In fact, we had already designed a cover for a different theme when we decided to change our minds," stated Stefanie Lava, Editor-in-Chief of this year's Mountaineer. 



Debating New Issues


This last presidential election made many Americans wonder: Can we do it better? Some students at West Orange High School have taken the time to learn the processes of the United States government.

One club, the Model Congress, meets once per week and acts as a real legislature, writing mock bills in official format. Then, the members go on a two day overnight trip where they present the bills they have created. This year, for the first time, WOHS has a Party Leader, Jesse Aporta, and an appointed Overall Chair of the House of Representatives, Dan Greenwald.

reaching new notes








King Jang inherited his talent from his father, an accomplished opera singer and his aunt, a violinist. "After watching my father's performance at Carnegie Hall," King reflected,




Seniors Breaking New Ground

Seniors Breaking New Ground



Using a variation of the Wing-T offense, and implementing an often controversial two-quaterback system, the 2000-2001 West Orange High School football team finished with a respectable 4-6 record, including several big wins.

Using an attack that featured double slot formations and the sharing of quarterback duties between senior tri-captain Fred DeFinis and junior Ian Gold, the squad had opponents second guessing all year, keeping the score close in many games.

Along with DeFinis, tri-captains Nick Rubino and Aaron Pearson provided, "good leadership that held everyone together," according to veteran coach Mike

This was not more obvious than in the team's 22-18 homecoming victory over West Side. DeFinis and running back Brian Reitmeyer split two touchdowns, while Rubino and Pearson, along with Mark Spagnuolo, Tony Nardiello, and Terrell Whitehead, provided the kind of blocking on the offensive line that created big holes for runners all year.

West Orange got off on the right foot in a 34-0 season opening victory over Lakeland. Reitmeyer had another of his team-high eight touchdowns while averaging 14 yards per carry, while Derrick Morrison averaged nine per carry. Chinedu Njoku led the Mountaineer defense with eight tackles.

West Orange suffered a tough loss against Orange, losing 14-13, with several players performing admirably. On the defensive side, DeFinis and Njoku had 11 tackles apiece, while Whitehead contributed three sacks and Drew Osterguard added nine tackles. Role player Lensly Larose was part of the cause with a fumble recovery. Offensively, Reitmeyer was steady again, running for 77 yards and a touchdown, and wide receiver Gary Joshua caught two passes.

The 2000-2001 season was one of versatility for the Mountaineers, as several players were on both sides of the ball. Reitmeyer ran for over 1,000 all-purpose yards rushing, receiving, and handling punts and kick-offs. He also led the team with five interceptions. DeFinis threw for 349 yards, but also had 282 receiving yards, and served as the punter, kicking 46 times for 1447 yards.

"Success cannot be measured by wins," Pizzi concluded. "It's not where you start but where you end up, and because of this football program a lot of us are better people. And, that is what football is all about."

This season marked the first time the West Orange girls soccer team ever defeated Wayne Valley, always a top team in the tough Northern Hills Conference. After much anticipation and a hard fought game, the girls walked away with a 2-1 win and a place in West Orange soccer history.



Silencing talks of what was supposed to be a rebuilding year, the 2000-2001 West Orange High School boys soccer team finished with a 15-4-2 record, producing the best winning percentage of any one boys soccer team in school history.

After losing eight starters and thirteen seniors from 1999, the boys successfully combined "good senior leadership and mature play by underclassmen," according to coach Doug Nevins, who, in his first year as coach, was named Northern Hills Conference Coach of the Year. That success was displayed in the team's second place finish in the conference, reaching the semi-finals in the Essex County Tournament for only the second time in West Orange history, and receiving the number one seed in Group 4 Section 2 of the state tournament.

Leading the way for the Mountaineers were two four-year lettermen captains Andres Correa and Gabriel Alvarez. Correa, who was named First-Team All-County and All-Conference, ended the season with 14 goals and 10 assists, while Alvarez contributed with 11 goals and 10 assists. Correa scored

the lone goal to beat Delbarton 1-0 in West Orange, a huge victory over the eventual conference champions.

Senior stopper Phil Criscione, also a tri-captain, added 3 goals and 14 assists from the defensive position, while senior goalie Jeff Parker posted 10 shutouts. Coming off the bench, seniors Mark Espino and Justin Mathew were big factors on the defensive front.

The early season loss of Josh Danzig seemed to hurt the squad. However, the emergence of young players such as sophomore Marcelo Rodriguez, a First-Team All-County and All-Conference performer, and junior Nelson Mas were vital to the team's success.

The march to the Essex County semi-finals saw great wins over East Side, 3-2, and Livingston, 3-1, before a 5-0 loss to champion West Essex. Likewise, Roxbury halted the road to the state championship with a 3-2 win.

In a season with many milestones, summed up Nevins, "This was far from a rebuilding year."



When a three-time First Team All-Conference senior has problems with asthma, a team's morale would usually go down. However, when Meghan Neilan had difficulty finishing her races, the 2000-2001 West Orange High School girls cross country team never hung their heads.

"When I saw her struggling and gasping for air during races, I gave her the chance to stay on as captain, but quit running," veteran coach Joe Suriano said. "But, she refused to quit. She pushed herself to the limit, which, to me, was above trying."

Finishing with an 11-7 mark with Neilan sidelined was no easy task. Still, according to the coach, Neilan "pulled them all together, and made them feel special." And, that was not more evident than at the Essex County championships, when Neilan crossed the finish line.

Without Neilan at full strength

Denk and sophomore Andrea Miltiades, both Second Team All-Conference runners. They turned in their best performances when the team needed it most, at the conference championships, registering times of 24:17 and 24:12, respectively. In a year when all seven starters were never healthy at the same time, the team came from behind for a surprising twopoint victory over Wayne Valley, the 1999 Conference Champions. Also, adding to the team were sophomore sisters Joyce and Vivian Esquerre and Shani Spence, all of whom came on strong at the end of the year and have promising futures.

In the end, it was the leadership and dedication of Neilan -"the best female athlete in the school" according to Suriano that were the underlying themes of a season that showed a real class athlete in action.



Younger runners seemed to carry the team statistically, as the team finished a respectable 9th in the county. Setting the pace was sophomore John DeFillipis who led the team in times, medalled at every invitational, and capped off his season with a first-place finish out of 216 runners in the Maroon Invitational. Complimenting him was junior Joe Scioscia, who came back strong from an Achilles tendon injury to earn 2nd Team All-Conference honors.

In a season with so many freak accidents (even the manager got hurt), the squad "really reflected a team concept," stated Suriano. "There were no individuals, and because of that we we were a better team."





If the only three returning seniors, it was tough to tell how the season would turn out for the 2000-2001 girls basketball team. However, those three seniors quieted any talks of a rebuilding year, leading the Lady Mountaineers to a 12-10 showing.

"Meghan Neilan, Dana Tobia, and Lauren Westwood, all four-year performers, showed excellent leadership," commented 8th year head coach Marge Theobold. "We lost a lot from last year, but these seniors really stepped up."

Neilan, who started at point guard for the third straight year, led the team in scoring, averaging 13.4 points per game, ending her career with an impressive 738 points. She provided much of the scoring all year, erupting for 27 in a 63-38 loss to conference and county powerhouse, Orange. Tobia led the team in rebounding (with a 7.4 per game average), steals and assists, registering 45 and 61 respectively for the season. She also took some of the load off Neilan, pitching in 10.2 points per game. Her first double double of her career came in a tough loss to Emerson, as she scored 20 points and pulled down 10 boards. Meanwhile, Westwood controlled the interior game, averaging over 4 rebounds and close to 4 points per game. In another tough defeat, a 55-51

overtime loss to West Milford, she scored 15 points to go along with 10 rebounds. Also contributing to the team was junior Sarah Tortoreti and sophomore Meghan Barry, both solid in the starting lineup.

However, perhaps the biggest game came against Wayne Valley, who came into their meeting with a record of 17-4. In a stunning 56-44 upset, Neilan and Tobia scored 19 apiece, while Westwood chipped in with 6 points and 8 rebounds. In perhaps the biggest game of the year, the three seniors stood out yet again.

Other big wins for the squad included a 48-33 triumph over East Side in the first round of the Essex County Tournament, which saw Neilan score 25, and a 67-37 clobbering of Clifford Scott, with Tobia recording her second double double of 23 points and 11 rebounds. "They did an outstanding job leading a young team," Theobold added. "Needing them to be role models and really step up, which they did, was very essential in our success."

These seniors refused to do anything less than their best. As a result, Neilan, Tobia, and Westwood rallied an inexperienced team to a solid record and a vast improvement from the beginning of the year. And in the words of Theobold, "It showed."

Alley-oops, spectacular dunks, and deep three-pointers were not the only things spectators saw at West Orange High School boys basketball games. There was also a team that went 17-7, racking up the most wins for a boys basketball team in 10 years, earning a second place finish in the Northern Hills Conference.

With the dedication of seven hard working seniors, who, according to head coach Mike Fess, "had a mix of personalities and were extremely fun to coach," the squad proved to be a difficult team to beat in the conference, county, and state. And, that was not more evident in the team's two victories over Clifford Scott, an opponent a WOHS boys basketball team had failed to beat in 17 years.

Leading West Orange were senior co-captains Eze Andrews and Shawn Smith. Andrews "carried the team offensively," Fess indicated, pointing out he scored 21 of the team's 28 first half points in an eventual loss to Irvington in the first round of the Group IV Section II State Tournament. His averages of over 18 points and 8 rebounds per game led the squad, his two-handed jams brought crowds to their feet, and his all-around play earned him a spot in the Essex-Hudson All-Star Game. Complimenting the 6 foot 7 inch center was guard Shawn Smith, who was "explosive, quick to the basket, and almost impossible to guard," in Fess' accounts. Smith's combination of an outside shooting touch and ability to get in the lane took some of the offensive load off Andrews. Junior point guard Brian Dillon controlled the tempo and added his repertoire of no-look passes and NBA range three-pointers to the fast-paced offense,

as sophomores Caleif Drummond and Brian Hanlon rounded out the strong starting lineup.

In addition, senior Kevin May, who started in about half of the team's games, added height and, what Fess called, "the best rebounding on the team." His interior passing in Fess' high-low offense was crucial in the effective scoring of Andrews. Also, reserves Fred De Finis and Brian Reitmeyer played many roles off the bench, with Fess calling both of them "excellent defensive players." David Katz and Aaron Pearson provided "positive influences both on and off the floor." Fess added.

While the team got off to a rocky start, including a 2-2 record, they then kicked off a ten game winning streak, beating the likes of Delbarton and West Side. "The season began with many question marks," Fess stated. "But once everyone got used to playing with each other, we really got rolling."

While both Scott victories stand out in the coach's mind, the road win saw Andrews score 29 and De Finis add a career-high 16 off the bench. Other key triumphs included a sweep over Wayne Valley, Passaic Valley, and Millburn, with everyone contributing at some time or another.

It was Irvington that provided a lot of trouble for the Mountaineers all year, handing them a tough 50-49 loss in the Essex County Tournament, and an eight point defeat in the state tournament, ultimately ending the season.

Still, it was one of the most memorable seasons in WOHS boys basketball history-one for which the fans really got their money's worth.



Rising to a New Level

The West Orange swim team was faced with several changes at the beginning of the 2000-2001 season. With only three seniors on the team, the younger swimmers had to fill the gap left by last year's graduates. However, even with these challenges, "Everyone had fun swimming. We enjoyed each other's company, and we had great team spirit," stated Coach Wendy Branco. Although the team had only three seniors, it gained many talented new swimmers who helped the team finish undefeated in their conference with a record of 13-0.

This year's swimmers, led by senior captains Kevin Willhoit, Suzy Kelly, and Rachel Siconolfi had an outstanding season. They placed second in the Northern Hills Conference as well as third in Essex County. As a team, West Orange High swimmers placed in the top thirty teams in New Jersey. 





Impressive Improvements — Wrestling —

Despite a team full of underclassmen and a tough schedule, the 2001 West Orange High School wrestling team finished with a 7-13 record. It was a season filled with many individual accomplishments.

With only two four-year wrestlers in co-captains Bobby Krimmel and Damien O'Farrill, the team, "Gained experience through hard work," according to head coach Keith Appello, who, in his third year coaching, registered his best season. Also, in a 42-28 defeat of West Essex, Krimmel registered a pin in 2:28, while Njoku won 12-10, on a well-timed last second takedown.

The squad's record is misleading, however, considering its strong finish. This was apparent in a third place showing in their nine team district, which saw five wrestlers advance to the regions, including sophomore Joe Rollin, who won his 160 pound weight class. Additionally, the team ended ninth in Essex County, helped greatly by 145 pound sophomore Zach Dietrick, who placed second.

"These were really good kids," Appello added. And, they really came together in the end, when West Orange had its share of opportunities in the eventual 46-27, Mayor's Trophy loss. "That was a good team," Appello said, "but we fought all night, and made them earn it."





When last year's seniors graduated, WOHS parted with many track stars leaving the 2000-2001 team facing a rebuilding year. As the purpose of indoor track is to "prepare the kids for spring track," Coach Catherine Conlee stated, "We got a good head start on the spring season."

Although the boys team did not place at conferences, they had some promising runners who enjoyed a successful season. Sophomores Leajon Brooks and John DeFillipis set the examples for their team. Brooks had a good season placing fifth in the conference in the 55 high hurdles and earned sixth place in the high jump. 





















Preparing for New Possibilities






Fostering New Invention

"The physical universe manifests itself in patterns that can be described with mathematical formulas, and nobody knows why!" proclaims Dr. Michael Lawrence. It is this unknown that compels Dr. Lawrence to encourage his students' inquiries into the greater depths of physics in the advanced placement and honors physics courses here at West Orange High School.

Physics students learn several concepts that are seemingly intangible, but in actuality, these concepts are applicable to their daily activities. Active student participation in exploring and challenging all aspects of physics are easily achieved by Dr. Lawrence since "physics lends itself toward explaining 'real life' applications...musical instruments, telescopes, amusement park rides, credit cards, speakers, sports, etc." Specifically, honors physics classes had the rare chance to deal with the invention process at a series of three workshops with the Edison Inventors Seminar this school year. West Orange High School physics students met with Hollywood producers, participated in a card tower competition, and invented a toy for a visually impaired eight year-old child through this special program. Another creative approach in tackling complicated physics topics in Doc's courses includes shooting rockets to apply Newton's Second Law, the constant linear acceleration formulas, and the conservation of energy.

Doc's students are constantly presented with the unique opportunity to "make observations, develop models, make predictions, and test them" so that they are truly "constructing what they learn." As senior Caitlin Rauch puts it, "If we are doing a problem with an incline of 30 degrees, he has a board making an incline of 30 degrees. These visuals really help in learning how physics works."

Whether he is cracking jokes, sharing family experiences, or wishing you a happy birthday when, in fact, it is not your birthday, Mr. Evans always has the attention of his students. Year after year, his style and personality allow him to enrich the lives of the young people with whom he interacts. "I respect Mr. Evans because he's not afraid to talk about things that are controversial. Even if he doesn't agree with me, he'll always listen to what I have to say," states senior Daniel Fitzpatrick. He goes above and beyond the call of duty developing these relationships and being a true mentor to



Year after year, Ms. Dodds' A.P. students score well-above the national average, but this is not why she was recognized as a Distinguished Teacher by the NJ Council for Humanities. Ms. Dodds' overall educational intent is to expose her students to the changing culture and realities of our society. Outside the classroom, Ms. Dodds is continually pursuing ways to improve upon herself, her connection with her students, and her methods of teaching. She is one of twenty-four teachers nationwide who attended the United States Institute of Peace and is currently in the process of receiving her Doctoral in Student Social Education at Rutgers. Coincidentally, Ms. Dodds is writing her dissertation on the Montezuma School for Boys in Los Gatos, California, which is the birthplace of the Junior Statesmen of America (ISA), an organization for which she is the WOHS advisor. This great ability was also recognized by the National Council of Social Studies in San Antonio. 

Trying New Approaches

To truly be a good teacher, a person must teach in more than one way to appeal to all of his or her students. Ms. Bowsher, a teacher of U.S. History II, realizes this philosophy and incorporates it into her teaching. "I teach in a variety of ways: audio, visual, and writing. I want to appeal to each student's strong points," said Ms. Bowsher. A usual lesson plan for Bowsher's class consists of many different styles of teaching: reading about a topic, listening to various opinions regarding it, and then watching a movie about it. Ms. Bowsher realizes that her class changes from year to year. To compensate for this, she changes her style of teaching slightly every year. "I have to figure out what style works best for the class. I have to know I'm doing enough."

A New Play on Sports

As Mr. Fess has learned from coaching various sports at WOHS, teaching is a team sport. "To keep students interested in the class, a personal connection between the student and the teacher is needed." For Fess, most of the connections he makes are from the various sports he plays. "By playing seven sports, from soccer to fishing, it is easy to find common ground with most students." However, sports are not the only way Fess can relate to students. Fess also has a large music collection going as far back as the 1960s. "The most important thing is the connection. If we don't have a shared interest, I learn about what they like to do."

Old Craft, New Approach

Aside from being the woodworking teacher at West Orange High School, John Worobetz is also a part-time blacksmith instructor at the largest environmental center in the Northern Hemisphere, which is located right here in New Jersey. He has been teaching blacksmithing in a two hundred year-old carriage house at Montclair State's northern campus for over twenty five years. Each year, eight thousand students take part in his course from the School of Conservation, ranging from seventh graders to college graduates. This also includes multiple handicapped kids from Jersey City. He works with the aides from A. Harry Moore School, making everything from nails to weather vanes. All of the projects are made the way a blacksmith would have made them two hundred years ago. According to Mr. Worobetz, it is "very rewarding seeing both students with limitations and talented graduate students achieve a high level of achievement with primitive technology."

Worobetz revealed that several West Orange High School students have graduated from his course, and that his most famous student was Chris Chambliss of the New York Yankees.



New Experiences with Different Cultures

How would you like a taste of authentic Chinese and Italian cuisine without having to go very far? Try taking the Multi-Cultural Foods class with Mrs. Dora Wong-Macias. Trips to Chinatown and Little Italy

allow the students of this class to go behind the scenes and see the inner workings of the culinary business. "These places are where the cultures are so strong. The students come out of the experience thinking differently than when they went in," explained Mrs. Macias. Students who participate in this class, shop in the market places and are able to understand the importance of food to these cultures. These special activities are highlights of the course that enable all of Mrs. Wong-Macias' students to have a true appreciation for diverse ways of life.
