
















The class of 1983 was a truly spirited one. As sophomores, our energy was channeled into a winning display of enthusiasm for our class, our athletes, and our school.

The path, clearly marked by balloons and banners, is a direct one.



their large work load, the members of the Guidance Department always manage to come through in response to the needs of the student body.





The West Orange High School secretaries serving in different capacities provided us with an invaluable and all too frequently unheralded service.









SCIENCE

Our Science Department has a personality all its own. It is an annual, though no less miraculous occurrence. The lone but loud alto and her instrumentalist counterpart manage to somehow perform flawlessly in their respective concerts.










