


Moving on, I noticed a huge room filled with computers. Students were grinding out intricate programs. IBM should come here to recruit.



Imagine being uprooted from your friends, your school, your country and having to resettle in a new school with new people who speak a foreign language. This was an ordeal which many students in the ESL program had to endure. To help students make this transition, the International Club was initiated in 1987.

In only its second year, the club was recognized as one of the most active clubs in the school. According to adviser, Mrs. Daniels, "The club's goal was to create an atmosphere where people could feel free and take pride in their cultures." Diversity took on a new meaning in the International Club. Its 50

members came from nations all over the world; many Americans participated in the club as well.

The club focused on the ideas of sharing, and creating a sense of belonging. To the members, the International Club represented a microcosm of the world in which they tried to attain "world peace" through international friendships. To reach these goals, the club embarked upon at least two major activities each month. As their adviser explained, "It gave students a place to share and be proud of their cultures." The 1988-1989 school year was one of growth for the WOHS Black Awareness Program (BAP). It was the group's first year as a bonafide, and recognized club, with officers: President Magalie Salomon, Vice-President Camille Forbes, Corresponding Secretary Kim Foster, Recording Secretary Julie Da Silva, Treasurer Cheryl Caldwell, Liaisons Leah Brownlee and Ramara James, and adviser, Mr. Cunningham. Officers encouraged membership growth, and greater participation in planned events, concentrating on academic, social, and community — related activites.

In November, the group visited Lincoln and Cheyney, two black colleges in Pennsylvania. The trip was open to students of all grades who were interested. This way, underclassmen could familiarize themselves with the general admissions process and college life.

On a social level, BAP was particularly active. In October, they sponsored a social so all prospective members could join, and also get to meet and know one another. They also held the First Annual BAP Dinner in December so that parents and members alike could be informed as to the goals of the club. BAP later attended a Westfield High School dance in March, and at that time, interacted with other members of Black Awareness Clubs at other schools.

The group became involved in community activities as a result of the hurricane that hit the Caribbean in September. They joined forces with the New Jersey Jamaican Nurses' Association, and launched a two month Huricane Relief Effort that supplemented the supplies NJ-JNA had already had.

The major event in which BAP was involved was Black History Month, sponsored in accordance with the Social Studies dept. Every day, during homeroom, members of the group delivered informative biographies of famous blacks over the PA system, and set up a bulletin board announcing all events for the month. Through the YM-YWHA, the group planned a trip to see the Alvin Ailey Dancers and were able to meet with them backstage.

Other scheduled events for the month included: movies on topics such as black artists, black experience and black soldiers, a Jazz Band concert featuring prominent black composers' works and most importantly, a lecture by Rev. Watley, who informed students as to the plight of South Africans.

Barcan also recognized the depth of knowledge the team had in the area of sports and entertainment demonstrated by Marc Miller and Ricky Davis.

Later in the year, the team met again to compete in Academically Speaking, a program sponsored by Essex County. However, one of the biggest highlights for the team and its adviser was being invited to attend a large meet at Ridgewood High School. A Meeting of Medical Minds

The Health Careers Club had a dual purpose. It was an educational organization, teaching members about careers in the health profession, and it was also a service club, informing others about prominent health concerns.

The club consisted of ten females whom co-adviser Mrs. Christine Borkowski described as "conscientious, pleasant, and cooperative." These members attended approximately two meetings a month, during which the girls viewed health related videos, spoke with guest speakers, or discussed contemporary health related issues, such as the AIDS epidemic, battered women and children, and control of the spread of communicable diseases.

The members of the Health Careers

Club shared a common interest in pursuing a career in the field of health. Some wanted to be physicians or pediatricians, others wanted to pursue careers in the areas of medical research, pharmaceuticals, or rehabilitation. Others were unsure of the particular area of health they were most interested in, but just discussing these occupations was not enough; the members got first hand experience through the projects they undertook.

The club worked with the American Cancer Society to conduct programs such as the Great American Smoke Out, in November, in which the faculty and students were encouraged to "break the habit", and the annual Daffoldil Sale to raise money to help fight cancer. In October, the club took a trip

to the Theresa Grotta Rehabilitation Center to help the residents paint pumpkins and to bring baked goods to the patients. In December, the ten girls, along with advisers Mrs. Christine Borkowski and Mrs. Joan Picini paid the Grotta center another visit. This time they sang Christmas Carols (and Hanukah songs) for the enjoyment of the patients and the workers. They also carolled through the halls of Kessler Institute. Health Careers Club president Mamta Malhotra summed up the attitude reflected by the club when she stated, "The Health Careers Club helped support my career choice as well as gave me an opportunity to help my school and community.



Mountaineers' Rally Salvages Season

A repeat of the 1987 playoff and conference-championship season may have slipped away in the early going, but the winning tradition started in 1986 was kept intact by the 1988 Mountaineers' football team. This year's squad captured a 5-4 record which sounds mediocre by Mountaineer standards, but some highlights were indeed noteworthy. The most memorable was an emotion-filled battle with an undefeated West Milford, which, at the time, was one of two teams in contention for the conference title. West Orange took to the field during a torrential downpour with their faithful in the stands. Playing for nothing but pride, they conquered West Milford, 3-0.

The margin of victory came in the fourth quarter when all-county kicker Artie Spina nailed a 20-yard field goal. These points would have been meaningless had it not been for the resilience of a swarming defense led by Troy Sweeney, Taylor Gould, Chris Sorensen, Spina, Tommy Vasta, and co-captains Paul Stefanelli and John Case. As he has always done, defensive coordinator Michael Pizzi once again brought out the best in his players to create another stingy Mountaineer unit. On that cold, rainy day in November, the Mountaineer defense would not be denied. That victory was sweet revenge for a team that had previously been on the down side of a game that was decided in the waning moments.

After pummeling Parsippany Hills, 24-6, the Mountaineers lost a heartbreaker, 14-13, to a Wayne Valley football squad which went on to become conference and state champs, along with being ranked among the top 15 teams in the state.

In their next game, after a Mountaineer touchdown was nullified by an "inadvertant whistle," the team went on to lose, 20-0, to Passaic Valley, The following week, a deflated Mountaineer team travelled to Lakeland. Trailing, 7-3, late in the fourth quarter, their last minute drive was thwarted near the goal line.

The team had stumbled out of the gate at 1-3 and had reason to fold. That's exactly what didn't happen. Team frustrations transformed into senior leadership and the Mountaineers went on to win four of their final five games to salvage their season and keep the winning tradition alive. At 4-4, and heading into the season finale against Essex Catholic, head coach Ron Miller enthusiastically chanted "5-Alive," "5-Alive" in the days leading up to the game, making sure the players had that same vision of a winning season firmly implanted in their minds. Led by the stellar performance of an offensive line, which was the backbone of this year's team, the Mountaineers responded with 40-14 thrashing of Essex on Thanksgiving Day. Center Dag Madara and tackle Eric Ferguson had manhandled their opponents all season, and this game was no different.

The post-season honor roll included: all-county selections: Case, Madara, Spina, and Stefanelli; all-area: Case, Ferguson, Gould, Madara, Nick Novello, Sorensen, Spina, Stefanelli, Sweeney and Paul Wannemacher; all-conference: Case, Ferguson, Madara, Sorensen, Spina, Stefanelli, Sweeney, and Wannemacher.

This year's recipient of the Brian Piccolo Award, presented by UNICO to the "unsung hero" of the team, went to senior tackle Chris Feeley.

While the primary goal of the indoor season was to lower times for the upcoming spring meets, two individual performers, Kathy Bello and Lois Crawford, distinguished themselves by establishing school records which led to all-conference selections. 






The Mountaineers finished second in their conference and qualified for the state playoffs; this, from a team that set a mark for futility only two years ago.

Risse Praises Seniors

Veterans Lead Way To Holiday Repeat

"Though the season was very long, the players kept their enthusiasm throughout due to the constant challenge of preparing new defenses for each game." This comment, by Coach Judy Risse could not have been made had it not been for her four outstanding seniors. Added Risse, "The leadership of the four seniors played a dominant role in the success of the season. Their outstanding defense and teamwork combined with sheer hustle and heart, added intensity to every game."

Their record of 14-9 was the best the high school had seen in five years. They qualified for the Essex County Tournament, losing to a higher ranked Belleville team and lost in the second round of the State Tournament to Columbia. Even though those two losses were a bit disappointing, the Lady Mountaineers more than compensated by winning the Holiday Tournament for the second consecutive year. They outlasted Livingston in the championship game. One possible theory for the team's downfall in the ECT and the State Tournament was the injury to star center, Tricia Spinelli. After racing to a 11-4 mark, the team lost two out of three to lesser opponents. Spinelli, along with her three senior teammates Lori McDonald, Carrine O'Connell and Danielle Helmlinger were praised by Risse; "Tricia was our center. She was an excellent rebounder and inside scorer. She was very quiet, which was a plus for her because she led by example." Tricia had a thirty point performance vs. Orange and a 20 rebound outing vs. West Milford. "Lori could always be seen moving on the court. She always hustled, which helped her become a strong rebounder." Lori had a thirteen rebound performance against Morris Knolls. "Carrine was our leading scorer. Whenever she got the ball at her forward position she was always aggressive to the basket." Carrine averaged 12.7 points and eight rebounds per game. "Danielle was probably our quickest player, always coming up with the steals. At guard she was our best defensive player." Danielle averaged an incredible five steals per game.

When the '89 seniors remember their team, they'll definitely remember that they WERE a team. Offered Risse, "All of the seniors were leaders. I designated them all as captains. They were tremendous role models for the younger players. The girls simply never quit."

Hoopsters Overcome Obstacles to Gain Coach Belcuore's 300th

Despite a sub .500 record, the '88-'89 season was marked by a coach reaching a milestone and his players, especially the seniors, contributing above and beyond expectations to once again post berths in the Essex County Tournament and the state playoffs.

Coach Bob Belcuore, in his 22nd year in the West Orange system (18 years at Mountain High School), earned his 300th career victory when his team defeated West Milford, 48-40. After the game a commemerative cake was presented to him in honor of his accomplishment. Players circled around him for the special moment. "It's definitely a thrill to win my 300th. When I cut the cake they gave me, with my '89 players around, it felt as if every player I had ever coached at West Orange was by my side. Many memories were brought back."

This milestone would not have been reached this season had it not been for all all-out effort of his seniors. "All four seniors displayed tremendous leadership and attitude. I consider them overachievers because they had to work hard for everything they got." The senior group included: center Dean Clarizio, forwards Peeter Naeris and Eric Simon, and guard Dave Pykon. "Dean always gave 100%. He led the team with seven rebounds per game and was a key player in our matchup zone. Peeter came out to play everyday and did well in his limited role. This was only his first year playing so it's hard to tell how good he might have been had he started playing sooner. Eric was our captain. He averaged about seven points per game, but what I will remember him most for is his aggressive style of defense and rebounding. Dave was our floor leader. When he was out there, he gave the team confidence and he also did a great job handing out assist after assist when he penetrated the defense."


Two juniors Coach Belcoure also commended were guards Brian McCaffrey and James Davis. "Brian was our leading scorer with a twelve point per game average. He was very clutch and was effective shooting three-pointers. James was one of our most intelligent players. He ran the offense while also being a consistent scorer and assist man."

The Mountaineers once again reached the ECT and beat Belleville before being defeated by Montclair Immaculate. They were also dealt a tough draw in the state pairings and fell to a talented Barringer team. Facing strong opposition was a major obstacle for this inexperienced team. Besides facing Barringer, the Mountaineers battled such powerhouses as Clifford Scott and Essex Catholic, two highly ranked teams which finished tied for first in the conference. Scott was the eventual winner of the ECT.

The '89 season was a paradox for the veteran coach. Injuries and illness contributed to some agonizing moments on the road to his club's 10-13 record. However, one of the steps along the way proved to be the most significant in his coaching journey.
