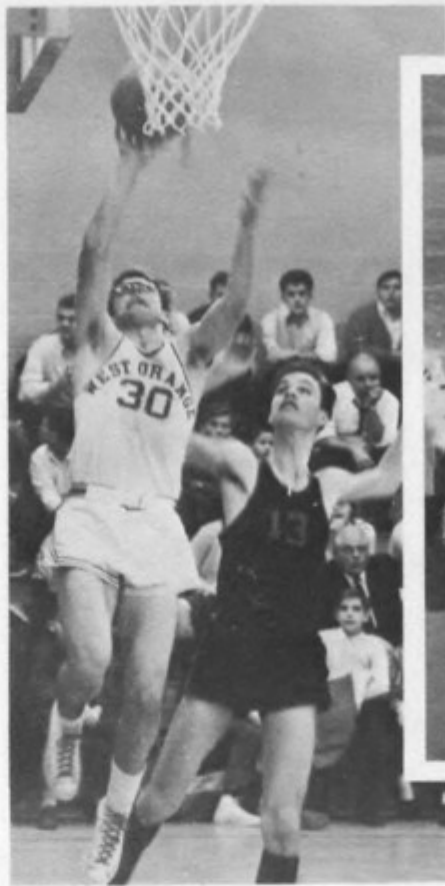


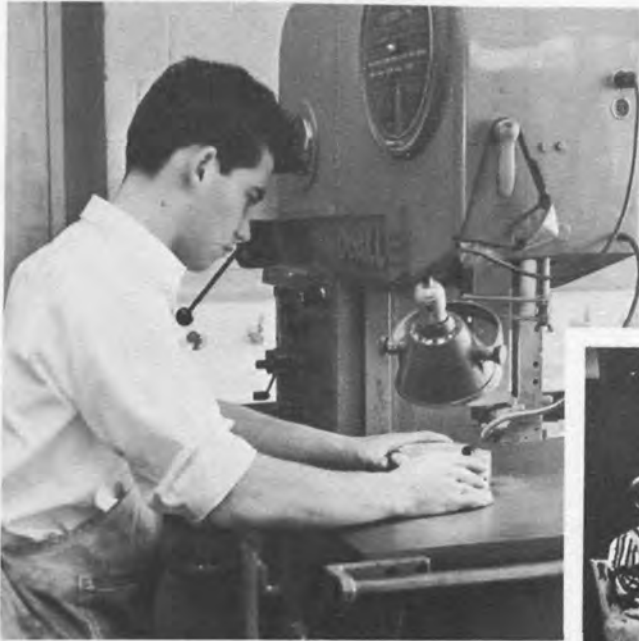

For the student who plans to continue his education at an institution of higher learning, the Guidance Department offers excellent counselors who are trained to assist him in choosing and applying to a school.

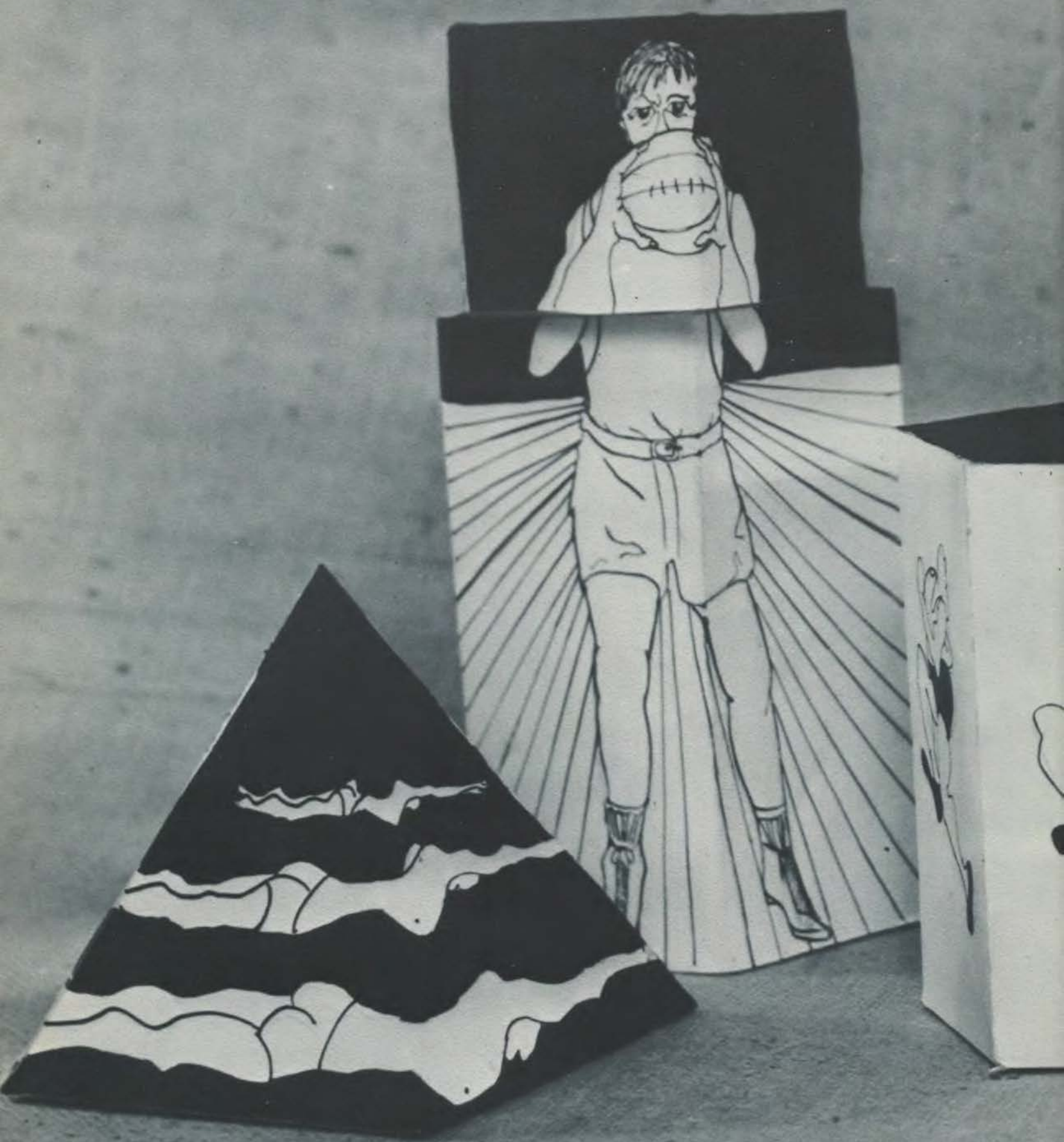


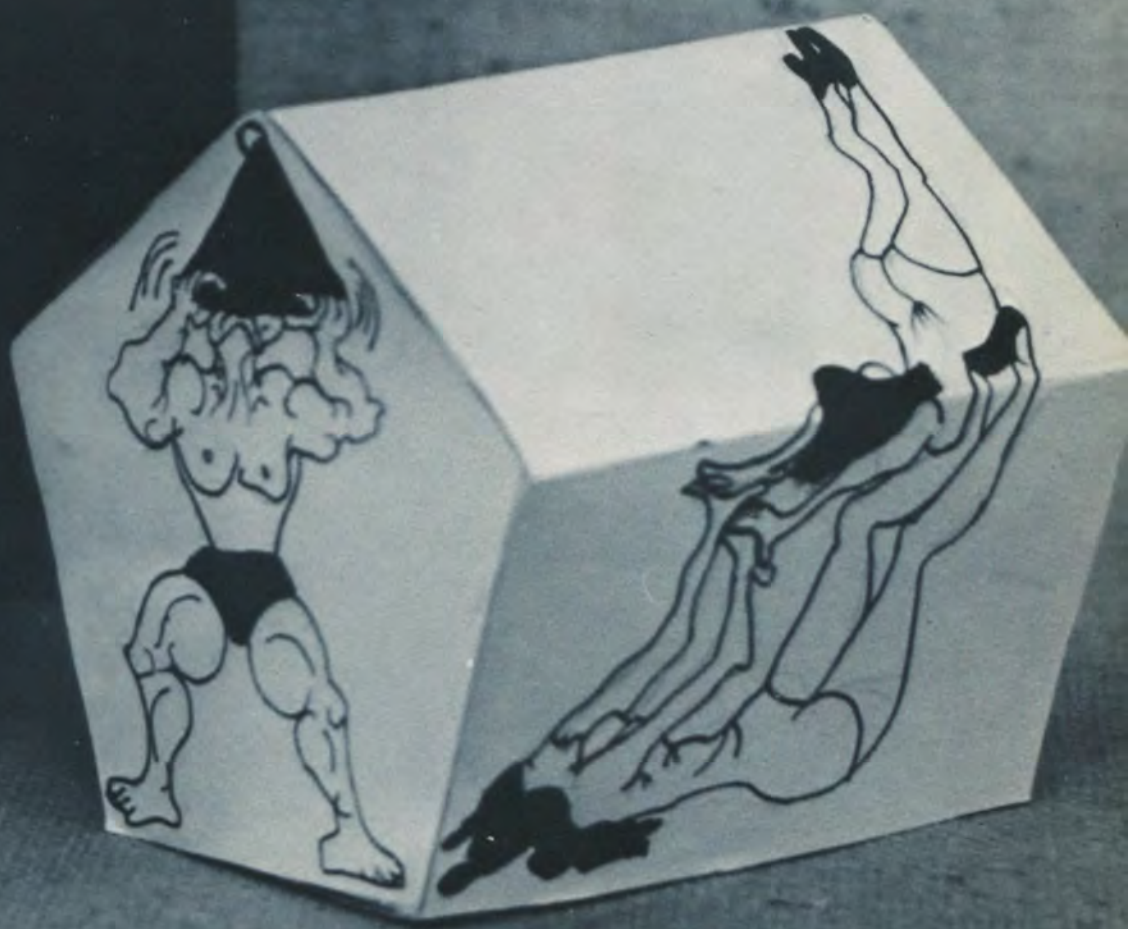
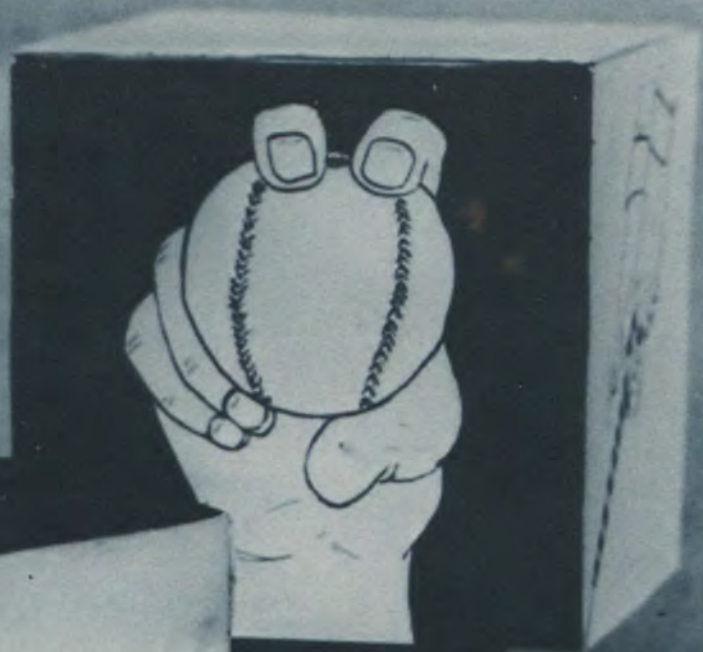

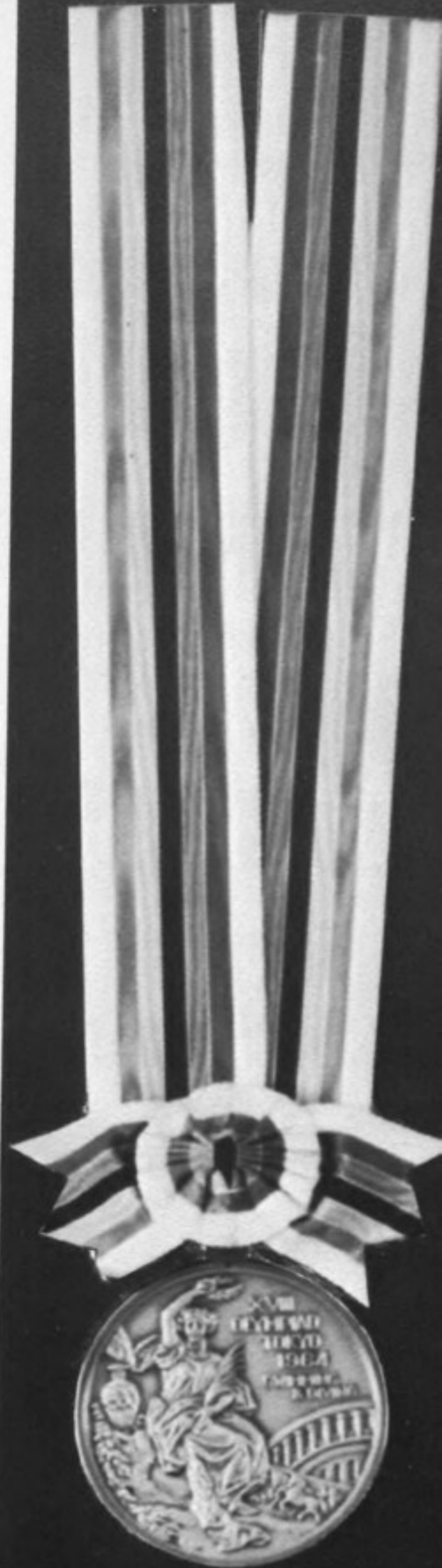

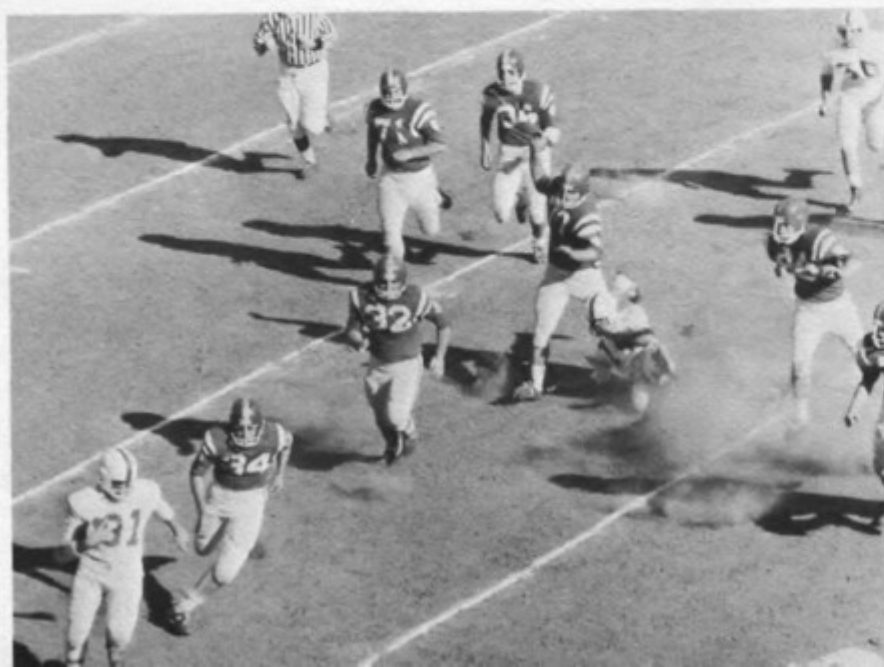

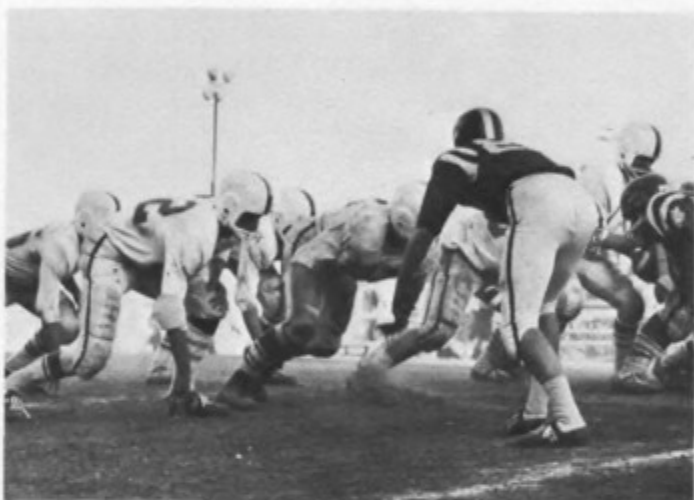

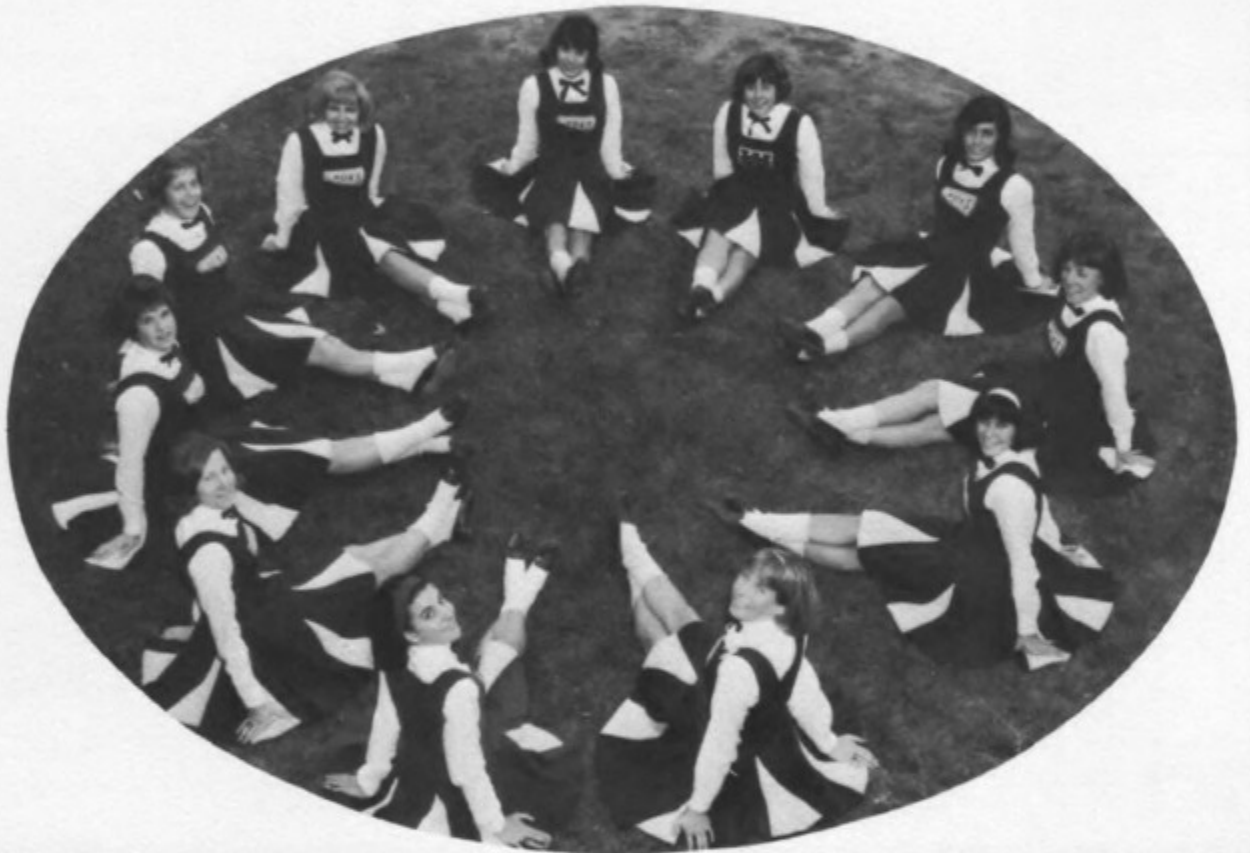

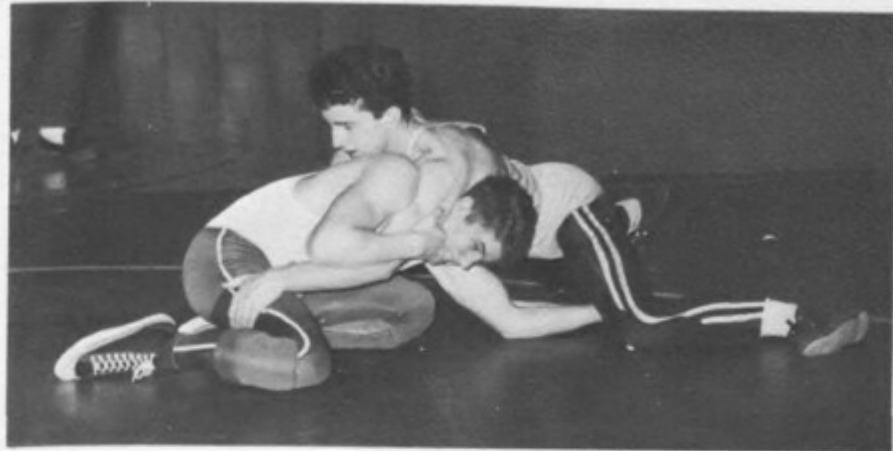


CHEERLEADERS' ENTHUSIASM INSPIRES PLAYERS AND SPECTATORS

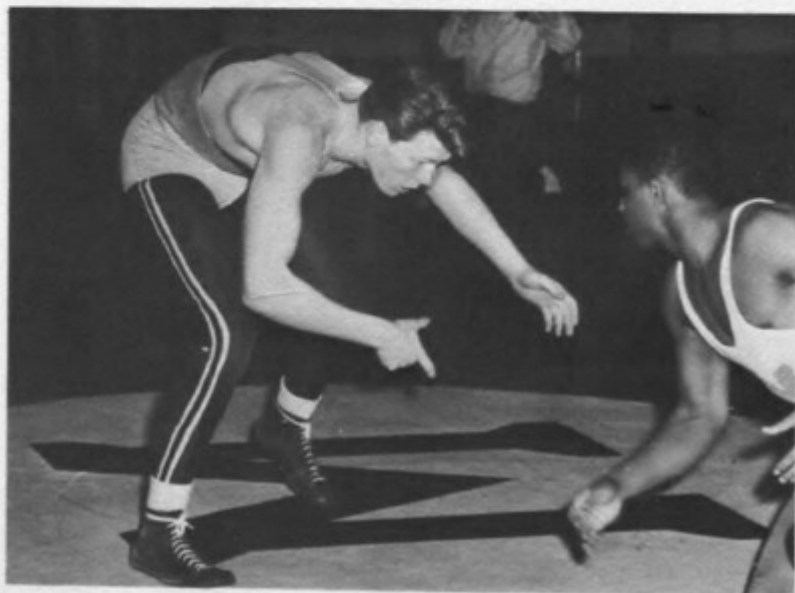

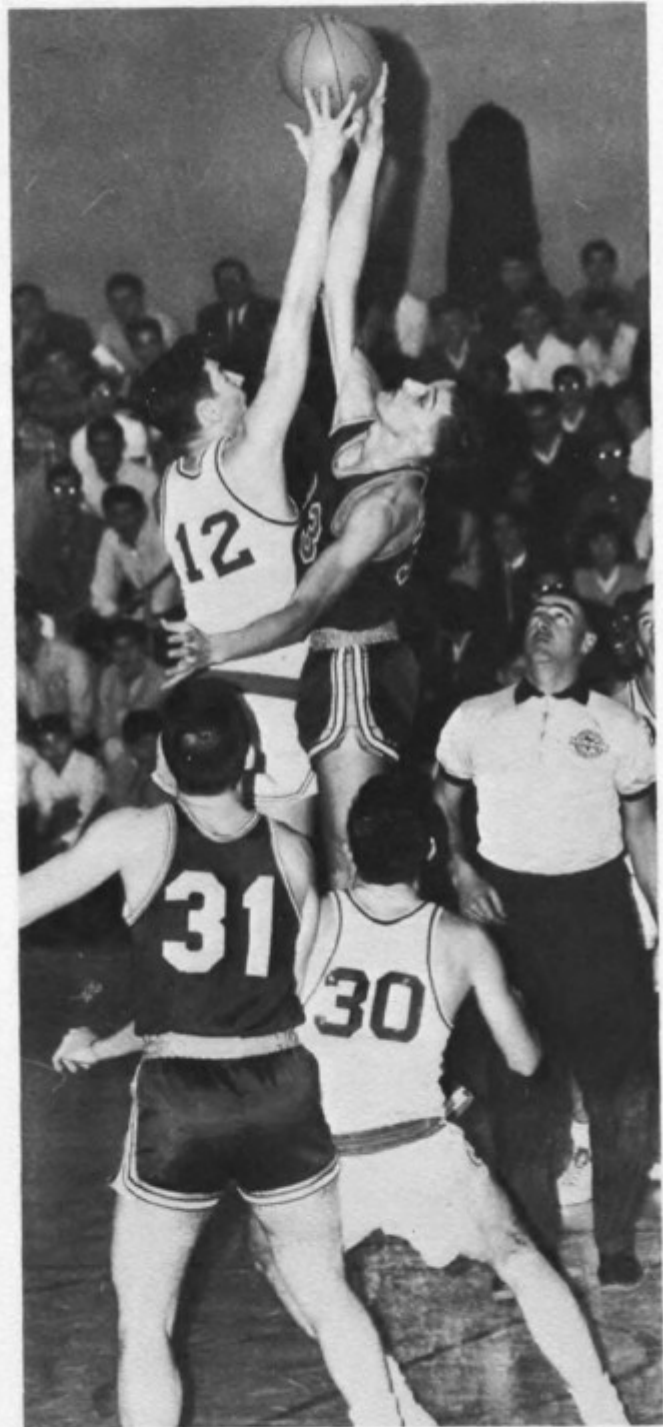

The Valley was our first victim. They gave us a hard fight but our superior foul shooting and Bill Dalton's 22 points secured us a one-point victory. Montclair, the pre-season favorite to take the Big Ten Crown, just couldn't cope with our offense. The Cowboys were undefeated until they met Bloomfield. We made four more field goals than the Bengals, but they beat us on the foul line. Plagued by injuries, we lost three of the following four games.

Then, led by Bill Dalton, who averaged 20 points per game, the Cowboys came right back to win the next five. When we came up against Bloomfield for the second time, the Bengals had a commanding 21-point lead. Determined not to lose, the West Orange five tied the score, but unfortunately lost the game with less than a minute to go. In the next game, arch-rival Columbia was beaten by the Cowboys.

Bill Dalton's field goal with less than three seconds to go in the Belleville game tied up the score to send the game into overtime. The Bellboys lost by six points. The regular season ended as the Cowboys lost a close ball game to Kearny.

The Cowboys had great spirit and determination in both the Essex County and State Tournaments, but fell victim in both series to the superior height and depth of opposing squads. True determination, spirit, and skill played a big part in the success our '64-'65 basketball squad enjoyed, coached by John Imgrund.

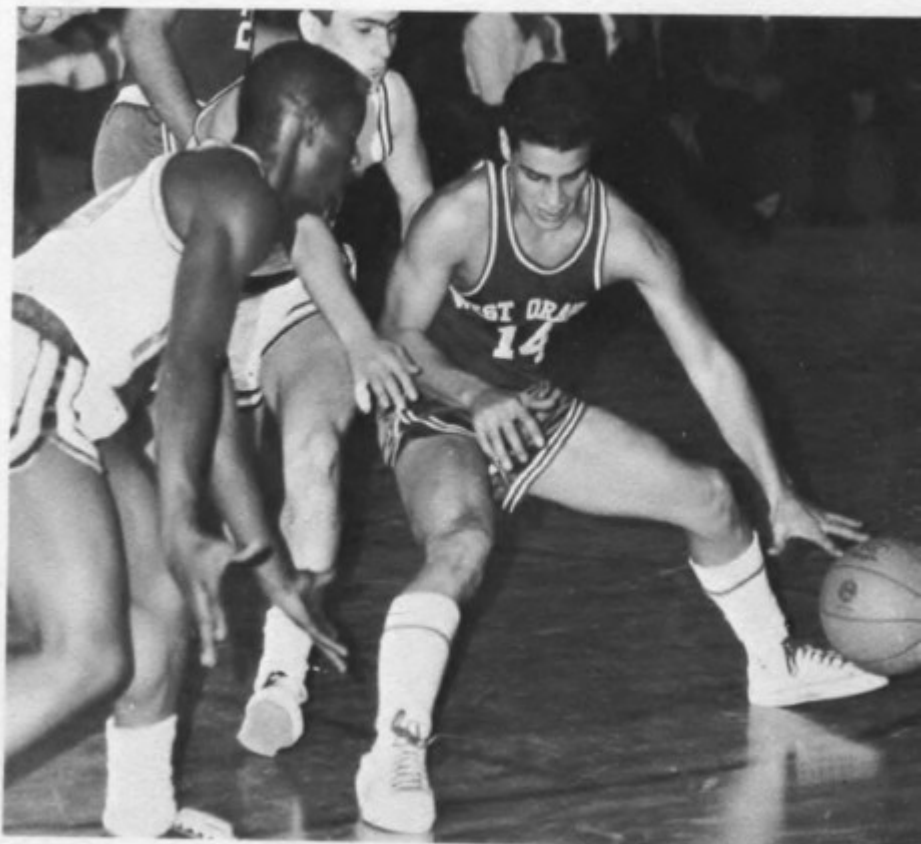

Mr. Congilose expects big things from these boys, and the prospects look good for a fine baseball season at W.O.H.S.

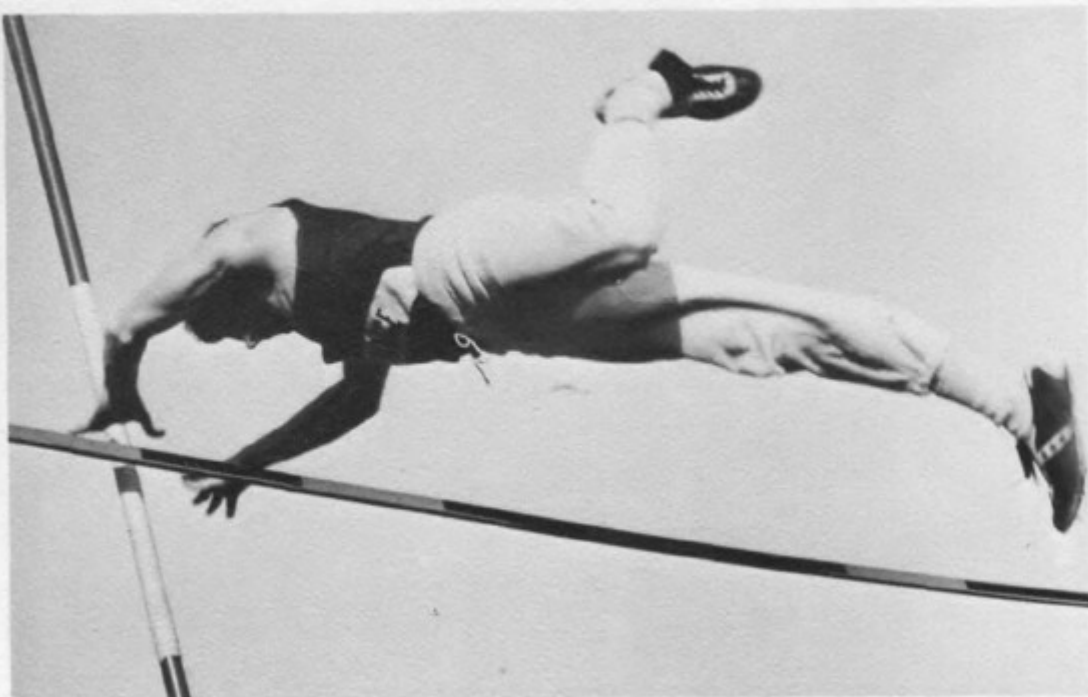

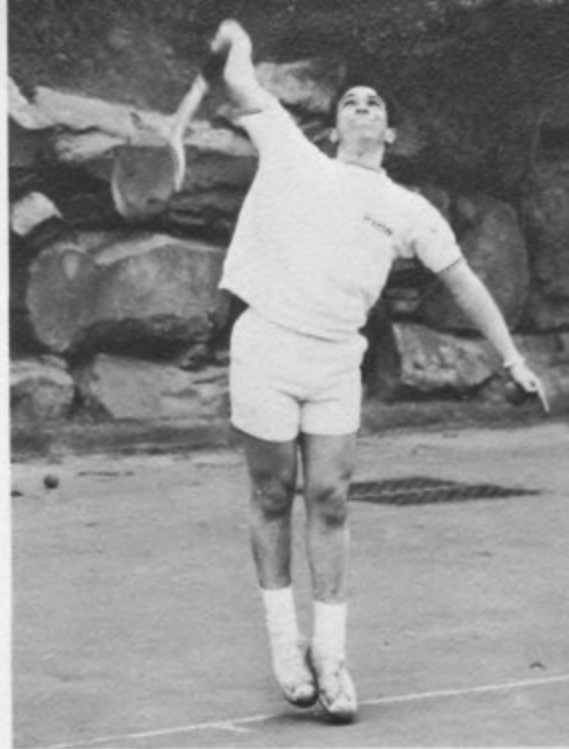

Larry Newman and Howard Dreskin are expected to gain vital points as the first doubles team. Robbie Kullman is also being depended upon to gain points in his position of second singles.

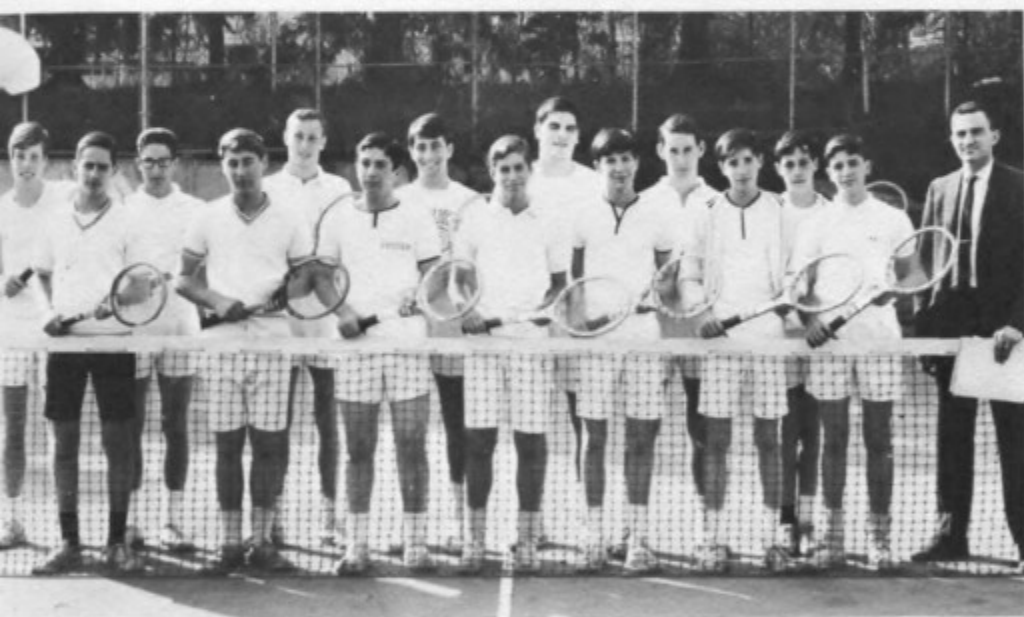

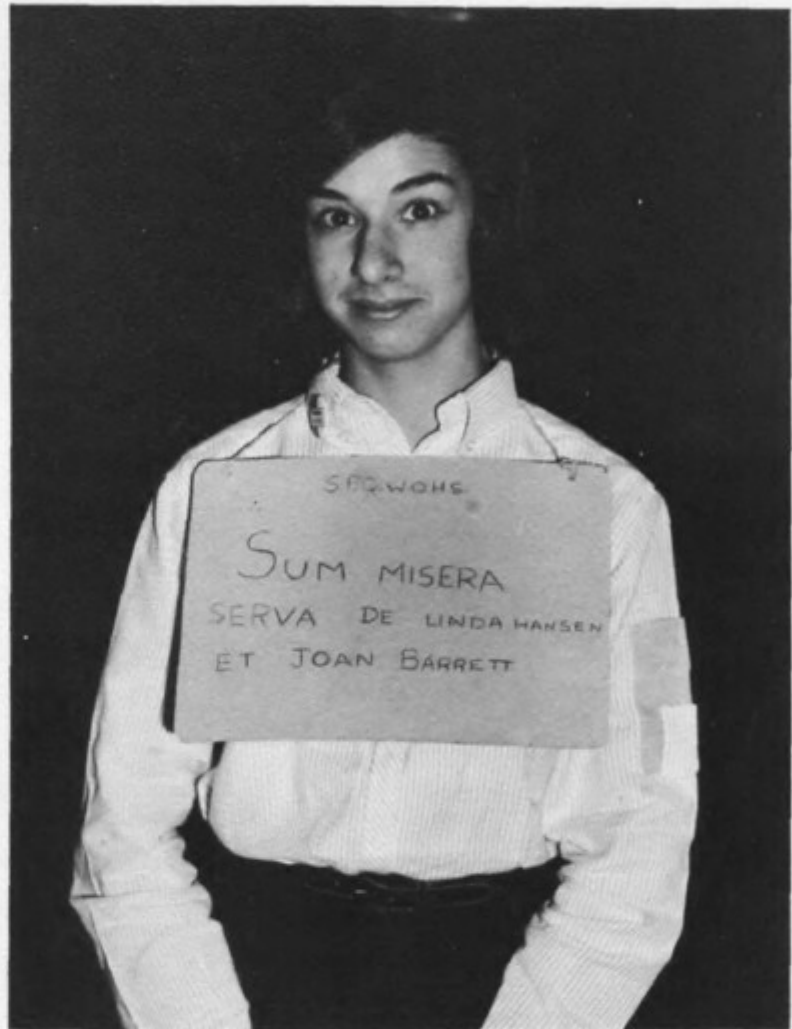

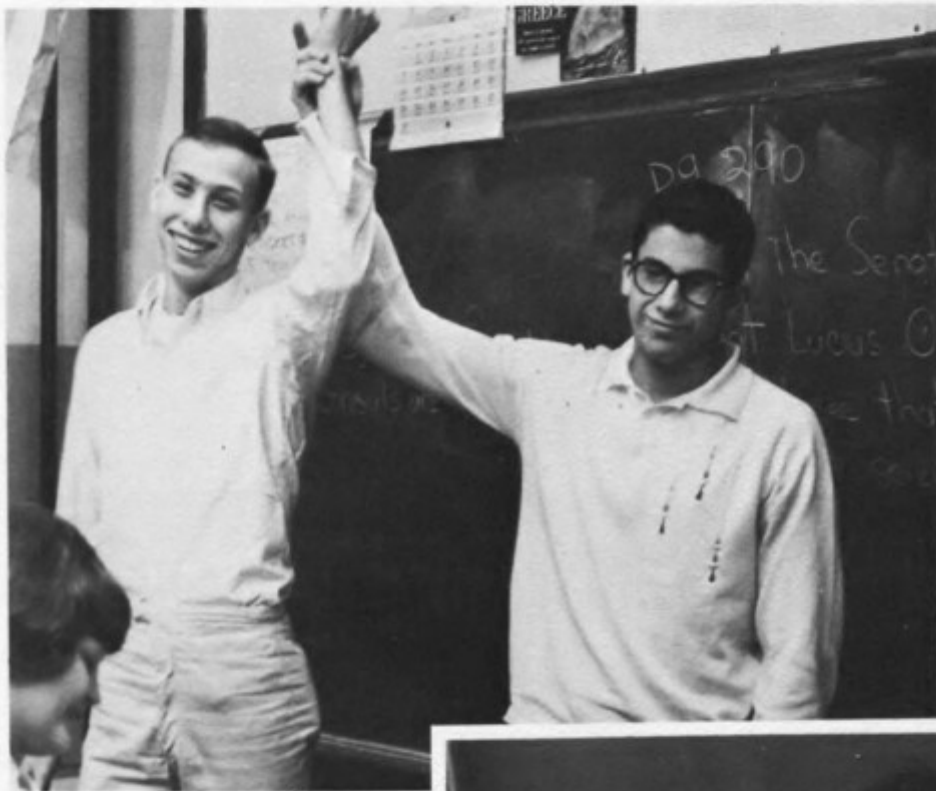

The major aim of the Social Studies Department was to teach the student democracy and good citizenship. This department, headed by Mr. Robert McRoberts, offered various courses in United States and World History.

United States History I, taken in the junior year, covers the founding of the New World and traces the growth of the United States up to the early twentieth century.

United States History II deals with the progress of our country domestically and internationally from World War I until the present. The course also teaches the student the mechanics and complexities of our state and Federal government. In compliance with the department's ideal of good citizenship, each senior was required to donate at least fifteen hours of volunteer work to the community.

Modern History stresses European History from the Age of Discovery to the Nuclear Age.

Each year the Department sponsors a mock town election. A mayor and six councilmen, all of which are seniors, are elected to run the municipal government for a full day.

SCIENCE PROJECTS THEORY INTO

The Science Department, under the leadership of Mr. Edward Liddle, strives to teach the student the mechanics of the world about him. The laboratory periods, a supplement to the classroom, provide a place where the student may derive a working knowledge of the principles brought out in the text.

Biology brings forth the life processes and how they are related to the individual. The course describes the evolution of the animal and plant kingdom from the most primitive plant to the complex organism of Man.

The Physics course introduces the student to the basic principles of physics and strives to give him an appreciation of the mechanics of our world. The course touches only on the "how" of natural phenomenon and leaves the qualitative "why" to the honors program. Honors Physics or PSSC Physics attempts to develop the philosophical foundations of physics and tries to increase the subject matter that is covered in the conventional course.

Chemistry deals with all of the substances that make up our environment and with the changes that take place in these substances. The honor program, in addition to Chem Study, does extensive work with the Chemical Bond Theory. This theory is a new concept in chemistry and deals primarily with the bonding of molecules.

Physiography teaches the student about the topography of the Earth, the atmosphere, and the universe.

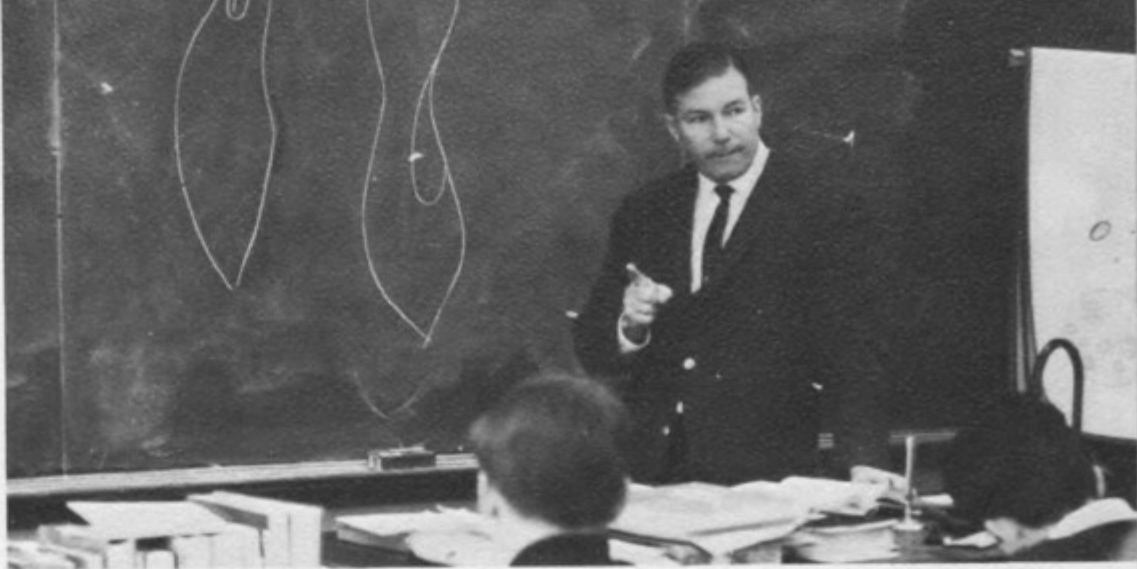
