

Summer Playgrounds Host to Nearly 4,400 During Opening Week

A total of 4,351 local youngsters were on hand throughout last week as the Board of Recreation opened its annual nine-week summer program at five city playgrounds. Opening day registrations showed 100 at Lincoln; 110 at Mabie; 365 in attendance at Memorial Field; 175 on hand at Edison and 200 at Tatlock Memorial Field.

Summer Band Concerts at New Location

The Summit Concert Band will present its sixteenth series of summer evening band concerts in a new location this year. Plans are made for the concerts to be held on the Village Green, near the Elm Street parking lot. As the concerts will be held on Thursday evenings, which are shopping nights, it will be more convenient for shoppers to come to hear the concerts and ample parking space will be available in both the Elm Street parking lot and the YMCA parking lot. The concerts are scheduled for the following Thursday evenings at 8:15 p.m.

July 11, July 25th, August 8, August 22, September 5.

Joseph Schaefer, director of elementary school music in North Plainfield, is conducting the Concert Band this season. Mr. Schaefer was formerly an instrumental music instructor in Summit in the 1930's. Mr. Schaefer left the Summit Schools to study in Europe and since his return to this country has taught music in the North Plainfield schools.

The Board of Recreation sponsors the Concert Band, which was organized in 1948. The band has presented summer band concerts regularly since that time, first under the baton of J. Fred Mueller, and for 14 years under the directorship of Harry S. Hannaford. The band opened the season in Summit at the Fourth of July celebration, playing for the circus acts in the afternoon and giving a concert before the fireworks display in the evening. The band also presented an evening concert in New Providence on July 3. In addition to the schedule of concerts to be presented in Summit, invitations have been extended to the band to appear in three concerts to be given in Westfield, and one at Lyons Hospital.

Three present members of the band were among the original members and have played with the group each summer. They are Robert Windhorst, percussion; Edward Parfando, trombone; and Lou Richardson, clarinet. While the present roster lists more than 70 members,

A bus containing 35 American Field Service students representing as many countries will arrive in Summit next Wednesday at Memorial Field at about 3:30 p.m.

During their five-day stay, the teenage visitors will be guests of Summit High School's American Field Service Chapter. Home Rule on Speed Limits Backed by PTA

Support of Common Council's fight against the state for 'home rule' on city speed limits was endorsed this week by the Jefferson School PTA.

The PTA recently completed a survey of pedestrian traffic on Baltusrol road and Glenside avenue, both county highways in the school district and under state speed laws. The PTA stated that "heavy traffic at unrealistic speed presents a challenge for survival to the 287 school-age children and 397 adults using these thoroughfares."

In a letter to Gov. Richard Hughes the PTA urged the Governor to allow local municipalities the right to govern their own speed limits until proper legislation is enacted, to insure safety and to resolve legal problems.

Copies also were sent to State Sen. Nelson F. Stamler and Common Council.

J." in the return address. An example would be: Mr. John Doe, 55 Summer Street, Summit, N. J., 07901.

Calvary Seeks Burying Ground On Church Site

A request to inter human ashes in the rear of Calvary Episcopal Church was presented to Common Council Tuesday night by Samuel M. Coombs, Jr., of the law firm of Carpenter, Bennett and Morrissey of Newark, counsel for the church. The request for the interment was referred to the public law and public buildings and grounds committees for further study.

In his letter of request, Mr. Coombs pointed out that the Calvary churchyard is "exactly similar" to that of the one built on grounds of Christ Church at Short Hills. Mr. Coombs added that an examination of New Jersey statutes regarding cemeteries did not "offer much help," but he noted that artists' renderings of the location and a sample of the receptacle as well as plans for individual crypts would be available for examination.

Mr. Coombs further added that no formal action was necessary in Millburn by the commissioner of the township or by the Board of Health, and that such a practice is common by Episcopal churches throughout the country.

Cites Restrictions
The letter also stated that no crypt would be sold since no such sale can be made without formal application and hearing before the standing committee of the Diocese.

Mr. Coombs said it has been the practice of the Episcopal church never to contract on the sale of a crypt but to "reverently care for the ashes" buried there while the church was in existence.

The only cemetery in Summit at this time is St. Teresa's on Passaic avenue.

In other matters Council approved a request by the Suburban Airport Coach Lines of Springfield, to operate an airport coach service to Newark Airport, New York metropolitan terminal, such as airports, ship piers, railroad stations and the 1964 World's Fair, with a stop at the Hotel Suburban. The company will operate four buses, pending approval of the Public Utilities Commission.

Council also received consent for use of Rolling Hill Farms at Chatham Township for refuse disposal under contract with Angelo J. Miele.

New Homes Taken by 70 During June

Moving permits climbed to 70 last month to bring to 232 the amount issued for the first half of this year, the city's tax department informed the Union County Board of Elections at Elizabeth this week.

For the first six months of 1962, moving permits totaled 278.

Last month's permits show a decrease of 21 from the record 91 issued during June of last year, but an increase of 35 over the 35 reported in May of this year.

Those moving within the Summit Area during June numbered 29, a decrease of four from 33 during the comparable month in 1962, but a boost of 17 over the 12 in May of this year.

Out of area permits last month reached 14, a decline of nine from the 23 during June of last year, but the same as in May of this year when 14 were reported.

Permits given to those moving out of state last month totaled 27, a decrease of eight from the 35 of June, 1962, and an increase of 20 over the seven in May.

Area Water Supply Seen As Adequate

With nearly an inch of rainfall drenching the Summit Area in a surprise storm Saturday morning, water reserves here are in good supply, Thomas W. Coleman, manager of Commonwealth Water Co., reported this week.

He cautioned however, that if rainfall continues to be sparse reserves could diminish over the hot summer weeks ahead. As of now, Mr. Coleman added, reservoirs are adequately filled to take care of "all needs" for the time being.

A sudden heat wave which began early last week nearly doubled the amount of average water used daily. Mr. Coleman said that the amount pumped last Thursday reached a record 40,000,000 gallons. He said on Monday, June 24, 36,000,000 were used and increased by over a 1,000,000 gallons daily for the remainder of the week.

The amount of water used during the last week in June and the first two days in July was the highest since 1952 when the area was subjected to extreme heat that did not subside for nearly four weeks. At that time, with less reservoirs and water reserves, residents were asked to curb use of water by not watering lawns.

Mr. Coleman said that since water reserves are somewhat lower than normal, pressure to the hill areas of the city is reduced, but is normal in the lower sections of the area.

A temporary break in the heat came late Tuesday when storms pushed the temperature down to a more comfortable 78 and eased the humidity. However the rains were scattered and the rainfall in Summit was fairly slight and not enough to revitalize parched lawns and gardens.

The official Weather Bureau thermometer readings taken at Newark Airport do not tell the whole story. In Summit the mercury climbed much higher than the official readings and in the sun almost any reading was 100 plus.

At the corner of Springfield avenue and Boechwood road, the Liss Pharmacy taped a thermometer to a tree and on Monday morning the instrument registered 104 degrees. It climbed higher during the afternoon.

The heat severely cut down local business activity and during the hottest parts of the day the business section was practically devoid of shoppers. As one local businessman said, "You could shoot a cannon down the street and not hit anyone."

Following Saturday morning's storm, which was also accompanied by thunder and lightning, the heat suddenly left, leaving residents sweltering under a (Continued on Page 4)

Area Skeeter Tally Shows Slight Rise

Summit's mosquito population doubled last week but still remained far below the 'nuisance' mark, according to the latest weekly check of mosquito traps by the County Mosquito Extermination Committee. The count for last week was 2.1, as compared to 1.0 for the previous week.

A count of from zero to 6 is considered light, from 7 to 13, medium, and from 14 up, heavy.

The county maintains and checks weekly mosquito traps in six sections of the county, including one for the Summit-New Providence-Berkeley Heights area.

Slight increases for all of the trap stations was reported for last week. The Plainfield-Fanwood area had a count of 1.4, the Westfield-Cranford area, 1.8; Union-Hillside, 1.1 and Elizabeth-Linden, 3.2.

County crews are at work in all communities as well as the Elizabeth salt marshes on preventative programs. Homeowners, however, are urged to cooperate by making sure that no water-filled receptacles are available for breeding places.

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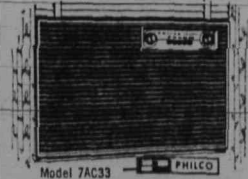

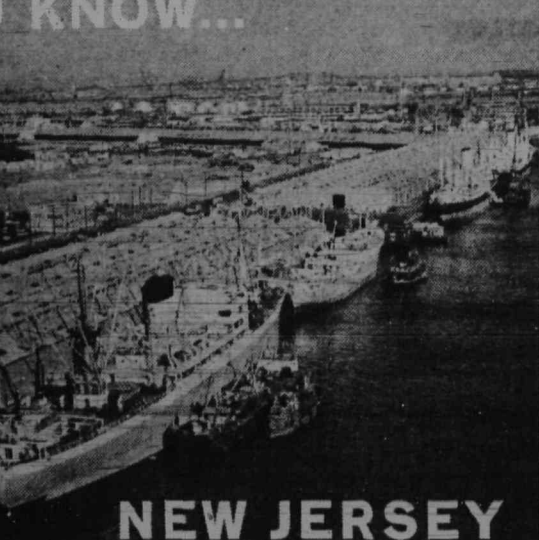

Heights Man

Author of Many Articles

Arnold R. Davis of 95 Orchard Lane, Berkeley Heights, is reported by a national technical journal as being among the top 100 contributors to the world's rubber literature. Mr. Davis is manager of rubber chemicals technical service at the Boud Brook plant, American Cyanamid Company.

The Journal, Rubber Chemistry and Technology, appears five times a year under the auspices of the division of rubber chemistry, American Chemical Society. It makes available under one cover papers on fundamental research, technical developments, and chemical engineering problems relating to rubber and allied substances.

The journal made a study of the 56,296 publications on rubber which appeared in print from 1932 through 1958 and of these 31,000 authors, the 100 most prolific individuals were singled out. Mr. Davis ranked 61 among these top contributors.

Mr. Davis has had 41 years experience in his field; 15 in the rubber manufacturing industry and 26 with Cyanamid research in accelerators, antioxidants, antiozonants, and plasticizers. He has over 30 patents assigned to Cyanamid in the field of rubber chemistry and is the author of over 40 publications. He has given lectures on the vulcanization of natural and synthetic rubber, accelerators, and curing systems. The latter lecture was given three times to classes sponsored by the Akron Rubber Group, American Chemical Society, at Akron University.

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Something's Wrong in Suburbia

Two current items, the quarterly crime report issued by the F.B.I. and a series of articles appearing in the New York Times, convey the bad news that all is not sweetness and light and good living in the suburbs. The FBI report tells that the country's crime rate continues to increase, but more than that, it contains information which upsets old concepts on breeding spots for criminals and suggests that the American people take a new look at themselves and their offspring. The Times articles more or less convey the same.

On a general basis, criminal acts increased 7 per cent in the first three months of this year. The increase amounted to about 3 per cent in the big cities but about 12 per cent in the suburban areas. Suburbia needs to take a fresh look at itself.

For years we have been told by law enforcement officials that it is the big city which breeds crime. We know all of the reasons, no play areas, slums, gang activity, idle time, poor schools and so on. Most of these contentions have been proven to some extent. Slum living is known to breed a disregard for the law. People are inclined to do as they please without regard for the rights of others.

But what has happened in the suburbs? This is the region where the middle class has gone to live so they may raise their children without big city handicaps. Sub-

urban parents, generally, enjoy good incomes. They are part of the two-car aspect of American living. Their youngsters have plenty of space for relaxation. They attend good schools, their companions are their equals. They dress well, they have allowances and they have little denied them.

But, it appears, instead of being satisfied with their good fortune, suburbia's youth is heading in the wrong direction. Thefts, particularly those taking place in private homes, increased tremendously. Theft of autos also played a major role in the higher crime figures.

The young people of suburbia have no valid reason for criminal acts if it may be inferred that there is any valid reason for breaking the law. In the crowded cities there are numerous "have nots" who assuage their longing for what they do not possess by taking without paying. This class of people, against whom always has been charged the blame for crime, are a minor element in the suburbs.

It begins to appear that youth in the suburbs get things too easily and so, in search of thrills, it turns to illegal activity. If that be the case, then the law breakers who indulge in misbehavior just for "kicks" have earned for themselves the need for a good "kicking around" by law enforcement agencies not dedicated to "mollycoddling."

Spirit of Independence

Doylestown, Pa., is described in travel folders as a town that "has always been known for its attractive old houses and tree-shaded streets." Nearby is Washington's Crossing where the ragged American Army crossed the Delaware River into New Jersey to defeat the British at Trenton in 1776—and went on to win the War for Independence.

Down through the years this Bucks County community has proceeded on its own quiet way, attracting hardly any notice except during the depression when it astounded Washington, D.C., by refusing Federal WPA and similar make-work projects. Instead it chose to provide work for its residents through local civic cooperation.

Recently redevelopment of its downtown business area with Federal aid was broached. But Doylestown (pop. 5,917) had already spent \$78,000 for downtown street improvement and parking facilities. This, it was indicated, could be applied as the local contribution to a \$500,000 urban renewal project carried out with Federal funds.

Citizens recognized the need for im-

provement and knew that a half-million dollars would go a long way. At the same time they questioned what would happen to the businesses that would be uprooted in the area. Council President John F. Mason also expressed concern over the effect of "the strings that are always attached to Federal aid." Council called a public meeting on the question. More than 250 attended, the Doylestown Daily Intelligencer reported. Questions ranged from "where is the creeping blight" to "where is the government going to stop?" Comments included: "We don't want the octopus of the Federal Government to get into our area." Asserting "we have a moral obligation," a school teacher asked, "do we have the right to raid the Federal Treasury?" A chorus of "no's" defeated the formal question whether Council should proceed with a study to be paid from Federal funds.

Thus Doylestown joined with such stalwarts of local independence as Indianapolis, Indiana, and Rice County, Kansas, which recently received nation-wide publicity for their rejection of Federal aid area development in favor of "do it yourself."

For the present, ZIP is designed for big mail users rather than for letters to and from children in camp, reminders from stores to pay bills, love letters, etc. In other words, we may now get our junk mail much sooner than before; but will we get our first-class mail any more quickly? Circus Objectionable

After many, many years, a circus was allowed to come into the very fine residential city of Summit on June 26 after approval was forthcoming from the Common Council. It is to be regretted that the citizens of Summit, and particularly those whose property abutted, or is in the immediate vicinity of the site allocated to the Hunt Brothers circus were not afforded an opportunity to voice their opinion prior to Council approval. This regret is vehemently stressed in view of the fact that the main tent of the circus was within 125 feet of my own property line.

The circus arrived in Summit prior to 6 a.m. on the morning of June 26 and departed at a like hour on June 27, with the necessary, but objectionable, noises associated with the setting up and dismantling of equipment and the unloading and loading animals.

The scene at Vanderpoel field, following the departure of the circus was reminiscent of the city dump. All garbage and debris associated with performance operations was left at the site by the circus personnel, necessitating the employment of a City of Summit garbage truck and four attendants to remove same during the morning. Fifteen individual piles of garbage and refuse were counted and paper and other debris was scattered over the field. Empty wine bottles were thrown on the ground, and raw sewage and used toilet paper was unceremoniously dumped from a house

trailer used by circus personnel. Because of the very strong and objectionable odor, it was likewise necessary to assign three men and necessary Summit equipment to remove the animal manure which had been piled up and left by circus employees.

The circus performances were sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce (definitely not the Summit Area Chamber of Commerce), and it is to be hoped that the Common Council will not again through their approval, subject Summit and its residential neighborhoods to such an unfair and disgusting experience.

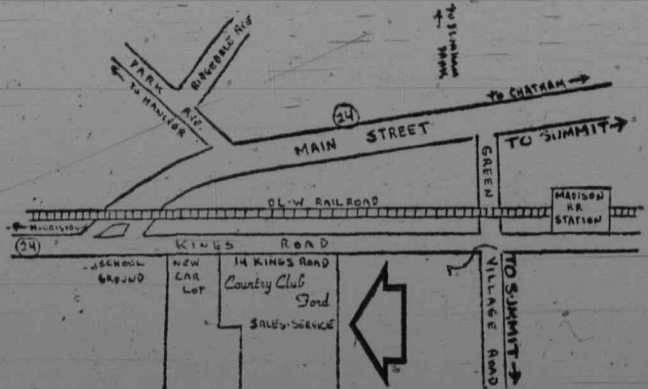
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English Will Name YMCA, Central Church

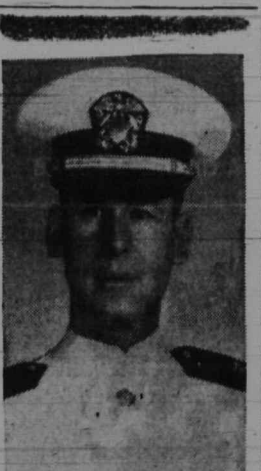
Top Cornell Award Won By Local Girl

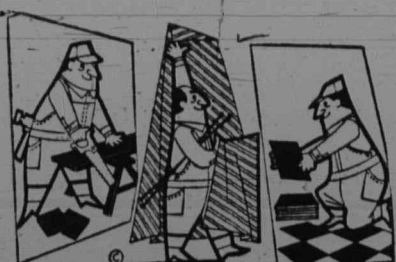
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Resident to Aid in Camp Organization
