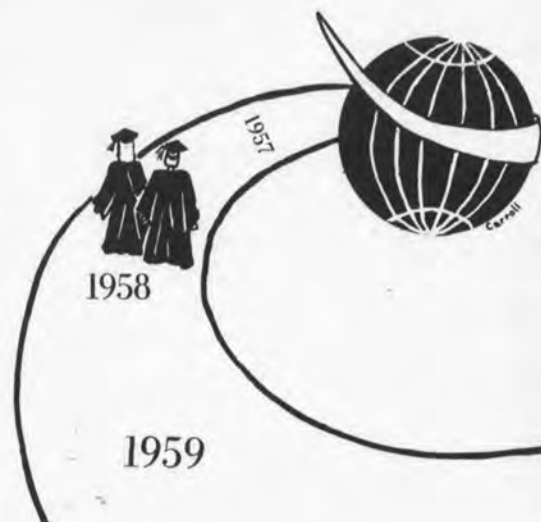

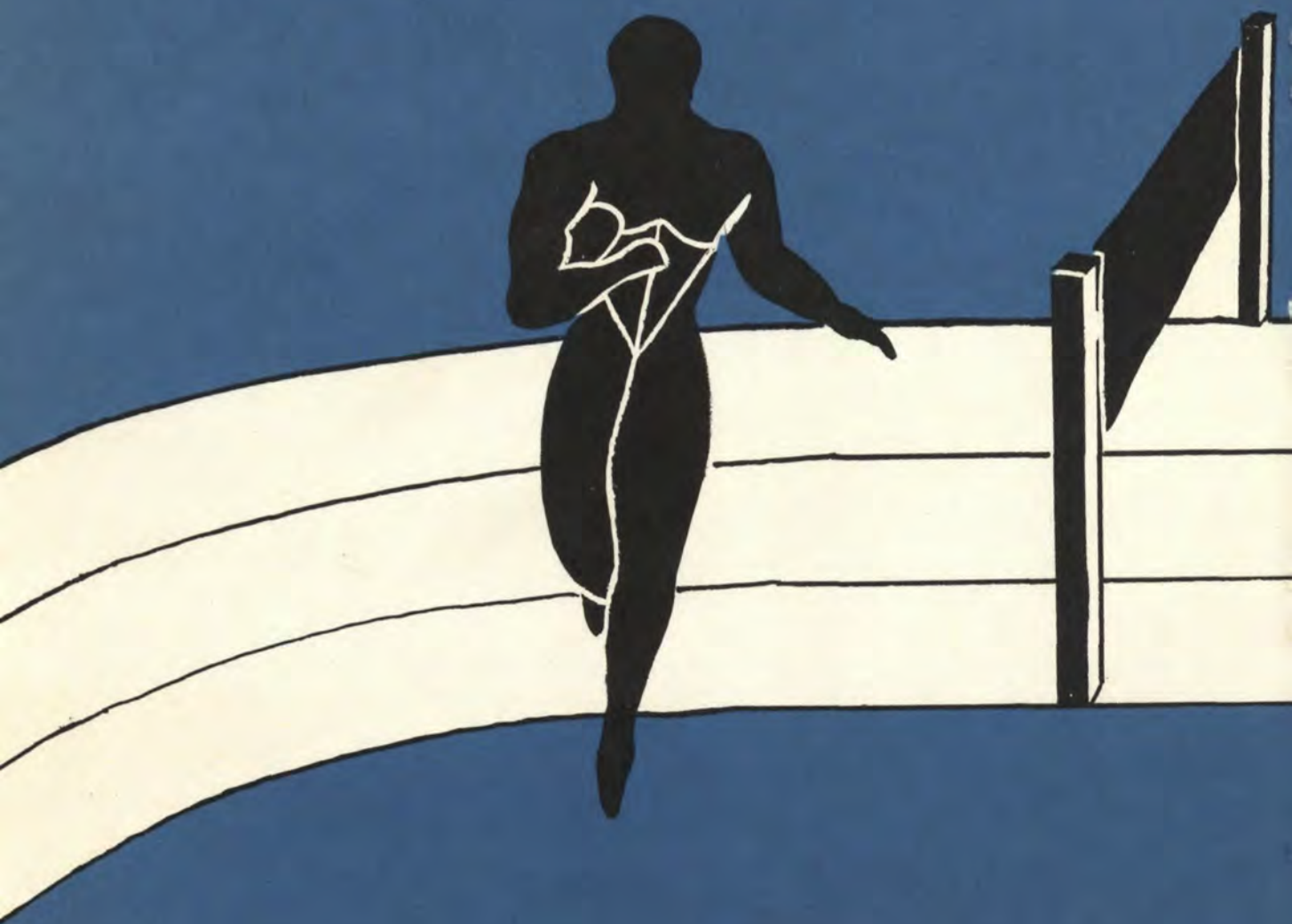

AUTUMN ACTION FOOTBALL

Coach Ed Johnson's gridmen compiled a fine record of 4-3-2 despite many injuries to key players. The veteran cowboy line played heads-up football most of the time with fine end play from Blake and Halfpenny. The backfield, led by Behar and Force, ran well and frequently displayed its power despite the serious injuries.

The cowboys roared into the pigskin season by routing Irvington 20-0. Fleet halfback, Charley Bleakly, led the way with a 75 yard touchdown return of the opening kickoff. Willie Cantelmo capped off the scoring with an 84 yard touchdown sprint. The cowboys then suffered an upset at the hands of Clifford Scott but tied East Orange in an inter-Oranges battle.

At this point in the season the backfield began to lose key personnel. Halfback Charlie Bleakly and fullback Dave Wenny were forced from action for the rest of the season with serious knee injuries. Halfbacks Cantelmo and Janke were also out of action for a while.

Coach Johnson's strong reserves filled the gaps, how-

ever, and defeated Kearny 19-13. Then the Johnsonmen dropped an 18-0 decision to Orange and tied the Bengals of Bloomfield. In the latter game, Walter Janke scored both TD's and gained over 100 yards. After suffering defeat to a powerful Mounty eleven, the Cowboys regained winning ways by completely dominating Morristown in a 13-12 win. In this game, the line displayed excellent blocking while the team gained over 400 yards.

The Cowboys topped the season off by defeating the Cougars in the traditional Turkey Day clash. The Johnsonmen played fine football sparked by excellent quarter-backing by Behar and steady gains by Bob Jankow. This victory clinched both a winning season and second place in the inter-Orange league.

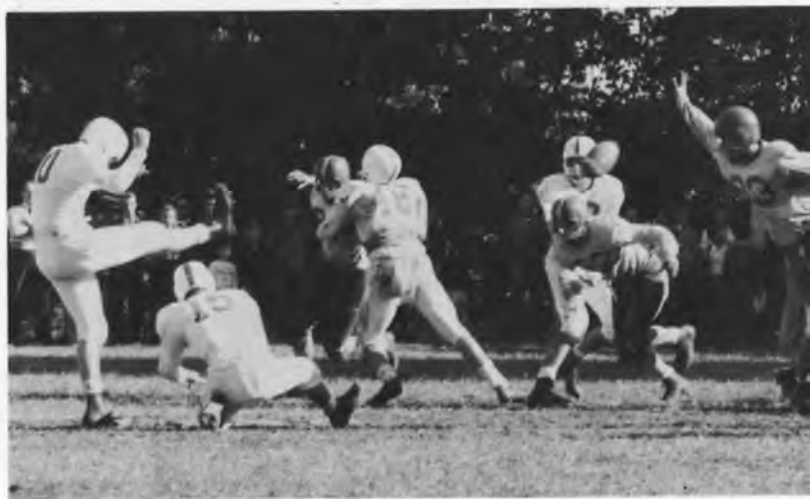

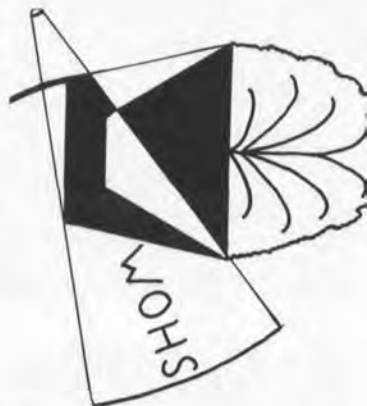




CHEERLEADERS

The Cowboy cagers, composed of veteran players, greatly improved upon their 55-56 season record by compiling a successful slate of 11-8. The Guestmen also showed strength in the Big Ten by finishing fourth with a 6-3 mark. Coach Guest was fortunate in having last year's proven sophomore and junior varsity members plus experienced courtmen from the J.V.E.C.T. championship team with which to build a winning team.

Throughout the season the Guestmen displayed fine competitive spirit and at times displayed surprising strength. However, the nemesis of the Cowboys lurked at the foul line. The courtmen collected on only 48% of their free throws. After opening the season by defeating Columbia 53-49, the Guestmen dropped two decisions to Bloomfield and Montclair. The cagers see-sawed from the win to the lost column for the next nine games, winning five and losing four. At this point the Cowboy courtmen spurred themselves toward an E.C.T. seeded berth by taking the next four contests. While compiling this streak, the Cowboys scored a surprising upset over the highly rated East Orange Panthers. In an overtime battle, the courtmen defeated the Panthers 49-44. This clinched the seventh seeded spot in the E.C.T. for W.O.

In their first E.C.T. game the cowboys soundly whipped Newark Tech, 64-37. Hopes of further upsets died in the quarter finals, however, when East Orange defeated the Cowboy cagers 53-41.

The junior varsity, coached by Mr. Wear, had a mediocre season record of 8-9. While defending their '56 championship, they defeated Central 49-45 in a preliminary E.C.T. contest. They lost the title in the quarter finals when they were upended by Weequahic.

Cowboy cage aspirations for next year are again high for an even better record. Coach Guest is very fortunate in losing only four men through graduation and he looks forward to greeting most of the starting seasoned quintet.

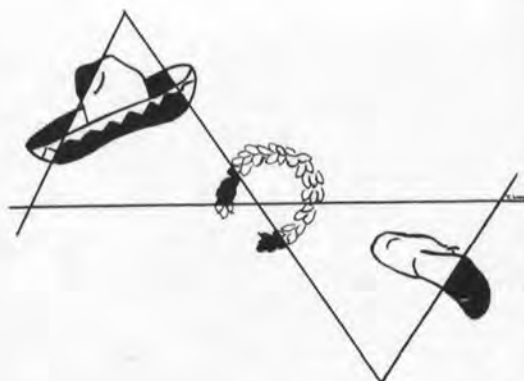
LANGUAGE CLUBS

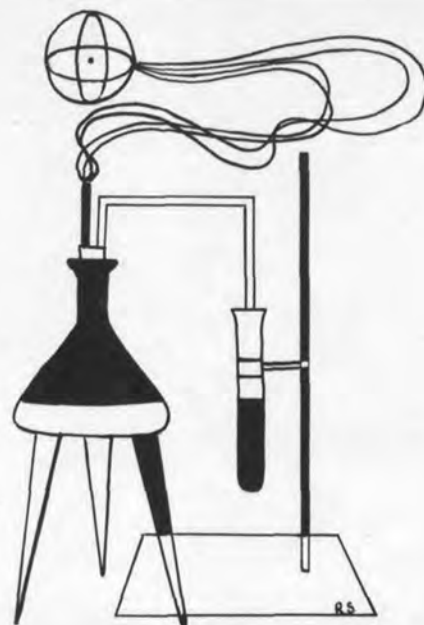


ABOVE—Mr. Bauerle supervises the production of cuprous-chloride.

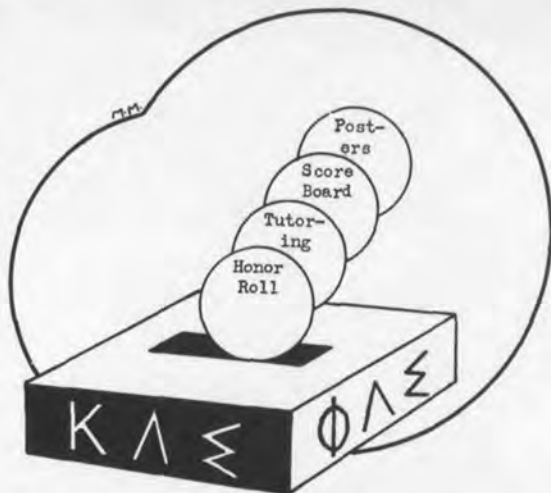

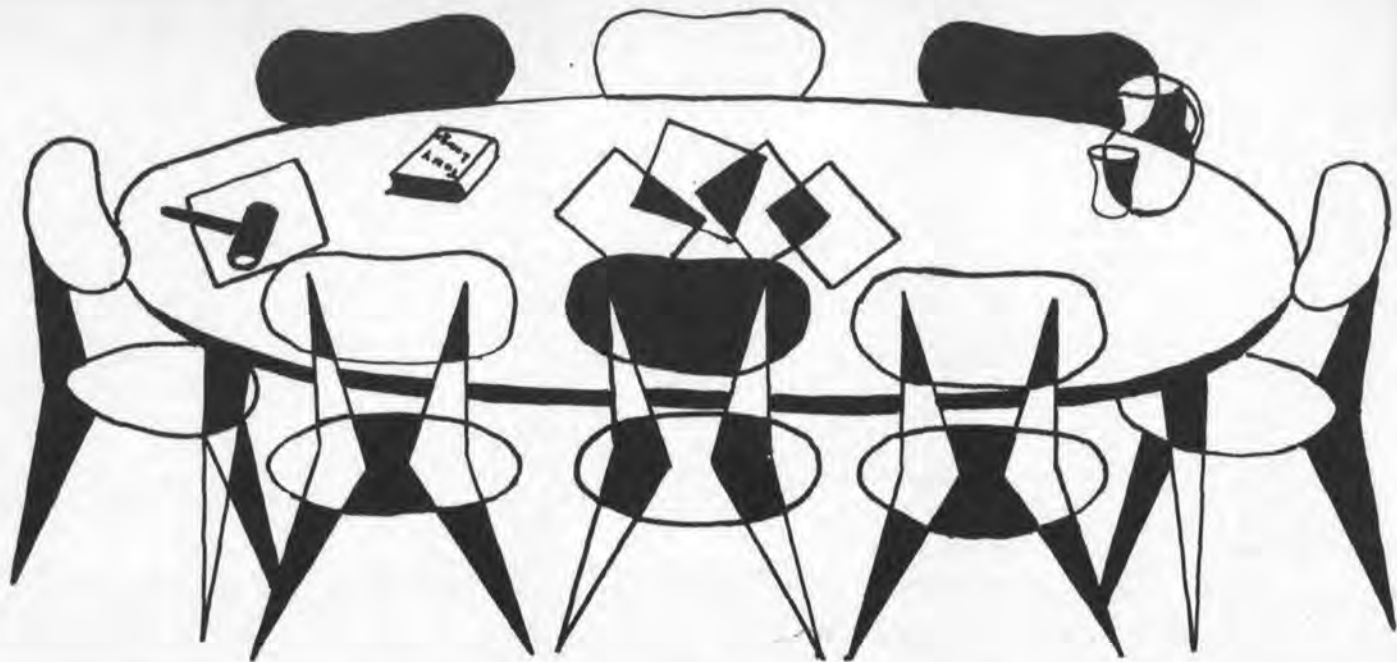

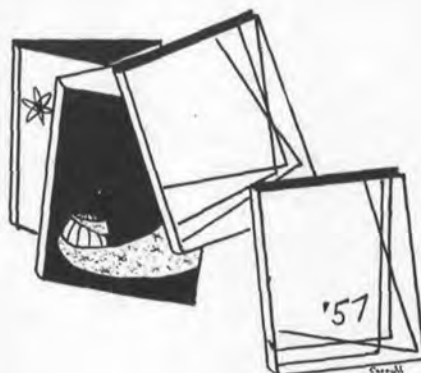

In addition to its regular activities, the "Roundup" again sponsored the "Typical Students" contest.

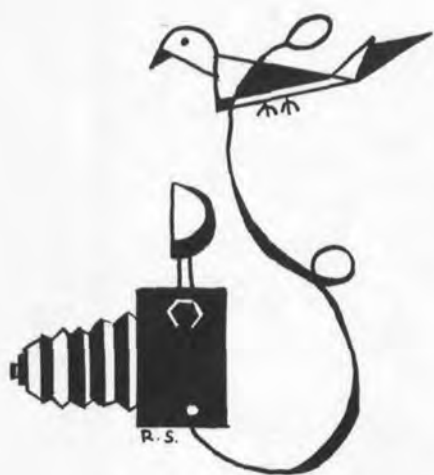
