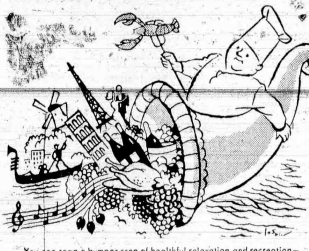

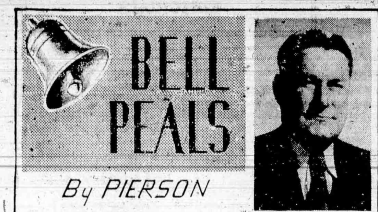

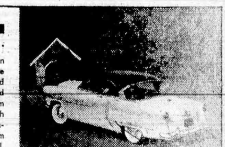

Our 19th District Congressman, Peter W. Rodino, blasted the State Department this week for having allowed the Hungarian government to recall its Ambassador in Washington. Dr. Emil Weid, without even as much as a blame for his extra-curricular and nefarious activities among Americans of Hungarian descent. The so-called diplomat is a Communist criminal with a long record of torture, an expert in the art of forcing "confessions". Instead of spending his time in Washington, he toured the country and sought to organize Communist cells among the Hungarians resident here. If such a Hungarian-American resisted being drafted into the Ambassador's spy-ring, he was threatened with reprisals against his relatives still in Hungary.

Rodino is right, the time to coddle the Communists is past.

The tremendous victory of Chancellor Konrad Adenauer in Germany last Sunday is proof that Communism has been stopped in its tracks in the West. The green and white flag of European Unity is the banner of the day, to rival the red flag of Communism.

By their action in returning Adenauer to power for four more years with an absolute majority, the German voters approved integration of West Germany in the anti-Communist front. By rejecting the Socialist demand that unification of Germany be put ahead of integration in the West, the German electorate gave Adenauer a clear-cut mandate.

Moscow ate sour grapes, clanging "terror" tactics in the German vote, blaming Wall Street and the Vatican for the Adenauer victory, and warning that the victory of the Adenauer government bars German unity for a long time. But Moscow never has allowed free elections in East Germany, nor would the Communists consent to an open plebiscite on German unity.

It would be a tremendous mistake to delay longer the integration of Germany in the community of Western nations. France can be depended upon to resist it, but in the interests of peace we must proceed. Communism has taken two resounding defeats in recent days, in Iran where its puppets are in prison and in Germany where the Communists, who held 15 seats in the 1949 Bundestag, now find themselves without a single seat and without an opportunity to ham-

string the government. In 1949, West Germany polled 1,361,706 Communist votes, or 5.7 per cent of the total vote cast; last Sunday, the West German Communists cast only 607,413 votes, or 2.2 per cent of the total vote.

The time to coddle the Communists is past, Rodino is right. R.E.H.

### A Flag That Bespeaks Gallantry

It is very fitting that another bit of Admiral Peary's flag has been returned to civilization from the frozen North where, since 1906, it had been buried in a cairn 400 miles from the Pole, because it stirred memories of a daring page of Nutley history and of the Peary explorations which the Admiral shared with his brother-in-law, Nutley's former mayor, Emil Diebitsch.

The Times-News took time out this week to ascertain from the National Geographic Society the full story of that tattered piece of silk, one of the most celebrated, widely traveled and torn-up flags in history. The segment, which two Canadian scientists brought back from Ellesmere Island was the third piece to be recovered of a silken flag which, the records show, was given to Admiral Peary by his wife, the Nutley man's sister.

For 15 years on his trips to the North, Admiral Peary wore the flag around his middle. He had two reasons for this. It would be handy for unfurling purposes if he ever reached the North Pole, and in the meantime it furnished additional warmth. But Admiral Peary had another quaint habit. Whenever he reached a historic spot, he'd tear off a piece of the flag and bury it there.

One he left at Cape Morris, in Jessup Greenland, at the world's northernmost tip of land. Another he left at Cape Thomas Hubbard, on Axel Heiberg Island, the westernmost point of land he reached. And the third he left at Cape Columbia, the northernmost point of land in Canada. It was from Cape Columbia that he jumped off for his two dashes toward the Pole, including the successful one of April 6, 1909 when Diebitsch no longer accompanied him on his explorations.

The first was found by Comdr. Donald B. MacMillan, Admiral Peary's aide and a famous explorer in his own right. A Danish crew found the Cape Jessup section. These have been given to Mrs. Peary, who lives in Portland, Maine, but comes to Nutley occasionally. And now the third part has been found.

Still missing — and likely to stay that way — are two pieces left in bottles on the ice, eternally drifting across the sea. One of these Admiral Peary left when he got to within 147 nautical miles of the Pole, the closest anyone ever had come at that time. The other he left at the Pole itself when he got there with Matt Henson, his negro valet, and four Eskimos. Since the ice drifts from 1 to 20 miles a day, these flag bits probably are gone for good.

While at the Pole, Peary also unfurled the "world's ensign of liberty and peace," given to him by the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Navy League flag, and the flag of his fraternity, Delta Kappa Epsilon. All three have been returned and are in the Smithsonian Institute.

But a fourth flag unfurled at the Pole is something of a mystery. It was white with a maltese cross, and was called a "Red Cross flag" by Admiral Peary. The National Geographic people told us this week they have searched everywhere, but they can't find out who gave it to Admiral Peary or where it now is. R.E.H.

## One Man's Opinion

Tito Rattles A Sword Just To Let The World Know That He Is Giving Away Nothing In The Trieste Dispute

There are a few "powder-barrels" in this world which are always good for a fight. The French and the Germans have gone to war many times over Alsace and Lorraine. Danzig always was good for a fight between the Germans and the Poles. Trieste is another, and recent days have seen a revival of the dangerous rivalry between Italy and Yugoslavia with a shooting war a certainty if either tries to take Trieste by force.

The strange aspect of the whole dispute is that neither Italy nor Yugoslavia has half as good a legitimate claim to Trieste as has Austria. The logical economic solution to the dispute would be to restore Trieste to Vienna as its seaport and revive the once-great trade of Trieste as inlet and outlet for the rich traffic of Central Europe, and, historically, a wrong would be righted.

The political solution, probably, will be to encourage Rome and Belgrade to try and find a compromise which would be acceptable to the West. There is, alas, a declaration made in 1948 which American and British statesmen now wish they never had made.

At that time, Tito was a pal of Joe Stalin and Italy was fighting for her democratic life against Communism. We and the British sounded off, badly, that Italy was entitled to the whole of the Free Territory of Trieste and that we would see to it that she got it. Today, the West is stuck with that promise, even though things have changed and we would prefer to see the Italians and the Yugoslavs divide the Free Territory between them.

### How It Stands

In reality, such a division already has been made. The Free Territory was divided into two zones, A and B. The northern half, including the city of Trieste, forms Zone A, which the Italians hold; the southern half, Zone B, is in Yugoslav hands. The latter, about 200 square miles in size, is economically poor but militarily vital because the Yugoslavs have built a powerful naval base as well as a good commercial port at Pola.

Emotionalism and nationalism appear to dominate where economics should decide, in the case of Trieste. It is a matter of history that Trieste, after centuries of rivalry and wars with Venice, placed itself under the protection of Leopold III of Austria. That was in 1382 and except for the Napoleonic campaigns when Bonaparte grabbed it, Trieste remained within the Austrian empire until 1918 when it was handed over to Italy by the Treaty of St. Germain.

### Centuries Of Activity

For nearly three centuries, from 1719 to 1891, it was a free port, serving all the people of the Danubian valley who escaped paying taxes on shipments through Trieste. Even Germany used Trieste, to the detriment of her own ports, until a grating government in Vienna abrogated the free port clause.

Trieste was the home port of the Austrian Lloyd lines before World War I and was a great rival of Venice for seaborne trade. With the transfer to Italy, Trieste waned and her trade dried up. The Italians refused to sacrifice Venice and developed the latter's trade. In a few short years, Trieste's shipping dropped from an annual average of 34,350 ships of 10,400,000 tons to 145 ships of a gross tonnage of 587,000 in 1925.

### Grass In The Streets

It was in 1933 that I visited Trieste on my way to watch a field maneuver by the Yugoslav Army. I found a shabby city, the shabby town of the mining era of our Wild West. There was not a freighter in port; grass grew between the cobblestones along the quays and the huge loading cranes were brown with rust. Trieste was a dead port and to this day it never has known a busy hour.

Now that Pola and Venice have taken all of Trieste's trade, neither Yugoslavia nor Italy really needs Trieste. Since this tricky question is being transferred to the city back to Austria as a convenient free port for the

What the United States has done in this latest flare-up is to urge both sides to calm down, to try to find a settlement satisfactory to both, also to assure the Italians that any Yugoslav seizure of Zone B would be considered a breach of the Italian Peace Treaty.

Every once in a while we receive a call from a customer, asking "is there a guarantee with your work?" The answer of course is "yes" and we know already without being told that there is another break down. Invariably it is "the same thing."

It never occurs to the con. plainer that "the same thing" could be caused by a number of defects. For instance if there is no picture, it may be caused by about 15 different tubes in the set or any one of a couple of hundred of parts. But invariably the customer insists "it must be that you just repaired," which, needless to say, almost never is the case. If you try to explain that when a motor in a car does not run, it may be due to lack of gas, a defective ignition system or carburetor, they understand. But they don't want to understand that the cause of the failure of the TV set also may be caused by something entirely different than what was repaired before. The next question always is "why didn't you check all the parts, you should have known that something might go wrong soon." This of course is ridiculous. We cannot tell you more when there will be trouble in a TV set than the garage man can tell when there will be the next flat, after he has just repaired the tire.

A TV set is a very complicated piece of apparatus with 20 or more tubes and hundreds of parts. If anyone of these tubes or parts goes bad, your set will not function properly. The older a set gets, the greater is the frequency of repairs. For this reason it does not pay to have an old set repaired again and again. People understand that a cap is subject to numerous repairs if it has run for 100,000 miles or so, but that a TV set, which has worked fine without much trouble for 2 or 4 years, will require repairs more frequently after such a long time of use, that they don't understand.

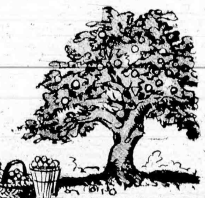

still unexcavated pyramids of much smaller size. Through the grants of the Mexican government and such interested groups as the Wiener Foundation for Anthropological Research such buildings as the homes of the pagan priests and the baths paralleling those of ancient Rome have been uncovered.

To the north of the Pyramid of the Sun is the Pyramid of the Moon, a smaller one but still an impressive sight although overgrown by grasses and wild flowers. To the south is the impressive and highly photogenic Temple of Quetzalcoatl, the "Feathered Serpent."

It is covered with beautifully carved stone heads of serpents emerging from the center of a stylized flower of feathers. Interspersed with the heads is a design of shells and snails painted red and white alternating with huge masks of the rain god, Tlaloc. The eyes of these masks were made of carved and glistening black volcanic glass, obsidian, now used in making settings for some of the very striking Mexican silver jewelry.

One of the treasures found at Teotihuacan have been taken to the National Museum in Mexico City but seeing them removed from their settings in the massive

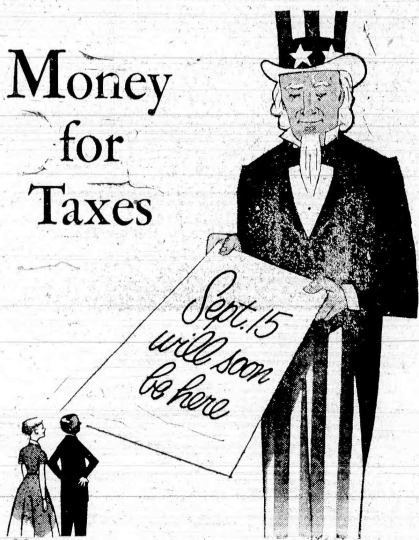

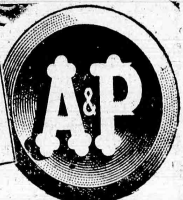
