

WEEK WAY TO PLUG  
TUITION FEE LEAK  
SCHOOL SYSTEM

Board of Education Declares  
Residents Are Not Pay-  
ing; Grant 5 Percent Bonus

The fact that out-of-town  
students are attending  
classes in Belleville schools  
without paying the stipulated  
tuition fee was revealed Mon-  
day night when School Com-  
missioner Joseph F. Arnold  
led the Board of Education  
to coordinate its students rec-  
ord and tighten its collection  
policy.

Mr. Arnold and school busi-  
ness manager Ruel E. Dan-  
iels disclosed that tuition fees  
had been collected from only  
one of the nineteen non-  
resident high school students  
in the district.

That there was no record of  
the kind of the number of out-  
of-town students in the elementary schools,  
the tuition fee is \$80 a year  
for primary pupils and \$120 a  
year for high school students. Mr.  
Arnold read a formal communica-  
tion from Mr. Daniels recommending  
that it be the duty of the  
school principals to collect the  
tuition.

The business manager further  
recommended that no out-of-town-  
student be given credit for a year's  
tuition unless the full tuition has  
been paid.

Mr. Daniels said that, of the  
more than \$890 owed the school  
system for tuitions so far this  
year, only \$153 had been paid.  
By next month, he declared, did not  
there is a tuition charge.

**Wards**

Eighty-one students, 117 state-  
ment here, he said, and  
the recommendation of board  
member Herbert C. Schmutz,  
on the question was post-  
poned until a study of the school  
system can be made.

The board also failed to take  
action on a request of super-  
intendent Wayne R. Farmer  
to be given authority to  
suspend emergency leaves of ab-  
sence for teachers according to his  
discretion.

Farmer told the board that  
disruptions arise at times where a  
teacher requires a brief leave and  
circumstances often make it  
impossible for the teacher to wait  
until the next monthly board  
meeting to get permission.

He cited three cases which  
occurred in the last month. One  
teacher's husband had been in-  
jured while working overseas, and  
the husband was about to be  
discharged and a third's fiancé  
was home from overseas with  
a broken leg.

The board passed over the first  
two and discussion centered  
on the third, which the board  
declared was not a legitimate  
reason for a leave. When the dis-  
cussion concluded, Mr. Farmer  
told himself still without the  
authority he had requested.

**Grant Bonus**

Five percent "cost of living"  
bonus were voted for all full-  
time employees of the school sys-  
tem, with the exception of admin-  
istrators and principals.

Teachers will receive a minimum  
of \$125 but the bonus will be pro-  
portioned according to the length  
of service and the amount of time  
worked this year.

The amount accrued so far this  
year will be paid with the Decem-  
ber checks and the remainder will  
be split into monthly payments  
during the remainder of the year.

Harold L. Trappner was employ-  
ed on the board of teach social  
science in the high school at a  
salary of \$1,800 a year. Miss Shir-  
ley Korn was hired to teach sec-  
ond grade in Franklin avenue  
school effective January 15 at a  
salary of \$1,200.

The resignation of Mrs. Alice  
Wagner as high school social  
science director was finally accept-  
ed by the board after action on it  
was postponed for a month.

Mary E. Carlstrom was given  
leave of absence until September  
1945.

**Eschevege Fined Second Time  
for Driving Bill to \$338**

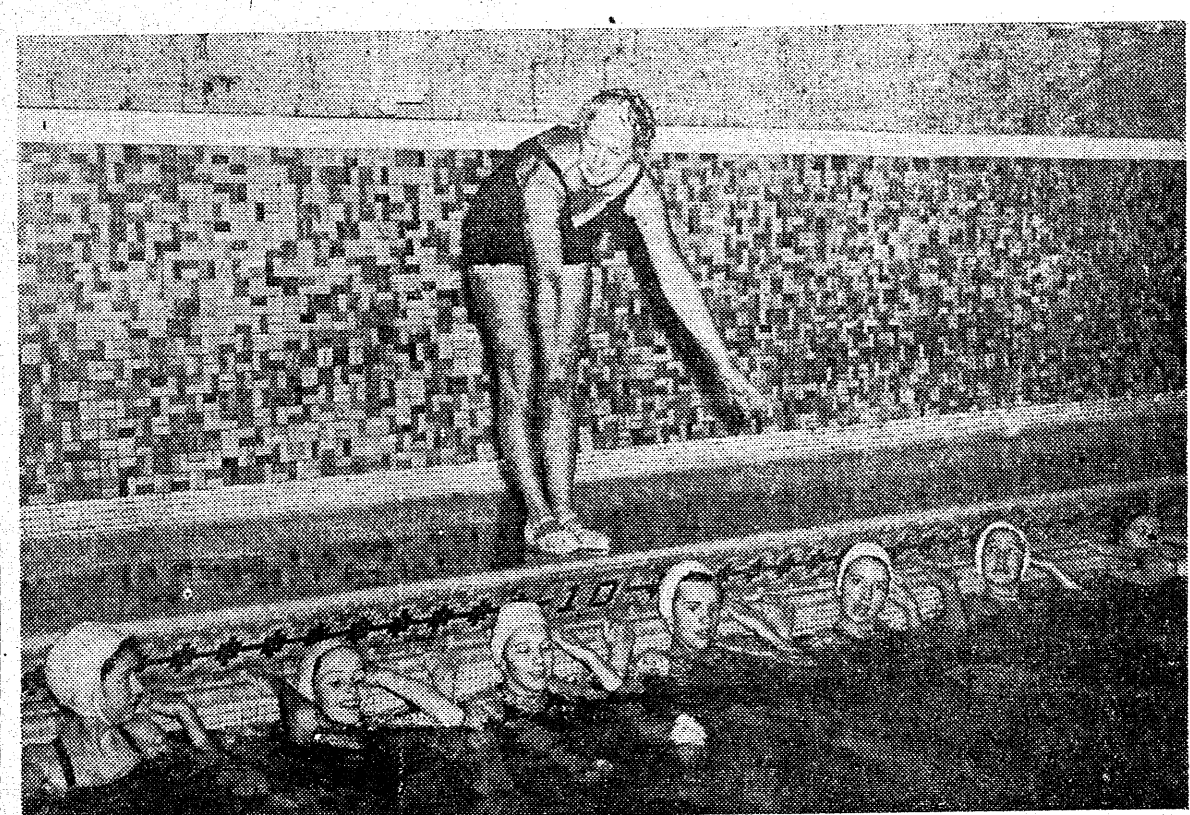
It has cost Peter Kisselevich  
total of \$338 so far to drive in  
Belleville. He was fined last week  
for Recorder Everett B. Smith for  
a second time in a year for  
motor vehicle violations.

It was just a year ago that Mr.  
Kisselevich, who hails from New  
York, Pa., but whose local ad-  
dress last year was 299 Hickory  
street, Kearny, was found guilty  
of driving while intoxicated. The  
conviction was upheld after he  
pleaded.

He was fined \$200 plus \$25  
costs and his New Jersey driver's  
license was revoked for two years.  
Last week he told Judge Smith  
that Pennsylvania had not revoked  
his license there as is customary  
under a reciprocity agreement be-  
tween the two states.

He was found guilty of a care-  
less driving charge brought on by  
a near fatal crash on Monday  
night. He was driving after  
drinking and was fined \$100.

E BOND PRESSURE  
AT DRIVE CLIMAX

Leaders Push Individual Sales  
As Belleville Hits 74 Percent;  
Overall Goal Tripled

The pressure is being put on  
the sales of Series E war bonds  
this week as the Sixth War Loan  
enters its final stages. Chairman  
Philip Dettelbach disclosed yester-  
day that Belleville had bought  
\$595,000 in E bonds for 74.4 per-  
cent of quota.

This is E Bond Week through-  
out the state as industrial and  
governmental leaders urged peo-  
ple to buy more bonds themselves  
and to give "America's safest in-  
vestment" to their friends as  
Christmas presents.

Ronald G. Brunner and W.  
Douglas Clark attended a meet-  
ing of the state War Finance Com-  
mittee in Newark Friday to dis-  
cuss plans for pushing the small  
denomination sales. The state  
performance is 63 percent to date.

Yesterday they pointed out that,  
although corporate sales in the  
campaign ended December 16,  
Series E purchases up to Decem-  
ber 31 will be credited to the town.

Mr. Dettelbach also announced  
yesterday that the town's overall  
performance to Saturday noon is  
\$6,730,767 or 298 percent of the  
\$2,255,000 goal. Most of this figure  
is credited to industrial purchases.

Mr. Clark said yesterday that  
the following firms in Belleville  
had surpassed their quotas: West-  
inghouse, Bart Laboratories, Han-  
lon & Goodman, Wallace & Tier-  
nan, Resistoflex, Sonneborn and  
Hever Products.

A Hoyer official revealed that  
sales in that company totaled \$29,-  
275. The company had set a \$25,-  
000 goal in order to purchase a  
Navy SNJ-3 scout training plane.

The leading individual bond  
salesmen were Catherine Clark,  
Eloise Brown, Jean Carpenter,  
Victor Laube and Jo Trappner.  
The management will distribute  
war bond prizes tomorrow night  
at the company Christmas party.

**BUS-MOTORCYCLE  
CRASH HURTS ONE**

Newark Youth Thrown Under  
Bus Suffers Possible Broken  
Hip; Other Accidents in Snow

Benjamin Sheffield, 17, of 49  
Chester avenue, Newark, suffered  
a possible fractured hip Monday  
night during the snowstorm when  
a motorcycle on which he was rid-  
ing collided with a Garden State  
bus at Washington avenue & Rut-  
gers street.

The driver of the cycle, accord-  
ing to police, was Cataldo Mar-  
tiano, 17, of 9 Acme street, Belle-  
ville. The bus was operated by  
Walter P. Chapman, 43, of 15 Or-  
chard drive, Allwood.

Police said that, as Martiano  
attempted to pass the bus, which  
was stopped to discharge passen-  
gers, the vehicle started up and  
pulled out from the curb to make  
a left turn into Rutgers street.  
Bus and cycle had both been  
travelling south on The Avenue.

Both boys rolled under bus but

was taken to St. Mary's hospital,  
Passaic.

SLIM ATTENDANCE  
AT SWIM CLASSES

Boy, Girl Scouts in Quantity  
But Adults Fail to Respond  
To Red Cross Campaign

Response to the invitation of the  
local Red Cross chapter several  
weeks ago for Belleville residents  
over sixteen years of age to  
participate in swimming instruc-  
tion and a water safety program  
in the Friendly House pool re-  
sulted in slim attendance.

Monday and Tuesday evenings,  
however, groups of more than  
thirty Girl and Boy Scouts are  
under the aquatic tutelage of Al-  
bert Hollihan, qualified at Red  
Cross aquatic school, Mrs. Olive  
Muir of Nutley and Mrs. Estelle  
Naylor of Bloomfield.

Paul P. Baxter of 171 DeWitt  
avenue, chairman of the program  
and William J. Ross of 182 Floyd  
street, vice-chairman, also assist  
the staff after the holidays.

Instruction ranges from "begin-  
ner" to "advanced swimmer" and  
"life saving." Special emphasis  
will be placed on pre-inductees  
training for high school students  
who are able to swim and who  
will be taught to handle equip-  
ment in the water.

Thursday evenings will be de-  
voted to adults and to this pre-  
military drill. Class is opened at  
7 in the Friendly House, which  
is located on Frederick street near  
Franklin street, and is continued  
until 9:30.

Mr. Baxter, who announced that  
posters would be placed in the  
high school and other buildings  
this week, pointed out the benefit  
to war workers and others in the  
relaxation of swimming.

DRAFT TO ENFORCE  
WORK-OR-FIGHT

Board Gets Washington Order  
To Reclassify All Who Leave  
Essential Employment

The "work-or-fight" order of  
selective service reached Belleville  
last week and was immediately  
put into effect by the draft board,  
according to Miss Sadie Slusser,  
the board's chief clerk.

Under the terms of the new  
order, all draft-deferred men up  
to 38 years of age will be im-  
mediately reclassified 1-A should  
they quit their war work.

An indication that men over 25  
may not continue to be exempt  
from the draft was seen in some  
quarters in the following excerpt  
from the order from Washington  
through Trenton:

"Estimates of the available  
men indicate that the armed  
forces' calls after February 1,  
1945, cannot be filled substantial-  
ly from men 18 through 25. . . .  
For these reasons it will be neces-  
sary to induct increasing number  
of men from the older age  
groups."

It was not immediately deter-  
mined whether this sentence re-  
ferred to the work-or-fight order  
or whether present indications are  
that a hike in the age limit may  
be necessary shortly after the  
first of the year.

"It is imperative that local  
boards fill the calls of the armed  
forces," the order declared, "and  
that they be filled by reclassification,  
as it becomes necessary, of  
men in the older age groups" who  
do not meet occupational defer-  
ment standards.

The move is designed to hold  
men in war plants whose products  
are essential to the successful  
 prosecution of the war, Miss  
Slusser said. Occupational changes  
prior to December 12 will not be  
considered.

The next Belleville call has been  
set for January 3 when the local  
board must send seventeen men  
for induction and twelve men for  
pre-induction physical examina-  
tion.

**Cut in Fuel Oil at High School  
Causes Activity Curtailment**

Activities in the high school re-  
quiring heat must be drastically  
curtailed during the winter, school  
business manager Ruel E. Daniels  
said Monday, because of the scar-  
city of fuel oil.

Mr. Daniels revealed that the  
school must operate on 38,135 gal-  
lons of oil this year, 2,187 gallons  
less than were received last year  
when some heating difficulties  
were experienced.

He said that the school had al-  
ready used thirty percent of its  
quota whereas OPA calculations  
show that only 27 percent should  
have been burned to date. He an-  
ticipated no coal shortage in the  
elementary schools.

BORRIELLO GIVEN  
UP TO NINE YEARS

Ralph Sentenced on Larceny,  
Escape Charges as James  
Is Released in \$1,500 Bail

Ralph Borriello, 20, of 509 Fifth  
street and Peter Muscio, 30, of  
41 Fairmount avenue, both of  
Newark, were sentenced to prison  
terms of four-to-nine years and  
one year respectively.

The men pleaded non vult to  
larceny of liquor from the Simon  
liquor store at 547 Washington  
avenue and from a chain store in  
Irvington. Borriello was also  
charged with escape from a Belle-  
ville police detention room Octo-  
ber 13.

The men were sentenced Monday  
by Common Pleas Judge Hart-  
thorne in Newark. Borriello will  
serve his time in the state peni-  
tentiary and Muscio in the coun-  
ty penitentiary.

Meanwhile, Borriello's brother,  
James, 20, of 43 Florence avenue  
in his town, is at liberty in \$1,500  
bail on the same charge and  
another charge of auto larceny  
from Montclair.

It is understood that James is  
also charged with theft of an au-  
to from Elizabeth. The car, to-  
ken last summer, was recovered  
over October 12 by Detectives  
Leighton, McGinnis and Holly.

The men have also been ques-  
tioned about the alleged finding  
of his motorcycle of parts stolen  
from a motorcycle owned by  
George Waldron of Newark, a  
Newark marine petty officer.

Ralph Borriello was recaptured  
at his Newark home two weeks  
after his escape here; James Bor-  
riello was retaken November 20  
after a gun chase through the  
backyards of Silver Lake.

VALLEYITES VOTE  
TO ASK GUARDRAIL  
FOR MAIN STREET

Improvement Association Will  
Confer With Commissioners  
At Meeting Tuesday

The Valley Improvement associa-  
tion, meeting in emergency ses-  
sion last night, voted to push its  
six-months-old campaign to ob-  
tain a guardrail along north Main  
street where the Passaic River  
comes within ten feet of the high-  
way.

It was at this point that a car  
dove into the river last week  
bringing death by drowning to  
three persons and raising Belle-  
ville's automobile death toll for  
1944 to five.

The Valley group wrote a letter  
to the town Commission last June  
(sending copies to the state and  
county highway departments)  
pointing out the hazardous con-  
dition of the road and asking for  
a guardrail.

Replies were received within  
two weeks from the county and  
state declaring that the matter  
was a municipal problem; last  
week however no one at town hall  
had any knowledge of the letter.

Two years ago when the depart-  
ment of Public Works submitted  
its plans for widening and resur-  
facing Main street, its request for  
a guardrail was rejected by the  
Public Roads Authority.

Funeral services were held last  
week for the victims, Mr. and Mrs.  
Mitchell P. Talmadge of Upper  
Montclair and Miss Clorinda Vol-  
picelli of Nutley.

TWO MEN PAY \$150  
IN TAVERN BRAWL

Second Offender Fined \$100;  
Defense Workers Found  
Guilty in Assault Charge

A tavern brawl, in which one  
of the principals suffered a gashed  
head which required 26 stitches to  
close, last week cost two men \$150  
in fines when they were given  
a hearing before Recorder Everett  
B. Smith.

Herbert F. Schwab of 19 Park  
View avenue was assessed \$100  
and Lawrence Clark of 20 Mt.  
Pleasant avenue, the man who was  
out, paid the other \$50.

Schwab's fine was higher, police  
said, because he had previously  
been found guilty of being  
drunk and disorderly and was  
then fined \$50 plus \$9 damages  
for windows he smashed while in  
a drunken stupor.

The men entered guilty pleas to  
the charges, made by Lieut. Ken-  
neth Smith, arising out of a fight  
November 28 in Laterza's tavern

At Detective's "Perjury" Hearing

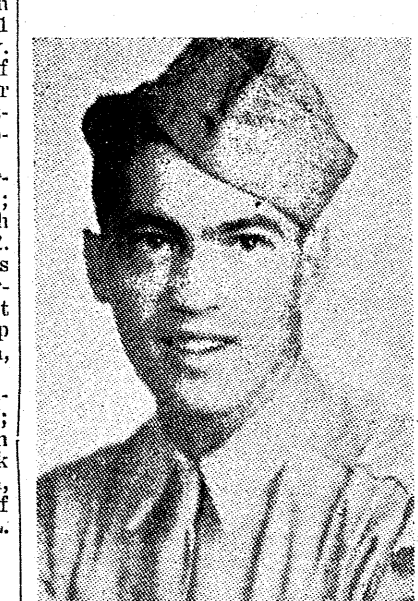
The famous "white paper," the report of Deputy Police  
Chief Elmer S. Leighton to Public Safety Director Joseph  
R. King which first linked Mayor William H. Williams with  
gambling interests, is expected to play a major role when  
Detective Nicholas J. Mariano goes on trial at 9:30 this  
morning.

The report was submitted to Commissioner King last  
winter and was the focal point of Mayor Williams' April  
attack on the Public Safety head during which the mayor  
demanded that the text of the report be made public. The  
report was turned over to the mayor this week and the chief  
executive in turn gave it  
to Town Attorney Lawrence I.  
Keenan who will prosecute  
Mr. Mariano.

The latter faces depart-  
mental charges of "miscon-  
duct in that he gave false  
testimony and committed perjury  
before the grand jury . . . by  
testifying that he had heard a  
conversation between Mayor Wil-  
liams and Deputy Chief King  
in which among other things  
Mariano testified that Mayor  
Williams told Detective  
Leighton that it was

**DELAY PLANS FOR  
LOOP EXPANSION**

**Month's Deferment of Action  
By School Board Causes  
Setback to Int. League**

Plans for expansion of the Intermediate basketball league are indefinite now, Recreation Director Edward J. Lister said yesterday.

He also indicated that the board was supposed to discuss Monday night the Recreation department's application to use the gym Saturday mornings for a grammar school league.

The proposal was briefly discussed by the board Monday but no action was taken. Permission cannot now be granted until January 15 at the earliest.

Board President Schmutz revealed that he and Mr. Lister had discussed a part whereby the Recreation department would sponsor primary school basketball and baseball activities in order to teach youngsters the fundamentals of the games, using high school coaches as tutors.

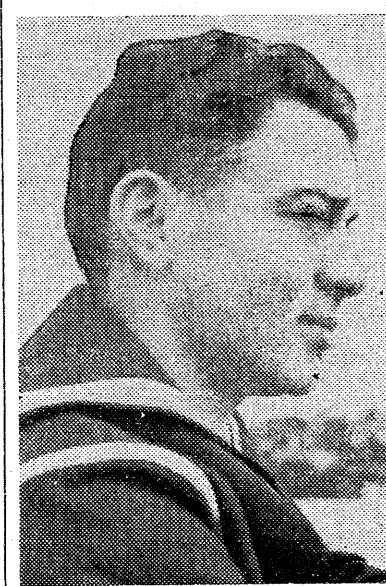

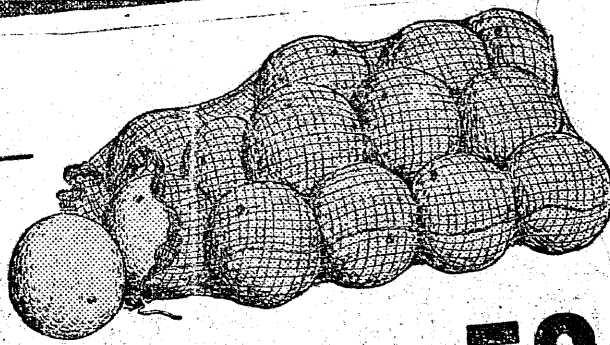

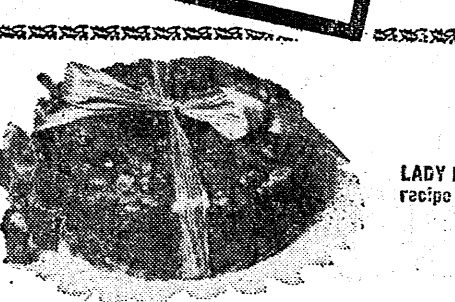

WANTS HOSPITAL  
FOR RHEUMATICS

Victoria Foundation President  
Urges Isolation Beds for  
Little Heart Sufferers

Another move to fill up the  
empty beds in the Essex County  
Isolation hospital at Franklin &  
Belleville avenue was indicated  
last week as the director of the  
Victoria Foundation suggested  
that part of the institution be  
converted to the use of children  
with rheumatic heart disease.

Dr. Harvey M. Ewing of Mont-  
clair put forth the proposal dur-  
ing his talk before the health  
division of the Social Welfare  
Council of the Oranges & Maple-  
wood.

Declaring that general hospitals  
are unsatisfactory for the treat-  
ment of rheumatic children be-  
cause of the long period of hospi-  
talization, Dr. Ewing asserted  
that the country has accommodations  
for only fifty of the 4,500 cases  
in this area.

This type of heart ailment is  
contagious among children, he  
said, and therefore the Isolation  
hospital, instituted for contagion,  
is "appropriate."

Dr. Ewing's suggestion follows  
by several months the campaign  
waged by Dr. Louis Schneider,  
president of the county medical  
society, to convert a large portion  
of the hospital to the care of per-  
sons suffering from chronic ill-  
nesses.

During Dr. Schneider's cam-  
paign, he declared that the 500-  
bed capacity of the Belleville in-  
stitution is normally less than  
twenty percent in use.

Dr. Ellis S. Smith, superin-  
tendent of the hospital, at that  
time retorted that the beds must  
be kept ready for peak loads dur-  
ing the late winter and during  
times of epidemics.

He quoted another doctor, a  
member of the hospital directors,  
who is reported to have illustrated  
the point with: "Firemen are not  
always fighting fires."

Savings-Loan Campaign Success

The campaign for sales of  
monthly saving shares in North  
Belleville Savings & Loan associa-



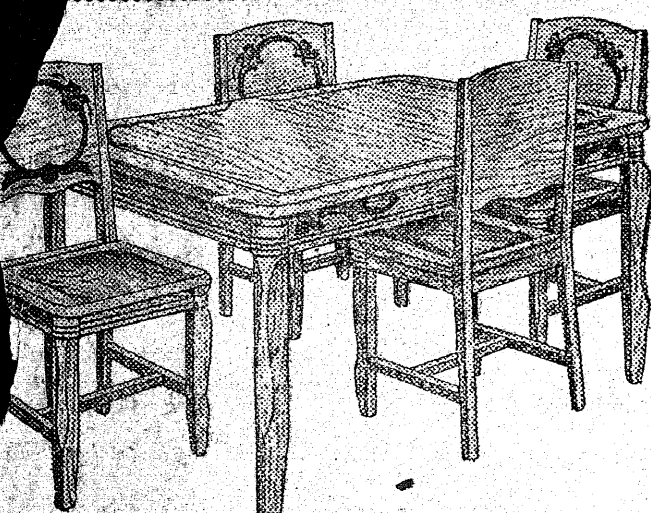
