
Aspects of the war were brought out in the school organizations of the 1940's. The propaganda club, the automat club, the U.S.O. and the quartermasters club were all popular.

Farewell, West Orange Cowboys

Since its inception, West Orange High School has been a respected member of many interscholastic conferences. When athletes first came to West Orange High, we, along with other schools, aligned under the Inter-Orange League. We stayed in that league until 1950 when the Big-Ten conference was formed. This conference consisted of many Essex County schools such as Bloomfield, Belleville, Nutley, Columbia and Orange. The Big-Ten was the dominant conference in the state of New Jersey for many years.

The size of a school often determines the conference which governs it. West Orange High School experienced a declining enrollment in 1970. That year also marked the abolishment of the Big-Ten due to the fact that West Orange and Orange were just too small. West Orange then moved to the Suburban Conference.

The New Jersey State Interscholastic Athletic Association called for strict realignment of all conferences after the 1981 school year. The Suburban Conference merged with the Skyline Conference which consisted mainly of Morris County schools. This merger brought about the establishment of the Northern Hills Conference in 1982. In 1982 and 1983 West Orange High School belonged to the Suburban Division of this conference.

Regardless of the conference, West Orange High School has been, historically, very successful. Below is a list of all State Champions and the year that the team won the championship.






The success of the 1983-84 wrestling season began when the present seniors were freshmen. Their overall committment to wrestling has given West Orange High School reason to be proud.
























