LIBRARY NEWS

Let us take a trip this week down to the Juvenile Department. I wonder how many mothers and fathers have taken the time to come with their children to see when and how they get their books?

A large airy room with shelves all around the walls, on top of which the covers of interesting books are displayed. Pictures suitable for the children adorn the walls and on the tables are picture books, most of them having been made by the staff. To add a springlike touch, flowers decorate every table. Most of the vases in which they are placed are also the handwork of the staff. On a cabinet between two windows is a case of colorful birds, and on each window sill is a helmet, one German, and the other American, which were given by the children.

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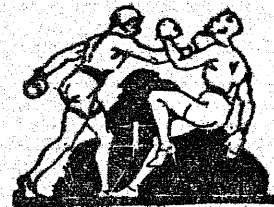
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Doings in the Field of Sports

THE WHYS AND WHEREFORES

AFTER seeing the Belleville High basketball team roller iron out Dover for its sixth straight victim, the question once more arises, "Why don't they enter the state tourney?"

The query, as asked by most of the fans, is in itself an altogether proper one. In winning that sextet of contests and also several early season ones, the Bell-boys have looked the part of champions. But what about that string of reverses at the hands of Passaic, Clifton, Orange, West Orange? One could hardly judge their performances first class in those.

Then again, a slump is natural to the most powerful teams in any line of sport.

The team seems to be good enough to at least give it a whirl.

But after all a team's record is not the only consideration. There are others. These, as voiced by Coach A. K. McBride and the other athletic authorities at the school, appear significant, to say the least.

Two reasons for not entering stand out glaringly. In the first place the season of nineteen games, played twice a week, seems entirely long enough, and secondly the tourney, as conducted at present, is not a fair test by which champions should be decided. This is in no way leveling criticism at the tournament officials, but merely stating a fact that appears unavoidable while attempting to pick the best team of a school system, state-wide in its scope.

The first reason seems sufficient in itself. Nineteen games, not mentioning the daily practices necessary in between times, appears a heavy enough schedule for the average school-boy.

Enlarging on the second, the uncertainty of the courts on which the games are played, the possibility of playing two games in one day, i. e. an afternoon and night contest, the fact that some of the best lives in the state, such as Montclair, are not entered, all tend to prove it not a fair test. How can the winner of the state tourney proclaim itself champion, when teams that have been howling over some of the best quintets in the state are not even entered?

More specifically, too, this year, with such all-powered squads as South Side, Passaic and Trenton, entered, the locals could hardly hope to win. Entrance this year would not even assist in giving the members of the team tournament experience, as they are all seniors and will be graduated this year.

The results obtainable hardly warrant Belleville High's entrance.
