

TRAINING SCHOOL AT STEVENS WILL OPEN ON SEPT. 22

**Evening Courses To Prepare
Students For Jobs In Field
Of Engineering Are Offered**

The fall term of the Industries Training School at Stevens Institute of Technology will commence on Monday, September 22. It was announced today.

Evening courses, planned to prepare students for jobs as supervisors of technical assistants in eight fields of engineering and production are offered. Certificates are awarded to graduates of courses in Chemical, Electrical and Structural Technology, Machine Design, Metallurgy, Production Supervision, Shop Practice and Tool Design. Basic courses in Mathematics and English also are available.

A high school education or equivalent on-the-job experience in the field chosen is the only requirement for admission. Students may attend classes one, two or three nights a week.

The Industries Training School is an outgrowth of 2½ courses offered by Stevens during the war to train technical employees for industries in Northern New Jersey and the Metropolitan New York area. Instructors are mainly members of the regular Stevens Institute faculty and classes are conducted in the classrooms, shops and laboratories used by daytime engineering students working in the Institute's undergraduate degree.

Appointments may be made now for consultation on the selection of courses. The closing date for registration is Wednesday, September 17. Catalogs describing the courses in detail will be mailed on request.

 stay until the pension money was all used up. Then they would start back across the bridge, often in such a snowy condition and sometimes they would just about make the buses on the other side of the river where they would lay down to sleep it off.

Tall Story
 At that time the "Mud Gutter Bands" came to town and they always took up their stand in front of the bridge tavern. Sometimes they played really good music. A story was told about one of these musicians who tooted a large horn. One time the band was playing before quite an audience and a woman who lived over the tavern was holding a baby in her arms leaning out of the window. She became so enthused that she loosened her hold of the baby and it fell down and landed in the bowl of the horn. The horn player, who saw the baby fall, rose to the occasion at once and blew such a blast on the horn that it blew the baby right back into its mother's arms.

Ancient Horses
 The horse cars which ran along Main Street to Mill Street and then to Woodside, had their stables on Main Street, north of Holmes Street. The horses on this line were a sad lot, some of them, no doubt, having come out of Noah's Ark. When a horse was no longer fit for family use, it would be put on duty drawing horse cars, until it dropped in its tracks (or on the car tracks). Many of these horses are buried in the old car barn yard, and their ghosts are supposed to roam around the vicinity on dark nights.

Some of the car drivers were characters, too. There was Ike Little, Jimmy Noonan and his brother Jack. Jimmy was a good ball player and caught for the Woodstocks in the early '90's. He was so enthusiastic about baseball, that if he saw the boys playing ball along his route he would let the horse stop and rest while he watched the game and the passengers fumed inside the car.

Link Is Missing
 The present jack-knife bridge, run by power, no longer has need for the youngsters to help as of yore. The boys have their scouting, PAL and playgrounds, but there is missing link, the old river bridge tender and the vocabulary of those bygone days.

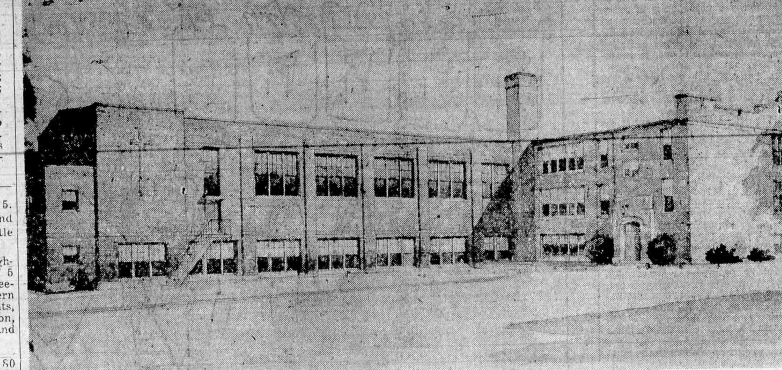

St. Peter's Addition Will Not Be Ready For Opening Of School On Monday



The new addition to St. Peter's Parochial School started last Spring will not be ready for occupancy at the opening of school on Monday. The building costing half a million dollars contains a combination gymnasium-auditorium and class rooms. The contractor is rushing things to complete the auditorium in time for the parish-wide card party later this month.

The first parochial school was opened about 21 years ago, on September 12, 1931, with 83 pupils in seven grades. The following September, the enrollment leaped to 150. The growth was so great that Mr. James J. Owens, who succeeded Father Quirk in 1932, was built not only a new convent and a new church but the present school which cost \$160,000 to build in 1933.

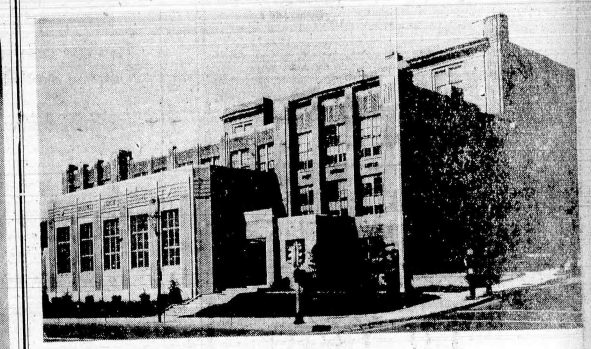


Miss Elizabeth Fulton Is Betrothed To John Manning
