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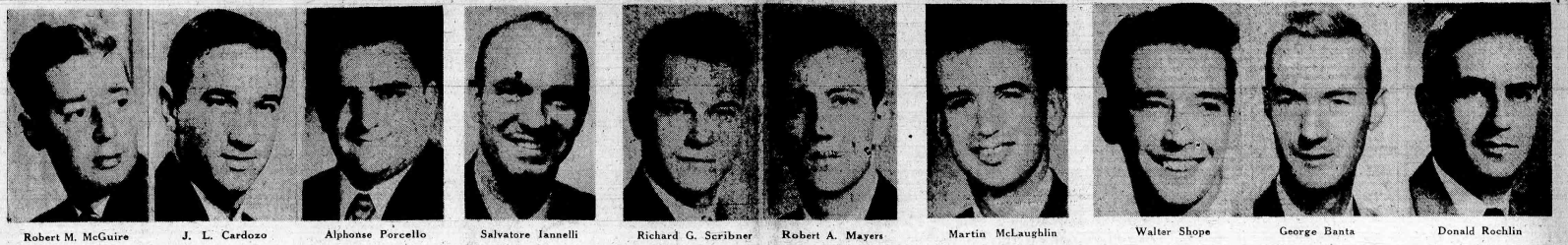

So What?

When a power shovel and other grading devices moved in to cut away the bank in the back of the stores on the south-west corner of Washington and Belleville Avenues, owned by the Belleville Properties, Inc., we thought some things were being done by the merchants to open up the backyards along most of the block, for parking. But it turns out that the work was done to cut down on water seepage into the building from the hillside behind the stores. A driveway has been installed and there is at least room for the employees of the stores from 137 to 141 1/2 Washington Avenue to park. The fence across the end of the lot, prevents access to a larger parking area behind the next group of stores.

Belleville letter carriers who made a "March of Mercy" last week for the Cerebral Palsy building campaign, have collected \$3,700 to date and more returns are coming in every day from those who were not seen last week. On a county-wide basis the mailmen have collected more than 25 per cent of the \$400,000 fund sought to build, equip and operate the new center for a year.

High School Driver's Education Teacher Accepts Key Spot For Community Chest Fund-Drive

Kenneth D. Smith, president of the Board of Trustees of the Belleville Community Chest, this week announced the appointment of Herman D. Knuppel, of 96 Rossmore Place, as campaign director of the 1954 Community Chest Campaign, which will be held in the fall. Mr. Knuppel, on the staff of Belleville High School, plans a different approach to the house-to-house campaign than has been tried in recent years, in hopes that this section of the fund raising campaign can put the drive over the top.

Mr. Knuppel, on the physical education staff, is in charge of the drivers' education program. In that capacity he is vice-president of the New Jersey Driver Education Teachers Association. He also acts as public relations co-ordinator for the Belleville Public Schools. During his off seasons he is Cabana Superintendent of the exclusive Atlantic Beach Club, Atlantic Beach, Long Island.

Mr. Knuppel holds a B.S. degree in Physical Education, Health and Recreation from Panzer College, a master's degree in Administration and Supervision from Montclair State Teacher's College and has secured 32 credits beyond his master's degree at Rutgers University, where he is working for his Doctorate.

At Panzer College he was a star basketball player and highest scorer for the team which holds the longest winning streak of any college, 44 straight. Upon graduation from Panzer, he started his teaching at Frederick Maryland, while playing professional basketball with the Washington Capitols. He also played pro ball with Baltimore, Philadelphia and Wilmington teams.

Before coming to Belleville he taught in Palisades Park and Montclair.

CANCER CRUSADE AT 79 PER CENT OF \$7,500 GOAL

Commissioner Elmer S. Hyde Says Effort Will Continue So Campaign Will Be Successful

Commissioner Elmer S. Hyde, Chairman of the 1953 fund raising crusade of the Belleville division of the Essex County Chapter of the American Cancer Society, today announced that the residents of this community have contributed \$5,844 toward the current appeal, which is 79 per cent of the goal set for the community.

The Chairman stated that the many volunteer workers who are devoting their time and energy will continue the campaign and are putting on a concerted effort during the next few weeks to complete the assigned tasks so that the county will be able to take care of the needs of its cancer patients.

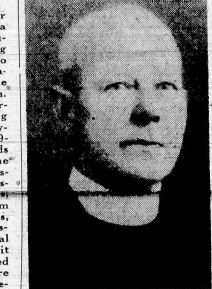
120 Couples Invited To Fewsmith Church Service

Neighbors Oppose County's Plan For Youth House, Here

Circulate Petitions in Streets Near Isolation Hospital; Building Would Replace Old But Model Institution

The neighborhood adjacent to Franklin Avenue and Continental Avenue seems destined to be very much in the spotlight at the meeting of the Board of Commissioners, on Tuesday night, with one delegation expected to oppose ratification of the Board of Adjustment action in granting a variance for the erection of an A & P Supermarket on the Plenge Farm, and another group from Berkeley Avenue and Carpenter Streets, filing a petition in opposition to the plans of the Essex County Board of Freeholders, to erect a "Youth House" to replace the County Parental Home in Newark.

First word that the County proposed to build the parental home here appeared in the Belleville Times-News in January, when it was reported that William Orchard, General Manager of the Wallace & Tiernan plant and a member of the board of directors of the county juvenile court, had appeared at a conference of the Board of Commissioners and had informed the Commissioners of the County's plans. The impression was given at that time that the town had no jurisdiction over the use to which the county puts the acreage owned by the county. At that time the Commissioners asked Mr. Orchard to recommend a conference of the Board of Freeholders to recommend to the County that a lot 150 by 150 on the County hospital site be reserved as a possible site for a future Belleville fire house.

Grubbin Retained
Attorney Robert C. Grubbin, who represented neighbors in the unsuccessful fight before the Board of Zoning Adjustment in the A & P Supermarket matter, has been retained by the group protesting the erection of the "Youth House". One of the leaders in the action is William Mishkin, 49 Berkeley Avenue, proprietor of the Riviera Roller Skating Rink, who has petitions circulating in Berkeley Avenue, Franklin Avenue, Continental Avenue, Celia Terrace, Fairway Avenue and Arthur Street. The petitions are addressed to the Board of Commissioners. There is some question that they are not being directed to the wrong parties for it is the Board of Freeholders who will be paying for the building and whose jurisdiction might have precedence over the town's actions.

Architect W. Orin Bartlett of Bloomfield, called Building Inspector Thomas P. Greco on Friday, when the County's plan in the matter was given publicity in Newark daily papers. He requested an appointment with Mr. Greco to discuss the erection of the Youth House. As was informed that under the zoning ordinance, correctional institutions are a prohibited use in a residential zone. After he was given this information Mr. Bartlett did not press for the appointment.

County Property
Again, however, the question can be asked, does the prohibition of a correctional institution hold for property owned by the County and which is not zoned in any manner, according to the town zoning map. This and the jurisdictional matter will have to be decided by someone on either the town or county level.

The Freeholders on Thursday voted to move the County Parental School from Sussex Avenue, (Continued On Page Two)

Newark and to build a new \$125,000 Youth Home on the grounds of the Isolation Hospital in Belleville. The Board also adopted a resolution providing for the issuance of bonds to finance construction of the new building.

At that time Freeholders Glick and others announced that ground would be broken in August or early September. In addition to a school building would contain the chambers and offices of the Essex Juvenile Court. The Newark building would be vacated and sold to the City of Newark for a Second Precinct Court.

Survey Made

The proposal to build the new school follows recommendations of surveys that were made by the Newark Probation Association and the State Department of Institutions and Agencies. The school is better for juvenile delinquents, most of whom are confined for only brief periods. While Newark home and management has been upheld as model, both on a national and international basis, the Newark building is old and provides only an acre for outdoor recreational activities.

Both reports said that the home should have a new building and that it should be located outside of the city but within easy traveling distance. The property in the rear of Isolation Hospital would provide six to seven acres for outdoor recreation. Plans for the proposed building would provide facilities for housing about 100 youths, twice the capacity of the present parental home.

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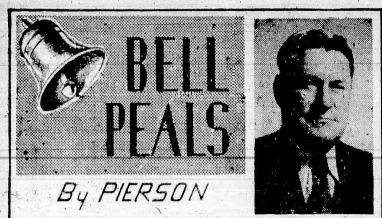

Not Disgraced

Belleville High's Varsity Eight, defending champions of the National Schoolboy rowing, failed to retain their title on Saturday at Buffalo, N.Y., but they were far from disgraced, and came off the river with the cheers of the spectators, by taking the winning boat of the Washington & Lee High School out of the water and putting it on the rack, to the wrong direction. Belleville took the full blow, rowing against the wind all the way. Shells on the inside lane, away from Lake Erie are in a more sheltered area and neither gain nor lose.

On Friday, in the same lane and with favorable wind Belleville rowed the mile in 5:17.8 to win with ease. On Saturday the winning time was 5:36 and Belleville finished two boat lengths behind the winners. Belleville kept abreast of Washington and Lee and George Washington until the three quarter mark, but then fell behind when the winners upped their stroke to 44 per minute.

Three members of the crew, Ronnie Worthington, Harold Sutphen and Bill Chapman, had been scheduled to be tapped by the National Honorary Society in school on Friday, but were missing out because of the trip. But they got their tapping on the boat on Saturday.

With the assistance of Coach Bill Bennett, Assistant Coach Raymond Smith and several of the mothers who were present, in the end the ceremony was a great success.

The Nutley crew which finished second in the consolation race, after coming in third in the qualifying contest, also won deserving cheers from the crowd. The Nutley episode, as reported by Bob Gorlin in the Nutley Sun, follows.

The talk of the National Schoolboy Rowing Championships at Buffalo last Saturday on Lake Erie was little Ken Magee, coxswain of the Nutley varsity. The slim Nutley junior captured the hearts of the throng that crowded the lake shore as he piloted the "Bill Bennett" in the consolation race to a second place finish accomplished without the aid of a rudder. The mishap occurred just before the running of the one-mile event on the cold, windy afternoon. While moving the shell, the rudder came in contact with a shoulder of one of the oarsmen and accidentally broke off. Coach Bennett frantically to solve the dilemma that unfortunately cropped up just at race time. In an effort to repair the shell, Bennett received the wholehearted co-operation of officials of Lower Merion High School, of Ardmore, Pennsylvania. With their shell already to be transported back to the Keystone State, the rival Pennsylvania coach in an effort to aid in the emergency, immediately dismantled his rudder to be used on the "Bill Bennett", only to find that it didn't fit properly. As a result Magee, the only underclassman in the lineup and his senior mates were forced to race in the consolation event without a rudder, a happening unheard of in crew circles. Not being able to control the course of the boat, Magee performed a perfect job as he directed the oarsmen by making one side ease up and visa versa, rowing without the aid of a rudder. The Nutley crew, still managed to stay in the lead, rooting for the handicapped crew, still managed to place second behind Bishop Timon, of Buffalo. Bishop Timon won by only one-half a boat length as the Nutley varsity was closing the gap with every stroke. Had the race been 50 yards longer, it was the consensus of those present that the Maroon would have tipped the Buffalo school at the finish and without a doubt would have been an easy race victor if they had been a rudder.

Arriving in Buffalo, Thursday by chartered bus, the Nutley and Belleville crews stayed first class as they stopped at the Statler Hotel. Following the second day of races the rowers traveled 15 miles north into Canada and visited Niagara Falls.
