





ABOVE—Mayor Sheeran addresses fellow commissioners and student commissioners during climax of Student Government Day.






MARY E. LOUGHREN


EDWARD E. JOHNSON Administrative Assistant





Plagued by several hindrances, the Cowboy cagers ended their first season in the new gym with a losing season of 1-15. Mr. Guest, coach of the West Orange varsity basketball team, gave the chief reason for the lack of wins as being inexperience. Coach Guest very often had to use in the lineup sophomores and juniors who had never before played varsity basketball. Even the five seniors on the thirteen-man squad were relatively unused to varsity ball, since last year's team was carried completely by seniors.

Another reason for the losing season was that the ball was much too often lost on violations. The Cowboys played a fine defensive game, but could not seem to score.

West Orange's only victory was against West Side, where the Cowboys netted 39 points to their opponents

35. The Belleville game was a close loss, Belleville barely edging out West Orange by one point, 43-42. The Cowboys made good showings against Columbia and Orange, but were defeated in these contests 36-33 and 45-32, respectively.

Mr. Wear's jayvee team improved greatly as the season progressed. In the first round of the Essex County J.V. Tournament they defeated Columbia, Kearny, Orange, and Nutley. Four of Cowboy's losses were by four points or less. The final record for the jayvee team was 4-12.

In general, behemoth inexperience caused the lack of success of the West Orange court men in the '58-'59 season. However, Mr. Guest looks forward to a winning campaign next year since he takes into account the experience of his holdovers and the promise of his jayvees.





Despite poor field conditions for practice here at West Orange, the track team, under coach Joe Hince, made admirable showings in various meets. Hince pointed up the sorry state of the training field after each rainfall as being one big reason why the group could not be developed to fullest potential.

Sprinting proved to be the boys' strong spot in the 1959 season. At the Clifford Scott meet Steve Venokur, a senior, broke two West Orange records, making the 100-yard dash in 9.8 seconds and the 220 in 22.2. High jump and hurdles were two other events in which the Cowboys were fairly strong. 


cross country






