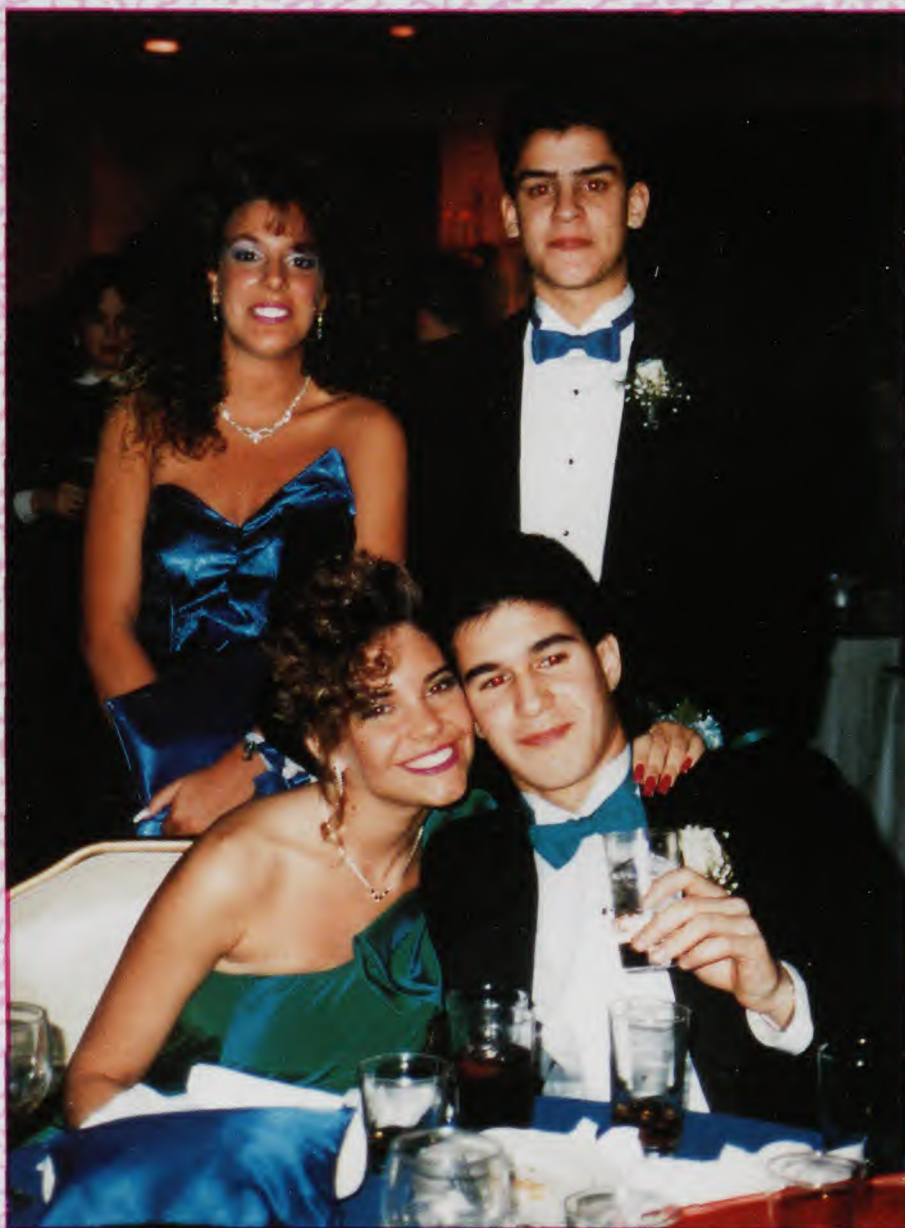

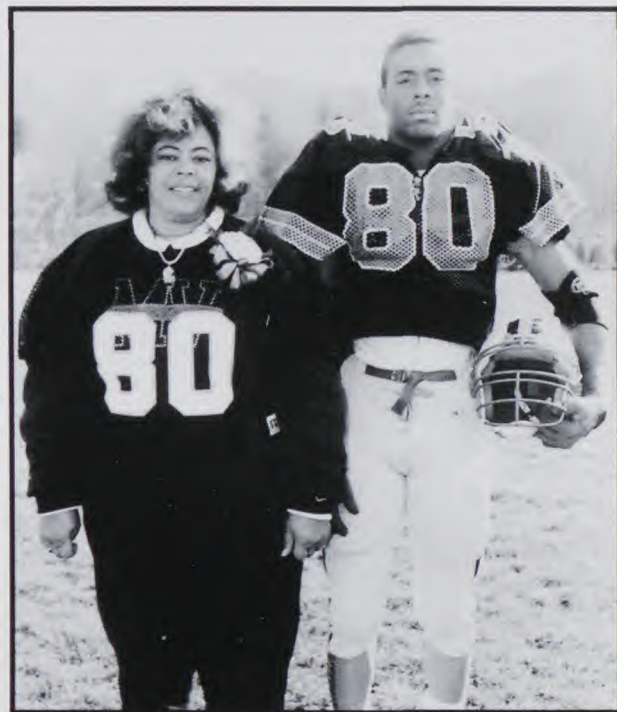

If the number of students who participated in service clubs at WOHS was any indication of the acceptance of the challenge to serve others on the part of teenagers as a whole, the nation's goal would be soon realized.

Several organizations volunteered their time and service to both the school and the community. Participation in these clubs gave the students involved a sense of accomplishment. Their efforts were widely applauded by the student body, the ad-

ministration, and the community.

Students Taking on All New Dimensions, better known as **S.T.A.N.D.**, was an anti-substance abuse club. Founded to show students that a good time could be had without drugs and alcohol, S.T.A.N.D. sponsored dances where participants proved that they could get a "natural high" from the

beat of the music and the time spent with friends.

Lean On Me was a support group which focused on promoting "wellness" through positive example. Under the guidance of Ms. Barbara Wofsy, the members provided peer

counseling and also worked with youngsters. They visited local elementary schools where they performed puppet shows

and creative skits around the theme of the dangers of substance abuse. They attempted to teach young children that it is wise not to do drugs or to drink alcohol. Physical and mental health was their primary focus.

Directed by Ms. Bette Forte, members could be seen handing out programs or serving punch at various school functions. Volunteers also worked outside of the school, most notably as holiday gift-givers at the West Orange Community House.

celebrated its third year of existence by continuing to foster black pride among its

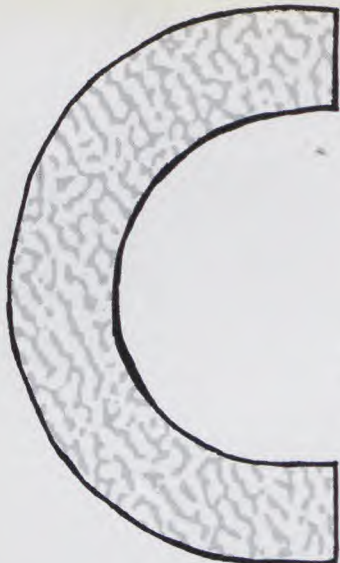
membership, while at the same time making the entire school more aware of the many con-

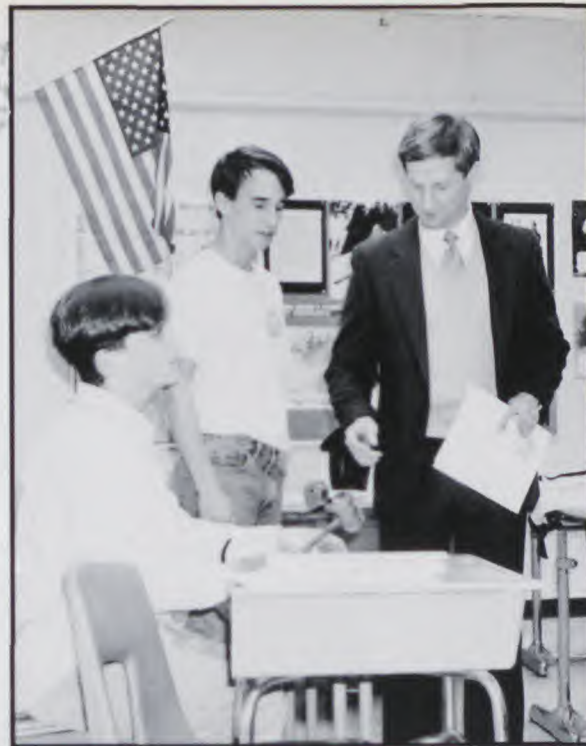

Career-WISE

Recognizing the needs of roughly 10% of the graduating class who would not be going on to two or four year colleges, there was a concerted effort to provide career infusion in the curriculum. The best examples of this effort were the co-operative education programs (CO-OP) and the Health Careers Club.

Under the umbrella of **CO-OP** and the direction of Mr. Kehayes, were such specialized areas as CIE (Co-operative Industrial Education) and COE (Co-operative Office Education). A new addition to the program was the FBLA (Future Business Leaders of America), advised by Ms. Berman. The students enrolled in these programs were afforded an opportunity to get a head start on the competition for jobs through on the job training in such fields as automotive repairs, computer technology, food preparation, child care and office management. This early training was crucial in light of the competition for jobs which intensified as the country worked through a recession. Mr. Buzelli, Mrs. Antonacci and Ms. Berman not only helped the students to find jobs, but visited them regularly at their place of employment to ensure that their work experience was educationally, personally, and financially rewarding.

While the **Health Careers Club** continued its yearly participation in the Great American Smoke Out and the American Cancer Society daffodil sale, the primary role of their advisors, Mrs. Picini and Mrs. Borkowski was providing career awareness for club members in the health field. Their two major projects in 1991 were a visit by the Director of Nursing from Rutgers Newark and a trip to St. Barnabas Medical Center to explore career opportunities in the field of radiology.

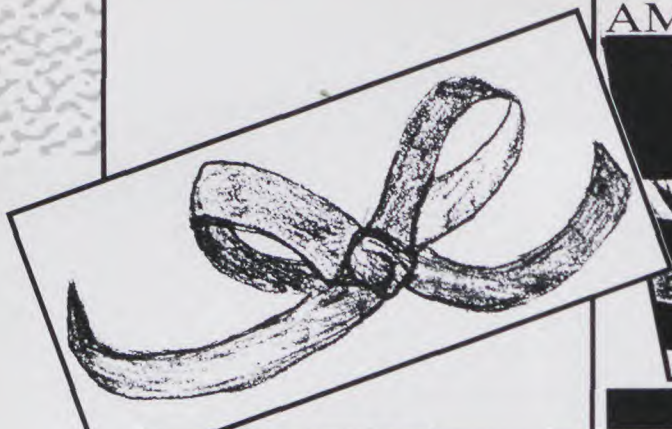

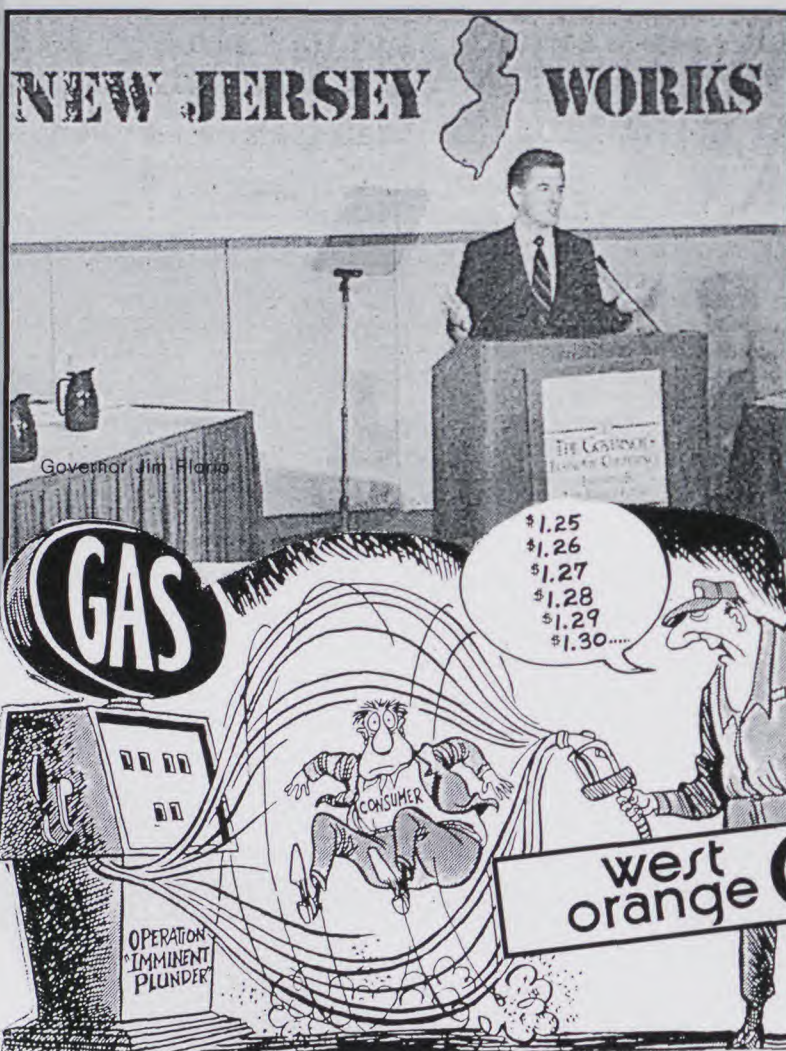

National data on police brutality are nonexistent, but the number of citizens killed by officers may roughly track the trend. A study by criminologist James Fox found that the figure peaked at 459 in 1980, declined to 300 in 1987 and increased to 363 by 1989. Some cities:

■ **Los Angeles.** Brutality complaints fell from 851 in 1988 to 672 last year. \$8 million was paid last year to victims.

■ **New York.** Complaints fell from 2,885 in 1988 to 2,366 last year.

■ **Detroit.** Has a good reputation among its citizens. Its force is more than 50 percent minority. Only 284 allegations filed last year, down from 772 in 1976.

■ **Philadelphia.** Allegations have fluctuated in recent years: 178 last year, 155 in 1989 and 223 in 1988.

Definitely Newsworthy

How was a student body of over 1400 kept informed on who did what? where? and why? The *Pioneer*, a bi-monthly newspaper and the WOHS News, bi-weekly television show, kept students and faculty, as well as the public, up to date on the events in and around school. Lawrence Kim, editor-in-chief, explained the coverage policy of the *Pioneer*. "Every week, in the various Journalism classes, there was brainstorming for relevant, pertinent, interesting, and timely topics to write about. Because several articles were usually written about the same topic, the most well-written and complete articles were selected." What type of coverage was achieved? Topics ranged from student council to the AIDS virus. After selecting articles, Kim and Kevin Feeley began the task of editing. The *Pioneer* was then taken to the printer by advisor Mr. William Ehrlich and eventually distributed in last period classes. The *Pioneer* received numerous citations for writing and coverage of relevant issues. Several students, most notably Billy Flannery, received awards for writing at the yearly journalism conference held at Rutgers University.

This year's Broadcast Journalism class took ad-

vantage of the availability of its own 24-hour cable channel 36. The shows were also broadcast over Suburban Cablevision, Channel 32. In addition to the traditional WOHS news show, which aired twice a month on TV 32, the show was available twice a week on TV 36. Supplementary features were also produced by the crew. These included a special on the STAND dance, The Battle of the Bands, and coverage of several sporting events. Not only did the students on the crew have the opportunity to learn how to use video cameras, how to edit a segment, and how to come across well on camera, they learned about the immense amount of brainstorming, planning, and time it takes to produce one half-hour show. Under the direction of Mr. Kale and Mr. McCarthy, the show was widely acclaimed in the community for its professional quality.

All the news that was fit for print or videotape was available at our fingertips thanks to aspiring journalists.

The process of editing an entire newspaper is not a simple one. Editor-in-chief, Lawrence Kim, re-reads articles many times in order to achieve perfection, as Bill Flannery, award-winning sports writer, ponders his next column.

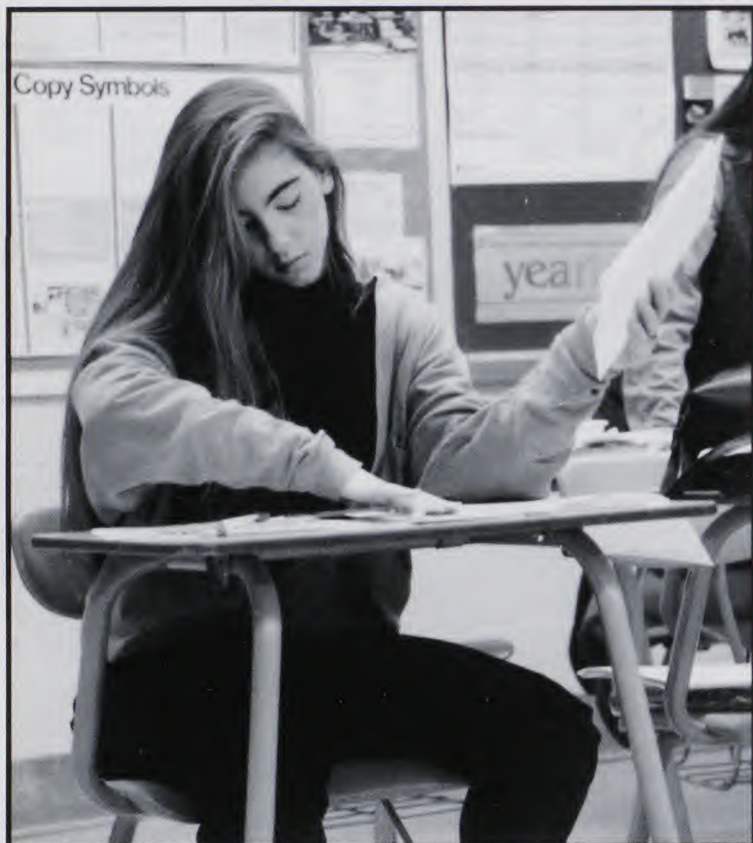
Dreaded Deadlines

Hakim was an extremely busy 17 year old. Whether it meant performing on a record album, producing a new group, or being watched by millions on the "Arsenio Hall Show" that always "gets busy", Hakim was sure to find stardom. What a "Kool" kid!

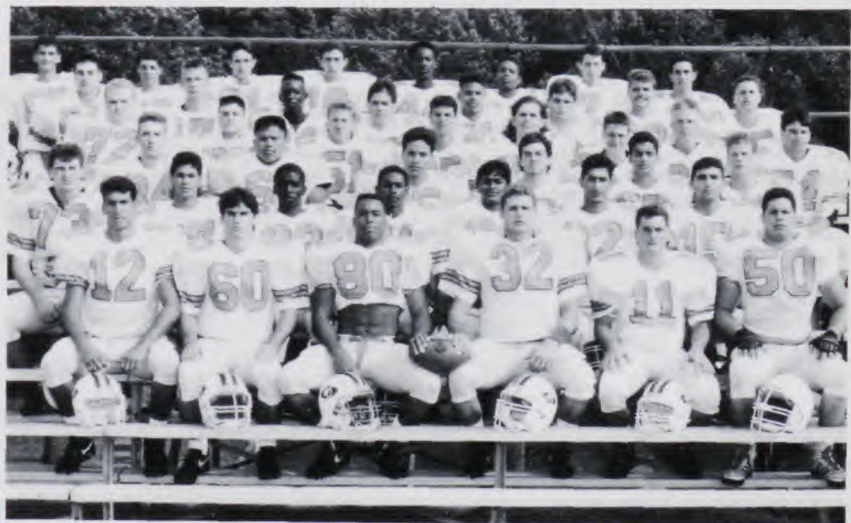

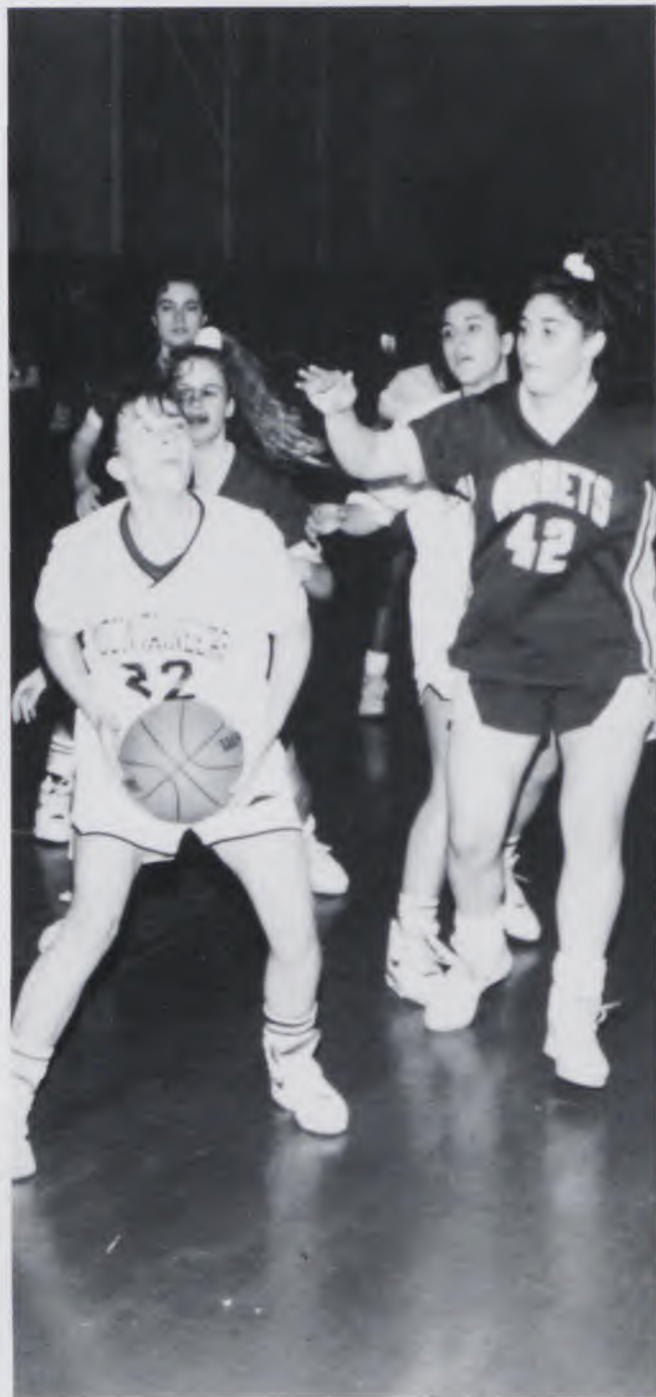
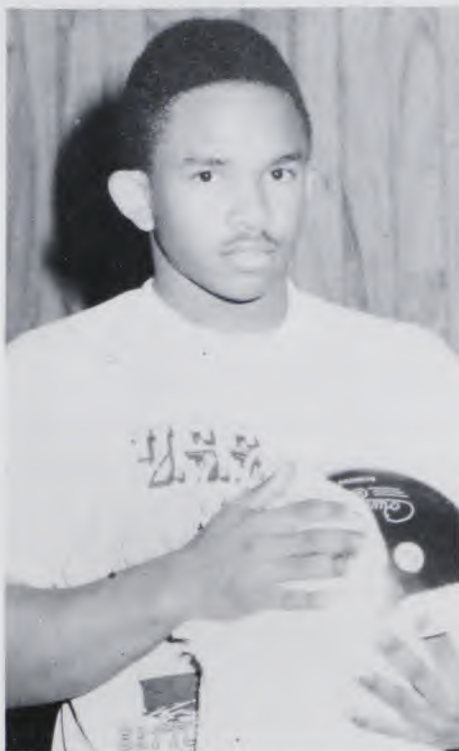

These six words embodied the goal of the boys' basketball program. They applied to being on time for classes and study hall, held for an hour before practice each day, to wearing a shirt and tie under the new team sweaters on game days, to executing offensive and defensive schemes instituted by the coaches. According to Coach John McCarthy, "Half the time we met the goal, half the time we didn't. Our final record, 11-11, bears that point out to some degree. We attempted to do many things in one year; the full measure of our effort can't be equated solely with a won-loss record. How these young men discipline themselves in their future academic, personal and athletic pursuits will be an appropriate gauge."

One occasion when the goal was fully realized was in a dramatic 77-74 double overtime victory over West Side. The Roughriders came into the contest at 12-4 and ranked fifth in the county. The Mountaineers rode the aggressive, rebounding Lance Lieberman and the spectacular 35 point performance of Luke Verdi in overcoming an 11 point deficit in the final period. Skillful ballhandling by junior Brent Davis, who also contributed 21 points, and sound interior defense from forwards Matt Watley and sophomore Shawn Baker were also significant. The key field goal was scored by LaRue Barnes on a put back of a missed free throw with eight seconds remaining in the second overtime.

The team earned the right to host games in the Essex County Tournament and State Tournament, but bowed out in the opening rounds. Davis led the team with 17 points in a loss to a strong Weequahic squad in the ECT. Lieberman netted 18 points, his season high, in the Group IV opening round against Randolph.

McCarthy had high praise for Lieberman's leadership ability and intensity, Watley's willingness to play out of his natural position at guard and his desire, and Davis's court awareness and ability to penetrate defenses. His highest praise was reserved for Verdi, whom he believed to be the top offensive player in the Northern Hills Conference. "There's a great deal of pressure on a shooter to produce night after night. Luke responded to the challenge and distinguished himself by averaging 22 points per game. His performance against West Side (35 points, 11 rebounds) was one of the best individual efforts I've seen in my 20 years of coaching."

Associate coach Bill Ehrlich summed up the season as one in which "Individually, we learned what was required to be a complete basketball player, but our most important lesson really wasn't mastered until our final game; we learned what it takes to be a team. Though it took almost four months, we have to be proud of a group of young men who did acquire that sense of dedication in commitment to others."

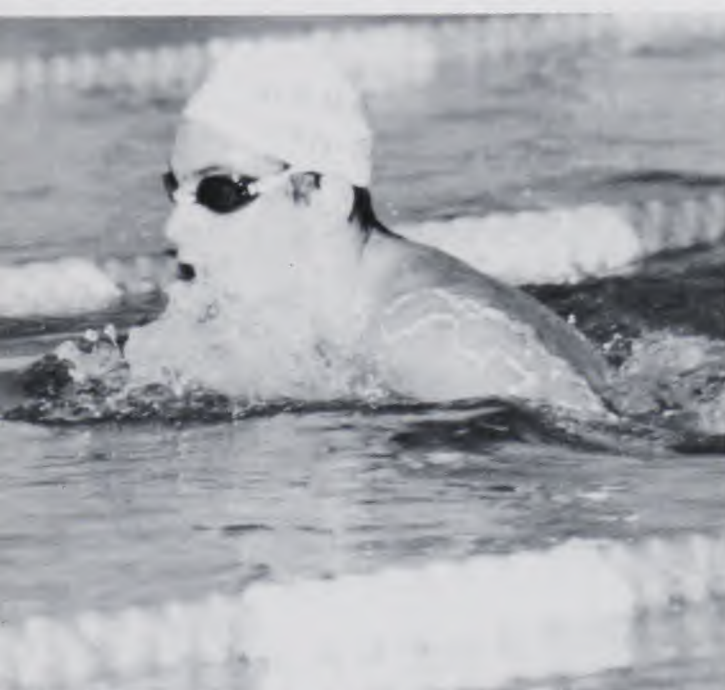
ular season ended with a victory over Mt. Olive.

Auletta got a late start due to an injury sustained during football season, and his final record was 14-2-0. He finished the regional in third place at 189. Other seniors who proved their dedication were Joey O'Connell, Kevon Beresford, Victor Buonopane, and Paul Leyton.

Unfortunately, Veteran

Aaron Terry was unable to wrestle his senior season due to injury. In 1990 Terry wrestled at 171 and placed fourth at the regional meet. Terry was a valuable wrestler. His absence effected the team's record.

Finishing the year with a fifth place at the Kearny Tournament and a third place at the West Orange Tournament was an accomplishment for the team, but the most memorable match occurred when West Orange shattered Montclair, a highly noted team for the state sectional, by 45-30 margin. This last match concluded the season with a great feeling.

"Our success was mainly due to the over-all effort, tremendous enthusiasm, exceptional work ethic and outstanding commitment by the entire team which is a direct result attributed to the abilities of the team leaders," Coach Lutkins proudly noted.

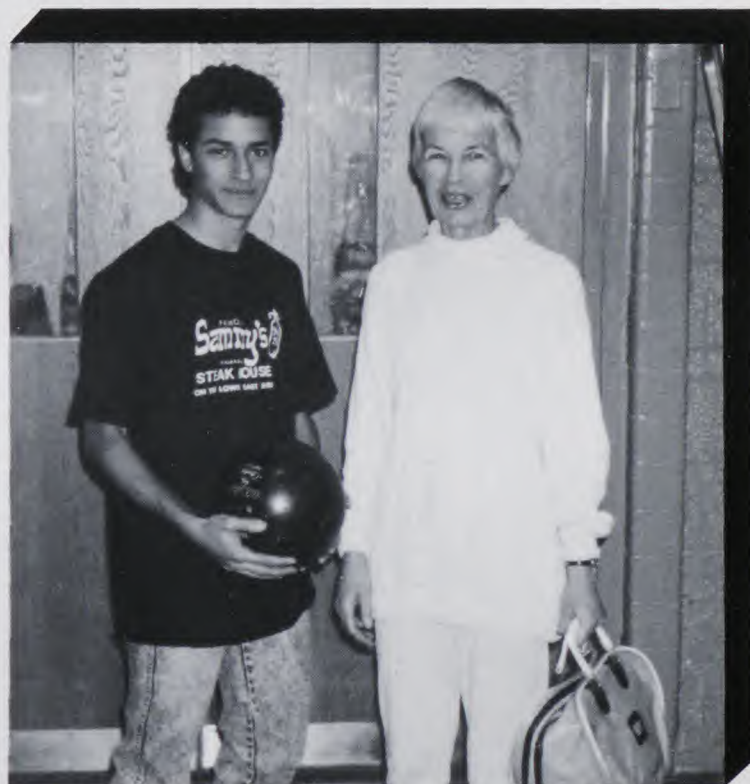

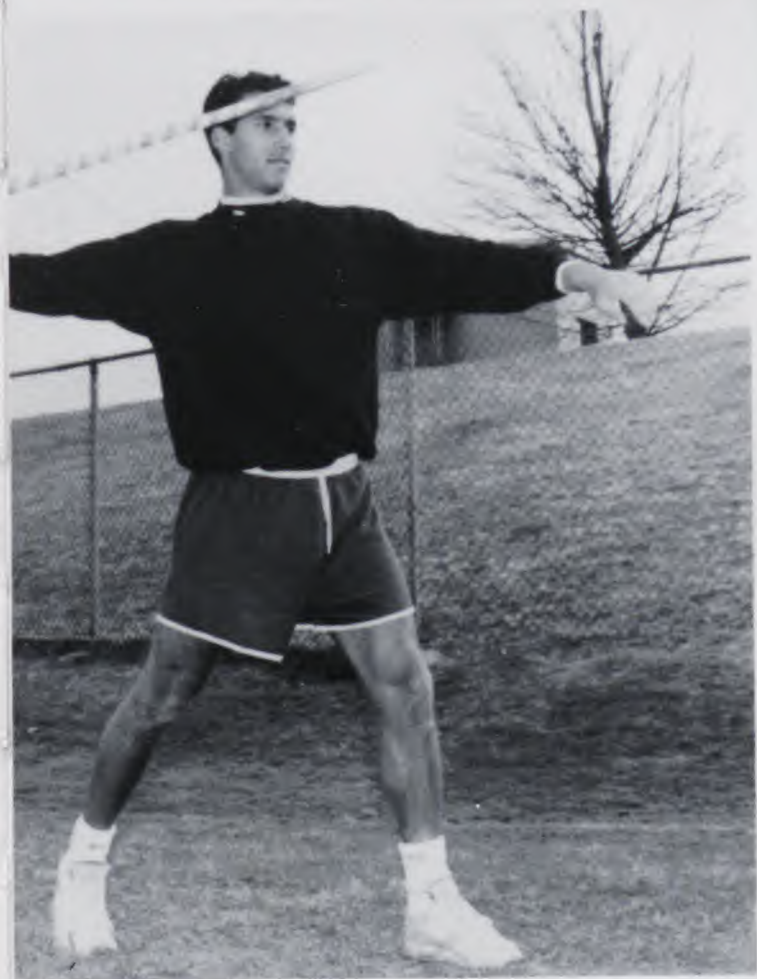

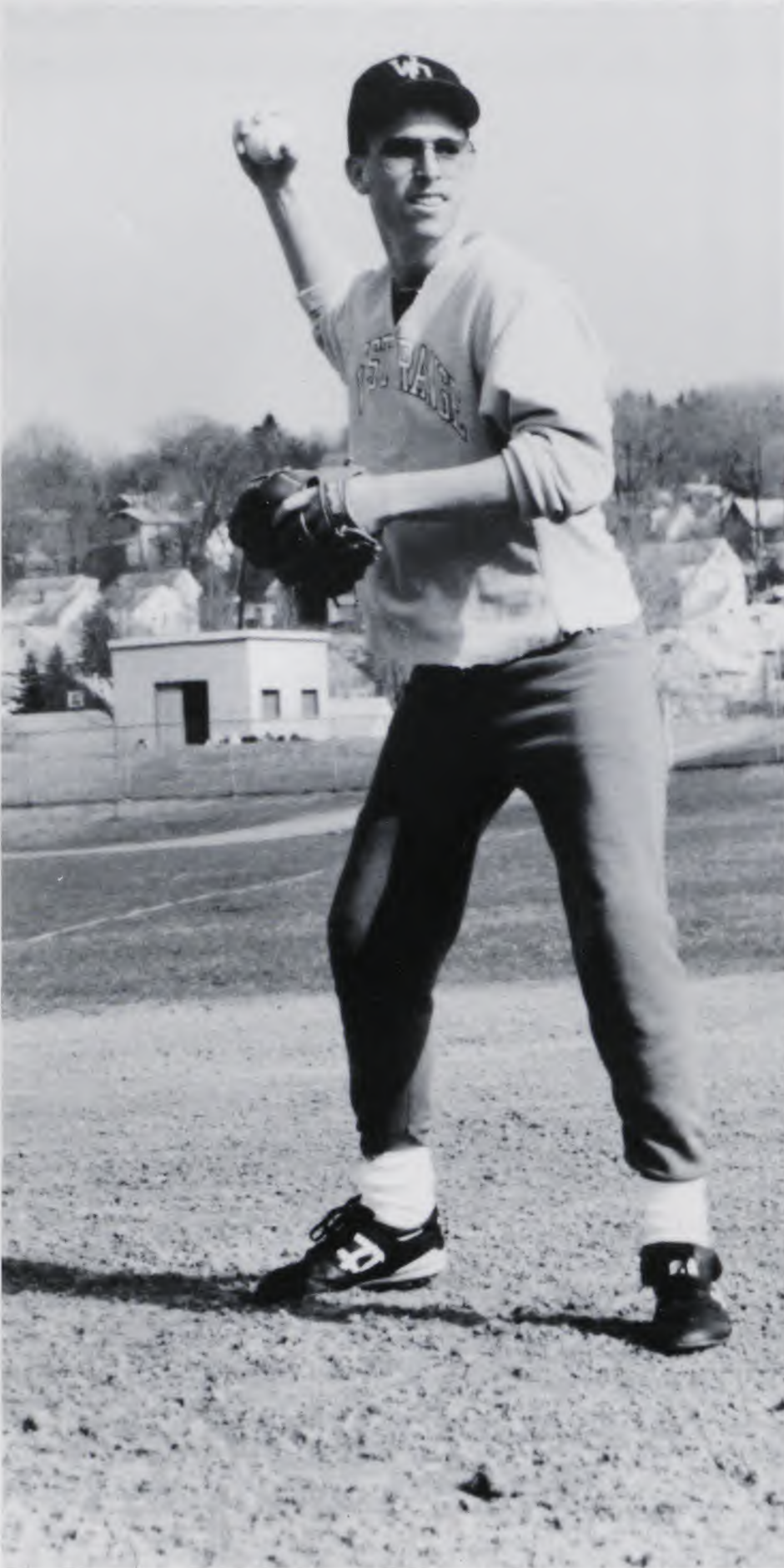

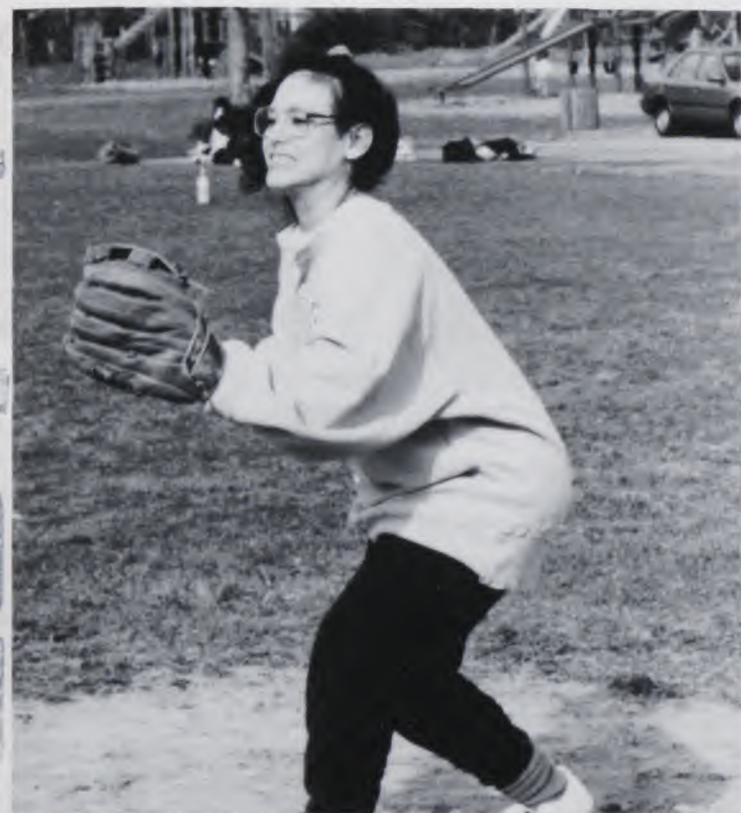
