During this five game win streak Co-captains Jim Caboy and Steve Kesselman led the way. Caboy averaged 25 points per game and dominated the boards, while Steve "Dutchman" Kesselman was playmaker and second leading scorer.

Following an overtime loss to Irvington we bounced back against Nutley as Junior, Merv Davies, hit for 21 markers. An excellent team effort resulted in the demise of Orange High, but against Montclair we were on the wrong end of the final tally. In this game Kesselman was injured and his services were curtailed for several weeks.

We rebounded again to defeat East Orange as Billy Dalton scored 18 and Frank Mirenda sank two foul shots to give us a one point edge with one second left in the third overtime. Then Bob Williams paved the way over Bloomfield with a 21 point effort.

Then came the disappointing exam week when we lost to both Columbia and Belleville, two teams which we had previously beaten. The latter defeat came despite Mirenda's 20 points.

After an easy victory against Nutley in which Caboy hit 22, we played Kearny in the deciding game for the Big Ten Championship. Although we led by six points early in the second half, the Kards were not to be denied as they posted a three point victory to sew up the race. A final victory over Montclair gave us second place and a conference record of 13-5. West Orange is the only team which has beaten all other Big Ten teams.

We were seeded fifth in the county tournament but were upset by an underrated Valley five. The State tournament was the same as we blew a nine point lead in bowing to Newark West Side.

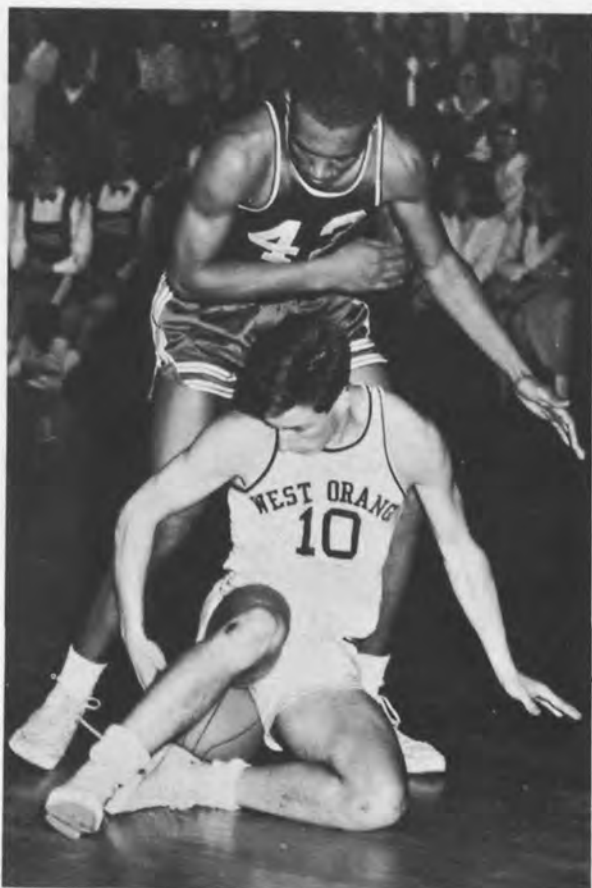

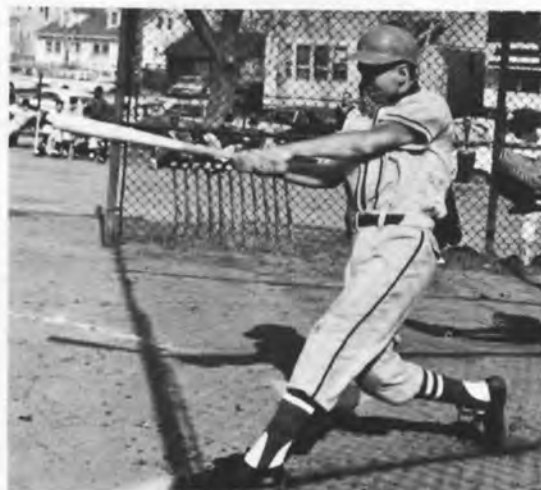
